

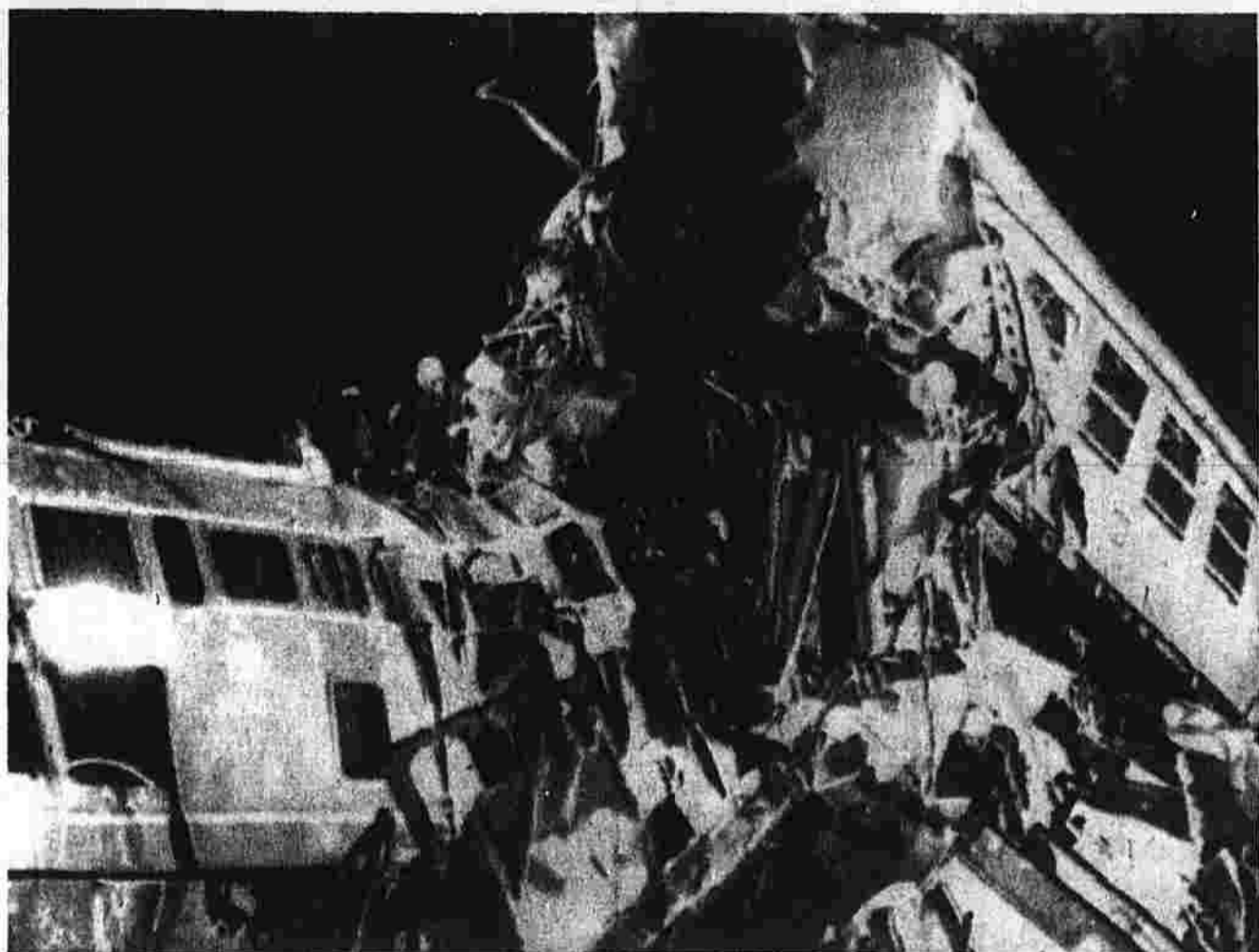

German Train Collision Toll at Least 36 Dead

WARNGAU, West Germany (UPI) — Rescue teams using acetylene torches cut through the wreckage of two passenger trains today in a search for victims trapped in twisted metal and shattered glass.

Officials said they were having difficulty in establishing the exact number of persons killed because mangled bodies were still being found in the wreckage.

Police revised the death toll to 36 with 86 injured, lower than the death toll of 42 they had reported earlier.

Many of the injured were reported in critical condition.

One hundred policemen, 250 firemen, 200 first aid workers and more than 20 doctors worked through the night with the help of giant electric lights.

The two trains, one nearly empty but the

other packed with tourists, collided Sunday evening on a single-track railroad line 200 yards south of Warngau station in the Bavarian Alps.

It was the second worst rail disaster in West Germany. Forty-six persons, including 41 children, were killed in 1971 in the worst accident.

One train, coming from the mountain resort of Bad Toelz, was packed with travelers taking advantage of warm and sunny weekend weather. The other train, coming from the town of Holzkirchen, was nearly empty.

Police said the trains apparently collided at high speed and the two locomotives were "virtually glued together into one." The first car of the train from Bad Toelz was demolished.

A police spokesman said the search teams now were looking for victims left in the wrecked second car of the train from Bad Toelz.

A railroad official said the train from Holzkirchen apparently left the Warngau station ahead of schedule. He said the train should have stayed at the station until the one from Bad Toelz passed through.

Hundreds of cars carrying weekend travelers blocked ambulances, fire engines and other rescue vehicles trying to get to the site of the crash, forcing police to clear nearby roads. Witnesses described the accident site as a "scene of horror." Smashed doors, splinters from shattered windows, wooden fragments and pools of blood littered the area.

Belgian Government Faces Vote Test Over Selection of F16 Jet Fighter

BRUSSELS (UPI) — The Belgian coalition government of Prime Minister Leo Tindemans today faced a vote of confidence in parliament because of its choice of an American jet fighter over the French Mirage.

Lucien Outers, secretary general of the French Speakers Front, an opposition party representing the French-speaking half of this nation, said he would call for such a vote Tuesday.

Tindemans has drawn criticism from the Walloon Front, a small party representing French-speaking Belgians within his coalition, as well as from France following his cabinet's selection Saturday of the General Dynamics F16 jet fighter over the French Mirage for its air force.

The choice seals the purchase of 334 F16s for \$2 billion by a consortium of Belgium, Norway, Denmark and the Netherlands to replace their F104 Starfighters.

The Walloon Front executive over the weekend reaffirmed its veto of any plane solution that was "not European."

The party's 13 parliament members were meeting today to decide how to vote in the action.

