

Building resumes at Seabrook plant

Construction of the controversial \$2.3 billion Seabrook nuclear power plant resumed today while police hauled away peaceful anti-nuclear

'My understanding is about 17 have been arrested," Attorney General Thomas Rath said. Witnesses said demonstrators refused to walk and were dragged without resistance into waiting

police cars. The Clamshell Alliance organized the demonstration to protest a Nuclear Regulatory Commission order reinstating the Seabrook construction permit. The NRC had shut down construction July 21 to give the Environmental Protection Agency time to rule on the safety of the plant's cooling system. The EPA okayed the cooling system Aug. 4 and last Thursday the NRC said construction could resume.

Several hundred workers reported back today to restart construction. Small groups of demonstrators tried to enter a private road leading to the construction area, placed a 'No Nukes' sign atop a crane on the plant site, and chained themselves to sign outside the plant, Clamshell spokesman Diana Tomasello said.

Protesters hauled away

Four hundred laborers of 1,800 laid off began filing through plant gates this morning. The plant builder hoped to phase in the rest within a

The workers were greeted by about a dozen pickets demonstrating across the street from the plant.

Ms. Tomasello said today's protest would be "the first of many wave actions" aimed at blocking the plant that has become the focus of a national drive to stop nuclear power.

A Clamshell demonstration last May resulted in 1.414 arrests. The group also sponsored a legal protest in June that attracted an estimated

10,000 people. The Nuclear Regulatory Commission last week reinstated Seabrook's construction permit, giving it the fifth federal go-ahead in two years. The NRC suspended the permit July 21 pending a review by the Environmental Protection Agency of Seabrook's undersea cooling system, which environmentalists claim will harm marine life. The EPA approved

the blueprint Aug. 4.
"Our business is building this plant. We intend to work as usual,' Nick Ashooh, a spokesman for the Public Service Company, said Sunday. PSC officials said they are optimistic about having construction back at full strength by Sept. 8. Gov. Meldrim Thomson, a staunch

advocate of the 2,300 megawatt plant, has promised to use "every legitimate means available" to prevent the threatened illegal interference. PSC officials said they planned no unusual security measures.

Board action may bring stuffed ballot

If Manchester's Board of Directors tonight approves all 15 proposed charter changes, it would lead to an unusual problem - an overstuffed

Town Clerk Edward Tomkiel said today that the ballot only has enough

room for 15 referendum questions. One question - an advisory referendum about the Sunday sale of liquor in Manchester - already has

been approved for the ballot. The town also had hoped to have a question about borrowing money to fund water improvements, although it now appears that this question will not be ready in time for November.

Thus, the town could exceed the pace for questions if all 15 proposed charter changes are approved by the Board of Directors. This means that the town then would have to decide to group some of the questions together,

Charter changes approved tonight

by the Board of Directors will be placed on the November ballot. Any change to the Town Charter must be approved by the voters before it goes into effect.

If the board rejects any of the proposed changes, they will not go before the voters and those sections of the charter will not be changed.

Tomkiel said that if more than 15 questions are approved for the November ballot, some will have to be grouped together. The Board of Directors can decide how such a grouping would be done. Two related changes, for in-

stances, could be combined into one yes or no question on the ballot. The final wording of the referen-dum questions will be up to the town counsel's office to decide, Tomkiel

Tomkiel's office also is beginning work on preparing absentee ballots for the upcoming election. New election laws and party primaries have

made that job even more com-

plicated than in past years, he said. For instance, absentee ballots for Sept. 12 primaries should be

available by Aug. 22, he said. In the 12th Assembly District in Manchester, a primary is expected between the party-endorsed candidate, Walter Joyner, and his opponent, Fred Peck.

Peck has until Aug. 18, this Friday, to file his petitions for a primary. This gives the office only until the following Tuesday to prepare the absentee ballots for the primary.

Texaco confirms natural gas find

WHITE PLAINS, N.Y. (UPI) — Texaco Inc. today confirmed reports it has made the first petroleum discovery off the U.S. Atlantic coast, saying it found "encouraging" amounts of natural gas 2.7 miles below the seafloor some 90 miles off

the New Jersey coast.

U.S. Geological Survey officials said the discovery — which came after other oil companies abandoned two nearby wells as dry holes -- was a significant development even though it is too early to tell if the well will produce commercial quantities

"Until this, we had no positive indication there was anything out

there," said one USGS official in Washington.

The successful well flowed at an indicated rate of 7.5 million cubic feet a day, not large in itself, Texaco said. It was drilled in Block 598 of an Outer Continental Shelf area called the Baltimore Canyon, and the gas was found in a 38-foot interval at depths around 14,000 feet.

The Baltimore Canyon is the first part of the U.S. Atlantic coast where oil companies have sought petroleum reservoirs containing oil and gas. It is the nation's most promising untapped frontier for new petroleum

Lenient laws reason truckers like Maine

BANGOR, Maine (UPI) - A survey of 12,000 truckers shows the nation's truck drivers like rural Maine because they say the state has the most lenient enforce

The study indicated Saturday that Maine state police are the easiest to get along with. It also said truckers say Ohio "smokies" are the most hard-nosed, handing ou tickets for traveling 57 miles per hour in a 55 mph zone. Seventy-nine percent of the truckers named Ohio as the strictest state for traffic law enforcement, followed by Virginia, (77 percent), Missouri (69 percent), Pennsylvania (56 percent) and California (54 percent). But Maine State Police Lt. Col. Ronald Hiltz told the Bangor Daily News that truckers are not getting preferential treatment in Maine.

NEW YORK (UPI) - Two bombs composed of sticks of dynamite were found early today near the United Nations' building and inside a locker at Grand Central Station, police said.

Four sticks of dynamite were removed from a window ledge of the United Nations library building about 3:30 a.m. by members of the bomb squad, a police spokesman said. The bomb had been spotted by U.N. guards. Shortly afterwards, five sticks of dynamite were found in a locker at Grand Central, police said.

Police said a security guard at CBS-TV received a call from a man with an accent who said he had placed a bomb in locker No. 702 at Grand Central. The spokesman said both bombs were active, but it was not known what time they were set to go off.

The bomb squad transported the bombs to the police firing range in the Bronx.

The spokesman said no one has claimed responsibility for placing the explosives. It was not immediately known what led police to find


