Another Glance Afar

Having prognosticated already the American League East Division, the look suggests to the National League West Division. This shapes up as a two-team battle between the Los Angeles Dodgers and Cincinnati Reds.

The Dodgers made the World Series a year ago and returned with a strong lineup this campaign with few minor exceptions. Manager Walter Alton, the one-year contract man, has the same pitching staff even if Tommy John doesn't recover his old form. Any club with a Mike Marshall, peculiarities included, in the bullpen doesn't have much to worry about.

Jimmy Wynn, Steve Garvey and Ron Cey provide the power and not many teams can match the Dodgers' catching tandem of Joe Ferguson and Steve Yeager.

If any club is going to mount a challenge to the Dodgers, it's the Reds. Cincinnati is long on hitting but is somewhat short on pitching. Nolan Ryan, an 18-year phenom unbelievably eight years ago, returns to form watch out. The Reds have power—Johnny Bench, Joe Morgan and Tony Perez—and speed—Morgan, Dave Concepcion and Cesar Geronimo. Don Gullett figures to be the ace of the mound corps and Clay Carroll is a top-flight reliever.

If any club is going to make it a three-way battle, it's going to be from the San Francisco Giants. The Bay Area team was a major disappointment in 1974 but the roster is young which could fulfill minor league performances. Bob Murcer, acquired in the one-for-one swap with the Yankees for Bobby Bonds, could be the key if he develops the right attitude.

Houston, Atlanta and San Diego figure to be also-rans in this division. Taking into consideration all strengths and weaknesses, and going under the assumption that major injuries won't hit, the view from here tabs the Dodgers as champs of the West Division, and the inside position to return to the World Series for the second straight year.

Runnersup Proving They Belong in NCAA

NEW YORK (UPI) — There was a lot of criticism when the NCAA expanded its basketball tournament to let conference runnersup compete for the national championship.

Some people, coaches like UCLA's John Wooden among them, complained — and still are complaining — that the extra teams cheapen the tournament.

"I think they've done it pretty well," said Wood, who should qualify as an expert on the NCAA championship since his team won it in nine of the last eleven seasons.

But the fact is that the runnersup have done anything but cheapen the tournament and today two of them are in excellent position to reach the final four.

They're Maryland, which is a four-point favorite over Louisville in the Midwest Regional final at Las Cruces, N.M., and Kansas State, a four-point underdog to Syracuse in the Eastern Regional at Providence, R.I.

Neither Maryland nor Kansas State would have qualified for the NCAA tournament under the rules that prevailed before this year. The Terps were beaten in the semifinals of the Atlantic Coast Conference tournament. Kansas State finished behind Kansas in the Big Eight.

The other two regionals match some of the best guards in the nation. The Terps have the best guard in the Midwest, John Lucas, 6-3 Mo Howard and 6-3 Brad Davis, probably the country's best freshman guard. Louisville is led by 6-5 Junior Bridgeman and 6-4 Allen Murphy.

"They're the best guard combination in the country," Denny Crum, the Cardinals coach, says of

Funeral Services Set For Medwick Tuesday

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (UPI) — Funeral services will be held Tuesday in St. Louis for Hall of Famer Joe "Ducky" Medwick, the third member of the Cardinals' Gasbague Band of the 1930s to die in recent years.

Medwick, 63, died Friday morning at Bayfront Medical Center after being stricken with a massive heart attack in his hotel room. He had been here serving as batting instructor.

A 324 lifetime batter, Medwick was the last National League player to win the Triple Crown, in 1937. He had been the league's batting instructor since 1966.

Frankie Frisch and Dizzy Dean, prominent members of that St. Louis team, also died in the last couple of years.

Medwick, who played in the major leagues from 1932 to 1948 and still holds the National League record for doubles is remembered as the center of considerable controversy.

One of the most aggressive players to ever play the game, the right-handed-hitting Medwick was the target of fruit and garbage from the Detroit Tiger fans during the seventh game of the 1934 World Series; was beaned by former teammate Bob Bowman in 1940, which took away some of his batting prowess; and finally was openly critical of the baseball writers, who waited until his last year of eligibility before electing him into the Hall of Fame in 1968.

He's best remembered for the World Series incident in

Backroom Politics Confuses Williams

NEW YORK (UPI) — Baseball is a simple game but all the backroom politics involved keeps confusing California Manager Dick Williams.

