

## Apollo-Soyuz Dock in Orbit; Opens New Era of Space Unity

HOUSTON (UPI) — Three Americans and two Russians docked in earth orbit today for 44 hours of flight together opening an age of international unity in space.

The historic linkup between the Apollo flown by Thomas Stafford, Vance Brand and Donald "Deke" Slayton and the Soviet Soyuz with Alexei Leonov and Valeri Kubasov aboard came two days after the two ships took off from bases half a world apart.

Leonov and Kubasov were in an orbit ranging from 137 to 139 miles high when the Apollo caught up after starting out 2,200 miles behind the Russian spaceship. The modified U.S. moonship followed a classic 29-orbit rendezvous pattern developed for lunar flights.

The five spacemen established radio contact three hours before the rendezvous, happily exchanging greetings in each other's language. Soyuz first appeared to the astronauts as a bright star.

"Hello, Valeri, how are things," Slayton asked in Russian.

"Good morning," replied Kubasov in English.

"Hello everybody," Leonov said, also speaking English.

As Apollo closed in on Soyuz, aircraft radio transmissions in French, English and Russian over Europe interfered with the radio equipment the astronauts used to measure the distance between the two spacecrafts. At one point, television showed Stafford shaking his clenched fist in a gesture of angry frustration.

Rendezvous operations continued, however, and at 10:30 a.m., Stafford told Leonov the two ships were 48 miles apart. The Americans, awakened 1 1/2 hours early by the loud buzzing of an apparent false trouble alarm, fired a brief burst from their main engine at 8:52 a.m. EDT to start the final phase of maneuvers leading to the first meeting of men from two nations in space.

Ten minutes later, Brand reported jubilantly he had sighted Soyuz for the first time through the Apollo telescopic sextant. Soyuz then was about 250 miles away.

"Right now it's hard to distinguish from a star," he said.

Leonov and Kubasov waited in an orbit ranging from 137 to 139 miles high.

The astronauts were flying in a lower, faster orbit than the Russian Soyuz and were overtaking cosmonaut Alexei

Leonov and Valeri Kubasov at the rate of 1.8 miles a minute.

Everything was reported normal aboard the Soyuz. The symbolic handshake between commanders Leonov and Stafford was scheduled for 3:15 p.m. EDT, about three hours after the docking.

Leonov and Kubasov beamed a telecast to Moscow shortly after 6 a.m. EDT and Kubasov pointed to a table where the five spacemen will share meals during the next two days.

Stafford, Brand and Slayton were 360

miles behind at the time, gaining on the Soviets at the rate of 1.8 miles a minute because their orbit was lower and therefore faster.

Brand reported the trouble alarm in the ship's guidance system sounded at 3:40 a.m.

"I'll tell you that alarm sure wakes up a crew," he said.

Stafford, a veteran of three previous spaceflights, agreed: "There's nothing to wake a crew up like an ISS (inertial subsystem) fail light on the day of rendezvous."

## GNP Report Encouraging; Inflation Rate Declines

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The output of the nation's economy declined at an annual rate of only 0.3 per cent during the second quarter of 1975, the Commerce Department said today in one of the most encouraging signs yet that the country is coming out of the recession.

The department also said the rate of inflation was at its lowest level in 2 1/2 years.

The second quarter figures on output, as measured by the Gross National Product, showed vast improvement between April and June when compared with the January-March quarter.

The 0.3 per cent slip in the GNP was the smallest quarterly decline since the recession began in early 1974.

The modest decline also comes on the heels of a huge 11.4 per cent drop in the first quarter, the worst three-month performance by the U.S. economy in three decades.

At the same time, prices rose at a 5.1 per cent annual rate in the April-June quarter, an impressive improvement over

inflation rates of 8.4 per cent and 14.4 per cent in the previous two quarters, the department said.

The department said the latest GNP stood at \$143.4 billion (\$1.4 trillion).

The GNP measures the value of virtually all goods and services produced during a given period and is the broadest measure of the economy's health.

The latest figures indicate the economy's growth rate, when adjusted for effects of inflation, was close to "zero growth" in the second quarter and that the expansionary phase of the business cycle may already have begun.

