Dogs, planes used in manhunt

SALEM, Ill. (UPI) - Two extremely dangerous fugitives from a federal prison, tired and thirsty, were captured Monday night...

The hunt, using dogs and spotter planes, sheriff's deputies, state police and FBI agents, went on through wooded areas and along highways and rail tracks.

Maurice Philion, 40, Oakland, Calif., was captured by Marion County sheriff's police while walking along railroad tracks east of Salem.

He was found about a half mile out of town after a resident told police he had come to the door seeking water.

Roche, 39, Katonah, N.Y., carrying an empty shotgun, as he walked in the opposite direction from Philion but along the same tracks. Roche is believed to have masterminded the break in which five inmates escaped after devising an electronic device that opened safety grills.

As a safety measure, the Iuka Elementary School about 10 miles east of here, was closed by Principal Ben Baggett because a large portion of pupils live within the search area.

Roche, who had been serving a 39-year term for bank robbery and carrying a dangerous weapon, and Philion, who had been serving a 50-year term for bank robbery and assaulting a federal officer, were caught in a 16-square-mile area of rough southern Illinois countryside staked out by law officers since Sunday.

Police and FBI agents combed an area west of town in search of the remaining two fugitives, Henry M. Gargano, 43, of Chicago, and Dennis D. Hunter, 26, of Salem, Ohio. Authorities theorized the pair had slipped through town along the tracks and remained holed up in the woods.

Gargano had been serving a 199-year sentence for the slayings of two Chicago area policemen during a bank robbery and Hunter was serving a 25-year term for kidnapping, assault on a federal officer and escape.

The convicts used a home-made electronic device similar to a remote control to open barred corridor doors and made their escape through the front door of the prison Friday night.

Canadians under economic controls

OTTAWA, Canada (UPI) - Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau imposed selective wage and price controls on a major segment of Canada's economy today, saying it was on a destructive course.

The controls limit wage hikes for many workers to 10 per cent a year and restrict price boosts by some corporations to their increase in costs.

"This program of restraint is the heaviest imposed upon Canadians since the Second World War," Trudeau said in an 18-minute nationwide address Monday night.

"I am asking the people of Canada to accept tough limits on their behavior so that our economy can recover, so that we can all be better off in the future than we would be if we allowed the economy to continue along its present destructive course."

The prime minister said the controls would take effect immediately and remain "for a considerable length of time." He said while they apply only to certain select groups "everyone is expected to observe the guidelines."

Congress asked to help define America's role in the Mideast

WASHINGTON (UPI) - President Ford says Congress has unfinished business on writing America's role in the Israeli-Egyptian Sinai agreement although he has been able to deliver on a promise to supply 200 civilians for desert monitoring posts.

Ford signed a congressional resolution Monday approving the American participation in the disengagement agreement. He said, however, he will consult with Congress about "what is required to sustain... our diplomatic efforts" in the Middle East.

Another part of the complex agreement involves American promises of aid to Israel and Egypt. Israel is expected to receive \$2.5 billion in military and economic aid and Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger said Sunday Ford was willing to discuss aid in general terms with Egyptian President Anwar Sadat who arrives in Washington Oct. 26.

Ford goes to Hartford, Conn., to raise money for Republicans and to win acceptance of his \$28 billion tax and budget cut proposal that has not gone over well in Congress.

White House Press Secretary Ron Nessen made it clear the President intends to make his tax program the centerpiece of his campaign.

Ford has been using the fund raising dinners, such as the one in Hartford, to establish his own party leadership and to sharpen the attack on the "big spenders" in Congress. Both Ford and Nessen also have cast a few biting asides against the "latest recess" Congress has taken.

Ford may go to Florida late next week for more political fund raising appearances, and perhaps other points in the South. But in the coming weeks, his main focus will be on foreign affairs, starting with the state visit by Egyptian President Anwar Sadat Oct. 27. Ford and Sadat also are expected to meet in Florida.

Ford plans to fly to France for the seven-nation international economic conference in mid-November. He hopes to arrange a meeting in Europe with Syrian President Hafez Assad to continue the Middle East peace momentum but observers believe such plans may have hit a snag.

Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger goes to China at the end of the week to make arrangements for Ford's post-Thanksgiving visit to Peking. The trip is expected to last less than a week.

Ford in Hartford tonight for Republican dinners

HARTFORD (UPI) - President Ford comes to Hartford tonight under heavy security in a three-hour visit to help Connecticut Republicans raise campaign funds.

The President will be whisked from his jet at Bradley International Airport in Windsor Locks to the Hartford Civic Center, where 2,000 persons were to hear him speak following two simultaneous dinners.

About 300 persons will pay \$250 each to meet Ford at a cocktail party and reception before the dinners.

Ford was scheduled to arrive at Bradley about 6 p.m., then travel the 13 miles to Hartford in a limousine, followed by vehicles carrying members of the police, other security forces and news media. Democratic Gov. Ella T. Grasso was expected to greet the President at the airport but she will not attend the dinners.

One of the dinners is planned for 1,000 persons at \$125 per plate while the other will provide another 1,000 with box dinners at \$15 each.

Republican party officials estimate the affair will turn a profit of \$125,000 after expenses.

Tight security precautions include the limiting of the news media to a restricted area of the center during the President's speech.

White House and Secret Service security began arriving in Hartford last week to carry out checks and surveillance procedures that have been broadened since the two attempts on the President's life in California recently.

Russian, Yale economists to share Nobel Prize

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (UPI) - Economists from the United States and the Soviet Union today won the 1975 Nobel prize in Economics, the Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences announced.

The award was shared by Tjalling Koopmans of Yale University and Prof. Leonid Kantorovich of the Siberian division of the Academy of Science in Novosibirsk in the Soviet Union.

Koopmans, 65, and Kantorovich, 63, shared the prize for "their contributions to the theory of optimum allocation of resources," the academy said.

"Prof. Leonid Kantorovich and Tjalling Koopmans, largely independent of one another, have renewed, generalized and developed methods for the analysis of the classical problem of economics," the academy said.

The award, presented by the Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences in memory of Alfred Nobel, the Swedish inventor of dynamite, carries a cash award of \$143,000 and a diploma.

The economics prize was established in 1968 by the Central Bank of Sweden as a tribute to Nobel, who died Dec. 10, 1896.

The American economist was born in the Netherlands and received a Ph.D. in economics from Leiden University. He is a naturalized U.S. citizen.

He came to the United States in 1940. The economist joined the Yale faculty in 1955 following teaching assignments at New York University and the University of Chicago.

The Nobel Prize for medicine will be awarded Thursday and the Physics and Chemistry prizes on Friday. The prize for literature will be awarded next week.

It was the second of six Nobel prize announcements this year.

Andrei Sakharov, father of the Soviet hydrogen bomb but now a leading dissident and human rights campaigner, won the Nobel Peace Prize last week.

Red Cross Blood Center workers go out on strike

FARMINGTON (UPI) - Union employees of the Connecticut Red Cross Blood Center went on strike early today after a marathon negotiating session failed to produce a contract agreement.

The strike deadline was set earlier to coincide with one of the center's main blood collection days at the Pratt and Whitney Aircraft Division plant in East Hartford.

Red Cross officials said earlier volunteers would be used to help collect an anticipated 2,000 pints of blood at the aircraft plant in the event of a strike.

A spokesperson for the 80 nurses, drivers and technicians said picketing would be conducted at the East Hartford plant as well as at the blood center.

The three separate bargaining units make up Local 1303, Council 4, American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees.

The nurses' contract expired Sept. 30 and the drivers and technicians are seeking their first contract.

Jerry Shuckorow, president of the nurses unit, said talks that began 9 a.m. Monday broke off at 4 a.m. with both sides still far apart. She said the major issues were the duration of the contract, wages, and insurance coverage.

"There are many other unresolved, miscellaneous issues pertaining to each unit," he said, "and we stand ready to continue negotiations."

Lutz Museum visits increase

During the past year, activity at the Lutz Junior Museum reached an all time high. Attendance numbered over 23,000 persons, school tours increased by 40 per cent in May and June, and participation in after-school and summer classes swelled.

