## Motorists trapped by snow on coast

HARTFORD (UPI) — Heavy snow today trapped motorists temporarily on Interstate 95 and closed schools throughout the state as a major storm moved into New England. More than a foot of snow was predicted for Connecticut.

At least six people suffering minor injuries were taken to hospitals after they had accidents on I-95, were trapped in their cars and then were extricated, state police at the Westport barracks said.

"We've had at least 50 accidents. Some people had to be extricated but everyone who was trapped is out. The roads are extremely hazardous. You just can't get through due to all the accidents," said Trooper James McCarthy.

Gov. Ella T. Grasso ordered all 40,000 state workers to go home at noon except those in emergency positions. She also canceled her evening office hours scheduled for tonight.

Banking Commissioner David Neiditz authorized all banks to close at noon.

for sections of Connecticut by the National Weather Service which issued a heavy snow warning and a travelers advisory.

"A rapidly developing storm off the mid Atlantic coast will likely become a vicious nor'easter this afternoon," the weather bureau said.

Anthony Palmese, of the Transportation Department's Storm Center, said 2 1/2 inches of snow fell in Greenwich in two hours this morning.

"At 7:30 we had two inches on the ground. At 9:30 we had four and a half inches and it's still snowing heavily," he said.

Palmese said road crews were working steadily in Fairfield County

and the New Haven area by mid-morning.

"In a storm like this, we'll be out 100 percent statewide and we'll hire more trucks as they're needed," he said. In major storms the department regularly uses 829 state and contractor snowplows and trucks, and 1,670 men.

By midmorning 2 1/2 inches had fallen in New Canaan and about half an inch blanketed New Haven. Only a few flakes had fallen in Hartford.

Almost all Fairfield County towns canceled school today. Schools were opened in Bridgeport and Fairfield, but they planned to send students home by noon.

Roland Laro, meteorologist in charge at Bradley International Airport in Windsor Locks, said light snow would increase in intensity late this afternoon but he said it was too early to predict snow accumulations.

"Pick a number (for expected snow accumulation) and somebody has called it," he said, "but it's a little premature right now."

The snow was expected to become heavy at times tonight and to taper off to flurries sometime Tuesday. High temperatures were predicted in the 20s today with lows tonight in the teens.

Gale warnings were issued for the coast with heavy surf and tides expected to cause some beach erosion tonight and Tuesday. Some local flooding of low lying coastal areas was expected at times of high tide.

The most recent major snowfall was Jan. 20 when up to 2 feet fell in some sections of Connecticut, causing flat roofs to cave in and shutting down most schools and many businesses.

That storm was followed by heavy rains Jan. 26 which resulted in heavy flooding that hit eastern Connecticut the hardest and forced hundreds of families to evacuate their homes.

## Summit didn't succeed

WASHINGTON (UPI) — With no agreement in hand on how to resume the stalled peace talks with Israel, Egyptian President Anwar Sadat today undertook to argue his case with the American people.

Sadat and President Carter returned to Washington Sunday afternoon after two days and three long talks at Camp David, a secluded presidential retreat in the snow-covered Catoctin Mountains of western Maryland.

An interview with Sadat on NBC later made it clear the Carter-Sadat summit did not succeed in what American officials had described as a minimum goal: achieving early resumption of the foreign ministers' talks broken off by Sadat on Jan. 18 in Jerusalem.

Instead, Sadat said, it was agreed that assistant Secretary of State Alfred Atherton Jr. will shuttle between Egypt and Israel in an effort to create some compromise language that would permit a resumption of the talks.

In the meantime, Sadat said, talks between the defense ministers in Cairo will continue.

The Egyptian president, meanwhile, scheduled two days of meetings, appearances and interviews in Washington before a final session with Carter Wednesday.

Sadat's schedule called for meetings with American Jewish community leaders at Blair House Monday morning and a speech and question-and-answer session later at the National Press Club.

On Tuesday, he is to meet key congressional leaders, do at least two more television interviews and have a private "background" session with American editors and columnists.

