### Aid Bill Advances

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The \$227 million and authority to use American troops in evacuation operations in South Vietnam requested by President Ford 18 days ago, appeared headed for congressional approval today. The House votes this afternoon on a House-Senate conference report and if it passes it will be sent to the White House where the President is expected to sign it. Ford is waiting for Congress to tell him what power he has to evacuate allied Vietnamese, who might face Communist reprisals.

### Protter Surrenders

JOHANNESBURG (UPI) — David Protter, a South African Jew employed by the Israeli Consulate as a security officer, surrendered to police today. Protter Monday took over the consulate single-handedly and held the more than 20 persons in the building hostage for 16 hours. At least two persons were killed and 32 injured, although none of the hostages was harmed. Protter threatened to blow up the building, along with the hostages, unless he was given safe passage to Tel Aviv in an Israeli plane where he apparently wanted to speak with the prime minister. Protter surrendered quietly just before dawn and was driven to Pretoria by South African police.

### Wallace Queried

WASHINGTON (UPI) — George C. Wallace ran into a hornet's nest of questioning House freshmen Democrats Monday. He had come to Capitol Hill to testify in support of federal tax checks that state officials will mail in the questioning, Wallace was given a temporary respite by the buzzer signaling a House vote, but he was asked to wait and resume the discussion after the vote was taken. Finally the ordeal was over and a tired Wallace was wheeled from the room with his wife by his side.

## Unconditional Surrender Ends 35 Years of War

SAIGON (UPI) — A triumphant Communist army riding tanks, trucks and captured American Jeeps took over Saigon today and raised the Viet Cong flag over the presidential palace in what the Communist world hailed as a great victory of historic importance.

The Viet Cong and North Vietnamese troops jubilant over the unconditional surrender that ended 35 years of war against American, French, Japanese and South Vietnamese forces—sized Saigon radio and announced they were renouncing the South Vietnamese capital "Ho Chi Minh City."

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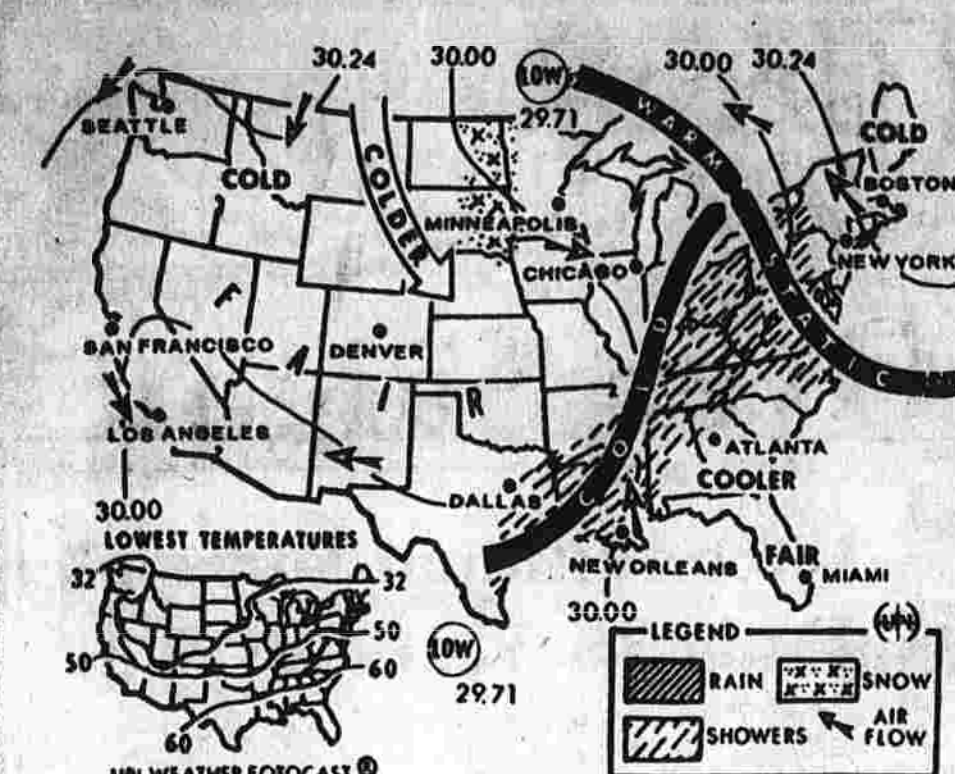
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## War Ends for United States With No Rallies, Parades

# Mayors Want State Funds For Obligatory Programs

 In a message released Monday, Vernon Mayor Frank McCoy, president of the Connecticut Conference of Mayors and Municipalities, urged state legislators and state officials to reject any proposed legislation which mandates programs unless accompanied by a 100 per cent reimbursement of the cost.

