

# Survivor describes ordeal

KEY WEST, Fla. (UPI) — Thomas Gibbons took a bite from the seagull he had captured, his first taste of food in nearly three days, and "decided I was not that hungry yet."

The 22-year-old Gibbons told the story Thursday of how he survived, clinging to a tossing sea buoy, after his 37-foot wooden boat *Diana* sank in rough seas Sunday. A Coast Guard search for a Key West couple who set out with Gibbons on the fishing trip to Fort Jefferson in the Dry Tortugas was suspended late Thursday.

Gibbons, who was rescued Wednesday by a shrimp fishing boat, said the *Diana* was struck by six-foot-high waves about 3 a.m. Sunday and sank in a matter of minutes about four miles from Fort Jefferson.

He said he grabbed a life jacket, flashlight and an automobile inner tube

and jumped into the water. His companions, Russ and Dorothy Corwin, jumped in without anything, Gibbons said, and he threw them the inner tube.

"We tried to swim for the current," Gibbons said, but rough seas and forts hampered them and they still were about three miles away at daybreak. Attempts to hold on to lobster traps failed because the waves ripped the traps from their anchors.

"I could see we didn't stand a chance together," Gibbons said, so he told the Corwins about noon Sunday to hold onto a lobster trap while he tried to swim to the light house at Fort Jefferson. He said they told him they preferred to float free.

Currents continued to hamper his progress but Gibbons managed to reach a 30-foot-high marker buoy and he crawled

onto its five-foot-wide platform. He said he strapped himself to the platform with his belt at night to sleep.

For the next three days he survived on fresh water droplets which had condensed on the inside housing of the beacon. On Tuesday afternoon he strangled a seagull which alighted next to him and plucked it. "I was going to eat him," Gibbons said, "but I tasted a bite and it was bad enough that I decided I was not that hungry yet."

He said he saw at least four boats a day in sight of the buoy, some of which came close and ignored his frantic waving and jumping to be discovered.

"I heard one guy on a boat say he thought I was a bird," Gibbons said. But he added, "I never did give up hope. I knew that sooner or later somebody would see me."

# Nobel work aids research

MADISON, Wis. (UPI) — The University of Wisconsin professor who won the Nobel prize for medicine Thursday said his research has not shown the cause of human cancer but has given other researchers a lead in tracking it down.

Dr. Howard M. Temin said the virus in the chicken leukemia is a member of the same family as the virus that causes cancer in humans. But he said his work should show other scientists they should look at chemicals such as asbestos and cigarette nicotine as major causes of human cancer.

Temin, 41, shared the Nobel award for physiology and medicine with Dr. David Baltimore of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and Renato Dulbecco of the

Imperial Cancer Research Laboratory in London. Temin was cited for his study of how viruses interact with genes in cells.

Temin, a professor of oncology at the University of Wisconsin in Madison, said his research and that of Baltimore and Dulbecco "has enabled workers, especially at the National Cancer Institute and elsewhere, to ask whether viruses like the rous sarcoma virus exist in human cancer."

Temin suggested the government increase its control of substances such as asbestos and discourage people from smoking.

An American and two Danes were selected to receive the Nobel Prize for Physics today for fundamental discoveries they made in the 1950s on the nature of the atomic nucleus.

The Physics award, worth \$145,000, will be shared by James Rainwater, 58, of Columbia University in New York and by Danes Aage Bohr, 53, and Ben Mottelson, 49, a one-time American who became a Danish citizen in 1973.

Bohr is the son of Niels Bohr, winner of the 1922 Nobel Physics Prize for his "investigation of the structure of atoms and the radiation emanating from them."

The elder Bohr received his award the same year Albert Einstein was awarded the 1921 Physics prize which had been held up for a year.

The Nobel Prize for Chemistry was being announced later today.

# Young driver talks to Ford

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Ford picked up his Oval Office phone Thursday and asked the young driver of the car that crashed into his limousine how he was feeling.

"I'm not hurt, but I'm pretty nervous," replied James Salamites, of Meriden, Conn., the 19-year-old sheet metal and roofing worker, who drove the 1967 Buick that collided with Ford's eight-ton, \$500,000 armored limousine in Hartford Tuesday.

