### State

**NEW HAVEN** — New Haven teachers Sunday night rejected a three-year contract offer by the board of education and today began a strike in the 20,000 student system. Previously the teachers have walked off the job in 1970 and 1973.

**WESTPORT** — Rep. Bella Abzug, D-N. Y., said people from all over the country should put on pressure for federal loan guarantees to prevent the bankruptcy of New York City. She said she hopes the House will vote on the issue soon, but doubts there is strength to override a threatened presidential veto.

**SHELTON** — Teachers who ended their strike after nine of their union leaders were jailed rejected a new contract offer from the school board Sunday night. The offer of a 5 per cent increase was lower than the 7.5 per cent offer the school board agreed to earlier but the Board of Aldermen rejected.

### Regional

**BOSTON** — Sen. Henry M. Jackson, D-Wash., announced candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination, says countries voting for a United Nations resolution equating establishment of Israel with racism should understand they may lose U.S. aid.

**MANCHESTER, N.H.** — Democrat Sargent Shriver, a Kennedy in-law who says the next president must be able to negotiate with America's enemies, announced his plans for the New Hampshire presidential primary today.

**FAIRLEE, Vt.** — A freight train carrying cars filled with liquid propane gas derailed, burned and exploded here Sunday night. No injuries were reported but about half of the train's 37 cars were wrecked.

### National

**MORRISTOWN, N.J.** — A judge is expected to rule this afternoon whether Karen Ann Quinlan, kept alive by a machine for almost seven months, should be allowed to die.

**SACRAMENTO, Calif.** — Lynette Fromme, accused of trying to kill President Ford, is given one more chance to behave in court or face the prospect of watching her trial on television.

**DETROIT** — General Motors executives are silent on reports the federal government may try to break up the world's largest auto company in what would be the biggest antitrust action in 60 years.