Williams had penciled in the name of Bill Sudakis as his designated hitter and posted the line-up card in his dugout. But when he arrived at the plate to exchange line-ups with Cubs Manager Jim Marshall, he was told his pitchers would have to bat.

An American League team can only use the designated hitter in exhibition games with the National League when the opponent from the senior circuit gives its consent. The Cubs told Williams they would not consent.

"I can't understand why in our park we can't use the designated hitter," Williams said. "It's like saying if we can't play the ball our way, we'll take the ball and go home."

Williams hinted that the Cubs' decision to veto the designated hitter for the game came from "upstairs" and not Marshall. "What would have happened if Nolan Ryan got skinned," said Williams of his starting pitcher and bread winner. "He never goes to bat."

As it was, Williams hustled Ryan in and out of the game in three innings as the Angels tried this spring with a 6-4 verdict.

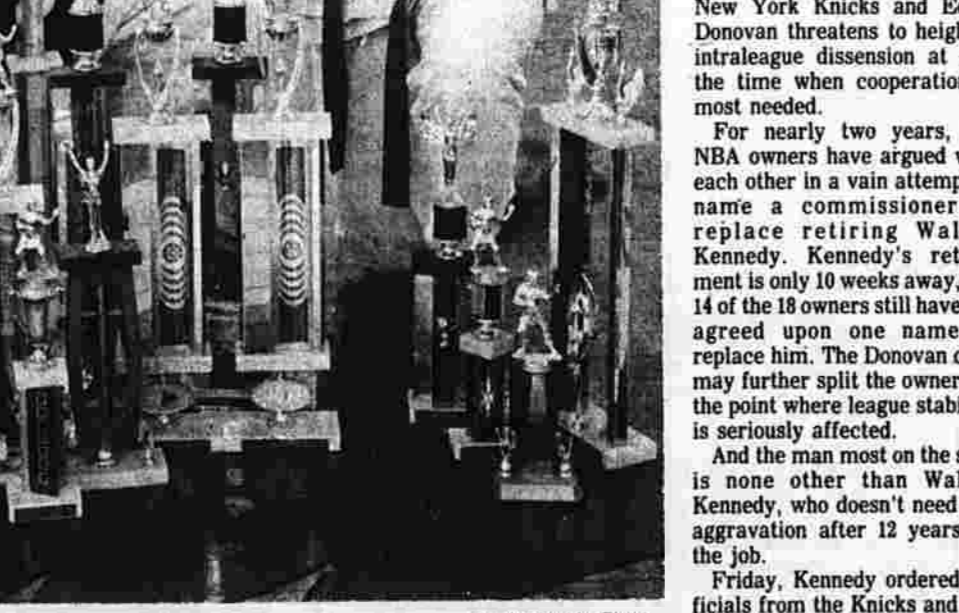

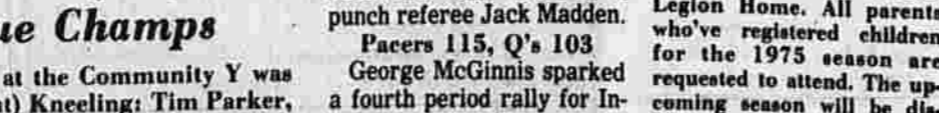

Manchester Week in Review Weiss Ouster Vote Delayed

The top story in Manchester this week emerged Tuesday night when, by a slim 5 to 4 vote, the Board of Directors tabled a formal vote on a motion calling for Town Manager Robert Weiss to resign. The tabling action is to next Tuesday, when the board will resume its recessed meeting and will vote on the motion.

The motion calling for Weiss' resignation was submitted by Vivian Ferguson and seconded by Phyllis Jackson. They charged Weiss violated the town's merit system by tailoring the application process for personnel supervisor to fit the person he appointed—Elizabeth Bauer. They charged he acted improperly and imprudently when he permitted Rec Director Mel Siebold to "daylight" in two teaching jobs and to collect extra fees for coaching the Manchester Swim Team, also on town time.

As of today, it isn't clear how the board will vote Tuesday. Based on last Tuesday's vote to table, however, it appears Weiss has the five votes he needs.

School Budget

On Friday, Weiss recommended a \$13,202,503 school budget for 1975-76, down \$18,400 from the school board's request but still \$1,022,503 above the current appropriation. Weiss' recommendation represents a potential \$1.5 million increase in the General Fund budget.

