**STAMPS AND COINS**

This innocent-looking coin is the "racketeer nickel." Note that no valuation appears anywhere, only the "5" which could stand for a lot of things. What happened was that evil-doers would give it a reeded edge and a slot of gold plate and pass it off as a five-dollar gold piece. This was especially the case south of the border down Mexico way where they were less familiar with the genuine U.S. half eagle.

About 5 1/2 million nickels were run off in 1883 before the die was changed to put in the word "cents" below the wreath in place of the motto. On the new version (with the same date) the E. Pluribus Unum was squeezed in above the open part of the wreath - from whence it would wear off in no time at all. (Only coins graded as "fine" will show it clearly.)

The designer who had to hot-foot it back to the old drawing board to make these changes was the same Charles E. Barber who later got up the artwork for the dimes, quarters, and halves that were minted from 1892 until the teens of this century.

The silver dollars of the time were another story. They were the work of "Special Engraver" George T. Morgan who had come from the Royal Mint at London in 1875 to make designs in competition with Barber's father, William, then chief engraver at the United States Mint.

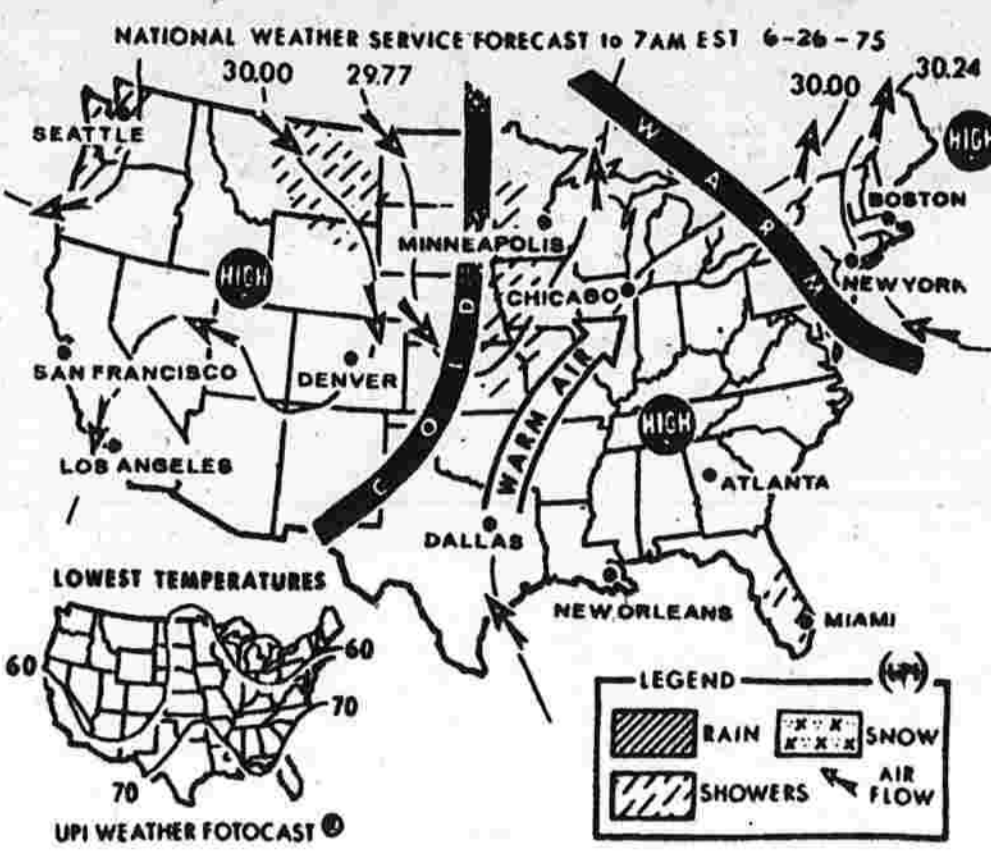

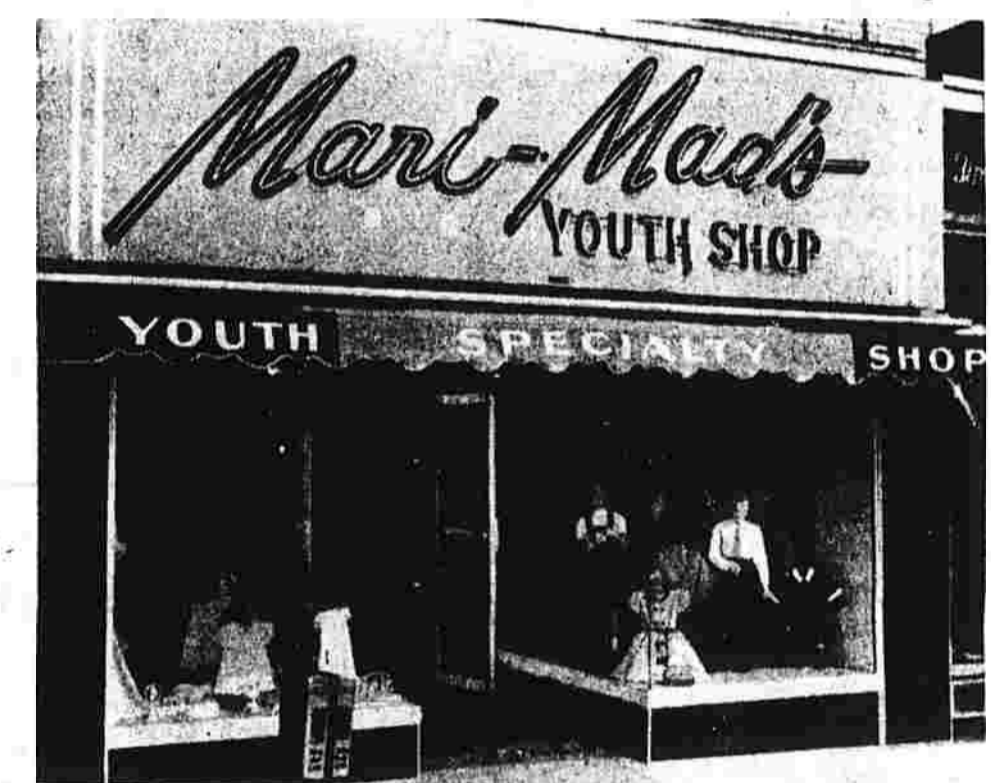

## Time To Quit Whistling In the Dark

Frankly we have lost count of the number of stories from various sources pointing out that our oil and gas reserves are either substantially less than believed, are being depleted faster than anticipated, or both.

And frankly, we could care less. We accept as part of the games politicians and others play this use of so-called statistical data to support some form of legislative action or to evoke some sort of public response.