Economists will rule that the recession has ended when positive growth in "real," or non-inflated, GNP occurs. The recession began in November 1973.

Not since the first quarter of 1971 has there been such a marked improvement in the GNP figures. It is not unusual, however, for the economy to soar by leaps and bounds in the first stages of a recovery and then taper off in the following quarters.

## Anyone Want To Rent Some Fish?

A Manchester couple, already boasting an unusual his-and-her occupation, has launched an even more unusual venture — "Rent-A-Fish." It's exactly as it sounds. They rent out fish.

Wayne and Peggy Fowler are welders — he for a Hartford company, she for a Hartford Rd. Manchester company. Wayne, 31, is from East Hampton and Peggy, 22, from Andover. They've lived on Oak St. since their marriage, in October 1973.

Although they've been in the part-time fish-rental business for only three months, Wayne has been raising pet fish and experimenting with aquarium equipment since he was 11.

From all indications, theirs is the only fish-rental business in Connecticut and, possibly, only the second in the United States. Magazines read by pet-fish entrepreneurs tell of one in Los Angeles.

Wayne says, until recently the Fowler's small bungalow had wall-to-wall fish, with only a sofa and TV set to keep them company. Now, except for a few tankfuls still in the living room, he keeps them in the cellar.

He says he has about 25 tanks in assorted sizes, containing about 500 fish, in assorted sizes, shapes and colors. The tanks hold about 300 gallons of fresh and salt water.

Wayne and Peggy have four types of fish — the ordinary school fish; the larger fish, such as Jack Dempseys and African Knives; a huge variety of gold fish; and the exotics, such as Elephant Nose, Angel Fish and African Cichlids.

Wayne refuses to have any piranhas around, not even for show. He says, "It's illegal to sell them and dangerous to keep them. I want no part of them."

He says, since the movie "Jaws" came out, people have become very aware of sharks and are inquiring about them.

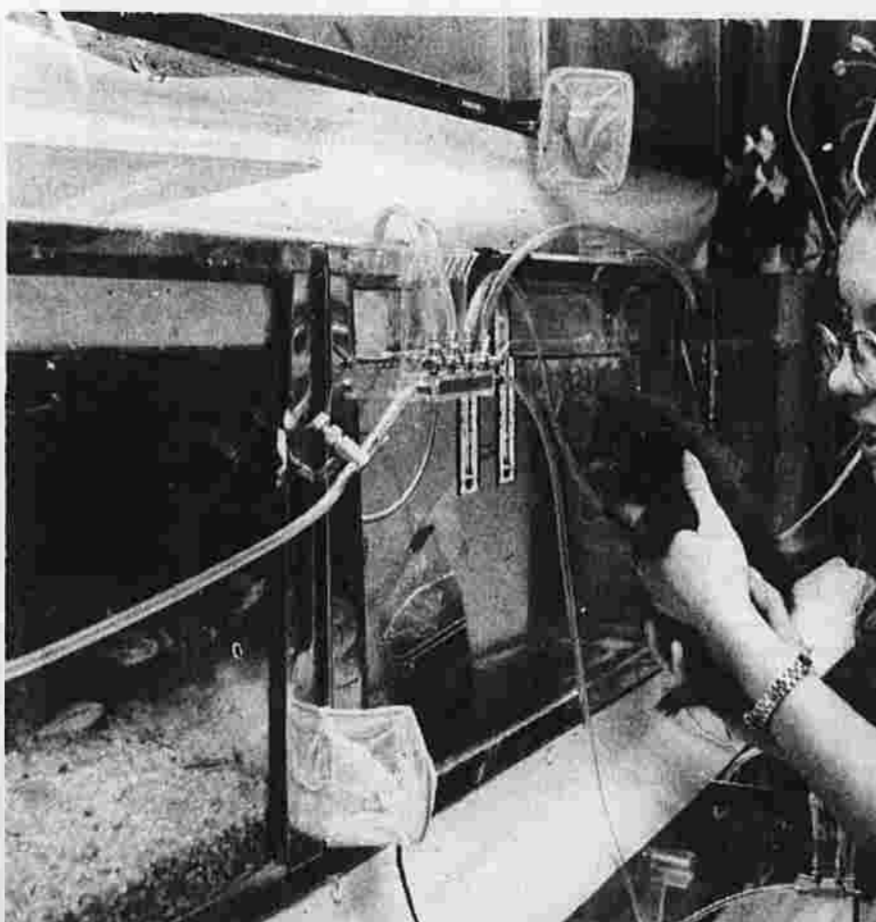
"Believe it or not," he says, "there are exotic marine aquariums in New York, California and Hawaii where even sharks can be bought. They require custom-built aquariums of about 1,000 gallons and have to include safeguards and restrictions. As for me, I stay away from all dangerous species and that's my advice to everyone."

