

# GOP Thinks Primary Means Grasso Is Vulnerable

 HARTFORD (UPI) — Even though Gov. Ella Grasso made short work of her lieutenant governor in Tuesday's Democratic primary, state Republicans think the contest revealed the incumbent is vulnerable, not invincible. Republican State Chairman Frederick Biebel and Rep. Ronald Sarasin, the man the GOP has chosen to run against Mrs. Grasso in November, say they both saw some encouraging signs in the governor's awesome victory over Lt. Gov. Robert Killian.

Mrs. Grasso beat Killian in 187 of Connecticut's 169 communities, convincingly in most cases. The challenger won only his hometown of Hartford and neighboring West Hartford, both by small margins.

After every polling place reported in, Mrs. Grasso had an unofficial tally of 137,466 — or 68 percent of the vote. Unofficially, Killian had 66,038 votes, or 32 percent.

But, while Democrats were gawking at the margin of Mrs. Grasso's victory (more than 2-to-1 — Biebel, for three years state chairman of the state's Republican Party, was examining the low voter turnout), Connecticut has an estimated 630,000 registered Democrats. Less than one third of them bothered to vote in Tuesday's Democratic gubernatorial primary — the first in state history.

"It is a very sad commentary when you stop to think that nearly half of Connecticut's Democrats either voted against or failed to vote for the Democratic governor," said the GOP state chairman.

"Thirty some odd percent turnout is a sad commentary on the governor's popularity," Biebel continued. "This, combined with over 60,000 Democrats voting for Mr. Killian, certainly shows dissatisfaction with the governor's leadership."

Biebel said the figures indicate a "mutiny" among Democrats not apathy. He added he believes Sarasin is the candidate to bring the Republicans back to power after a four year absence.

"I think the time has come for a change, and people feel that change," Biebel said after the results had been tallied Tuesday night.

Sarasin, a silver-haired, three-term congressman who has fared well over the years in his predominantly Democratic district, also felt good about his chances of unseating the incumbent in November.

"We'll be talking about the issues and matters of concern to the people of Connecticut," said Sarasin, who will try to become the first politician ever to beat Mrs. Grasso in an election.

Sarasin also took note of some of the pitfalls Killian could have avoided.

"His apparent embracing of the income tax in the last days of the campaign. That hurt him probably more than anything else," said the congressman who has proposed a constitutional amendment outlawing an income tax in Connecticut.

# Panel Sets Jai Alai Residency Rule

WETHERSFIELD (UPI) — Most employees at jai alai facilities will have to reside in Connecticut in the latest move by the state gaming commission to crack down on betting schemes by professional gamblers.

The commission Wednesday unanimously voted to approve emergency regulations requiring pari-mutuel clerks, cashiers and concession workers be residents of Connecticut in order to obtain licenses for employment.

The action was seen as an effort by the

commission to keep high rollers from Florida from importing persons who become jai alai employees. The employees then aid the professional gamblers in so-called systems betting schemes that cut the odds in half for the average gambler.

Earlier investigations showed some professional gamblers established a cozy relationship with some employees who punched tickets for them and cashed in their winning tickets.

Jai alai players would be exempt from the residency requirement and waivers could be granted persons who prove that being forced to move into Connecticut would represent an undue hardship.

Exemptions also could be made available for out-of-state residents if no one could be found in Connecticut to do a specific job at a fronton.

Current licensed employees are not affected now, but they will come under the requirement when they seek a new license, which is required every year.

The commission imposed the restriction under emergency powers it created to deal with professional gamblers who used a mathematical system to reap huge profits at the jai alai arenas.

The commission announced the residency restriction was imposed, because there was "an imminent peril to the public welfare present," and it was necessary for the commission to see that all officials and participants of jai alai meetings "remain within the jurisdiction of the state."

# House Probers Hear Experts On Pictures

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House Assassinations Committee today questioned two photographic experts who insisted the controversial "Hunter of Assassins" Oswald hoisting his rifle were genuine and not touched up as some conspiracy theorists have charged.

"We find no indication these photos were faked in any way," said Sgt. Cecil Kirk of the Washington, D.C., police department.

Another expert, Calvin McCamy, spoke in detail on the differences among the various photographs of the rifle, explaining how differences in illumination, tilt of the weapon and camera angle would result in apparent visual discrepancies.

