



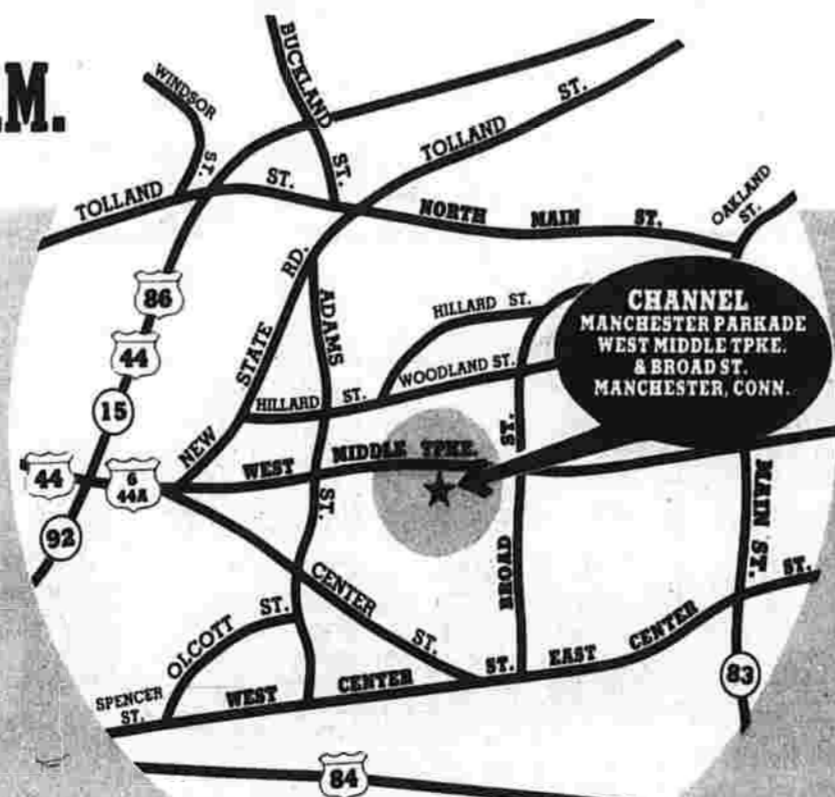

## Dental clinic cost high, Weiss suggests new site

High renovation costs apparently have eliminated Bentley School as the site for Manchester's dental clinic. Town Manager Robert Weiss has sent a letter to members of the Town Board of Directors about the high cost and he has recommended a reshuffling of town offices that would locate the clinic in the present Senior Citizens Center.

Originally, the architect at the school had estimated that the renovation and reconstruction work would cost \$20,000.

The contractor who is doing work on the school itself, however, estimated the cost of renovation for the dental clinic at \$71,000. Weiss said that problems developed that were not anticipated.

Some of the problems apparently occurred because the school building is relatively old. Others included relocating items, such as an air-conditioning unit.

"Because of the cost, the site seems unsuitable," Weiss said. The town now will try to relocate the clinic, but the relocation probably would mean a delay in the opening of the facility. Town and Health Department officials had been hopeful the facility could be opened near the start of the school year.

#### Carter says goals popular

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Carter Friday claimed the public supports his chief policy goals and suggested his plunging poll ratings stem from Congress' failure to achieve those goals. His comments in a magazine interview coincided with two White House moves that could improve his standing with one interest group and weaken it with another.

#### Exploded Pinto impounded

ELKHART, Ind. (UPI) — The U.S. Department of Transportation Friday impounded a Ford Pinto whose gas tank exploded during a rear-end collision, killing three teenage girls. It brought to 59 the number of such deaths since 1975. Judy A. Ulrich, 18, of Osceola, Ind., died in a Fort Wayne hospital's burn unit Friday, eight hours after the crash. Her sister, Lynn, 16, and their cousin, Donna M. Ulrich, 13, Roanoke, Ill., died of burns at the scene.

#### Forest fire contained

CAZADERO, Calif. (UPI) — Aided by fog and cooler temperatures, firefighters Friday gained the upper hand on a raging forest fire touched off by a power mower. The blaze burned through thousands of acres and for a time threatened a resort town north of San Francisco. Nine buildings and three cars were destroyed in the blaze which was sparked by the mower Wednesday afternoon in dry grass near the old Russian settlement of Fort Ross on the coast.