ADOPTION OF AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE
In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 3, Sections 1 and 9 of the Town Charter, notice is hereby given of the adoption by the Board of Directors of the Town of Manchester, Connecticut, Ordinance No. 1197, of Amendment to Chapter 122 (Pension) of the Ordinances of the Town of Manchester.

Chapter 122 of the Ordinances of the Town of Manchester is hereby amended to read as follows:
Sec. 122-5 (a), paragraph (1) is hereby repealed and the following is substituted in lieu thereof:
(a) Retirement by Pension
(1) Any provision of this Ordinance to the contrary notwithstanding, the Police and Officers of the Police Department may retire and receive pension payments provided they shall have completed at least twenty-four (24) months of service in the Police Department and have met the age requirement on the appropriate effective date listed below:
Effective July 1, 1974 - he has attained age fifty-five (55) and has attained at least ten (10) years of service in the Police Department.
Effective July 1, 1976 and thereafter - he has attained age fifty (50) and has attained at least ten (10) years of service in the Police Department.
Police and Officers may retire and receive a pension commencing the first day of the month following the completion of the above requirements. Effective July 1, 1975, each Police Officer and Officer included in the Plan shall be required to contribute to the Retirement Fund an amount equal to 2% of his wage or salary exclusive of any maintenance payments and other special payments or remuneration, but including overtime pay. Beginning July 1, 1974, such contribution shall increase to 3% and 4% effective January 1, 1975 and thereafter. Each contribution shall be deducted from the payroll and shall be entered in a separate fund known as the "Retirement Allowance Fund". The monthly amount of pension payable to a Police Officer or Officer included in the Plan shall be equal to 1 1/2% of his final average annual wage or salary. If a Police Officer or Officer included in the Plan shall be entitled to a pension for each full year and fractions thereof to the nearest completed month of such service in excess of one (1) year. The maximum pension payable under this Plan shall be 66 2/3% of a Police Officer's and Officer's final average annual salary.
Sec. 122-8, paragraph (1), is hereby repealed effective March 11, 1975.
Sec. 122-8 (b) is hereby amended effective July 1, 1975, by adding the following:
(g) Eligibility for Total Disability Pension (under 15 years of service).
Any Police Officer and Officer who shall become permanently totally disabled from engaging in any gainful occupation and employment, such total disability having been sustained during the performance of essential duties pertaining to his employment by the Town, and while acting in the scope of such employment, and such total disability having been caused by no fault or negligence on the part of such disabled member, may request, by written application to the Pension Board, that monthly disability payments be commenced to him, and be continued during the period of such disability, in an amount equal to 2% of his final average annual wage or salary for each full year and fractions thereof to the nearest completed month of such service in excess of one (1) year. Such disability payments shall be subject to the provisions of paragraphs (c), (d) and (e) of this Sec. 122-8.
Sec. 122-8 (b) is hereby amended effective July 1, 1975, by adding the following:
(h) Eligibility for Total Disability Pension (over 5 years of service).
Any Police Officer or Officer of the Police Department who shall have been employed in the continuous service of the Town for a period of five (5) years and who as an active member shall become permanently and totally disabled from engaging in any gainful occupation and employment, such total disability having been caused by no fault or negligence on the part of such disabled member, may request, by written application to the Pension Board, that monthly disability payments be commenced to him, and be continued during the period of such disability, in an amount equal to 2% of his final average annual wage or salary for each full year and fractions thereof to the nearest completed month of such service in excess of one (1) year. Such disability payments shall be subject to the provisions of paragraphs (c), (d) and (e) of this Sec. 122-8.
This Ordinance shall take effect ten (10) days after this publication in this newspaper provided that within ten (10) days after this publication of this Ordinance a petition signed by not less than five (5) per cent of the electors of the Town, and signed by the latest official lists of the Registrars of Voters, has not been filed with the Town Clerk requesting its reference to a special election.

State Government Not Open Now, Burke Contends

VERNON

"Presently the state does not have true open government," Vernon Representative Martin Burke (D) told the Connecticut Chapter of the American Society for Public Administration during a panel discussion recently.

The panel discussion centered around the topic, "Open Government: Do we have it or need it?"

