He noses about for the right scent

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Why would a woman want to change fragrances after wearing the same one for years?

Perhaps she's tired of it, or found one she likes better. More likely she's become so used to it she's hardly aware of it herself and possibly thinks, therefore, it's fading too quickly or not doing the job it once did.

This answer comes, oddly enough, from a man — who is a nose for women, so to speak. Tom Cannariato pokes his nose into perfumes for a major cosmetics company and his highly developed sense of smell tells him what to do about improving upon a fragrance or how to create a new one.

He offers two schools of thought for fussy females. One is to stay with one fragrance until it becomes an identifying part of you like your signature.

The other is to have a fragrance "nearby," so you can choose one to fit your mood of the moment, your planned activity, or even complement your outfit.

Whenever route you choose, advises the resident "nose" at Merle Norman laboratories here, remember that after having worn any fragrance for a while, more often than not people around you will be much more aware of it than you are, since the sense of smell becomes less sensitive to stimuli it is exposed to for any length of time.

On being a cosmetic industry "nose," Cannariato says that basically we do with our equipment what chemists do with theirs. We know precisely the blend we want and the "nose" is the expert who decides if there is too much or too little of whatever.

Just as a wine taster sometimes goes "sour," a perfumer can get odor fatigue or anosmia. It may take an hour, or sometimes a day for the sense of smell to rebalance itself, Cannariato explains, but sooner or later he's back nosing around.

How did he decide upon a career as a scent sniffer? "Well, I grew up in Clifton, N.J., and went to P.S. 19 there," laughs Cannariato. "On one side of the school there was a plant that made aromatic chemicals. On the other side was a factory that produced after-shave lotion. I guess it was just sort of in the air for me to follow my nose."

Cannariato, who can tell at one sniff whether a fragrance is "mature" or "youthful," whether it's "provincial" or "sophisticated," naturally is a fountain of information for women seeking pointers on perfume.

Here are his common-sense answers to some of the questions most asked.

What is the most potent fragrance I can buy? "A perfume. It is compounded of oils and is mixed in the usual ratio of 24 ounces of oil to one gallon of alcohol. Next would be the eau de toilette fragrances which are mixed in a ratio of 10 to 15 ounces of oil to one gallon of alcohol, and last, the splashers which run about one to five ounces of oil per one gallon of alcohol."

Some women seem to be able to wear a fragrance all day without "touching up." Mine wears off in an hour. Is that due to the fragrance or to my own skin chemistry?

"It is a combination of both. There is no wrong fragrance for anyone as long as it pleases the wearer. Some women have more oils in their skin and will carry a fragrance longer. Some do not apply fragrance correctly. There are several reasons why a scent might not last. One thing, however, the stronger fragrances do last longer."

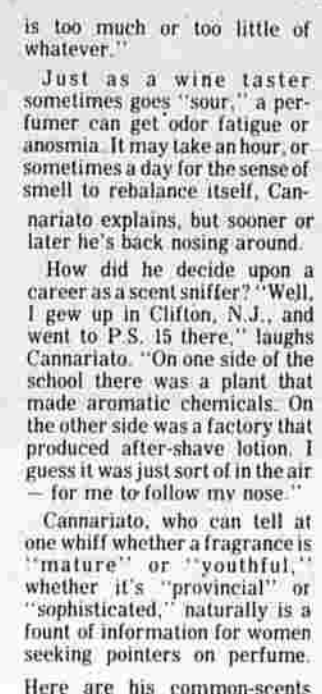
What is the way to apply a fragrance correctly? "Every fragrance is accentuated by body heat. Apply fragrance where the blood vessels are closer to the skin — those are the heat areas. For example: the wrists, inside the elbows, the back of the knees, on the sides of the throat, the cleavage. The temples are a good area — especially when you're dancing cheek to cheek. One caution — any mucous membrane area can be most sensitive, under the arms, around the nose, eyes. Avoid fragrances in these sensitive areas."

Why do I have to hide my perfume away so that they will keep from smelling it? "If you use a perfume regularly, you most likely will use it all before it is affected by light, heat, or its own natural life span. If you are one of those who splash in at previous intervals, it should be kept in a dark place. By the way, keep a cologne or splash in the refrigerator in an old, but still effective and fragrant trick for keeping cool in the summer — or simply as a relaxant after a particularly tiring day."