"The Doing Place," as the Museum is often called, offers a variety of "hands on" exhibits for children of all ages. This year, 36 different exhibits in all areas of the arts and sciences were offered as well as a collection of living plants and animals.

Included in the displays and Saturday happenings are live animal demonstrations and craft activities. Classes held after school and Saturday mornings throughout the school year and daily during the summer months expanded in number, topic selection and participants.

More classes were offered for kindergarten and pre-schoolers, including week-long summer sessions of outdoor experiences at the Oak Grove Nature Center.

Scholarships are available for students interested in taking classes but who are financially unable to do so.

In addition, increasing numbers of adults became involved in Museum workshops on gardening, quilting, and holiday decorations.

Besides classes and exhibits, the Museum also brought various types of programs to town for public enjoyment. This year, the Museum sponsored among other activities, a professional children's theater presentation, a magic show, a Gwen Reed variety program and several field trips.

The Museum also services the community through its maintenance of the town-owned Oak Grove Nature Center. Nature trails are open daily, sunrise to sunset, throughout the year. Using the Center's valuable resources, the Museum offers nature walks led by staff and other nature-oriented programs.

Not only did the Museum expand its services offered this past year, but a greater number of persons from the surrounding area became involved in assisting the Museum in its daily operations. The Museum's small staff was again augmented by an active adult volunteer league of more than 90 women and a junior league of 30 junior and senior high students.

Bennet Junior High School students also worked at the Museum through the Youth Service Center. University of Connecticut students served as interns each semester as part of their child development studies.

Whether it's children's theater, nature walks, cooking classes, "touch me" displays, scholarships, student involvement or family field trips, thanks to you it's working.

Tonight's meeting last of term for current Board of Directors

Tonight's meeting of the Manchester Board of Directors will be the last for 1975-76, unless something unforeseen develops and a special meeting is called before the Nov. 4 elections.
On that day, the voters will elect a board which will be sworn in Nov. 17 and will serve for the next two years. Its first regular meeting for 1975-76 is expected to be the next night, Nov. 18.
Whatever directors are elected Nov. 4 and whatever the majority party, the new board is certain to have a minimum of six incumbents and a maximum of nine. Each party has six candidates for the 9-member board and all but three will be elected. All of the incumbents (six Democrats and three Republicans) are candidates for election.
The board presently consists of six directors elected in November 1973 and three named to fill vacancies created by resignations.
Matt Martonyi Jr. replaced Anthony Pietranzoni. Jack Goldberg replaced John Tani and Paul Willhide replaced

Hillery Gallagher. All but Willhide and Gallagher are Democrats.
Among the actions to be considered tonight is sanitary sewer assessments against benefiting property owners on Erie St., Garden Grove Rd. and part of Kenney St.
The board has indicated it will honor promises by the administration to defer assessments against some of the properties, even though the Democratic majority has adopted a policy opposed to the practice.
The Democrats have said the action will not constitute a precedent and is being taken only because the property owners accepted the administration's promises in good faith.
Also tonight, the board will conduct a public hearing and will take action on a proposed \$70,000 appropriation for sanitary sewers on Love Lane, where the town is the largest property owner and will assume the greater part of the assessment.
In other actions, the board is expected to approve a \$189,666 appropriation for a

model records and management information center in the police department. The pilot program is believed to be the first of its kind in the nation.
It would be financed by a \$150,000 federal grant, an \$8,333 state grant and an \$11,333 town contribution. Estimates are it would cost the town \$100,000 to \$200,000 annually to maintain.
Among the several other actions to be considered tonight are: Appropriating \$7,500 to construct a horseshoe connecting road on Case Mt., accepting a scoreboard at Robertson Park, a gift from Sam Crispino; approving an agreement with Manchester Community College for a department; adopting an ordinance for job classifications and pay scales for 10 former employees of the Manchester Water Co., now employees of the town water department; adopting an ordinance for training grant for a police dispatcher with 50 per cent of the salary paid by the grant and 50 per cent by the town.

