### Pitch by MDC addles board

The Metropolitan District Commission (MDC) presented a water sales pitch Thursday night to the Manchester Board of Directors and the Manchester Water Study Committee, which left those attending in a muddled state.

A reaction of confusion and resentment pervaded members of the board and study committee, which just last month submitted a report of its nine-month town water study to

The Water Study Committee has been studying plans for improving the town's water treatment in an effort to upgrade its water system and meet federal water standards.

At the invitation of Mayor Stephen Penny, William DiBella, chairman of the Metropolitan District Commission, and MDC staff members presented facts and figures on their water sales plan. The Water Study Committee was present also at the mayor's invitation.

Town Manager Robert Weiss was absent because he was ill, and board members Carl Zinsser and William Diana were out of town.

DiBella, who is also a Hartford councilman, gave an historical background of the MDC which has been in operation since 1928. Involved in the complex water operation are 15 dams and reservoirs, 10 filter beds and 31,000 acres of watershed. DiBella said.

Using charts, which no one but Directors table could see, cost projections were explained by Donald Vigneau of East Hartford, chairman of the Hartford Water

Saying that the MDC turns out an average of 53 million gallons of water per day, he added that "our water is so pure you can put it in your car battery." He cited emergencies such as big fires when several million gallons of water were lost per day, but customer service wasn't affected.

The water supply system that MDC is proposing for Manchester is based on the water main that goes through East Hartford to one-and-a-half miles within the Manchester town line, according to Peter Rowley, MDC chief engineer. The pipe lines would be increased with added pumping stations as Manchester's water needs increased with projected population estimates about 1985 and

later, Rowley said. To the many questions asked after the presentation by board and Water Study Committee members, DiBella frequently used "negotiable" in his replies. The repeated usage was one of annoyance to committee chairman

MDC members had left, was dissatisfied that the MDC didn't seem to have any definite answers to the group's questions. "All we heard was 'negotiable'." Reinhorn said. "We couldn't seem to pin him down."

Questions raised were about negotiating with the Glastonbury residents currently using Manchester water, the cost if MDC monitored the water going into Mancheser's system, comparison of projection costs between the MDC and Water Study Committee DiBella guaranteed that Manchester's projection costs aren't going to be what the study committee predicts), rate of cost increases, and would MDC maintain the town's water assets if Manchester bought MDC's water.

Reinhorn asked that MDC document the information presented so that the Water Study Committee could study all the facts at a future

committee meeting.
The committee asked DiBella why the MDC had not come to the board or the Water Study Committee previously with its information. DiBella replied that he was accustomed to dealing with city or town managing officials. He said that he had met previously with Weiss. He also said he had offered a tour of the MDC facilities to any Manchester officials interested. None has taken the tour, DiBella said.

DiBella apologized if he was at fault for not contacting the Water Study Committee with the MDC's water supply plan, but he said he thought the contact would be made through Weiss.

Water Study Committee members were "upset over this meeting tonight because we had no information (from MDC) and could not rebut.

Mayor Penny was "flabbergasted" that the situation existed. "I thought that when you made the report about MDC that you had full information and communication with MDC." Penny said referring to the committee's rejection of a previous suggestion to buy water from the

During DiBella's presentation, he said the MDC is currently supplying water to parts of Manchester in Squire Village and Fountain Village. He said there has also been an into the proposed Buckland Industrial

### Alcoholic counselor ites about his life

> "Consider the Alternative" is a book dedicated to "the thousands of alcoholics anonymous members who don't open the gates of Heaven and let people in but open the gates of Hell to let people out."

> Lee M. Silverstein, a resident of the Manchester area, is author of this book who describes himself as being "chemically free after being alcoho and drug dependent for many years.' Silverstein now heads the Human Services Department at Rockville General Hospital.

Thursday he was the guest of honor at a tea sponsored by the hospital's auxiliary and during the afternoon be quiry about providing water service obligingly signed copies of the recently published book.

In the book, Silverstein takes a good look at his own life and describes how, even though he was a successful businessman, he never felt success.

