Nuclear satellite crashes

WASHINGTON (UPI) - A Soviet military satellite with a small nuclear reactor aboard fell to earth over northwest Canada today, the White House announced. The probability of contamination was described as minimal.

Reporters were summoned to an urgent briefing by National Security Affairs adviser Zbigniew Brzezinski and informed that The Cosmos satellite, in orbit since Sept. 18, had been malfunctioning since

"This is not a horror scenario." Brzezinski said. "The chances of real hazard are small."

But, he said, the United States dispatched two Air Force planes to the scene over Great Slave Lake to sample the atmosphere.

Brzezinski said that results of the sampling for radioactivity would be known within five or six hours. Brzezinski said the 3-by-3 foot, 100-

pound satellite -- powered by a small nuclear device fed by uranium 235 -'in all probability" burned up before it entered the earth's atmosphere. He said the Soviets immediately informed a number of nations, including Canada and the United

States, and had acted "responsibly" in the matter. The reactor was aboard the satellite to provide electricity. He said that in none of the contacts with the Soviets did the United States ask if a weapon was aboard. He said

there was no need to ask. "This difficulty in the space age is completely under control," said Brzezinski. He added that there is small danger of contamination.

The satellite went across British Columbia, northwest Alberta and the Northwest territory. Brzezinski said that he had sent

directives throughout the government military and security agencies because "we were planning for the

He said the directives outlined "certain emergency procedures" in event the satellite fell to Earth or there was contamination over the United States.

In late December, said Brzezinski. "We got some indications that the Soviet Cosmos satellite with a nuclear reactor on board was encountering difficulties and that at some point it would re-enter the atmosphere with some uncertainties as to what would happen when it did

Those uncertainties, he said, included "whether it would burn up in the atmosphere or whether some portions of the satellite would come down to Earth posing some risks of contamination.

Brzezinski said that on Jan. 12 he conveyed a message to Soviet Ambassador Anatoly Dobrynin on President Carter's behalf "posing certain questions regarding this matter, indicating that if the debris fell near a populated or unpopulated area there could be some serious hazard to the

'We invited the Soviets to share whatever information they have with us so that the appropriate measures can be taken to obviate such dangers, Brzezinksi said.

Dobrynin answered Jan. 14 and conveyed an answer "which was somewhat reassuring but not fully satisfactory from the standpoint of what we needed to know," he said.

Brzezinski said new questions were posed by the United States on Jan. 17 and two days later Dobrynin conveyed "more complete answers which provided some additional information, especially that there was no danger of a critical mass and therefore precipitating a nuclear explosion of a bomb site."

"On Jan. 17, I signed a directive to the secretary of state, the secretary of defense, the secretary of energy, administrator of NASA, director of Central Intelligence, and director of the Office of Science and Technology." Brzezinski said.

"This directive established certain emergency procedures in the event that debris would be present on the surface and in the event there would have to be a cleanup and safety

Brzezinski said he talked by telephone several times to Dobrynin on Sunday, Monday and this morning. He said, "Last week we also informed friendly governments that would be affected, assuring them that we were in close and cooperative touch with the Soviets. that we were tracking it very carefully, that our estimate is that the chances of real hazard are quite

small, and that we would keep them informed of what transpires.

Building strength in the southern Rockjes, the storm dumped heavy snows on Utah, Colorado, New Mexico, western Texas and western Nebraska. Under mounting pressure from and foreign tax matters was too controversial even to this year.

On the other hand, his \$24.5 billion tax-cut plan may not only survive but a fight is shaping over whether to enlarge it. Some congressional leaders have expressed concern the cut is too big, but Republicans and some Democrats complain it is not big enough.

WASHINGTON (UPI) - President Carter and Secretary of State Cyrus Vance are calling on Egypt and Israel to cool the rhetoric and in an atmosphere of quiet diplomacy resume pegotiations to bring peace to the Middle East.

The president met with Vance at the White House only minutes after returning from a three-day holiday off the Georgia coast Later, they issued a statement urging Egyptian President Anwar Sadat and Israeli Prime Minister Menahem Begin to "recapture the spirit" of their historic meetings of late last year.

OAK LAKE, Manitoba (UPI) -A man barricaded in a doctor's use with three hostages after a gun battle in which a Mountie was killed said today he was "sorry for what happened" but he would never surrender.

