for the star figure in the case which captured the nation's attention for months during 1974. Even with her arrest, her whereabouts in recent months remained a mystery. Miss Hearst, 21, now faces federal charges of bank robbery and use of a firearm in the commission of a felony. She also must answer more than two dozen state charges including assault with intent to kill and kidnapping. The precision arrests wrote the final chapter for the SLA, a small terrorist group which had its roots in the California State Prison system.

Stephen Solia, 27, a housepainter, was taken into custody on a charge of harboring federal fugitives. Federal investigators said two others were arrested, but declined to detail their role in the crime. The other two were not identified. It apparently was a tip from a citizen which led FBI agents to the Harries and Miss Hearst. The arrests came at 2:25 p.m. PDT. Surveillance had been set up at the Harries home on Wednesday at 2 p.m. She was locked up in the San Mateo County Jail in Redwood City, 25 miles south of San Francisco. The arraignment of Miss Hearst was quiet. Dressed in tan slacks and a purple striped sweater and wearing dark glasses, she appeared demure and polite. Just before this, Wendy Yoshimura, a 32-year-old artist arrested with Miss Hearst, was arraigned.

At a home near where Miss Hearst was arrested, William Harris, 30, a former Indiana school teacher, and his wife, Emily, 28, were arrested simultaneously as they finished jogging.

Patty Hearst ordered held without bail



SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The Hearst family millions were not enough to free Patricia Hearst on bail. A federal judge says the gun-toting newspaper heiress might try to go underground again. The prosecution, in a bail reduction hearing Friday, disclosed Miss Hearst had a .38-caliber pistol in her purse when she was arrested in a quiet, Mission District neighborhood Thursday. Two carabinieri were also found in her rented house. U.S. District Judge Oliver Carter, declaring her 19-month "underground" life over, ordered her held without bail on charges of robbing a San Francisco bank and carrying a machinegun during the crime. Bail for Miss Hearst had been set at \$1.65 million for charges in San Francisco and in Los Angeles, Calif., but Carter rejected all bail. He said her lawyer could try again to obtain her release Tuesday. Carter said what worried him was "whether this defendant is a flight risk."

Miss Hearst's father, Randolph A. Hearst, president of the San Francisco Examiner, and his wife were dismayed by Carter's decision. "We'll have another day in court with Patty," she said after meeting privately with her daughter following the hearing. Mrs. Hearst added her daughter took his decision "very well."

Shriver announces bid for Demo nomination

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sargent Shriver, the Kennedy family's main rival, and George McGovern's desperation running mate, stepped into the presidential spotlight today under his own power. Shriver, the 1972 Democratic vice-presidential candidate, scheduled a news conference to formally announce that he will seek the party's 1976 presidential nomination. The 59-year-old brother-in-law of Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., becomes the seventh Democrat in the already crowded field. The other declared candidates are Sens. Henry Jackson, D-Wash.; Lloyd Bentsen, D-Tex.; Rep. Morris Udall, D-Ariz.; former Gov. Terry Sanford of North Carolina and Jimmy Carter of Georgia, and former Sen. Fred Harris of Oklahoma. The state is expected to grow to eight next week with the entry of Gov. Milton Shapp of Pennsylvania and to nine next month with the formal declaration of Sen. Birch Bayh, D-Ind. There is no firm word on the announcement date of Gov. George Wallace of Alabama.

Manchester's debt service cost reported lowest in state

By SOL R. COHEN Herald Reporter A 32-page prospectus prepared for potential bidders on a \$1,865 million bond issue points out Manchester's uniquely low cost for debt service—3.3 per cent of the total budget and the lowest in the state for communities above 12,000 population.

The prospectus contains comparisons to the total General Fund budget for other cities as well. It shows that Manchester budgets 60 per cent to the schools, compared to the state average of 52.3 per cent. 9 per cent for public works, compared to 8.2 per cent in the state; 4.5 per cent for libraries and recreation, compared to 3.1 per cent; 7 per cent for public safety, compared to 10.5 per cent; and 2 per cent for health and welfare, compared to 3.3 per cent in the state.

