Wallace, 55, is paralyzed below the waist as the result of gunshot wounds suffered while campaigning in Maryland in May, 1972. He campaigned from his wheelchair last year to win an unprecedented third term as governor and began stepping up pre-presidential campaign activity in 1970.

At the time he was shot, Wallace had received more votes in 1972 state presidential primaries than any other candidate and had shown strength outside the South by winning the Michigan primary.

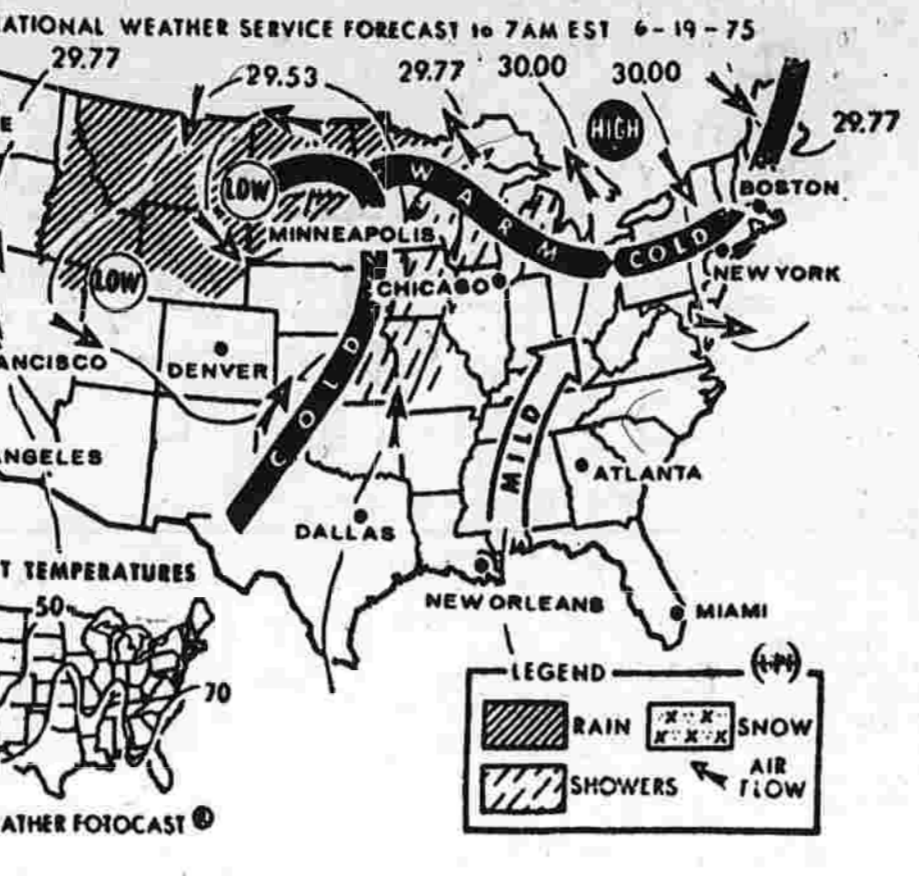

STAMPS AND COINS

We can't be as beautiful. Here are some recent stamps from Ethiopia showing a warbling, an aardvark, a gelada baboon, and a civet cat.

The warthog even shook up a writer for the Britannica, who described it as "hideous." An aardvark, one of the many kinds of anteaters, at least possesses a most satisfying name to sound off with. Try it sometime when you are frustrated: "Aardvark!"

The gelada baboon, special to this country, is famous for having his nostrils far back along the snout. Civet cats have been raised in captivity for the production of a musky substance for the perfume trades.

A more appealing product of Ethiopia's Mother Nature is the coffee shrub. Kaffee, one of their towns, is reputed to be the source of the salubrious bean. The stamps here were issued by the new provisional military government, since the line of emperors going back to Menelik I son of Solomon and the queen of Sheba, has been scattered.

This ancestry is traditional and generally believed, although there is some dispute as to whether the country, Sheba, was in Ethiopia, or a long hike and a short sail across the Red Sea, in Yemen.

We never hear it, but the queen had a name: Makeda. She was supposed to have been a living doll but the only artist's depiction on a stamp of the country (in 1949), does nothing to prove it — being an anybody-looking profile with a junky crown on top (Scott No. 415; Minus 814). Compare that with Egypt's swanlike Nefertiti on Scott No. 387.