Kirk held the weapon recovered from the Texas School Book Depository after the Kennedy assassination and McCamy compared it to photographs of Oswald holding a rifle and photographs of the rifle which appeared in public print after the assassination.

"We are very confident this is the rifle (which killed President John F. Kennedy)," McCamy said.

# Government Fall Stymies Portugal

LISBON (UPI) — Portugal's ninth government since the 1974 revolution that ended nearly a half-century of rightist rule has fallen without ever having a chance to govern.

The government of Prime Minister Alfredo Nobre de Costa was the ninth since the military coup d'etat against the rightist regime that ruled since 1926, and Portugal's third government in two years.

Nobre de Costa was appointed by President Antonio Ramalho Eanes two months ago to head a government of technocrats from outside party ranks after a coalition between the Socialists and Center Democrats broke down.

The technocratic government, formed after the four major parties said they could not form a govern-

ment, was thought able to offer a program to solve Portugal's problems of inflation and foreign debt.

But Nobre de Costa's government meted Thursday night following a 141-71 vote against his program to cure Portugal's woes.

The dominant Socialists, conservative Center Democrats and a handful of Marxist leftists voted against the government, while the centrist Social Democrats supported it and the Communists, who have 40 votes, abstained.

Nobre de Costa described himself as the "overthrown prime minister" and asked: "How is this poor country going to survive. How is our economy to persist if we continue postponing solutions?"

The legislative assembly must pass a revised electoral law to clear the way for new elections, and politicians said this would delay the balloting until early 1979.

# Peace Talks Nonstop

CAMP DAVID, Md. (UPI) — Virtually nonstop talks, including a meeting this morning between Secretary of State Cyrus Vance and Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin, proceeded today at the Camp David summit, sources said.

The likelihood that the peace conference would run on through the weekend was also increasing, the sources disclosed. And these sources took pains to discount pessimistic news stories about the summit published in Egypt.

The topic of the Vance-Begin session, according to the sources, dealt with the future of the Israeli-occupied West Bank of the Jordan River and taken eight hostages.

All eight have either been released or escaped. None were harmed.

About 60 law enforcement officers led by police, were briefly picked up on the trail of escape ring-leader Larry Chism, 29, shortly before sunrise today in the rugged and thinly populated northwest corner of Izard County in north-central Arkansas near the Missouri border.

"All we know is that they've been released somewhere in rural Kentucky," Kenney said. "They have contacted their son and they have

In their two-day escape covering at least three states and involving more than 500 law enforcement officers, the escapees have hijacked a plane, commandeered at least six vehicles and taken eight hostages.

Chism, who suffered a gunshot wound to his fingers during the escape, was known to have at least a .38-caliber weapon in his possession, Harper said.

Authorities said they had no clue as to the whereabouts of the other escapee, Ronald Lyons, 32. Lyons fled to Kentucky along with the Kings in their car after all four convicts spent the night at the Kings' Woodlawn home.

He had last been seen with the hostages heading north on state Highway 177 toward Missouri.

# Convicts Free Hostages

LITTLE ROCK (UPI) — The FBI reported today an elderly couple being held hostage by one of the four Tennessee convicts who shot their way to freedom has been released unharmed in Kentucky. Whereabouts of the fugitive were unknown.

At the same time, police said they believed bloodhounds were closing in on another convict in the rugged woods near the Missouri border. Two convicts were captured Thursday.

John Kenney, assistant special agent in charge of the FBI office at Little Rock, said details on the release of Woodlawn, Ark., residents Mr. and Mrs. John King were scant.

"All we know is that they've been released somewhere in rural Kentucky," Kenney said. "They have contacted their son and they have

"We still think we have him trapped out there somewhere. We had roadblocks up all night on all access roads, too."

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# Alarmed Police Plan Crackdown On Drugs

EAST HARTFORD — Police are going to get tough with users of illegal drugs after their findings have indicated an alarming problem which spans age groups and socio-economic classes.

Police say the problem reaches the town's public schools as low as the fifth grade.

"Some parents are going to be shocked to hear that, but Willimantic is no exception," said Investigator Jerome Hickey.

Hickey and Investigator Herb Weeks were chosen to form a narcotics team by Police Chief Clarence A. Drumm in May.