The Walloon Front usually votes together in Parliament with the 12 members of the French Speakers Front, although the French Speakers are part of the opposition.

One of the four Walloon cabinet members — Institutional Reform Minister Francois Perin — vowed to resign if his parliamentary colleagues voted against the government.

If the Walloon Front's ministers resign, Tindemans would be faced with the choice of running a minority government or stepping down with the rest of the cabinet.

The Walloon Front and an allied party have 25 members in the 212-seat parliament. There are 85 opposition legislators in parliament.

The Belgian decision climaxed a year-long battle involving the Swedish SAAB Viggen, the U.S. Northrop YF17, the Mirage F1E and the General Dynamics F16 to replace outdated F104 Starfighters in the four countries.

In Paris, Prime Minister Jacques

Chirac criticized the Belgian decision to purchase the American plane rather than the French-made Mirage.

"This decision is profoundly regrettable," he said.

Morton Says Oil Tariffs May Drop If OPEC Increases Petroleum Prices

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Commerce Secretary Rogers C.B. Morton said today if exporting countries hike the price of oil this fall, the administration should consider removing the tariff on imported oil.

Morton said that if the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries increases the price of oil again "I'd like to look at it (the tariff) and make a recommendation to the President that we take it off."

"It's a thing you have to constantly look at and monitor," Morton said at a breakfast meeting with newsmen.

Morton is also chairman of the Energy Resources Council which completed a weekend meeting at Camp David Sunday.

Morton said the purpose of the tariff, raised to \$2 a barrel by President Ford last month, was to bring about conservation and to "get the Congress moving."

He said to leave it intact if OPEC raises prices more "might be self-defeating" because the price would become so prohibitive people would look to other sources of energy.

The Shah of Iran has been quoted as saying that OPEC nations will probably increase oil prices by at least another \$2 a barrel this fall. There have been reports that the cost may jump by as much as \$4 per barrel.

Morton said his views on the tariff were his own and not discussed at the Camp David meeting.

"The tariff is a darn good thing," he said. "It certainly has gotten the Congress off their duff."

Morton said that analysis would be required before removal of the \$2 tariff on imported oil.

Oil-Producing Nations Open Policy Sessions

LIBREVILLE, Gabon (UPI) — The oil-producing nations opened a major policy-making meeting today with a threat to tie oil prices to world inflation or to stop quoting these prices in dollars.

Gabon President Albert-Bernard Bongo keynoted the meeting of ministers of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries by accusing the west of undermining OPEC's new wealth through inflation and a falling dollar.

Gabon is one of OPEC's newest and smallest members and its palm-shaded West African capital put on a rhythmic, hand-clapping show of African singers and drummers to open the first meeting that the cartel has held here.

"It would be possible to decide the pegging of petroleum prices and to post our prices in a suitable unit of accounting," Bongo said.

The ministers from the 13 OPEC nations who applauded Bongo's speech knew that he referred to two proposals before the meeting:

Wallace Gives Democrats Word on Loyalty Oath

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) — George Wallace has a short message for all Democrats who want him to pledge his party loyalty before they consider him for the 1976 presidential nomination: You go first.

The Alabama governor arrived at the 67th annual National Governors Conference Sunday to find himself and his soon-to-be announced candidacy political Topic A among his colleagues.

His neighbor, Florida Gov. Reubin Askew, had suggested on a national television program that Wallace, while strong in early presidential polls, was not getting support from national Democratic leaders because he had not pledged to stay in the party and support its nominee if his campaign failed.

Wallace turned the Askew proposal around: "I wonder if all these leaders

Rockefeller CIA Report Release Expected Tonight

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Five months after President Ford asked Vice President Nelson Rockefeller to head an investigation into U.S. intelligence agencies, the uproar over the final product is almost as loud as the one that created the probe.

Ford will hold a nationally televised news conference at 7:30 p.m. EDT tonight, and he was expected to announce he will release the 350-page Rockefeller commission report but withhold from the public an accompanying report on allegations the Central Intelligence Agency was involved in plots to assassinate foreign leaders.

White House sources said Ford will turn over the commission's findings on the

assassination question to the Senate committee investigating the CIA, headed by Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho.

Ford got the report Friday. Despite an earlier statement from Rockefeller it would be released to the public Sunday, the White House decided to keep it under wraps, not saying if or when it would be released.

But Ford aides said during the weekend it would be released, but without the sensitive material on alleged CIA plots to kill foreign leaders, which the panel did not complete.

Attempting to clarify the confusion, White House sources said Ford had always intended to release it but was offended when commission officials took the lead in announcing an exact release time.

They said Ford felt he was being pre-empted by lesser officials and decided to assert his right to control the situation, providing himself time to read and digest the report before making it public in orderly fashion.

White House aides have been saying one reason for not publicizing the evidence about CIA plots was that Ford did not want to be the President to blow the whistle on

possible wrongdoing by his predecessors.

The Rockefeller commission was set up Jan. 5 in response to allegations the CIA violated the law by spying on domestic anti-war dissidents.

But last month Ford said the panel also would look into reports the CIA may have been involved in plots to kill foreign leaders, such as Cuba's Fidel Castro and the late Francois "Papa Doc" Duvalier of Haiti, Rafael Trujillo of the Dominican Republic and Patrice Lumumba of the Congo.

Ford, who returned from a grueling trip to Europe last week, read the CIA report during the weekend, but also found time to play 18 holes of golf both Saturday and Sunday.

On Wednesday he begins two days of meetings with Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin, at which Ford will probably relay results of his talks last week in Austria with Egyptian President Anwar Sadat.

The Israeli cabinet today said it would push for an interim settlement with Egypt. The cabinet instructed Rabin to tell Ford that Jerusalem would be willing to make concessions "parallel" to concessions from Cairo.

Court Rules Jobless Parent Has Option on Benefits

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Supreme Court ruled unanimously today that an unemployed parent has the option of receiving either unemployment compensation or welfare — the latter being higher in most states.

Justice William H. Rehnquist said that under amendments to federal welfare laws approved in 1968, jobless parents cannot be forced to accept unemployment compensation rather than welfare.

He said that if Congress and the states, which share in financing welfare costs, want to force a parent to exhaust his unemployment benefits, they must join in changing the federal law.

The Court affirmed the ruling of a three-judge federal court in a Vermont case.

The state had argued that since unemployment compensation is paid for by employers based on an employee's service, it should be exhausted before benefits can be obtained through tax funds financing welfare services.