The bottom line fact is that we all know and have known for some time that oil, coal, and gas are not unlimited in supply. We have known that once they are consumed we must have a substitute and once a substitute is consumed, we must have a substitute for it.

The issue then is not that our energy resources are being depleted — they are. The issue is what we propose to do about it and perhaps of greater importance, when are we going to do it?

Conservation is a must but not a solution. At best it can only buy us time to come up with alternative energy supplies.

Yet, Congress and the administration seem to stress the conservation aspect more than the alternatives. The House has approved and sent to the Senate a bill to provide \$5 billion for research but through a new federal agency which will take time to set up and may or may not produce results. However, it is a start.

Assuming it does come up with some viable alternative to petroleum sources of energy, Congress must find a way to attract capital to bring these new sources into the market place.

We are pessimistic for as much as we hate the idea of higher gasoline prices, we are convinced that unless the price is maintained at a relatively high level through taxation, tariffs or higher crude oil prices, alternative sources of energy cannot compete and our dependence upon a diminishing energy supply will not be broken.

We must not let the impending disappearance of existing and yet-to-be developed oil reserves or potential reserves panic us. We should seek out and exploit petroleum but within the confines of environmental considerations.

If we keep in mind that petroleum resources are limited, we should realize that our use of this resource should be done in a manner which leaves the least permanent damage.

Two things must be recognized before we really can push ahead in our efforts to obtain a less vulnerable energy situation.