## Desegregation expert slain

DAYTON, Ohio (UPI) — School desegregation expert Charles Glatt, appointed to formulate a plan to integrate Dayton's schools, was shot to death while working in his Federal Building office Friday.

"I did what I had to do," said Neal Bradley Long, charged with first degree murder in the slaying.

Shortly after the shooting, the American Civil Liberties Union in Columbus asked for federal protection of other officials working on Dayton's school desegregation, including judges and attorneys in state and federal courts.

Glatt, 46, suffered bullet wounds in the chest, abdomen, neck and shoulder. Doctors at Miami Valley Hospital said Glatt's heart had stopped when he arrived in the emergency room. It was restarted and he

was rushed to surgery, where he died three hours after the shooting.

Glatt, who worked out public school desegregation plans for cities in 18 other states, was appointed by the U.S. 6th Circuit Court of Appeals to draw up a similar plan for the Dayton school system.

Long's short statement was his only comment on the shooting as he was led from U.S. District Judge Roger Makey's chambers after being charged with first-degree murder and ordered held without bail.

Long, 48, a service station attendant and divorced father of eight children, was scheduled for a preliminary hearing Thursday.

The investigation into the shooting was being conducted by the FBI, since the assault occurred on federal property.

Glatt's desegregation plan was to be completed by Nov. 3. He taught two courses at the Ohio State University, including one on "Problems and Processes of Desegregation."

His previous work included desegregation plans for Indianapolis; Lexington, Ky.; Charlotte, N.C.; Richmond, Va.; New York City; Philadelphia; Chattanooga, Tenn.; Houston; Baltimore; Kansas City and Dayton and Toledo, Ohio.

Last Thursday, in an interview with an Ohio State University official, Glatt said he expected "no great problems" with the court-ordered desegregation in Dayton.

Ohio State University President Harold L. Enarson called the shooting a tragedy. "We are greatly distressed and saddened by the tragic shooting of Professor Glatt," Enarson said.

## Auto insurance laws bad in Massachusetts

BOSTON (UPI) — Insurance Commissioner James Stone says Massachusetts' auto insurance laws for property damage are "terrible" and companies would be justified in leaving the state if the system is not reformed.

"We have a terrible system," Stone said in an interview Friday. "If we don't change it they (the companies) ought to get out."

His remarks came after it was reported Travelers Insurance Company of Hartford, Conn., the largest auto insurer in the state, has threatened to pull out if pending legislation is passed to freeze property damage rates in the first six months of 1976.

The company issued a statement Friday that it does not plan to withdraw from Massachusetts, but has not

ruled out that possibility "as a last resort."

Stone has been conducting hearings on the insurance industry's request for a \$244 million rate increase. He has suspended testimony on the property damage portion of the request pending action on the freeze legislation or reform of the system.

## Man charged with selling tix to minor

An East Hartford man has been charged with three misdemeanor counts of selling \$105 worth of state lottery tickets to a 17-year-old who had saved the money from a summer job.

Authorities said Gary Leone, 23, submitted to arrest Friday at Manchester police headquarters and was charged with selling instant lottery tickets to a minor at a Manchester package store owned by his father.

The girl, Mary Lewis, reportedly was encouraged to spend her summer earnings on the tickets. Agents receive a five per cent commission on lottery ticket sales.

The law prohibits sale of lottery tickets to any person under the age of 18 and permits the revocation or suspension of the license of any agent who violates the rules.

## Stamps and coins

Time for some exotica. Here are hand-made objects of art from three African nations. There is a wooden comb and a decorated gourd from Kenya, an armlet from Uganda, and an earring from Tanzania. (This last country was Tanganyika plus Zanzibar until 1964).

