House Okays \$5 Billion For Energy Research

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House, defeating attempts to delay the "fast breeder" nuclear reactor program, has approved \$5 billion for energy research and development for the next 15 months.

The House voted 317-0 today to provide \$5.8 billion for the Energy Research and Development Administration, including about \$800 million for nuclear weapons development.

The bill sets oil import quotas, provides tax incentives to conserve fuel and penalizes makers of gas-guzzling cars. Ford's proposals include removing price controls from domestically produced oil to provide incentive for more production.

No Protection Ordered For CIA Probe Witness

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Despite the murder of Chicago underworld figure Sam Giancana after the Senate Intelligence Committee tried to contact him about alleged CIA plots against Cuban Premier Fidel Castro, federal protection has not been ordered for another reputed underworld figure scheduled to testify next Tuesday.

The House refused 227-136 to halt construction funds for the Clinch River project in Tennessee, a demonstration plant for fast breeder nuclear reactors to produce electricity. The fuel of these reactors can be reprocessed and reused.

Senate Still Haggling Over Contested Seat

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Senate Democratic leaders, irritated by the extended haggling over the vacant New Hampshire Senate seat, ordered a special session today and vowed to begin early and work late every day next week.

BUENOS AIRES (UPI) — Guerrilla leaders say they received a record \$60 million for the lives of two kidnapped brothers who had one of the richest private companies in the world.

The leftist Montoneros called a clandestine news conference Friday to announce the ransom payment. They then freed Jorge Born, a director of the powerful Bunge & Born.