#### Iran riots bring curfew

TEHRAN, Iran (UPI) — Army tanks and troops clamped a dusk-to-dawn curfew on the ancient capital of Isfahan Friday to end 18 hours of anti-shah rioting and arson in the Moslem extremist stronghold. The rioting erupted Thursday night, just hours after the shah called reporters to his summer palace to assert he was "not just another dictator" but would crush extremists who tried to block his moves toward political liberalization.

## Killian says he'd accept income tax in an overhaul

HARTFORD (UPI) — Lt. Gov. Robert K. Killian said Friday he would accept an income tax if it were part of a comprehensive tax overhaul even though he is personally opposed to one.

He said Connecticut's finances are "a fiscal mess." Killian is challenging Gov. Ella T. Grasso in a Sept. 12 primary for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination to oppose Rep. Ronald Sarasin, R-Conn., the Republican nominee.

"Unless we can come up with another solution to the fiscal mess, any governor — including a Gov. Sarasin or a re-elected Gov. Grasso — will have to consider an income tax," he said.

## Truck with hydrogen tanks explodes outside Millstone

WATERFORD (UPI) — A flatbed truck carrying 10 hydrogen canisters exploded and burned Friday outside the Millstone nuclear power plant complex.

The hydrogen is used as a coolant for the main electrical generator in the turbine area of the power plant. "We don't know what caused it," said a spokesman for Northeast Utilities which owns and operates the plant. "On occasion we utilize

hydrogen in some of our systems and hydrogen is delivered for that purpose. I can't say how frequently this is done, but this is the first incident of this kind we've ever had."

A spokeswoman said the incident had no effect on the plant's operation. "Even if the explosion and fire had occurred next to the reactor building, there would have been no effect on the reactor or on the operations," she said.

## Massage parlor owners told town will now enforce law

The owners of two Manchester massage parlors were sent letters Friday informing them that the Town Health Department will now begin enforcement of the massage parlor ordinance.

A federal court case challenging the town's ordinance was dropped Thursday, making the enforcement possible. A case in state Superior Court challenging the constitutionality of the ordinance will still continue. The ordinance requires licensing of massage parlors and employees and

establishes certain guidelines they must meet. In the letters to Paul O'Bright, owner of Cleopatra's at 455 Main St., and the Body Shop at 325 Main St., Alice J. Turek, director of health, outlined the procedures to apply for a massage parlor license.

The deadline for receiving completed applications has been extended by the Health Department to Aug. 23. Dr. Turek said in the letter that her decision to grant a permit or to reject an application "will be made in a timely manner after review by appropriate town departments." She said it is a decision on massage establishment application can be expected by Sept. 12. Enforcement of the massage parlor requirements will not begin until after tests have been conducted on each applicant by the Health Department.

