Ford to Veto Oil Control Bill

VAIL, COLO. (UPI) - President Ford said today he will veto a six-month extension of controls on domestic oil prices and will remove the \$2 a barrel tariff on imported oil if the veto is upheld.

An extension would continue price uncertainty for consumers and producers alike and tend to increase dependence on foreign oil sources. More important, it would signal to foreign producers our inability to face up to this problem.

"The representatives in Congress should keep this in mind as they vote to sustain my veto," he added. "This is particularly important at a time when producing nations are considering increasing the price American consumers will have to pay."

"To cushion the impact of sudden decontrol, I will lift the special import fees on crude oil and petroleum products," Ford said.

Democrats Adopt New System To Pick Convention Delegates

A brand new system for selecting Connecticut's delegates to the 1976 Democratic National Convention was adopted unanimously Thursday night by the Democratic State Central Committee.

Delegates to the June 1976 Congressional District conventions will be chosen at town primaries or town caucuses - in accordance with presidential preferences expressed by Democratic voters at the primaries or caucuses.

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Attorney Generals Confident Oil Fee Ruling Will Stand

BOSTON (UPI) - The attorney generals of the nine states successful in challenging President Ford's oil import tariff say they're confident of winning an appeal of the case from the White House.

But Massachusetts Attorney General Francis X. Bellotti, speaking for his counterparts who met here Thursday, said they were afraid delaying court action would continue to cost consumers money.

With roughly \$9 million still being collected daily under the \$2 per barrel tariff, Bellotti said the biggest fear is a possibility of Ford requesting a stay of Monday's U.S. Appeals Court ruling pending the Supreme Court review.

Critic Says Democratic Plan Favors Well-Heeled Candidates

HARTFORD (UPI) - A minority report will be sent to the Democratic National Committee recommending a caucus-convention system for Connecticut similar to that used in other non-primary states.

The party leadership Thursday night adopted a plan calling for a presidential primary next May 11 as a way of selecting delegates to the Democratic National Convention. It also provides for six congressional district conventions.

Bangladesh Leaders Killed

NEW DELHI (UPI) - The armed forces seized power in Bangladesh today in a coup that cost the lives of Sheikh Mujibur Rahman, two of his spouses and Prime Minister Mansoor Ali. A rightist minister considered to be pro-American became president.

Radio broadcasts said the armed forces imposed a 24-hour curfew and martial law for an indefinite period, but later broadcasts said it had been lifted, indicating Dacca was calm.

Bangladesh, with a population of 80 million, is probably the world's most crowded and underfed nation - the scene of almost continuous famine. It has accepted more than \$2 billion in foreign aid since independence in 1971, mostly just to keep its citizens alive - more than 30,000 persons starved to death in the last three months of 1974.

Sheikh Mujib had been a hero of the Bangladeshis in their fight for independence but his popularity waned because of the country's perennial crises and widespread government corruption. Last year he abolished the parliamentary system and installed himself as absolute ruler.

Welfare Cut Protesters Invade House

BOSTON (UPI) - Protesters against proposed welfare reductions stormed into the Massachusetts House chambers Thursday afternoon. Some legislators helped them out.

Several persons were injured, Capitol Police Chief Paul Doherty said "every possible step will be taken to prevent a similar occurrence."

Laborers Stop School Work To Protest Lack of Contract

Members of the Construction and General Laborers Union, Local 230 of Hartford, began picketing junior high school construction projects in Manchester today to protest their employer's rejection of a

two-year contract.

Sixty to 70 union members set up picket lines at 8 a.m. at Basset and Illing Junior High Schools. The pickets continued through the morning, and other tradesmen were honoring the lines. All work stopped.

A mid-morning meeting between representatives of the general contractor, Ray Adler Inc. of Ridgefield, and union

business agent Dominic Lopreno was unsuccessful. Officials were trying to schedule another session this afternoon involving officials of the Connecticut Building Trades Council.

Paul Phillips, chairman of Manchester's Town Building Committee, said the work stoppage jeopardizes plans to re-

occupy the junior high schools in September.

Phillips said School Supt. James Kennedy is preparing backup plans for the start of school, because work progress is critical at this point.

Phillips said the union's dispute with Adler involves signing of a two-year contract. Adler refused to sign the contract, Phillips said, because the firm doesn't want to be held to an agreement for that much time.

Track Promoter Criticizes Horse Racing Opponents

HARTFORD (UPI) — The head of a company seeking to begin pari-mutuel racing in Wolcott today accused Gov. Ella T. Grasso and the state Senate president of bad faith in trying to repeal the horse racing law.

Noel Bernstein, president of Old Rock Road Corp., said his stockholders would lose \$3 million invested in the track and the state would lose \$25 million a year in tax revenue, 1,000 new jobs and "a \$200 million annual economic boon."

"Where is the morality in a state government that would, by legislative action and the stroke of the governor's pen, wipe out four years of dedicated work?" Bernstein said.

Bernstein said the proposed \$30 million track would have an "unusually high purse structure" of \$50,000 a day, which

would guarantee "the finest quality horses."

By comparison, he said Narragansett Park in Rhode Island has a daily purse of less than \$30,000 and Rockingham Park in New Hampshire a purse of less than \$40,000, he said.

Bernstein criticized as "senseless" the prediction of Sen. Joseph J. Faullo, D-Hartford, that the track would have horses that can't walk in the morning running in the

afternoon.

The Old Rock Road news conference on the Capitol grounds followed by a day the statement by Connecticut Commission on Special Revenue chairman that once a race track license is granted, the legislature won't be able to revoke it.

Paul Silvergield said if a license is granted for a track before the lawmakers meet next winter, there would be legal problems in trying to lift

Bay State Signs Over National Cemetery Site

OTIS AFB, Mass. (UPI) — A 750-acre site at Otis Air Force base was signed over today by Gov. Michael S. Dukakis to the federal government to become the first National Cemetery in New England.

The site, to be developed in stages with groundbreaking on the first 20 acre segment next summer, is roughly the size of Arlington National Cemetery in Virginia and will eventually comprise some 360,000 gravesites.

Full Representation Amendment Favored

HARTFORD (UPI) — Secretary of the State Gloria Schaffer said today the U.S. Constitution should be changed to guarantee states full representation in Congress while disputed elections are being held and to end the Electoral College.

Mrs. Schaffer said she will propose the two changes as resolutions at the annual conference of the National Association of Secretaries of State next week in Las Vegas.

Her full representation proposal would empower governors to make an appointment to fill a Senate vacancy with the outgoing incumbent is unwilling

or unable to service until a successor has been elected and has qualified.

New Hampshire has been without full representation in the Senate for nearly 10 months because of a disputed election.

Mrs. Schaffer said her proposed constitutional amendment to eliminate the Electoral College would provide for the direct and popular election of the president and vice-president.

She said the present system "is based on the anachronistic premise that the average citizen, because of communication and transportation limitations, would be unfamiliar with the qualifications of persons outside their state who would be candidates for these offices. "This is clearly not the case today," she said.