Is it true that fragrance from other grooming agents such as hair sprays, deodorants and such "fight" with each other? "Fragrances of different types do fight with each other, even if it is to a minor degree and it is noticeable. I feel that if you have a favorite scent and are trying to create an aura, so to speak, you ought to coordinate your powders and colognes in that one scent. Otherwise, why spend the money on it? You can even fight your shampoo scent by throwing a few dabs of your scent on a hairbrush. I mean, if you're going to create a fragrance aura about yourself — create it all the way!"

Thanksgiving 'thankful' for many

By United Press International. A critically ill child, jail inmates, Vietnamese refugees and a man whose murder conviction was overturned all found much to be thankful for during Thanksgiving, 1975.

Doctors diagnosed that Jacquelyn Packheiser, 7, of Rolling Meadows, Ill., had Reyes Syndrome, a brain-damaging disease, when she was admitted in critical condition to Wyle Children's Hospital in mid-November.

But she opened her eyes Thanksgiving eve and asked to see her mother. The hospital sent her home for a very "thankful" holiday. Sammy Garrett, 26, was released from Stateville Penitentiary just 14 hours before the holiday began. His murder conviction — for which he had served five of a 20-to-40-year sentence — had been overturned.

"Thanks. That's what I feel," Garrett said. "I often wondered if any humanity remains. Well it does." Nguyen Van Tuoc, a former lieutenant colonel in the South Vietnamese military, sat down with his wife and their eight children to celebrate their new life in Chicago with an old-fashioned turkey dinner.

"Thanksgiving is a day of thank you to God," Tuoc's 10-year-old daughter Dung said. Jail inmates had special turkey dinners but at Cook County Jail in Chicago, they went without drumsticks. Bones more than 1½ inches long are considered potential weapons.

"Thousands of volunteers served Thanksgiving dinners to the sick, disabled and poverty-stricken." The U.S. Army — the largest single turkey customer in the nation — dispatched 347,000 pounds of turkey, 52,000 pounds of shrimp and 74,000 pounds of mince meat and pumpkin pies to servicemen around the world.

President and Mrs. Ford and their daughter, Susan, sat down to a traditional feast. The rest of the First Family celebrated elsewhere. A handful of reporters combed New York City's Central Park for live turkeys. They'd been sent there to cover a "turkey trot" sponsored by the Borough of Manhattan Community College.

"See any turkeys around here," a reporter asked a pretzel salesman. "Turkeys? We got pigeons and squirrels, no turkeys," he replied. "The turkeys — dead and wrapped in brown paper bags — were finally found. It turned out the college students and faculty were doing the trotting. The turkeys were prizes."

HARTFORD (UPI) — With state employees preparing for a possible strike, leaders were to meet today with Gov. Ella T. Grasso to discuss her proposal that they work longer with the same pay.

Mrs. Grasso drew sharp reaction from union leaders after she went on television Tuesday night, announcing a plan to stave off a projected \$80 million state budget deficit.

A major pillar of the plan is to increase the state employ work week from 35 to 40 hours with no additional pay. Officials of the Connecticut State Employees Association received immediate authorization to call a strike.

The American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, Council 16, has begun distributing strike ballots and plans to have members "lobby" at a special session of the state legislature Monday, called by the governor to approve her fiscal measures.

Other mainstays of her austerity plan involve transferring \$29 million from a state veteran's fund to the general fund and tightening up on medical benefits for welfare recipients.

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Town directors endorse Meals-on-Wheels program

The Board of Directors Tuesday night indicated its support for a Meals-on-Wheels program for Manchester's elderly shut-ins to be administered by the Manchester Homemakers Service. Its action was unanimous.

The board took no action on the town's cost share for the program. It indicated it will schedule for public hearing any request it receives for town funds. No date was mentioned.

With no discussion, the board approved the following appropriations:

- \$100 to the Camp Kennedy Account, financed by a donation already received from the Manchester Telephone Employees Community Service Fund.
- \$2,700 for an electrical softball field scoreboard at Robertson Park, financed by a gift from Sam Crispino.
- \$389 to the Special Grants Fund, financed by an equivalent state grant under Emergency Employment Act legislation.