McCoy said state-mandated municipal services are identified and analyzed in a detailed report issued to all state legislators by the conference. He said the report covers 22 areas where state legislative mandates impose additional costs or administrative burdens on cities and towns.

He added that in some cases the state has failed to keep abreast of actual costs when

determining reimbursement rates, but in many cases there is no reimbursement at all. He said no such list has been compiled by the state so legislators have been awaiting its publication by the conference.

He listed some of the areas where the conference feels the state should either pay more of the bill or eliminate the mandate.

One of these areas is school transportation where he said the \$20 per pupil reimbursement only applies to students up to 14 years of age.

He said the increasing scope of mandates concerning water pollution control has not been met by money. He said there is only partial reimbursement for construction of sewage treatment plants and none at all for operating costs. Vernon is one of the towns that has been ordered to build a new treatment plant to abate pollution of the Hockanum River.

He said the state requires unemployment compensation for municipal employees but provides no funds, leaving the burden with the municipalities.

On the mandate concerning the phasing out of tax on merchants' inventories, there

is only partial reimbursement from the 1974-75 state reimbursement.

McCoy said.

There is a long list of other such programs, including the requirement of a municipal agent for elderly which the state doesn't finance but "passes the buck to local taxpayers," McCoy said.

Another area he mentioned was welfare which the towns must provide, but the state gives them nothing to administer such programs and reimburses only 90 per cent of the welfare grants.

