Careful scrutiny was given recommended salary increases for department heads. A \$1,085 salary increase for Town Clerk Edward Tomkiel was removed by the board after it decided to treat Tomkiel the same as other department heads who have reached to the top of their wage scale. These employes will receive a percentage increase, which will be decided later. The board indicated it would reduce a recommended \$2,000 increase for Town Treasurer Roger

Town Planner Alan Lamson was luckier; he was tentatively granted a salary hike of about \$1,500 after Weiss said that Lamson was making much less than other planners in Capitol Region towns. Weiss along with Penny and other directors praised Lamson for his performance over the past two years and for his work on the new industrial park.

The board, upon the advice of Weiss, will sit down with the town Pension Board to discuss the \$750,000 pension allocation in the budget. Tentative approval was given by the board for the installation of a new phone system for the town and Board of Education offices that would allow permit direct dialing to all

departments' and schools. The town would pay \$3,000 of the total cost of \$11,000 for installation of the system, and the Board of Education would pay the remainder. 