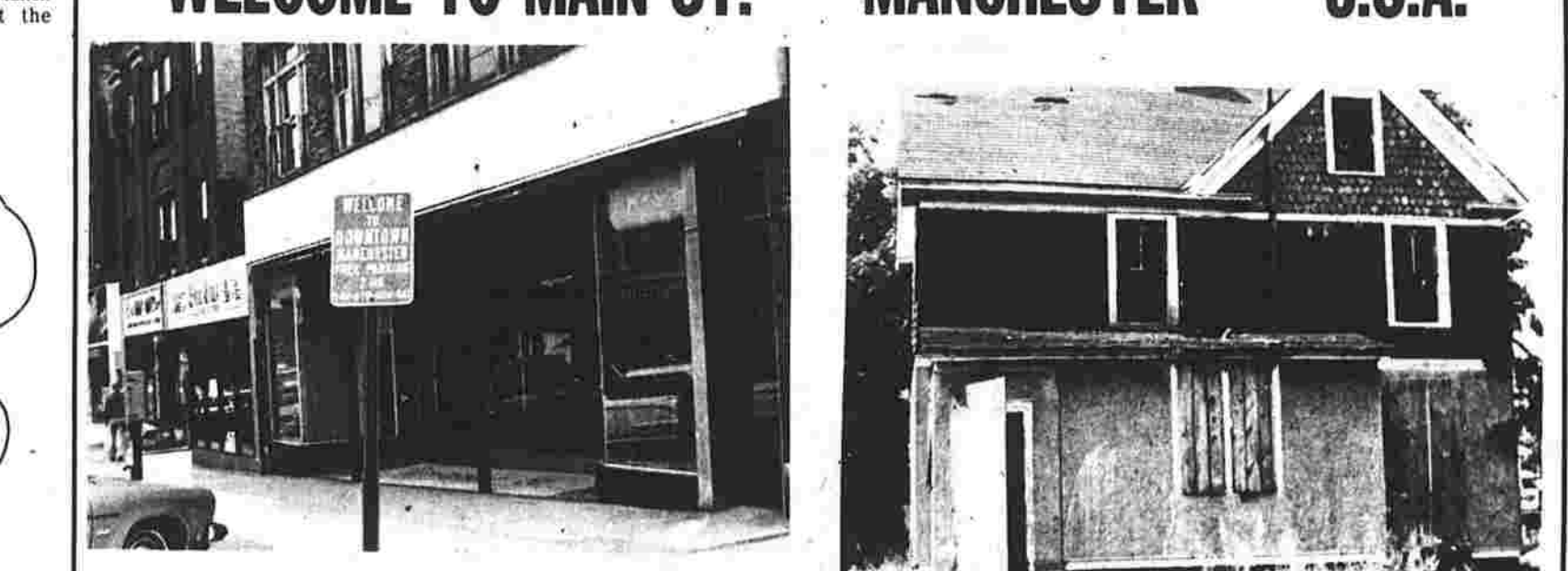

The curious double standard the democracies of Europe for some reason are in the habit of employing when it comes to judging the behavior of socialist and non-socialist governments, has seldom been as glaringly obvious as it has in the case of Spain of late.

totalitarianism of the Communist system at its most benevolent. Yet in their zeal to see Europe rid of its last non-Communist dictatorship, Western leaders are calling for a visitation of chaos upon Spain from which only the Communists will benefit.

The execution by the Franco government of five convicted terrorists, despite appeals for mercy from everybody from the Pope to prime ministers and presidents, set off a wave of outrage throughout Europe. Diplomats were called home, economic sanctions were threatened.

What barbarism against those whose only crime has been to blow up, shoot and otherwise dispatch more than 50 policemen and civilians in Spain so far this year. The only people outraged by the murders themselves seem to be the Spaniards.

Francisco Franco, of course, is an old fool who either believes the Almighty has suspended the laws of nature on his behalf or is too senile to realize that he is providing history with another example of "after me, the deluge."