First, we must accept that cheap energy is a thing of the past and no matter how politically popular cheap energy might be, any effort by government to artificially depress the price hastens the end which is eventual depletion of petroleum resources.

Second, there are no miracles around the corner to save us. There may or may not be a few years supply of oil off the Atlantic Coast or in the shale deposits of the West. There may be a way to convert coal into a synthetic petroleum. And there may be substantial improvements in energy use efficiency. But the fact is that at some point in time, the wells will dry and refineries idle because we will have exhausted all recoverable petroleum.

We must conserve what we have, not to make it last forever but to enable us to survive until we have the social, economic and environmentally acceptable alternatives.

We do not lack any more stories on reserves or need of reserves. We need action now toward the end that when the well goes dry we will have in place some alternate forms of energy.

Our national energy policy should not be cheap oil, rationing, allocation, tariffs, tax breaks, more agencies, but simply a recognition that King Oil is tottering toward oblivion and it is later than we think when it comes to deciding what the alternative can and should be.

It is time to quit whistling in the dark.

## A New Political Climate

NEW YORK — If there were ever any doubt that the two major presidential candidates in 1976 — Republican and Democratic — are in fact candidates, and ready to go, the doubts are being dispelled. You can discard the "ifs" and "maybes" and say as flatly as the rules of history and the vanity of human wishes allow, that if nominated Gerald Ford and Edward Kennedy will run and if elected they will serve.

As long as President Ford's fortunes in office were minimal, his 1975 candidacy was little better than academic. But they have been rising fortunes. Mr. Ford is on the way to establishing himself as a President. If he hasn't become a Harry Truman, he is no longer a Herbert Hoover. The Mayaguez incident evoked a wave of popular sentiment which — transient as it may prove — enabled him to nose out Sen. Kennedy in the Harris Poll. His European trip helped. The active, mediating American diplomacy in the Middle East has revived, and the Russians have faded with their Geneva Conference option.

President Ford's gamble on taking a personal role in the Middle East diplomacy, in his talks with President Anwar Sadat and Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin, involved some obvious danger to him, but it is filling out his presidential presence in foreign policy.

Add several minor eddies of opinion which may help him. The new political climate is post-Watergate in a different sense from the past year. Sen. Lowell Weicker's (R-Conn.) proposal for a runoff in the hairbreadth New Hampshire election was rejected by the Senate Democrats, for the obvious reason that the Democratic miracle performance in New Hampshire in 1974 would be unlucky in 1975. Moreover, in his struggle with a Democratic Congress, the Ford vetoes have been holding.

I have few doubts that President Ford and Vice President Rockefeller will be the 1976 Republican nominees. Curiously, Ronald Reagan's chances of running in 1976 depend more on a Democrat — George Wallace — than upon Reagan's fellow Republicans. If the primaries give Wallace his revenge for the humiliations that his more liberal Democratic rivals have heaped on him, and if he makes no conventional headway for the vice presidency (which is what he aims at), I don't rule out Wallace joining with Reagan in an independent splinter-fusion party in the 1976 election. It could cut into both major parties but if it threw the election into the House of Representatives, the Democrats would win. That's mainly why I doubt whether Reagan and Wallace would try it.

Nearly every time we travel it, we discover cars racing when the light changes to green in front of us and move forward. In short, they don't turn as the printed lines indicate.