Previously, in 1909, Ethiopia had three stamps with King Solomon's throne, but they didn't have a portrait.

The Republic of Vermont shall rise again! Coin World shows their medal design for the Bicentennial, and they would have to be different with the dating 1777-1977 instead of the usual '76. The medal is available now (in several formats), to mark the 200th anniversary of Ethan Allen and the Green Mountain Boys taking Fort Ticonderoga (May 1775).

Too bad they didn't make the dates 1777-1991, to commemorate their 14 years as a gutsy independent country with their own laws, postal system, coinage, and army. They did not accept the Union until their terms were met in '91.

The face of the medal shows a hillside village with the word "Vermont" large in the sky. The back has the dates under something like a troika of amebae about to merge, which is their logo. Around all this is a circlet saying "Official Medallion of the Vermont Bicentennial Commission."

And while we're on medals, hard-up Ricker College of Houlton, Maine (that is pretty well upstate), in cahoots with local Rotarians, is putting out a nice one in sterling with the cog-wheel of the Rotary International filling one side. This is

Lottery Data Bill Passed in House
WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House has voted to give newspapers in certain states the same exemption to carry state-operated lottery information as given last year to broadcasters.

The measure, approved on a 250 to 125 vote and sent to the Senate, would permit a newspaper in a state with a lottery to print information about an adjacent state's lottery.

Commercial radio and television was given the same exemption from federal anti-gambling laws by Congress last year but newspapers were inadvertently left out of that bill.

South Windsor Lauds Decision On Rail Line

Some 26 local industries in South Windsor are much happier this week than they have been over the past five months when their future was in doubt over the continuation of rail service.

The 11-mile stretch of line 88, which runs from East Hartford to East Windsor and services South Windsor along the way will be continued, following a decision made last week by the United States Railway Association (USRA).

Using data compiled by South Windsor officials and contributed by businesses which use the rail service here, this town has won months of battle to keep its rails in service here and consequently keep its business.

Earlier in the year it was announced that line 88 would be discontinued in an attempt to save money.

Five Central Railroad figures showed unprofitable trackage in South Windsor and the line threatened to pull out because of it. However, state and local officials, armed with a poll disputing Penn Central claims, presented their arguments to the USRA and the results have been victorious.

Local officials this week applauded the victory and attributed their work as being responsible for the USRA's reversal. Specifically, the Economic Development Commissioner Henry Shekely and the rest of the EDC has been praised.

Mrs. Sprengelmeyer To Seek Election

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Mrs. Sprengelmeyer, who has never run for office before, said, "I feel I've been so critical of some school board activities that I'd rather do something. I'd rather get on the board and give people a more positive approach, rather than stand around and look as though I'm criticizing all the time."