Wayne and Peggy rent out their aquariums by the month, with the fee in-

cluding maintenance as needed. Their average aquarium holds about 30 gallons of water (fresh or sea) and they have them to 125 gallons.

Although they've just got started in their "Rent-A-Fish" venture, they've already placed aquariums in several barber shops and professional offices. Their first is in a newly renovated restaurant on Union Pl., Hartford.

Can they expect to make a living at it? "I don't know," says Wayne, "but we'd like a good try at it. Some day we may go into it full-time. Who knows?"

## Service Sales Tax Changes Not Practical Until 1976

HARTFORD (UPI) — Gov. Ella T. Grasso said today she recognizes there may be inequities in the 7 per cent tax on certain business services, but changes won't be practical until the 1976 legislative session.

Mrs. Grasso said she has received numerous letters and complaints about the imposition of the 7 per cent sales tax to business services and will look toward correcting any inequities.

"I feel there would be great difficulty at this time to initiate a new tax program," she told newsmen.

Republican leaders have called for repealing the levy at next week's special legislative session and reducing state spending to keep the budget in balance.

On another matter, Mrs. Grasso announced the appointment of David I. Silverstone, Connecticut's consumer counsel on the Public Utilities Control Authority.

Silverstone, who was named as the first consumer counsel on the PUC by former Gov. Thomas J. Meskill, said he will do his best to protect the public against spiraling electric and gas rate hikes.

## New Englanders May Watch Apollo-Soyuz Tonight, Friday

BOSTON (UPI) — Weather permitting, New Englanders will get a good chance today and Friday to view of the linked Soviet and American spacecraft.

The Apollo-Soyuz craft will be visible for brief periods from 65 per cent of the earth's land areas — including every American state except Hawaii and Alaska.

The best viewing will be in the northern part of the East Coast, according to the Marshall Spaceflight Center in Alabama.

The vehicles will be orbiting about 140 miles above the earth and will reflect the rays of the sun. They will be visible from the ground just before dawn and just after sunset.

In New England the craft will be seen for almost four minutes today, starting at about 9:14 p.m. And on Friday, it will be seen beginning around 8:34 p.m.

Officials at the Smithsonian Astrophysical Laboratory said viewers should scan the skies for about 15 to 20 minutes before and after these times. The times are for the midpoint of passage, therefore the satellite usually can be seen a few minutes before and after those times, they said.

"If the stars are visible, you should also be able to see the satellite," they said.

In Boston, the linked capsules today were to pass from northwest to southeast at an angle of 42 degrees above the horizon. On Friday, it will be seen moving from northeast to southeast, 49 degrees above the horizon.

In Augusta, Maine, the spacecraft will be seen today moving from northwest to southeast — almost directly overhead. On Friday it will be seen moving in the same direction, 75 degrees above the horizon.

And, in Providence, R.I., skywatchers today can see the spacecraft moving northwest to southeast, 34 degrees above the horizon. And on Friday at an angle of 40 degrees above the horizon, moving from northwest to southeast.

## Common Market Pushing New Monetary System

BRUSSELS, Belgium (UPI) — Leaders of the European Common Market nations are trying to get U.S. support for a new world monetary system aimed at combating persistent recession.

But the United States, an advocate of the current "free float" exchange rates, is expected to resist Western European pressure for more monetary controls.

Many economic authorities have blamed the free float, which allows currency values to fluctuate on the basis of market prices, for creating inflation and business uncertainty.