The Department of Health, Education and Welfare joined Vermont in asking the

justices to reverse the lower court, which had determined the federal law permitted a parent the option of taking either unemployment or Aid for Dependent Children welfare.

Ford's Popularity Up Sharply in May

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Ford's popularity increased significantly in May, giving him a small edge over Democratic Sen. Edward M. Kennedy in the 1976 presidential race, according to a new Harris survey.

The survey showed that Ford for the first time since May 1974 has a chance of defeating Kennedy, the Democrats' strongest candidate according to the poll. Kennedy has continuously said he will not be a candidate for president.

Ford, who was trailing Kennedy 50-43 per cent in April, registered a 48-46 per cent edge in the survey in May.

Police Seize 7,200 Cartons Of Untaxed Cigarettes

BETHEL (UPI) — State police say three men arrested early today were transporting 7,200 cartons of untaxed cigarettes, the largest single seizure of illegal cigarettes in the history of the state.

The three men were to be arraigned today in Danbury's Court of Common Pleas under a state law signed June 5, making it a felony to sell more than 100 cartons of untaxed cigarettes, a police spokesman said.

Being held under \$20,000 bonds each were Mr. Bernice R. Peeden, 43, Wilson, N.C., Mitchell Moore, 51, Gray, Ga., and Richard K. Hamilton, 16, Lucama, N.C. They were charged with sale and transportation of unstamped cigarettes and conspiracy to commit both crimes.

The state police spokesman said the 7,200 cartons of cigarettes confiscated in a truck disguised with empty produce crates would have been worth \$37,000 in the market, with state taxes totaling \$15,000. Another truck also was confiscated, he said.

The truck was stopped on Interstate 84

in Bethel about 2:15 a.m. today, police said. The investigation was conducted by the state police and the Tax Department in conjunction with the Statewide Organized Crime Investigative Task Force and the Eastern Seaboard Interstate Tax Enforcement Group.

State Tax Department agents kept the suspects under surveillance from the Greater Rocky Mount area of North Carolina, the spokesman said.

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Senators Take Up Election Dispute

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Senate Republicans plan to add hours, and perhaps days, of debate to the seven months New Hampshire has been waiting for its junior senator.

The Republicans want to take as much time as possible in the debate opening today to persuade the Senate to send the disputed election back to New Hampshire. The Democrats favor settling the issue in Washington.

Louis C. Wyman, a former five-term congressman whom New Hampshire officials declared the winner over Democrat John A. Durkin in the closest Senate race in history, also wants to take the issue back home.

The Senate will consider whether to allow television coverage of the proceedings. Republicans proposed both

radio and television coverage, but Democrats said such coverage should be tied to an agreement on limiting debate, something the Republicans have been unwilling to grant.

Wyman defeated Durkin, a former state insurance commissioner, by 355 votes Nov. 5. An official recount gave the victory to Durkin.

Wyman asked a Republican-dominated commission to review the dispute. A ballot review board stripped Durkin of a 10-vote edge and gave the victory to Wyman by two votes.

Durkin appealed to the Senate in a complaint that resulted in barring either man from taking the seat.

The dispute came back on the Senate floor because a Rules Committee review deadlocked on 35 issues, including the validity of 27 ballots.

Conservative Sen. James B. Allen, D-Ala., joined the three GOP lawmakers on the eight-man panel to produce the deadlock. A state's rights advocate, he joined the Republicans in an effort to uphold the decisions of New Hampshire officials on the various disputed ballots.

However, Allen opposed moves within the committee to send the issue back to New Hampshire.

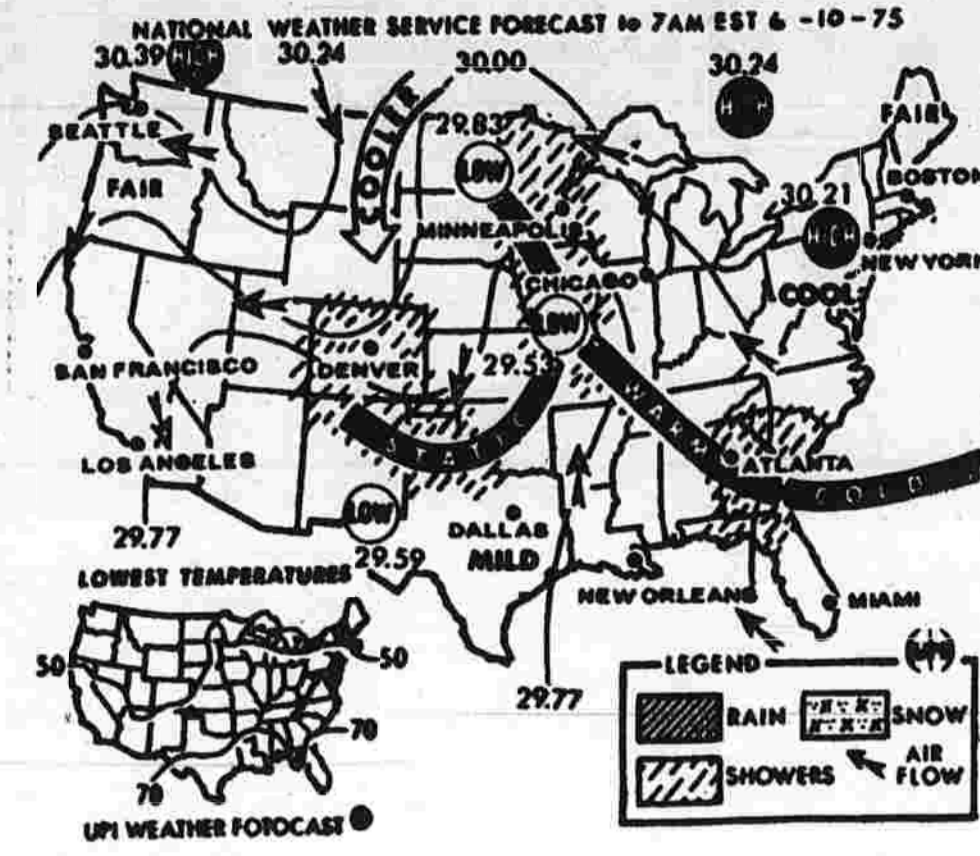

Manchester Evening Herald OPINION Norway's Dubious Gift

While Britons are anxiously looking to the arrival of North Sea oil as their salvation from impending economic catastrophe, the Norwegians are just as anxiously wondering what they are going to do with their share of the bonanza and how its going to affect their society.