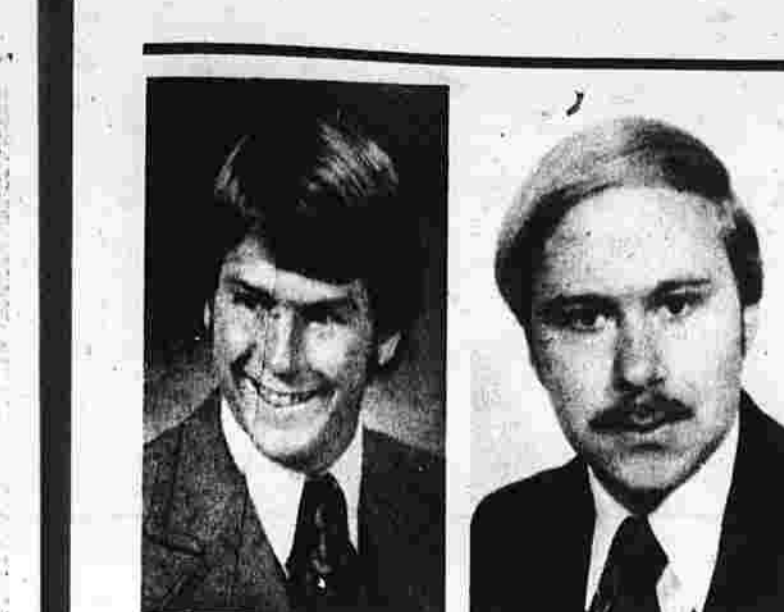

## Federal Court Power Limited By Ruling

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Supreme Court Tuesday further watered down the power of federal courts to consider complaints that state criminal activities are invading constitutional rights such as freedom of expression.

The court also held in a Richmond, Va., case that a city's annexation of white suburbs is not in itself a violation of the 1965 Voting Rights Act in the absence of a showing it was done for racial reasons.

Less the circumstances are highly unusual. Last term the court held that federal courts could go ahead if no state criminal proceedings were pending. Today's case narrowed the ruling.

The court also held in a Richmond, Va., case that a city's annexation of white suburbs is not in itself a violation of the 1965 Voting Rights Act in the absence of a showing it was done for racial reasons.

**Tolland Sends Out Tax Bills**

Collector of Revenue Earl H. Beebe has sent out 10,200 tax bills totaling more than \$3 million due the town.

Taxes still unpaid for this year must be paid by June 27 or liens will be filed, adding interest to date of payment and statutory fees for filing and release of lien.

Taxes were determined on a mill rate of 55.9 per cent and are payable during the month of July. All taxes \$100 or under are due in full in one payment in July. Beginning July 1, all delinquent taxes will have an interest charge of 1 per cent per month or 12 per cent per year.

Beebe notes that this year Tolland has gone to a computerized tax bill with three parts mailed to taxpayers. He asks persons to read directions and send the proper slips with payment.

New property owners who have not received a tax bill should contact the tax collector at 872-3773 to check on amounts due. Not receiving a bill does not disallow an interest charge if the tax bill is not paid on time.

**Investigator Says PSE Test Absolves Teddy**

NEW YORK (UPI) — Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., told "the absolute truth" about the 1969 Chappaquiddick auto accident in which Mary Jo Kopechne was killed, the National Enquirer reported in its current edition.

The newspaper reported that Charles R. McQuiston, "a former top U.S. intelligence expert," used a Psychological Stress Evaluator, or "truth detector," to scan statements Kennedy made in a nationally televised statement July 25, 1969, a week after the accident. "I'm thoroughly convinced Kennedy told the truth about Chappaquiddick. There's no doubt about it," McQuiston told the Enquirer. Miss Kopechne was killed when Kennedy's car, in which she was riding, went off a bridge on Martha's Vineyard, Mass., into a tidal pond. McQuiston said the PSE would show unusual levels of psychological stress if Kennedy told an untruth.

## State Auditing Powers Broadened

HARTFORD (UPI) — At a time when the public doesn't want to hear pleas for more taxes, the way Connecticut's state agencies spend money is going to come under closer scrutiny.

Under a new law, state auditors Henry Becker and Leo Donohue not only will be making sure books of state agencies balance, but also that they are doing the job they are supposed to.

The expanded review is called performance auditing, and Donohue and Becker want to approach the job cautiously because of the great deal of subjectivity required in evaluating agency performance and the limited size of their staff.

"This bill gives a whole new dimension to our audits by permitting us to determine the scope of the audit," Donohue said. "Up until now we have not had direct authority to comment on the efficiency or effectiveness of an agency's operation."

Under the existing audit program, staff auditors check agencies to make sure that their spending complies with the law and that there are no irregularities.

But for the most part they are limited in looking beyond those criteria and don't get into the question of determining whether an agency is well run or the public is getting its money's worth.