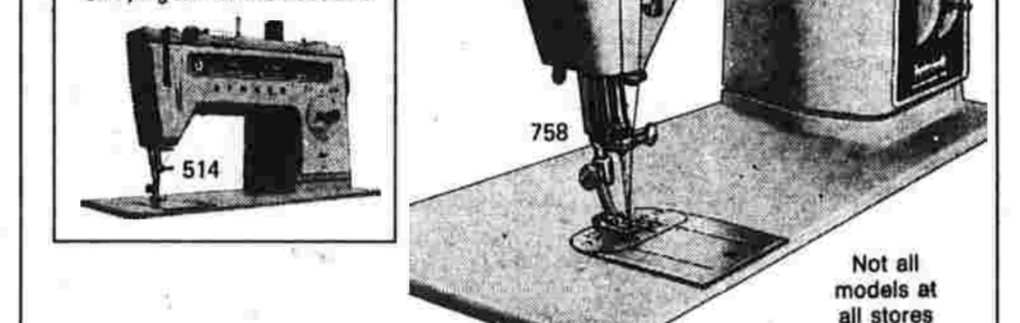

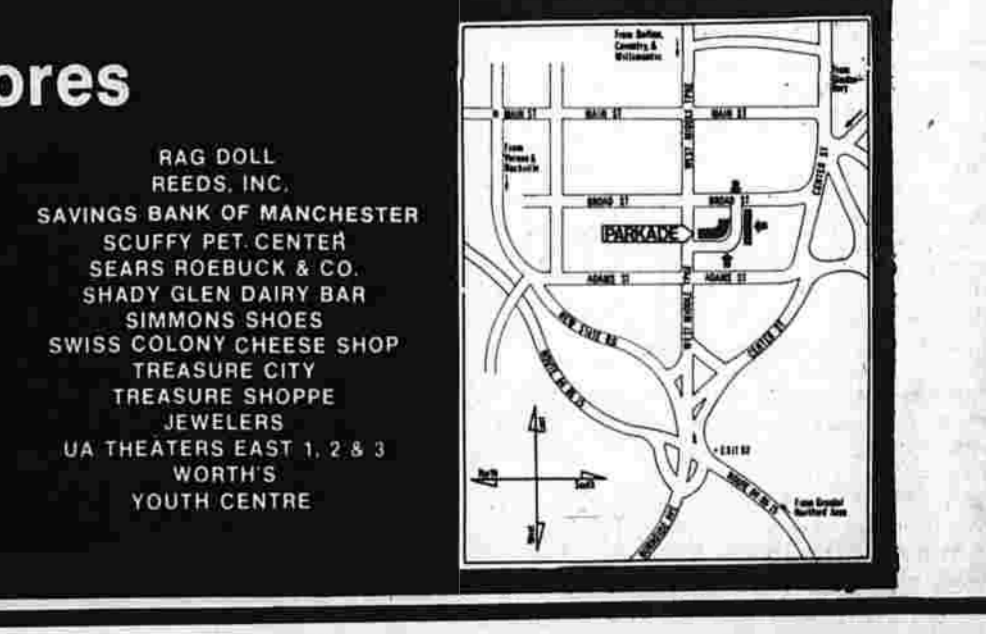

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Gandhi Wins Support

NEW DELHI (UPI) — Ruling Congress party leaders from across India gathered in New Delhi today to declare their support of Prime Minister Indira Gandhi, fighting a legal battle to save her political career.

Speakers said a mildly worded resolution containing no mention of Mrs. Gandhi's recent court conviction for election law violations would be passed at a Wednesday night session of the Congress Parliamentary party, the powerful decision-making body of the Congress party Mrs. Gandhi leads.

The gathering will be the first full session of the party hierarchy since a court in her home district of Allahabad found Mrs. Gandhi guilty last Thursday on two charges of malpractice in campaigning for the 1971 national elections.

Mrs. Gandhi will appeal the verdict to the Supreme Court in New Delhi, a move expected Friday. Should the court decide against her, she must step down as prime minister.

Legal opinion varies, but she may also have to step down temporarily while the court considers her appeal — a contingency that has reportedly caused bitter Congress in-fighting over the selection of a successor.

Party sources said it is because of this court case that the leadership resolution would make no mention of the court issue. Rather, it would simply assure her of the party's support and faith in her leadership.

The resolution was viewed as a show of strength to counter opposition party demands for Mrs. Gandhi's resignation.

Reagan Hopes He Won't Be Invited To Be President's Running Mate

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Ronald Reagan says he hopes "every day of my life" that President Ford won't seek him out for the vice presidency.

But he did not say flatly he would reject the second spot on the GOP ticket in 1976 if offered.

The former California governor told a news conference Tuesday he still has not decided whether to run or the 1976 presidential nomination. He said he will make a decision before the end of this year.

Reagan met with reporters shortly after the American Conservative Union, citing polls showing "impressive" GOP and independent support for Reagan, urged him to become a candidate for President.

The ACU did not suggest whether Reagan should run as a Republican or a third party candidate.

Reagan was asked by reporters what he would say if Ford asked him to be his vice presidential running mate in 1976.

"Well," Reagan replied, "let me just say that every day of my life I hope that doesn't happen."

State's Chief Tax Agent Won't Be Allowed Gun

HARTFORD (UPI) — A former state trooper convicted of perjury will not be allowed to carry a gun as a state tax agent even if Gov. Ella T. Grasso signs into law the bill he helped write.

As for Philip Salafia Jr., chief agent for the Tax Department, he said Tuesday he doesn't want the right to carry a gun.

On June 10, the directors extended the current twice-a-week refuse pickup through September.