Tyrant that he may be, however, for the ordinary Spaniard, life under Franco at his most despotic has been infinitely freer than that of the ordinary Russian under the absolute

Politics never lie, truth fades away

WASHINGTON - Two years ago this autumn Gerald Ford presented himself to the public trust in much the same way as in this town do, by dissembling. Pressed as to whether he would use his unselected elevation to the vice presidency as a vehicle to even higher reaches, Ford assured a concerned Congress and bemused nation he had "no intention of seeking public office in 1976," and could "foresee no circumstances where I would change my mind."

Chile, and Nelson Rockefeller shabbily tells southern politicians he's from their club. Actually, Watergate created naught but the illusion of a new Washington morality. Everybody's for honesty, even more than ever, but nobody's for it enough to bring it about. The only meaningful proposal in Congress, for instance, the Watergate Reorganization Act, a bill, that among other things, outlaws government lying, still languishes.

Watergate, it was thought, would change all this deception. Moralists have for months agreed with Rep. Donald Fraser (D-Minn.) who believes the day has ended when society penalizes people for lying to their government but not vice versa. Yet that day has not ended, the sun is still high on official fabrication. To paraphrase Oliver Wendell Holmes, a remains the handle to fit all political sins.

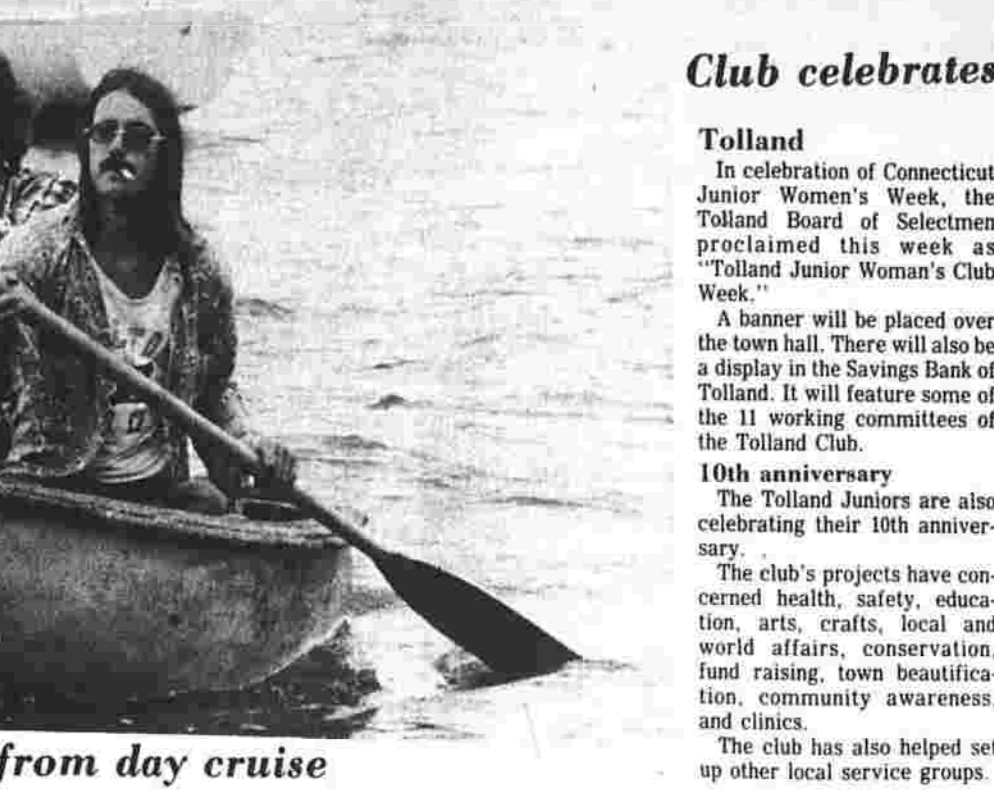

VITAMIN C versus the cold Virus NEW EVIDENCE

A group of Biochemists* exposed a set of human cell cultures with one of the common cold viruses, rhinovirus serotype, 20(RV-20). While the virus colonies kept growing and increasing in number the Vitamin-C treatment was kept up. Although the Vitamin-D did not affect the beginning growth of the virus colonies, it did, thereafter, SUPPRESS the virus's ability to increase in number. His controversial conclusions were that Vitamin-C acts to stop colds or infections by increasing the body's own ability to fight, and also, increasing the adrenal glands ability to withstand the stress of infection. In addition, the literature points out evidence that Vitamin-C increases the energy level of the white blood cells, which are the bodies main line of defense. The amount of Vitamin-C a person needs is dependent upon the metabolic demand of that individual. People who are under a great deal of physical and psychological stress may need more than a sedentary person. A person who does not have a well balanced diet, drinks alcohol, and smokes a great deal, may need more than a person who does not abuse his body. Recent reports show that when an individual takes aspirin while having a cold, it depletes the Vitamin-C in the body. One might feel better, but the valuable Vitamin-C may be destroyed. However, a word of warning! Reports have shown that very high dose of Vitamin-C may cause diarrhea. Diabetics should take Vitamin-C with caution because reports have shown further destruction of beta cells in their islets of Langerhans, which manufactures insulin. High doses may also increase the blood pressure of persons who already suffer from High Blood pressure. If you are suffering from any type of ailment, consult your physician first before taking any other type of Vitamins. 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Cathy Dyak captures fifth duckpin crown as No.1 high average bowler in United States