"You shouldn't be nervous," said the President. "Thank you for being such a fine young man in the way you handled it."

Salamites asked how the President was feeling.

"I feel fine," Ford said. "It was kind of a jolt, but there were no body injuries." But the crash, he said, "shook the old bones."

# Lead found in baby foods

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Food and Drug Administration is studying hazardous levels of lead are showing up in canned baby food.

Lead poisoning can cause brain damage and other problems, particularly in children. Lead in canned foods could come from the solder or other metal in the can. In addition, the agency said it found that

"lead levels in some adult canned foods are undetectably high from a long-range public health perspective."

The FDA said it will focus on getting the levels of the poisonous metal in canned baby and infant food curbed and also will seek reductions of lead levels in adult foods frequently eaten by children.

The agency announced the results of a survey it made of 2,900 samples of 41 different foods produced during 1972.

"Of the (canned) baby foods, orange juice had the highest mean lead level. Next in order in the baby foods were apple juice, applesauce and baby food with peaches, vegetables and beef, and mixed vegetables, had the lowest means."

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# Over 40? Avoid pill!

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Food and Drug Administration plans to tell women over 40 to avoid birth control pills.

The FDA said Thursday it has drafted warning labels for birth control pills which will inform users that sex hormones in the pill can cause birth defects such as stunted limbs and malformed hearts.

About 10 million women in America use the pills. The new warnings, if approved, will tell women who take them they face an increased risk of suffering fatal and nonfatal heart attacks.

Women over 40 years old increase chances of blood clots and strokes if they use the pills, the FDA said.

Women who wish to stop taking the pill and become pregnant will be advised to wait at least three months because "studies show there is a possible increased risk of spontaneous abortion in women who

# Syrians reject negotiations similar to Sinai accord

Syrian President Hafez Assad today criticized the recently concluded Sinai accord between Egypt and Israel, saying it called an unprecedented deal in world history.

Assad, in an interview with the Kuwait newspaper Al Rai Al Aam, rejected negotiations over the fate of occupied Arab lands.

"Syria has been asked, and will be asked to enter into negotiations similar to the one in which Cairo was involved, but we utterly refuse to lead on a course similar to the Sinai agreement," Assad said.

The Sinai accord was "an unprecedented deal in world history, whereby an agreement is signed by two countries at war while the territory of one is still under occupation," Assad said.

"It's heart-breaking to see what's going on in the dark or semi-dark around the Arab homeland."

The Syrian leader also criticized Egypt's anti-Soviet campaign and said its purpose was the "isolation of the Syrian-Palestinian attitude under the pretense of nonexistence Communism."

Commenting on his recent visit to the Soviet Union and talks with Kremlin leaders, Assad said the Soviets "exhibited their readiness to back our just and legitimate struggle for the liberation of the occupied lands."

Referring to the presence of United Nations forces on the Golan Heights — whose mandate expires Nov. 30 — Assad said "they do not constitute a problem

# Federal housing subsidy for workers announced

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The newly announced federal housing program is designed to help working people become homeowners by subsidizing part of the burden of their monthly mortgage.

"These are people who could enter home ownership, but cannot because of the economy," Housing Secretary Carla Hillis said Friday.

The program, to begin early next year, is aimed at Americans earning \$9,000 to \$11,000 a year, an income that until now was neither high enough to buy a median priced home nor low enough to qualify for housing subsidies.

The feature of the program is the subsidized interest rate. When the buyer defaulted, but details were rare and by the late 1960s, more than half the nation's homeowners had received aid from FHA or its counterpart program for veterans.

Not only did FHA help create the world's highest level of home ownership, but it made money for the federal treasury.

Following the riots and inner city turmoil of the 1960s, the Johnson administration tapped FHA to develop housing programs for the poor. One of these plans was "Section 235," under which low income Americans got their own homes with 1 per cent mortgages provided they had a \$200 downpayment.

But of the \$50,000 subsidized homeowners more than 10 per cent have already defaulted, others are struggling and the whole subsidy concept fell into disrepute during the past five years.

Federal and private housing officials agree the program for the poor failed because the buyers had so little invested that they could simply walk away from the house when problems arose.