- \$15,000 to the Police Special Services Account, to be financed by equivalent receipts from outside services performed.
- \$6,312 to the school Work Incentive Program, to be financed by a state grant.
- \$36,057 to the Educational Special Projects Account, to be financed by a state grant.
- \$16,214 to the Head Start Program Account, to be financed by a state grant.
- \$20,000 for inventory acquisition of the Manchester Water Co., to be financed from the surplus in the Cooper Hill Treatment Plant Renovation Account.

All of the actions were unanimous.

Approved by an 8 to 1 vote (Carl Zinsser was opposed but didn't give an explanation) was a \$6,475 allocation from revenue-sharing funds for financing an equivalent state grant under Emergency Employment Act legislation.

The board authorized acceptance of a \$450,000 federal grant (already promised) and a \$225,000 state grant (being sought) toward acquisition of open-space holdings of the Manchester Water Co. (already purchased by the town). The \$675,000 combined grants could reduce the \$2.25 million cost of the water company that that amount.

In another action relating to the water company, the board allocated \$49,085 from the Water Reserve Fund to pay taxes owed the town by the water company when the purchase was consummated. In effect, the town paid itself the sum.

By a unanimous vote, the board approved a \$3,000 settlement for Mrs. Rose Guaraschelli, 60, of Glastonbury, she fell on a Maple St. sidewalk in March 1975. Town Council member Moses, who recommended the settlement, said she sustained injuries and suffered loss of wages from her job.

Sen. Barry named chairman of two state commissions

State Sen. David M. Barry, Dem., Manchester, has been appointed chairman of two commissions created by the 1975 General Assembly — the Commission to Study Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention and the Commission to Study the Removal of Status Offenses as Grounds for Delinquency.

Among members of the first commission is State Rep. Martin B. Burke, Dem., Rockville, and of the second is Juvenile Court Judge James M. Higgins, formerly of Manchester and now residing in Higganum.

Because of the interrelation between the purposes of the two commissions, they will function jointly during the course of their existence. Barry has scheduled the first

meeting of the commissions for Monday (Dec. 1) at 7:30 p.m. in the State Capitol's judiciary committee hearing room, to organize and to determine the scope of their inquiries.

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Bus service expanded

The State Department of Transportation (DOT) has announced expanded holiday evening bus service in the Hartford and New Haven areas, starting tonight.

In Hartford, there will be about 154 trips on Connecticut Co. routes after 6 p.m. The normal number of evening trips is 74. The increased service will require use of 32 additional buses.

The new schedule for Hartford-to-Manchester buses, in effect through Dec. 30, is:

ROUTE B — Market St. via Silver Lane to Manchester. Leave Hart-

ford's Market St. at 6:00, 6:45, 7:15, 7:45, 8:15, 8:40 and 9:15 p.m.

ROUTE V — Market St. to Manchester Green via Sunset Hills in East Hartford. Leave Market St. at 8:10, 5:35, 5:30, 6:00, 6:30, 7:00, 7:30, 8:00, 9:10 and 9:20 p.m.

Regular fares of 35 cents for single-fare zones and 50 cents for multiple-fare zones will be in effect during the holiday season. Half fares are charged eligible and handicapped persons.

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Weiss seeks CPEC suggestions to improve revenue forecasts

Town Manager Robert Weiss, ap- preciantly stung by wide-spread criticism over his failure to predict the \$597,389 surplus for Manchester's 1974-75 fiscal year, has asked the Connecticut Public Expenditures Council (CPEC) for suggestions to improve revenue forecasting.

His request was simultaneous with a request by Director Carl Zinsser for CPEC aid to the Board of Directors in its budget-making process — possibly at a January or February meeting.

The proposals are related, because it was Zinsser who led the criticism in his estimates — especially when a large amount of receivables is involved.

"When a tax has been levied, as ours has, it can't be lawfully reduced," Weiss said. "Preserving the surplus carefully" in the possibility taxes could be reduced next year — 1976-77.

The existing building behind the Grange Hall might be demolished and a structure of similar size built in the form of a 17th Century Connecticut house measuring about 18 by 30 feet in size.