Israeli Defense Minister Moshe Dayan has been invited to Washington soon after Sadat leaves Wednesday evening.

The Egyptian president said he would be willing to resume the foreign ministers' talks, but with a necessary precondition — agreement with Israel on a basic set of principles. The weekend talks had been designed, among other things, to produce such a declaration.

Sadat repeatedly made two points in Sunday night's interview with NBC's David Brinkley: — He expressed gratitude to the American people, particularly the American Jews, for the "sentiments they have shown." Speaking of the American Jews at one point he said, "I shall never fail them, or all the American people."

— He accused Israel, at length, of taking the "wrong direction" after his visit to Jerusalem in November. He said the Israelis accepted his offer of recognition, direct talks, and full diplomatic relations as part of a comprehensive peace settlement without making any similar response in turn.

## District claims signers misled

A committee from the Eighth Utilities District has charged that petitioners in the district seeking signatures for a consolidation referendum have been misleading residents.

This is the second complaint in five days about petitioning in Manchester's North End, but persons involved in the effort deny any wrongdoing.

The petitioning is being organized by "The Committee for One Manchester." The group is trying to obtain signatures from ten percent of the registered voters in the district and ten percent of the registered voters in non-district areas of Manchester.

If these numbers of signatures re-obtained, the committee apparently will continue work to place the consolidation question on the ballot this November. Consolidation would combine the Eighth Utilities District with the Town of Manchester, eliminating the present setup of separate fire departments and sewer authorities.

The complaint was made by the district's ad hoc committee, which charged that some circulators of petitions have been misleading electors.

"These circulators have instructed electors that their signature in no way supports consolidation," the committee said in a press release issued this morning.

Last week, Granville "Ted" Lingard, fire chief for the Eighth Utilities District, criticized the use of Town Fire Department members to distribute petitions for a referendum question on consolidation.

The ad hoc committee, which was formed by the district when talk of

the recent consolidation movement started, said that the statements that the petitioners do not support consolidation are "false and misleading, the petition is for consolidation, just as its plain language says," the committee release said.

"If ten percent (of the district's voters) do not sign this petition, there can be no townwide referendum. Every signature on this petition may be a nail in the coffin of the Eighth District," it said.

The release also said that forms are available if someone wishes to withdraw his or her signature from the petition. It also asks that any district resident who feels he or she has been misled should contact Robert Bletchman, who is chairman of the ad hoc committee, or any district director.

Those involved in the petitioning, however, feel that there has been no misleading by the circulators.

"Signing the petition does not mean there will be consolidation. It just means that the question will be placed on a referendum," Durward Miller, co-chairman of the Committee for One Manchester, said.

He said that circulators were not told to say that signing the petition does not support consolidation.

"But, if they are, it's not wrong," he said.

Miller also said that there have been about 700 signatures obtained in the district. The committee needs about 750 signatures to reach the ten percent mark in the district.

Ted Cummings, Democratic town chairman and also a member of the Committee for One Manchester, said, "We're telling people that signing the petition means there will be a referendum."

"We're sticking to the rulebook, no matter what the district people say," he said.

## 1978 Legislature a little different

HARTFORD (UPI) — The all new 1978 legislative session, which goes on display Wednesday, is expected to have a lot of the same features highlighted in last year's model. But there's an important difference. This is a campaign year.

This year's legislative session will have a compact look to it. It will be three months long instead five, like 1977's model. But the shorter session is expected to have enough room inside to accommodate many of the legislative ideas Connecticut residents have become accustomed to.

Just like its predecessor, this year's session is expected to sport proposals to reform the state's liquor pricing system, to allow motorists to make right turns at red lights, to control auto pollution, to prevent stores from opening on Sundays and to ban throwaway bottles and cans.

But this year's session is expected

to be more luxurious than last year's entry. It's being billed as a money model.

Last year, the Legislature adopted a budget just under \$2 billion, almost exactly what Gov. Ella T. Grasso ordered. This year, the state's fiscal package is expected to carry a price tag that could run well over the \$2 billion mark.