# New York City avoids fiscal default; but faces new crisis in six weeks

NEW YORK (UPI) — For more than 13 hours financial collapse for New York City seemed unavoidable.

But in the end it was just another of those dramatic rescues city officials and residents are rapidly becoming accustomed to. And, in another month and a half, New York may have to go through it all over again.

That is, unless the Congress steps in to help soon.

House Majority Leader Thomas P. O'Neill Jr., D-Mass., was quoted by the Boston Globe today as saying he expects Congress to pass legislation within a few weeks to aid New York.

He said he expects the move after congressmen realize a default by the city would eventually affect their home districts as well.

"I feel we have to save the city of New York. We can't let the financial center of the nation go down," O'Neill was quoted as saying.

The latest default threat was avoided Friday when trustees for the teachers' pension fund finally agreed to contribute \$150 million to a \$2.3 billion state bailout plan to keep the city solvent through Dec. 1.

The trustees earlier had voted against investment, prompting frantic phone calls by city officials to the White House, Treasury Department and Federal Reserve Board to find some way of meeting \$477 million in obligations falling due.

City officials began drafting default contingency plans, noteholders queued up anxiously at the City Comptroller's office to learn the status of their maturing securities and the Sanitation Department temporarily halted issuance of payroll checks.

However, shortly after 2 p.m. — just two hours before Mayor Beane was scheduled to proclaim default — United Federation of Teachers President Albert Shanker announced the decision to make the funds available.

The impact on the financial community was immediate. The stock market, which had dipped nearly 10 points earlier, turned sharply upwards to within one point of even.

In June, city officials made a last-minute dash to the banks to deposit real estate taxes which property owners refused to prepay so the city could meet its bills. Two months later, the city again had to scramble to cover its debts.

The latest move, however, gives Mayor Abraham Beame little maneuvering room. More debts fall due Dec. 1.

"We can't live in this continual crisis," said Beane. "The federal government must recognize its responsibility."

The city called on President Ford Friday for financial help, but administration spokesman Ron Nesson said: "The President's reaction is that he feels New York City and New York State has the means to live up to the financial mess ... and to live within the city's means for a change."

Gov. Hugh Carey told a news conference Friday he sent a telegram to Ford, telling him: "By exhausting all of its resources, New York can meet its obligations until Dec. 1. After then the welfare of our citizens rests in the hands of our federal government. I seek your cooperation and leadership."

For's stand that the federal government would not come to the city's aid, Carey said "we need not a bailout, not a handout, but some recognition by the federal government that property owners are not responsible for the city's fiscal crisis."

# Officials give views on NYC aid

HARTFORD (UPI) — David Grossman, former New York City budget director, says the use of \$150 million in teacher pension funds to avoid default is only a temporary measure and the answer is massive federal aid.

But, John K. Parker, acting director of the U.S. Office of Revenue Sharing, said that if the city had defaulted, "the impact upon the rest of the country could be from devastating to catastrophic. Choose your own adjectives."

President Ford wants to continue revenue sharing, he said, but not to expand it.

Grossman, who served under John V. Lindsay, a Republican, said officials of Connecticut cities and towns complain about the same basic problems that have brought New York City to the brink of disaster.

State and federal government, he said, have mandated programs for welfare and health care, Medicaid, schools, jails and courts, costing New York City hundreds of millions of dollars.

"Welfare is a national problem, a problem that New York City did not create," he said.

## Ella blamed for rating

HARTFORD (UPI) — House Minority Leader Gerald F. Stevens, R-Milford, is blaming Gov. Ella T. Grasso, a Democrat, for Connecticut's drop in credit rating.

"Mrs. Grasso cannot escape responsibility for the actions taken since this January that raise serious questions about the fiscal stability of the state," Stevens said Friday.

Moody's Investor Service dropped the state's rating from triple-A to double-A, an action Mrs. Grasso attributed to New York City's financial difficulties.

The governor said she has taken extraordinary measures to reduce state spending by holding Connecticut to the smallest budget increase in a decade and reducing the work force by 1,100.

