> WASHINGTON(UPI)President Ford says Congress has unfinished business on writing America's role in the Israeli-Egyptian Sinai agreement although he has been able to deliver on a promise to supply 200 civilians for desert monitoring posts.

Ford signed a congressional resolution Monday approving the American participation in the disengagement agreement. He said, however, he will consult with Congress about "what is required to sustain ... our diplomatic efforts" in the Middle East.

Another part of the complex agreement involves American promises of aid to Israel and Egypt. Israel is expected to receive \$2.5 billion in military and economic aid and Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger said Sunday Ford was willing to discuss aid in general terms with Egyptian President Anwar Sadat who arrives in Washington Oct. 26

Ford goes to Hartford, Conn., to raise money for Republicans and to win acceptance of his \$28 billion tax and budget cut proposal that has not gone over well in Congress.

Canadians under economic controls

OTTAWA, Canada (UPI) - Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau imposed selective wage and price controls on a major segment of Canada's economy today. saying it was on a destructive course. The controls limit wage hikes for many workers to 10 per cent a year and restrict price boosts by some corporations to their increase in costs.

This program of restraint is the heaviest imposed upon Canadians since the Second World War," Trudeau said in an 18-minute nationwide address Monday night

"I am asking the people of Canada to accept tough limits on their behavior so that our economy can recover, so that we can all be better off in the future than we would be if we allowed the economy to continue along its present destructive course.

The prime minister said the controls would take effect immediately and remain "for a considerable length of time." He said while they apply only to certain select groups "everyone is expected to observe the guidelines.

Minorities start boycott

BRIDGEPORT (UPI) - An estimated 48 per cent of the students at 13 so-called target schools stayed away from classes today in the first day of a two-day boycott of Bridgeport schools

The boycott was called by a group of minority community organizations and parents to protest the selection of Edward Desmond as Bridgeport's new superintendent of schools. Desmond is controller of the Westport school system.

The boycott was made more effective today when some 50 parents blockaded the Chestnut Hill Bus Co. garage, effectively shutting down school bus service for 9,000 students.

Bridgeport police arrested three persons on disorderly conduct charges. Among those arrested were J. Michael Smith, president of Bridgeport NAACP, and the Rev. Roger Floyd of the Greater Bridgeport Council of Churches

An elderly woman identified as Ella-Jackson was arrested when she refused to let go of a bus mirror. She had to be carried by police to a waiting van.

All three were released on their own recognizance. Attendance ligures at the 13 inner city schools targeted for the boycott showed 5,179 out of a possible 10,800 students were absent.

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. -Five survivors of the sunken Panamanian freighter Mimi have given statements to officials investigating the crew members' role in the apparent murder of four West German officials. Unconfirmed reports say an Indonesian named Gun Supardi killed the officers but officials have refused to comment.

TOKYO - Emperor Hirohito returned home today from a historic two-week visit to the United States and thanked President Ford and the American people for their warm hospitality.

LONDON - Alabama Gov. George Wallace began his second day of his European tour by visiting British Conservative leader Margaret Thatcher today. He met with Prime Minister Harold Wilson Monday and will go on to Brussels later today.

LISBON, Portugal - Army chief Gen. Carlos Fabiao flew to northern Portugal today in an attempt to reach a settlement with mutinous troops occupying a military base on the outskirts of Porto. The troops are demanding an ouster of a district military chief and a return of the Communists to power.

PARIS - Industrialized, oilexporting and developing countries have agreed to hold a conference on energy and raw materials in December, sidestepping a U.S. campaign to drive down fuel prices. The three blocs agreed Monday to meet Dec. 16 in Paris and not to have the price of oil on the agenda.

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (UPI) '-Economists from the United States and the Soviet Union today won the 1975 Nobel prize in Economics, the Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences announced.

The award was shared by Tjalling Koopmans of Yale University and Prof. Leonid Kantorovich of the Siberian division of the Academy of Science in Novosibirsk in the Soviet Union.

Koopmans, 65, and Kantorovich, 63, shared the prize for "their contributions to the theory of optimum allocation of resources," the academy said.

"Prof. Lleonid Kantorovich and Tjalling Koopmans, largely independent of one another, have renewed, generalized and developed methods for the analysis of the classical problem of economics," the academy said.

The award, presented by the Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences in memory of Alfred Nobel, the Swedish inventor of

dynamite, carries a cash award of \$143,000 and a diploma. The economics prize was established in

1968 by the Central Bank of Sweden as a tribute to Nobel, who died Dec. 10, 1896. The American economist was born in

the Netherlands and received a Ph.D. in economics from Leiden University. He is a naturalized U.S. citizen.