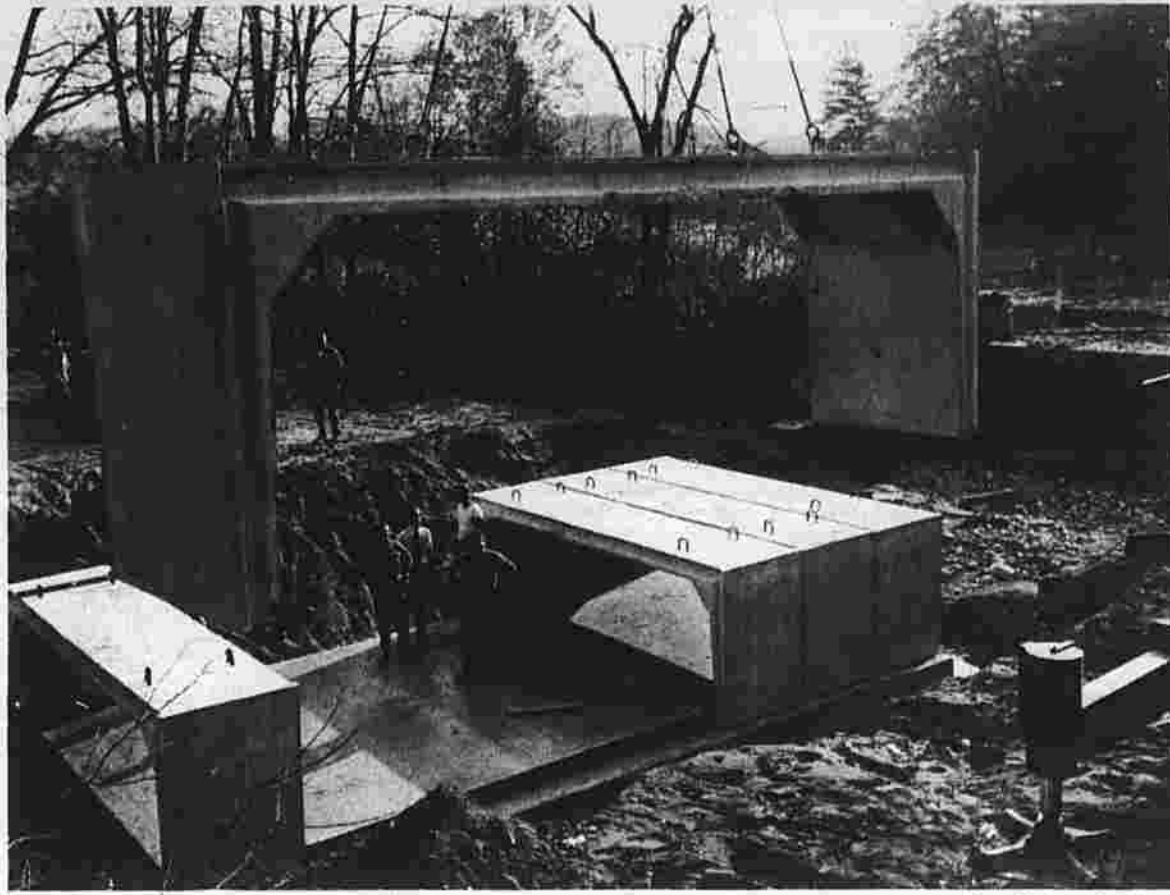

## 'Peace marchers' withdrawn

**WITH MOROCCANS IN SPANISH SAHARA** (UPI) — Thousands of Moroccan volunteer marchers, many expressing surprise and disappointment, began withdrawing today from Spanish Sahara on orders of King Hassan II.

The king, threatened by war from Spain and Algeria, called off the "peace march" to claim the Spanish territory in a dramatic television and radio address Sunday night.

This morning he flew from the march command post in Agadir to his winter palace in Marrakesh, officially ending the bizarre "invasion" by an estimated 200,000 civilians.

His marchers stopped six miles inside the Sahara territory facing Spanish troops and minefields.

Still another contingent of 150,000 marchers were caught by surprise by the announcement Sunday as they were crossing the border to reinforce the first group.

The volunteers, obeying orders to pull out, packed up their dishes and tents at dawn and began heading in trucks back to Morocco at 8:30 a.m., the Spanish news agency Europa Press said.

"We have a profound conviction that our march has fulfilled its mission and attained its objective," the king told his people Sunday. "That is why, dear people, we must return to our point of departure in order to treat the problems with other methods and new procedures."

The volunteers, who began crossing the Spanish Sahara frontier last Thursday, heard the king's speech over loudspeakers mounted on top of vehicles in the sprawling camp.

## President admits 'growing tension' behind firings

**WASHINGTON** (UPI) — President Ford acknowledges he fired James Schlesinger because of "growing tension" between the former defense secretary and Secretary of State Henry Kissinger that was causing "an over-all problem" in national security matters.

Ford also said Sunday in a nationally televised interview that operations in his campaign organization "could be better" but that he would enter all 30 GOP presidential primaries next year to let voters judge him on his record.

He indirectly challenged Ronald Reagan to do the same.

Ford said at his news conference last Monday he fired Schlesinger and CIA Director William Colby only to put "my own team" into sensitive national security positions.

He provided no details on the Schlesinger-Kissinger rivalry but said he removed the defense secretary "to permit me as President to do a better job."

## Public hearings main business of town directors

Public hearings on a variety of proposed appropriations are on the agenda for the first business meeting of the 1975-76 Manchester Board of Directors — Nov. 18 at 8 p.m. in the Municipal Building Hearing Room.

All but one of the appropriations would be funded by equivalent grants or contributions.

The exception is a proposed \$20,000 appropriation for acquiring the unused inventory of the former Manchester Water Co., already purchased by the town for \$2.25 million. Purchase of the available inventory was a condition of the town's option to buy.

The \$20,000 would come from the available balance in the appropriation for renovations to the Cooper Hill Treatment Plant.

At some future date, the town will be involved also with a payment (this time to itself) of about \$50,000. The sum is the amount of taxes the Manchester Water Co. would have owed the town for the 1975-76 fiscal

year which began July 1. Under state law, the taxes must be paid. When the payment is made, it will be from the Water Fund to the General Fund.

Other proposed appropriations are:

- \$16,214 to the Head Start Fund, to be financed by a state grant. It is for an evaluation program, transportation costs and services for handicapped.

- \$36,057 for Educational Special Projects, to be financed by a state grant.