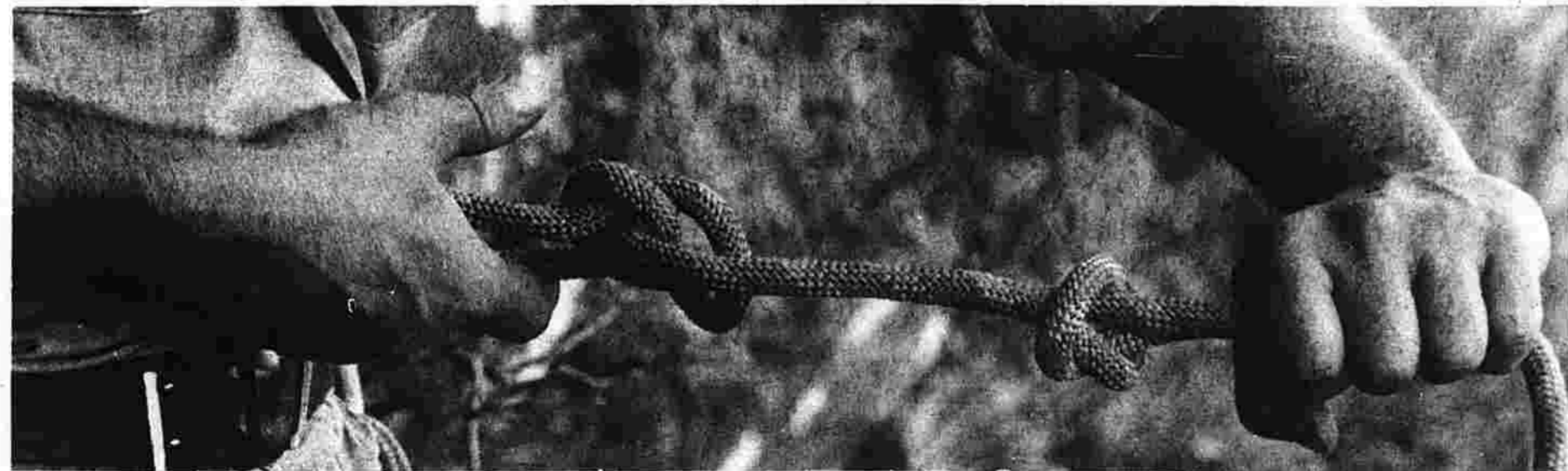
It isn't easy