"I felt only the deep personal inadequacy I had felt all my life. So I deadened the pain with alcohol and

"I was crippled inside, wrecked with active alcoholism, lonely, guiltridden, anxious about unknown fears, confused, alienated, suicidal," he said. He compared himself to a "live Peter Pan" seeking only pleasure, loving no one and committed to

nothing. The opening chapter of his book is titled "Reborn" and in it Silverstein tells how his rebirth began with his entrance into Alcoholics Anonymous (AA). He said there he became aware of the necessity of involvement with other people and the importance of sharing experience, strength, and hope.

He tells how for so many years he had felt pain alone and had chosen not to look at alternatives and how he learned to give up alcohol and drugs

with the help of others. Silverstein is a graduate of the Harvard Business School and has a master's degree from the University of Connecticut School of Social Work He has worked at the Blue Hills Clinic and was coordinator for its psychiatric day program, director of social services and director of the alcoholism services.

Silverstein can relate to his clients. He said he knows what anguish is and what rejection is. "I grew up in a house of anger: I grew up a Jewish boy in a Yankee town. I grew up with facial paralysis. As a boy I cultivated a sense of humor as a defense against those sorrows," he said.

"Consider the Alternative" not only tells how Silverstein was able to reverse his life but it also contains many self-examining exercises to help others do the same and woven in some of the chapters is evidence of Silverstein's sense of humor which he said, when used properly, is a great tool for establishing and maintaining rapport with others and for

his own balance. Also interspersed among chapters of the book are quotations such as "He who knows others, is clever; he who knows himself is enlightened.' Much of the book was written in a Benedictine monastery high in the Adirondack Mountains. Silverstein said he went there because he needed to establish his priorities and goals.

### Antarctic has clues to future

McMURDO, Antarctica (UPI) -If you think it was cold last winter, stick around a few hundred years Antarctica's scientists say it could get even colder.

Dr. George Denton of the University of Maine said glacial studies in the Antarctic show things were lots warmer down there 120,000 years ago, got progressively colder and then warmed up for a spell.

The New England geologist said that warm period is just about over, and the entire world could be entering another cold cycle.

Dutch-born Dr. Minze Stuiver of the University of Washington explained that new techniques of measuring the moisture content of the Antarctic snow and ice pack now give man a more accurate picture of the weather cycles on the continent.

The Navy's chief meteorologist at McMurdo, Lt. Ronald Fauquet, of Granada Hills, Calif., is even more specific. "It would seem from our records that during the last 10 to 15 years Antarctica has been getting

The New Zealanders at Scott base, just two miles from McMurdo, claim last year was the coldest ever experienced by their wintering-over party since records were started 20

The cold of which they spoke was a daily average of about -50 degrees Fahrenheit. Several times the mercury dropped to around -100 during the long Antarctic winter, and those figures did not include the chill fac-

The lowest official temperature ever reported in the Antarctic - or anywhere else in the world - was at the Russian base of Vostok near the south geomagnetic pole where it dropped to -126.9 on Aug. 24, 1960.

Not only has it been getting colder in the Antarctic, but scientists here said more moisture seems to be falling over the continent, but they cautioned that this could be a result of the more sensitive instruments now being used in antarctic meteorology. American temperatures have dropped an average of 0.7 degrees over the past 20 years, Fauquet said, while the average in the Antarctic has been

Denton explained that such a temperature change in such a relatively short period of time could indicate that the world had reached another "of the mountains and valleys in its climatology where changes are taking place. This one would seem to be another cooling of period.

The meteorologists are convinced that any change in the temperature of the Antarctic air mass will affect climatic conditions in the Southern Hemisphere, particularly Australia. New Zealand and Africa.

"We have traced storms and cold fronts from the Antarctic all the way through Australia." Fauquet said, 'and whenever New Zealand gets snow it comes from here, not the

The most useful tool used in Antarctic weather research has been the American satellite system which now, for the first time, gives meteorologists continuous picture coverage of the continent's weather patterns. But on the debit side, there are only 20 ground stations reporting in Antarctica, which is the size of America and Europe combined, compared to the 600 reporting in the United States.