Burke said, "Under the present law, meetings of governmental bodies can be closed merely upon majority vote. A weakness of equal significance in the exclusion of legislative bodies such as town councils and the General Assembly from the right-to-know law."

He noted that Florida's "Sunshine Law" contains few, if any, exceptions to requiring all meetings of public bodies to be open to the public at all times.

He added, "Significantly, the Connecticut General Assembly, this session, has opened all committee meetings to the public except for matters of personnel and security. The major change in the rules pertains to a change in the right-to-know law this session for all governmental bodies," he said.

Burke contends that the ideal law would preclude any closed sessions of government agencies but that reality dictates a few exceptions. He said there are some 21 proposals before the General Assembly Committee on Government Administration and Policy, for revision of the right-to-know laws.

Two Teenagers Sent to Prison

BRIDGEPORT (UPI) — Two Danbury-area teenagers have received stiff prison sentences for the fatal shooting of a 14-year old boy in Danbury early last year.

Richard Miller, 19, of Danbury, was sentenced to 8-16 years and John Johnson, 17, of New Fairfield was given a 6-12 year term. Both terms will be served at the state correctional facility in Somers.

He added that Governor Grasso has proposed a Freedom of Information Act which would make sweeping changes in the present law, prohibiting closed meetings of public agencies except for discussions concerning personnel, collective bargaining, litigation, public security, criminal investigative proceedings, and the purchase of real estate.

Governor Grasso also is proposing the creation of a Freedom of Information Commission to which any denial of access to a public record or exclusion from a meeting of a public agency could be appealed and determined within 30 days.

Burke said, "Whatever right-to-know bill is eventually passed this year, in my view, it must contain five basic ingredients."

He called for the limiting of the right to hold executive sessions to only those areas outlined in the Governor's bill; that all record of public agencies, with few exceptions, must be available to the public; that there be criminal penalties for violation of the law; that there be access to the courts for an injunction prohibiting closed meetings; and the voiding of any actions taken in violation of the citizens basic right-to-know what the government is doing.

Others participating in the panel discussion were: Marc Caplan, executive director of the Connecticut Citizens Action Group; Charles Morse, city editor of the Hartford Courant; State Rep. Russell Post of Canton; and Phillip Walker of the law firm of Day, Berry & Howard.

Meskill Opponents Critical of Panel Confirmation Vote

HARTFORD (UPI) — A leading opponent has labeled as "politics as usual," the Senate Judiciary Committee's 8-5 vote to approve former Gov. Thomas J. Meskill's nomination for a federal judgeship.

Sen. George L. Gunther, R-Stratford, said the former governor's victory Friday was disappointing and it was because of "politics as usual" on the part of the U.S. Senate.

Criticism also came from the Connecticut Women's Political Caucus and Common Cause in Connecticut.

The American Bar Association, announced after the vote to approve the nomination it would still oppose the nomination of the former Republican governor.

Evon Kochey, the director of Common Cause in Connecticut, said she was concerned because "there was not a thorough investigation of the leasing program."

Gunther said, "There are a lot of senators down there who cannot or will not look at the evidence in front of them because Meskill was promised the judgeship. It's 'politics as usual' and a great disappointment," he said.

Gunther was referring to a legislative report on Connecticut's property leasing scandal, which showed friends of the former Republican governor got favored treatment on questionable leases.

Gunther said he expected the U.S. Senate would confirm Meskill in the 2nd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

"At the present time there are 14 facilities being used for indoor recreation, 3 full-time and 2 permanent part-time staff members, and 150 part-time staff. We have approximately 25 programs for girls or women.

"In the last six months we had, for the first time, classes in modern dance, canoe and sailing, first aid and self defense; special events included ice sculpture and kite flying. The Outdoor Recreation Education Clubs started, but moving slowly. These programs have not increased our budget for staff or supplies.

"My first interest, other than my family, is the Manchester Recreation Department. The department is trying to help the people of Manchester enjoy their leisure time in this ever-changing society. To keep up with change we need to keep our ears open and tuned to the needs and desires of others. What was popular last year may not be this year; so we try and change. Its hard for many to understand and keep up with it, but I am trying and so is my entire staff.

"Not only is my staff trying to keep up, so is Mr. Weiss. In the five different jobs I have had, both in private industry and public service, Mr. Weiss is the best administrator I've worked with. He is always available to help when needed, lends support, and tries to understand department situations.