Manchester's Conservation Commission, which was in the forefront of the newspaper pickup program, declared itself upset over its abandonment but conceded it has proved unprofitable for the town. It is

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Italian Communists Step Up Demands In Wake of Stunning Election Gains

ROME (UPI) — The Communist party, buoyed by stunning election gains, has stepped up demands for a major role in the Christian Democratic-led government.

"Our strength has grown to the point of making practically impossible any government solution that tries to refuse a Communist contribution," party leader Enrico Berlinguer told thousands of cheering supporters Tuesday.

The crowd outside St. John's Basilica chanted "En-ri-co, En-ri-co," waved hammer and sickle flags and released red balloons into the sky.

Thousands of cheering Communists paraded through the streets Tuesday, waving red flags and giving clenched fist salutes to celebrate their advances in the voting earlier this week.

Police outside a Christian Democratic party office used tear gas to disperse a stone-throwing crowd carrying a coffin bearing the Christian Democratic emblem.

The stock market panicked in reaction to the elections, which saw the Communists gain 2.5 million votes and come within two percentage points of the Christian Democrats.

Quotations in Milan fell an average of eight per cent, with some stocks suffering losses of up to 31 per cent on one of the darkest trading days in 20 years.

Although the nationwide vote Sunday and Monday was only

Communist-Led Workers Given Control of Newspaper

LISBON (UPI) — The military gave Communist-led janitors and typographical workers control of the newspaper Republica today in another blow to Portugal's Socialists and troops fired shots into the air to disperse crowds demonstrating against the move.

The shots were fired after someone inside the newspaper building threw what the crowds outside thought was a smoke grenade, enraging them.

The paper had been closed since last month and the military rulers' announcement that Communist-led janitors and typographical workers would be put in charge seemed certain to provoke a major political crisis.

The Socialists had threatened to pull out of the cabinet last month when the military regime closed Republica, one of the last non-Communist newspapers in Portugal.

The Socialist supporters demonstrating in front of the building fired in the face of the gunfire, but quickly returned when they saw no one had been wounded.

A new process called xeromammography made possible through new equipment installed at Rockville General Hospital makes it possible to evaluate breast X rays much faster.

Robert Boardman, hospital administrator, said the process utilizes an electrically-charged plate to record the X-ray image instead of the conventional X-ray film.

The conventional X-ray examination, mammography, has been performed by the hospital for several years. The process was an accurate way of aiding surgeons to evaluate breast lumps before surgery but was a more time-consuming process, Boardman said.

The new process, developed by the Zorex Corp., allows the examination to be performed much more quickly and the image can be examined immediately. It allows the radiology department to handle an increased volume of these examinations.

The "xeroradiographic" equipment is not limited to breast examination and is being used to supplement the X-ray for examinations of other parts of the body.

Another plus connected with the new equipment is the fact that it allows for a significant decrease in X-ray exposure. Boardman said this may be an aid for the few women who need to have repeated examinations over a period of years.

One of the main goals of mammography is the detection of early cancer, too small to be discovered by physical examination, Boardman said.

Adult School Funds Cleared

Firemen battled the blaze for more than an hour before bringing it under control, a task made simpler when the building's walls collapsed. Men and equipment from nearby towns were called in to help quell the blaze. Rush hour traffic on Interstate 94 was tied up after the blaze erupted at 4 p.m.

Students eligible for summer school are 12th graders who need to make up credits for graduation and 9th graders who need to make up a course in order to enter Manchester High School in September.