Their audits, conducted for the legislature, routinely run up accounting and bookkeeping problems and occasionally shed light on misuse of public funds.

With the new measure, however, they will have a free hand to go beyond checking balance sheets and delve into the subtler questions of program effectiveness.

For example, Becker said, his office might take a look into the way the state purchases automobiles and what factors are taken into account in accepting bids.

With the high price of gasoline, the lowest price on an auto might actually cost the state more if it gets poor mileage compared to a comparable but somewhat more expensive competitor, he said.

Another possibility might be whether reflectorized license plates provide a margin of safety that justifies their added costs, Becker said.

Starting Oct. 1, the auditors can, with their new powers, at their discretion follow up on agencies that are poorly run or leads on irregularities that bear further investigation.

"Now we can comment on any inefficiency or lack of organization."

General Assembly should be aware of," Donohue said. "We don't have any intention of slacking off on our fiscal and compliance auditing. We consider that to be paramount."

"This is a broadening of our basic audit," Donohue said. "We are going to be very careful with these audits to make sure that our comments don't weaken the credibility of the office has built up over the last 200 years."

The auditors' office dates back to colonial times when the British crown kept track of colonial expenditures.

The auditors' office will set up guidelines based on federal procedures, he said, but the staff will take on the new task on a gradual basis. In many cases, field auditors will be able to add to their regular reports their observations going to drive into it. We'll be lucky to have three or four items in the next year."

