In an emotional resignation speech, South Vietnamese President Nguyen Van Thieu blamed the U.S. for his country's military disasters.

## Thieu Resigns

SAIGON (UPI) — President Nguyen Van Thieu resigned tonight in a speech in which he blamed South Vietnam's military disasters on U.S. failure to honor President Richard M. Nixon's written promises of aid.

The resignation opened the way for possible negotiations of a cease-fire with the Communists who have pushed the front lines to within 26 miles of Thieu's presidential palace and have massed 100,000 troops for a final assault.

At exactly 8:40 p.m. (8:40 a.m. EDT) Thieu, biting his lip and apparently fighting back tears, said:

"In front of the National Assembly, I announce my resignation as president.

"Goodbye, my friends."

Thieu said he and former President Nixon had agreed that the United States would provide all necessary aid to South Vietnam to defend itself if Thieu signed the Jan. 27, 1973, Paris peace agreement.

Thieu said he had been assured of U.S. aid, and it had not been delivered.

"I never thought a man like Mr. (U.S. Secretary of State Henry) Kissinger would deliver our people to such a disastrous fate," Thieu said.

As he delivered his televised speech to the nation, the North Vietnamese and Viet Cong closed in on Saigon from three sides.

The government earlier today abandoned Xuan Loc, which some persons have called the 1975 Dien Bien Phu.

Fifteen minutes after Thieu began his speech, authorities ordered an 8 p.m. to 7 a.m. curfew — one hour longer than the normal both in the evening and morning — apparently to avoid panic.

Saigon's defense forces were placed on full alert.

"If the United States had intervened as it should have, we would not be losing province capitals, district capitals," Thieu said.

"And we would not be faced with losing our national capital."

Thieu said he would hand power to ailing, 72-year-old vice president Tran Van Huong. But it was expected Huong also would resign. That would hand the presidency to Senate President Tran Van Lam, a political moderate who might be able to open peace talks with the Viet Cong before Saigon itself is attacked.

Thieu gave no indication whether he would leave Vietnam, but most senior officials said they believed he would seek exile, possibly in the United States.

"If the Americans don't want to support us any more let them go, get out! Let them forget their humanitarian promises!" Thieu said.

Thieu's 90-minute ended at 9:25 p.m. (9:25 a.m. EDT). He gestured emphatically throughout the speech. He pounded the lectern frequently and often repeated himself.

Huong, in the swearing-in ceremony, said, "I will defend the country and protect the constitution and carry out the duties of the presidency of the Republic of Vietnam."

Thieu kissed and embraced his successor before and after the swearing-in ceremony.

Thieu said South Vietnam had been constrained not to go into the north by international agreements, such as the peace accords in Paris.

But he asked, "If soldiers at outposts are overrun where do they go? They have no place. We have no place to run if we

give up the Republic of Vietnam."

Thieu said that the Communists receive more support daily from China "but our support from the Western world has been going down."

"To fight against the rebels we have to have ammunition, the wherewithal to fight," he said. "The other side gets it from the Communists."

"The Communists bring down more people, more tanks, more guns and they would like to overrun us."

"If the United States had intervened as it should have we would not be losing province capitals, district capitals and we would not be faced with losing the national capital. Maybe we could have worked out something with the Communists."

Massive pressure had been building on Thieu to resign for the past month following his order to abandon the Central Highlands without a fight. After that order, government forces were routed from the northern two-thirds of the nation and Communist troops swept to the very approaches of Saigon.

The 52-year-old president blamed "American pressure" for his decision to step down, but did not say in what way the pressure was applied, according to a source who was present when Thieu spoke.

U.S. Embassy officials said they were taken by complete surprise by Thieu's resignation. An embassy official told UPI only an hour before the resignation that the embassy believed Thieu would stand and fight.

Thieu's replacement, Vice President Huong, is a popular civilian in the Saigon area and a former school teacher who is known as totally honest.

Huong, a former mayor of Saigon and presidential candidate against Thieu in 1967, likely will serve only as acting president until a new administration can be formed, political sources said.

"I want to impress upon you the urgency of the current situation," Thieu said. The television speech was filmed at Independence Palace as he spoke to his supporters and other government and military leaders.

Thieu, who had served as South Vietnam's chief executive just 54 days short of 10 years, said when he took power South Vietnam was threatened by a Communist takeover.

