





Perfectly good teeth are lost.

The Institute's Patricia McGrath presented evidence

that, in addition to pain-carrying fibers, human tooth pulps may contain other types of nerve fibers. Previously, teeth were considered to be especially suitable for pain studies because only pain fibers were known to be present. Ms. McGath said she used electric currents of one second duration at various frequencies and strengths to study normal volunteers.

She found all her subjects could detect non-pain sensations - tingling, warmth or pressure - as well as painful ones. They could rank the intensity of each. Another of the Institute scientists, Dr. Stephen S. Gelfman, reported on anxiety-controlling agents used in patients undergoing extraction of wisdom teeth. He found a combination of drugs which partially substitute a narcotic and a narcotic antagonist for a tranquilizing agent may help speed a patient's return to normal functioning after intravenous sedation for dental

The tooth decay front On the tooth decay front, Dr. Stanley B. Heifetz, also an Institute scientist, reported on a 30-month field trial involving 416 children in fluoridated Stickny, Ill. During the trial fifth graders in 15 schools put a fluoride gel on their teeth, then rinsed with a fluoride solution. Public health nurses supervised.

Heifetz said the trial produced additional evidence that such programs can provide significant protection against new tooth decay - even when caries incidence already is low due to community water fluoridation. For the mouthrinsing alone, the cost was 42 cents per child per year. The cost of the fluoride gel application is

greater, according to Heifetz. Professional dental teams used denture liner materials and vinyl holders to make two custom-fitted mouthpieces for each child in the test group.

Track asks aid to face strikes

WETHERSFIELD (UPI) - Plainfield dog track officials, faced with another possible strike by clerks, have asked the state gaming commission to license dog owners, trainers and others to handle the betting win-

The track's owners, who have refused to bargain with their pari-mutuel clerks, Wednesday blamed the state gaming commission for the two-day shutdown by parimutuel clerks last week.

They struck Friday and Saturday because track owner Edward Keelan has refused to grant bargaining rights to the Service Employees International Union despite orders he do so by the State Labor Relations Board and a

Superior Court judge.

Keelan is appealing the judge's order to the state Supreme Court. Management and dog owners at the track told gaming commission members Wednesday their refusal to grant emergency licensing for new pari-mutuel clerks last week was not a neutral stance but one that favored the

The commission said it was neutral by refusing to change the regulations in favor of management, who wanted to run the betting windows themselves. The owners Wednesday made another attempt to replace the unhappy clerks by submitting a list of 51 applicants for permanent licenses as pari-mutuel clerks. The applicants included dog trainers, owners and other

But the nine-member commission refused to act on the plication immediately and said it would be handled in the usual manner by a subcommittee next week.

Meanwhile, the SEIU, which represents the 210 clerks, planned to meet Sunday to discuss possible further job

Dog owners also criticized the commission for "not acting in the best interests of the state" by turning down