Cox said it would appear desirable to leave the approved lot adjacent to the Grand property isolated from the Grange corner lot and reconstruct the Windsor house there where it would be used as a residence and would conform to the zoning regulations.

Las Palmas: Nature as a sculptress

From the towering cliffs and undulating dunes of Gran Canaria to the volcanic abstractions of Lanzarote and the endless beaches of Fuerteventura, the three easternmost Canary Islands offer an incredible variety of vistas. The sun of these parts is a vacationist's dream, and the scenery is as awesome, charming and enthralling as the climate.

The island of Gran Canaria, third largest in the archipelago of the Canaries, has been correctly called a "continent in miniature." The topography is dominated by deep ravines, running from the rugged heights of the central mass to the edge of the sea. Tropical foliage native to Africa, Europe and the Americas flourishes in the valleys between, whose lush soil also provides a base for vineyards, banana and coffee plantations, sugar cane fields and numerous tomato and vegetable farms. In the south, the rolling beaches of Maspalomas and

Playa del Ingles offer incomparable vistas for the sun-bather and swimmer.

Las Palmas, the provincial capital for these three islands, is the major metropolitan area of Gran Canaria and in all the Canary Islands. It is an intriguing city — Spain's busiest seaport, an international airline gateway to the archipelago, and a first-class resort with the superb Las Canteras beach only a few minutes walk from the urban center. Hotel facilities and services are completely modern; the seafood-based cuisine is exotic and varied; and golf, tennis and all aquatic sports are available to fill the leisure hours.

Less developed than her sister islands, Fuerteventura has beaches stretching as far as the eye can see and pleasant little villages in the interior. The water off the coast is incredibly clear, and each year tuna, swordfish and sardines race through the strait separating the island from Africa.

Killington has new chair

A new double chairlift servicing expert trails, expansion of New England's largest snowmaking system, and renovation of three base lodges are among the improvements skiers will find this winter at the Killington Ski Resort in Central Vermont.

"These projects, designed to upgrade services and facilities, will be ready for the 1975-76 season," reported Foster Chandler, vice president.

The new chairlift, to the summit of 4,421-foot Killington Peak will nearly double the capacity of the old Killington Chair which it replaces. The new lift is 6,100 feet long and has a vertical rise of 1,480 feet. It is popular with advanced skiers because of its access to expert trails, and with novice skiers who ride it to reach the Goat Path and Great Eastern novice trails which start at the summit.

Snowmaking extensions to three new trails substantially improve the inter-visibility of Killington's four mountains. For the first time a major expert trail, 1 1/3-mile long Cascade Expert Trail, will be covered by snowmaking.

A "race's corner" specializing in merchandise for racers in a new feature at Killington Base Lodge, while ski shops in the Snowshed and Gondola Base Lodges have been expanded. A combination breakfast nook, fast-grill lunch area will expedite food service in the lounge at Snowshed.

Major face-lifting at all three lodges involves redecoration, new carpeting, and landscaping improvements. Seating capacity at the Killington Base Lodge has been increased by the addition of a third-level mezzanine.

The new Killington Chair will have a midstation at the 3,450-foot elevation which is used early and late season for skiing on upper Killington Peak trails where there may not be enough snow cover on lower elevations. Expert trails accessible by chair are Escapade, Cascade, Plume, Catwalk, Downdraft, Big Dipper, Superstar and Sky Lark.

Total capacity of Killington's lift system is 13,300 skiers per hour. The 11 lifts include a gondola, two triple and six double chairlifts, and two pomalifts. The 3 1/2 mile, four-passenger Killington Gondola is the world's longest ski lift.

Three out of four of Killington's mountains now receive snowmaking coverage: The Snowshed Area on Sky Peak, Killington Peak, and Rams Head. The capacity to cover 12 miles of novice, intermediate and expert trails ensures skiing at Killington from November to May.

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MMH welfare rates okay

Manchester Memorial Hospital is one of Connecticut's hospitals whose new rates for welfare patients have been approved by a state committee. The new rates will add \$5 million to the state welfare budget this year.