- \$6,312 for a Work Incentive Program in the Educational Special

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## Ford hopes NY won't default

**WASHINGTON** (UPI) — President Ford told five Democratic senators today he is hopeful New York City can avoid default, but is still opposed to giving the city federal loan guarantees.

The five senators, led by Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield, said they are still hopeful the President will change his mind.

Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis., chairman of the Senate Banking Committee, told reporters that after meeting with Ford in the Cabinet Room for more than one hour he found "no change" in Ford's position.

"The most important impression I got is that he (Ford) very much wants New York to avoid default," Proxmire said. "He feels that default can be avoided without federal intervention."

Proxmire said he and the other senators explained their proposals to state off a New York City default by guaranteeing federal loans.

"The President was very firm that New York must meet its obligation," Proxmire said.

Asked why he was hopeful Ford would alter his position, Proxmire said, "I base that on nothing we've heard today, but I believe as time goes on," he may change his view.

As for Ford, Proxmire said, "I would say he said 'no,' (on the loan guarantees) but I think we made progress. I think he listened. It's a much tougher bill" and would require the city to make sacrifices.

The Senate Banking Committee has approved legislation calling for \$4 billion in federal loan guarantees and establishment of a three-member panel, chaired by Treasury Secretary William E. Simon, to oversee the city's finances.

Ford, appearing on NBC's "Meet the Press" Sunday, said "there will be no serious ramifications in the money market of this country" if the city defaults.

Asked his opinion of a House bill providing \$7 billion in loan guarantees, Ford replied, "The bill I've seen I think is not the right kind of legislation to help New York City."

## Commissioners disclaim contacts with Bailey

**NEWINGTON** (UPI) — An alleged payment to the late Democratic party chief John M. Bailey to influence approval for the Bridgeport jai alai fronton was \$250,000 instead of \$200,000, according to Connecticut Special Revenue Commission Chairman Paul J. Silvergleid.

The higher figure was disclosed today by Silvergleid as he commented individual commissioners' attempts to deny they were contacted by Bailey in the jai alai matter.

The disclaimers came at the resumption of hearings, which began Thursday, by the commission to decide whether to revoke the license for the scandal-ridden fronton.

Four Democratic members of the commission, led by Gloria M. Morris, of Glastonbury, denied they had ever been contacted by Bailey to either oppose or endorse the Bridgeport fronton over any other pari-mutuel outlet.

"At no time was I ever asked by the late Democratic state chairman, the honorable John M. Bailey, on behalf of the license of the Bridgeport jai alai fronton or for that matter on behalf of or against any prospective licensee," Mrs. Morris said.

She was joined by commissioners Michael Seri of Danbury, Francis X. Hennessey of Windsor and James Fitzgerald of East Hartford.

When attorneys for the jai alai asked why the commissioners were making the disclaimer, Silvergleid said it was because of "evidence" that Bailey had been paid \$250,000 cash to influence the Democratic commissioners regarding the license.

It was the first time the commission had mention the higher figure.

To have a Veterans Day returned to Nov. 11 has been the goal of the Veterans of World War I as it has a specific meaning to each member because World War I ended on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month, and that has always been Veterans Day to them, according to Harold Olds, a member of Manchester Barracks.

Veterans Day

Tomorrow we will be observing Veterans Day in Connecticut. The state reverted to the traditional Nov. 11 observance at the behest of veterans groups and it will be the veterans groups who will be most active in the formal observances.

In a way it is fitting that the veterans should do this since they are really closest to those being honored by virtue of having shared in the horrors as well as the glory of service to our nation.

But in a way it's sad too that this day which is to be a tribute to the nation's veterans is virtually devoid of non-veteran participation. The attempt to shift the holiday to the fourth Monday in October for a long weekend reflects the desire of too many Americans for "fun"

holidays rather than a few days dedicated to sober reflection of the sacrifices many have made throughout our history so that we can enjoy those holidays.

Tomorrow a small group of the community's veterans will pay tribute to their comrades in arms — both living and dead. A few others will join in the tribute. But for most it will be business as usual.

This brief moment of gratitude cannot repay the debt we owe our nation's veterans but it can let them know in a simple and humble way that we have not forgotten what they were called upon to do for our country. It is the least we all can do wherever we are tomorrow.