Stevens, however, criticized the governor for dipping into the state employee retirement fund payment to provide workers with a pay increase.

"This practice did not go unnoticed by credit rating agencies," Stevens said.

Stevens said the Republican

legislative minority warned during debate that the state's credit rating would be adversely affected by taking \$5.6 million out of the state's contribution to the retirement fund. The payment was part of a plan to bring the fund's assets closer to its retirement liabilities.

"If Connecticut's obligations cannot be met from general revenues, then expenditures must be reduced to match tax revenues that are available," Stevens said. "We cannot spend more than we take in."

The use of the pension money, he said, shows Connecticut was unable to meet expenses from revenues.

Standard and Poor's, the other major rating service, dropped the state's rating earlier this year.

"Our credit rating has been dropped now by both major credit rating agencies, and our already overtaxed Connecticut residents will now pay many thousands of dollars in additional interest over the next year," Stevens said.

## Indictments charge five in embezzling conspiracy

HARTFORD (UPI) — Five men connected to the East Hartford Housing Authority and a South Windsor pharmacist have been named in a 63 count indictment for conspiring to embezzle federal funds.

A federal grand jury returned the indictment Friday after listening to three days of testimony from an FBI probe involving an estimated \$100,000 in misappropriated state and federal funds.

Named in the indictment

were former authority director Stanley A. Ozimek, 66; acting director John C. Somers Jr., 35; former form Michael A. Serignese, 61; former maintenance superintendent Joseph N. Giannetti, 65; and a maintenance employee, William D. Perkins Jr., 40, all of East Hartford; and pharmacist Richard Ptachinski, 43, of South Windsor.

Asst. U.S. Thomas P. Smith said the FBI investigation, aided by local and state police,

is not complete. He said Ptachinski was charged with cashing checks misappropriated from the housing authority.

Smith said Ozimek and his employees were involved in a multi-faceted, phony billing scheme which required Ptachinski to cash some checks.

Maximum penalties of five to 10 years in prison or \$5,000 to \$10,000 fines, or both are attached to each count.

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**Stamps and coins**

At the left are 10-and 50-pence coins currently in use in Great Britain. The seven sides of the larger value piece help to prevent mix-ups.

Next in line is a nice square 1957 five-naye-paise (nye-a pye-sa) from India with its three watchful beausties on guard.

Then the real handful, a 100-mon brass coin from Japan. The date is not evident, but it first appeared, with the same characters, in 1837.

The other holed coin, with its bunch of draped grapes, is an aluminum 10-lepta from Greece, dated 1959.

The walking elephant in the hexagon (no political reference intended) is a 1943 copper piece, two francs, inscribed on the back "Banque Du Congo Belge." (Belgian Congo). It is one of the many foreign coins that were minted at Philadelphia.

Finally, there is the piecrust item, crescent moon and swirls, which is a 1961 10-pice coin in nickel-brass from the Government of Pakistan.

These are shown to give an idea of the variety that can be expected in a collection of inexpensive foreign coins.

A first prize exhibit in this class was shown by Mrs. Lucy Spector at the recent CCCCUB competition. It was an almost complete alphabet (Australia,

Belgium China...) of foreign coins together with a flag from each nation. (Will anyone in possession of something from Xeimappa please come forward.)

**Back at the ranch**

Meanwhile back at the ranch in Washington D.C., they are fending off phone calls from excited people with 1943 zinc pennies, hoping they have the experimental aluminum cents "lost or misplaced" by certain congressmen. ("By George, I don't know what became of that thing!")

The value of the 13 missing coins is estimated at \$35,000 each and it has been proposed to dilute this a bit by running off 100 million more. (This-kind of thinking gave us a lot of Ham-marskjold invert stamps—they kept the presses going and going "to satisfy the demand".)

**13-cent coming**

It seems to be really getting here—the 13-cent postage rate. Linn's has a picture of a Liberty Bell stamp of that value slated for release in booklet format on the 31st of this month at the convention of the Society of Philatelic Americans in Cleveland. Then on Nov. 15, at the SEPAD in Philly (Southeastern Pennsylvania and Delaware clubs) we will get a 13-cent, 13-star flag in coil and sheet form.