Note the alternations of who's-on-first for the order of names on the stamps. A check of Scott's Volume I shows that the switcheroos have been going on from the beginning of the threesome in 1965. Sometimes it is keyed to products such as these, or to an area or a building, but often it just seems to be a case of "My turn now."

Each country has also continued to issue stamps in its own name only. Uganda had a nice flower set in 1971; Kenya had sea shells the same year; and Tanzania put on a set of 15 butterflies in '73.

The stamps Kenya-Uganda-Tanzania (or TUK, or UKT, etc. in whatever order) were printed under the auspices of the East African Postal & Telecommunications Corporation. We will forego any further delving into this can of worms.

### 'Airport Journal'

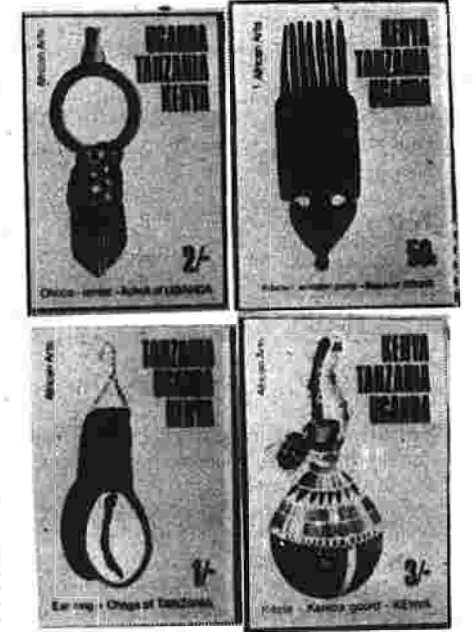
The "Airport Journal" for August is at hand. (From the American Airmail Society). On the masthead of the little mag is the name Gerard A. Caron — the Chairman of Exhibitions for the Manchester Philatelic Society. Inside, his department, Airs of The Month, describes and illustrates offerings of 8 countries, from Bermuda to Togo.

There is news that the first volume of the long-awaited "American Airmail Catalogue" is ready. A reviewer complains that it is not well updated as recent auction knockdowns have run far ahead of some of the listed prices. But insofar as airmail covers are concerned, "it's the only one in town."

### Still looking

There is a piece in the latest American Philatelist that could have fitted nicely into the above journal. It seems that air-letter people are still looking for the mis- sive given to Jean Blanchard by G. Washington in 1793. It was carried in Blanchard's pocket during a balloon flight from Philadelphia to Woodbury, N.J., in January of that year. He showed the letter to townspeople at the landing site and was forthwith given a carriage ride back to Philly the same evening.

The text of the letter is given in the article, where George Henchoffer describes his world-wide 40-year fruitless search for the original.



### Just for addicts

For Cornering Addicts. The Postal Service is now making an effort to supply four-position plate blocks to any office that takes full-carton lots of commemorative. That is, 20,000 panes of 50 stamps at a whack. ("Panies" are what we call sheets).

Want to win a bet? The Eakins painting stamp (Scott number 1355, 1968) and the Walt Disney (number 1355, 1968) were produced by commercial firms in New Jersey, as we are reminded by a recent item in the philatelic press. It should be easy to find somebody who will pound on the table and insist that the Bureau of Engraving and Printing had put out all our stamps since the 1943-44 Overrun Nations.

### Double hobby

Coins-on-stamps should be a good double-strength collecting hobby. The Falkland Islands will release a set of 5 in October to publicize their new coinage. There will be pictures of coins, together with trout, gentoo penguins, geese, albatross and sea lions. Money plus wildlife. Scott's Monthly Journal notes recent sets like this from China, Mexico, and Norway. Information on back issues is supplied by the American Topical Association.

# Harnessing nature

**We need people to do something about energy. If everyone said 'I'm going to take aggressive action about my energy needs,' nearly 95 per cent of the nation's energy problems would be solved.**

You may never be able to hitch your proverbial wagon to a star, but with a little ingenuity and effort, you can harness the sun, wind and even a small waterfall to provide heat, light and power for your home plus energy to operate your car.

