A Bad Deal

The heads of some of the state's employ unions have come up with what they call a solution to the problem of the state not having enough money to pay increments to state workers. They propose that \$3 million be taken from the employ retirement pension fund and replaced when the state is more flush financially. We don't have any real details but we don't like it. If next fiscal year isn't any better revenue wise than this year, will the legislature have to increase taxes to pay this increment plus next year's too? Should the economic doldrums last several years, will this debt to the pension fund be allowed to accumulate? That the pension fund could be tapped for the \$3 million for the 1975-76 increment without putting it in jeopardy is not the point. The point is that once you start, where and when does it end? It seems to us that one of the major provisions of the new federal pension law, which was a major goal for so many years of organized labor, is making sure that pension funds are reserved for the payment of pensions to those eligible. This violates that principle.

Has Patriotism Gone Out of Style?

If designating May 1 as 'Loyalty Day,' as Congress did some years ago, was supposed to be this country's answer to the Communists' traditional May Day celebrations, the reply has been less than deafening. For example, a crowd counted in the hundreds — the low hundreds — turned out for this year's Loyalty Day parade in Cleveland, Ohio. It was held on Sunday (why disrupt weekday traffic just for a parade?) and nobody in his right mind comes downtown when he doesn't have to. Yet it's a sign of something. Even less observed this year was the 30th anniversary of the end of the European phase of World War II. If there were any major observances, we weren't aware of them. Much more note of this anniversary was taken in Europe, which of course has more reason for remembering that war than does the United States. But far and away the champion observer of VE Day, not just this year but every year, is the Soviet Union, which has more reason than anybody for remembering. It is not only that the Russian soul bears an ineradicable scar from the war in which one of every seven Russians fell. To the Communists, history is more than merely the record of what happened — it is a tool, a means to an end. Thus, victory in the 'Great Patriotic War' is celebrated not just as the defeat of one particular enemy at one particular time in history but as one more step in the preordained triumph of world socialism. As Soviet defense minister Andrei Grechko wrote for the World Marxist Review: 'The war and the victory that crowned it demonstrated the fundamental superiority of the new, socialist type of army over the army of exploiter society... German fascism's doom was sealed with its attack against the most advanced social system, for the birth and development of socialism to replace the old, obsolete bourgeois society is an inevitable and inexorable process. There is no halting it. It is a law of history!'

BEIRUT, LEBANON — It was early evening and 10-year-old David Walker was going with his mother to the market. As they approached the family car, David saw a rag attached to its bumper. Unthinking, the youngster picked up the metal object of tin to the other end of the rag. The puff of smoke it exhaled told him he now held a live grenade whose safety pin was still attached to the rag. David immediately hurled the grenade, which exploded near the house. Although slightly injured, his uncommon presence of mind probably saved two lives. The source of the body tag apparently is still unknown. David, whose near brush with death occurred just before I arrived here, is the son of the chaplain at the American University of Beirut, Rev. Robert Walker. The Walkers are only one of many American families in Beirut to whom the threat of violence has become a way of life. The American community here, estimated at up to 8,000, is drawn to Lebanon for several key reasons. Not the least of which is the fact that Beirut — with modern facilities and an excellent climate — is an idyllic place to live. It is the political and trading crossroads of the Middle East, with a wide-open governmental system which tolerates views of every persuasion. Lebanon serves as a haven and playground for Arab leaders fleeing from the incessant struggle and intrigues in this part of the world. It prides itself on being to the Middle East what neutral Switzerland is to Europe — although its position of non-involvement is becoming increasingly tenuous in the absence of a lasting peace settlement with Israel. The chief unbalancing factor here is the estimated 300,000 Palestinians living within the country's borders. They help supply the manpower for terrorist raids on Israel and serve as