Both of the above stamps are to be squarish in shape.

And don't go 'way — actually all through November our

heads will be swimming with new issues: A three-cent coil, a Liberty Tree 13-cent stamped envelope, a nine-cent postal card, an 11-cent Freedom of Press stamp, a 24-cent Old North Church, a 13-star flag, a nine-cent Freedom to assemble, a Liberty Bell coil — which brings us to the 25th of the month.

Then draw a breath and get ready for the 13-cent American Eagle and Shield with its First Day at Juneau, Alaska, on Dec. 1. Whew!

The names of the Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee are given in Linn's, all 14 of them (Oct. 6, p. 3). Familiar ones: Ernest Borgnine (new) and Jamie Wyeth (a holdover). Let's hope they have a better year.

More zesty little post offices rubbed out — this time down in the Virginias — we will lose both Tetotum and Rangoon.

**A cool cover**

Far-off covers may henceforth be obtained from a new Antarctica branch of the USPS. The postmarks will read, "So. Pole Br. New York, NY 10090."

This facility was established Oct. 1 to provide "mail service to the geographic South Pole, some 800 nautical miles from the main U.S. station at McMurdo Sound." See p. 683 of "Stamps" mag for the way to get yourself a cool cover.

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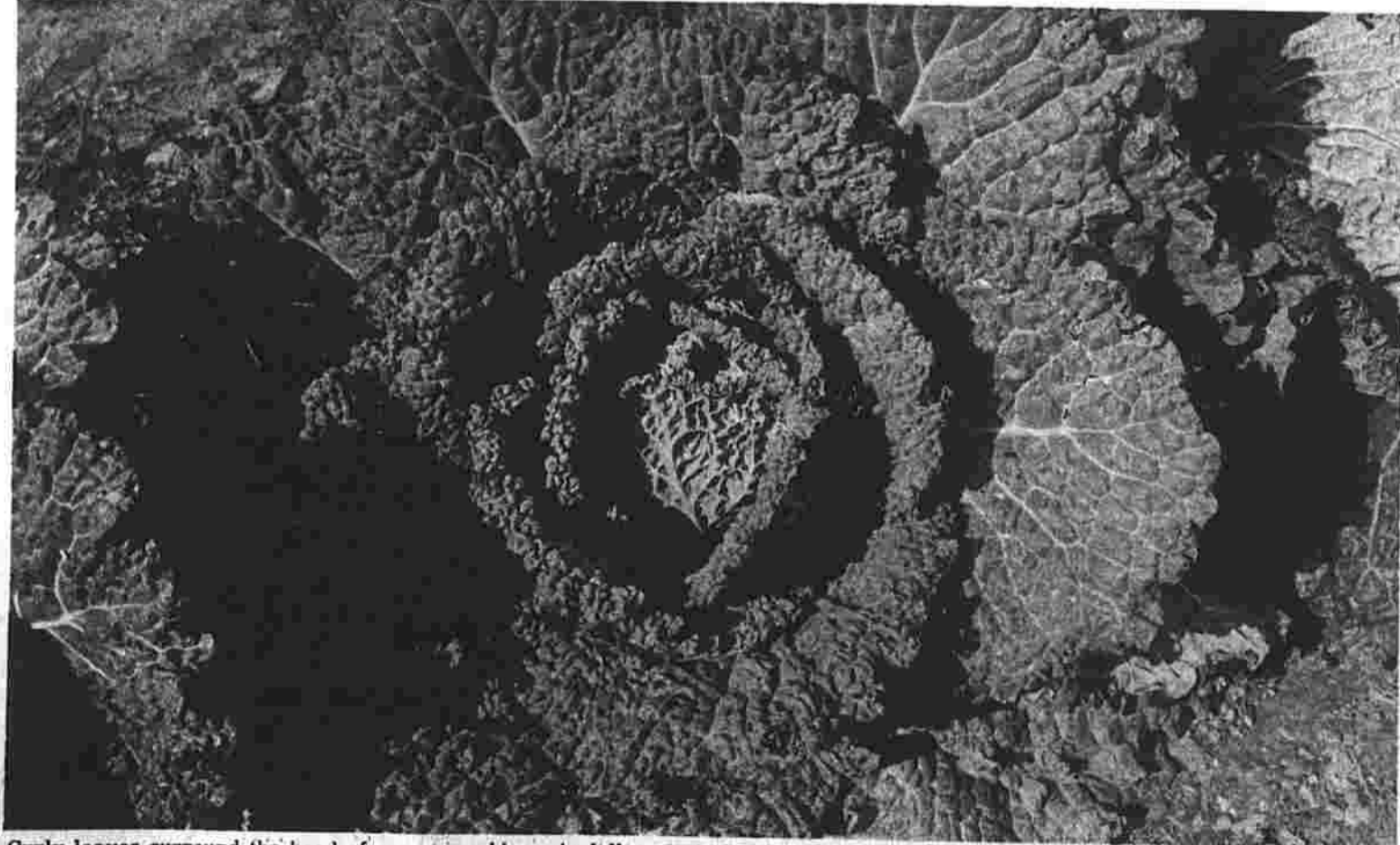