Shortly after the session's unveiling, Mrs. Grasso will tell the Legislature what she wants the driveshaft of this year's session — the budget — to carry as standard features.

The governor has said she likes the lean look of a half-percent cut in Connecticut's hefty 7 percent sales tax. WASHINGTON (UPI) — Muriel Humphrey, taking over the job her husband held for almost a quarter-century, says she will not be a "caretaker" as the only woman in the U.S. Senate and the first woman senator in more than five years.

Mrs. Humphrey, a petite 65-year-old mother of four and grandmother of 10, was to take the oath of office this afternoon in a simple and traditional Senate ceremony.

HONG KONG (UPI) — Vietnam has given in to an unprecedented U.S. expulsion order and recalled its chief representative to the United Nations, but it denied that Ambassador Dinh Ba Thi was a spy.

The official Vietnam News Agency said Sunday that Thi, the first U.N. ambassador ever expelled by Washington, was being ordered home "because the U.S. government was hindering the activities of the Vietnamese U.N. chief."

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House votes Tuesday on an issue organized consumer groups have been pushing for eight years, and the chief pusher, Ralph Nader, says the outcome is too close to call.

The vote on whether to establish an office of consumer representation is crucial because, if the measure fails to pass the overwhelmingly Democratic House with President Carter's stamp of approval in advance, it will almost certainly die.

Nader told UPI he thinks the bill would have no trouble getting through the Senate because "we have between 60 and 65 votes in the Senate alone."

But the House, he said, "is very close, nip-and-tuck. There's no way of saying right now."

EDMONTON, Alberta (UPI) — Scientists recovered the most radioactive fragment from a crashed Soviet spy satellite and ordered increased radiation detection flights today in a search for more debris.

Scientists, protected by 1,600 pounds of lead shielding, braved 40-below-zero temperatures to recover the fragment from frozen Great Slave Lake Saturday and load it aboard a Chinook helicopter.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A compromise proposal on natural gas deregulation, said to be the last chance for passage of the energy bill, is being circulated among House and Senate negotiators.

The plan is being offered by Sen. Henry Jackson, D-Wash., who said Sunday it would "give deregulation a trial down the road," but allow the president to reimpose price controls if the test fails.

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (UPI) — Nicaraguans voted in a virtual state of siege Sunday amid growing reports of an imminent end to a two-week general strike in protest against the regime of President Anastasio Somoza.

Returns were expected today from municipal elections and observers said the turnout by Nicaragua's 1 million eligible voters appeared very light.

MOGADISHU, Somalia (UPI) — Somali insurgents today reported a heavy battle raging around two cities in Ethiopia's Ogaden region, three days after the start of a massive Ethiopian offensive reportedly aimed at Somalia itself.

The insurgent newspaper Danab (Lightning Bolt) Friday reported for the first time the start of a two-pronged Ethiopian offensive backed by Soviet and Cuban forces.

## Army costs up billions since draft

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The end of the draft and the switch to an all-volunteer Army, Navy and Air Force has added more than \$18.4 billion to national defense costs since 1971, congressional investigators said today.

The report by the General Accounting Office, the investigating arm of Congress, was released by Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga. It attributed the sharp increase in costs to higher pay, enlistment bonuses, higher recruiting costs, better housing and other changes to make military life more attractive.

The shift began in 1971 and all conscription ended in December 1972. By July 1, 1973, the nation had returned to an all-volunteer military force for the first time in three decades.

The GAO said its study showed the change added \$90 million to costs in fiscal 1971. The additional costs rose to a peak of \$3.4 billion in 1975 and totaled \$18.4 billion through 1977.

Assistant Defense Secretary John White said GAO's failure to consider various factors caused it "to greatly overstate the costs and understate the savings" of an all-volunteer force.

According to Pentagon estimates, he said, the GAO estimate was at least \$3.7 billion too high.

Controversial tax treaty

WASHINGTON—(NEA) — The Senate is preparing for the politically delicate task of ratifying a controversial treaty with a nation that long has been a staunch ally of the United States.