The nine Common Market leaders agreed Wednesday at the opening of a two-day summit meeting that only international action — with American and Japanese cooperation — can end the recession.

"We must convince the United States to go along with us," West German Chancellor Helmut Schmidt said.

Schmidt and French President Valery Giscard d'Estaing said a more controlled international monetary policy could be a major step in stabilizing the world economic situation.

But a high official in one Common Market country said the leaders do not want to return to the rigid fixed exchange rates that existed before the free float system began in 1971.

The official said the leaders will try for a solution somewhere in between — "a very dirty float" in which governments intervene regularly to keep currencies from fluctuating too much.

## Butz Says Wheat Sale Won't Raise Prices

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A U.S. grain company has contracted to sell two million metric tons of wheat to Russia. But Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz says it won't have the drastic effect on U.S. consumer prices as did a larger sale in 1972.

Agriculture Department officials said Wednesday a company, later identified as Cook Industries, Inc., of Memphis, Tenn., had contracted to sell the hard winter wheat to the Soviets for delivery through August 1976.

The price was not known. But at prices prevailing Wednesday the deal would be worth \$28 million.

American farmers are having record grain crops and Soviet production this year is down.

The sale was smaller than speculation had indicated. Deputy Assistant Agriculture Secretary Richard Bell said administration experts think Soviet purchases in the 1975-1976 season will total 5 to 10 million tons of corn and wheat combined.

Butz said sales in that range would be "well within our capability" and would have only minimal effect on food prices for American consumers.

Even if sales reach the upper 10 million ton limit predicted by Bell, they would still be far below the 19 million ton 1972 Soviet purchase of American grains that caught the government, farmers and consumers by surprise, raised U.S. food prices and helped disrupt the economy.

Butz has insisted no such impact is likely this time. He said that in light of his

year's bumper harvest prospects American farmers "need the sale."

Administration officials said this grain deal was not unexpected. But Sen. Henry Jackson, D-Wash., insisted in Pittsburgh Wednesday the administration "once again has been taken by surprise" as it was by what he called the "great grain robbery" in 1972.

Butz said that in contrast with the 1972 deal, when the U.S. government gave the Russians a \$500 million line of credit for what turned out to be a \$1 billion-plus deal, the new sale is "straight cash." There are no government credits and none of the export subsidies used in 1972 to help keep the sale price down, he said.

Butz said the main motive for Russian grain imports has been to provide expanded livestock feed to fuel steady increases in meat, poultry and milk supplies. This year is probably no exception, Butz indicated in an interview.

The sale came after published reports that present and former executives of several grain companies are under investigation in a government probe of alleged irregularities in grain inspection and handling of export sales.

The New York Times said Cook was among the firms involved in the investigation.