Five times in the past decade, the No. 1 high average duckpin bowler in the United States is Cathy Dyak of Manchester.

Averages, released by the National Duckpin Bowling Congress, show the local grandmother and housewife at the top of the list with the highest average ever posted by a woman small pinner.

Mrs. Dyak averaged 133.253 for 689 sanctioned games. Thus, for every three games rolled, she averaged less than one pin under 400 - the goal of all duckpinners, male and female.

"I'm really, really happy," an overjoyed Mrs. Dyak said when official word was received of her latest accomplishment.

"I'm happy about winning and also happy with the highest average ever posted by a woman small pinner."

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It's been a four-year wait for the Baltimore-born woman who has resided in Manchester a dozen years to regain the No. 1 ranking.

In addition to heading the averages, Mrs. Dyak has been named Bowler-of-the-Year among the 170 eligible members of the Women's Pro Tour.

Mrs. Dyak first ranked No. 1 for her efforts during the 1965-66 season with a 129.332 average. She repeated the next season with 129.398 and after slipping

back to second place in 1967-68, regained the title in 1968-69 on the strength of a

130.242 average. The fourth crown was achieved in 1970-71 with 129.242.

A member of the NDBC

Women's Division Hall of Fame since 1968, Mrs. Dyak credits her success to her husband and coach, Steve Dyak. The latter for a number of years ranked with the top duckpinners in the country.

"My husband is my coach. He's really responsible for my success. He tells me what to do and how to do it. I take his advice and have been very successful," she noted.

Holder from time to time of several world records, the local woman started

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Saints come on strong to trim Eagles, 41-8

When the Saints came marching in it would've been an appropriate tune to play yesterday morning at Mt. Nebo.

The St. Bernard Saints after falling behind for the first time this season, 8-6, got their offense rolling in high gear and took advantage of four East Catholic fumbles to roll to a 41-8 romp over the Eagles in HCC football action.

With the victory, the Uncasville-based club remained unbeaten at 5-0, 3-0 in the HCC, and most likely will move up in unofficial state polls. East drops to 3-3 over-all and 0-2 in the conference.

Senior quarterback Mike Lindsey started for St. Bernard completing 10 of 15 passes for 181 yards and two touchdowns and also tallied two six-pointers on runs of 29 and five yards. Junior Sam Popinchak was on the receiving end of both touchdown aeriels covering

11 and five yards. Heralded wide receiver Arnie Pinkston did his thing catching five tosses for 93 yards.

Aided by a holding call against the Eagles, St. Bernard took a 6-0 lead midway through a lengthy first quarter on Lindsey's 11-yard touchdown pass to Sam Popinchak.

The Saints were marching again but Jim Hyman lost the handle and Ed Sedzski fell on the loose pigskin in East's own 10-yard stripe.

