Social Security Tax Increases Proposed

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Two former Social Security officials are proposing that Social Security taxes be sharply increased within 18 months to keep the system on a sound financial footing.

But Robert M. Ball commissioner of

Social Security from 1962 to 1973, and Robert Myers, chief actuary for the system for many years, disagree over what type of increase is called for. Ball wants one which would increase the maximum tax by about 50 per cent, but MHS Graduation which would be paid only by middle and high income wage earners, those earning over \$16,500 in 1977. Myers wants a proportionately smaller

increase, but one which would affect every wage earner, including the poor. In testimony Wednesday to the House Ways and Means subcommittee on Social Security, the two experts decried the "alarmist" stories about Social Security's current and potential future deficits.

But both said a new source of revenue would be necessary to overcome deficits. Higher taxes are unavoidable, they said. Ball proposed that the amount of wages subject to the tax of 5.85 per cent be increased to \$24,000 in 1977, then to rise as the cost of living rises. For persons earning \$24,000, this would amount to an increase of \$579.15 on the maximum tax paid this year of \$824.85-an increase of more than 50 per cent.

Next year, with the wage base scheduled to rise from this year's \$14,100 to \$16,500. the maximum tax will be \$965.25. The tax is paid by both the employe and Myers, testifying on behalf of his current

employer, the American Life Insurance Association, proposed that the tax rate of 5.85 per cent be raised by one-half of 1 per cent in 1976 and by the same amount in the 1980s. If done next year, the maximum tax payable in 1976 would go to \$1,047.75.

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

Dr. Rosenfeld Was Director Of Mental Health Division

ELLINGTON-Dr. Joseph Eugene Rosenfeld, 68, of 151 Maple St., medical director of the Alcohol and Drug Dependence Division of the Connecticut Department of Mental Health for the past 11 years, died Wednesday at Hartford

A psychiatrist, he had a private practice at 660 Prospect Ave., Hartford, for over 20

"Dr. Rosenfeld's death is a severe blow to the state mental health services," Commissioner Ernest A. Shepherd said. "His professional leadership has been of

a high and durable quality. Over the years, I have appreciated his foresight, and the humane and humorous way in which he has made an impact on services in the field of alcohol and drug dependence. His sudden passing is a great loss to those of us who valued his psychiatric knowledge, which he used with consumate skill and great personal warmth. Ever committed to the care of troubled people, he extended his concern to the entire mental health community, where his unusual qualities were broadly recognized," the com-

missioner said. Dr. Rosenfeld was a lecturer at the University of Connecticut School of Social Work, psychiatric consultant to the University of Hartford, and a guest lecturer and consultant for the Institute of Living Living, Rutgers School of Alcohol Studies and the New England School of

He authored numerous professional articles and was a consultant and reviewer for professional publications including the Quarterly Journal of Alcohol Studies and the American Journal of Psychiatry.

Born in Poland, Dr. Rosenfeld had lived in Ellington for about 20 years. He received an A.B. degree in 1930 from West Virginia s University at Morgantown and his M.D. degree in 1938 from the University of Vienna, Austria. He took his internship and residence at Wassaic State School of the New York Department of Mental Hygiene from 1997 to 1943. He served as senior psychiatrist at the school from 1946 to 1948 and as supervising psychiatrist from 1949 to 1954.

Before coming to Connecticut, he also served as a major in the Army Medical Corps, associate editor of the Medical Journal (ARS MEDICI), supervising psychiatrist at Harlem Valley State Hospital, Wingdale, N.Y., and as pyschiatrist at the Child Guidance Clinics at Pawling and

From 1956 to 1964, he was clinical chief at the Meriden Child Guidance Clinic and senior psychiatrist at the Hartford Regional Outpatient Clinic of the Connecticut Commission on Alcoholism.

He was a former faculty member of the Psychiatric Education Project, Connecticut Psychiatric Society and Connecticut Academy of General Practice and a psychiatric consultant for Hartford Family

A past president of the District Branch of the American Psychiatric Association, he was a member of the American Medical Association and the Hockanum Valley Community Services Council. Survivors are his wife, Mrs. Sylvia Reichlin Rosenfeld; three daughters, Miss

Barry said that, on balance, the recent session of the General Assembly was a productive session.