"Because it can use only a fraction of the oil it can drill, Norway should be able to export all but 10 million tons of its projected 90-million-ton annual output from Ekofisk, the first of several rich fields lying astride the British-Norwegian boundary dividing the North Sea that is expected to begin flowing this summer.

Norway stands to earn at least \$4 billion annually from oil exports. In a nation of only four million persons, this kind of money will go a long way. The question is: What way?

The issue "has been positively traumatic to underpopulated, bucolic Norway" and has split the nation politically and socially, writes UPI European diplomatic correspondent Richard C. Longworth.

"We see the possibilities it offers," says Odd Goethe, an oil expert in the industry ministry. "But we are afraid our new wealth will be used wrong, and we will have a rich man's problems."

Only New York Can Save New York

The nation's eye is on the apple — the "Big Apple," New York City.

Staggering under the long-term burden of a debt larger than that of the entire United States before the Depression and faced with the immediate need to raise some \$1 billion just to meet its short-term cash flow demands, the nation's greatest metropolis stumbles from one fiscal crisis to another and verges on bankruptcy.

Simply stated, New York City has long been living beyond its means. Denied rescue by the federal Treasury and granted only temporary relief in the form of a \$200-million advance by the state, Mayor Abe Beame has presented New Yorkers with a "horror list" of drastic budget cuts including the layoffs of 38,000 municipal employees in a city in which one out of

seven people is alive on some form of public welfare.

Now if New York only had the power to print money, all its problems would be solved — on paper and by means of paper. That's what the federal government, which has also long been living beyond its means, does when it spends more than it takes in.

But then every other city with money problems — and that includes most of them — would want the same power and the country would be in a worse situation than it was before the establishment of the national government, when every state was sovereign unto itself.

New York's plight is the plight of other cities, only magnified many times. And only New York can save itself from its plight.



Pro-Israel Petition Endangers Mid-East Peace

WASHINGTON — I recently returned to the capital from the Middle East, convinced that the best hope for a lasting settlement lies in a more even-handed policy by the United States. Thus, the recent pro-Israel letter to President Ford, signed by 75 U.S. Senators, appears to be a step precisely in the wrong direction.

What is needed from the United States is a strong affirmation that this country is committed unequivocally neither to Israel nor to the Arab states, but rather to a just settlement of the issues involved. The U.S. should guarantee Israel's territorial integrity, but only after Israel agrees to withdraw from Arab land and compromise on the Palestinian issue.

Coming on the eve of the President's visit to Europe which included meetings with Egyptian President Anwar Sadat, the Senate's pro-Israel petition was full of mischief. Sadat, it will be remembered, put his political neck on the line earlier this spring when he agreed to participate in Secretary Kissinger's shuttle diplomacy between Cairo and Tel Aviv.

With both the power and the will to deal reasonably with Israel — may lose faith once more and become a political casualty of ill-fated U.S. policy. His replacement almost surely would be forced to take a harder line toward Israel.

The letter signed by 75 Senators said in part that American policy since the 1947 war has been that the conflict "be settled on the basis of secure and recognized boundaries that are defensible, and direct negotiations between the nations involved. We believe that this approach continues to offer the best hope for a just and lasting peace."

The problem, of course, is that Israel is playing the game with borrowed chips and the "defensible" boundaries she has in mind are to be found on the Arab territory seized by Israel in 1947.

This reporter's recent talks with a number of well-placed Americans in Beirut — which is the crossroads of the Middle East — failed to produce a single individual who is optimistic about a lasting settlement unless Israel agrees to relinquish virtually all of the Arab land taken in 1947. American observers there also generally place a second precondition on any hope for peace: The willingness of the United States to convince Israel of the necessity of coming to terms on the re-settlement of displaced Palestinians, such as those I saw living in camps in Beirut and in the south of Lebanon.

"We affirm that the great issues of our time are not the supply of oil or the control of the Middle East equator, but justice and peace," reads a statement prepared by a prominent group of American and Arab leaders.