Equality Preaching Nations Are All Talk
WASHINGTON — It is not what a nation preaches about equality that counts, but what it does. By that test, if we look at each citizen's share of his own country's Gross National Product, and the extremes between the privileged and the underprivileged, a surprising number of free world nations seem to rank differently from what we've been led to believe. Some better, some worse. That is, some of the most boastful on equality show up very badly indeed. Some of the most maligned show up well. For all our self criticism, the United States, Canada, Australia and the United Kingdom come out very well. Not so for France, Sweden and Mexico, countries which unceasingly praise themselves on their equality. In France, the top 5 per cent of the population has incomes which average 50 times those of the bottom 20 per cent. That is, the top 5 per cent absorbs a quarter of the nation's Gross National Product; the bottom 20 per cent divides less than 2 per cent. In Sweden, that bastion of share-the-wealth, the average income of the top 5 per cent is 17 times that of the bottom 20. In Mexico, the top 5 per cent has incomes which average 33 times the average incomes of the bottom 20 per cent. By contrast, incomes among the top 5 per cent in the U.S. average out at around 10 times that of the lowest 20. Very few countries do better. Similar but not identical tables give poor ratings to Finland, Venezuela, Iraq, South Africa, the Philippines, Rhodesia, Brazil, Peru, Panama and other assorted lands. Burma, India, Tanzania, Iran, Uruguay, Chile, West Germany, Argentina, the Netherlands, Norway, Denmark, New Zealand and Turkey don't get high marks either. In the top rank — countries in which the lower 40 per cent of the population receives 17 per cent or more of the national income — are such often-

Ladder Replacement To Cost About \$15,000

The ladder on the Rockville Fire Department's aerial truck will have to be replaced at a cost of about \$15,000, Mayor Frank McCoy told the council at its meeting that followed the annual budget meeting Tuesday night.

In a letter received by the mayor Tuesday, Joseph Panicko, secretary of the Hook and Ladder Co. of Rockville, explained that a vote had been taken at a company meeting and it was agreed to roll the aerial truck to the scene of a fire and to utilize all of the equipment with the exception of the disabled aerial ladder.

"This vote dictates that officers and men of the company will not use the aerial ladder under any circumstances until full repairs have been effected," Panicko said.

While the letter stated that the mayor had been informed of the problem in a May 9 letter, also, and was asked to request a mediate reaction of the mayor and the council, Panicko said there was no reply.

He added, "I only assume there is a lack of interest and concern on the part of the mayor and the council."

The mayor explained that he had written a letter to Panicko explaining that he had contacted the manufacturer, LaFrance in Elmira, N.Y., and a man had been in Rockville to inspect the ladder.

He said he had been informed Tuesday, by phone that the ladder cannot be repaired and will have to be replaced. He also said repairs will have to be made to the hydraulic system of the truck.

The mayor said the LaFrance representative said the truck only has some 6,000 miles on it and is "hardly broken in."

He said the phone call will be followed up by a written report which should be here sometime this week. The \$15,000 cost will include repairs to the hydraulic system, the mayor said.

To the charges that the council and mayor showed a lack of interest and concern, the mayor said this was erroneous. He said the LaFrance representative had inspected the ladder just days before the company meeting when the vote was taken.

He said at that time the representative said the ladder could be used if not fully extended. He also said that the ladder was damaged in some way other than normal wear and tear, McCoy said.

Council To Review Funding Of Youth Council in Fall

The Youth Services Bureau in Vernon will continue its operations under state funding until Oct. 3 at which time the service will be reviewed by the town council to see if it will fund it at least through Dec. 31.

Ladder Replacement To Cost About \$15,000

The ladder on the Rockville Fire Department's aerial truck will have to be replaced at a cost of about \$15,000, Mayor Frank McCoy told the council at its meeting that followed the annual budget meeting Tuesday night.

In a letter received by the mayor Tuesday, Joseph Panicko, secretary of the Hook and Ladder Co. of Rockville, explained that a vote had been taken at a company meeting and it was agreed to roll the aerial truck to the scene of a fire and to utilize all of the equipment with the exception of the disabled aerial ladder.

"This vote dictates that officers and men of the company will not use the aerial ladder under any circumstances until full repairs have been effected," Panicko said.

While the letter stated that the mayor had been informed of the problem in a May 9 letter, also, and was asked to request a mediate reaction of the mayor and the council, Panicko said there was no reply.

He added, "I only assume there is a lack of interest and concern on the part of the mayor and the council."

The mayor explained that he had written a letter to Panicko explaining that he had contacted the manufacturer, LaFrance in Elmira, N.Y., and a man had been in Rockville to inspect the ladder.

He said he had been informed Tuesday, by phone that the ladder cannot be repaired and will have to be replaced. He also said repairs will have to be made to the hydraulic system of the truck.

The mayor said the LaFrance representative said the truck only has some 6,000 miles on it and is "hardly broken in."

He said the phone call will be followed up by a written report which should be here sometime this week. The \$15,000 cost will include repairs to the hydraulic system, the mayor said.

To the charges that the council and mayor showed a lack of interest and concern, the mayor said this was erroneous. He said the LaFrance representative had inspected the ladder just days before the company meeting when the vote was taken.

