New Process Speeds Breast X Rays

A new process called xeromammography made possible through new equipment installed at Rockville General Hospital makes it possible to evaluate breast X rays much faster. Robert Boardman, hospital administrator, said the process

utilizes an electrically-charged plate to record the X-ray image instead of the conventional X The conventional X-ray examination, mammography, has been performed by the hospital for several years. The process was an accurate way of

breast lumps before surgery but was a more time-consuming process, Boardman said. The new process, developed by the Zerox Corp., allows the examination to be performed much more quickly and the image can be examined immediately. It allows the radiology department to handle an increased volume of these

aiding surgeons to evaluate

The "xeroradiographic" equipment is not limited to breast examination and is being used to supplement the X ray for examinations of other parts of the body. Another plus connected with

the new equipment is the fact that it allows for a significant decrease in X-ray exposure. Boardman said this may be an aid for the few women who need to have repeated examinations over a period of years.

One of the main goals of mammography is the detection of early cancer, too small to be discovered by physical examination, Boardman said.



Cubs Come To Museum

Orphaned when their mother was killed by a car recently, these baby raccoons have captured the affections of everyone here at the museum. We all find it quite impossible to resist those tiny masked faces peering out from beneath their blanket or their playful scampering about the yard. We estimate the cubs to be approximately six to eight weeks old, still much too young to fend for themselves in the wild. Because raccoons experience less fear of humans than most wild animals, they have been quick to adjust to their new life. They willingly

accept food from us and seem to enjoy being held and fondled. Raccoons, in general, are a widely known and popular species of animal. They exist only in North America and have their greatest distribution throughout the southern states and milder portions of the West

Usually they select as a nesting place a hollow tree in high above ground level, close to a stream or lake. However, if necessary, they will inhabit small crevices among rocks or burrows. As nocturnal animals, they spend most of the day asleep perched in a tree, leaving it only at night to hunt for food. The ringed tail serves as a protective camouflage while sleeping, blending in nicly with the shadows cast by the tree branches.

Raccoons are particularly fond of fresh-water fish, clams, crayfish and frogs, the primary reason for nesting near water. Their omnivorous diet also consists of vegetables, nuts and fruits and occasionally birds and their eggs. A propensity for corn and poultry often causes farmers to look up on these masked animals as pests. The life span for raccoons may reach ten years. Adults range in size from 18 inches to 28 inches long, excluding the tail, and 12 to 35 pounds in ntelligent enough to use it wisely and aggressively when threatened. Like skunks and bears, raccoons are plantigrades, or animals that walk

"Everybody Does It" Pedestrian Jenks, bowled over by an automobile, decided to sue the motorist for damages. But in a court hearing, the motorist pointed out that Jenks had been rossing in the middle of the

"What of it?" countered Jenks. "Crossing in the middle of the block happens to be the customary thing at that particular location. As long as everybody does t, that can't be held against me."



However, the court ruled that Jenks was indeed guilty of negligence-regardless of the custom. The judge said the mere fact that many people do something wrong does not make it right. This is the law's usual attitude toward those who follow someone else's bad example. And it applies not only to those who suffer an injury but also to those who inflict an injury. For example:

An eight-year-old boy threw a rock at a playmate, damaging his eye. In the litigation that followed, the defense attorney tried to excuse his young client by arguing that "healthy boys of his age have done (the same thing) from time immemorial." But again the court ruled that rock-throwing, however common, was still wrongful because of its

inherent danger. On the other hand, while custom does not excuse negligence, it may at least shed light on what negligence is. In another case, a hurrying shopper crashed into the plate glass door at a market, shattering the glass. She claimed damages later on the ground that the panel should have been thicker. But experts testified that the glass was of standard thickness, the kind used almost universally in market doors. Dismissing the woman's claim, the court said the custom of the trade was persuasive evidence that the company had simply not done anything wrong.

For instance, the most earnings anyone could have credited last year was \$13,200. The naximum amount on which Social Security contributions were based. This yearly maximum was as low as \$3,000 before 1951, and it was increased over the years as earning levels increased throughout the United States. Social Security Tax Increases Proposed

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Two former Social Security officials are proposing that Social Security taxes be sharply increased within 18 months to keep the system on a sound financial footing.

But Robert M. Ball commissioner of

Social Security from 1962 to 1973, and Robert Myers, chief actuary for the system for many years, disagree over what type of increase is called for. Ball wants one which would increase the maximum tax by about 50 per cent, but which would be paid only by middle and high income wage earners, those earning Myers wants a proportionately smaller

increase, but one which would affect every wage earner, including the poor. In testimony Wednesday to the House Ways and Means subcommittee on Social Security, the two experts decried the "alarmist" stories about Social Security's current and potential future deficits. But both said a new source of revenue would be necessary to overcome deficits. Higher taxes are unavoidable, they said. Ball proposed that the amount of wages subject to the tax of 5.85 per cent be increased to \$24,000 in 1977, then to rise as

If done next year, the maximum tax payable in 1976 would go to \$1,047.75.