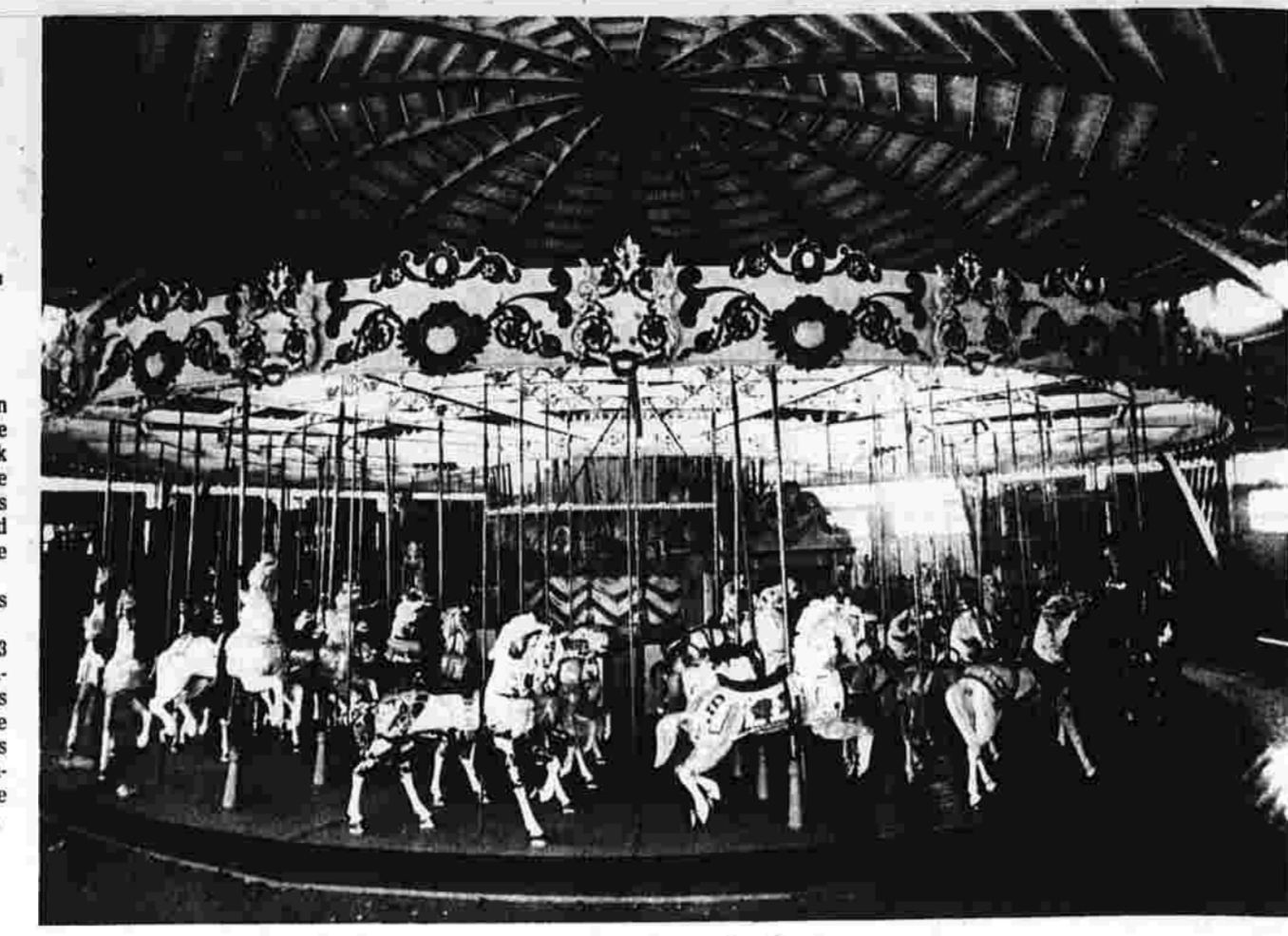

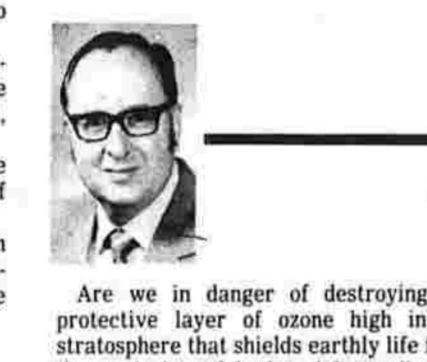
The Malpractice Hassle

NEW YORK CITY — Any moment now I expect to see a cartoon coming up with a caricature showing a doctor in medical garb and a lawyer with a briefcase slung around him, both locked in a deadly hassle over malpractice legislation, with a bewildered public between them getting crushed as they wrestle.

Take the whole absurd tangle of interests and pressures — lawyers' complaints, doctors' strikes, new patients left untreated, state legislators in nonstop negotiating and law-drafting sessions, threats of hospitals to be closed down. How did it ever emerge, so sharply, suddenly, catastrophically?

There is enough blame to distribute pretty widely — among the medical and legal professions, the jury system, the insurance companies, the patients themselves. We can all testify that there are many first-rate, hard-working, deeply committed doctors. But there are others caught up in the urge to stretch things and make a fast buck, and still others who have to be set down quite simply as incompetents. The combination of high fees, greed, tension, incompetence and overwork — however you mix the ingredients — is certainly not a usual formula, but there is enough of it to have created a very real and sinister climate.

Many people feel harassed by life, are often envious or angry (or both) at the publicized high income of doctors, and take it out on them. The lawyers are all too ready to join the fun for high stakes, by gambling on cases with contingency fees. As for the jurors, they have been joining the roller-coaster ride, rocketing to malpractice awards which are often absurd in size. It is a fine rollicking feeling for a juror to job at the doctors, stick the insurance companies with staggering awards, and emerge as a good fellow all around.

The cost of home loans to home buyers is tied closely to the interest rates which thrift institutions must pay to attract and keep money in savings accounts, points out Lloyd S. Bowles, president of the United States League of Savings Associations — "and the cost of attracting savings has been going steadily ever since inflation took off in 1966."

Since 1966, there have been six increases of one kind or another in savings rate ceilings, which are set by federal regulatory agencies. In that year, the passbook rate ceiling was 4.75 per cent; it is now 5.25 per cent.

But savings certificates are the predominant form of savings today, and the most recent increase, authorized late in 1974, allows savings institutions to issue certificates for six years or more at a new high rate of 7.75 per cent per year.

Onassis Will Details Revealed

ATHENS (UPI) — Aristotle Onassis in a handwritten 18-page will, bequeathed a yearly income expected to reach \$250,000 to his widow Jacqueline, a Greek newspaper said Saturday.

The Athens Daily Acropolis said Onassis arranged that \$100,000 will be paid annually to his wife Jacqueline and \$25,000 dollars annually each to her children, John and Caroline Kennedy.

It said Onassis made the stipulation after arranging for most of the income of his estate to go to a multi-million dollar foundation for public benefit projects, honoring his late son Alexander.

The paper quoted from a copy of the will obtained after it was submitted Thursday for validity to the Athens court of first instance.

Onassis said his wife's two children will receive the annuity until they reach 21 years of age, "then the amounts destined for them will be given to my wife so that she will finally receive \$150,000 annually," the paper reported.

"This amount added to the tax free income of \$100,000 from bonds, will give her an annual income of \$250,000 dollars," Onassis wrote.

The will, written Jan. 3, 1974 while Onassis was flying on his Lear Jet from Acapulco to New York, provided an annual income of \$50,000 dollars for his daughter Christina.

He also gave her ownership of his shipping company Victory Carriers, 90 percent of the Olympic Airways shares he still owned when he wrote the will, plus 450 shares of a new company in which he wanted the executors of his will to consolidate the largest part of his other holdings.

Onassis said his wife was entitled to one fourth of his luxury yacht Christina and of his private island of Scorpios, with the rest going to Christina.

On Thursday, Christina announced half of her father's fortune would be spent on charity in Greece "in accordance with the instructions of my deceased father Aristotle Onassis, and in memory of my brother Alexander," who died in a plane crash.

Other beneficiaries from the Onassis will are his sisters, his cousin, his nephews, his close associates and people who served him in various parts of the world.

According to estimates of shipping and business experts, the estate is worth about \$947 million, plus the cash to be paid by the Greek government for the takeover of Olympic Airways. This was estimated at between \$36 and \$45 million.

A letter to his 24-year-old daughter Christina, accompanying the will, ended with: "The last kiss from Daddy."

Quake Reported
FORTUNA, Calif. (UPI) — An earthquake lasting 16 seconds that rumbled through northern California dumped merchandise onto supermarket floors and knocked out power to 4,600 homes.

The quake that struck at 1:17 a.m. Saturday was described as moderate. It measured 5.4 on the Richter scale and was centered 20 miles southwest of Fortuna, just off the northern California coast.