He said at that time the representative said the ladder could be used if not fully extended. He also said that the ladder was damaged in some way other than normal wear and tear, McCoy said.

New U.N. Ambassador Urges Tough Line on Third World

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Daniel Patrick Moynihan, President Ford's choice for ambassador to the United Nations, has urged the United States to take a tough line with Third World countries.

Moynihan, 48, is a former bartender and Harvard professor who was ambassador to India from 1971 to 1973 and has served every President — since the late John Kennedy. Ford announced his intention to nominate him for the U.N. post Wednesday.

Like the man he will succeed — former newsman John Scali — Moynihan is colorful and controversial. He touched off an uproar in 1970 with a memo urging President Nixon to treat American Negroes with "benign neglect" after serious national race riots and tensions.

In the mainstream of liberal Democratic politics most of his life — he was one of the architects of President Lyndon Johnson's "Great Society" — he joined the Nixon administration in 1969 and has advocated more conservative policies of late.

In a recent article for Commentary magazine, Moynihan urged the United States to pursue a hard line towards the Third World at a time when the world is developing nations, most of which are nonwhite, recently organized their political strength.

"Richard Rabinowitz, until recently the education director at Starbridge Village Museum, was the guest speaker."

He spoke to the group about the importance of stimulating the imagination of the young child, and then to support it.

A native of Brooklyn, N.Y., he said he hated going to the New York Museum of Natural History because so many things were unobtainable and distant.

"If we're designed to teach in a museum, do we attempt to have the children use skills they've already used in school, or do we introduce them to new situations?" he asked.

Ideally, he said a way should be designed for children to come to museums to solve problems. Rabinowitz thinks schools, in general, don't challenge children enough in their learning skills.

As to who should teach in museums, he suggested non-professional people.

As an example, he referred to the number of costumes kept in museum storage reflecting different materials used in different periods.

"There is nothing on drying-cleaning to tell how to care for the costumes. This is where a dry-cleaner could come in and give a demonstration."

The smaller museum has a much better educational potential, he said, because it knows its community. He referred to the Lutz Junior Museum.

In making the museum a community project, he told the group to develop community involvement by inviting people to come in and speak from their own experience on things.

Rabinowitz reminded his audience there are multiple ways of doing things. His general theme was to stimulate these present to cultivate new ideas, which, in turn, would cultivate and nurture enthusiasm for a progressive and educational children's museum.

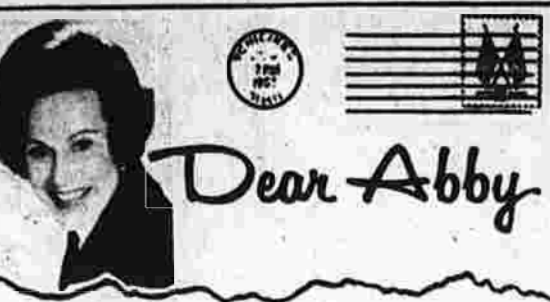

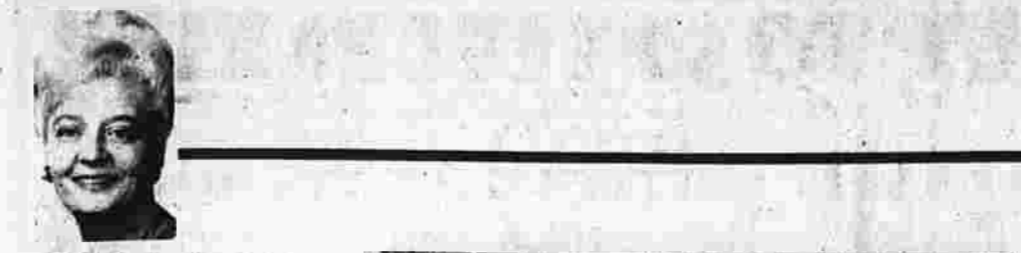

Cindi Marler doesn't believe in having hum-drum classes. A teacher at Manchester High School, she moonlights with the adult evening classes. Her pupils are mainly housewives learning to type for their own enjoyment.

Each year, her evening typing class prepares a cookbook. Students bring in their favorite recipes. They type them and prepare stencils. The last evening of school, everyone takes home a cookbook. Entitled "Come and Get It," this year's Typing 2 project contains 30 recipes. You might call it a cook booklet.

"We have combined a learning process with something tangible, which is fun," says Cindi. "So often, classroom projects can never be put to use."