There was no sign of panic or nervousness. Most residents were unaware of the fact the government had lengthened the curfew hours.

SAIGON — President Nguyen Van Thieu resigns, blames Kissinger for leading South Vietnam into disaster by not honoring written Nixon commitments. Resignation expected to lead to negotiations for a cease-fire.

WASHINGTON — President Ford calls Secretary of State Kissinger to White House to discuss Thieu resignation. There was no immediate official White House comment on the resignation.

SAIGON — Communist troops capture provincial capital of Xuan Loc, once seen as a symbol of resistance to the Communist drive. Front lines 26 miles from Saigon; Communists mass 100,000 troops for final assault.

CLARK AFB, Philippines — More than 600 Americans and South Vietnamese fly to Clark from Saigon in stepped up evacuation.

BANGKOK — Thai Foreign Minister Chatchai Choonhavan says that American military equipment being brought into Thailand by fleeing Cambodian government troops will be turned over to the Khmer Rouge insurgent government in Phnom Penh.

VIENTIANE — Renewed Communist attacks threaten to cut a vital highway linking Vientiane and the royal capital of Luang Prabang.

## Top Court To Decide Man's Life

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Today the fate of Jesse Thurman Fowler, a 26-year-old truck driver sentenced to die in the North Carolina gas chamber for killing a man in a dice game, will be up to the Supreme Court.

The Supreme Court banned capital punishment in 1972. By a 5-4 vote, it said the death penalty was too arbitrary, that there were too many loopholes for a defendant to escape execution.

In today's oral arguments, the court was to be asked to decide a wider question — whether any death penalty violates the constitutional ban on "cruel and unusual punishment." But the high court has the option of deciding the Fowler case on a narrow technicality that would not affect the other condemned prisoners.

Thirty-one states have interpreted the court's 1972 decision to say that if the death penalty is mandatory, it will pass constitutional muster. That many states have passed stricter laws and under them, 219 persons are on death row in 22 states. Fowler is one of them.

However, his particular case gives the court a chance to avoid a definitive ruling, because he was sentenced under a North Carolina Supreme Court ruling — not a change in state law.

In January 1973, 10 months after the Supreme Court ruling, the North Carolina court voted 4-3 to remove the option of life imprisonment. Death became the only penalty upon conviction of rape or first degree murder. Judge Henry McKinnon sentenced Fowler in Raleigh, Oct. 1, 1973. Only last year did the North Carolina legislature pass a new law.

The U.S. Supreme Court could say the state court had no power to make the revision, giving Fowler his life but avoiding a capital punishment ruling that applies everywhere. Six other appeals from North Carolina are pending, along with death cases from Louisiana, Florida and Georgia.

In decisions handed down today, the Supreme Court:

•Rejected James W. McCord's appeal of his conviction for breaking into National Democratic Headquarters in the Watergate complex in June 1972. The court refused to review McCord's claims that his trial lawyers cooperated with the White House in attempting to protect top aides in President Nixon's re-election campaign.

In rejecting McCord's appeal, the justices a second time found nothing to warrant review in Judge John J. Sirica's conduct during the break-in trial.

•Let stand a lower court decision upholding laws allowing alimony only for women. The justices declined to grant review of an appeal of a Georgia decision which upheld that state's laws barring alimony for men on grounds that women are in need of greater financial aid after a divorce.

## Governor Names State's Top Cop

HARTFORD. (UPI) — Gov. Ella T. Grasso today named State Police Lt. Edward Leonard to replace Cleveland Fuessenich as commissioner of state police.

Leonard, 46, who helped establish the department's first narcotics squad, told newsmen he opposed a bill before the legislature to "decriminalize" marijuana and supports state police use of controversial "dum dum" bullets.

A native of Bridgeport, Leonard will assume his new post May 1 at an annual salary of \$30,200.

The selection of Leonard, a Stratford resident, completes Mrs. Grasso's cabinet appointments.

Currently the commander of Westport Barracks, Leonard has been a state policeman for 22 years. He graduated from the State Police Training Academy in 1953 and was first assigned to the Westbrook Barracks.

Married and the father of six children, Leonard holds an associate degree in law

enforcement from University of New Haven.

He said he opposed decriminalization of personal possession of an ounce or less of marijuana because the user invariably comes into contact with other hard drugs and runs the risk of using addictive narcotics.