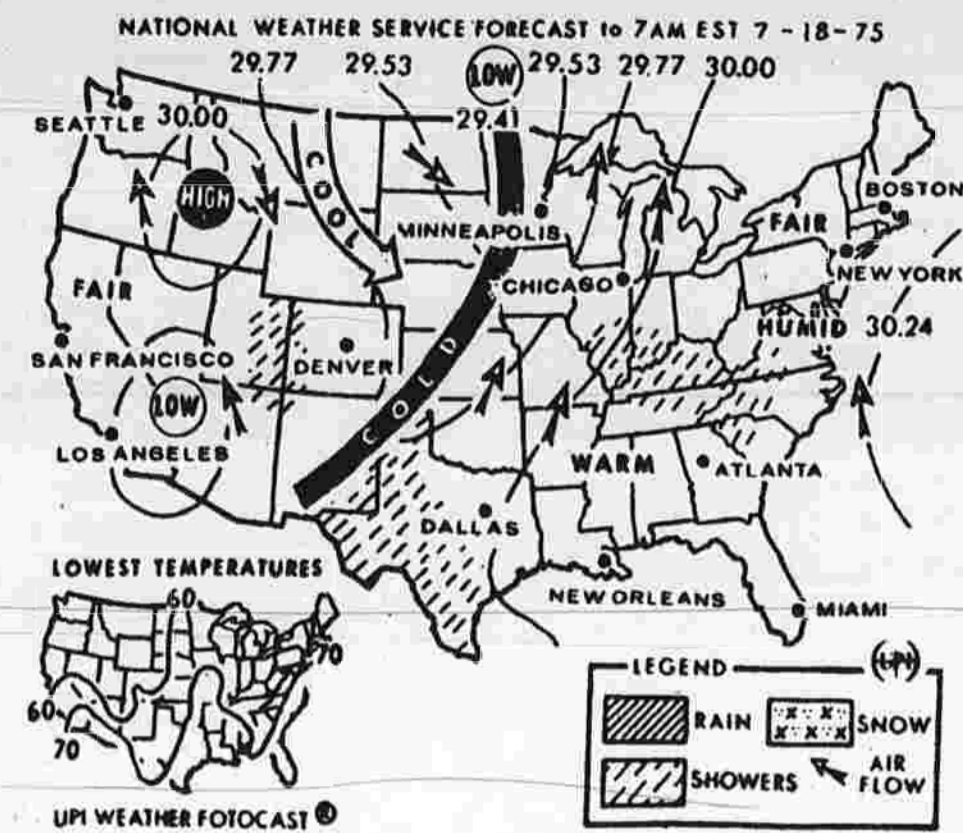

## Benoit Seeks Nomination for Mayor

Encouraged by "some Republicans, independents and many fellow Democrats," Thomas Benoit announced at a press conference this morning that he will actively seek nomination to run for mayor on the Democratic ticket in Vernon this fall.

Long an outspoken member of the minority on the Town Council for issues he said he felt were important to the townpeople, Benoit said he will conduct an active door-to-door campaign to discuss crucial issues and problems of the town and to give the citizens a chance to discuss these issues.

Present during the press conference were Benoit's wife, Lynne, his daughter, Marcia, and son, Thomas Jr.

In a letter to all members of the Democratic Town Committee, requesting support for the nomination, Benoit said, "As you know, over the past several years I have served our town in various capacities both as an elected official and as a private citizen."

He added, "My deep concern about Vernon and its people, the need for constructive and responsible leadership, and my desire to provide direction and enhance the quality of government in Vernon has prompted my decision to seek this office."

If Benoit wins the nomination, it is likely that incumbent Mayor Frank McCoy, who has served for three consecutive terms, will be his opponent in the race.

Benoit said that before making his decision he discussed the matter in detail with his family, weighing the time commitment involved in campaigning and serving if elected.

He said he has lived, worked, and served in Vernon for many years and feels he knows the townpeople and is sensitive to the financial strain they have had to face but he admitted that "no candidate for public office has all of the answers."

If elected, Benoit said he would like to see another Charter Revision Commission appointed, noting there are many things in the consolidation charter he feels have not been followed and he would like them to be looked at.

He said he does not, at this time, know how many others are seeking the nomination for mayor on the Democratic ticket. He said he is not taking anything for granted now and if nominated he will not take one vote for granted, either.

Benoit has served two terms on the Town Council, was coordinator for Thomas Dooley during his successful campaign for state representative, two terms and filled the same post during State Representative Martin Burke's successful campaign.

He was also a member of the first Charter Revision Commission, is a member of the Democratic Town Committee, and was named Democrat of the Year in 1974.

He has served on the board of directors of the Rockville Area Chamber of Commerce for three terms; is now serving as president of the Exchange Club of Rockville; is chairman of the scholarship committee of the Thaddeus Kosciuszko Benefit Club; and is a member of the Rockville Elks, the Knights of Columbus, Italian Friendship Club, the Polish American Club

### FROM YOUR NEIGHBOR'S KITCHEN

By VIVIAN FERGUSON

"Parsley, sage, rosemary and thyme..." My son quoted the old rhyme when I selected herbs for planting in the spring.

Not the least of these is parsley which was known and used by the early Greeks and Romans. They not only ate parsley, they wore it on the head in garlands much as they did the laurel leaves. It signified victory and revelry. Champions at the Greek games at Isthmus were crowned with the green plant.

On festive occasions, these same people believed that eating parsley would keep them from becoming intoxicated. They also knew that it sweetened the breath. We know today that parsley contains the green chlorophyll and that it is high in vitamin C and A.