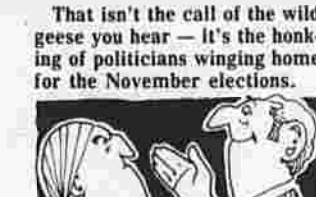
The new inpatient daily rates at MMH will increase by \$24.61 to \$141.52 in the non-maternity general care unit. Other units affected are intensive care, by \$19.01 to \$365.82; pediatrics, by \$35.93 to \$183.38; maternity, by \$25.25 to \$200.23.

The new all-inclusive rates are only interim rates which are reconciled at the end of the fiscal year on Oct. 1 by the state welfare department.

The new rates in the state's hospitals, retroactive to Oct. 1, increased an average 13.5 per cent over last year. The department's deficit because of the rate increases were included in Gov. Grasso's estimated \$77.5 million over-all state deficit.

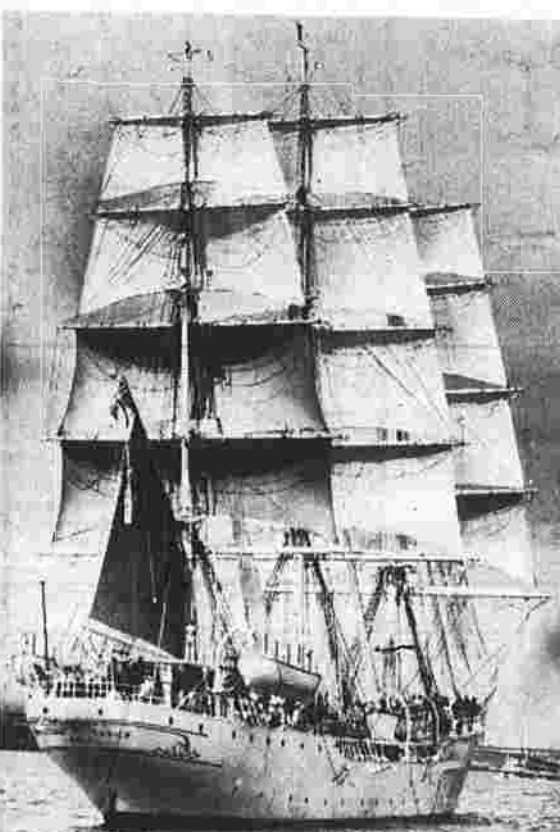

Jericho is ready

Jericho, the new trail at Jiminy Peak is ready for inspection. The name was selected in honor of the Town of Hancock; as Hancock was originally known as "Jericho" Valley some 200 years ago.

Jericho descends from the top east section of the mountain and drops 1,000 vertical feet in only 3,000 feet of skiing terrain. This long steep glide will be the most difficult trail at Jiminy. It is designed for experts only.

Consistent with Jiminy's philosophy of protecting the environment, this slope has not put any scars on the mountain. Little or no changes have been made to the mountain ecology while creating this slope. Trees

have been flusd cut rather than bulldozing the stumps. In fact, Jericho is not even visible from Hancock Valley while the leaves are on the trees.

Big trees have been left on this slope for three reasons: 1) most importantly is that this natural snow bowl will hold snow better all winter because of the protection the trees afford 2) the challenge of a glide for advanced skiers is far more exciting 3) the natural tree fall line allowed for little moving of the terrain.

Consistent with Jiminy's philosophy of protecting the environment, this slope has not put any scars on the mountain. Little or no changes have been made to the mountain ecology while creating this slope. Trees

MCC plans relay races

Manchester Community College will be the first college east of Pennsylvania to hold a "relay carnival" this coming June 26 and 27.

Christie McCormick of Vernon announced the dates of the sports event Monday night at a meeting of the MCC Regional Council. He is a member of the council.

"I expect it will develop into a great New England college sports event," he said.

Pal Mistretta, MCC's director of athletics, has been working with McCormick setting it up.

The relay carnival here will include many races, track events, and a 12-plus mile long distance run, Mistretta said.

Contestants will include students of colleges, high schools, junior highs and elementary schools. Some relay teams will be of both sexes, an innovation proposed by Dr. Ronald Denison, MCC president.

The track events will be held at Manchester High School. Officials will be almost all volunteers.

The major track and field sanctioning groups have given their approval of the event, Mistretta said.

Mistretta and McCormick are setting up seven committees of volunteers to run it. They expect to need about 200 experienced volunteers before its over.