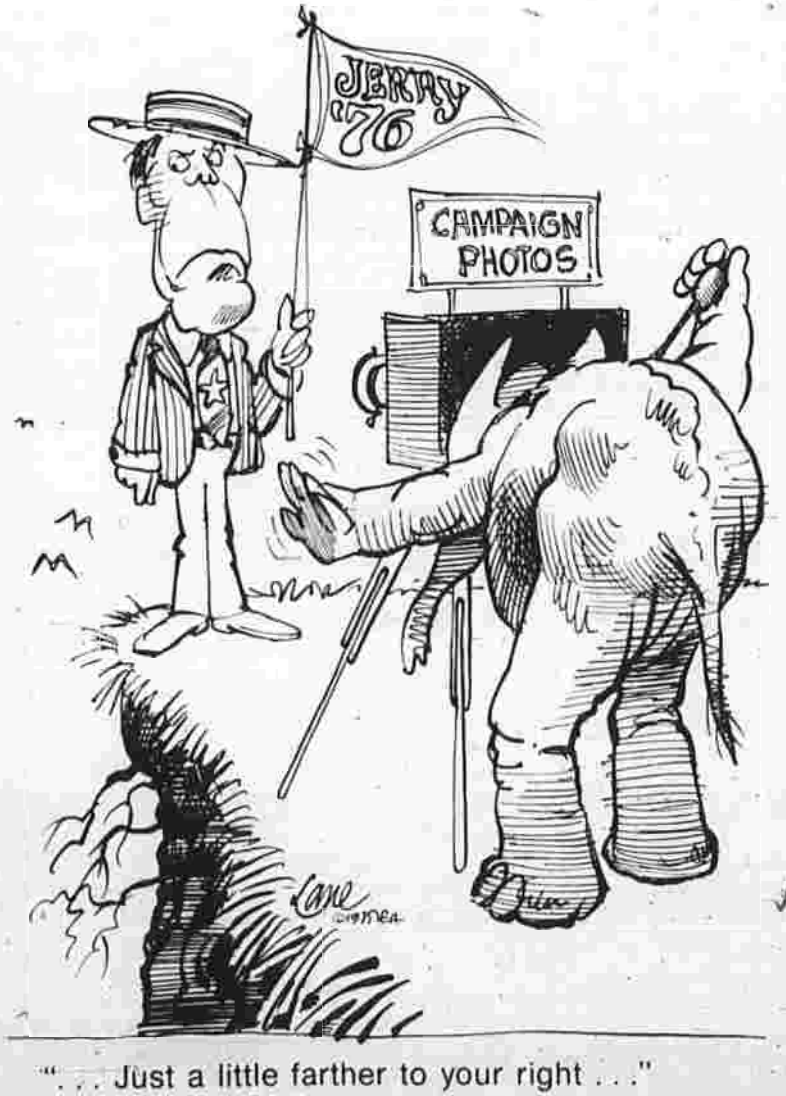

## Single sessions, textbooks, and busing on agenda tonight

### Vernon

A report on the proposed switch to single sessions at Rockville High School, one on the use of public school textbooks by local private schools, and school bus problems will be among the items to be discussed at the Board of Education meeting, tonight at 7:30 in the Sykes School cafeteria.

The school system has had a rule that students who do not adhere to the rules of conduct on the school buses will be suspended from riding on the bus.

School officials have now been informed, by the state, that students can't be suspended because it denies them their education. The matter will be discussed by Steven Marcham, chairman of the board's transportation committee.

Marcham will also report on requests to bus students from the Merline and Highland Dr. areas. Dr. Raymond Ramsdell, superintendent of schools, will explain the public act concerning the use of public school textbooks by local private schools.

At the start of the meeting there will be the usual committee reports and the citizens' forum.

# Allen making enemies with the wrong people

NEW YORK (UPI) — George Allen is making enemies with the wrong people. Allen's Washington Redskins rallied from a 10-7 halftime deficit Sunday to squeak the New York Giants 21-13 — the 10th straight time the Redskins have knocked off the Giants. It was the 12th consecutive triumph by an Allen-coached team over the New Yorkers, with the first coming while Allen was at Los Angeles.