No injuries were reported.

Triple Veto
UNITED NATIONS (UPI) — A triple veto has saved South Africa from strong disciplinary action by the United Nations Security Council.

The action by the United States, Britain and France was the second "triple veto" in U.N. history.

The three countries Friday vetoed a resolution, sponsored by black African nations, to slap an arms embargo on South Africa until it agrees to quit the former German colony of South-West Africa, renamed Namibia by the U.N. in 1966.

The Western powers said the situation in Namibia was not a "war-and-peace crisis," the only U.N. justification for sanctions.

Tests Completed
MOSCOW (UPI) — The Soviet Union says it has successfully completed testing missiles in the north Pacific, in an apparent preparation for renewed disarmament talks with the United States later this month.

A brief Tass announcement Saturday said only that the tests had been "successfully completed." It did not say what kind of rockets were being tested.

The distance of the firing range indicated the Soviets again have been testing intercontinental ballistic missiles, possibly equipped with multi-targeted warheads.

Many Bridges Deficient
WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Road Information Program says one of every seven bridges in the United States is in hazardous condition.

TRIP, an association of companies in the road construction and materials industry, said federal, state and local government reports show at least 80,000 bridges cannot safely accommodate current traffic patterns.

The bridge problems are especially acute in New Mexico and Nevada, where 35 per cent are considered deficient, the report said. More than 25 per cent of the bridges in Louisiana, Vermont and West Virginia are also in unsafe condition, TRIP said.

Planes Withdraw
WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States has withdrawn the last squadron of 18 combat planes based in Taiwan, according to the State Department.

A department official also confirmed Sunday American troops on the island will be cut by 30 per cent — to 2,800 men — by the end of June.

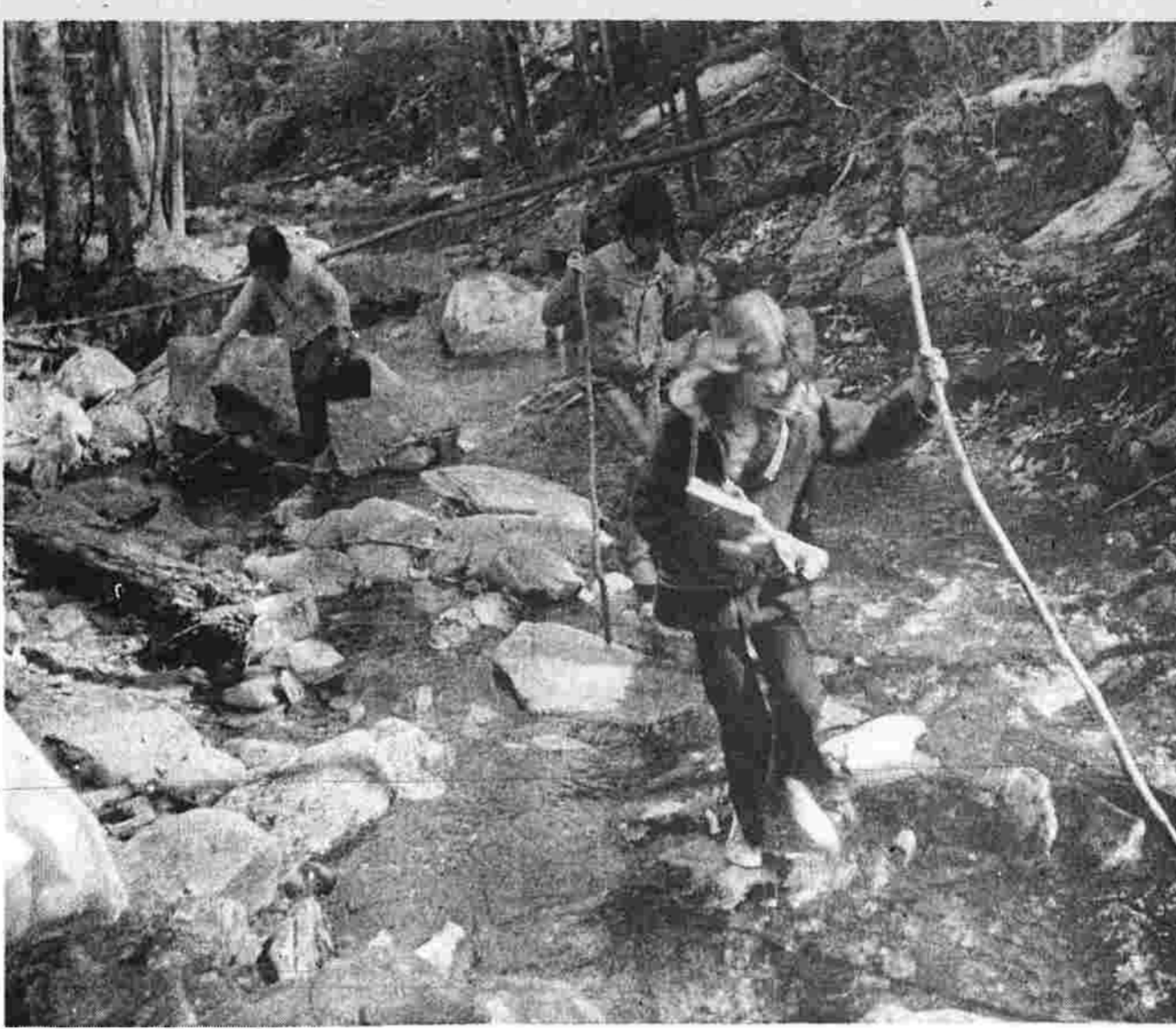

Global Approach Urged
WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Jacob Javits, R-N.Y., says the United States must take a global approach to diplomacy, not the "piecemeal reassessment" of foreign policy which now is evident.

Javits told the American Society for Medical Technology Sunday the administration's foreign policy reassessment concentrates on the Middle East crisis and establishing a post-Vietnam Asian policy.

"My concern is that this type of piecemeal reassessment will focus on the wrong questions and come up with the wrong answers," Javits said.