From this field position, East sustained a drive exclusively on the ground with Cephus Nolen who rushed for 94 yards on 16 carries, capping it off with a 25-yard gallop around left end. Signal-caller Mike

Furlong dove over for the two-point conversion and an 8-6 advantage at the start of the second canto.

That lead didn't last long as the Saints struck for two touchdowns just before the halftime gun. A Cephus Nolen option pass was skyjacked by Jim Hockensmith and returned 15 yards to the East 29. On the following play Lindsey, who had to come out for two plays earlier after being gang tackled, ripped right up the middle for the score. Placeholder John Mooney raised up and hit an unmolested Popinchak for a two-point conversion.

Immediately after, a Kevin Shorey punt was blocked giving St. Bernard the ball at the East 12 and four plays later Lindsey teamed with Popinchak for a TD.

The steam went out of the Eagles in the second half and the Saints resorted to their running game with Bill Hunter, who totaled 71 yards on 14 carries, doing most of

the work. Hunter capped off a 50-yard march with a one-yard plunge to give the visitors a 27-8 lead. Hyman and Lindsey completed the scoring with runs of nine and five yards. The Saints' fifth touchdown was set up by a fumble and aided by a personal foul call against the Eagles, who ran up 75 yards in penalties.

"We thought St. Bernard was good but we made them look better than they are," East Coach John LaFontana stated. "We're not that bad of a club but lack of concentration hurts. After awhile, it gets frustrating. We're better than we showed."

