







# Bolton pact arbitration results in salary accord

An arbitration decision on the Bolton teachers' contract has resulted in an agreement on salaries and evaluation safeguards but a split over insurance provisions. The decision, filed with the town clerk Monday, was made by arbitrator Neil Macy for the Board of Education, James Sandler for the Bolton Education Association, and Gerard Rowe neutral.

The arbitration panel was unanimous in its agreement on salaries. The panel said both the school board and the teachers' association agreed to the dollar amount for 1978-79, \$50,000, and 1979-80, \$54,000. The panel said the disagreement stems from how the money should be divided. The arbitration panel has directed the parties to meet to develop a salary schedule that is agreeable to both. The panel wants the schedule by April 21.

A request for \$602,000 for construction of a gymnasium at Andover Elementary School was tabled by the Board of Finance last week. Board members said they need more information before they will make a decision. The finance board will meet tonight at 8 at the Town Office Building to further consider the request.

# Filkoff quits town council

Citing pressures of business and sickness in his family as reasons, Democratic Councilman James Filkoff resigned from the Town Council Monday night. Filkoff was serving his second term on the council. It will now go to the Democratic Committee to recommend a replacement to be approved by the mayor and the council.

# Sewer jobs cut in Vernon budget

In approving the sewage treatment and disposal budget totaling \$804,786 Monday night the Vernon Town Council, in effect, eliminated a third shift that sewer officials feel is essential in the new treatment plant. The \$16 million plant is expected to go into operation later this summer. Charles Pitkat, superintendent of the plant, said he has 10 employees and he asked for provision for 14 additional ones.

The Board of Education Monday night approved a May 18 trip for the high school students and June 1 for Middle School students.

Careful scrutiny was given recommended salary increases for department heads. A \$1,060 salary increase for Town Clerk Edward Tomkiel was removed by the board after it decided to treat Tomkiel the same as other department heads who have reached to the top of their wage scale. These employees will receive a percentage increase, which will be decided later. The board indicated it would reduce a recommended \$2,000 increase for Town Treasurer Roger Negro.

Town Planner Alan Lamson was luckier; he was tentatively granted a salary hike of about \$1,500 after Weiss said that Lamson was making much less than other planners in Capital Region towns. Weiss along with Penny and other directors praised Lamson for his performance over the past two years and for his work on the new industrial park.

Tentative approval was given by the board for the installation of a new phone system for the town and Board of Education offices that would allow permit direct dialing to all departments' and schools.

The town would pay \$3,000 of the total cost of \$11,000 for installation of the system, and the Board of Education would pay the remainder. The town would provide a telephone operator for the system, who would also act as receptionist at the Municipal Building, and the Board of Education, would provide the console, Weiss told the directors.