The man demanded \$100,000 and safe passage out of the country for himself and his wife or there would be "a helluva big grave."

Educators not sure about transfer plan

Manchester Board of Education members were not convinced Monday night that a transfer plan for 86 Verplanck School students is the best alternative available.

The board delayed action on the plan presented by Wilson E. Deakin Jr., assistant superintendent, at Monday night's board meeting at Highland Park School.

The plan was devised to solve the immediate problem of too many students at Verplanck next year. The number of students in Grades 3 and 6 next year would mean the need for two additional classrooms, which are not available at Verplanck, Deakin

Because most of the Verplanck School district students walk to school, it was decided to transfer the largest concentration of students who are bused, which is the Souire Village complex off Spencer Street, Deakin explained to the board.

School board member Earl Odom questioned the fact that children in the same neighborhood would be attending three different schools. He also said it is a difficult situation when children in the same family attend different schools. By allowing such a situation, Odom said, "We're doing something wrong."

Board member Nicholas Costa also asked Deakin if parents who do not want to send their child to the transfer school have any option.

Deakin said the administration is willing to listen to anyone and will try to accommodate individual situations.

School Superintendent James P. Kennedy said the school administration will consider babysitters or relatives as reasons for asking for a school change and will also consider changes for reasons of school program if the parent is willing to provide the transportation.

No opposition heard to subdivision plans

Manchester's Planning and Zoning Commission had a rare happening Monday night - a public hearing for a 135-lot subdivision that drew no opposition.

The hearing was even more unusual because the site of the proposed development - the Walek tract off Keeney Street - is the same one that was the subject of a crowded and stormy public hearing two years

The developers, Herman Frechette, Albert Martin, Gerald Rothman and attorney David Golas, have proposed a 135-lot Residence AA Cluster Zone for the 80-acre site east of Keeney Street across from Leland and Linwood drives.

Two years ago, the developers sought a Residence M Zone subdivision at the site. This proposal met with strong opposition from area residents. About 400 opponents attended a public hearing on the proposed development. The M Zone plan was denied by the PZC.

But, Monday night, was a total change from the 1976 hearing. Only a handful of residents attended, and they all spoke in favor of the Residence AA Cluster Zone. No one spoke against the proposal.

We feel this is good use of the land. We think it regards the needs of the neighboring residents," Richard Jensen of 231 Keeney St. said.

The cluster concept permits lots and houses that are smaller than those permitted in a regular Residence AA Zone. It also requires the developer to turn over 25 percent of the property to the town for open

The developers have proposed giving the town two parcels. One is about 12 acres adjacent to the townowned ski slope.

"Everybody seems quite enthusiastic that this parcel would lead to a natural extension of the ski area," Golas, who represented the applicants, said.

The other parcel would be about eight acres next to the Keeney Street School. It would be used as a detention area for storm water and also be utilized as a skating area in the PZC member Joseph Swensson

asked about the hazard of the detention area near the school. William O'Neill, the engineer for the development, said that the detention area would improve the area's drainage and would be mostly two to three feet deep with a maximum depth of seven feet in one spot if a 25-year storm oc-

Alan Lamson, town planner, and Jay Giles, director of public works, suggested several changes, mostly minor technical ones, to the proposed

Lamson and Golas also mentioned the possibility of someday extending one of the subdivision's streets that would be parallel to Keeney Street north through property that is now owned by Connecticut Bank & Trust.

That parcel might be a future development site. Lamson also said that the road might eventually be extended all the way to Hackmatack Street.

In other items on Monday's agenda, the commission discussed, but took no action on, a proposed church on West Vernon Street submitted by the Unitarian Universalist Society:

A couple of PZC members expressed their concern about travel on the street.

"It's just frightful traveling there," Swensson said, The commission has until March to act on the church proposal.

The PZC Monday night voted to deny a request from Raymond Luce for a special exception to permit the outside storage of motor vehicles at a Sheldon Road site Luce had proposed developing an

area to store motor vehicles involved in accidents until an insurance adjuster can inspect them.

Leo Kwash moved that the application be denied. He said that outside storage in an industrial zone is expected to be connected with an ongoing operation. All four PZC members agreed that the proposed use is one that they feel is not allowed according to the town's zoning regulations.