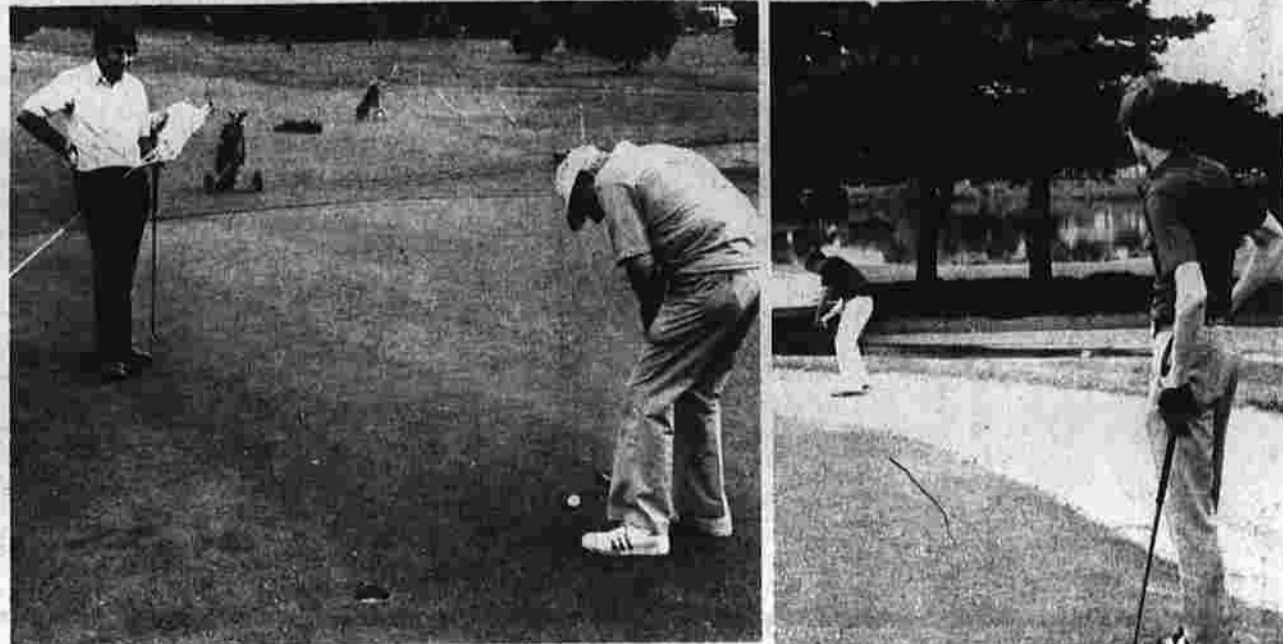

### St. Joseph's Church 20th Outdoor Bazaar

**Good food, good friends, good times**

When St. Joseph's Church in Rockville plans an event, parishioners go all out.

In preparation for the 20th annual Outdoor Bazaar to be held Monday through Saturday, the ladies of the parish joined forces and made more than 10,000 pierogis (little pies filled with cabbage, sauerkraut or cheese) and more than 1,500 goiabkis (tender leaves of cabbage stuffed with ham-burg and rice and simmered in a tomato sauce).

"The work on the pierogis began early in May," said Lou Wagner, an active church worker for many years. "We took a week off in between, but in all it took us about eight weeks to make them." The pierogis were then placed in plastic bags and frozen until bazaar time.

Meanwhile, another crew of workers busied themselves making the goiabkis. The cabbage leaves were stuffed with a delicate blending of ham-burg and salt pork and refrigerated until the bazaar opens Monday.

"For the pierogis alone, we used 600 pounds of flour, 60 pounds of margarine and 60 dozen eggs," Mrs. Wagner said. "While not involved in the food preparation, the men of the parish are busy erecting booths, setting up tables and chairs, and assigning booth operators."

The bazaar, sponsored by all the church societies, will benefit St. Joseph Church and its school fund. This year, it will feature 30 booths, most of them games of skill. There will be a record booth which is a favorite with the teen-agers, a baking booth with fresh baked goods daily, a doll booth, plus many other booths geared for children and rides.

"A new attraction this year is the dunking booth," said Max Sadlak, who along with Patricia Cedor is in charge of publicity. "Balls will be tossed at a person suspended over a pool of water in attempt to dunk him or her," he explained. Bingo will also be offered each night at 7:30 under a large tent on the church grounds.

Of the baking booth, Mary Ann Erickson, said, "This booth empties out fast. Baked goods are won and people seem to be lured to it and they just disappear. Many of the items are made from old family recipes and are brought fresh each day of the bazaar by the parishioners."

A Polish and an American kitchen will be featured, and from the Polish kitchen, pierogis will be available by the bag.

# Rhode Island officials get the runaround

PROVIDENCE, R.I. (UPI) — Government runaround will soon take on a new meaning. The state's officials are getting the runaround from the picture-perfect Rhode Island Statehouse soon will be alive with government employees and area residents exercising their way to physical fitness, as health officials see it.

Shortly after Labor Day, the state will kick off an effort to involve workers in an exercise program centered around a jogging track now being installed by minimum security prison inmates.

A 100-yard section of jogging path was cut between an existing service road and a sidewalk running behind the capitol.

The circular route will stretch a half mile around the ornate Statehouse. It won approval from architects concerned with how it fits into the building's setting.

Assistant Health Director John Tierney, who fostered the idea, also hopes to install a series of "exercise stations" along the path to include chin-up bars and similar equipment to take boredom out of the program.

"The whole thrust is fitness prior to and after the working day," Tierney said. "One of the problems is that it's a pain. Nobody wants to get up and run alone at 6 or 7 o'clock in the morning."

State Administration Director Robert Liguori said the entire project will cost no more than \$2,000.

Employees will be limited to when they can use the facilities.

"They can't jog during work hours, only during lunch hours or before or after work," Liguori said. "We may allow a 'flex-time' program allowing them to adjust their schedules accordingly if they want to exercise for a few hours during the day."