Basically, there are two kinds of parsley though there are a number of varieties. The flat, broader-leaved plant is called Italian parsley. Then there is the bunchy, or curly variety. If you take some of each in your hand and sniff separately, you will find that the Italian variety has more scent. So, too, is it more flavorful.

Most of us immediately think of parsley as a garnish and what you ever do without its beautiful greenery especially in winter? I find it very easy to grow. In fact, I take a plant or two out of the garden in the fall, put it in some potting soil. Kept in a window, it will last all winter. My thanks to Arline Norman for that bit of advice a few years ago.

Besides using parsley as a garnish or chopping it for various recipes, what do you do with it? There is, of course, parsley butter; it can be added to your favorite dumpling recipe. There is fried parsley and hot parsley sauce.

My family made the Italian green sauce known in the northern part of Italy as *ragout*. There are many versions of this delicious cold sauce. It is served with raw vegetables, meats either hot or cold, on sandwiches, or with plain fish.

You take fresh parsley...there is no way to make this with the dried. I like to remove the large stems and put the rest through the fine blade of a grinder. An electric one is perfect as you need a fairly good amount of parsley. Take a can of flat anchovy fillets, a good large clove of garlic, some hot peppers to taste. Season with oil, vinegar and pepper. Taste for salt. Delicious!

In adding the oil and vinegar, you want enough to hold the mixture loosely together. It's not to be swimming in dressing. Everyone makes this sauce just a little differently. One will like more garlic, another more oil, another more or less hot pepper. I like a nice balance and prefer mine more vinegary than oily.

**Bagnet**  
(Italian Green Sauce of the Piedmontese Region)  
34 bunches parsley (preferably the Italian variety or a mixture of the Italian and the curly)  
1 very large garlic bud  
12 cans flat anchovy fillets or anchovy fillet with capers, including oil  
1-2 hot peppers either fresh, pickled, or dried; or 1 to 1 1/2 teaspoon crushed red pepper  
olive oil and vinegar to taste, enough to hold mixture together loosely but not floating  
check for salt and add if needed  
Grind everything in food chopper with medium to fine blade. If you have juice from the parsley, discard it. This will

not happen with an electric grinder and you will retain flavor as well as vitamins. To the above recipe, Mrs. Fred Lea Sr. adds 1/2 medium green pepper and one medium-sized tomato. She uses about 1/4 cup olive oil to 1/2 cup vinegar.

Now, witness another version or two which come straight from Italy:

**Green Sauce**  
a good handful of chopped parsley  
1 very finely chopped onion  
2 finely chopped cloves garlic  
1 tablespoon capers  
3-4 tablespoons olive oil  
1 1/2 tablespoons lemon juice  
pepper and salt

Found together parsley, onion, garlic and capers to mix well. Gradually add olive oil and mix the time. Then add lemon juice and pepper and salt to taste. Sauce should be really thick. Good served with hot or cold fish or meat.