Bill Kelleher, track coach at the University of Connecticut, told Mistretta, "We should be doing this."

Mistretta told him, "We beat you to the punch."

A council member, Dr. Merrill Rubinow, agreed with the others the whole event would benefit the college. The publicity would all be favorable. Thousands would be involved including spectators.

Dr. Rubinow volunteered the services of town physicians and nurses at a medical center during the events. He told of the insurance savings this would bring as well as the chance for medical people here to help the event.

Other matters discussed by the council included:

- Mrs. Florence Wood, a former school principal in Manchester, was accepted as a new member of the council.
- The book ordering "snafu" of this past August was explained. "It was a human error, not lack of concern," said Miss Catherine Putnam, council member.
- Collective bargaining between the teaching staff agents and the agent of 12 state community colleges begins soon, Denison said.
- Dr. Robert H. Fenn, dean of MCC faculty, has declined the presidency of another community college, Denison said. "He said he feels he can do more in his present MCC position than he could as the new college's president," said Denison.

Hospital officials said Barningham was treated for heat exhaustion and released Thursday afternoon.

There were unconfirmed reports that another Road Race entrant, an unidentified 16-year-old, collapsed near the Center in the last mile of the competition.

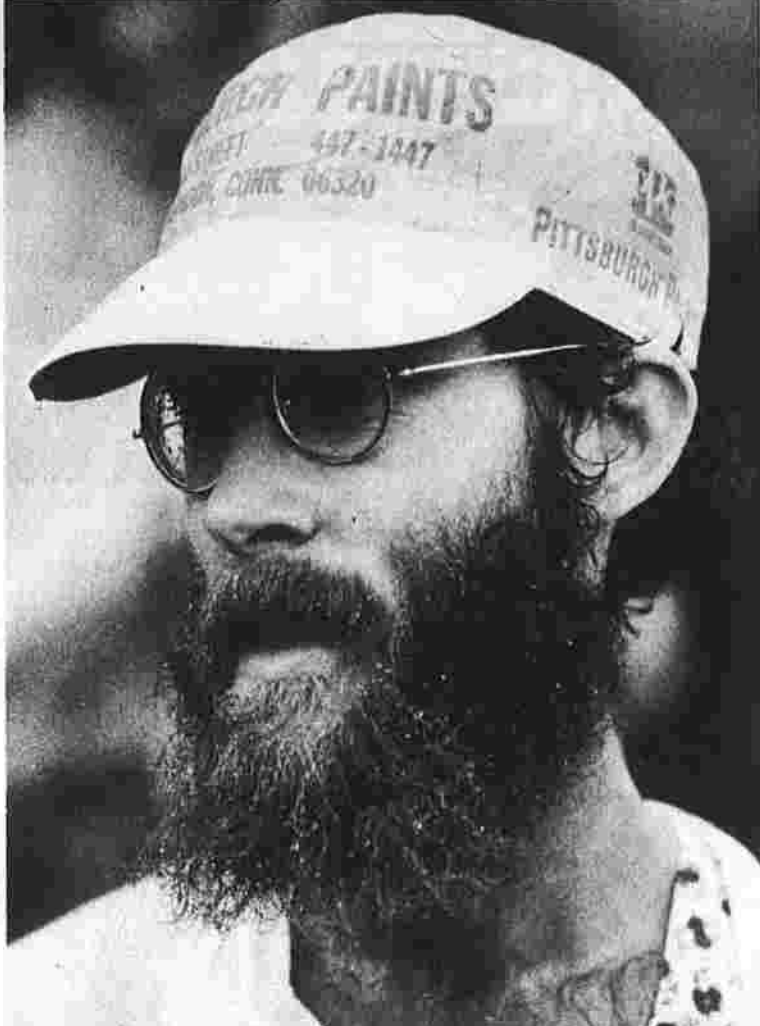

Runner-up Duggan couldn't top Amby

"I figured that I had a good chance to win today if I could finish ahead of Amby Burfoot," handsome Charlie Duggan of Hartford said after he picked up his second prize, a black and white television set.

Duggan, the greatest cross country runner in Springfield College history, had to settle for runnerup laurels in his best finish ever here.