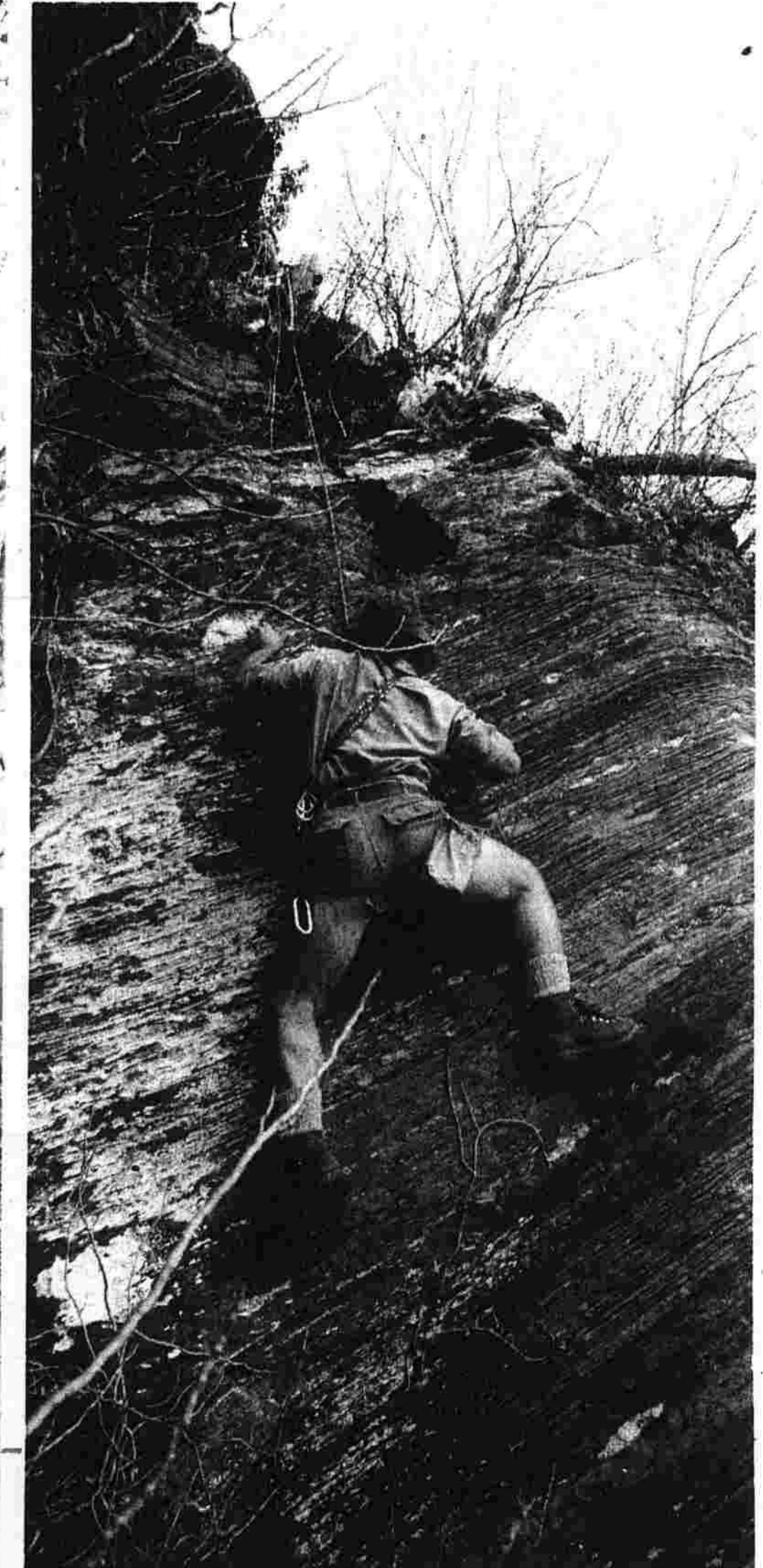
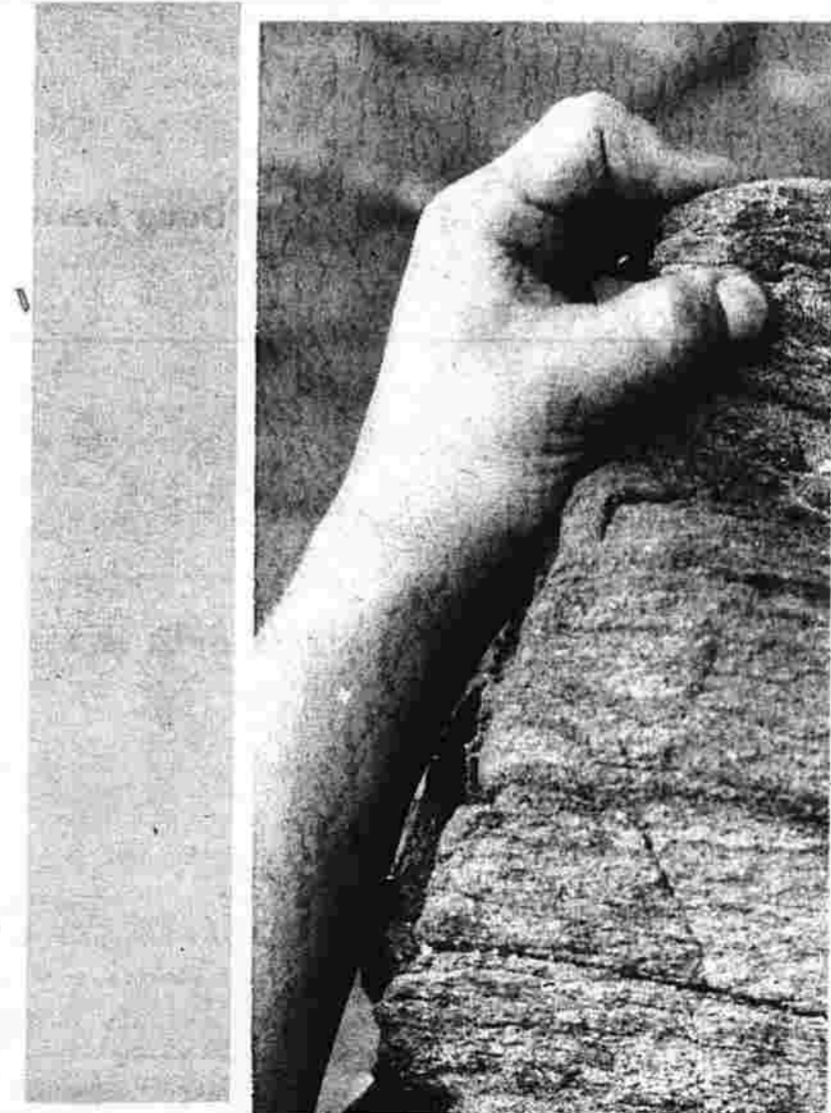