This is not a dream of the future, but things that Mike Corbin, formerly of Manchester and president of Corbin-Gentry, Inc., of Somersville, is involved in right now.

An instant millionaire, he has parlayed \$80 and a new design for a motorcycle seat into \$5 million in about five years. "I became a millionaire accidentally, and the \$5 million is in assets, not cash," Mike said.

His motorcycle accessories firm is currently the largest manufacturer of custom motorcycle seats in the world. Last year, the firm had \$2,250,000 in sales, he said.

His experience as a motorcycle racer and Navy electrician involved in the Navy's electric propulsion program, led him to design and manufacture an electric motorcycle before we were hit by today's energy pinch.

### He proved it

Topping that, he designed and built Quick Silver, the world's fastest electric motorcycle, because "I wanted to prove that electric vehicles don't have to be slow moving." He proved it at the Bonneville Nationals on Utah's salt flats in 1974 when he rode Quick Silver at a top speed of over 171 miles per hour with an average speed of more than 165 miles per hour.

Still proving things, he rode his newest motorcycle, the XLP-II to the top of Mt. Washington, N.H., a climb of 4,688 feet, in the Mt. Washington Alternative Vehicle Regatta this summer.

"We came in first. The bike made it to the top in about 26 minutes. The eight miles of road is real hairy and slow moving with 99 hairpin turns. We made two trips up the mountain before recharging the bike at a wind-mill powered generator at the top," Mike said.

Though Mike admits that "very few people are buying electric cars because they feel that you have infringed on their right to be mobile," he has designed and is manufacturing an "Electric Bug Kit" to convert a used Volkswagen into an electric car.

"All you need to recycle an old Volkswagen is the shell of the car plus the clutch and transmission. One of our representatives can tell a person how to install the kit over the phone. It will cost about \$175 to \$200 to have someone else or a dealer to install the kit, and we have a dealer in South Windsor," Mike said.

### 65 cents a week

"It costs 65 cents to operate the car for a week. The car travels at a

speed of nearly 50 miles per hour and will go about 30 miles on a 12-hour charge. As batteries improve the range will widen. You have a plug in your garage or on the side of your house, and it will cost less money to operate this plug than it does to run any other plug in your house, because the only work it does is in the off-peak hours between 8 p.m. and 7 a.m. But that's all you need for power, a 110 volt outlet," he said.

"According to statistics, 78 per cent of Americans travel only 18 miles a day. All we need to do is train ourselves to go to work or shopping in an electric car and use our large gas-eating cars for weekend trips or vacations. It would pay you to own two cars, not only in energy savings or in pollution savings but in dollars and cents spent on fuel," he said.

Mike, who operated his firm in a small shop in Bolton Notch about five years ago, and later, on Rt. 83 in Ellington, now has his plant housed in the former Somersville Mill across the road from a dam on the Scantic River. He has harnessed the river and is now using its hydroelectric power to run the plant.

Jean Lara, vice-president and financial wizard of the firm, is using the sun's rays to raise fruits and vegetables in an organic garden on the fifth floor of the facility.

