# Free-lancer's shorthand key to film about Reilly

 HARTFORD (UPI)—Millions who watched the Peter Reilly movie Wednesday night on television might have been viewing something else if it weren't for some St. Louis nuns who insisted their students master shorthand.

"I used to complain back in St. Louis where I grew up that I was made to learn shorthand, but that's the only way I could have gotten the transcripts of the tapes," said Joan Barthelemy, author of "A Death in Casamir."

The CBS television drama was based on her book and the tapes made by the Connecticut state police of Peter Reilly's interrogation and confession in the Sept. 28, 1972, murder of his mother, Barbara Gibbons, 51.

Reilly, then a fatherless 18-year-old high school senior, repudiated his confession the next day and began a successful struggle for exoneration with the help of local people, an anonymous woman, and celebrities.

Reilly was convicted of manslaughter in 1974, but was granted a new trial in 1976. The case was later dropped after it was disclosed that evidence in Reilly's favor had been withheld for three years by the state.

In May 1977, a special grand jury investigating the handling of the crime virtually absolved Reilly of the crime although state police still insist on his guilt.

Ms. Barthelemy said she is convinced Reilly's story would have come out eventually. "I happened to be there early, so perhaps I hastened things along a bit," she said. "Eventually, there was a transcript available, but I understand even then, it was difficult to get."