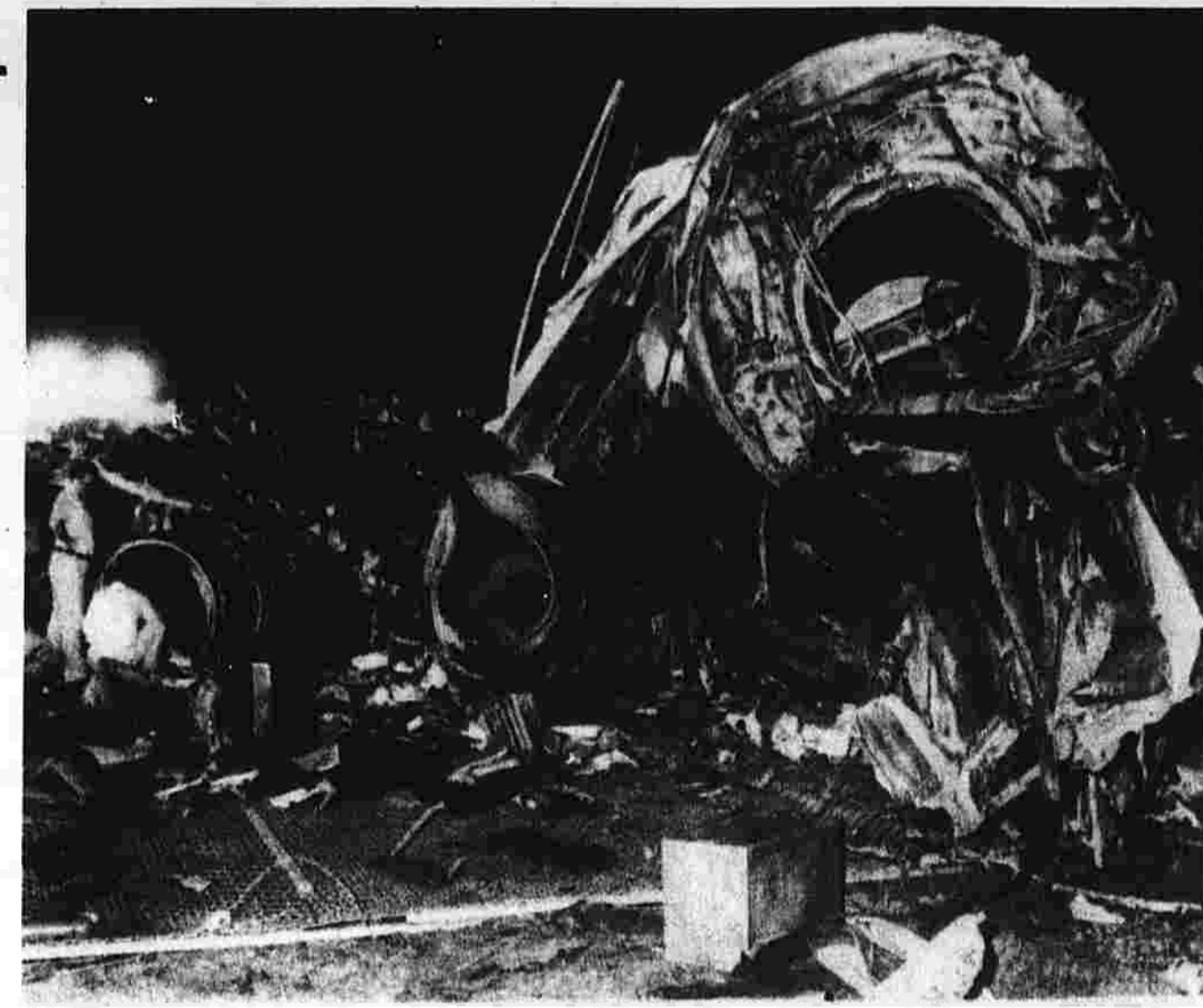

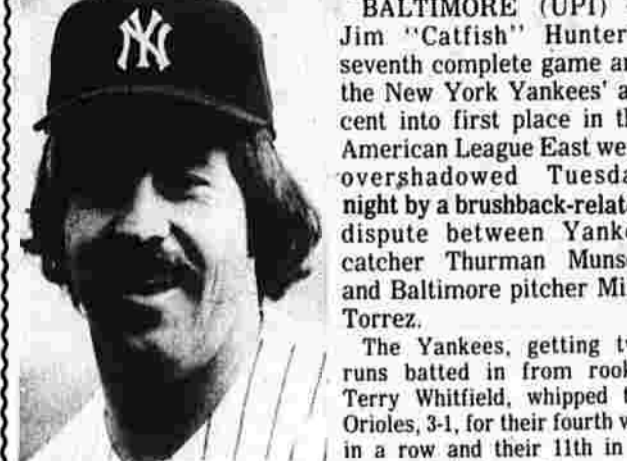

His post-fight statements after beating George Foreman were even more tired than he was, but after he had won, Ali, with that fertile always-working mind of his, publicly announced that henceforth he was going to be "a rope fighter," whatever that is... The vast majority of the Chinese have never heard of Ali and wouldn't know him if they met him on the street. What's more, boxing is looked down upon in China as something needlessly brutal. ## 'To All Practical Purposes'

Shed a tear for poor Jack Bennett, undersecretary of the Treasury and the official responsible for financing the government's debts.

He told reporters in Washington last week he's resigning his \$40,000 a year job. Why would anyone quit a \$40,000 a year job, you ask? A very good question and Bennett had the answer for it.

"I'm broke," he told the reporters. Elaborating a little, he said he wasn't earning enough to make ends meet.

He left the Exxon Corp. to work for the Treasury Department at what he said was a substantial pay cut. Now, he plans to return to private industry, but hasn't lined up a new job yet.

"I've been doing an unconscionable amount of borrowing and my personal finances are depleted," he said. Bennett is putting four children through college.

Well! All you people who are laid off, or who took a pay cut, or who are drawing unemployment, or Social Security, or welfare — what would you do if someone offered you a \$40,000 a year job?

But then, if you're reading this column you don't live in Washington, do you? No! You live right here in Connecticut, where unemployment officially is at about 10.5 per cent. And that's not counting recent high school graduates, or recent college graduates, or the men and women whose unemployment benefits have run out and who are off the statistics' list.

If you lived in Washington, you, too, would be the latest from the "President's" top economic advisors — that the recession, "to all practical purposes," is over and that unemployment "is about to drop.

But what about all the hedging and all

the double talk by these same top Presidential economic advisors?

"The most dangerous potential force to upset this recovery would be letting our financial forces get out of control," goes the double talk.

I told it to my friend. You know what he said?

"My financial forces have been out of control for several years," he what he said. "Does that mean I qualify as a top Presidential economic advisor?"

