

School offers 21 mini-courses to students

BOLTON DONNA HOLLAND 616-0375 There are 21 different mini-courses being offered to Grade 7 and 8 students at Bolton Center School during the present term.

The courses include drama, newspaper, automotive, softball and tumbling training. Students are scheduled an average of 78 per cent each day with the remaining per cent in study halls.

Title I Para-professional aides and teachers responsible for coordinating student services at each grade level recently participated in two in-service development workshops.

The aides and teachers got together during one of the sessions.

The session topics include the reassessment of students to be targeted for extra help in math and reading based on current achievement, summer school transfers, October pretesting procedures for students in the program and teachers and aides sharing problems together with possible solutions.

There is a total of 56 students in the program in Kindergarten through Grade 8.

A majority of the students involved receive help in both math and reading.

Para-professional help in kindergarten is for four hours a week and in Grades 1-6, 15 hours.

A half-time Title I teacher gives extra help in math and reading to targeted students in Grades 7 and 8.

The Board of Selectmen requested information from the Insurance Advisory Board concerning the status of constables on duty other than town business.

It asked whether or not the constables were covered by town insurance while serving as constables either for the town or private business.

Candidates are saying ELLINGTON

Barbara Paluska, seeking re-election on the Republican ticket for the office of tax collector, is charging former Sewer Commission chairman, Herman Usher with, "furnishing political double talk rather than facts."

To Michael Malloy, her Democratic opponent, Mrs. Paluska said Malloy has stated that she, as tax collector, is collecting \$600 yearly in sewer usage charges.

She explained that the \$600 she receives yearly was set up seven years ago on the basis of \$50 monthly to cover the original sewer assessments.

She said since that time the Sewer Commission has added another 300 sewer usage fees originally collected by the town of Vernon to the Ellington tax collector's office with no additional money paid to the tax collector.

Mrs. Paluska said that Usher knew these facts as he was chairman of the Sewer Commission at the time these usage charges were transferred from Vernon to Ellington, and should not have given Malloy misleading information.

Concerning a proposal made by Malloy that the tax collector should be on a straight salary rather than a percentage for the tax collector, Mrs. Paluska said she would be in favor of this proposal. She added, however, that she would caution town officials to study the issue before implementation.

She said other area towns which pay salaries to tax collectors also pay health insurance costs, vacation time, sick days, holidays, and other fringe benefits.

Home mortgage bond issue sale planned

NEW HAVEN (UPI) — Gov. Ella T. Grasso says the Connecticut Housing Finance Authority will offer a \$55 million bond issue next month to strengthen the market for home mortgages.

Mrs. Grasso told the New Haven County Homebuilders Association the authority is trying to reintegrate Connecticut's lagging construction industry. "The state will use every resource at its command to get our homebuilding and construction industry moving again," she said.

In addition to the planned bond issue, the authority has allocated \$27 million to participating lenders, Mrs. Grasso said.

"The authority expects the lenders to convert the allocation to home mortgages within three months," she said.

Bay State eyes repeal of blue laws

BOSTON (UPI) - The Massachusetts Legislature's Government Regulations Committee today began studying a bill to repeal the state's colonial-vintage "Blue Laws," at the urging of lawmakers, businessmen and tax experts. Proponents of the bill testified Thursday its repeal would generate \$300 million in sales and \$8 million in additional tax revenues. Manpower Affairs Secretary Howard Smith said repeal would result in an additional 10,000 to 15,000 jobs. Taxation Commissioner Owen Clarke told a State House public hearing of the Government Regulations Committee the majority - \$4 million - of the new revenue would come from the sales tax. Another \$4 million would come from tax revenues on liquor and cigarettes now going to New Hampshire where prices generally are lower and stores are open on Sunday.

Dreselly said he would like the Finance Board's thoughts with respect to funding. He said he would like to advertise the position. He said it would probably be similar to that of an assistant foreman and would pay about \$4 per hour.