Manchester had other fountains

Editor's Note: Two weeks ago, Weekend featured a story about Manchester's historic fountains. At that time, we only knew about two fountains: The dancing bears fountain in Center Park and a Revolutionary soldiers memorial fountain once at the Center. But there were at least two others, as many readers have pointed out.

Back in the days when the Cheney family provided free water to Manchester residents there was a fountain, designed for use by both animals and people, on N. Main St. and an eight-sided horse trough at the Terminus in South Manchester.

At least 70 years ago Lucy Spencer, who was fond of horses, erected a fountain on N. Main St. across from Depot Square in memory of her husband Dwight Spencer. The Spencer home at 317 N. Main St. now houses the Community Child Guidance Clinic.

The eight-sided horse trough apparently was erected by the Cheney family at the Terminus, which was the end of the trolley line at Main St. and Hartford Rd. during that era.

In the late 1930s, the fountain was removed when N. Main St. was widened and the railroad crossing paved. The horse trough disappeared at about the same time.

Today, the base of the fountain and the horse trough may be found at the rear of the Manchester Memorial Co. shop at Bissell and Harrison Sts.

The top of the fountain was ruined during the moving process but the horse trough is in good condition, says Arrigo Aimetti, owner of Manchester Memorial Co.

Aimetti says he was hired by the town to move the fountain and trough, which meant employing plumbers, hiring a crane, and putting in new sidewalks and curbing at the sites.

He charged the town \$400 for removing the fountain and \$600 for the trough removal. He is still waiting to be paid.

Trolley pageant planned

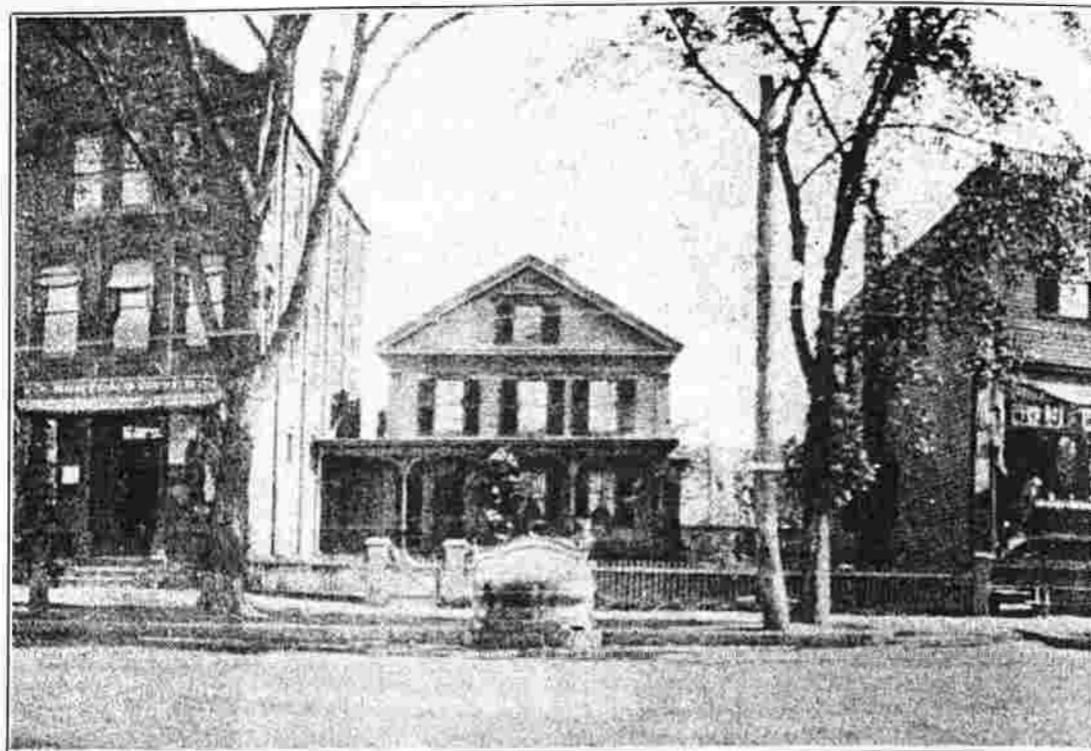
An 82-year-old trolley car originally used in Providence, R.I., will lead the Branford Trolley Museum's Pageant of Trolley Cars next Saturday.

Proceeds from the admission fees go for restoration of No. 61 and other cars operated by the volunteer-run, non-profit museum.

The Branford Trolley Museum is a short distance from Exit 51 or 52 on the Connecticut Turnpike.

NEW YORK (UPI)—At the ripe old age of 24, singer-songwriter Janis Ian is making a show business comeback.