Tierney envisions the jogging track as the start of a comprehensive state health awareness program, including weight loss clinics and anti-smoking clinics for people willing to trim fat or cigarettes from their lifestyles.

"If we're in the health business, we want to set a tone and get out there, not be phonies. We can all use the fitness," Tierney said. "We want to get people in good shape and it doesn't take that much."

State maintenance workers are also installing two showers in the Statehouse basement which can be used by jogging employees. Tierney is pressing for similar facilities in the Health Building.

## Seabrook protests scheduled

SEABROOK, N.H. (UPI) — Protesters said Friday they'll use unspecified illegal tactics when construction resumes Monday at the Seabrook nuclear power plant, but won't block workers from returning to their jobs.

The Clamshell Alliance, which has orchestrated previous anti-nuclear demonstrations, said Friday 18 New Hampshire residents Monday will stage a "nonviolent action of civil disobedience" that may involve an occupation.

A spokesman said the first demonstration would be by state residents to symbolize local opposition to nuclear power.

Clamshell spokesman Diana Tomasello said Monday's protest would be the first in a series of "symbolic actions" — legal and illegal — against the \$2.3 billion plant that has held center stage in the nationwide anti-nuclear movement. She said details would be worked out this weekend.

The Public Service Co. of New Hampshire, builders of the plant, Friday called union halls to summon workers to the site beginning Monday.

PSC spokesman Gordon McKenney said the firm hoped most of the 1,800 workers laid off three weeks ago would return by Sept. 8.

The Nuclear Regulatory Commission reinstated Seabrook's construction permit Thursday, ending a three-week halt ordered July 21 to let the Environmental Protection Agency consider Seabrook's cooling system. The EPA approved it Aug. 4.

The Clamshell Alliance said it did not plan a massive demonstration like others it has sponsored. Instead it talked of a series of smaller actions — legal and illegal — by chapters across New England.

Clamshell spokesman Diana Tomasello said the first protesters would be 18 New Hampshire residents, whose demonstration "will definitely be civil disobedience."

"We don't intend to block workers' access to their jobs," she said, adding the group had not decided what alternative illegal tactics to use.

Gov. Melvin Thompson, a staunch supporter of nuclear power, has pledged to "use every legitimate means available to prevent threatened illegal interference."

The alliance Monday pledged a marine blockade of near-door Hampton Harbor later in the year to stop delivery of a vital part of the nuclear reactor.

Members told a House Interior subcommittee that if failed, they would block the highway to the plant with their bodies.

## Lawyers in state nix TV ad

HARTFORD (UPI) — Television advertising for almost everybody else may be okay, but for lawyers it would be a sure sign that members of Connecticut Bar associations agreed Friday.

Attorney John Fitzgerald, vice president of the Hartford County Bar Association, said he was surprised and certainly opposed to the American Bar Association endorsement Wednesday of the controversial concept.

"My own view is that such advertising would offer no conceivable advantage to the public or profession," Fitzgerald said.

"I submit that it is ludicrous that it is undignified, unnecessary, and there is no need for lawyers to pandar their wares on television. I am certainly opposed to it," he said.

"The theory is that the public needs the assistance to find a lawyer. Well, I don't think we have to reduce it to that level. You can always look in the telephone book."

Attorney Richard Bell, president of the New Haven County Bar Association, agreed with Fitzgerald's comments.

"The risk of abuse and demeaning the profession far outweigh any possible advantage to the public or to the profession and do nothing to assure the quality of legal services," he said.

"Personally, I'm very reluctant to see the legal profession scurrying in huckstering. The prospects of mistaking the public outweigh any possible benefit," he said.

Bell said recent rules formulated by the Connecticut bar and state judicial department now preclude any immediate attempt to permit television advertising by lawyers in Connecticut, although newspaper advertising is permitted.

The New Haven attorney said the rules were drafted last year after the U.S. Supreme Court ruled lawyers could advertise fees and routine legal services in newspapers.

Until then, Bell noted, the ABA had opposed almost all forms of legal advertising.

"Frankly it would have probably stayed the same because there was very little internal pressure pushing for legal advertising. The pressure came from without, not from within," he said.

Because the ABA endorsement is not binding, both Bell and Fitzgerald said it is likely that the state bar will study the ABA endorsement closely before reaching a final decision.