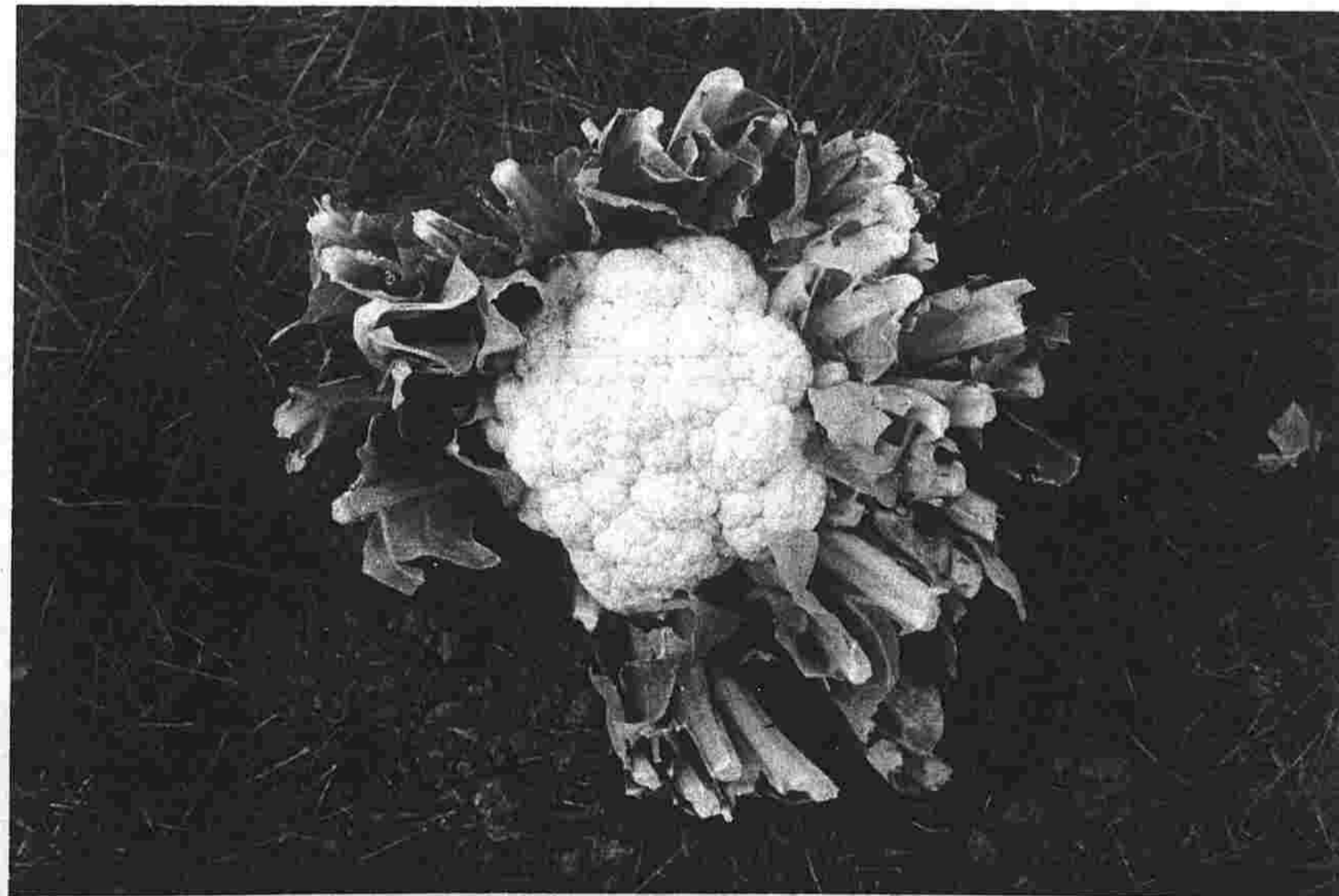

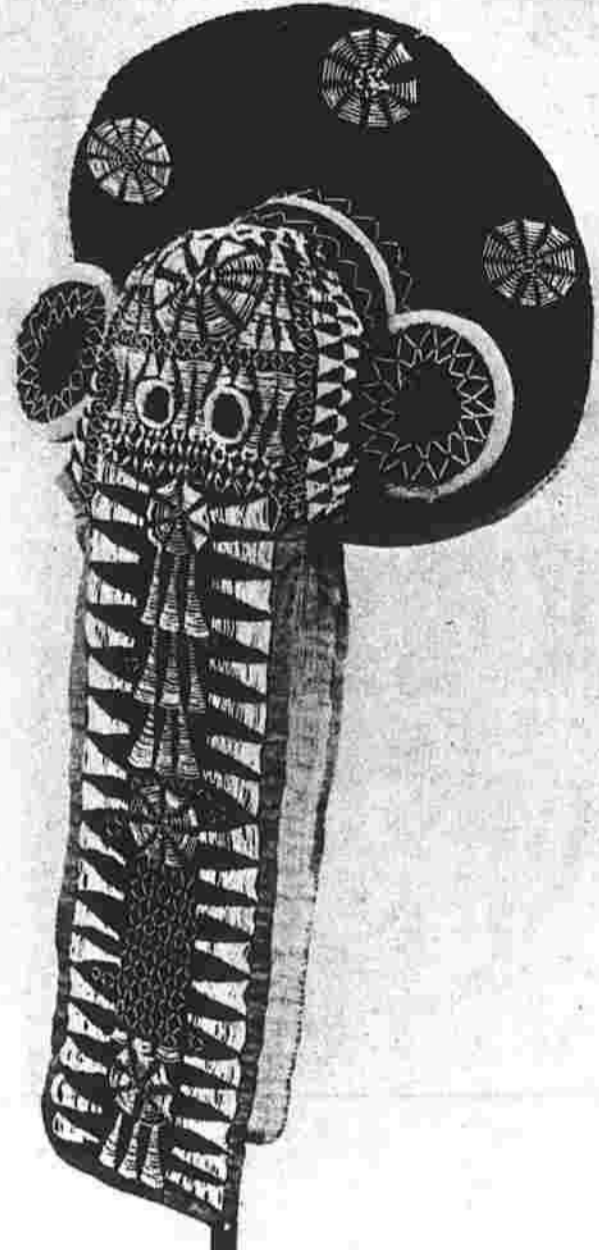

## UConn museum shows African beaded art

The largest exhibition of African beaded art from Cameroon ever displayed on this side of the Atlantic Ocean has opened at the William Benton Museum of Art at the University of Connecticut, Storrs.

The exhibition, "The Sign of the Leopard: Beaded Art of Cameroon," will be on view until Dec. 20. (The museum will be closed Nov. 26 to 30.)

It was organized by visiting curator Tamara Northern, generally regarded a leading American scholar in this realm of African art, who brought together a successful exhibition of the "Royal Art of Cameroon" at Dartmouth two years ago.

The Benton exhibition features 150 items, including 15 elephant masks, which make up the core of the exhibition, plus assorted headgear, personal adornments, bowls, swords, gongs, thrones, stools and pipes. All of these elaborately glass-beaded objects served as status badges and displays in the highly stratified monarchical culture of Cameroon as it existed when Europeans first

penetrated the area at the turn of this century.