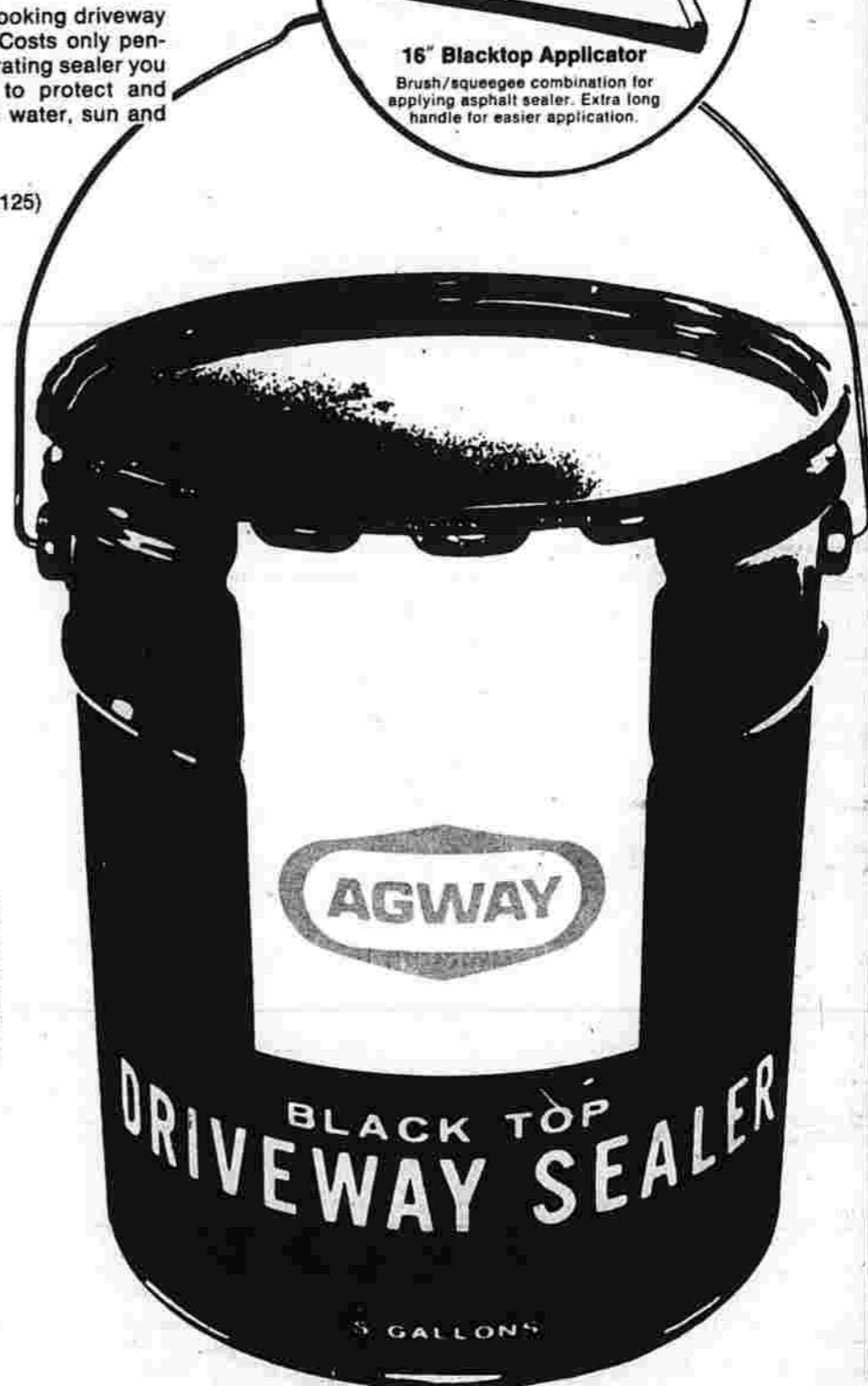