Drumm said concern from local citizens and some town officials prompted the police to research the problem to find out just who was using illegal drugs and where they were using them.

"We found the overall picture to be fairly alarming," Hickey said. "Drug use was much higher than we had expected."

"Willimantic is no exception," he said. "Yes, there are 10- and 11-year-olds in East Hartford using drugs."

The reference to Willimantic involves a well-publicized police bust made there last winter. Several youthful offenders were charged and the case became publicized in out-of-state newspapers.

Hickey said young drug users in the fifth grade age group use mostly marijuana and "medicine cabinet drugs" — prescription drugs which they take from their parents' medicine cabinet.

Hickey and Weeks said they plan to ask the school administration if they can set up an office for five or six hours a week "to discuss any problems at all — not just drugs — with students."

"Right now the schools are sanctuaries for kids using drugs," Hickey said. "Once they get in the schools

they know the police aren't going to be receptive to having Hickey and Weeks come into the schools as part of the drug education program.

Diggs said the program starts in the primary grades and includes rehabilitation personnel and drug referral services.

"The problem is in our society and obviously the schools as a part of our society," Diggs said. Obviously, then, the problem reaches our schools."

He said the drug problem "con-

tinues to change its dimensions, too, breaks also is a major problem for us, too."

Hickey and Weeks say the newest drug to gain popularity among high school drug users is PCP — commonly referred to as angel dust.

The drug, they said, is a hallucinogenic which produces unknown effects.

"Nobody's really sure what kind of effects it produces," Hickey said. "We had a kid on PCP call us up recently and he said, 'I don't know who I am, where I am, or what I'm doing.'"

"People in this community have a right to be concerned when they see people using drugs right out in the open," he said.

Weeks is a 14-year veteran of the police force and Hickey is a five-year veteran. Both have extensive backgrounds in narcotics investigation.

Weeks handled many narcotics cases as a member of the now-defunct Capital Region Crime Council. Hickey worked many drug cases in the East Hartford force.

The two officers handle every "narcotics-related case in town. They say the administrative chores — processing cases and doing other paperwork — sometimes hinder their investigative efforts.

However, Drumm has said he does not have the manpower to expand the narcotics squad.

"We are happy that the chief has had the foresight to start such a squad," Hickey said. "It shows that he is concerned about the drug problem."

"What Ron (Sarasin, GOP gubernatorial candidate) is emphasizing is that 500,000 Democrats stayed home or voted against the governor," Mrs. Berry said. But, because of the enthusiasm generated by Joyner's primary win, the committee is ready to start working now for the November election, he said. Joyner also said that his committee has been expanded and now includes Fred Peck, the loser in Tuesday's primary, and Granville "Ted" Lingard, the fire chief of the Eighth Utilities District. Part of the Eighth District is within the 12th Assembly District. Two candidates from districts that are divided between Manchester and another town pledged that they will work for both communities. Esther Clarke, an East Hartford town council member seeking the Third Senatorial District seat, said both Manchester and East Hartford will be included in her campaigning. Marcella Fritchey, her opponent, said she won't speak out on the real tough issues, but she will speak out on Spanish-oriented programs that will cost \$150,000. Mrs. Clarke said. John Mitchell of South Windsor, who is seeking the 14th Assembly District seat, said, "Manchester deserves a representative in the 14th District. I don't think they have had it." Registration for religious instruction classes of St. Bridget Parish will take place in the school cafeteria after all masses this weekend. Classes already filled are Grades 2 through 4 on Mondays, and Grades 3 and 4 on Tuesdays. However, stickers for parking on a car window may be obtained only by contacting the Governor's Committee on Employing the Handicapped at the state Labor Department building in Wethersfield, by calling 566-4322. The commission will also, by letter, ask the Public Utilities Commission to deny the request of taxi companies for an additional fee for a trained person to accompany the handicapped passenger, whether such a person is needed or not.

The Town of Manchester Water Department will be flushing water mains beginning Monday in a southwest section of town. The flushing will be done from Main Street between Hartford Road and West Center Street westerly to the town line. There may be discoloration of water and reduced pressure during the flushing. If water appears discolored, the homeowner should try to avoid using it until it clears. This will prevent rust and sediment from being brought into the home's system. If sediment does get into a home's hot water tank, the homeowner should wait until the water clears and then open the faucet at the bottom of the tank to drain the collected material, which will settle at the bottom. Also, if a load of wash is done during the period of discolored water, the load should be done again after the water clears. Four ounces of cream of tartar should be added to help clean any discoloration of the clothing. It normally takes a couple of hours for the water to clear in a home. If water appears discolored for an extended period, the homeowner should call the Water Department at 649-5281, ext. 251.

