# Washington made commander

Copyright 1975 American Antiquarian Society On June 10, 1775, John Adams of Massachusetts resolved in the Second Continental Congress that the militia gathered about Boston should be adopted by Congress as the Continental Army. At the same time Adams declared that he had but one man in mind for the important position of commander-in-chief, and that was "a gentleman from Virginia whose skill and experience as an officer...would command the approbation of all

George Washington, dressed in the buffand-blue uniform of a colonial in the Virginia militia, darted out of the room where the Congress was meeting in the Pennsylvania State House (called Independence Hall today) when he heard

Adams refer to him. The president of the Congress, John Hancock, evidently wanted the position or at least the refusal of it. Adams recorded in his diary that when he referred to the Virginia, Hancock's face darkened: "Mortification and resentment were expressed as forcibly as his face could exhibit them." But this was no time to worry about Hancock's vanity. Circumstances demanded that the best possible leader be

After some discussion and tavern politicking, Congress voted unanimously to make George Washington commander in-chief of the Continental Army. Washington seemed the best choice for several reasons. He had shown bravery and resourcefulness during campaigns of the French and Indian War; he was 43 years old and in vigorous health; he had been a champion of colonial rights; already wealthy, he would not enrich himself at public expense; and he was from the South.

fighting had been in the North, mostly in Massachusetts. And citizens of the Bay Colony had a reputation for rowdyism and trouble-making. Appointing the prominent Washington head of the colonial forces would help to unite the Americans in their struggle against the mother country. The "Father of His Country" surely did not possess all of the impossible virtues that 19th Century nationalists attributed to him. Not well-educated, nor self-taught like Franklin, Washington was, nevertheless, a man of considerable abilities. He was a very practical man who knew the value of land and money. Some

said the tall Virginian was not witty, but rather quiet and dull. Without question, though, he was devoted to the American cause and had a deep sense of responsibili-

Although George Washington was neither a Caesar nor a Napoleon on the battlefield he had great qualities as a leader of men. If he had faults as a strategist and tactician, he usually made the most of difficult conditions. His calmness and patience in the face of adversity were invaluable. Most important of all, his natural dignity inspired At the time of Washington's appoint-

ment Congress also named four major generals, partly on merit and partly to please different sections. Artemas Ward, already in charge of forces in Massachusetts, was an inevitable choice Charles Lee, although testy, irascible, and unpredictable, had had considerable experience in the British Army. Philip Schuyler of New York was named "to sweeten and keep up the spirit in that province," Eliphalet Dyer commented Israel Putnam of Connecticut, short in military training but long in courage and daring, was the fourthynajor general.

To the accomplishment of parading, martial music and other fanfare, Washington, Lee, and Schuyler began their journey to Massachusetts. As they left, John Adams, statesman and master of government, showed envy as he wrote to his wife, Abigail: "Such is the pride and pomp of war. I, poor creature, worn out with scribbling for my bread and my liberty, low in spirits and weak in health, must leave others to wear the laurels which I have sown; others to eat the bread which I

have earned, a common case." As they proceeded, Washington and his comrades were greeted warmly in every village. At New York there were deafening cheers and stirring music. News of the greeting accorded the American generals spread widely. The Virginia Gazette (July 15, 1775), for example, reported that the Provincial Congress of New York had expressed its confidence in Washington's "abilities and virtue" and declared that it had "the most flattering hopes of success in the glorious struggle

for American liberty." Mass., to take command of the troops, George Washington was received with great respect. The address of the Provincial Congress was printed in the New England Chronicle, Watertown, July 6, 1775; it expressed "the Sentiment of Gratitude of the People" and offered "to contribute all Aid in our Power, to the Cause of America, and your Happiness

HARTFORD (UPI) - House Minority Leader Gerald F. Stevens, R-Milford, is blaming Gov. Ella T. Grasso, a Democrat, for Connecticut's drop in credit rating.

'Mrs. Grasso cannot escape responsibility for the actions taken since this January that raise serious questions about the fiscal stablity of the state,' Stevens said Friday.

Moody's Investor Service dropped the state's rating from triple-A to double-A, an action Mrs. Grasso attributed to New York City's financial difficulties.

The governor said she has taken extraordinary measures to reduce state spending by holding Connecticut to the smallest budget increase in a decade and reducing the work force by 1,100. Stevens, however, criticized







NEW YORK (UPI) - A quarter of the 27 shows to bow onto network television this season are ready to bow out, with "Big Eddy" the latest to hit the dust by mid-November.

NBC already has given up on four of its hopefuls, while CBS has canceled two so far. ABC has canceled nothing,

although it is switching time periods on two of its very low rated shows - "Barbary Coast" will be moved to Friday night at 8 while "Mobile One" proves its mobility by going over to Monday night. If the networks were to be

characterized on their actions this season, NBC would be the one quick to cut its losses, perhaps too quick, according to some of its critics.

CBS has taken a middle of the road policy, holding on grimly trying to establish its very expensive "Beacon Hill" and its wobbly "Joe & Sons" and "Three for the Road."

ABC sits with what a network spokesman described as "our Mona Lisa grin," and insists it is committed for 13 weeks on all its shows except Howard Cosell, who has a 20-week contract. The network spokesman insists ABC will stick by its obligations, although the Cosell show is doing abysmally