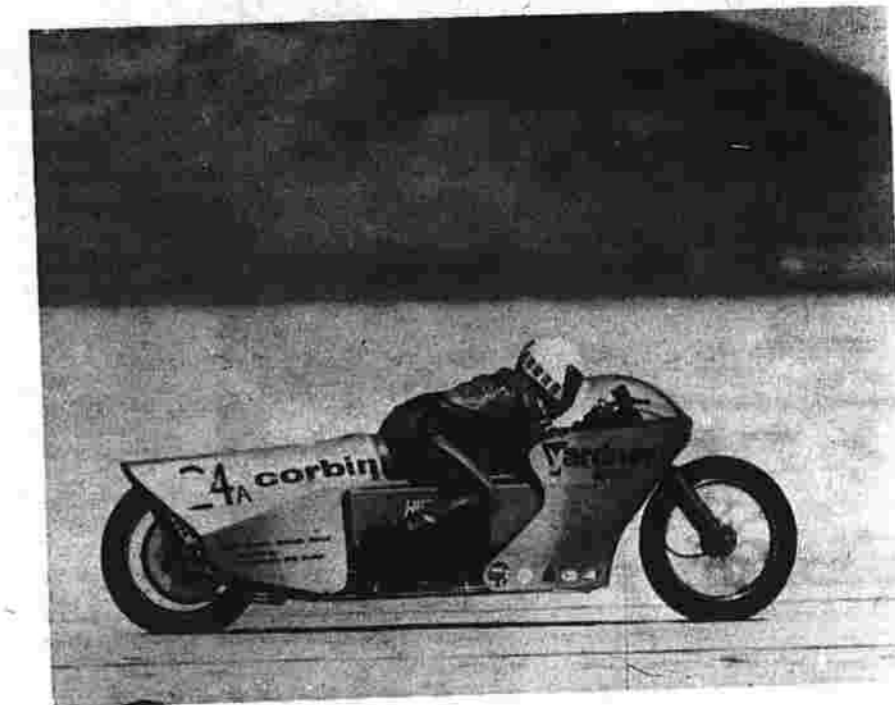
Mike, who has six patents on electrical devices, still has another project. "This is what I'm going to do and would advise anyone else to start thinking about. I'm designing a house, which will be independent of all services. It will be heated by solar energy and firewood with wind generators to power the house. The byproduct is that the wind generators will also charge a couple of electric cars so that I don't have to be an energy consumer in my own home," he said.

### Start working

"The average person can do a lot more than he thinks he can do. He can't shut off the electricity and oil tank tomorrow and say 'Okay, I'm independent.' He has to start working in that direction. It will take a couple of years to get the money together and to get enough hardware in the place so that he can be at least 65 or 75 per cent independent. Then he can finish it right up with a wood stove," Mike said.

"We need people to do something about energy. If everyone said 'I'm going to take aggressive action about my energy needs, nearly 95 per cent of the nation's energy problems would be solved,'" he said.

Perhaps someday, if Mike has his way, every parking meter will be equipped with an electric outlet, and Manchester's skyline will be dotted with windmills. Then we will be free of the oil producing countries and their whims, and large utility bills will be a thing of the past.

## Old photos are more than bits of nostalgia

Grandma, her hands folded stiffly over a white apron, newlyweds posed rigidly in wedding finery, horses standing in floodwater. Photographs, literally millions of them, cram the files of local historical museums across the land.

Although photography dates from 1839, when Daguerre's results were published, it remained in the hands of professional men. It was not until the 1870s after a succession of inventions simplifying the process that photography was promoted for the amateur.

The daguerreotype was the earliest variety of photograph in which the image was produced on a silver plate or a copper plate covered with silver. Portions of it will reflect light rather than show an image when

moved into different positions. By the mid-1850s the daguerreotype was being replaced by the ambrotype, a photograph made on glass by backing a thin negative with a black surface.

And by the 1860s the ferrotype (tintype) and paper prints from glass negatives were used. The ferrotype was a photograph made on a thin iron plate using collodion as a vehicle for the sensitive salts.

When in 1888 the roll film camera was introduced, the amateur photographer came into his own. George Eastman gave the name "Kodak" to the first of these cameras. They were loaded at the factory with a roll of film which would allow the photographer to make about 100 exposures. Pictures were circular and about 2-1/2 inches

in diameter. After the roll was exposed the loaded camera was sent to the factory. There the film was developed, the camera reloaded and the pictures and camera returned to the owner.

The box camera enjoyed great popularity into the mid-20th century and is responsible for the bulk of the photographs made during this period.

If you've been wondering what to do with old photographs, consider giving them to your historical association. Just make sure that people, places and events are identified and dated, if at all possible.

Your contribution could help fill in time and events gaps and provide continuity to a pictorial history of your community.