Dear Mr. Postmaster General: This is the first open letter I ever wrote, and I hope you won't take offense at my use of the UPI news wires instead of the U.S. Postal Service to ensure delivery.

It's just that I heard you're planning some more "improvements," including one to add four more digits to the ZIP codes — which are hard enough to remember already — and I wanted to express my dismay to you today, not days or weeks from now.

I wouldn't have liked the longer ZIP Code under any circumstances, but I could have stood it if you hadn't coupled it with the observation that using it would help speed delivery service. Because I remember vividly when my far-flung family and I could communicate by mails with assurance of one-day delivery — two

days at most — right up until the time the first ZIP Code was adopted.

It cost a lot less in those days, too. Fewer letters were lost, postcards weren't dog-eared, and packages were recognizable when you signed for them.

A lot of us who are, shall we say, past the callow years remember when letters were three cents, postcards a penny. We remember two home deliveries a day — except only one on Saturdays — from friendly postmen who knew us by name and would get our letters to the right house even if the address were smudged, or wrong, and who would stop and chat for a few minutes over a cup of coffee or a glass of iced tea from time to time.

We remember being able to drive up and park right alongside our post offices, and turning over our mail

## Dukakis: Still a Favorite

BOSTON (NEA) — You don't have to be crazy to understand Massachusetts politics, but it helps. Especially this year.

Anywhere else in the country in this year of Proposition 13, the political sitchsayers would be diligently stitching a shroud along about now for a governor who was elected on a "lead-pipe" promise not to raise taxes but did just that in his first year in office.

But in "Taxachusetts," where the property tax on single-family homes is the highest in the nation and the overall tax burden the fifth heaviest, Gov. Michael S. Dukakis is not only alive but in good political health, thank you.

He is by no means, to use his own infelicitous phrase, a "lead-pipe" cinch in either the Sept. 19 primary or the Nov. 7 general election. But he is favored. And for a fellow whose political obituary was all but set in type a year ago, that is no small satisfaction.

Dukakis became an overnight hero, directing relief efforts, dominating the news and the airwaves, generally maintaining an air of calm confidence in the state's ability to cope.

Disaffected Democrats, including many union leaders angry at Dukakis for his tough handling of state employees, will be backing Democrat Edward J. King, director of the Massachusetts Port Authority, in the Sept. 19 primary — and the contest could be a tough one for the incumbent.

But if he makes it past the primary, Dukakis will be a clear favorite over either of the Republicans seeking the nomination this year — State Rep. Francis W. Hatch or tax-cut advocate Edward F. King.

If Dukakis is indeed re-elected, as now seems likely, he has some advice: Jimmy Carter would do well to heed. "You have to keep grinding away, making the tough decisions and sticking by them," he said recently. "It's a mistake to be perceived as taking a position and then having to back off from it."

## Capital Fare

WASHINGTON — It was not on the agenda for the Camp David Middle East summit, but lower-level officials of the U.S., Egypt and Israel had informal talks on the current battle of words between the Soviet Union and Communist China.

The meat of these conversations was a naked fear that war could break out between those two Communist giants and the need for an international effort to head off hostilities.

Only hours after President Carter, Israel's Menachem Begin and Egypt's Anwar Sadat had their first meeting, an American official put it this way: "If ever there was a need for the United States to get off its collective behind and use its influence, it is provided by the dangerous insults exchanged by Moscow and Peking. That's the way world wars start."

Perhaps it is fatuous to expect the indecent collection of thieving playboys and capering apes who comprise the UN to do anything constructive about keeping the peace anywhere in the world. Africa is the latest example of its slothful inadequacies. But the situation has become perilous when some high Western officials admit concern that the Soviet Union might launch a preemptive strike against Red China.

Consider recent exchanges between Moscow and Peking. Both sides have not been satisfied with trading nasty cracks. They are talking about trading armed force.