He came to the United States in 1940. The economist joined the Yale faculty in 1955 following teaching assignments at New York University and the University of Chicago.

The Nobel Prize for medicine will be awarded Thursday and the Physics and Chemistry prizes on Friday. The prize for literature will be awarded next week. It was the second of six Nobel prize announcements this year.

Andrei Sakharov, father of the Soviet hydrogen bomb but now a leading dissident and human rights campaigner, won the Nobel Peace Prize last week.

Red Cross Blood Center workers go out on strike

FARMINGTON (UPI) - Union employes of the Connecticut Red Cross Blood Center went on strike early today after a marathon negotiating session failed to produce a contract agreement. The strike deadline was set earlier to coincide with one of the center's main blood collection days at the Pratt and Whitney Aircraft Division plant in East

Hartford. Red Cross officials said earlier volunteers would be used to help collect an anticipated 2,000 pints of blood at the aircraft plant in the event of a strike.

A spokesperson for the 80 nurses, drivers and technicians' said picketing would be conducted at the East Hartford plant as well as at the blood center.

The three separate bargaining units make up Local 1303, Council 4, American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employes.

The nurses' contract expired Sept. 30 and the drivers and technicians are seeking their first contract.

Jerry Shuckerow, president of the nurses unit, said talks that began 9 a.m. Monday broke off at 4 a.m. with both sides. still far apart. She said the major issues were the duration of the contract, wages, and insurance coverage.

"There are many other unresolved, miscellaneous issues pertaining to each unit," he said, "and we stand ready to continue negotiations."





Is this federal agency necessary?

WASHINGTON - The story goes that a prominent U.S. senator was asked what Congress would do when the new consumer advocacy agency he had proposed got out of hand, as it inevitably would.

His answer was quick and simple: "Set up a new agency to watch and regulate it." In Washington, there are dozens of offices and an assortment of agencies, whose job it is to watch out for the in-

They do an abominable job - at great

Some become captives of the industries they are supposed to watch. Some get so involved in petty detail, in the collection of reports and the arguing of legal niceties, that they forget their objective is consumer protection, not paperwork and cases decided on bases so mushy they accomplish nothing.

A strong bloc in Congress is again pushing for a new agency to oversee all government consumer protection agencies and departments - and all other government agencies as well. That new agency would be empowered

to seek or mandate court action. It would, if established, decide what is in the consumer interest. But there is no provision in the proposed law by which the agency would accurately determine consumer interests. Scholars I've talked to believe it inevitable that the agency, like the agencies it would monitor, would be forced to depend on information supplied by pressure groups. 'There's a strong body of academic opinion that this body would thus become prisoner of one vested in-

terest or another. Unlike congressmen, forced by elections to keep in touch, however poorly, with constituents, the bureaucrats would be largeisolated behind the walls of their Washington offices, developing their own concepts of consumer interest, influenced

largely by special interests. Congress has an agency - the General 25 Years Accounting Offices which has the power to check on agencies and departments responsible for protecting the consumer. Congressional committees have staffs and the legal means to require accountings

Bemusement, perhaps, is the only fitting reaction to government's preoccupation with bunkum. But often it is most difficult to laugh. David Wise, in his book "The Politics of Lying," reminds us that in 1971 when mechanical errors provoked a false national emergency alert, government humbug was in effect prepackaged to deceive what during a real alert would

have been a terribly frightened public. Wise says the government had prerecorded tapes, ready for use by the federally controlled Emergency Broadcast Station, assuring Americans that the enemy had struck first with atomic weapons, that retaliation was massive, and that the "probability of victory is

Watergate, it was thought, would change all this deception. Moralists have for months agreed with Rep. Donald Fraser (D-Minn.) who believes the day has ended when society penalizes people for lying to their government but not vice versa. Yet that day has not ended, the sun is still high on official fabrication. To paraphrase Oliver Wendell Holmes, a lie remains the handle to fit all political sins. Actually, Watergate created naught but the illusion of a new Washington morality. Everybody's for honesty, even more than ever, but nobody's for it enough to bring it about. The only meaningful proposal in Congress, for instance, the Watergate Reorganization Act, a bill, that among other things, outlaws government lying, still languishes.

The anti-lying measure would force a \$10,000 fine or five years in jail for government employes who obstruct federal functions by fraud, and would also penalize those people, such as President Decent, who lie to Congress. But there isn't what you'd call an urgency to pass the new law.

