Fittingly John Wooden Goes Out Winner, 10th National Title in 12 Years for UCLA

SAN DIEGO (UPI) — Fittingly, John Wooden has gone out a winner. The man who turned out the greatest dynasty in college basketball history did it again Monday night—his final game of coaching.

Wooden, the witty Wizard of Westwood, was conducting some kind of psychological warfare when he announced his retirement Saturday after UCLA's 75-74 overtime win over Louisville in the NCAA semifinals, it worked.

For the 10th time in 12 years, his UCLA Bruins won a national championship. Two days after Wooden's dramatic announcement, his Bruins beat Kentucky's take-no-prisoners defense, 92-85.

"I just can't believe a team could only play six men against such a fine, physical team as Kentucky and win," said Wooden. "But we did it."

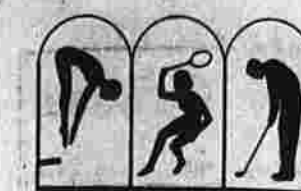

(Continued from Page One) That's why I appeared as a character witness for him and that's how I answered every letter I received in criticism."

Cotter said he can't and won't support further hikes in prices of home heating oil and residential oil and would support a tax incentive that would encourage conversion to coal. He stressed the importance of cutting down on oil imports and said he'd support relaxation of environmental standards — as a compromise with the needs of the economy.

He said he's still opposed to a gasoline tax but would vote for one — if the only alternative is an increase in home heating oil.

On other subjects — during a question and answer period — Cotter said he's confident a National Health Insurance bill will emerge from committee by November and will be considered by Congress by January.

He said he's opposed to placing the program under the Social Security system and favors its operation under existing facilities — private enterprise and insurance companies.

He dismissed rumors Congress may cut back on the revenue-sharing program, explaining it's become such an integral part of municipal financing it's become fully entrenched.

Cotter, who appeared as a character witness for Meckill, acknowledged he's been criticized for it by many state legislators. He said he's had 35 or 40 from Manchester alone.

Said Cotter, "Tommy Meckill and I have been personal friends for more than 25 years. We went through college together (Trinity) and I have great respect for him as a friend, a man and a father. The fact we've fought politically doesn't take anything away from my respect for him."

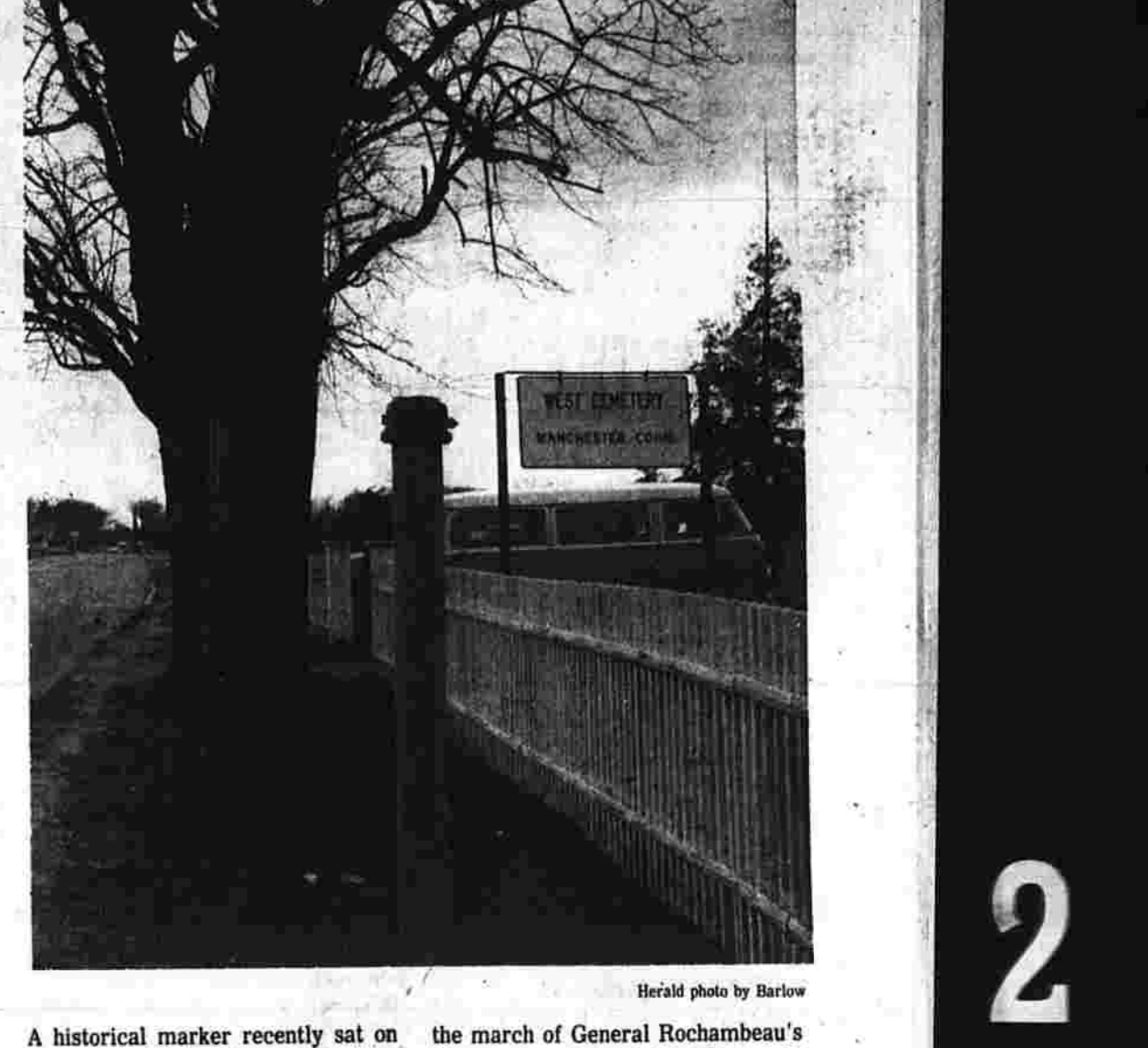

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Serious Crime Increases

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Serious crime in the United States increased 17 per cent in 1974, the biggest increase in 14 years and possibly the biggest ever, the FBI reported today.

In 1973, crime rose 6 per cent in 1973, and in 1972 it declined 4 per cent. Much of the 1974 rise came from a 19 per cent increase in the last quarter when unemployment first went above 6 per cent.

The Uniform Crime Report is compiled from reports of federal, state and local agencies.