## University of Hartford shows stunning photos

A stunning photographic exhibition including a selection of works by the distinguished artist Paul Strand will be on display at the Joseloff Gallery at the University of Hartford beginning today and continuing through Sept. 30.

Entitled "A Sense of Place," the exhibition consists of photographs of Iceland, Maine, Mexico, North America and Latin America by Paul Strand, Fred Picker, Stephen Gersh, Nubar Alexanian and Steven Nestler. Nestler organized the exhibition.

Paul Strand's "Mexican Portfolio" was first published in 1940 and holds a near-legendary status among serious photographers and scholars of photographic history. Strand was one of a group of artists working in the early years of this century among whom were Alfred Steiglitz and the painter Matisse.

Strand's deep concern with how a place feels as well as how it looks and is a classic study of Mexican landscape, people and religious artifacts.

Fred Picker has published numerous books including Rapa Nui (Easter Island) in collaboration with Thor Heyerdahl, and "Zone VI Workshop," which is a standard text in many universities. He has had many exhibitions and considerable critical acclaim as an author and photographer. The works in the current exhibition are a selection of Picker's photographs of Iceland.

Stephen Gersh was assistant to Ansel Adams from 1962 to 1964 and his works have been in many exhibitions as well as being in a number of collections including that of the Metropolitan Museum of Art. He has worked with young photographer Nubar Alexanian over the past two years, producing a number of works

including "Peruvian Portfolio" and a group of photographs of North America, which will be on display in the current exhibition.

Steven Nestler was curator of photography at the Museum of Fine Arts in Springfield, Mass., during 1973-1974. A graduate of the University of Hartford, he received his master's degree in photography from Goddard College last year and his works are in collections of Fogg Museum, the Museum of Modern Art, the Metropolitan Museum of Art and several other museums. He has taught at the Wadsworth Atheneum and is now teaching photography at the University of Hartford. Several of his photographs taken in Maine are in the exhibition "A Sense of Place."

The Joseloff Gallery is open Monday through Thursday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and also from 6:30 p.m. to 10 p.m.

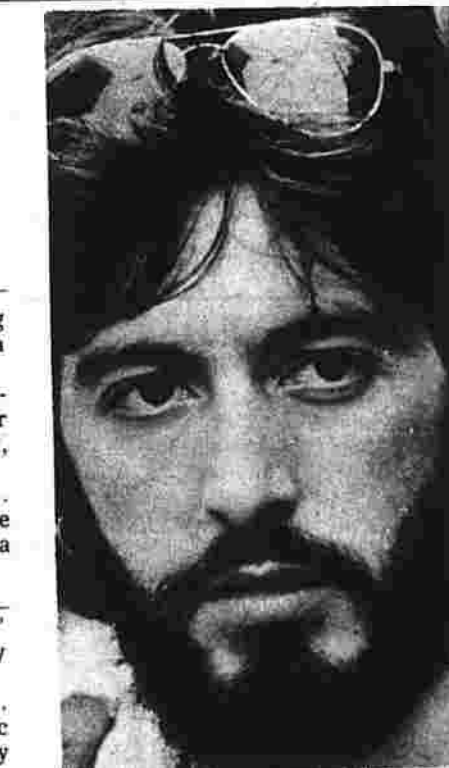

### Photographs featured in UConn show

"Faces in Israel," an exhibit of 145 black and white photos made during the Middle Eastern nation's 25th year in 1973, is on display at the University of Connecticut's Wilbur Cross Library.

The photos were shot by Rabbi Gedalyah Engel, Hillel director at Purdue University. The traveling exhibit, which runs through Sept. 30, is a story of contrasts that blend together to make a whole. It is co-sponsored at UConn by the local Hillel House.

The show was designed by Lee Koch, a graduate student in photography at Purdue. Its 28 panels tell the story of the people of Israel — Arab, Christian Jew, Moslem, city dweller or kibbutznick.