"If I am being used as a spring board, I don't like it. If attacks are directly pointed at me, then let's get together and get all questions on the board and discuss them. "I am very proud and happy to be working for the Town of Manchester and what to continue. My 17-year-old daughter will graduate from high school in June '76. At that time I want to move my family to Manchester. So please if there are problems let's get them taken care of now so we can all get back to providing the best for the Town of Manchester and stop bickering."

Hearings Set on Abortion Bills

HARTFORD (UPI) — In response to public demand, the legislature's Public Health and Safety Committee has announced that hearings will be held Monday on several bills to restrict abortions in Connecticut.

The committee said Friday it regarded the entire issue as settled by the U.S. Supreme Court decision on abortion, but out of deference to proponents of the legislation it will hold the hearing.

Gov. Ella T. Grasso said her opposition to abortion is well known but the Supreme Court ruling is the law of the land. She said she had not seen the proposed bills and could have no comment on them.

Before the committee are measures to:

- Impose the most stringent regulations permissible under the Supreme Court ruling.
- Prohibit experimentation on any live, aborted infant regardless of its stage of development.
- Require counseling at a suitable hospital, clinic or medical office at least 24 hours before an abortion is performed.
- Prohibit the use of any state funds for abortions.
- Prohibit the public advertising of abortion services.

—Prohibit discrimination against hospitals which refuse to perform abortions and to protect the rights of doctors, nurses and others who refuse to participate in abortions.

On another matter, House Minority Leader Gerald F. Stevens, R-Milford, said he supports a measure which would give Connecticut voters a direct say in the selection of political candidates.

The Republican leader said the current law, which allows a primary if a losing candidate at state party conventions wins a fifth of the delegate votes, does not go far enough.

A direct primary, he said, will bring the electoral process closer to the people.

Stage Company's Latest Just Isn't My Cup of Tea

"Afternoon Tea," a two-character drama which premiered at the Hartford Stage Co. Friday night, is an unconventional play.

"It has no story, no exposition, no high-pitched dramatic conflict," according to its author, Harvey Perr. "It is a celebration of events, most of them quite ordinary, and a savoring of those events as though they were happening for the first and last time."

The playwright is absolutely correct. It's not that "Afternoon Tea" is a bad show. For what it is supposed to be, it's good.

It's about ordinary people doing ordinary things, says the Hartford Stage Company's publication, "On the Scene."

It's also boring. To this novice theater-goer, probably unfit to critique a play, it wasn't very entertaining. I didn't take home any inspiring message, something I hoped for despite Director Paul Weidner's comment that the audience should forget a message.

Instead, I sat through the play, waiting for an

intermission. There wasn't one. About his latest play, Perr writes, "It's the only work of my own that I can still sit through and feel good about." I wonder if he did.

What happens in the play? It starts with Rachel (Barbara Caruso) arranging flowers and eating an apple. It ends with Rachel peeling an orange. In between those two events, Aaron (Jordan Charney) comes and leaves.

There's some dialogue, but it's pretty slim. There were a couple of lines which drew laughter from the audience, but I'm not sure they were meant to be funny.

One thing was very noticeable. Several people in the audience were already out of the door before any round of applause at the end of the show.

I wasn't one of them, though. I still applauded, uncertain whether the show was as dull as I first thought.

"Afternoon Tea" plays at the Hartford Stage Company through April 27. For ticket information, call 525-5601.

Twenty-five works of art by students in nine Connecticut school districts are on their way to France to represent the United States in an exhibition scheduled as part of the biennial conference of the International Society for Education through Art (ISEA).

Daguerreotype Demo Slated in Photo Show

Marvin Kreisman, a photographic collector and historian, will present a "live" demonstration of the daguerreotype photographic process, as used in the 1840s, at this weekend's Photographic Flea Market and Show in East Windsor.

The show runs until 5 p.m. today and from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. tomorrow. It's at the Ramada Inn off Interstate 91. General admission to the show, sponsored by the

Photographical Historical Society of New England, is \$1. The daguerreotype — this first permanent form of photography — was named after its French inventor, L.J.M. Daguerre. It was presented to the public in 1839, and the process was quickly adopted in the U.S.

Kreisman is one of about half a dozen photographers in the country who have experimented with the dangerous process in recent years.

