Refinery fire kills three

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) - An oil refinery fire is a fearsome thing. "We thought we were in pretty good shape, Gulf Oil Co. refinery manager Jack Burke said. "Then it flashed - and that's when we lost control."

Before it was over, two multiple alarm fires ripped through the huge Gulf Oil refinery in south Philadelphia within seven hours Sunday, destroying seven storage tanks and sending balls of flame and smoke soaring 200 feet.

Three firemen died in the fires and three others were unaccounted for.
Thirteen more firemen were injured in

battling an'll-alarm fire which broke out at the refinery barely seven hours after a sixalarm fire had been brought under control. Fire Commissioner Joseph Rizzo said there was a "flash of light" only hundreds of feet from him as firemen hosed down

the rubble of the first blaze. He said "there were three firemen standing about 200 in front of me," and he saw them go Smoke still poured from the refinery early today. Mayor Frank Rizzo, the fire commissioner's brother, said, "We have to let it burn out because if vapors build up and become locked we get explosions. We've still got a live fire."

To keep the blaze contained, firemen hosed down other tanks which Rizzo said contained "hundreds of thousands of barrels of napthalene and gasoline."

Assistant Deputy Fire Marshal Edward Stevens said the second fire began when a tank containing crude oil burst into flames and two smaller tanks of napthalene erupted, followed by four more crude oil

Stevens said the area burning covered about six city blocks.

The refinery is located along the Schuylkill River and next to another huge Atlantic Richfield Co. refinery, which was not in any immediate danger.

The fires caused massive traffic tieups on a nearby bridge, a major artery for homeward bound weekend traffic. The

extra 30 days — to Oct. 7. Fred Brunoli & Sons of Avon bid \$233,000 for the project on July 24 and its price was to remain firm for 45 days - to Sept. 7.

On Aug. 5, by an 8 to 1 vote with Republican Hillery Gallagher voting "no," the town Board of Directors authorized construction of the Buckland firehouse (at N. Main St. and Tolland Toke). The board stipulated, however, financing and construction won't start until the legal ramifications (of who services the Buckland area - the town or district)

are resolved. Thompson predicted today, "We believe we should be ready to take action in the courts, if necessary, within the next few

Town Counsel William Broneill reported today his office "has completed a substan-tial part of the legal research." He said procedure - checking the signatures on the petition from Buckland area property owners which led to the July 31 vote for expanding district lines.

Broneill said he expects to have a report for the Board of Directors by the beginning of pext week.

In his appeal to Eighth District leaders, Thompson said, "I believe we have had a good working relationship with the district these last few years. Portuguese leftists campaign to regain public confidence

LISBON, Portugal (UPI) - Embattled Portuguese Prime Minister Vasco Goncalves today launched a campaign to regain public support and stifle antinist critics of his military govern-

The Communist party, pressing ahead with its own counter-offensive, planned a rally in one of the country's major anti-Communist strongholds despite increasing resistance by violent mobs.

A spokesman for Goncalves said the prime minister would appear at a leftwing labor union rally tonight in suburban Almada, the first time he has made a public speech since anti-Communist violence and political crisis engulfed Por-

tugal five weeks ago.

Goncalves announced the speech after three days of emergency meetings with his cabinet and a nationally televised

appeal for public unity.

President Francisco da Costa Gomes joined the effort to keep the government in power, holding a series of urgent weekend talks with key military figures in an effort to resolve severe dissension between leftists and moderates in the armed forces. Representatives of the Communist-controlled National Union Confederation canvassed shops and factories throughout the country to promote a 30-minute general strike Tuesday to protest swelling violence in the country.

The Socialist party, the country's biggest vote-getter and the Communists' major opponnents, urged their supporters to ignore the strike. A Communist party spokesman said the

Communists would demonstrate Tuesday night at the sports arena in Porto, the largest city in the conservative, anti-Communist north of Portugal.

"We have no intention of changing plans for our next rally," the spokesman said

At the last major rally, mobs of farmers and youths exchanged shotgun fire Satur-day night with Communists in the town of Alcobaca, 65 miles north of Lisbon. Combat-equipped troops had to break through a crowd of anti-Communists out-

side Alcobaca's gymnasium to free a thou-





How Congress gave itself a pay raise

By Donald Smith Congressional Quarterly WASHINGTON — The blitz-like House and Senate action approving cost-of-living raises for members and high federal officials proved that the 94th Congress can

Even some members of Congress were caught by surprise.
"The first I had heard of it was when it came up on the Senate floor," said Rep. Robert E. Bauman of Maryland, a conservative Republican who voted against the pay raise in the House two days later. "It

whizzed right through."

Under the adopted plan, the actual amount of the increase will be left to the living recommendations for other federal employes. President Ford is expected to suggest a 5 per cent raise effective Oct. 1. This would raise the \$42,500 salary of senators and representatives to \$44,625. It will be their first raise since 1969.

The idea of Congress giving itself an automatic pay increase every year, tied to the Consumer Price Index, arose from staff discussions in the Senate and House after the Senate rejected a pay raise in
