Despite the publicity that inevitably surrounds such spectacular oil spills as the well blowout in Santa Barbara Channel in 1969 or the breakup of the tanker Torrey Canyon off the coast of England in 1967, it is not these fortunate accidents that pose the greatest threat to the world's marine ecology.

There are laws against this sort of thing. The trouble is that in the heavily traveled shipping lanes it is almost impossible to connect any particular spill with any particular vessel. Ship owners and ship captains know this, and thus they continue to use the ocean as a convenient sewer.

Drastic Budget Cuts

CHICAGO (UPI) — Drastic cuts in expenditures for college sports were voted by the NCAA special convention called especially to shave expenses, and although NCAA executive director estimated the savings at more than \$15 million per year, most slashes were in prospect.

Over the two-day session, which ran more than two and one-half hours longer than its scheduled timetable, the delegates knocked out such time-tested fringe benefits as the \$12 per month incidental expense payments for athletes and course supplies other than books.

In an even deeper slash, affecting university athletic budgets, they cut grants in aid in football and basketball from 105 to 85 for major schools and from 195 to 160 for the smaller ones for football and from 10 to 15 for basketball. They reduced the maximum value of grants in aid to athletes in minor sports 40 percent for both the large and smaller schools.

Additionally they imposed a limit for the first time of no more than three visits of campus by coaches to prospects, set a limit for the number of paid trips to the campus by individual prospects at six, limited the number of paid visits a school could provide prospects and established for the first time a limit on the size of coaching staffs.

In one positive action to generate revenue, schools were authorized to schedule one additional basketball game next season, setting a limit of 27 games outside of post season tournament competition.

What's avant garde theater?

There's a good deal of misunderstanding about avant garde theater, says Martin Esslin, head of the British Broadcasting Co.'s radio-drama department and author of books on theater.

"People will tell you that Ionesco is avant garde. When you say, 'No, no, Ionesco was avant garde in 1959, they will answer, 'But we were taught in school that Ionesco is avant garde!'"

Esslin says avant garde means the latest thing. And then he uses comparatives. "But how late is the latest? It's like how long is a long piece of string."

Esslin was talking to the Critic Fellows of the National Critics Institute which runs concurrently with the National Playwrights Conference each summer at the Eugene O'Neill Memorial Theater Center in Waterford.

Many people have the misconception that "whatever's happening that's avant garde invalidates everything else. That's absolute nonsense," Esslin says.

"The whole history of cultural development is one of diversity. The fact that Ibsen wrote differently from Shakespeare doesn't mean he wrote better. It doesn't mean Shakespeare shouldn't be done."

Theater critics should make themselves as well-educated as they can in all forms of theater, Esslin says. "The critic's function is to understand what is going on and to explain it to his readers so they can get more pleasure out of the artist's work."

Esslin says in his country, the reporting of baseball games and soccer is superior to drama criticism generally. "If you read baseball

criticism or soccer criticism consistently, you note fine points of technique which increase your enjoyment tremendously next game you see."

Good theater criticism is needed, the British critic says, to raise the general level of awareness of an audience and to help people enjoy and appreciate cultural diversity.

Participatory theater is a wide-open field right now, Esslin says.

The new kinds of theater—environmental poetry or a game type of theater, whatever you want to call them—are important because the audience participates freely, Esslin says. People are moving away from entirely passive entertainment such as television, he says.

"But that doesn't invalidate the play that is written by a great writer, rehearsed by actors and directed by a director. Each is an enrichment. The more you have, the merrier you are," Esslin says.

Esslin says anything which embarrasses the audience or forces them to do things they don't want to do is wrong. The cleverness of participatory theater is to invent ways to make people want to participate.

Participatory theater is a wide-open field right now, Esslin says.

The new kinds of theater—environmental poetry or a game type of theater, whatever you want to call them—are important because the audience participates freely, Esslin says. People are moving away from entirely passive entertainment such as television, he says.

'Raggedy' is coming to screen

NEW YORK (UPI) — "Raggedy Ann," one of the most popular children's book characters in literary history, is coming to the motion picture screen.

The animated feature film is now being made in New York and will be released this fall. It is a \$1.7 million project of Bobbs-Merrill Co., the Indianapolis publishing firm, and its parent corporation, International Telephone and Telegraph.