Mrs. Marler is a bright young woman who hardly has time for cooking. During the school year when she is teaching both day and night, the evening meal was once a problem. It was solved beautifully last Christmas when Cindi's husband presented her with a microwave oven. "It has proven to be quite a lifesaver and I can prepare quantities that are good for just two."

The quick method is the best method for the Marlers. William Marler gets home from work about 5:30. With Cindi having to be at her evening classes at 6, the microwave oven solved the problem.

"Pork chops are quick and easy. I can take a ham steak and serve it with raisin sauce. I melt a little butter, add some brown sugar, a touch of water, mix in some raisins. Then, pour over the steak and cook about three minutes. We're always watching our weight so we'll have a salad and that's it."

"No pans are necessary. You cook in the dish in which you serve. There is very little cleanup. I cook in glass dishes; paper plates and have even used paper towels. Also, the house doesn't get overheated plus our electric bill is considerably less," Cindi notes enthusiastically.

"One of the greatest advantages is that there is almost no dishwashing. My husband plays hockey and he likes a cup of hot chocolate when he comes home. He mixes it in a cup, puts it into the microwave oven. The next morning, all I see is a cup in the sink. No pans at all."

"Before I had the oven, I was even cooking at night and I was getting very good at peanut butter and jelly sandwiches. It's great for reheating. You wouldn't believe you were eating something the second time around. With only two people, we can never use up the

FROM YOUR NEIGHBOR'S KITCHEN

By VIVIAN FERUGSON

Make brownie mix according to recipe on box. Do not cut in normal brookie fashion. Instead, cut one large piece big enough for base of Alaska. Let ice cream soften just slightly and place in bowl to shape. Freeze very hard (preferably overnight).

Place large brownie in oven-proof dish. Quickly run bowl with ice cream under hot water. Place on top of brownie. Swirl meringue on top of ice cream and place in hot oven at 500 degrees. Watch carefully and remove from oven when egg whites are golden on peaks. Trickle chocolate syrup on dome.

Topping for Baked Alaska
Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry. Beat in sugar gradually (at least three tablespoons). Spread evenly atop ice cream forming peaks with spoon or knife.

My note: Traditionally, a wooden board is used as base for this dish. The board should be covered with white paper though I have done it without the paper. The cake, board and meringue serve as insulation for the ice cream and it will not melt. Try this also using orange halves, filling with ice cream, top with meringue. Nice served on large green leaves.