He couldn't find the formula to beat Burfoot and finished 11 seconds and just under 100 yards behind in 22:45.

Now teaching school in Unionville, Duggan stayed close or on Burfoot's heels over the first half of the race only to fade back when Burfoot called upon his experience to win.

"I now can pick my races and I am in great shape. Monday I'm leaving for Florida to train for a possible spot in the Olympic Games. I'm in great shape.

"After two miles today, I knew that I couldn't stay with Amby. He was just too fast coming down the hill (Porter Street). I just couldn't catch him.

"I was surprised that I beat (John) Vitale. I found this a good fun race. I'll try again next year and one of these years I'm going to win," he confidently said as he packed away his teevee set.

Duggan has now taken part in seven Five Milers, placing eighth and sixth in 1969 and 1970, being the first schoolboy finisher in each, and was 19th, fourth, seventh and seventh 1971 thru 1974 in other showings.

Triple run

Billy Rodgers, winner of the Boston Marathon last April and one of the pre-race favorites, was among the 'also-rans' yesterday — by his own choice.

The Wesleyan grad, running under the colors of the Greater Boston Track Club, ran the course early yesterday morning, checked into race headquarters and registered, then ran along with the regular field and after the race set out again.

He was not clocked in officially. Rodgers used the local run as a warm-up for a marathon run Dec. 7 in Japan — a distance of 26 miles, 385 yards.

Last man to beat Burfoot

"This is the last best distance for me. I run better in 10, 12 and 15 mile races. My best shot for the Olympic Games is in the steeplechase.

"Amby is just amazing at this distance. I've seen him beat a lot of good guys, here and in many other races, who are faster runners but don't have the knack of pacing themselves. Amby is just great. I'm glad he's got the record for consecutive wins and most wins. I know that he wanted it badly," he added.

Four days ago, Vitale, 26, trekked to Youngstown, Ohio and won the National 20-kilometer crown. He's now employed at the Connecticut Valley Hospital in Middletown and is involved in the adolescent rehabilitation program.

"I used this race today to try and stay sharp. I don't seem to peak for the race here, like Amby does. I want to win every race I enter but I haven't had much luck here."

Vitale was correct in this statement. He's been in nine Five Milers, winning once — in 1970 — placing second three times, third once and fourth twice, ninth once and 10th once.

Vitale is the only man to beat Burfoot in the last seven Five Milers.

McCluskey marks finish to 50-year race career

Tea and toast consisted of Joe McCluskey's breakfast yesterday morning before he donned his running togs to mark finis to a 50-year career as a competitive runner.

Now 64, the greatest athlete in the history of Manchester, came home for the finale and took part in yesterday's 39th Five Mile Road Race, an event he once dominated in the early 1930s.

McCluskey, winner of 25 national track championships, twice a member of the United States Olympic squad and many times selected on the All-American track and field squad, placed 60th in the field of 738. His time was 37:05.

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The next stop for the smiling Irishman from Manchester's East Side is a niche in trackdom's Hall of Fame.

Hollander moved into the lead at the two-mile marker but as the leaders started down Porter Street, Burfoot moved out front and never relinquished the lead. Confrey slipped back at this point with Hollander, Duggan and Vitale fighting for the second spot.

Twice Burfoot looked back over his shoulder, the first time opposite Watkins on East Center Street and the second at the Center. He ran on the inside of the course all the way while the other top finishers were running the course wide for the most part.

Attendance swelled all along the course as spectators literally came out of their homes in large numbers all along the route to catch the leaders. The 1975 run marked the silver anniversary of Nutmeg Forest, Tall Cedars of Lebanon sponsorship. All proceeds, including the \$2 entry fee from all runners, entered the Muscular Dystrophy Fund of the Tall Cedars. Mayor Matt Moriarty Jr. handled the presentation of awards at the East Side Rec with Will Hadden general race chairman.

Seasonal Sharing Appeal sets goal of \$2,000

A clearing committee consisting of a representative from each of the Manchester Department of Social Services, Public Health Nurses Association, Head Start, state Welfare Department, YWCA, Salvation Army, FISH, MACC and St. Bartholomew's Church is developing a priority system so that those most needing help will be cared for first. Housing project start year away

It could take from four months to a year before the Manchester Housing Authority (MHA) starts digging for a 40-unit, state-funded elderly housing project on Spencer St., MHA Council Dominic Squatrito said Tuesday night.