But Allen was not content with the eight-point victory and did his best to add another touchdown with less than 30 seconds to play after Ed Brown ran an interception back 33 yards to the New York five. On the first play, quarterback Randy Johnson dropped back but fired an incomplete pass over the head of Charley Taylor in the end zone. He threw again on the second play, again too long, and sent Ralph Nelson off tackle on the third play with just 12 seconds left on the clock. As the gun went off to end the game, Washington's field goal team was running onto the field. New York Coach Bill Arnsparger darted across the field toward Allen at game's end and began screaming at his counterpart before finally relenting to aides who were trying to direct him toward the locker room. "That's his style," New York linebacker Pat Hughes said of Allen. "He's done it to us three years in a row. Most teams would have sat on

the ball and consider themselves grateful they came out with a victory. But there are a few teams who live by their own set of rules and are compelled to do things like that. "It's his prerogative to play it any way he wants to," a composed Arnsparger said after the game. "I don't see why we should get so upset about it," defensive tackle John Mendenhall said. "It's nothing new. He tries to do it (run up the score) about once a year against us."

The bitter climax spoiled a brilliant job of second half quarterbacking by Johnson, who came on late in the first half after Bill Kinler left the game with a right shoulder separation when he was hit while throwing an interception. Johnson led the Redskins on two sustained drives — their only two of the day — and capped them with a Larry Brown sweep of left end for one yard and a touchdown and a Bob Brunet TD plunge from two yards out. Johnson hit nine of 13 passes for 115 yards in the second half. Kinler, who completed just two of seven passes and threw a pair of interceptions before he left, combined with Frank Grant with a 96-yard pass-run play for the first Washington score.

"Of course we were trying to score," Allen said. "If there's a tie at the end of the year in our division it's decided on total points. We try to score as many points as we can every game. Our division may be decided by one point, who knows. Last week

the effort won Smith the Patriot game ball, but he had shared it with running back Sam Cunningham and linebacker George Webster. "It was a good win for us," said New England coach Chuck Fairbanks, whose Patriots are in fourth place in the AFC East with a 3-5 record behind the Baltimore Colts. "We made some big plays. The defense was particularly good in the area of the goal line," Fairbanks said. Fairbanks singled out for praise rookie quarterback Steve Grogan, who has had to fill the shoes of former Heisman trophy winner Jim Plunkett, still recuperating from a shoulder separation. "Steve did a good job," said the coach. "Plunkett could have played today, but the doctors advised against it. He will see action later this season."

Grogan played the entire game as he completed 17 of 28 passes for 245 yards and a touchdown. San Diego quarterback Dan Fouts also was effective through the air, hitting 25 of 42 passes for 285 yards, but two of his passes were intercepted. San Diego's Wersching

struck early in the first period with a 41-yard field goal that was countered by a 36-yard field goal. Then Patriot cornerback Bobby Howard intercepted a Fouts' pass and scampered 44 yards for a touchdown to give New England a 10-3 advantage at the end of the quarter. # Jets continue their tailspin

MIAMI (UPI) — The New York Jets continued their tailspin with a 27-7 loss to the Miami Dolphins Sunday and nobody, not even Joe Namath, seems to have a solution to the problem. Jets, now 2-6, would have to stage another late season charge to reach respectability — and would need to win five of their remaining six games just to equal last year's 7-7 output when they won their last six outings. Meanwhile, the Dolphins seem to be having their own problems despite a seven-game winning streak following their season-opening loss to Oakland. Running back Mercury Morris announced that he wants to be traded after the season because he's not being used enough.

Namath seemed to be at a loss about the cause of the Jets' problems. "I don't see anybody quitting out there — everybody seems to be trying, everybody has pride in what they're doing," he said. "If any of us knew what causes the breakdowns, we would fix it. But we don't know what it is."

The Jets battled to a 7-7 tie midway through the third quarter, but then Miami struck it away with a 59-yard touchdown pass from Bob Griese to Norm Bulach and a 50-yard punt return by Freddie Solomon. The two long scores came within 2:06 of each other. Meanwhile, the Dolphin defense shut out Namath and the Jets in the second half. "The running game was going good in the first half, but then they started shutting it down," Namath explained. "When they started doing that, we were facing second and third-and-long."