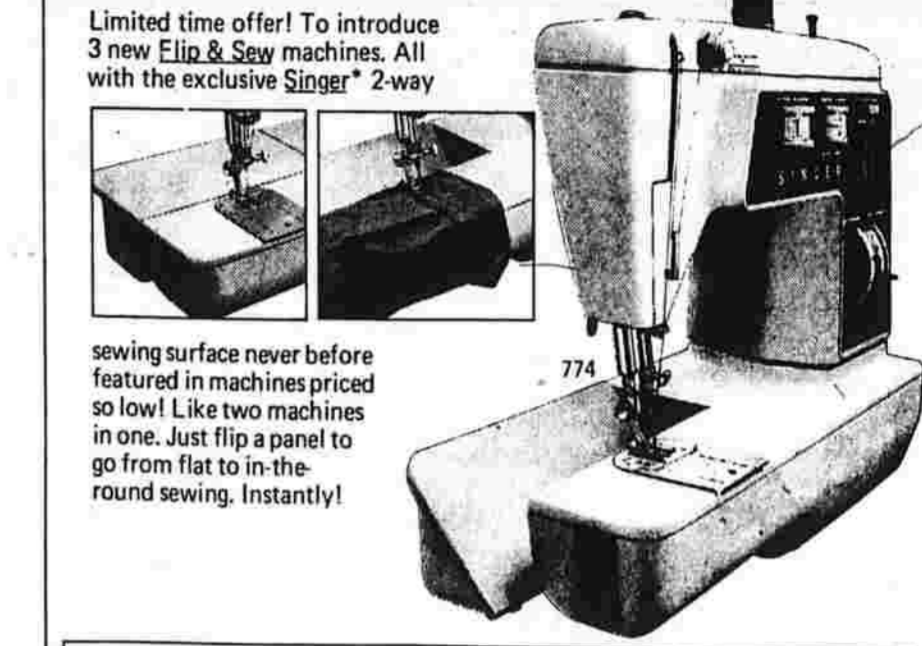

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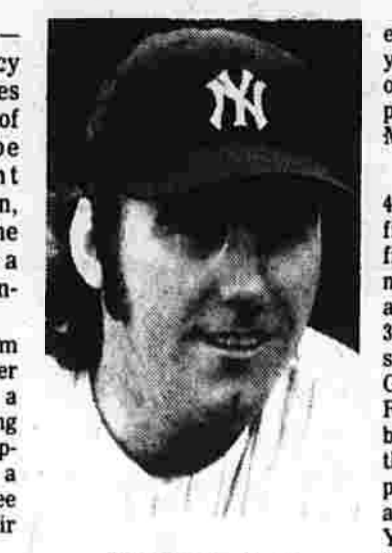

Roaming Dog Complaints Increasing

Town Manager Terry V. Sprekel has been directed to investigate increasing complaints regarding roaming dogs.

Also, the possibility of hiring additional canine control officials, or another official, is being looked into by the Town Council.

At present, the town has two part-time officials - Edward Deskus and Jan Blowers.

Town Councilman Robert Hornish has told the council he has received many calls from residents in the Farnham Road area.

Meanwhile Councilman Howard "Happy" Pitts called the roaming dogs a serious problem.

He pointed to the strict dog ordinances that exist in other communities and suggested South Windsor do whatever necessary to resolve its problem.

Social Security

Q. I understand that everyone on Social Security was supposed to get a special \$50 payment. I didn't get mine yet?

A. The special \$50 payment for Social Security, railroad, and Supplemental Security Income beneficiaries was part of the Tax Reduction Act of 1975, which has become law. However, the necessary funds was not appropriated by Congress until recently. Release of the special \$50 payment was delayed until Congress approved and the President signed the appropriation bill.

Q. My husband and I have both worked for many years, and nearing retirement age. My sister works for a lawyer and she told me I won't be able to get Social Security checks on my own record because I'm living with my husband. Is she right?

A. No, your sister is wrong. A wife who has worked under Social Security has the same right to monthly benefits as any other worker. However, a wife can't get full benefits on her own work record and on her husband's at the same time. If a wife is eligible for benefits on more than one record, she will always get the larger of the two benefits.

Q. I'm planning to retire in February 1976. I heard that it takes about 6 to 9 months for Social Security to get my latest wages on their records. How can I be sure my most recent wages are used in figuring my "monthly payments"?

A. When you apply for retirement payments, take a copy of your 1975 (Form W-2) to the Social Security office. On the basis of the form W-2, all of your creditable earnings for 1975 will be recorded to your record.

Q. When my husband retired he was earning \$1500 a month. Some of his friends, who made less, are collecting as much as he is. How come? I thought Social Security benefits are figured on earnings.

A. You're right. Social Security benefits are computed on average earnings over a period of years. But this average is based on earnings actually covered by Social Security contributions. For instance, the most earnings anyone could have credited last year was \$13,200. The maximum amount on which Social Security contributions were based. This year's maximum was as low as \$3,000 before 1951, and it was increased over the years as earning levels increased throughout the United States. So no matter how high your husband's pre-retirement income was, his average earnings for Social Security purposes is based on the amount actually covered by Social Security contributions.