Major Exhibition Comes to UConn

A major exhibition of 20th Century American art is now on view at the University of Connecticut's William Benton Museum of Art. The show, "Selections from the William H. Lane Foundation," includes 80 works, primarily oils, by 39 artists.

Included are most of the important artists who shaped American painting in the early decades of this century, a museum spokesman said. "They were artists who gave expression to their inspiration by America's natural, industrial, urban and social climate through their unique individualism."

The range of several artists is suggested by as many as five or six works spanning their careers. This gives the public an insight into the painters' style changes and development. Many of the paintings are

critical or transitional works, such as Stuart Davis' "Egg Beater No. 3," which is from a series done at a decisive period in his life.

Another is Charls Sheeler's "Spring Interior," which was painted in 1927. After completing this work, Sheeler didn't paint for two years, and then changed his style radically. This shift is shown by four later paintings.

The exhibit includes work by a number of such artists who made the customary pilgrimage to European art centers, and returned to America with renewed inspiration.

Six works by Arthur Dove, who arrived early (about 1910) at a personal abstraction, span the years from 1927 through 1942. They show the impetus he received from the changes in his physical locale.

The attraction of the New England coast is reflected in paintings by John Marin, Stuart Davis, and Milton Avery. The wide Southwest infuses other works by Georgia O'Keeffe, Marsden Hartley, and Marin.

"America's burgeoning industry is captured by works of Niles Spencer, Charles Sheeler, Rawison Crawford, and Joseph Stella.

Also displayed are paintings growing out of the "Abstract Expressionism" movement of the 1950s, such as works by Arshile Gorky, Hans Hofmann, and Franz Kline.

Groups planning to visit the museum can arrange in advance for a guided gallery tour by calling 486-4520. The Lane Foundation collection will run until May 25, but will be closed March 30.

The William Benton Museum of Art is open Monday through Saturday from 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., and from 1 to 5 p.m. on Sunday. Admission is free.

Noted Poet To Lecture

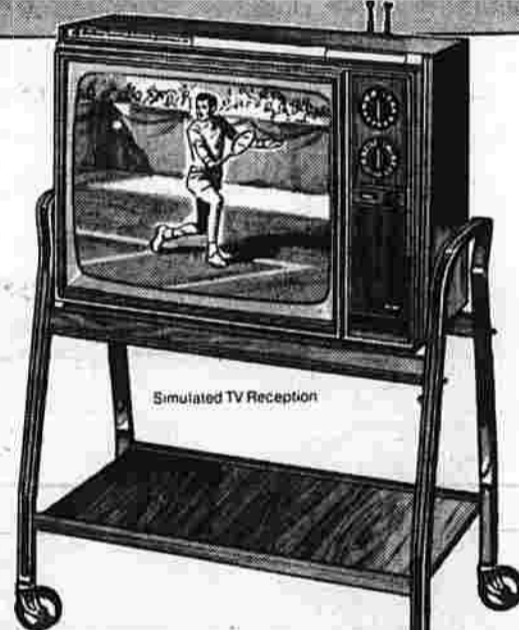

Book Review: An Easter Classic

"The Egg Tree," written and illustrated by Katherine Milhous and published by Charles Scribner's Sons, New York, 1950.

"The Egg Tree" was the Caldecott Medal winner for the outstanding children's picture book of 1951.

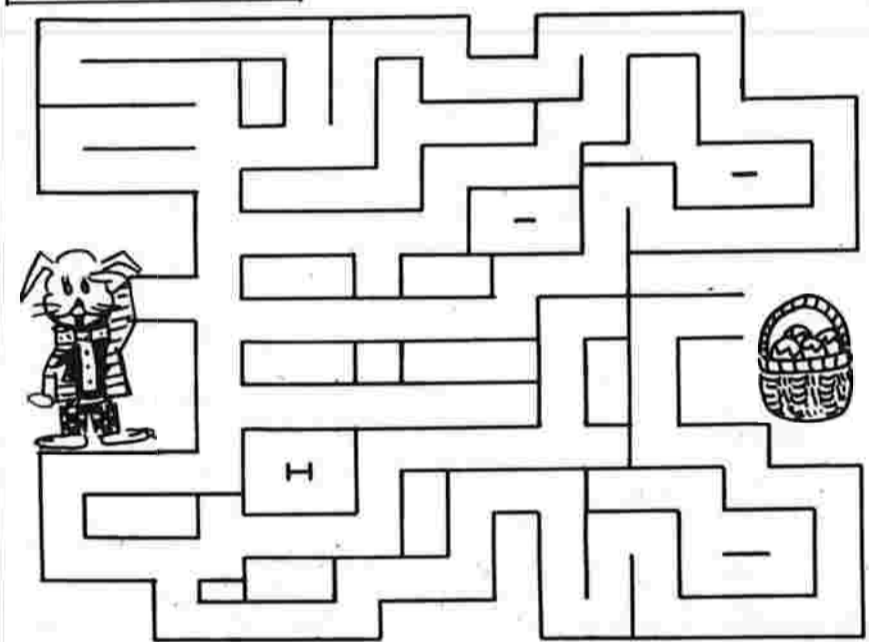
Fabergé fled to Switzerland where he died in 1920.