Morris, who went in the game trailing only Buffalo's O.J. Simpson among AFC rushers, was given the ball just four times and gained nine yards. The workhorse was Benny Malone, playing only his second game in the year because of a pulled hamstring muscle. Malone carried 13 times for 60 yards and an eight-yard touchdown.

A caution flag went out on lap 25 when Bob Burcharm's Chevy blew an engine, causing Ferrell Harris, who was drafting Burcharm, to lose control. "I was very lucky in that," Baker said, "because I wasn't that far behind him. If he (Burcharm) hadn't hit the wall and spun down to the inside, I would have hit him." The race was almost free of accidents or caution flags. But the 25 laps run under caution when Burcharm and Harris' car collided slowed the average race speed considerably. Until then, Baker had set a blistering pace of better than 146 miles per hour. His winning average was 139.990 mph. Petty, who finished third in his familiar red and blue Dodge, said he lost his chance to win when NASCAR officials stopped the race for rain.

Richard Petty is the hardest man in the world to beat," Buddy Baker said after winning the rain-delayed Dixie 500 Sunday. "That number 43 looks like a semi-truck when he's behind you." Baker, a Ford driver from Charlotte, N.C., lost the lead only momentarily to David Pearson following a 50-minute rain delay with only 27 laps to run. He said afterward, "A lot of the drivers have said Atlanta International Raceway was a jinx to me, but I feel Talladega (Ala.) has been worse."