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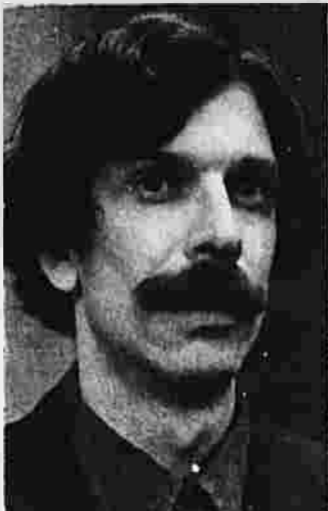

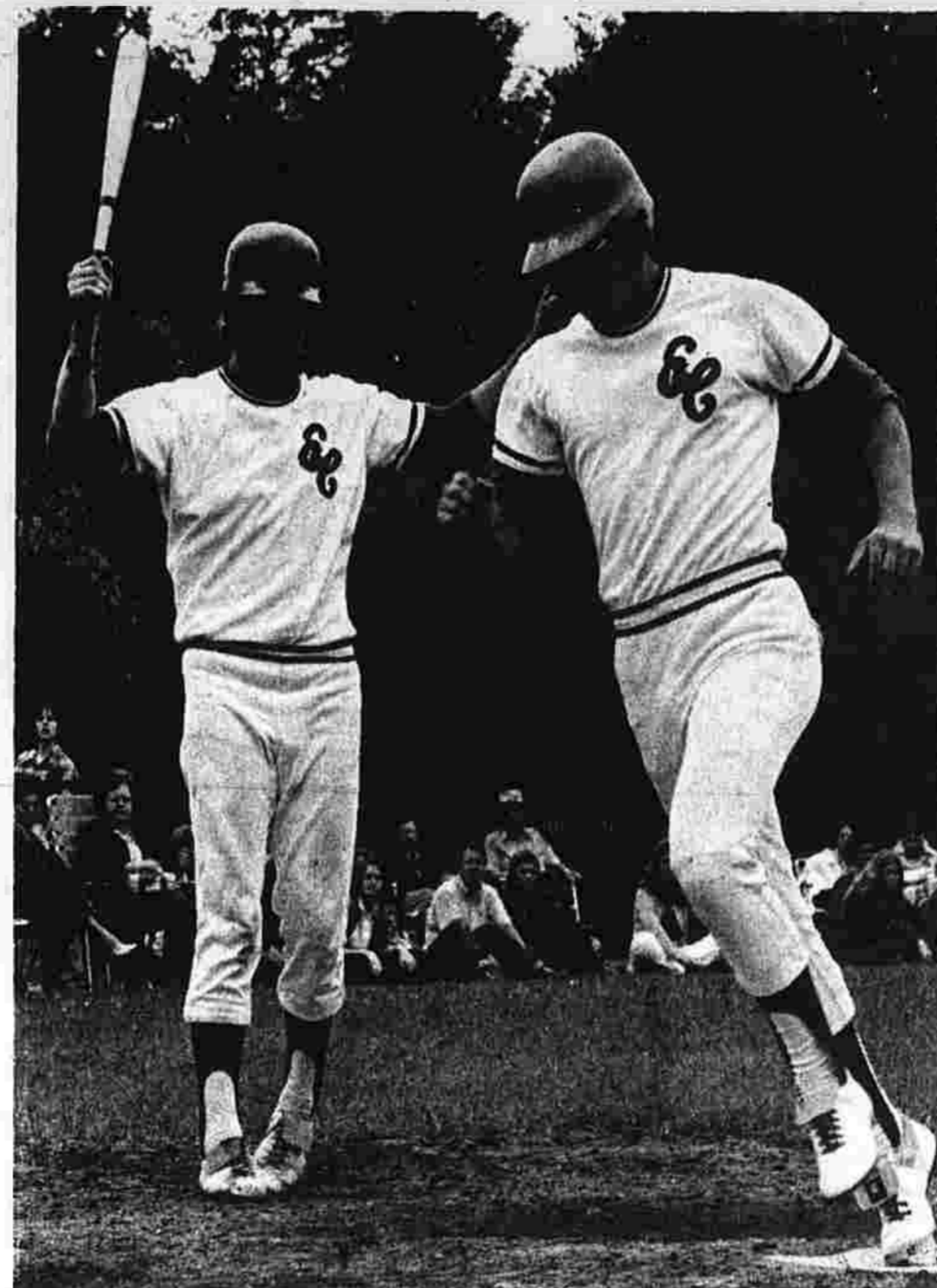

Yet Neudecker, who was involved in a bumping incident last month with Cleveland manager Frank Robinson, was convinced he was right. "There is no question in my mind the ball hit Carbo's glove, hit the wall, then came back down. That is no catch. It was so clear cut I'm amazed Johnson came out to argue. There's no question in my mind it was not a catch."

Carbo was equally certain he had made a legal catch. "No way that ball hit the wall. I jump up, my body hits the

wall, the ball drops off the heel of my glove and I catch it before the ball hits the ground."

"Look, if the ball went off the wall, I wouldn't have stood there and argued. I would have thrown the ball into second base to try and get the runner."

Minnesota players were understandably tight-lipped on the call. Manager Frank Quilici said he "didn't really see the play well from where I was" in the third base dugout. The Twins manager added cryptically, "I'll tell you what, there have been some injustices the past week."

Boston center-fielder Fred Lynn, a usually quiet type, explained heatedly that he had an excellent view of the

play. "I was about 20 feet away and it was obvious that the ball didn't hit the wall."

Bench and Perez Big Red Leaders

NEW YORK (UPI) — The Big Red Machine is clicking on all cylinders now that the two vital parts of the mechanism are functioning as a unit again.

Johnny Bench and Tony Perez, the two primary catalysts in the Cincinnati Reds' arsenal, joined forces for the first time in two weeks Sunday and delivered most of the clout as the Reds swept a doubleheader from the Chicago Cubs, 2-1 and 5-5, to move a game and a half in front of Los Angeles in the National League West.

Bench drilled a two-run homer, his 13th of the season, in the seventh inning to give the Reds and Gary Nolan a victory in the opener, and Perez, starting for the first time since suffering a chipped bone in his thumb on May 15, singled twice and homered while driving in three runs in the nightcap.

The twin-victory gives the Reds 16 victories in their last 19 games and 22 triumphs in 27 games this season at Riverfront Stadium.

Perez' three-hit spurge in the second game came after he went hitless, striking out twice, in three at-bats in the opener.

"I swing at too many bad pitches in that first game," said Tony. "The second game — three hits, one homer — make me feel good."

Perez not only tattooed Cub pitching in the second game, but he also starred in the field, making a diving back-handed grab of Manny Trillo's sinking liner in the sixth inning.