Leonard said state policemen should not be barred from using dum dum bullets because they are entitled "to use any weapon to protect the life of the officer."

One of Fuessenich's most controversial decisions was to equip his men with powerful .357 magnum pistols and dum dum bullets.

Civil libertarians oppose the dum dum as "cruel and unusual" and the legislature is considering prohibiting the bullet, already banned by international treaty from use in warfare.

Fuessenich, who was appointed commissioner four years ago by then Republican Gov. Thomas J. Meskill, is expected to retire from the force.

## Schools Measure Advances

HARTFORD (UPI) — The legislature's Education Committee today was expected to approve a measure that lawmakers hope will eventually provide equal school revenue for all 169 Connecticut towns regardless of their wealth.

Sen. Mary Martin, D-Groton, co-chairman of the committee, said the measure would replace Connecticut's "current inequitable and unconstitutional 'flat grant' school aid system with a new 'guaranteed tax base' program" without requiring increased state taxes.

Mrs. Martin said the measure "represents a necessary step towards building the type of fair and equitable school finance program while at the same time recognizing the need for fiscal restraint in these difficult times."

Connecticut communities currently receive an annual flat grant of \$250 per pupil whether the towns are wealthy or poor. The arrangement was held unconstitutional in a recent Superior Court ruling.

Mrs. Martin said that under the new proposal, all municipalities "eventually could receive basic state aid amounting to the difference between the school revenue they raise from their own taxes and the amount they would raise if they had the taxable wealth of the 85 percentile community."

This means, she said, the community with more taxable wealth than 85 per cent of all others.

Most towns will receive additional aid under the proposal, she said.

Rep. Robert M. Walsh, D-Coventry, said, for example, that Hartford would likely get an extra \$683,000 under the new proposal; Bridgeport an additional \$584,000; Torrington an extra \$139,000; Griswold an extra \$46,000 and Sterling \$11,000.

Thirty-six towns will lose aid under the program, including the affluent Fairfield County towns of Darien, Greenwich and New Canaan, Walsh said.

## Floor Fight Due Over Judgeship

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate is ready this week for a rare floor fight over the confirmation of a presidential appointee.

He is former Connecticut Gov. Thomas J. Meskill, who has run into strong opposition from fellow lawyers, other politicians and feminists, who oppose his nomination to the 2nd U.S. Court of Appeals.

Some observers predict Meskill, whose nomination was one of the last official acts of former President Nixon, will be confirmed but only by a narrow margin and bitter debate.

The Senate has scheduled six hours of debate this week to begin after it completes action on humanitarian aid and evacuation assistance for Vietnam.

Nixon nominated Meskill, 47, to the lifetime circuit court post on Aug. 9, 1974, only hours before leaving office. Meskill, a conservative Republican and ardent Nixon supporter, was recommended for nomination by one of Nixon's sternest Republican critics, Sen. Lowell P. Weicker of Connecticut.

The \$42,500-a-year circuit court job ranks second only to a Supreme Court post in prestige and judicial authority.

Meskill's appointment won a narrow 8-6 approval in the Senate Judiciary Committee after five days of hearings that stretched over six months. His opponents mounted two lines of attack: Political and professional. On the latter score, critics say he lacks the legal experience to qualify for the job.

Chief among Meskill's professional opponents is the American Bar Association, which had not opposed a major federal bench appointment since it helped block the district court appointment of Francis X. Morrissey 10 years ago.

The National Organization for Women started its own grass-roots anti-Meskill campaign Friday, urging its 40,000 members to pressure their home state Senators to vote against confirmation.

Angered by Meskill's opposition to liberalized abortion laws when he was Connecticut governor, NOW said: "He has the potential for being the worst judicial sexist ever to be placed on the bench."

Calling Meskill "manifestly unqualified" for the circuit court bench, the ABA testified: "He had no appellate experience, substantially no litigation experience and less than eight years of professional experience."