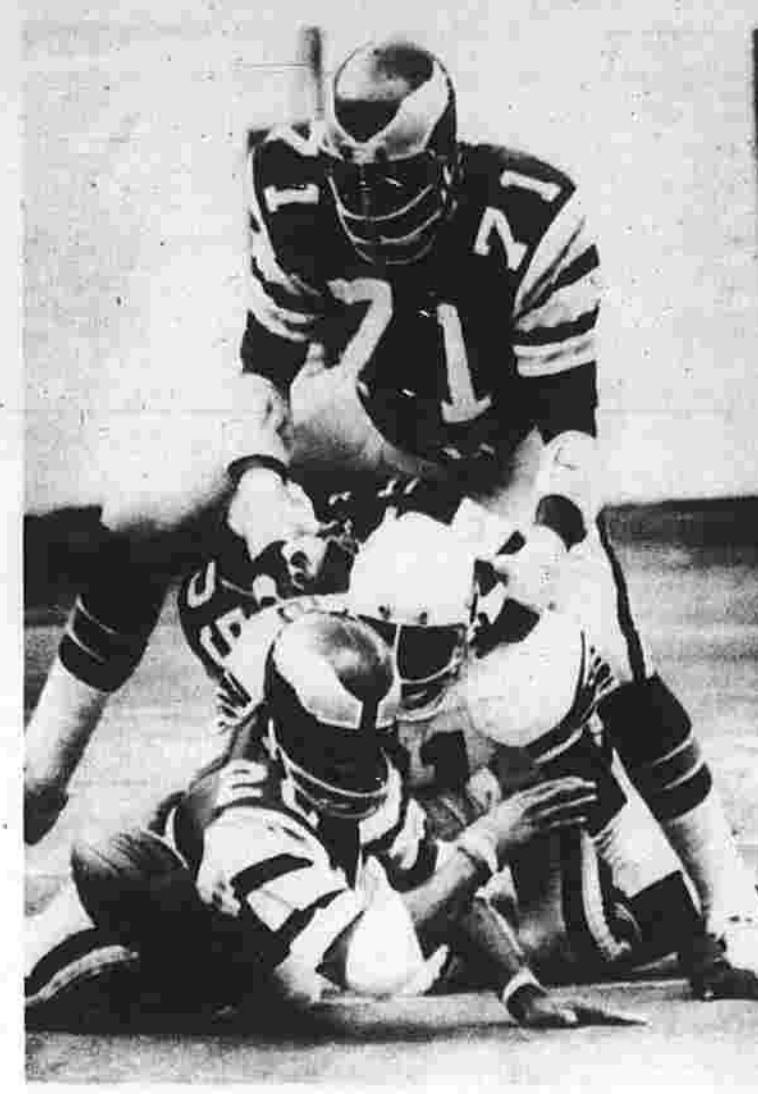

# Steelers were hit hard but managed to post win

NEW YORK (UPI) — Maybe Bum Phillips should tell his young Houston Oilers not to hit so hard. The Oilers, who had allowed the fewest points in the league before Sunday, went into the game with Pittsburgh as part of a three-way tie for first in the AFC Central Division with the Steelers and Cincinnati. After spotting the Super Bowl champion Steelers a 17-7 lead, the Oilers came roaring back to tie the game at 17-17 with 2:38 left to play. Then the young Houston defense got a little impetuous. They racked up wide receiver Frank Lewis and Steeler Coach Chuck Noll was forced to replace him with John Stallworth, who had missed the last three games and had been on the bench Sunday with an injury. Four plays later, Stallworth put a brilliant move on cornerback Zeke Moore and caught a 21-yard touchdown pass from Terry Bradshaw with 38 seconds left to lift Pittsburgh to a 24-17 victory. It was Pittsburgh's seventh victory in eight games and left the Steelers tied with Cincinnati, which edged Denver 17-16, for first. Houston fell to 6-2 in other NFL action Sunday. San Francisco upset Los Angeles 24-23, Baltimore stunned Buffalo 42-35, Washington downed the New York

Giants 21-13. St. Louis edged Philadelphia 24-23, Miami whipped the New York Jets 27-7, Minnesota routed Atlanta 38-0, Oakland blasted New Orleans 48-10, Detroit downed Cleveland 21-10, Chicago dumped Green Bay 27-14 and New England clubbed San Diego 33-19. Kansas City is at Dallas tonight. Bengals 17, Browns 16 Cincinnati, down 13-7 at the half, pulled ahead in the third period on Dave Green's 45-yard field goal and Bookie Clark's one-yard plunge to beat Denver. Vikings 38, Falcons 0 Chuck Foreman scored three TDs to boost his league-leading total to 11 and Fran Tarkenton had a scoring pass to move within nine of John Unitas' all-time record as Minnesota swamped Atlanta. The Vikings forced eight turnovers, including Jim Marshall's NFL record 23rd career fumble recovery. Raiders 48, Saints 10 Ken Stabler threw for 232 yards, including TD passes of 36 and 48 yards to Morris Bradshaw, to lead Oakland's romp past New Orleans. Lions 21, Bills 35 Bert Jones threw two TD passes and ran for a third and Lydell Mitchell had three TDs as Baltimore downed Buffalo. Cardinals 24, Eagles 23 Jim Bakken's 30-yard field goal with three seconds left boosted St. Louis over Philadelphia and helped the Cards remain tied for the NFC East lead with Washington at 6-2.

# Yale and UConn grid victories warmups for upcoming games

HARTFORD (UPI) — Yale and the University of Connecticut won important football victories this weekend but they were only warmups for upcoming games against traditional rivals. Yale defeated Penn Saturday, 24-14, securing the victory with a touchdown in the final minute, and UConn drubbed Boston Friday evening, 52-10, taking an unexpectedly fierce victory. But the Elis face a critical Ivy League challenge Saturday in their 98th game against Princeton while the Huskies travel to Kingston, R.I., for the 65th game of a long and nearly even series of grid duels. Wesleyan and Trinity, another pair of ritual antagonists who will face

each other next weekend, each took a loss in their Saturday games. Wesleyan went down to Williams, 28-21, while Trinity suffered a 20-17 loss to Amherst. Central squeaked past Cortland State, 7-6, Saturday, while Southern Connecticut bowed to American International College, 17-14. Central and Southern will meet Saturday to cap their seasons. In other games, Coast Guard defeated Hobart, 20-14, New Haven lost to Nichols, 28-0, and Western Connecticut went down to Framingham State, 14-7. Yale steamed to victory largely on rushing by Don Gesicki, who set career records with 164 yards in 31 carries. The Bulldogs must beat Princeton if they are to hold onto their chance at the Ivy League championship. Nick Giacinto ran for 117 yards in just eight carries to become the first Husky to top the 100-yard mark in 12 games. The Huskies totaled 329 yards rushing against Boston and the most points since 1958.