Chinese Defense Minister Hu Hsiang-chien fired the opening salvo in this latest verbal skirmishing in an article last month in the Chinese Communist Party's journal Red Flag. Hsu chided the United States for building up its war arsenal, but declined flatly to say "the danger comes mainly from the atomic bear."

Hsu went on to declare that "the hands of the Soviet Union are reaching out farther and farther, thereby becoming a source of world war far more dangerous than the

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Boston Mayor Kevin White, who is in a running feud with his fellow Democrat, Dukakis, chided the governor for providing too little to the big urban centers like his own. But Dukakis swiftly retaliated, accusing White of trying to postpone a Boston property tax cut until next year — when the mayor will be up for re-election — and warning the state not to tolerate such shenanigans.

Dukakis received the biggest political boost of his term through an act of God. The great blizzard of '78 struck Boston with a special vengeance, all but crippling the city and much of the state for days.

With Mayor White caught in sunny Florida, unable to travel because Logan Airport was shut down.

### School System Urging Parents To Teach Safety in Homes

VERNON — With the deep concern expressed by the school system, the Vernon School system is instituting a safety program and is issuing booklets for the children to bring home.

The school system wants the parents to be involved in teaching safety. The booklet, titled, "How To Walk To School Safely," has a preface to the parents.

The preface bears startling data about accidents to children who have not been taught the basic rules of safety. It states that more than 2,600 children, under age 15, are killed each year in pedestrian and bicycle accidents and more than 18,500 are injured.

Parents are cautioned, for safety sake, to walk the route to school with their children before the children do it alone. And to make sure that the child knows his or her name and their address and phone number, plus the names of their parents.

While the booklet notes that walking to school can be fun it alerts the child to the fact that he must be careful because "people who aren't careful around streets and traffic might get hurt."

Other words of caution include: Cross a street at an intersection where there are traffic lights and where drivers expect pedestrians and they slow down; look all ways before stepping off a curb; stay in the crosswalks; don't step out from between or behind parked cars; watch for cars turning; and cross an intersection at right angles.

And above all, children should be taught not to play games in the streets, explore such places as sandpits or vacant houses and to never stop to talk to strangers, and to be extra alert when the weather is bad.

Children riding bicycles should be taught to use the same hand signals that car drivers use; to only have one rider on a bike; never hitch a ride on a moving vehicle; keep right and go in the same direction as traffic, always in single file; to walk the bike across busy intersections; and take all of the other precautions they would if they were walking.

The dining room is basically early Victorian. The board is hoping that other period furnishings may be donated by area residents to help make the Hicks House look lived in and reflect the variety and ingenuity of furnishings of the past two centuries.

In the coming year plans are to include work on the second floor so that tours will show several of the bedrooms.

### Difficulties in Scheduling Create Problem for Teachers

BOLTON — Action by the Board of Education in July to eliminate a half-time French and a half-time Spanish position and create a full-time French-Spanish position at Bolton High School resulted in having the two teachers involved at the school board meeting Thursday at Bolton Center School.

The action will become effective in September 1980. Neither teacher knew anything about the board's plan or action until they read it in the Herald.

Board members said their action resulted from the difficulties in scheduling classes at the high school because of single-track courses.

They felt if they could get a teacher who was certified to teach both courses it would help scheduling. They also felt it would be better to have one teacher at the school for a full day.

In July the superintendent was directed to inform the teachers of the board's action and to ask for their written intent to become certified to teach both courses.

At the high school, French is taught by Ernest Stokes and Spanish by Helen Winkler. Neither is certified to teach the other language.

Stokes is certified to teach French and does at Rham High School and also holds a masters degree and six years in administration.

Mrs. Winkler is currently working on her master's degree. She said she didn't receive notification of the matter from Allen until after school resumed in September.

She said, "For personnel matters, teachers should be informed before it hits the press."