In other National League games, San Francisco took a doubleheader from Pittsburgh, 3-1 and 4-2. Philadelphia defeated Los Angeles 4-2; San Diego downed Montreal 5-2 then lost 3-1; St. Louis beat Houston 5-1 and New York edged Atlanta 7-5 in 14 innings.

Giants 3-4, Pirates 1-2. Chris Speier knocked in two runs with a double and a sacrifice fly to support Ed Halicki's five-hit pitching as the Giants won the opener. San Francisco rallied for three runs in the ninth inning to win the nightcap, with Marc Hill delivering a pinch-hit single to drive in two runs. Glenn Adams homered for the Giants in the second game while

rookie Joe McIntosh. Dave McNally lost his sixth straight for Montreal. In the nightcap, Pat Scanlon hit a two-run triple and Steve Rogers scattered nine hits to even his record at 4-4 to gain Montreal a split.

Cardinals 5, Astros 1. Ted Simmons smacked a two-run homer to lead the Cardinals to their sixth straight triumph. Ron Reed notched his second straight triumph since being acquired from Atlanta, allowing only one run in 7 2-3 innings.

The Atlanta Braves can vouch for that today.

The 35-year-old Torre, who broke in with the Braves 16 years ago, collected four hits in six at-bats and drove in three runs Sunday to lead the New York Mets to a 14-inning, 7-6 triumph over the Braves. Yet, ironically, it was a ball that Torre did not hit safely that caused Atlanta the most grief.

Floyd Celebrates Victory



Winners in Fishing Contest

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (UPI) — Ray Floyd gave his mother a first birthday gift Sunday, his first victory on the professional golf tour in six years.

"My mother's birthday is today," a grinning Floyd said after a three-stroke victory in the Kemper Open. "This is her gift."

Floyd, who now lives in Lake Havasu City, Ariz., grew up at Ft. Bragg, N.C., and his father still lives there. Both his parents, though now divorced, were in the gallery Sunday.

The burly six-footer was locked in a tight duel with playing partner Gary Player while he used and iron to chip in a 100-foot shot for an eagle three.

That gave Floyd a two-stroke lead, which he maintained throughout the rest of the match. Bogeys by both Player and young John Mahaffey, who played for second on the 18-hole gave Floyd the three-stroke victory.

"I ran it up the hill, down the valley and around the corner," Floyd said of the 100-foot clincher shot. "I was amazed to see it go in; I think I reached the hole in four steps."

The victory, which netted Floyd \$50,000, was his first since the 1969 PGA championship and ended a six-year drought, which he said was partly due to his immaturity as a golfer.

Floyd, who came within one shot of the course record on Quail Hollow Country Club in Thursday's first round, finished Sunday with a three-under-par 69 and a four-round total of 10-under 278.

Player, playing in only his eighth U.S. tournament this year, started the day one stroke ahead of Floyd and two others.

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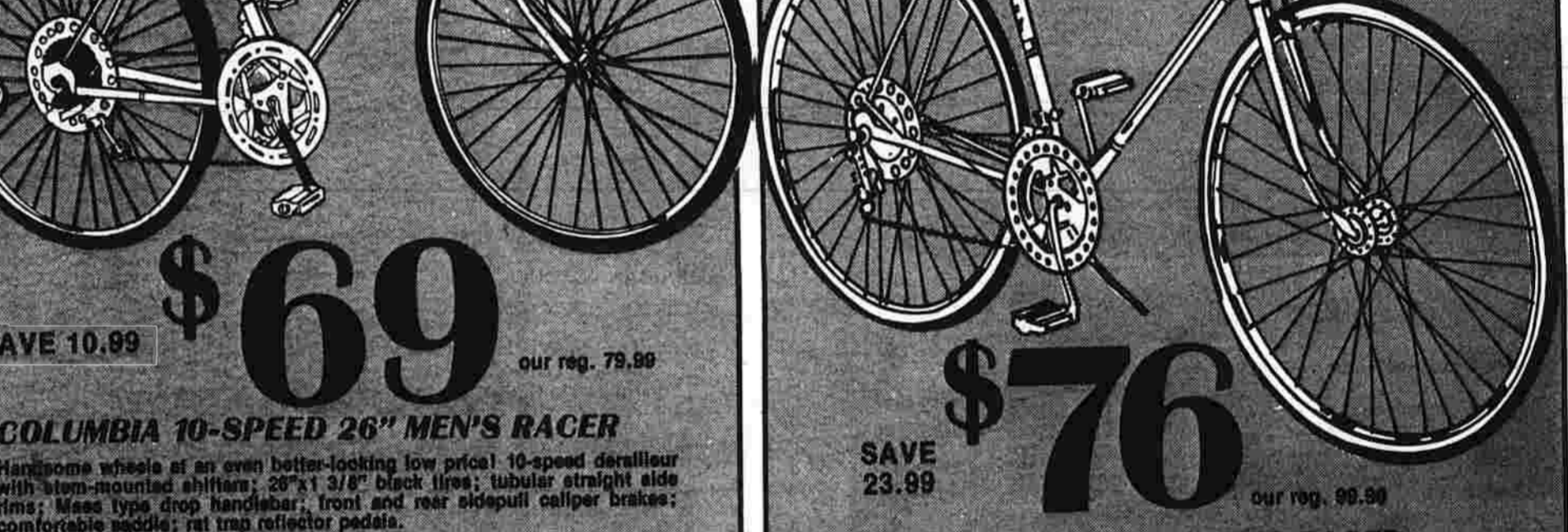

Air Crashes Kill Two State Men

Two Connecticut men were killed Sunday in separate small plane accidents in Martha's Vineyard, Mass. and Coventry, R.I.

John Crumlish, 43, of Southbury, a senior pilot for Allegheny Airlines, was killed while practicing aerobatics in a modified World War II P-51 Mustang over Martha's Vineyard. The plane nosedived at 250 miles per hour into the grass landing strip at Edgartown Airport.

In Coventry, Albert Brewster, 48, of East Lyme, died after taking off from a grass airstrip in a homemade, single engine plane, which he borrowed from a member of the Experimental Aircraft Association, a Connecticut flying club.

Members of the club, Brewster took off from the airstrip at about 3:30 p.m. The plane climbed to about 100 feet, when its engine apparently failed.

The plane dove steeply into a heavily wooded area about one-quarter of a mile from the airstrip near the Rhode Island and Connecticut border.

Crumlish was also a member of a flying club. About 10 members of the North American Flyers, a group based in Brookfield, Conn., were at Katama Airport in Martha's Vineyard for a weekend of stunt flying practice.