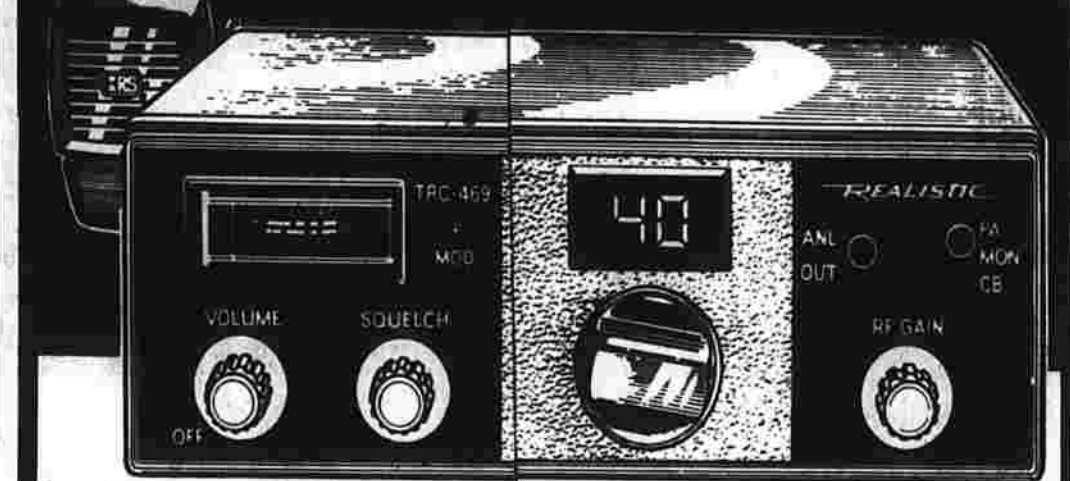

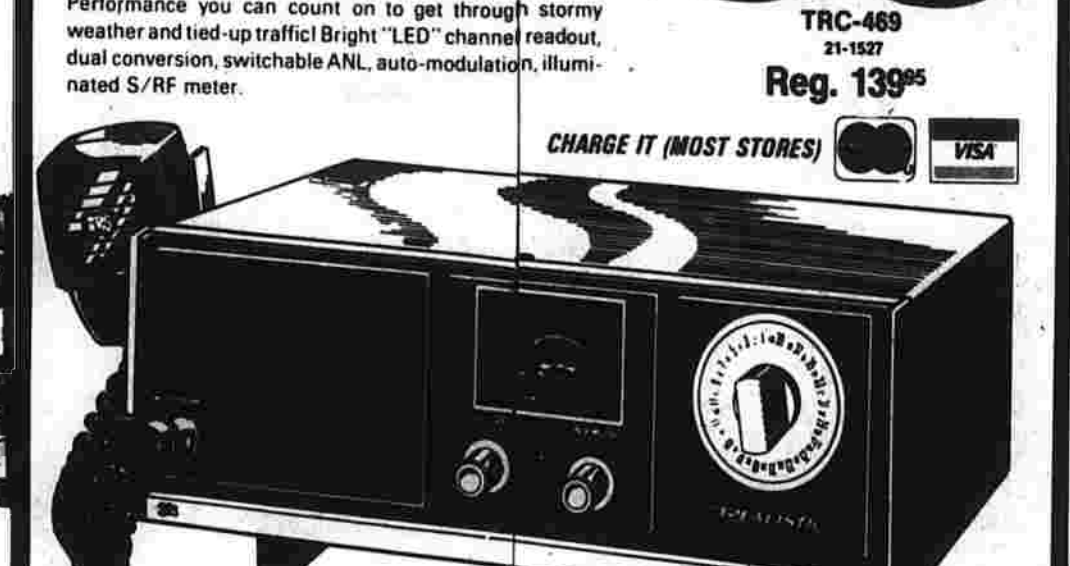

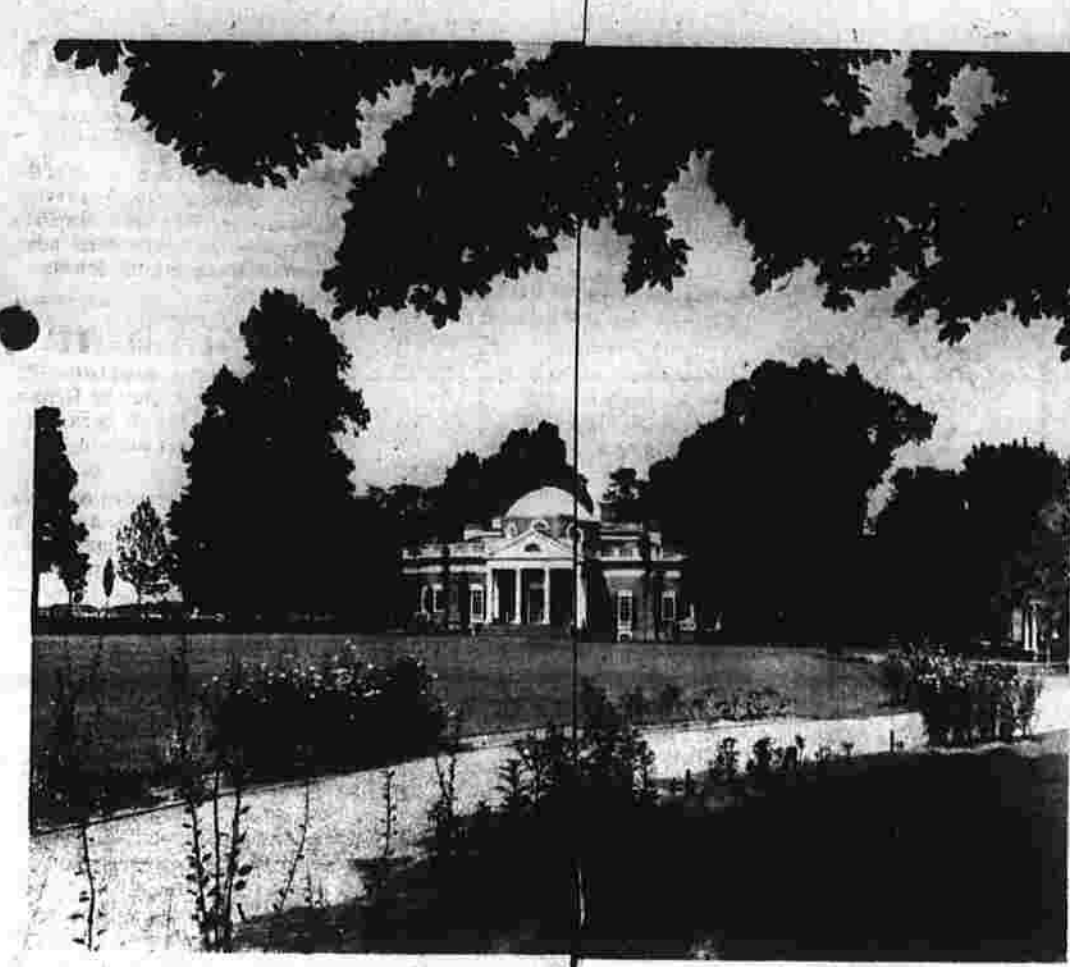

When Thomas Jefferson built his magnificent home, Monticello, at Charlottesville, Va., he planned an 18-acre grove as part of the grounds, where he and his guests could take leisurely walks under the shade of splendid trees and stop to rest on convenient benches.

In 200 years the grove has been neglected. Trees have died or been damaged by storms. Paths, roads and benches have disappeared. Weeds, brambles and other underbrush have become a tangle. Openings in the woods to provide views of the Virginia hills and valleys have been blocked by vegetation.

Now the grove is being restored under the direction of a University of Connecticut landscape architect, Rudy J. Favretti, who has been given \$50,000 to spend by the owners of the property, the Thomas Jefferson Memorial Foundation.

Mr. Favretti has made his plans, has marked old trees for removal and driven stakes at spots where new trees are to be planted. Much of the cutting has been done, and when the snow melts in the Virginia hills the planting will begin.

"It is the most interesting job I have ever had," says the landscape architect. "The people in the foundation are marvelous to work with."

Luxurious commuting  
 When Mr. Favretti travels to the job and back during college vacation periods he is provided with airplane transportation to Richmond, and then on another airline to Charlottesville. He has a car at his disposal in Virginia and comfortable quarters in the home of the manager of the Monticello estate.

Mr. Favretti was appointed about a year ago after the Monticello people had screened the records of landscape architects to find people interested in historical restoration and invited five of them to come for interviews. The Connecticut man's hobby is American history and he has been an active president of the