Further delays in starting the project could result from three stages of design and accompanying review by the state Department of Community Affairs, Squatrito said. The Department of Community Affairs is in charge of a \$840,000 grant to Manchester for the housing.

Squatrito, explaining the delays to the town Board of Directors, said he doesn't blame town officials for being frustrated about time lost on the project planning.

"We're equally frustrated," Squatrito said.

The MHA has been wrangling with the Department of Community Affairs since April, when architect Dominic Cimino's first design for the project was submitted for state review.

The first design, which would have used 1.7 acres of the MHA's six-acre site, was rejected by the state agency because it called for two-story buildings, Squatrito said.

Although there's no written regula-

tion prohibiting two-story structures for elderly housing projects, state officials prefer one-story buildings, Squatrito said.

The second design prepared by Cimino would have been acceptable to the state, Squatrito said. It included all one-story buildings using 2.8 acres of land. But the MHA didn't want to use that much land, preferring to reserve a large portion of the expensive, \$145,000 property for future housing projects.

So the third design, now being prepared by Cimino, has a mixture of one-story and two-story buildings, Squatrito said. It will take about 2.3 acres of land.

"We're giving a little and we're hoping that they (the state) will give a little," Squatrito said.

He said he thought the MHA could have won a contemplated legal battle with the state over the first set of plans, but the MHA decided not to go to court because of further delays and expenses.

The revised design is to be submitted for state review within two weeks, Squatrito said.

Squatrito admitted that delays may affect the cost of building the housing, due to inflationary factors,

but he was unable to predict a cost overrun. He said the Department of Community Affairs has refused to grant supplemental funds in case of a cost overrun.

Squatrito said the time lost due to design revision may have been time well spent, because the MHA wants to assure a good plan for future development of the remainder of the site.

If the state accepts the new set of plans, the remainder of the land could accommodate up to 150 units, if suggested medium-rise (five or six stories) construction is allowed.

As soon as the preliminary plans for the 40-unit project are completed the MHA will begin looking for possible sources of federal funds for another project, Squatrito said.

Duplication at crash rescue raises fire department question

A two-car accident this morning on N. Main St. in which two persons received hospital treatment has apparently raised a question of which fire department in Manchester is responsible for providing emergency medical assistance.

Both the Town of Manchester and the North End Fire Department responded to the 7:37 a.m. accident near the Ball plant, a location within the Eighth District's area.

Town firefighters say they responded to a Manchester Police request for aid under provisions of a new policy. Eighth District fire fighters say there's apparently a mixup in the policy of calling the town fire department.

Police policy states that the Town Fire Department is to be called when injuries in an automobile accident require Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) at the scene. The policy apparently doesn't men-

tion the Eighth District.

Asst. Chief John Christensen of the Eighth District said today he couldn't understand why the town fire fighters were called when the Eighth District has the same capability for emergencies.

Capt. Joseph McCooe of the Town Fire Department, complaining that his men were harassed by Eighth District volunteers at the scene, said there's no question town men should be called because they're better trained and more readily available for emergencies.

McCooe said there was a verbal confrontation between town men and Eighth District men at the accident scene, but the alleged confrontation didn't hamper rescue efforts.

Christensen said it's possible that Eighth District volunteers might have exchanged words with town fire fighters, but there was no harassment.

Town fire fighters responded to the 7:42 a.m. call with two pieces of apparatus and several men, including three EMTs. Eighth District men were called to the scene at 7:45 a.m., also responding with two pieces of apparatus, several men and at least two EMTs.

Two persons hurt in the accident - Suzanne Sorden, 26, of 204 E. Middle Tpke. and Tony Arcari, 26, of Hartford - were taken to Manchester Memorial Hospital by the Manchester Ambulance Service, which also had qualified EMTs at the scene.

Mrs. Sorden was treated for a fractured nose and released. Arcari was treated for cuts and bruises and released.

Officials said that both persons appeared to have more severe injuries before they were taken to the hospital.

Police had no comment on the incident. The accident investigation was incomplete at midday.