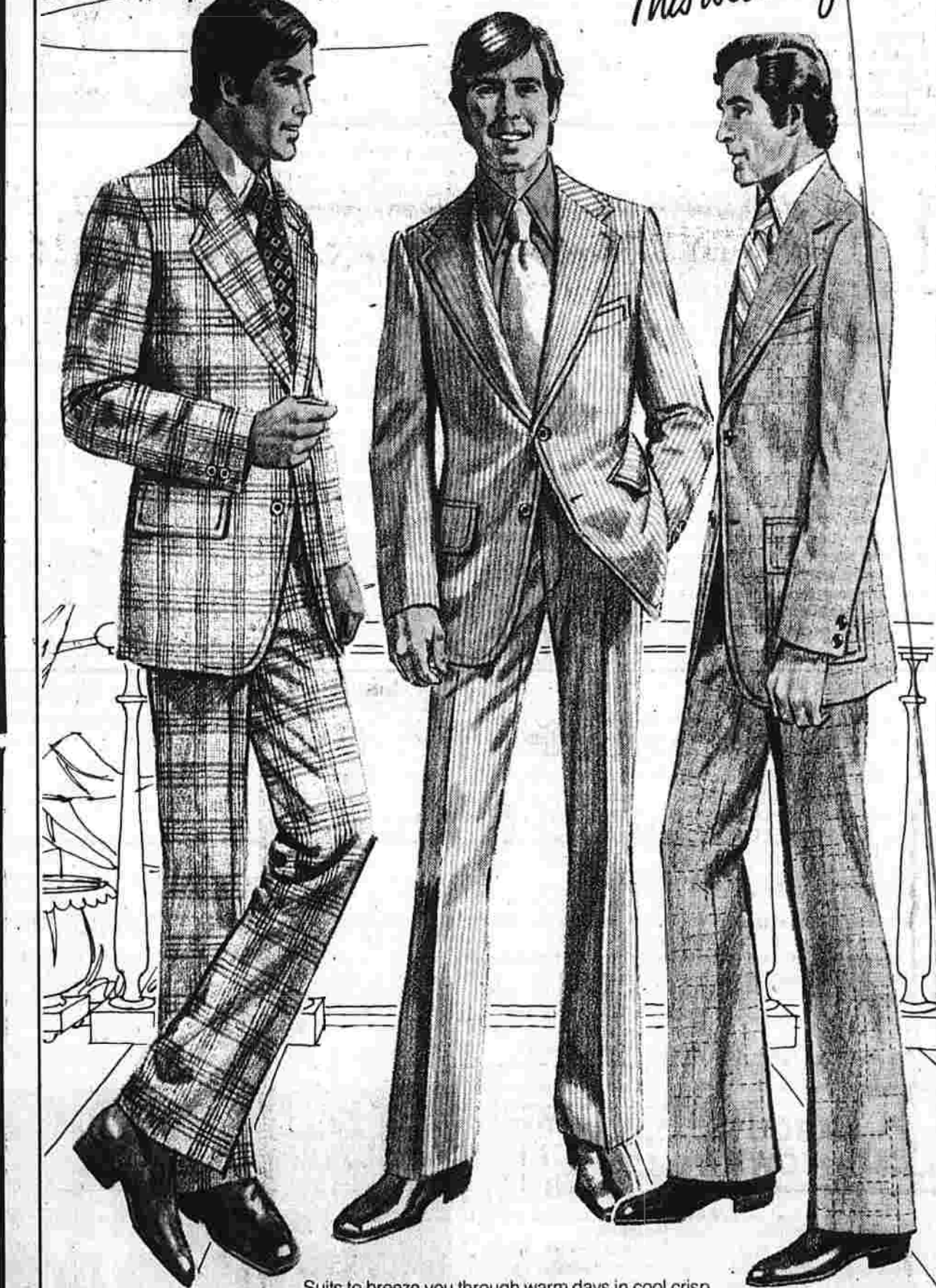

# McCarthy '76: To the Barricades Softly

 WASHINGTON (UPI) — Dodge the subway construction, litter on Connecticut Avenue, find the unmarked door between the Sewing Shoppe and the Soup-Er Cafeteria and ride the ancient elevator three floors to the hushed, nearly empty suite of offices.

There it is, McCarthy '76. The campaign headquarters of the politician-poet from Minnesota who began the job of dumping President Lyndon B. Johnson seven years ago and now has undertaken to seize the White House without benefit of a political party.

He is the same Eugene McCarthy, a tough grayer and a bit more baggy-eyed at age 59 but still displaying that odd mix of languid assurance and suppressed outrage that made him a hero on college campuses and in liberal saloons of the late 1960s.

He no longer is the organization Democrat who huzzaged for the vice presidency in 1964 and then sought to lead his party against its own President in 1968. Today he is a political loner, sitting in a rented office bare of the trappings of the past.

He speaks quietly now of leading a guerrilla campaign against the two-party system's grip on selection of U.S. government leaders.

McCarthy is the presidential candidate of the Committee for a Constitutional Presidency, which his friends created last summer. He calls it a "movement" rather than a political party.

He appears weekly before student forums, citizen groups and living room receptions where the faithful still revel in McCarthy's style — the wry digs at orthodox politicians, acid-dipped observations on the follies of government, the cool confidence in the rectitude of his views.

McCarthy does have a plan for 1976 to get his name on the presidential ballot in every state and then "confront" the two major party candidates.

His purpose, he says, is two-

fold — to challenge state laws that often require candidates to have the support of a conventional political party, and sometimes freeze out all but Democrats and Republicans.

"To force other candidates to discuss the present political process, which he believes has distorted the intentions of the Founding Fathers, and how they would conduct the office and use the power they are seeking."

McCarthy questions the methods both Democrats and Republicans use to select presidential candidates. He objects to campaign finance laws that limit individual contributions and favor the established parties in distorting public campaign funds.

"The question of procedure and how you operate, especially the presidency, in my mind is almost as important as where you may stand on the critical issues that face the country," McCarthy says.

"They ought to say who they would appoint attorney general and Treasury secretary... and perhaps even who they would appoint to the Supreme Court if they had the opportunity during their terms," he said in a recent interview.

The names, he suggested, would be a tipoff to voters about where a candidate stands. His own choices, he said, would reflect his concern over personal liberties and an economy which not only nurtures jobs and business but takes into account energy needs, conserving resources and protecting the environment.

Sandra Stave, chairman of the Planning and Zoning Commission, expressed her displeasure Monday with the cut made by the Town Council in the town's annual contribution to the Windham Regional Planning Agency.

In an attempt to save money in the upcoming budget, the council cut its contribution to the agency by \$83, paying \$500 in annual dues rather than the \$1,131 assessed to the town by the agency on a per capita basis of 13.9 cents per person, using 1970 census population.

The cut, if not restored, could jeopardize the agency's reopaving state and federal planning grants because the agency must provide matching funds totaling \$7,480 from local contributions.

I think we should send the council a letter asking it to restore the cut and to ask that we be notified in the future of any such action to be taken by the council that would affect the Windham Regional Planning Agency."

### Small Cars Proving Thrifty for Yankees

WELLESLEY, Mass. (UPI) — The driver of a compact car in New England spends \$700 less per year than the big car driver in the region, according to a cost study conducted by the AAA Auto and Travel Club.

The study showed the average New England motorist who drives his 1975 full-size car in Massachusetts 16,000 miles per year pays \$2,422.40 annually or 15.14 cents per mile to operate his car. If he drives a compact car, he spends \$1,715.20 annually or 10.72 cents per mile.