"Raggedy Ann" was born in Indianapolis shortly before Christmas in 1914 when eight-year-old Marcella Gruelle, daughter of Indianapolis Star cartoonist John Gruelle, brought a faded, faceless doll she had found into her father's office. Gruelle drew a face on the doll, pinged on button eyes, and searched a volume of Hoosier poet James Whitcomb Riley's poems for a suitable name.

The doll was dubbed "Raggedy Ann" from a combination of Riley's Raggy Man and Orphan Annie. Gruelle made up stories about the doll's adventures to entertain his daughter when she fell ill with tuberculosis.

After her death in 1916, the grieving father began to write down the tales which were first published by a Chicago firm in 1918.

Gruelle wrote 40 "Raggedy Ann" books before his death in 1948. There have been 180 million printings in 156 languages throughout the world. Walt Disney contracted for the animated film rights but production was dropped during World War II.

Since 1960 the popularity of "Raggedy Ann" has soared to record heights and there are over 400 Raggedy Ann products on the market.

The film is being produced under the supervision of Tony Award winners Lester Osterman and Richard Horner.

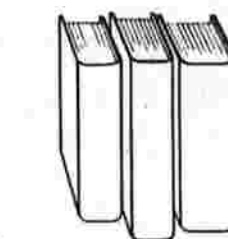
A crew works hard on the sliding hill side of Wickham Park July 4 as people crowd onto the park's meadow below and lights go on in the

Capsule book reviews

The Animal, by Jack Jones. (Morrow, \$6.95) JoJo, the hero of this novel, is the epitome of the professional football player. Out-sized to the point of freakishness, he is a powerful brute of a man. He also is black. But JoJo is caught in a world he despises. He hates violence. His struggle to be himself, to be seen for what he is, makes a touching, often amusing story.

Best Detective Stories of the Year -- 1975, edited by Allen J. Hubin. (Dutton, \$8.95) All the stories can't be the best, but this selection by The New York Times mystery specialist, in fine, indeed, Francis Clifford does his tough guy prose in a violent little story. Phyllis Bentley trots out her amateur detective, Miss

Phipps, who gets mixed up in dogs and crime. Other writers include Gerald Green and Jack Webb.

The Mixed Blessing, by Helen Van Slyke. (Doubleday, \$8.95) There's something old and something new in this slick tale — it's a love story (old) involving the daughter of an interracial marriage (new) and her all-white cousin. As befits love stories going back before Romeo and Juliet, the lovers compound their problems by making added difficulties for themselves. If

you're in the mood for romance, this will fill the bill.

Surrealism, by Uwe M. Schneede. (Abrams, \$25) An art movement that reflects the world of dreams and the subconscious, surrealism has a new fascination for the 1970s in its search for meaningful aesthetic images. The director of the Württemberischer Kunstverein explores the movement from Dada to Abstract Expressionism and provides more than 150 illustrations, 41 of them in color.

Flooded streets and cellars, families being hastily removed from homes, whole sections of communities cut off, interrupted telephone and power service — all these were common experiences.

20 years ago

Aug. 19, 1955 — The worst flood in Connecticut history roared down the state's main rivers, wrecking buildings, washing out dams; damaging industry, and taking lives.

Torrington, Winsted, Waterbury, Putnam and other valley towns were devastated. Damages were estimated in the millions in the drenching storms that developed after Hurricane Diane spent its fury on the Eastern Seaboard.

Aug. 20, 1955 — Connecticut, staggered by catastrophic floods, threw all its resources into a grim battle against death, destruction, and the threat of disease. The real destruction of the Black Friday flood became known.

Gov. Abraham Ribicoff declared a state of emergency. The death toll climbed to 30. Manchester, relatively unscathed by the disaster, mopped up streets, pumped out cellars and sent aid to other communities.

Aug. 22, 1955 — Connecticut's ravaging rivers, whose waters tore away life and wrought destruction never before seen in the state, began to flow back to normal. Sixty-eight persons were known to have perished; another 70 were missing.

President Dwight D. Eisenhower, beginning an inspection of the stricken Northeast, declared Connecticut a major disaster area.

Aug. 24, 1955 — Manchester's municipal, civic, and business organizations sent aid to devastated towns. A Red Cross appeal for clothing, food, and financial aid began.

Aug. 31, 1955 — Many towns were still in ruins, but rebuilding progress was already seen. Many of the estimated 60,000 people put out of work by the flood returned to their jobs.

Recovery would take years and change the face of the state. Many things were lost forever. The flood would not be forgotten.