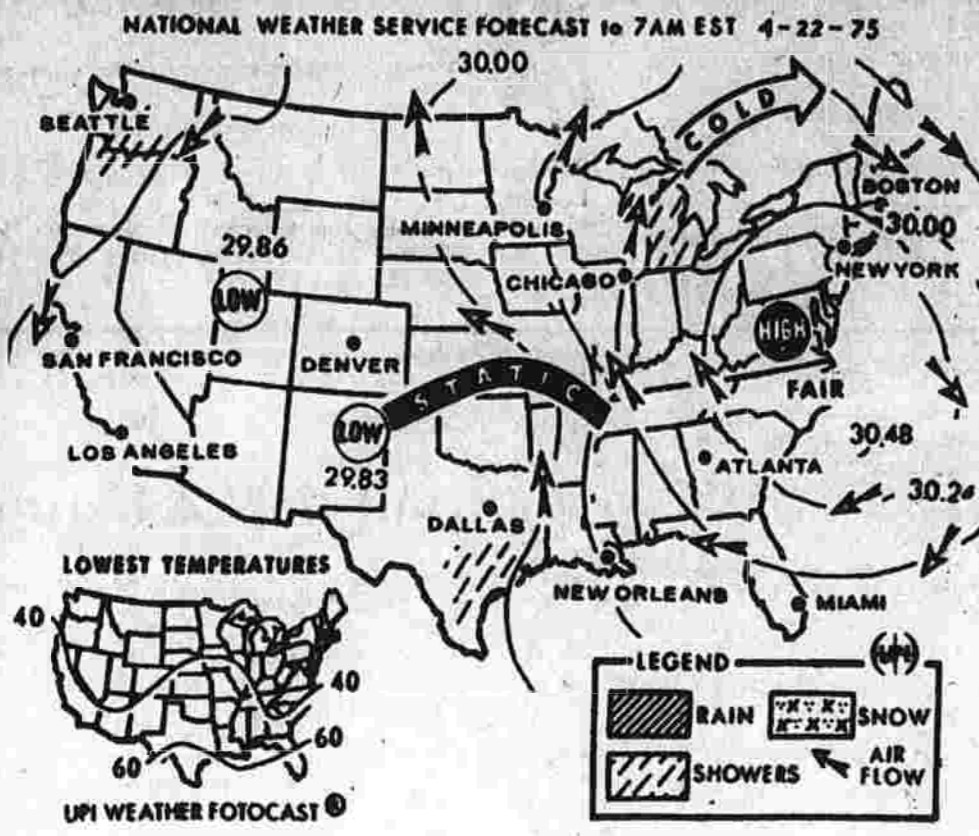

The Board of Finance has scheduled a budget hearing tonight at 8 at the Hebron Elementary School to review the proposed general government and the Board of Education budget for 1975-76.

These two budgets — \$50,994 for the General Government and \$664,810 for the Board of Education — plus an estimated \$906,947 which represents Hebron's share of the Regional District 8 Board of Education budget, totals \$2,372,791 as compared to \$2,156,510 this year.

The school board's proposed budget of \$664,810 is a \$127,810 increase or a 19.2 per cent over the current budget of \$537,000. This leaves the town faced with the possibility of raising for the three budgets, through property taxes, approximately \$216,291 more than last year.

The Board of Finance urges residents to attend this hearing and to speak out on any proposed items in either the General Government or Board of Education budget.

David Albee, chairman of the Hebron Board of Education is asking the public understanding and support of the proposed 1975-76 Board of Education budget, saying it is essential to the maintenance of a viable educational program for Hebron children.

Although the proposed education budget is up \$127,810, he said it is a bare bone budget which is designed to provide a basic educational opportunity for all children.

Traditionally Hebron has ranked relatively low among towns in the state as measured by per pupil operating expenditures. In 1973-74 Hebron ranked 32nd among the 169 towns.

Aaron Reid, first selectman, commented last week that he was "very disappointed in the job the Board of Education has done this year on the budget."

## Lindsay Amendment Seeks Eased Liquor Restrictions

The Manchester Planning and Zoning Commission (PZC) is being asked to consider a zoning regulation amendment which would ease restrictions on serving liquor in just the Central Business District (CBD) Zone.

The amendment, to be aired at public hearing May 5, was requested by Barbara H. Lindsay, Mrs. Lindsay's husband, Albert, is one of the developers of a proposed downtown mini-mall which would include a liquor-serving restaurant.

Mrs. Lindsay's proposal would place distance restrictions on CBD establishments only if they have the same type of state liquor license. Existing regulations prohibit liquor outlets within 1,000 feet of another liquor outlet, regardless of the type of license.