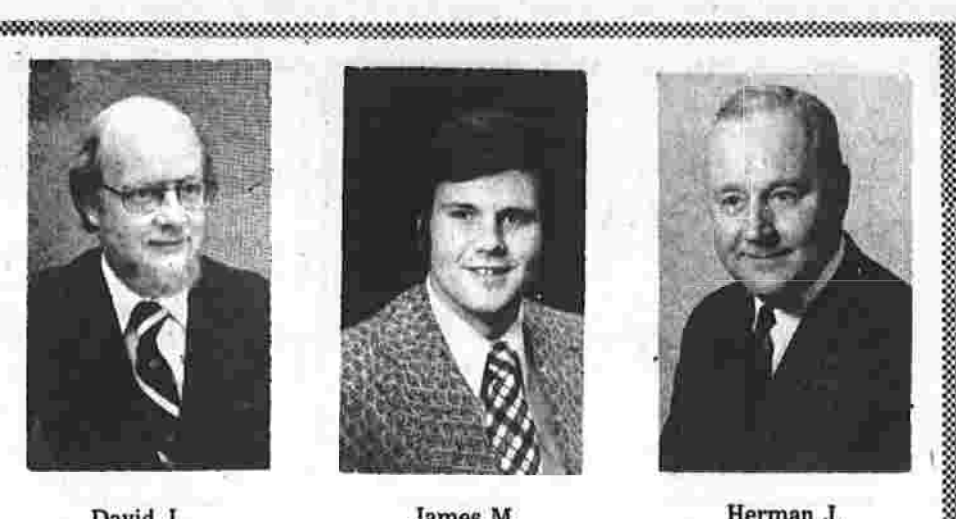

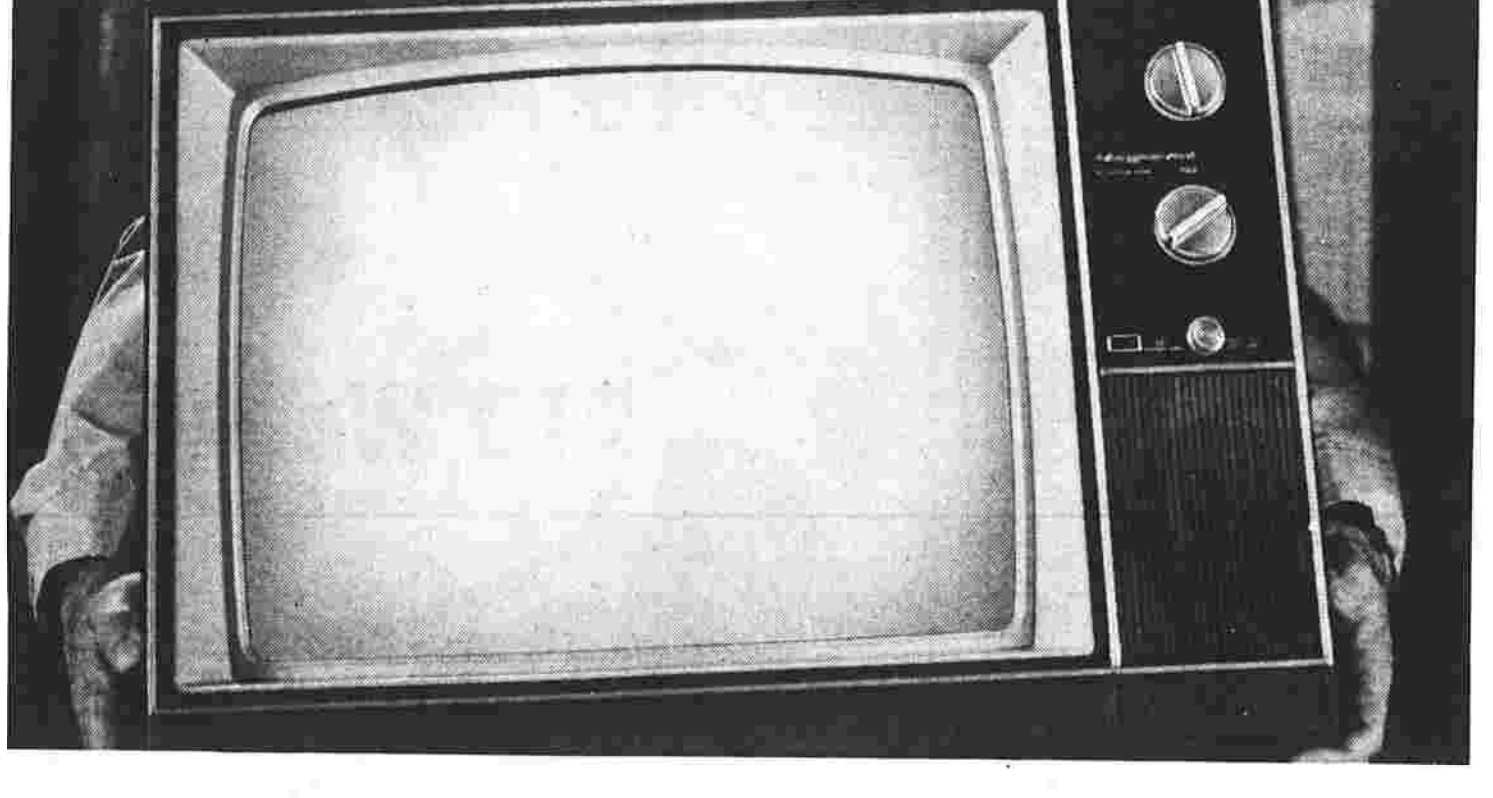

Consumer Measures Explained

By State Department of Consumer Protection
Several new laws concerning consumerism, all passed by the last General Assembly session, became effective Oct. 1. Among those which have some special significance to consumers are laws which:
• Abolish the so-called "fair trade laws" which allowed manufacturers to prevent retailers from selling certain products at lower prices.
• Allow drug stores to advertise the prices of prescription drugs.
• Require drug stores to post the prices of the 100 most commonly prescribed drugs. The Consumer Protection Department must establish regulations for these prices posted.
• Prohibit food stores from increasing the prices of products while on store shelves.
• Require products marked with new "universal price codes," which are designed to be read by a computer, to be marked with numerical prices as well. Regulations for enforcement of this law must be established by the Consumer Protection Department.
• A few other laws, added to the statutes on Oct. 1, and which are enforced by agencies other than the Consumer Protection Department:
• Require automobile repair shops to give customers written estimates on demand.
• Prohibit credit discrimination on account of age and housing discrimination on account of age except in cases of rental housing.
• Require a double payment from landlords who withhold security deposits after a tenant moves out.