Q. I am a sales clerk in a department store and I have no plans to retire yet. My yearly earnings are about \$5,500 a year. Now that I am 62, can I get benefits from Social Security?

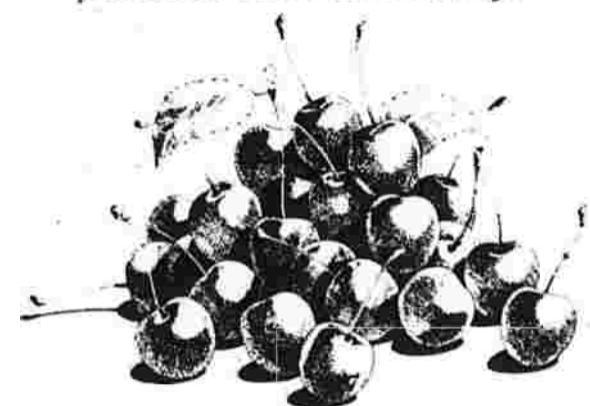
A. You might be eligible for some retirement checks from Social Security. It will depend on the amount of your monthly Social Security benefits. Contact your Social Security office; they will get an estimate of your benefits for you at age 62.

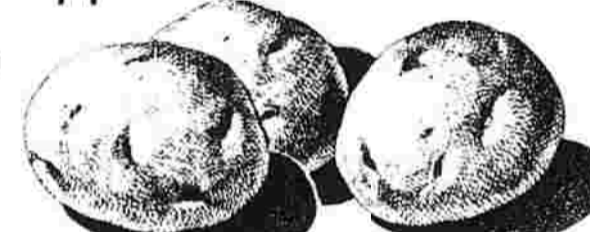

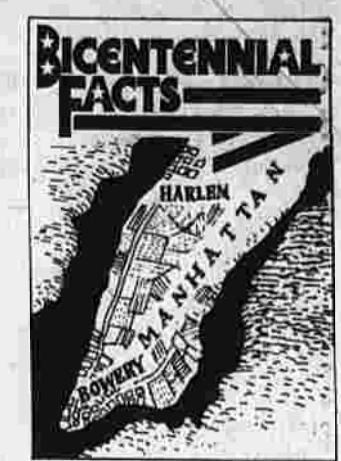

Nickel Coffee Marks 50th Anniversary

By ROD CLARKE, BURLINGTON, Vt. (UPI) - Coffee is selling for a nickel a cup this week at Henry's Diner and the waitresses are wearing party hats and polka-dot aprons.

As news stories go, it may not sound very important. But for Henry's Diner, it is a milestone: 50 years in business at the same Bank Street location.

To celebrate, prices have been cut in half and a big, steaming cup of coffee goes for the old price.

Henry Couture, who founded the business in June 1925, isn't around to trade banter with the customers any more. Now almost 91, he lives not far away at St. Joseph's Nursing Home.

But there is a twinkle in his eye when he talks about problems he had trying to open the place. How, for instance, it took him three appearances before the Burlington Board of Aldermen to get a license.

"The churches and society were against me," Couture recalls. "Diners, it seems, were demoralizing places" called "greasy spoons and hangouts for rowdies."

Back on Jan. 1, 1925, he traveled to Baytown, N.J., to order his \$9,000 diner, complete with its familiar railroad car-type rounded roof. It was later delivered by rail.

Couture was kind of a pioneer. "I had the idea that it should cater to women, and women weren't patronizing diners in those days."

That wasn't the only innovation.

Once a year, he gave gifts to his customers: Kewpie dolls for the men and sailor dolls for the women, or small leather billfolds for everyone.

And, Couture invented "an entirely different frankfurter sandwich," with his beef and toasted only on the outside.

The gimmicks paid off. He was soon feeding 400 customers a day for lunch, and had to put on a staff of 14.

"After I got going, jazz, the churches were sorry for objecting the way they did," he says.

Even Burlington "Society" people would flock in after their late-night parties.

In 1944, he sold out to Frank Goldstein, who still operates the business. Ten years later, Goldstein expanded the diner, and after a fire in 1969, was forced to rebuild.

Henry Couture is half blind now, but still makes his own greeting cards, and talks eagerly about the old days, when egg sandwiches were a dime and hamburgers 15 cents.

The golden anniversary of Henry's Diner probably will go largely unnoticed outside of Burlington, Vt. Even here, hundreds of shoppers will rush past without noticing that the clock has been turned back.