"I guess with increasing numbers of lawyers coming into practice there are those who might see this as a way of producing and generating business," Bell said.

"But I don't think by and large that it's a significant percentage."

Then she was spotted — there aren't many gal athletes who are tall, blonde and beautiful — and began doing commercials and then straight parts. That was only five years ago.

She progressed, onward and upward, until she did the pilot for "Wonder Woman." She says the program became a tug of war between ABC and Warner Bros. — ABC wanted to make the program comic-bookish, while Warner Bros. thought of Wonder Woman as more of a James Bond character.

"I was on Warner Bros. side," she says, "but ABC won, and bought out Warner Bros."

So they used Lynda Carter instead. Cathy Lee Crosby says she has no hard feelings, that she thinks Lynda is great and actually is happy not being Wonder Woman.

She left the business, then. It was a combination of things. Partly, it was a "relationship" with a man who didn't want her to work. Partly, it was dissatisfaction with her life, a desire to find a new direction.

For seven months, during one period, she travelled aimlessly around the world. Somewhere along the way, she heard a quotation from Ron Hubbard: "Culture is only as strong as its dreams, and its dreams are dreamed by artists."

"I thought about that for a while," she says, "and I realized it was true. I realized I was a dreamer and, therefore, I ought to be an artist."

So she came back to acting. She is also writing. On her world travels, she discovered some true stories about World War I, and she is turning them into screenplays, with a good part for Cathy Lee Crosby.

One of her first parts, since she returned, is in the movie "Coach," in which she plays the coach of a boy's high school basketball team. She thinks it will help get her re-established.

And now, too, she is back playing tennis. Not competitively, at least not yet. She's playing every day with Jeff Austin, who is the big brother of the teen-age whiz, Tracy Austin.

## CB clubs work to make it better

It was the first CB funeral ever held. More than 100 CBers, many of them members of the Signal Seekers of Polk County, Fla., were present to bury their chaplain, Gordon Van Noske.

It was a touching occasion as the pallbearers wearing their red, white, and blue uniforms buried "Flash Gordon" in reverence. He, too, as he had requested his family, wore the prescribed attire of his club.

Marlin Fagan, president of the Signal Seekers, presided at a private club prayer for Van Noske the following Sunday and dedicated the mini-jamboree, which the club had been planning for months, to his memory. CBers from throughout Polk County came to participate in the event and to honor their fellow CBER's passing.

"We organized the club in mid-December, 1977," explained Fagan, whose handle is "Yellow Jacket." "Our first meeting was in January, 1978. We've got 54 members. It was started by seven CBers who were tired of the abuses that we found on citizens band radio. People who harass CBers talking, who yak on top of conversations and who dead key are doing CB an injustice. We decided to do something about it."

At their first meeting they agreed that their efforts would be directed toward this objective. They set initiation fees at \$10 per member (which included the wives) and monthly fees at \$2. With their initial organization there was enough money to buy three signal tracers for finding the offenders. Working together, the club has nailed five so far. Two of these have been reported to the FCC for refusing to cooperate reasonably.

Signal Seekers like "The Wild Man" (Leonard Wilts), "Crusader" (Reese Griffin), "Elevator Man" (William Davis) and "Alligator" (Louie Mitchell) all wanted some structure for what they term a "decent CB

family that could enjoy each other in good fellowship." Their meetings are primarily about projects they can undertake. Their uniforms indicate their pride in their organization.

In a county of Florida with about 200,000 population there are more than 30 CB clubs. Their total membership is estimated at 8,000 active CBers. At a mini-jamboree in Lakeland, the county seat, between over 4,000 CBers came to enjoy the bingo games, various family competitions and strive for the prizes. A joint effort of all the Polk County clubs is in the planning stage to see if their combined efforts at raising money for Jerry Lewis' annual muscular dystrophy can do better than a Tampa television station.

"Right now the biggest problem on CB is the non-stop talkers," Fagan said. "Recently, as an example, a woman was heading south on Interstate 75 and there had been a death in her family. She was from Ohio, so a member of her family called a friend in Winter Haven to see if she could be headed off before she got to Miami. He put it on Channel 12 (our channel) and I picked the message up. I wanted to relay it to Tampa or Orlando, but I couldn't get a break because of this. That's wrong."

There are many things wrong with citizens band radio. But clubs like the Signal Seekers are dedicated to making it a better and a more valuable resource.