Massachusetts was the most expensive state in New England and one of the most expensive states in which to operate an automobile, according to the study.

The newly available 1975 edition of "What It Costs To Run A Car," the AAA's periodic survey of car-related expenses, reveals that the average per-mile cost of driving a 1975 full-size car in Massachusetts is 15.15 cents per mile. That is nearly a third of a cent per mile more than the New England average.

Overall per mile costs are then computed for each car based on 16,000 miles of driving annually, based on a three-year period of ownership.

### SOCIAL SECURITY

ATLANTA (UPI) — The committee of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S., working on a new confession of faith for the predominantly southern denomination, will ask the church's 1975 general assembly for another year to prepare a revised draft of the confession.

Q. I receive monthly Social Security survivors benefits for my daughter. She was killed. She is planning to get married. Will the continuation of benefits until she is 18 even after she gets married?

A. No. If monthly Social Security benefits will stop the month before she marries. You should notify the Social Security administration when the marriage plan to return her check if she received for that month.

Q. My 10-year-old son and I both received monthly Social Security benefits after my husband's death. When I remarried a year ago, my benefits stopped. Since my husband died last month I can again receive monthly benefits on my first husband's earnings record?

A. Call or visit your Social Security office to file a new application for benefits. You will need a certified copy of your divorce decree.

Q. I get Social Security payments as a widow. I do not work, but I own a small apartment building. Does my rental income count toward the \$2,500 a year that I can earn before Social Security payments are reduced?

A. No. Only wages and self-employment income count earnings for Social Security purposes. Rental income will not affect your cash benefits unless you are a real estate dealer.

Q. Before her recent death, my wife worked Social Security for nearly 11 years. Even though I plan to continue working and support our two children, aged 7 and 11, could they get monthly Social Security benefits on my wife's work record?

A. Yes. The children would be eligible for Social Security benefits on their mother's record regardless of your earnings. However, you may even be eligible for a father's benefit. Please call your Social Security office to check into this.

### THE FAMILY LAWYER

Alienaid Parent

Alienation of a husband's affections is often based on grounds for contempt in a court of law.

But what about alienation of a parent's affections? Do the children have grounds for contempt? From time to time, claims of this kind have been successful.

In one recent case, two children filed suit against the "other woman" who induced their father to withdraw from his family. They argued that he had deprived them of not only his love and affection but all the comfort and security of family life.

Instead, the court awarded damages to the children. The court said that including the children as well as the response spouses. A child has an interest in the affection of the parent, at least while he remains in a household.

If for the most part, courts have awarded damages on such claims.

In another case, also brought by children against an "other woman," the court took the more traditional view. Except for financial support, said the court, a father's obligation to his children is honor—not legal.

The court stated that allowing alienation-of-affections claims by children "would place the love of the parent on a commercial level, as if there have been cases running in the opposite direction by a parent suing for alienation of the affections of a child. But by the courts have generally taken a dim view of such suits."

If forsaken parents filed old-time damages, observed the judge, it could forsaken brothers and sisters. The judge said it would open "a Pandora's box of litigation."

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### Steel Profits Increase Despite Recession

The nation's two largest steel companies Tuesday reported gains despite the deepening recession in the first three months of the year. But the profits of the largest auto-maker hit a 23-year low.

U.S. Steel Corp. and Bethlehem Steel Corp. said their first-quarter earnings were more than or nearly double profits in the same period last year.

Detroit did not fair as well. General Motors Corp. said its first quarter earnings fell 51 percent to \$59 million, or 20 cents a share, the lowest since losing \$38 million in a 1946 strike.

In the first three months of 1974, GM earned \$120 million or 41 cents a share.

U.S. Steel's first-quarter profits were \$162.1 million, or \$1.36 per share, compared to \$89.5 million, or \$1.65 per share, during the same period last year. Bethlehem's profits rose to \$80.3 million, or \$1.84 a share, compared to \$43.1 billion, or 99 cents a share. Despite the bleak first

quarter, GM executives joined officers of the two steel companies in expressing optimism about an end to the recession. GM Chairman Thomas A. Murphy and President Elliott M. Estes said "the pressures of inflation are easing, inventories are being reduced and shorter-term interest rates are lower."

Edgar R. Spear, chairman of U.S. Steel, and Lewis W. Foy, Bethlehem chairman, warned the steel companies are just beginning to feel the pinch of the recession, as customers cut back on orders.

But Spear said "We are optimistic that the worst of the economic recession is behind us, although a period of adjustment for the domestic steel industry still lies ahead."