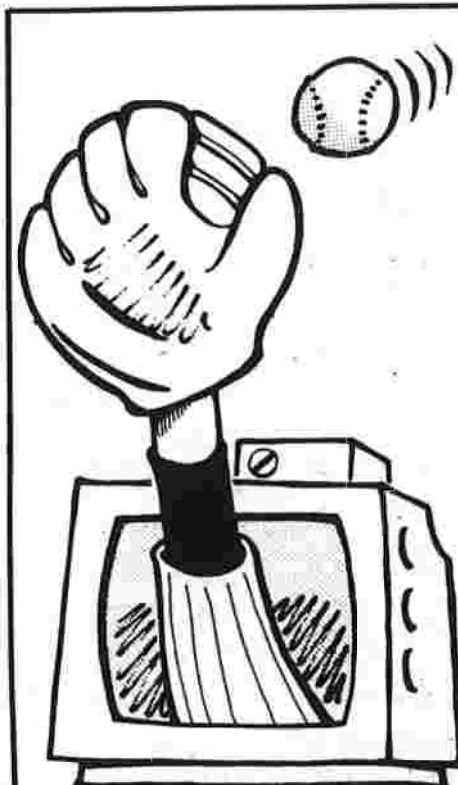

Mistaken identity

Jean Shepherd suffers from a chronic case of mistaken identity — a result of his great success as an author, campus lecturer, radio and TV humorist.

The problem is that Shepherd is so adept a storyteller that when he talks about "his" first blind date, or "his" army buddies, everyone believes him.

In Hartford recently to promote "Jean Shepherd's America," a 13-part television series airing Tuesdays at 7 p.m. on Connecticut Public Television, Shepherd talked about the misconceptions his fans have about him.

Many of them, he feels, seem to think he is just some guy who walks in off the street to gab about the experiences he has had and the people he's known.

At WOR Radio in New York, where he has done a nightly 45-minute radio soliloquy for the past 17 years, the humorist gets letters from people trying to top his stories. "If you think you had a bad experience," they say, "wait 'til you hear what happened to me."

"Jean Shepherd's America," the television series he created several years ago, has been brought back by PBS for airing again this year.

Each show is different. In one, Shepherd returns to the steel mills where he worked after high school. In another, he sets out to explore American food — Virginia pecan pie, rocky mountain rainbow trout, New England baked beans, and deep southern candied sweet potatoes.

Blended with his humor is a personal philosophy which indicates that Shepherd is probably much more reflective than his easy gift for gab might indicate. In Hartford, for instance, he provided this observation:

"To a ham radio operator (which he is), Hartford is like Rome to a Catholic." (Hartford is the headquarters of the ARRL, the American Radio Relay League).

About television — "The problem with television shows is that they are done by people in television."

About humor — "The difference between a humorist and a comic, he says, is that a comic tells jokes about Nixon, a humorist tells jokes about all of us who voted for Nixon."

Bilingual programs finished

For the past seven weeks, the Connecticut Public Television studios have housed a Puerto Rican barrio. But now the barrio is a ghost town — its inhabitants departed, its buildings partially torn down.

The barrio was a set for a series of 10 bilingual television programs — dismantled now that production is complete.

Called "Mundo Real" (for "Real World"), the series is a comedy/drama about the experiences of a Puerto Rican family living on the U.S.A. mainland. It was produced under a \$250,000 grant from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare for anticipated airing in December. An additional funding request has been made to HEW for a second season of 10 programs.

Designed for both in-school and evening broadcast, the series revolves around the Luis Blanco family. Luis, the owner of a small travel agency, his wife Doris, and two children live in an unidentified, multi-ethnic urban area.

Through the family's activities, the series intends, among other things, to promote cultural understanding and an awareness of the problems commonly associated with adjustment to mainland, urban life.

The cast of "Mundo Real" includes actors from Hartford, New York, and Puerto Rico. Miguel Angel Suarez, who plays Luis Blanco, is a TV and film actor in Puerto Rico, as are "Mundo Real" neighbor Delia Esther Quinones and grandfather Victor Arrillaga.

Ana Ramos (Doris Blanco) and 11-year-old Elaine Davila (Delia Blanco) are professional New York actresses; while Carl Willis Crudup, also from New York, is probably best known to the public for his role as Spencer in the film *The Gambler*.

Cast members from the Hartford area include 10-year-old Luis A. Robles, a student at the Ann St. School, Mike Sarli and Euripedes Rios.