Most of the objects in the exhibition were loaned by the Linden-Museum in Stuttgart, Germany, which has the largest Cameroon collection in Europe. The Benton show represents the largest transatlantic art loan of its kind. Most of these items have not been publicly displayed before either in this country or Europe.

All the items illustrate the state of the arts in the grassland country snuggled in the Atlantic elbow of Africa before German explorers opened the country up to a period of Western colonialism and artistic influence.

The 50 newly reproduced photographs accompanying the exhibition, made from negatives lent by the Evangelical Missionary Society of Basel, Switzerland, were taken at about the time the objects on display were collected, and show many of them in actual use.

The Benton Museum is open free to the public Monday through Saturday from 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and Sunday from 1 to 5 p.m.

## One fourth of new shows getting ready to bow out

NEW YORK (UPI) — A quarter of the 27 shows to bow out of network television this season are ready to bow out, with "Big Eddie" the latest to hit the dust by mid-November.

NBC already has given up on four of its hopefuls, while CBS has canceled two so far.

ABC has canceled nothing, although it is switching time periods on two of its very low rated shows — "Barbary Coast" will be moved to Friday night at 8 while "Mobile One" proves its mobility by going over to Monday night.

If the networks were to be characterized on their actions this season, NBC would be the one quick to cut its losses, perhaps too quick, according to some of its critics.

CBS has taken a middle of the road policy, holding on grimly trying to establish its very expensive "Beacon Hill" and its wobbly "Joe & Sons" and "Three for the Road."

ABC sits with what a network spokesman described as "our Mona Lisa grin," and insists it is committed for 13 weeks on all its shows except Howard Cosell, who has a 20-week contract. The network spokesman insists ABC will stick by its obligations, although the Cosell show is doing abysmally.

"An average of about one out of every three new television shows make the grade, and eventually we won't be that far off," said Marvin Antonovsky, NBC vice president, programs.

NBC has canceled four of its eight new shows, or, since two of them were half-hour formats, three out of seven hours of new programming.

While he has been accused of being too quick on the trigger, few of Antonovsky's critics were referring to the demise of "The Montefuscos" or "The Invisible Man." "Fay" and "Family Holvak" are another matter, and actress Lee Grant referred to Antonovsky on the "Tonight" show as "the mad programmer" for canceling her "Fay."

"Holvak" was a big disappointment to me," Antonovsky said. "Holvak" was very well done. Maybe the public has had its fill of nostalgia type shows."

"As for 'Fay,' we premiered it early to give it a chance, the audience saw it and rejected it. We are dealing with what the public wants to see. I like Lee Grant," he said. "How can you not like Lee Grant? I wish everything could go on forever, but it can't. They pay us to make these decisions."

One of the men they pay to make those same decisions over at CBS is Harvey Shephard, vice president, program planning. He said that so far "Big Eddie" and "Kate McShane" were the only definite cancellations. On "Three For the Road," he called the numbers disappointing.

"The Nielsen ratings come in very quickly," he said. "That's just one element. We fix on the over-all performance relative to the competition."

He said CBS likes to give a show about three months in which to succeed but "Kate McShane" never really got the tune-in. On top of that there was real erosion. "Canon," which comes on after, was building while she was decreasing — and

opposite 'Petrocelli, which was not a stellar performer last year."

"Big Eddie" not only has low ratings, but it may be dragging down "M-A-S-H," which follows it," Shephard said.

He said CBS had decided to keep "Beacon Hill" where it was instead of shifting it to Wednesday night because "if it's going to work, it should work where it is now." He confirmed that George Kennedy in "The Blue Knight" would replace "McShane" in late December.

Neither man argued with the theory that what sells today is comedy and cops.

"People want to laugh," Antonovsky said, "and what they read in the newspapers isn't very funny. As for cops, it's a life-and-death situation and all the cop or detective solves it all. That's a very simplistic way to put it, but I believe that's what goes on."

Sammy Davis Jr. will guest-star on an upcoming episode of CBS-TV's daytime serial, "Love of Life."

ABC will present a 90-minute special saluting Nashville's Grand Ole Opry and its 50th anniversary Nov. 11.