The proposal, expected by the PZC since Lindsay explained his interest last month, would add a new paragraph to town zoning regulations:

"In the Business Zone CBD there shall be a minimum distance of 1,000 feet in a direct line between premises occupied by establishments in which are held the same class of liquor permit (as the same are defined in Connecticut General Statutes). The classes of permits to which this applies are:

- (1) Package store permit, (2) Package store beer permit, (3) Hotel permit, (4) Restaurant permit for beer only, (5) Restaurant permit, (6) Restaurant permit for beer only, (7) Restaurant permit for wine and beer only, (8) Cafe permit, (9) Club permit, (10) Tavern permit, (11) Druggist permit, (12) Druggist permit for beer only."
- If the proposed amendment is adopted by the PZC after public hearing, Lindsay would be able to include a full-service restaurant in his proposed mini-mall at 81-83 Main St., because its permit wouldn't be of the same class as other liquor outlets within the 1,000-foot limit.
- The proposed amendment contains provisions that appeared to be favored by the PZC when it rejected a different liquor amendment last year.
- Last year's proposal, drafted by Town Planner J. Eric Potter, would have removed the 1,000-foot restriction for "bonafide restaurants with inside seating capacity of not less than 200." Potter's amendment would have affected every zone in Manchester.
- When Lindsay appeared before the PZC last month, he said his mini-mall had been in the planning stages for several months, awaiting PZC action of liquor rule changes. The full-service restaurant would be the mini-mall's major tenant.
- The amendment proposed by Lindsay's wife is the only item on the PZC's May agenda.

**MACC NEWS**

Food Day 1975 has a new theme: "Plant a Seed for Change." We are urged to plant a garden, window box, even a pot of herbs and salad greens in a sunny window; to explore the possibilities of community gardening; to grow something and then perhaps figure the cost of seeds, seedlings, plants and give this "seed money" through one of the agencies to combat hunger and to help small farmers grow more food where the need is greatest.

Here at home, more Americans than ever before are planting food gardens. For thousands of families a vegetable garden is a necessity; they really need the food they can grow. For many of the rest of us, the backyard garden is a means of stretching the food budget or even just a pleasurable hobby-type activity.

To millions of desperately hungry families in famine stricken areas of the world, a garden is the dream—a dream that could mean life itself. If they had their own land if they had the tools they need if they had water.

For famine victims in Bangladesh, in India, in the Africa Sahel, spring is a season come and gone. For many it is already too late. Planting requires the strength to dig and plant—and hope.

\$1000 to Niger  
Manchester Council on World Hunger has just allocated \$1,000 through a Church World Service hunger relief project in Niger, Africa. Niger lies just at the south edge of the Sahara desert, an area of scarce rainfall in many areas. In other areas the rain is very sporadic, coming down in heavy downpours at times and then for months drought.

Between rains the people travel long distances in an attempt to find life sustaining water. Crops which fail the livestock begin to die, food becomes harder and harder to obtain. The results are familiar to most of us from the newspaper, the magazines—TV specials.

The thousands of dollars sent by you to Niger will go toward the digging of wells in the town of Kella, and the planting of some 17,000 eucalyptus trees. This will be part of a long range overall project including the building of a reservoir which can be filled by runoff from the occasional heavy folding and rains, well digging to tap the underground water which has been found but is inaccessible to the people and which will eventually be increased by percolation from the reservoirs, and eucalyptus trees which will be planted in strategic places to help break the dehydration effects of the prevailing winds which frequently are enormous in strength—another source of crop destruction.

As limited irrigation becomes possible from these wells, more vegetables and grain can be produced—more food will be available and fewer people will die. Almost \$25,000 is needed to carry out the total project. Our \$1,000 is a link in this chain of life being forged across a sea. Your caring will bring for the people of Kella a new spring, and the strength and means to plant and hope again.

Hope Gardens  
We have good land here. Unfortunately for some of us who could most use the food grown in a family vegetable garden, there is no land available. They are living in apartments or duplexes with little or no yards. If you are interested in working with the council to explore the possibility of making land, seeds, plants, and tools available to families needing to supplement and stretch their food supply with fresh vegetables, please call the conference office, 648-2883. Concordia Lutheran has sent \$11 to the MACC Emergency Food Pantry for use on such perishable goods as eggs for special diet needs (diabetics—salt free diets of elderly people).