In other developments Tuesday:

Business failures last week were the greatest in more than eight years. Dun & Bradstreet said. The firm said 313 commercial and industrial firms failed, the highest weekly total since March, 1967.

The new president of the American Bankers Association, J. Rex Duwe, said the price of single-family houses has risen faster than public's ability to buy because of inefficient use of materials and land by builders.

Inflation and recession are forcing dramatic changes in the life style of Americans, according to the annual report by General Mills on American Family Life. Americans are spending more time at home, giving fewer gifts, doing more home and auto repairs and using credit cards and charge accounts less, the study said.

### Oil Price Posting Bill Nearly Lost By Killian Absence

HARTFORD (UPI) — Lt. Gov. Robert K. Killian nearly missed his chance to give his old adversary, the oil industry, a little piece of mind suggested to be away from the Senate where he presides.

Opponents of a measure to require gasoline station operators to post their prices on conspicuous signs battled the measure to an 18-18 tie Tuesday while Killian was in his office after returning from a trip to New Milford.

Killian, who as attorney general accused 23 major oil companies of price fixing in violation of antitrust laws, made a speedy return to the upper chamber to salvage the situation.

Sen. James J. Murphy, D-North Franklin, having voted with the prevailing "nays" — who kept the bill short of the 19 yeas needed for passage — moved for reconsideration and won, 20-16.

The supporters were able to keep the proposal from sliding into legislative oblivion, 19-17, but had to settle for postponement of action on the measure.

Nearly half the people attending the public hearing regarding the South Windsor Board of Education's 1975-76 budget, last night, voted in favor of slashing even more than the already proposed \$201,000.

In a straw vote taken at the conclusion of the hearing, nine persons voted in favor of adding back the \$201,000, 14 voted in favor of leaving the budget with the proposed cut, and 28 voted in favor of further slashing of funds toward education.

Board of Education member Marge Hutensky lashed out at those recommending budget cuts by saying that the proposed budget has "no fat."

"By cutting the budget you are making a mediocre system," said Mrs. Hutensky. "You don't like health education... well that's about athletics and home economics and music? We'll have none of these. This is a line item budget."

Unaware that the Town Council can only cut the budget and not dictate as to which areas they want deleted, some residents made an eleven-hour attempt at slashing both the current-year health education curriculum and the proposed additional assistant superintendent of schools.

The new assistant would cost the town \$23,000. One of the main functions of the assistant superintendent would be to evaluate teacher performance, seen by some as, "A luxury we can't afford."

The Human Development and Health Education curriculum for which funds have been appropriated has been under fire by a group of residents for some time.

Most residents in favor of budget slashes blamed the economy and asked councilmen to "Hold the back."

"My taxes have gone up 40 per cent since I moved here 18 years ago," complained one resident, "and my salary hasn't." Mayor Robert Smith said today that his main concern is holding the present tax line and he hopes that this can be done with no further budget cuts for education.

## Ideas Explored For Boosting Police Patrol

The Committee on Police Department met last night to determine how the town could solve its police manpower problem.

Committee members Robert Kjelquist, chief of police, Allen Sandberg, town manager, and councilmen Al Carilli and Henry Grabowski were primarily interested in how to place another patrolman on the now one-man third shift without drawing more money from the town budget.

All members agreed that the safety factor on the third shift is too low.

"I don't like shortening the manpower on any shift, but because of our budget I have to," said Kjelquist.

The present force of six patrolmen and one lieutenant allows for two policemen to be on duty on the first and second shifts but only leaves on patrolman for the third shift.

The committee proposed a number of alternatives, but none were accepted during the meeting as viable solutions.

Kjelquist said that he had applied for Federal funding in November. He said that if the funding is approved by the government that it would provide the money needed to buy and equip one patrol car and would also pay the salary for one additional policeman.

For the first year the funding would pay for 100 per cent of the costs for both man and car. The second year the funding would be reduced to 50 per cent of the patrolman's salary with no aid allotted for the maintenance of the car. The third year funding would allow only 25 per cent of the patrolman's salary. Kjelquist, however, was quick to point out that even though this would allow to place two men on each shift it still did not alleviate the problem of relief should one man become ill.

Councilman Carilli then suggested the use of supernumeraries to augment the force. Kjelquist dismissed the suggestion, saying that those men would be asked to work a 9-hour tour plus their full-time jobs. He also added that he doubted there would be very much response, and if used the plan could only be utilized on weekends and holidays.

Finally it was suggested that an intermittent shift be organized. Carilli said that this could be established by having one patrolman kept on stand-by during the 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. third shift. Kjelquist said that this plan might conflict with the union contract and would not alleviate the problem of overtime pay. He said that if a patrolman is called out on duty the contract demands that he be paid a minimum of 4 hours pay.