What is there about those advisors, with their prestigious credentials, that they can look you straight in the eye and say, "For all practical purposes, the recession is over."

You read it and you hear it, and then you buy some groceries, or gasoline, or pay your electric bill, or your oil bill, or you look at the increases in your taxes, or see how much you have to pay for a new car, or a new house, and you wonder out loud, "Are they speaking the same language I am?"

There has to be that there are two versions of the English language spoken in this country — the one spoken in Washington and the one spoken by the rest of the country.

That's the only way to explain anyone giving up a \$40,000 a year job because he's broke and he's got to find something better.

And that's also the only way to explain anyone telling us the recession, "to all practical purposes," is over and unemployment is about to drop.

The key to it all has to be the phrase, "to all practical purposes."

My friend, who's a very practical-type person, asked, "Does that mean I have to give up my food stamps?"



### Outstanding Rating Given to Guard Unit

The Manchester National Guard Hdqrs. Co. has been given an "outstanding" rating for its performance at annual field training in North Carolina this summer.

The company, with the rest of the 1st Bn., 169th Inf., took part in "Operation Solid Shield," an airborne, land and sea training exercise with the 82nd Airborne Division of the regular Army two weeks ago.

"It is unusual for any reserve unit to be picked to participate in Solid Shield," Capt. John Howe, Hdqrs. Co. commander, said. "The operation took place on the North Carolina shore and involved Army, Navy, Marine and Air Force units...and us!" he said.

The operation was designed to test the military units on the most advanced level of training, Capt. Howe explained. The Connecticut 169th is chosen because of its record of high performance levels.

"We really moved...we kept pace with the paratroopers and that takes some doing," Platoon Sgt. Dennis Strimick of the Medical Platoon said. "Manchester left its mark on North Carolina. We covered more ground than any other unit in the exercise."

"This unit is one of the best," boasted Sgt. Mark Starin who commands the Communications Platoon.

"We got to be the best by picking good people, 1st Sgt. Joseph Coombs explained. Coombs is the unit's administrative chief and recruiting specialist. The unit is continually recruiting new personnel, both prior-service veterans and persons with no former military experience.