But it's kind of nice to find something that hasn't changed, even if only for a little while.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Two former Social Security officials are proposing that Social Security taxes be sharply increased within 18 months to keep the system on a sound financial footing.

But Robert M. Ball, commissioner of Social Security from 1962 to 1973, and Robert Myers, chief actuary for the system for many years, disagree over what type of increase is called for.

Ball wants one which would increase the maximum tax paid by about 50 per cent, but which would be paid only by middle and high income wage earners, those earning over \$16,500 in 1977.

Arms Buildup Concerns Israel

By United Press International. Israeli Defense Minister Shimon Peres said today Arab nations are countering a trend toward peace in the Middle East with a weapons buildup and President Ford warned of a "drift" toward war in the region.

Peres, according to a copyrighted article in today's Minneapolis Tribune, said Wednesday any new fighting in Middle East would be more dangerous than past conflicts and would include a paralyzing oil embargo.

According to the Tribune, the President's emphasis on the "drift" in the Middle East is somewhat of a surprise after his discussions with Egyptian President Anwar Sadat June 1-2 in Salzburg, Austria, and his discussions last week in Washington with Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin.

The newspaper said Ford's statement may indicate he is fearful there is a stalemate in the peace-making process and he wishes to head it off by emphasizing the gravity of further delay.

He was asked by the Tribune if he had reassessed his view of a few months ago that war is too near a reality to be comfortable.

"It sure was, and is," Ford said. "It is a potentially very volatile situation that could erupt into a real tough conflict any time, and the longer we drift with no prospect of action, the more potential the lightning becomes," he told the newspaper.

"The military effort in the Arab world reached a scope of investment in arms and armies unknown in this region and from time to time larger than the NATO organization in numbers of soldiers, in quantities, quality and varieties of arms."

But, he said, "The readiness of the Arabs to show themselves in favor of compromise is very limited, almost nonexistent."

"But this is contradicted by another Ha'aretz said Israeli officials were optimistic about the chances for an accord with Egypt because of progress made by Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin during his talks last week with President Ford and Secretary of State Henry Kissinger.

Israel Foreign Minister Yigal Alon, meanwhile, cautioned the United States against using "pressure cooker" tactics to push an American peace plan in the Middle East.

Alon expressed hopes Wednesday of narrowing negotiating differences between Israel and Egypt if peace talks take place without "any pressure or any threats from any source."

He said Israel is ready to resume negotiations with Egypt on an interim peace pact "provided that America should offer her good offices and will not try to put forward her ideas.

HARTFORD (UPI) — Attorney General Carl R. Ajello today confirmed fears of a controversial community development act would allow municipalities to override local and state laws for the sake of commercial development.

Ajello, who was asked by Mrs. Grasso to advise her on the measure, said "all the arguments against the bill could be eliminated by several relatively simple amendments."

In an informal action Monday night and without a vote, the Eighth District Board of Directors indicated "it will consider" a petition from Buckland area property owners for district fire service.

The board's informal action was on the condition legal barriers don't exist or, if they do, can be removed.

The Buckland area is under the jurisdiction of the Manchester Town Fire Department and its property owners pay taxes to it. However, fire service is provided by the Manchester, Eighth District Fire Department under a contract with the area now paying taxes to the Manchester Town Fire Department.

The town plans to construct a new firehouse at Tolland Pike, and N. Main St. and to have it in operation by the end of this year. The district has been notified its contract with the town will end when the firehouse opens.

A group of Buckland area property owners contend the firehouse isn't needed and that they can save money by becoming part of the district. Fire taxes in 1975-76 will be 6.5 mills in town and 2 mills in the district.

The group and several of the district directors contend Special Act 200, passed in 1973, is unconstitutional. They say the district to extend its fire service boundaries. Several others of the district directors contend the town's charter is unconstitutional.

Moses took cognizance of Special Act 200 when he ruled, "Notwithstanding its provisions, the district cannot extend its boundaries without first obtaining the approval and consent of the town."

He ruled further, "Our charter is clear that, in case of any conflict of authority between the town and district, the authority of the town shall prevail."

Down the hall and around the corner in the west wing, in the press briefing room, press secretary Ron Nesson announced the President was naming Army Secretary Howard Callaway as his campaign manager.