The committee decided to meet again on Monday for further discussion before going before the town council.

## Fire Study Group To Report Monday

The Vernon Fire Study Committee, appointed by Mayor Frank McCoy about a year ago, wrapped up its report Tuesday night and the report will be presented to the Town Council Monday, chairman Donald Eden said.

Similar requests were made last year and they were deleted at that time too. The study committee's charge was to make a thorough study of both departments as to equipment and housing and to report findings and recommendations back to the full council for action.

Monday's meeting will be at 7:30 p.m. in the administration building.

labor government to bring a new budget this summer with even tougher measures than those announced earlier in April. Chancellor of the Exchequer Denis Healey's appeal to the labor unions to hold back their pay hike demands has had little or no effect. On the contrary, many big unions are demanding not only 30 per cent pay hikes but an additional 10 to 15 per cent on top of that to make up for the higher taxes and living costs resulting from the Healey budget. Pay inflation in Britain now is rocketing up at a 32 per cent annual rate. Prices are surging up at a 21.5 per cent rate. The government is deeply concerned that foreign countries from which Britain has borrowed billions in the past two years to cover the oil-balance of payments deficit will pull out their money and refuse to lend. This would spark a major financial crisis and possible collapse of the pound.

The Rocket Abort:  
Soviet authorities have given a preliminary report to the United States on the failure of their last Soyuz launch, but little has emerged publicly about what caused the booster rocket to go wrong. ### Brown Professor Seeks To Harness World's Volcanoes

PROVIDENCE, R.I. (UPI)—There are approximately 600 active volcanoes on the earth. All are potential energy producers for an energy-starved planet.

The volcano release hot molten lava which otherwise would have been trapped deep beneath the earth's surface. Although nobody knows how many chambers of molten lava are underground, it is known they are potential energy producers.

Dr. John F. Hearnance, a Brown University associate professor of geological sciences, specializes in finding these chambers of lava which he calls the "ultimate sources of geothermal energy."

Energy from volcanoes and these hidden lava chambers are a very practical probability and will probably be done in the immediate future, in the next five to 10 years," Hearnance said.

Geothermal energy is best known in the forms of volcanoes, geysers and hot springs. Mankind already has tapped natural hot waters as an energy source, but volcanoes and lava remain little utilized.

Homes in Reykjavik, the capital of Iceland, have been heated for several years by natural hot water. Similar projects are under way in California, Mexico, New Zealand and other countries, Hearnance said.

"Extracting energy from these lava deposits has always been an intellectual goal of a stimulating idea. Rather than tell people where to drill, I specialize in finding these underground deposits," Hearnance said.

A research team at Sandia Laboratories in New Mexico is in research funds during the past five years to develop geothermal energy. Hearnance, who received his doctorate in physics from the University of Toronto, is getting ready for another trip to Iceland this year to further research the source.

"We chose Iceland to find answers because that country straddles an active tectonic area, a region of concentrated geologic activity," he said.

Extracting energy from the lava chambers and areas near volcanoes is not without its drawbacks. Drilling could result in the emission of noxious fumes.

"Sometimes we would have hot water we would not know what to do with and sometimes the ground around the drilling area would collapse," he said.

However, Hearnance says if modern science can send men to Mars, he believes it can develop ways to solve these "minor obstacles."

NEW YORK (UPI) — Wall Street, the pride of capitalism, today reluctantly ends an 185-year era of price-fixing on brokerage commissions and hesitantly embraces free enterprise.

Under federal edict, brokers no longer will be able to establish uniform rates charged investors for buying and selling stocks. The fees, the government said, must be set in the open market. It will be the first time this free enterprise concept has applied since the New York Stock Exchange was founded in 1792.