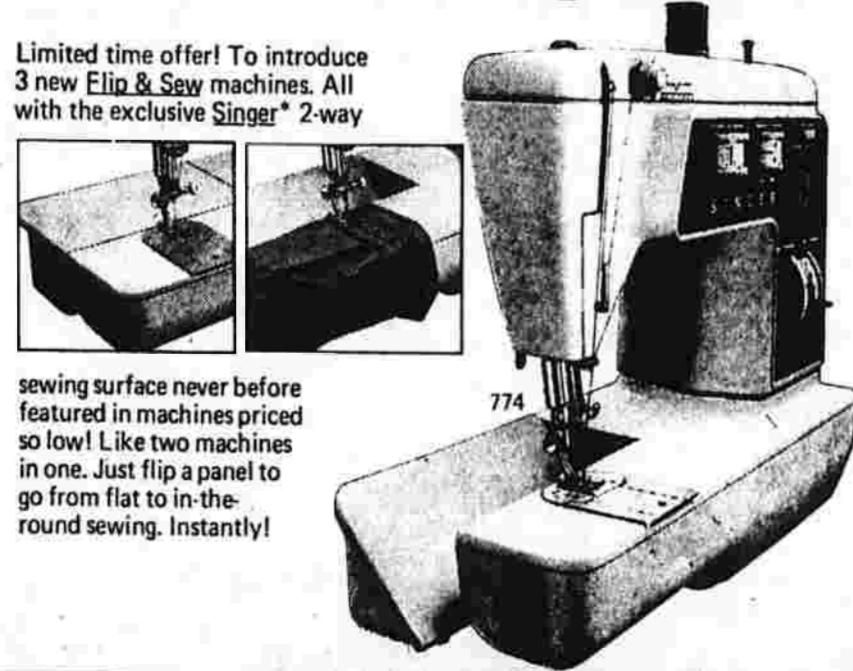

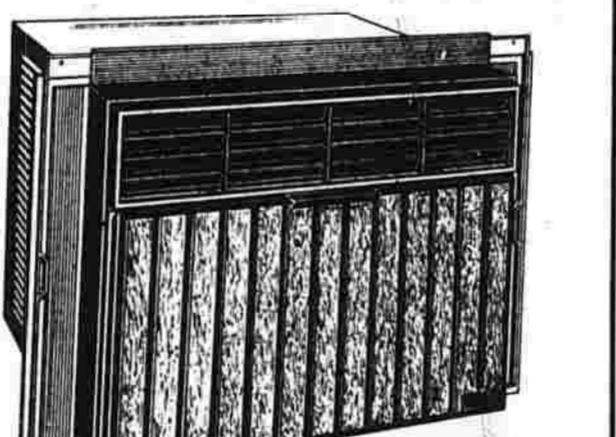

# South Windsor To Institute Short Days for First Grade

The South Windsor Board of Education has formally adopted a pilot program which allows first graders to attend school for a shorter period of time the first four weeks of school — thus permitting them a period of adjustment.

The program was initiated by Orchard Hill School Principal Larry Mickel as a means of eliminating overtiredness and loss of attention span in first graders.

Officials found that these children — ages 5 and 6 — found it difficult to plunge into a full day of school after half-day kindergarten sessions the previous year.

The shortened day gradually allows the first graders to get used to the full school day.

Mickel has termed the pilot program a "trial and error" success. "He conducted a study and survey which received a 95 per cent response.

"Considering that most surveys of this type get a 60 per cent response... I feel that we have obtained an excellent sampling of opinion and that our conclusions can therefore be considered to be extremely valid," said Mickel.

According to Mickel, the results show by a large majority that it was beneficial to the children's school life as well as to their home life, in certain instances, to limit attendance to a shorter period of time at the beginning of school.

The Board of Education will institute the "shortened day program" for first graders in all five elementary schools next year for about the first 23 days of school, according to officials.

It was added, however, that if any "extreme objections" are received in any one school then the school board may consider deleting the program from that school.

According to responses from parents with children involved in the pilot, 97 per cent found the program "generally successful" to "very successful" with 89 per cent recommending continuance of the program in other schools.

Teachers said that the overall results were advantageous.

"For the first time I never had instances of children complaining they were tired or wanting to go home. There were no tears. It seemed their physical stamina was not being taxed and they enjoyed everything else," said one teacher.

According to Mickel, if the program is continued, the school department will need to re-examine the arrangement of the kindergarten services in which the kindergarten teachers are involved after the children leave school.

Teachers probably work with second and third graders since these are the children who have most recently come from their classrooms and with whom they are most familiar.

## Tolland, Bolton Join in Study

The state Department of Education approved a joint project proposal for teacher evaluation for Bolton and Tolland.

The project will run from June 1975 until May 1976 and will be administered by Raymond Allen, superintendent of Bolton schools and Dr. Kenneth MacKenzie, superintendent of Tolland schools.

The Elementary Secondary Education Act (E.S.E.A.) funding will total \$3,000. Broken down it shows \$1,500 for consultant time — 12 days at \$125 per day — \$1,000 for teachers and principals, \$100 for secretarial, \$300 for supplies and materials and \$100 for travel.

An additional \$3,000 cost will be paid by the towns. Of that \$2,000 is for teachers and principals and \$1,000 for project administrators.

The project objectives are to construct and pilot test a teacher evaluation instrument and to develop a set of effective procedural guidelines for teacher evaluation.

Teacher evaluation programs became mandated by state law in 1974.

Accomplishing the objectives is essential to both evaluation programs.

The funds will permit the two towns to pay consultants and

teachers for work during the summer and the school year.

The instrument and guidelines will be developed and then field tested by selected administrators and teachers. Changes in both the instrument and guidelines will be made according to experience during field testing.

Teacher population figures for the two towns are: (Bolton shown first) classroom teachers, 54, 148; guidance counselors, 2, 7; librarians, 2, 2; psychologists, one-fifth, 1; speech therapists, one-fifth, 2; learning disability, 1½, 5; administrators, 4, 9.