But this pact has nothing whatever to do with the Panama Canal. It's the proposed United States-United Kingdom Tax Treaty, a far less publicized document, but one that probably will have a substantial impact on most Americans and the taxes they pay.

The leading tax official in President Carter's home state of Georgia warns that Senate ratification of the treaty will constitute "a total federal cave-in to the desires of the multinational corporations at the expense of workers, small businessmen and the states."

one section of the treaty that would prohibit states from using the "unitary method" of assessing corporate taxes and would require instead an approach known as the "arms-length method."

The "arms-length method," however, allows only examination of the finances of a corporation's subsidiaries or affiliates within the particular state. Thus, a company can avert taxes by bookkeeping transfers of profits to foreign units.

Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, says the controversial section "has raised doubts in my own mind" — and his position probably is crucial to the treaty's future because Church is in line to become chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee next year.

## Town, union disputes center on promotions

The relationship between the Town of Manchester administration and the union representing Public Works Department employees has been marked by several disputes in recent months. But most of those involved in the matters say that the main problem now concerns the method for making promotions, particularly in the Water Department.

The addition of the Manchester Water Co. and requirements mandated by the federal government have resulted in many changes in the Water Department. The amount of change in recent years is the apparent reason for more union-oriented problems in this department than in any other that includes employees of the union, American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, AFL-CIO, Local 981.

The town has used a merit system for promotions since 1973. Frank Jodanis, water and sewer administrator, said. Previously, most promotions had been based on seniority.

The purchase of the Manchester Water Co. led to a large increase in staff, something that no other department has had to deal with. Thus, promotions in this department have caused more complex problems than in others.

"That's been a conflict with the union for several years," Jay Giles, director of public works, said of the merit system.

Jodanis said that the seniority system is preferred by the union for promotions because it bases a promotion merely on the number of years worked.

"It's an absolute thing. It's totally objective, there's nothing subjective to it," Jodanis said of the seniority system.

"But, there's a lot more to a person than the amount of time he's spent on the job," he said.

A great majority of this department

revolve around promotions," Jodanis said.

Robert Fuller, president of 981, agreed that Water Department promotions involving past employees of the water company have been part of the union dispute.

"Between the merit system and the contract, we have some differences," Fuller said.

He does not feel that the differences about promotions should affect the upcoming union and town contract negotiations. The union contract expires June 30.

A court case challenging a town promotion of a Water Department employee should resolve the matter, he said.

Jodanis said that changes he has instituted in the department have resulted in some of the union-town dispute.

"There are communication problems. Probably one of the hardest things to do is to change something," he said.

Giles said that most of the grievances from his departments should be filed by employees of the Highway, Water or Sewer Departments.

In recent months, however, the number of Highway and Sewer Department grievances has been reduced.

In fact, in the Highway Department, a grievance has not been filed since September 1976. Before that, the grievance had been filed at a rate of about four per week, Timothy O'Sullivan, highway superintendent, said.

Giles credits O'Sullivan and some change in personnel for the drop in complaints. He said that the superintendent has good control of them (the workers). I think he's being fair with them, and that's all they want," he said.