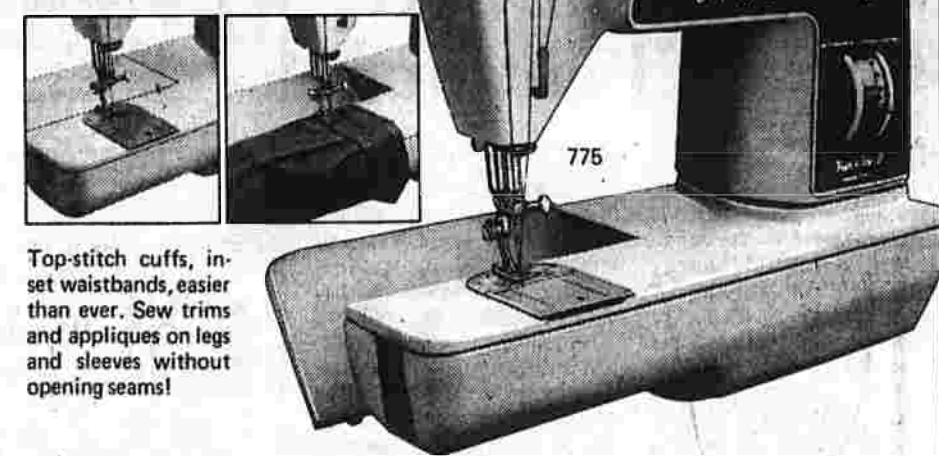

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### Nuclear Plant Security Termed Very Vulnerable

WASHINGTON (UPI) — An independent study of nuclear power plant safety has found that a determined band of terrorists equipped with the proper equipment and know-how could sabotage a power reactor and cause great loss of life.

"We found that by getting very detailed knowledge of the way the plant was laid out, much of that knowledge being public because of the requirements of the Freedom of Information Act, that a combination of high explosives, fires, wire cutters and so on could cause events that would be very likely to lead to a core melt-down," said Dr. Theodore Taylor of the International Research and Technology Corp.

"How difficult it would be to do this we found unable to say in general because power plants differ in detail and we weren't able to say systematically through any power plant," Taylor said in presenting part of the 12-man study panel's results to the annual meeting of the American Physical Society.

"We see no way to estimate the probability that such acts might be attempted either for coercive or outright terrorist purposes, but it is possible to estimate credible ranges of possible damage in terms of fatalities," the report said.

"It is conceivable that a group of people might threaten or carry out sabotage of a nuclear power plant in such a way as to cause great damage and loss of life," the study group said.

A core melt down is the most serious type of accident that could strike a nuclear power plant, particularly if containment structures failed and large amounts of radioactive material escaped into the atmosphere. Such an accident is considered extremely unlikely.

But the panel said its study found that the health consequences of such a hypothetical disaster in an area of high population density are much greater than previously believed.

### BICENTENNIAL FACTS

The British West Indian islands did not ally themselves politically with the 13 colonies, although sympathetic gestures of supplies and arms for the Revolution were offered. ### Congressmen May Probe Shadowy International Police Agency

DAVID E. ANDERSON WASHINGTON (UPI) — Interpol, the private international police organization, has a kind of "Mission Impossible" image — shadowy international police agents tracking down equally shadowy international gangs of criminals.

After years of existing in the twilight of public scrutiny, however, some members of Congress are beginning to ask the question "just exactly what is Interpol and what are its implications for a citizen's right to privacy?"

Much of the new controversy was sparked by charges brought by the National Commission on Law Enforcement and Social Justice, an arm of the Church of Scientology. The church, which some people consider a genuine religion and others believe is a racket, got entangled in the intelligence web of Interpol when a West German news reporter showed church members information the German police had received from Britain's Scotland Yard through Interpol.

The church officials believed the information was false and sought to correct the records and at the same time began being concerned about the easy worldwide dissemination of police and intelligence files.

The result was an extensive investigation by the commission into Interpol's structure and activities which resulted in a 200-page report on the police organization.

Among its charges are that Interpol was a willing part of the Nazi Gestapo during World War II and that it lied to Congress about the Nazi connection in order to receive U.S. financial support and access to American police files on all levels.

Sen. Joseph Montoya, D-N.M., has shown an interest in the church commission's report on the private police organization and has asked Treasury Secretary William Simon some hard questions about Interpol. He is expected to press Simon and other Treasury officials even further during hearings on Treasury funding at the end of the month.

The U.S. branch of Interpol is housed in the Treasury Department and the U.S. dues of \$140,000 are part of the Treasury Department appropriation.

According to the commission, some of the Nazi influence has been carried into the present and it charged that the group has dragged its feet on pursuing Nazi war criminals, even when they were wanted for other crimes, and in the international effort to bring a halt to skyjacking.

Among the issues Montoya and some other congressmen want to get into is the degree of access foreign governments might have to U.S. police and intelligence files.

Interpol has 120 members, including two Communist bloc nations, Romania and Yugoslavia, as well as a number of other militarily ruled nations such as Chile and Brazil.

Exemption Sought - WASHINGTON (UPI) - Sen. Abraham A. Ribicoff, D-Conn., offered legislation today exempting state lotteries from a 2 percent tax on revenues and ticket-sellers from a \$500 occupational tax.