CPTV Show Aids Pilots

Can a televised weather program, aimed at aviation interests, succeed on prime-time public television? Connecticut Public Television thinks so. Each Friday at 7 p.m., viewers across the state use "Aviation Weather" for flight planning purposes and for keeping in step with new developments in aviation. The program is produced with the cooperation of the National Weather Service. The Federal Aviation Administration also provides services. A grant from the Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association's Air Safety Foundation helps pay for the show. Each program describes current and future weather to aid pilots in planning safe flights. Weather charts are displayed while local conditions are explained. In addition to weather information, the program features news for aviation interests and interviews with prominent people in aviation. "Star Trek," the long-defunct science fiction series, is now licensed to 142 television stations in syndication.

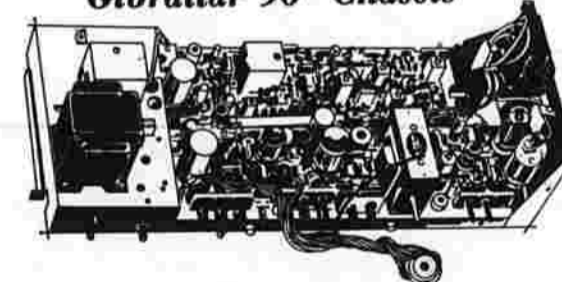

Mechanical Toys Reflect the Times

By JEAN BARNES

Mechanical banks and toys deserve more than just a nod from the passing scene.

Not only are they marvels of American ingenuity and skill but they reflect the times and manners of the periods in which they were made.

This is the opinion of Frank Laughlin who owns an extensive collection of banks and toys which date from the 19th century.

"In many instances they were a comment on historical events," he said.

His collection of banks and toys reveal the interest of the time — sports, circus, politics. Some invoke humor, satire or prejudice. Others were made with a great deal of realism and include trains, fire engines, carriages and early automobiles.

Biblical toys such as Jonah and the Whale and Noah's Ark were the only toys many children in religious households were allowed to play with on Sunday, Laughlin pointed out.

He explained that the collection is classified in three divisions — mechanical banks, toys and bell-ringer toys.

Most mechanical banks were constructed of cast iron which is quite heavy. That's why the coin depository is usually in a pierced or lacy pattern to lessen the weight.

Mechanical banks work with such intricate split-second timing that they have an almost magical quality. For

example, Uncle Sam with outstretched hand stands atop a box, a satchel at his side. A coin is placed in his hand, the lever is tripped and the bank is in motion. The satchel pops open and the coin drops in, leaving Uncle Sam's chin whiskers quivering.

Bell-ringers are a special favorite of the collector. "Usually toys made for girls, such as the bell toys, survived in better condition than those made for boys," Laughlin said.

"However, after 20 years, very few if any toy will survive and only then because of some unusual circumstance."

Cast iron toys and banks were made mainly between 1870 and 1910 by the hundreds of thousands. Most sold for less than \$1 or \$2. "Remember, \$10 weekly was a good wage for long hours," Laughlin said.

Workmen became extremely skilled in casting and using cast iron and the work was exceptionally smooth and intricate. Designs were painted by hand for very small wages.

Toys don't have to be old to be collectible, he said. "Their low survival rate is one reason. New collectors are turning to the mid-20th century toys that can still be found in abundance."

A word about reproductions. New collectors or speculators might be fooled but the experienced collector doesn't have any problem, he advised.