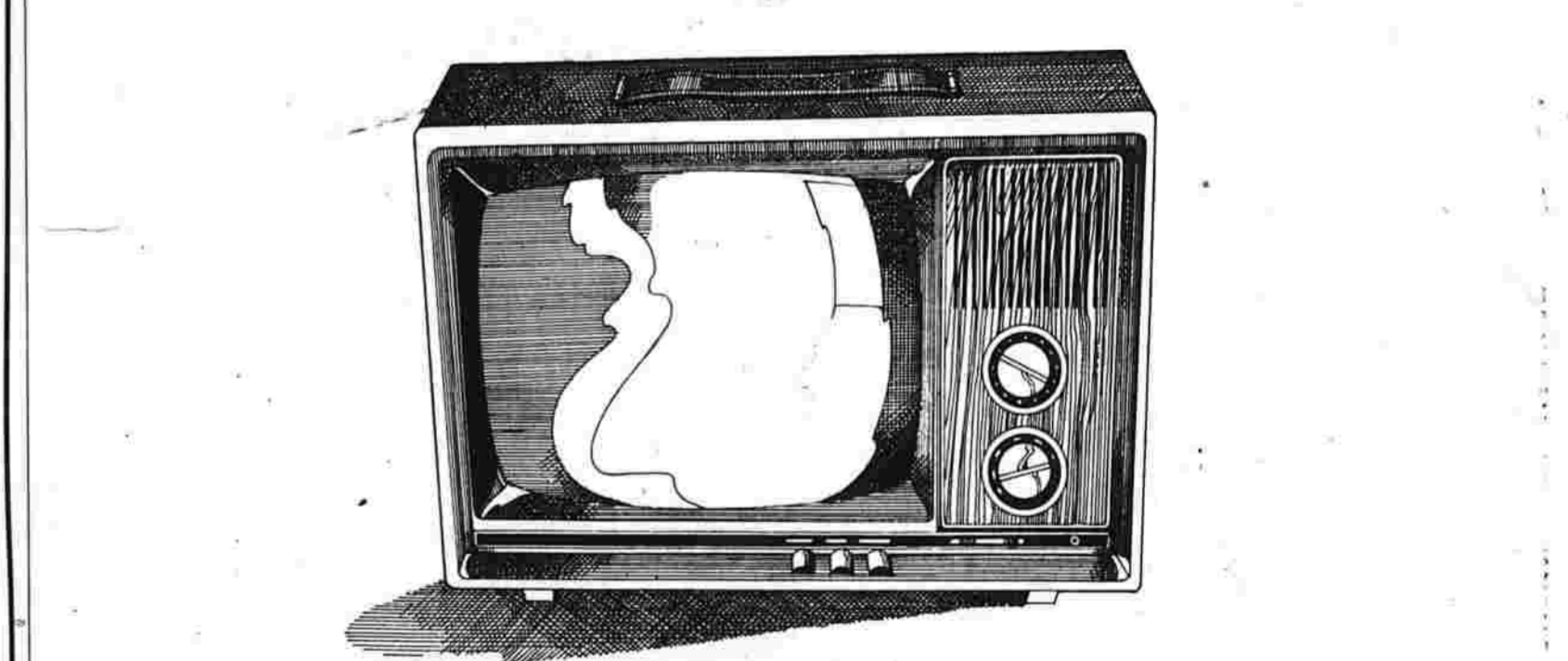

By MICHAEL J. CONLON WASHINGTON (UPI) — A reader in West Chester, Pa., writes: "If it problems you solve, I have a doozy. My waist is 66. I have not been able to get work pants for over a year. The 'big man' stores only carry work pants to size 60, when they can get them."

We checked with a local store, George and Co. Inc., which says it regularly stocks pants to size 66. It tells us it doesn't have a store in your area but it does mail order business at 1598-B Rockville Pike, Rockville, Md. 20852.

Also, the American Apparel Manufacturers Association suggests you might check with Levi Strauss in San Francisco, which in the past has done some special order work. We've sent the company a copy of your letter in case it can do something.

A consumer in Charleston, S.C., recently sent us the label from a can of Sacramento Tomato Plus Vegetable Juice Cocktail made by Borden, with the question: "How can this product have a label of 'vegetable juice cocktail'?"

Her question was prompted by the list of ingredients, which were water, tomato paste, salt, dextrose, celery powder, dehydrated chili pepper, onion powder, spices, ascorbic acid (vitamin C) and flavorings.

We agree that doesn't sound much like vegetable juice, although tomato paste and water do, in a sense, constitute a juice.

However, a check with the Food and Drug Administration reveals that there is no "standard of identity" — that is, a set, approved formula — for vegetable juice cocktails. Nor has any been proposed.

This means you can put just about anything you want together in a can or bottle and call it a vegetable juice cocktail, within the bounds of truth in labeling provisions of course.

The best answer is an one — take a close look at the label before you buy.

The same reader passes on some other comments: "I was to mention a couple of other things which I feel are very unfair to the consumer. Many products, including cheese, luncheon meats, etc., are over-salted. For people who have high blood pressure they are a no-no. It would be very easy for people to add salt, but it cannot be taken out."

"I realize salt helps hold moisture, and that is a way to increase the weight of the product. Also, one of my complaints is cereal boxes which have a large empty space at the top. It is dishonest to pack them this way. It has not always been so. For the packer to say the product shakes down in alignment is untruthful. I buy old fashioned shredded wheat very often because I like the product, and the pack in the box is always an honest pack."

If you are out of work and spend money traveling or whatever in search of a job, those expenses may be deductible items on next year's income tax return, regardless of whether you get the job.

The research group in Charlottesville, Va., which researches tax matters for the legal profession, reports that a new Internal Revenue Service policy to that effect became operative April 25.

Walter Morrison, president of the organization, said "1975 could well be a record year for expenses incurred by individuals seeking new employment. This new tax break is welcome news to millions of Americans."

There is one catch — the new employment being sought has to be in the same trade or business as the previous job.

Maine House Votes to Keep Abortion Law

AUGUSTA, Maine (UPI) — The Maine House Wednesday killed a proposal to remove Maine's abortion law from the books. The vote was 91-48. The measure, sponsored by Sen. David Fisher, R-Falmouth, would repeal Maine's law prohibiting abortions and providing a \$1,000 fine and three years in jail for anyone who performs or assists in one.