Model Rape Law Passed - CONCORD, N.H. (UPI) - New Hampshire's 400-member House with more women members than any time in history, has passed and sent to the Senate legislation ending a major obstacle to women reporting rape in this increasingly urban state.

Without opposition, the House Tuesday approved a bill locking a defense attorney from laying out a woman's past sexual history in a rape trial. The measure was modeled after Michigan law, drafted by the organization "Women Against Rape" and passed a year ago.

The bill faces uncertain action in the 24-member state Senate, where only two members are women. The 400-member House includes 106 women, the highest percentage of women in its history.

Superintendent Named - BOSTON (UPI) - Marion Fahy has been appointed superintendent of Boston's school system.

Capital Punishment Vetted - BOSTON (UPI) - Less than 30 minutes after it had been enacted, Gov. Michael S. Dukakis vetoed a new capital punishment law in Massachusetts. A check with Senate sources indicated the veto would be sustained with no votes to spare in the Senate. Dukakis, explaining his action, said he found it impossible to "reconcile the willful taking of a human life."

## Congress Tackles Deficits

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Congress, accused over the years of running up deficits thoughtlessly, is giving thought this week to how large a deficit is tolerable at a time of recession and inflation.

Coming before both houses are resolutions proposing guidelines on spending and deficit totals for the fiscal year that starts July 1.

Both call for more spending and larger deficits than President Ford said are acceptable.

Both also propose shifts in how the money is spent — less for defense and foreign aid, more for helping recession victims and stimulating the economy with public jobs.

The debate is unusual. Congress rarely discusses such abstract questions.

Customarily, it has passed tax and spending bills without any thought to their impact either on the deficit or the economy. Not until a fiscal year had ended could the size of the deficit be known. Reform legislation, enacted in 1974, set up the new procedure.

Skepticism is high. Many in Congress doubt it can — or even wants to — change old patterns. Many came to Congress for the express purpose of channeling money into home districts.

As debate began Tuesday in the Senate and today in the House, here are the three proposals from the President and the House and Senate budget committees.

Revenue — Ford's proposal is \$295.6 billion; the House proposal \$295.0 billion, and the Senate \$297.8 billion.

Spending — Ford \$355.6 billion; House \$368.2 billion; Senate \$365.0 billion.

Deficit — Ford \$60.0 billion; House \$73.2 billion; Senate \$67.2 billion.

## Doctor Says Marriages Affected by Culture

"Marriage changes over the years dependent on the culture in which it exists."

This was one of Dr. John H. Houck's comments as he spoke to the Auxiliary of the Manchester Memorial Hospital Monday at its annual meeting at 9 e.h. mid 14th of "Love and Marriage" and said, as a psychiatrist, he is constantly impressed with the range and variety of experiences that come his way on the subject.

"In the Middle Ages, romantic love and marriage were not

considered the same. One could be married and have a great romance on the outside," he said.

He cited instances of exchange of love notes with someone other than the married mate, of troubadours and the like.

In Communist society, Dr. Houck said marriage and sex go together but love has little place. "It's considered very bourgeois."

"Our society today," he continued, "has idealized all three,

but it appears none of the three may go together."

He compared life today with when our country began.

"We were hedged in New England by Puritan tradition. Bundling was the result of the quality of life at the time," he said.

"Love," he said, comparing it to becoming acquainted through growing friendship, "is an even more complicated phenomenon."

"With love - we fall into, fall out of, make, give, lose, etc.," said Dr. Houck listing its complications.

The concept of one's marriage is according to the individual's early life experiences, he said.

"One tends to imitate the life patterns he grew up with. There are families to whom bickering is second nature, a way of life. There are others to whom it is unknown," he said.

Defining marriage, Dr. Houck said "Marriage is, in varying proportions, a religious, moral, social, economic contract between two people."

"For some, it is a casual relationship; for others, it is not to be nullified."

Divorced marriages are not new. But Dr. Houck said they are

"more open" and accepted than they used to be.

The difficulty with a trial marriage, said Dr. Houck, is that although it is a viable relationship, it is not the same as marriage. It is difficult to make a commitment.

He concluded his talk with

quotations from an essay on marriage, "Virginibus Puerisque," by Robert Louis Stevenson.

In effect, Stevenson and Dr. Houck seem to say there are marriages with and without love, and love with and without marriages.

## Bylaws Rejected

A new set of bylaws was voted down twice Monday by the Auxiliary of Manchester Memorial Hospital at its annual meeting at The Colony in Taicottville.

After considerable discussion, another vote was taken. The count was 100 affirmative and 56 negative with several abstentions.

The next presentation of the bylaws for approval will be at the annual auxiliary meeting in April 1976.