And perhaps a law should not be passed. Legislating honesty is a trick even Moses found evasive. Moreover, as one critic of the anti-lying bill puts it, smiling uncomfortably, "If we threw out everybody who colored the truth in this place, we wouldn't have anybody left." Quite right. Distribution of series tickets

Followers of the Boston Red Sox in Manchester who failed to receive any tickets for World Series games at Fenway Park have expressed openly their displeasure with being shut out by the system employed.

True, there were a few Silk Towners in the stands last weekend in Boston, like Herb Phelon and his son, Jeff, Joe Hammond, Stanley Bray and Jack Bowers, but there were hundreds more who had to watch the games on video. One Manchester baseball fan sent four applications for tickets and received all four letters back - all unopened. This was the case for 99 out of every 100 regusts received with Manchester postmarks.

Who then gets the 35,000 plus tickets?

Good question. And the answer was provided on a weekend visit to Beantown

Practically all the choice seats - boxes and lower grandstand reserved - were sold to regular season ticket holders.

With approximately 10,000 season ticket clients, and each entitled to buy two tickets for each series game, and most likely did, that would cut the number of seats left to 15,000 for Joe and Jane Fan.

Seventy-five baseball writers from the Boston area were given an option to purchse as many as six tickets for each

Media in sky-view seats

Four hundred tickets were allotted to the Baseball Writers of American, for distribution to their friends at the regular ticket price per copy.

All 595 sky-view seats were set aside for the working media, newspaper, radio and teevee. All regular season sky-view ticket holders were given the opportunity to double the number of seats they had, which amounted to 600. Major league baseball clubs and officials were allotted 2,700 tickets which brings the total number of sold seats to

Politicians came in for seats, too, each Massachusetts state legislator could purche two grandstand tickets. As cards were against my larger for the Red Sox in there are 240 representatives and 40 senators, if all took

their full share, it would amount to 560 tickets each game. Another 50 tickets per game went to other political figures and two seats were also made available at each game for 125 members of Congress.

Another 400 tickets per game were set aside for NBC which has sole rights to televise the series. Newspapers, radio and teevee stations in New England

also had access to 500 tickets per game. Baseball writers had another 300 tickets to sell to their friends.

Only 7,000 available

All told, counting 2,500 standing room tickets, there were just over 7,000 tickets each day for sale to Joe Fan without any connections for games at Fenway Park.

It's no wonder thousands were disappointed, like the many in Manchester, including the woman caller who was indignent because she followed the rules, got her check and sent it to Boston on the prescribed postmarked date and got the same letter back several days later unopened. She admitted that she had never seen a major league baseball

There is only a small percentage of died-in-the-wool baseball fans in attendance at the opening World Series games every year and little more for game No. 2. The majority of these tickets fall into the hands of bigwigs. Usually, in the case of Boston, the true-blood fans will in-

crease for the possible sixth and seventh games this weekend at Fenway. However, scalpers will have a field day. For some unexplained reason they seem to come up with the choice seat locations for games after the first

Bleacher seats, incidentally, were selling for \$25 a copy last weekend despite the foul weather. The asking price for a set of grandstand seats was \$100 ... and there were takers.



Consumer Measures Explained

By State Department **If Consumer Protection**

Several new laws concerning consumerism, all passed by the last General Assembly session became effective Oct. I. Among those which have some special significance to consumers are laws which:

· Abolish the so-called "fair trade laws" which allowed manufacturers to prevent retailers from selling certain products at lower prices. Allow drug stores to advertise the prices of prescription

· Require drug stores to post the prices of the 100 most comnonly prescribed drugs. The Consumer Protection Department must establish regulations for these prices postings.

· Prohibit food stores from increasing the prices of products while on store shelves. Require products marked with new "universal price codes," which are designed to be read by a computer, to be marked with numerical prices as well. Regulations for enforcement of this law must be established by the Consumer Protection Department.

A few other laws, added to the statutes on Oct. 1, and which are enforced by agencies other than the Consume Protection Department will: Require automobile repair shops to give customers written

estimates on demand. · Prohibit credit discrimination on account of age and housing discrimination on ac count of age except in cases of ousing especially for the eldery. Employment discrimination will be prohibited on account of

marital status. Bar utilities from passing the cost of their advertising on to rate payers.

 Give tenants authority to demand a double payment from andlords who withhold security deposits after a tenant moves