**Salsa Verde**  
(Piedmontese Green Sauce)  
2 salted anchovies  
1 hard-boiled egg yolk

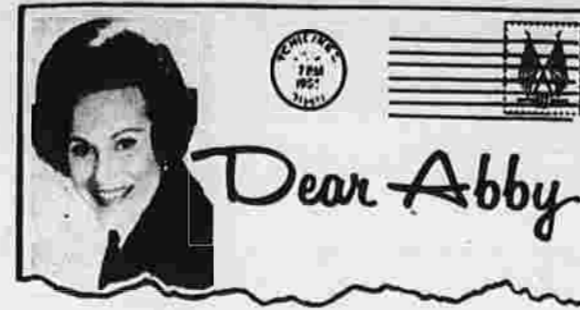

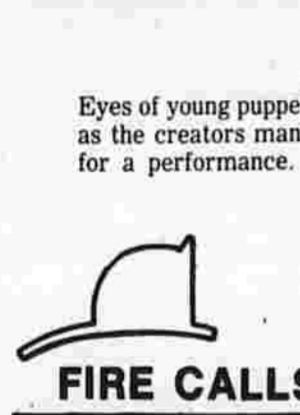

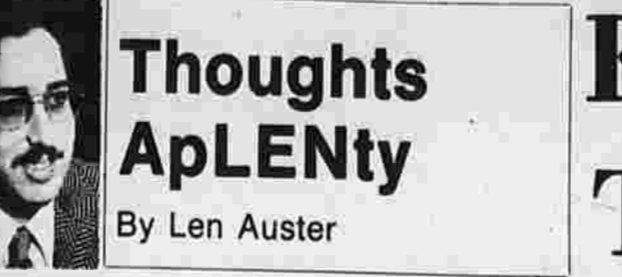

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate, over the objection of some members representing land-locked states, has approved legislation authorizing almost \$1 billion over the next three years to help coastal states get ready to cope with oil and gas development off their shores.

The bill, passed 73-15 Wednesday and sent to the House, would allocate \$100 million a year in federal funds — distributed according to the number of barrels produced offshore and landed — for coastal states. Another \$200 million "impact fund" also would be established.

# Gov. Grasso Names Members Of New Utility Authority

HARTFORD (UPI) — Gov. Ella T. Grasso's five nominees to the Public Utilities Control Authority will be taken up next Monday's special session of the legislature.

The new agency, designed to replace the Public Utilities Commission, which Mrs. Grasso described as antiquated, will start regulating electric, gas, water and intrastate transportation companies Dec. 1.

Mrs. Grasso Wednesday nominated economist Thomas K. Standish of Hartford, Yale University management specialist Richard O. Jones of Woodbridge and consumer advocate Michael B. Butterworth of West Hartford.

The governor also retained two members of the existing commission, Gerald McManis of Storrs, an expert in state and municipal finances, and Albert E. Kleban of Easton, an attorney.

The governor made abolition of the PUC and its replacement with another agency a key element in her election campaign.

3:17 p.m. — First crew transfer: Stafford and Clayton move from docking module to Soyuz, joining Leonov and Kubsov for initial greetings. Flags and letters are exchanged (TV).

4:14 p.m. — Joint flight certificate is signed in Soyuz, followed by joint meal in Soyuz special (TV).

5 p.m. — Five-minute telecast from docking module followed by nine-minute telecast at 5:14 p.m.

5:31 p.m. — Stafford leaves Soyuz, preceded by Clayton.

7:20 p.m. — Astronauts begin eight-hour sleep period. Communications begin 7 1/2 hour sleep period.

Friday, July 18

2:50 a.m. — Cosmonauts awaken.

3:20 a.m. — Astronauts awaken.

3:29 a.m. — Second crew transfer begins: Stafford moves to docking module followed by Brand. Brand then enters Soyuz. Leonov and Clayton move to docking module and enters the Apollo for first time at 6:56 a.m. followed by Stafford. Thus Stafford, Leonov and Clayton will be in Apollo and Brand and Kubsov are in Soyuz (TV).

7:40 a.m. — Joint flight certificate is signed in the Apollo and Leonov and the two Americans join halves of the Soyuz center console.

## One Bid Submitted For Paving Work

Only one bid has been received for furnishing the Town of Manchester with a Midland Mix Paver, for paving E. Middle Tpke. and Keeney St., two bids for furnishing the paver and the mixing grade emulsion it uses, and five bids for furnishing only the emulsion.

The Hoosic Valley Asphalt Co. of Valley Falls, N.Y. is the lone bidder for furnishing the paver. Its price is \$45 an hour (including the operator) plus 4 cents per gallon for the paving material it spreads (an estimated 100,000 gallons). The 4 cents per gallon is for labor and doesn't include the actual cost of the material.

Hoosic Valley is the apparent low also for furnishing the paver and the paving material. Its price is 46.2 cents per

gallon spread and covers rental, labor and cost of material. Dosch-King Co. of Whippany, N.J. bid 46.30 cents per gallon spread.

Chevron Asphalt of Perth Amboy, N.J. is the apparent low bidder for furnishing only the paving material, at 36.5 cents per gallon. Hoosic Valley was apparent high at 39.7 cents.

General Services Director Maurice Pass said a study of the bids must be made, to determine which type of contract would be more beneficial for the town — split or combination.