Proponents argued that the U.S. Supreme Court two years ago ruled laws similar to Maine's was unconstitutional. A three-member federal district court in Portland has ruled the state's law unconstitutional. Maine law permits abortion only if the mother's life is in danger. The Supreme Court said abortion is a medical procedure and that the decision was between a woman and her doctor.

Rep. James Henderson, D-Bangor, argued to repeal the law. "Some of us on the legislative committee considering the bill thought it unwise to leave this on the books. In committee the question of right or wrong was not debated," Henderson said. Lewiston Democrat Louis Jabert, for years a staunch opponent against repeal of the law, made the move to kill the bill. "We ought to leave things as they are," Jabert said. "The nine wise men (the Supreme Court justices) can make mistakes. I think that they have blundered on this one."

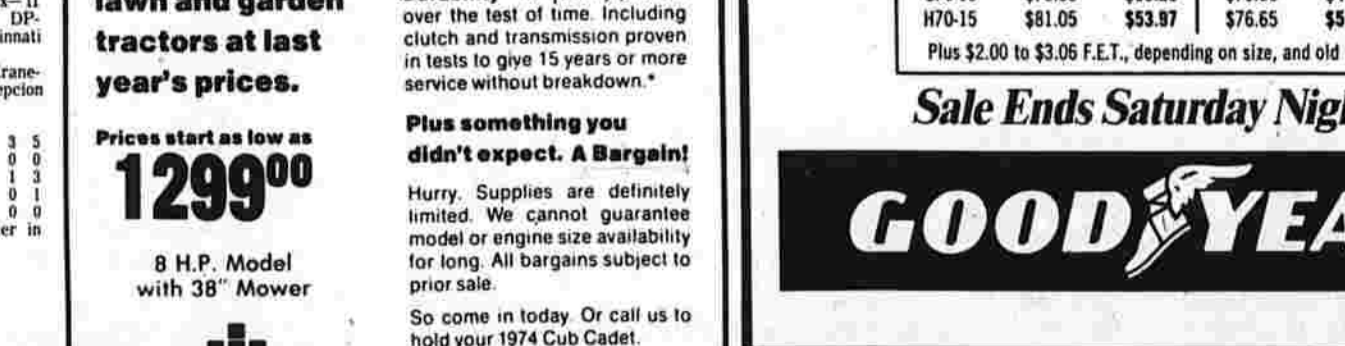

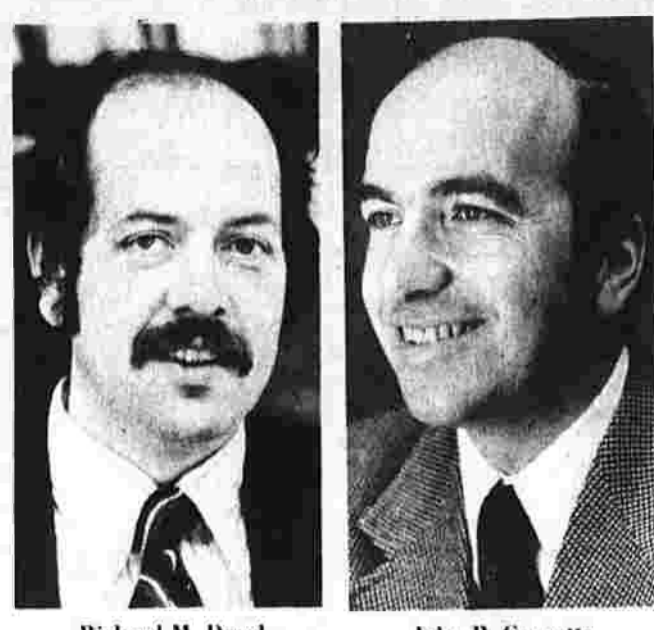

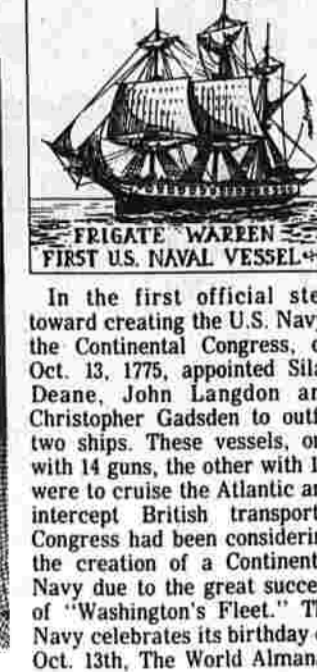