O'Sullivan said that he tries to involve all department personnel in

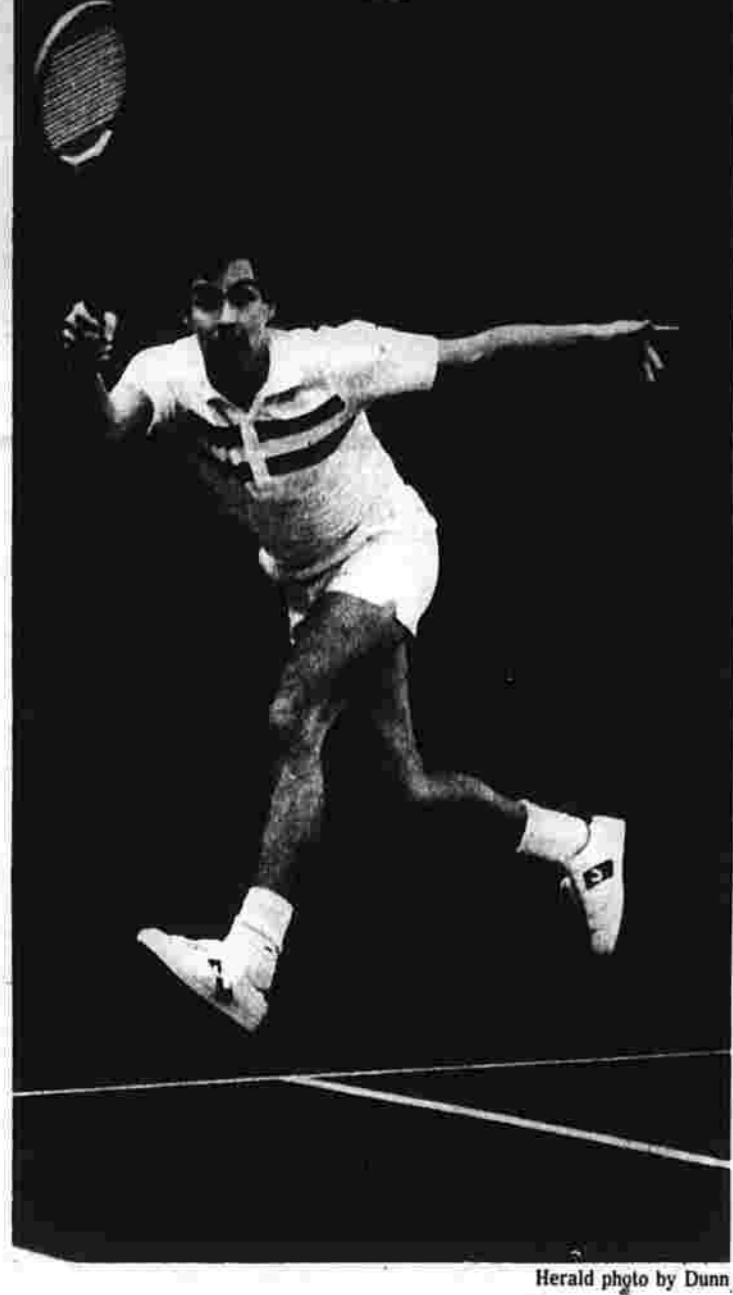

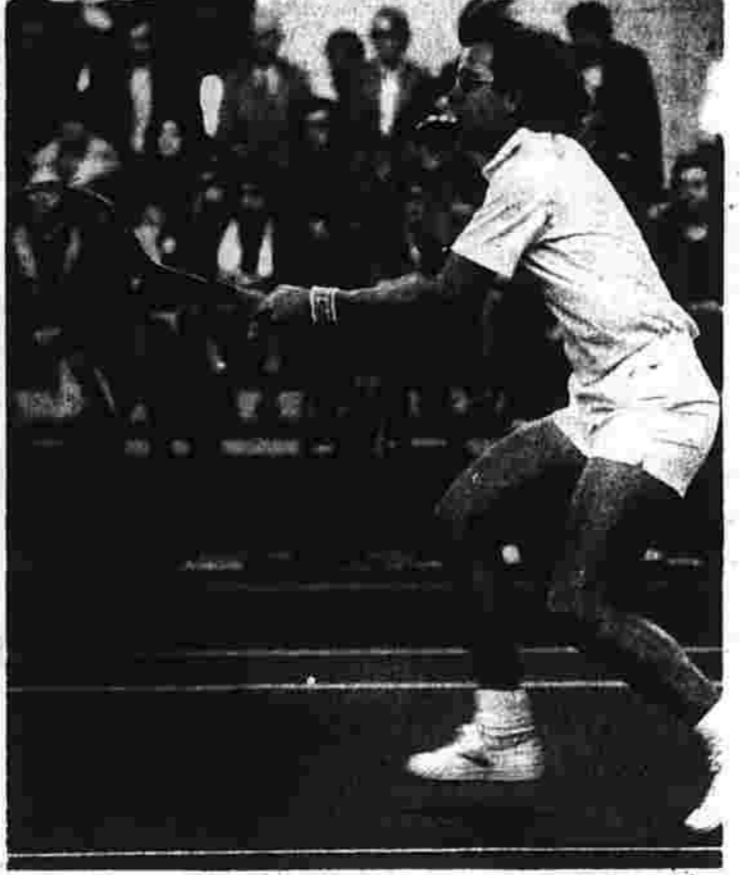

**Chamber asks Sears why closing planned**

Upset by the news that Sears Roebuck Co. plans to close its Rockville catalog outlet store, the board of directors of the Rockville Area Chamber of Commerce has written to Sears officials questioning the reason for the move. Harvey A. Desrussieux, president of the board, in a letter to Guy Eberhart, a Sears official, said the news of the closing came at a time when the chamber had been told that the Rockville store was doing such a good business and that it would be moving "across the street" to much larger quarters. The