The first panel exemplifies the mood of the exhibit. Titled "Three Women," it shows an office manager in Jerusalem, a 14-year-old Arab bride and a black convert to Judaism.

Other panels show how holidays are modified by the people of Israel, American settlers known to the Engel family, as well as the late David Ben Gurion, Israel's famous prime minister.

"Faces in Israel," was first presented at Purdue. Since then, it has been shown at Wabash College, Marion College, the Indianapolis Museum of Art, the B'nai B'rith building in Washington, D.C., the University of Maryland, and American University in Washington.

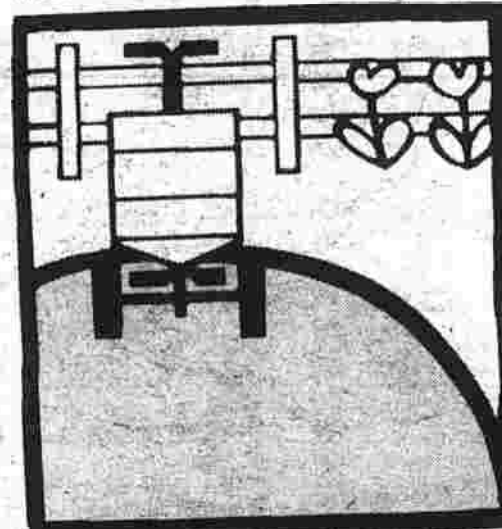

### State

**WATERTOWN** — Watertown teachers voted to strike Sunday and the walkout effects 4,500 students. They have been working without a contract that expired at the start of the school year. Issues are seniority to determine layoffs and a dental plan.

**HARTFORD** — Alfonse Marotta, a Hartford highway engineer, was elected president of the Connecticut State Employees Association Saturday night. He pledges efforts to begin immediate talks for cost-of-living raises for the state's 40,000 employees.

### Regional

**BOSTON** — A floor vote on President Ford's request to place American technicians in the Sinai Desert has been scheduled tentatively in the House for early next month, House Majority Leader Thomas P. "Tip" O'Neill, D-Mass., said Sunday. He said the House will comply. O'Neill received Israel's Prime Minister's Medal from Ambassador Simcha Dinitz, the first non-Israeli to be so honored.

**BILLERICA, Mass.** — Some Middlesex House of Corrections inmates are contracting for early release in exchange for paying restitution to their victims. Under mutual agreement plans they pledge to reimburse victims and to take other forms of positive action, such as alcohol therapy.

### National

**MONTEREY, Calif.** — Veterans Day will return to Nov. 11 on the calendar of federal holidays effective in 1978 under a bill signed Sunday by President Ford. It was shifted the fourth Monday in October in 1954 and since then has been a subject of controversy especially among veterans groups which favored Nov. 11, the end of World War I.

**WASHINGTON** — The extraordinary events leading to Gerald R. Ford's ascension to the presidency and his choice of a new vice president provided the first test of how well the new 25th Amendment of the Constitution works. In a report Sunday, a Senate constitutional rights committee concluded it "operated exceedingly well" and "no modification is warranted."

**MORRISTOWN, N. J.** — A judge began hearing arguments this morning on the request of Karen Ann Quinlan's foster parents that Karen be allowed to die. Miss Quinlan is in a coma and being kept alive by a respirator.

**UNITED NATIONS, N. Y.** — A galaxy of diplomatic stars gathered today for the start of a General Assembly debate testing the "spirit of cooperation" at the United Nations. Secretary of State Henry Kissinger led speakers at opening session.

**WASHINGTON** — A three-judge federal court began hearing arguments this morning on claims by Richard M. Nixon that he should have control over his White House papers and other materials, including tapes.

### International

**STAR CITY, USSR** — More than 500 persons cheered a welcome for astronauts Thomas P. Stafford, Vance D. Brand and Donald Slayton Sunday as they arrived in Star City, the Soviet Union cosmonaut training center. Astronauts and their families are on a 10-day, six-city tour of the Soviet Union.