chamber, Desrussieux said, has been deluged with inquiries and protests concerning the decision. He said the office workers report that they have received more calls on this than on any other subject in the last 10 years. Desrussieux said additional space in Rockville is available and was offered to Sears at less than the going rate. In announcing the closing, Sears officials said those who use the Rockville office can go to the Manchester office. But Desrussieux said the chamber has been told, by customers in Rockville, that they would not be in a position to go to Manchester and that their alternative would be to find another local catalog outlet.

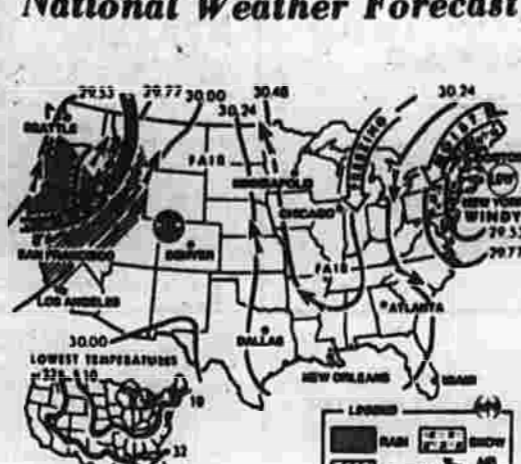

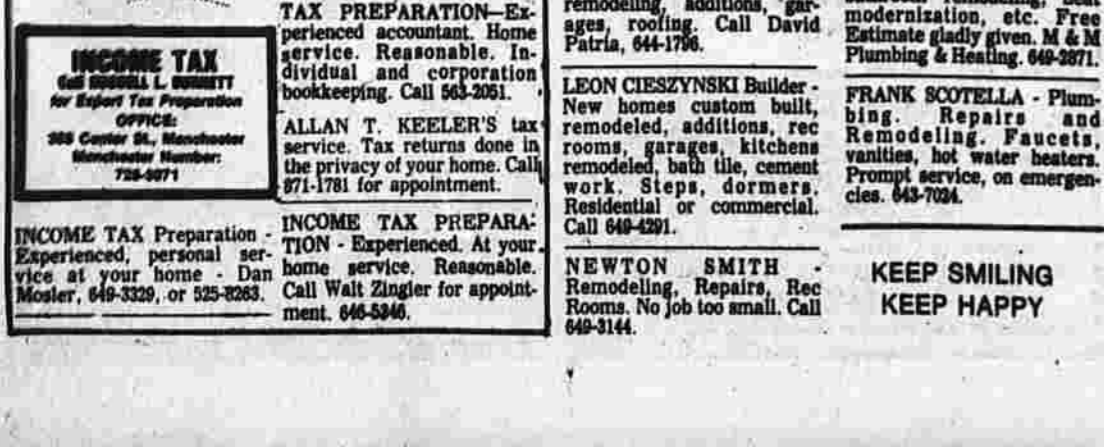