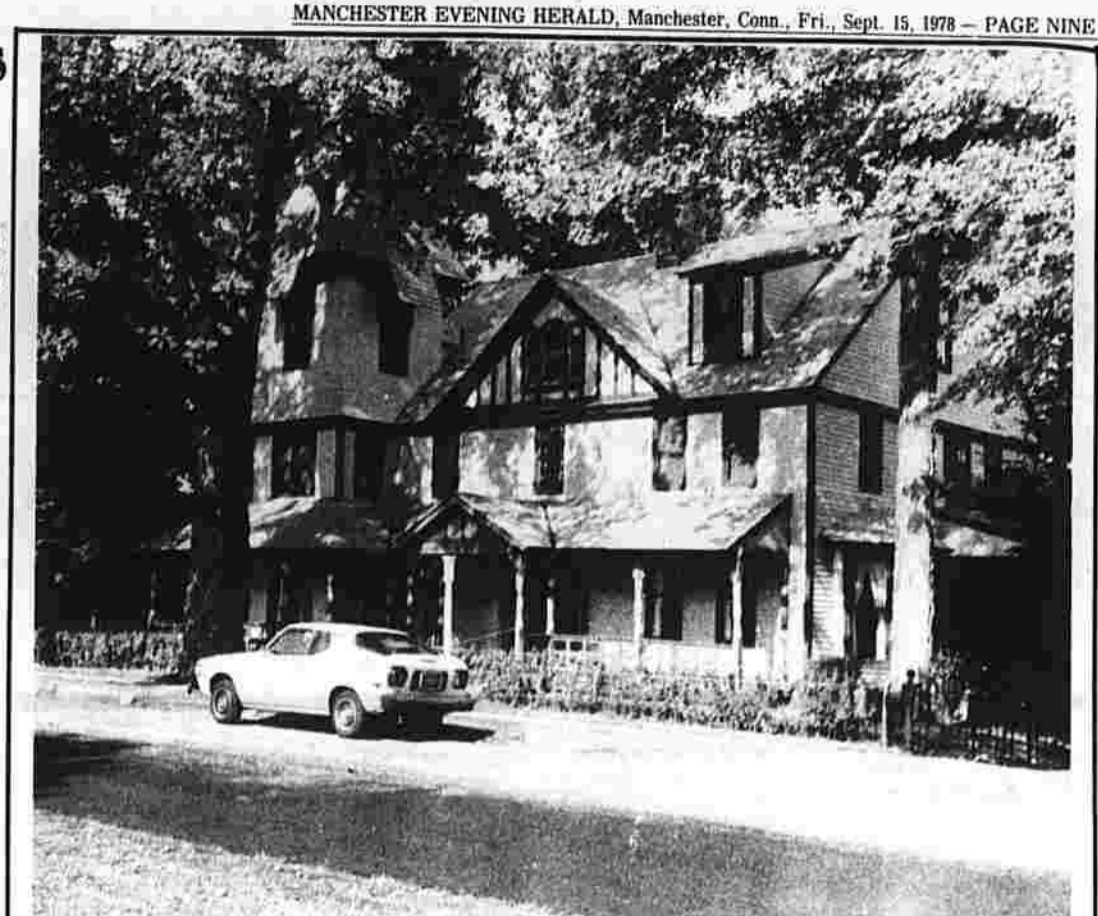
Mrs. Winkler said the board voted to eliminate the position after school was recessed in June. She said she didn't receive notification of the matter from Allen until after school resumed in September.

### Restored Hicks Home on Green Opens Doors to Public Sunday

TOLLAND — The restored Hicks House on the green in Tolland will be open to the public on Sunday from 2 to 5 p.m. and after that will be open Saturdays and Sundays from 1 to 4 p.m. through Oct. 15.

Preservation and operation of the Hicks homestead has been made possible through the will and bequest of its last owner, the late Miss Elizabeth Hicks.

Miss Hicks, in her will, expressed the hope that the house would be preserved as an example of a house which illustrates so-called traditional architecture and of a Connecticut family home.

She said it was her belief that such an example is of value today and will be of increasing value in the future for the citizens of Connecticut and of the United States.

Miss Hicks had spent part of each summer in the homestead and was much interested in Tolland history, its library and its schools.

The Tolland Grammar School, built in 1808, was donated under a legacy from Ratcliffe Hicks, father of Miss Hicks, and is named the Ratcliffe Hicks Memorial School.

Land and funds were donated by Miss Hicks and her aunt, Minnie Hicks, for the addition of an auditorium. The property on which the Tolland High School stands was given by the two women also.

Between 1795 and 1807 the Hicks House was known as the "Sign of the Yellow Ball" tavern and was owned and operated by Benoni Shepard, Tolland's postmaster and town clerk.

In 1842 it was bought by Judge Elisha Stearns and he gave it to his daughter and son-in-law, Charles Hicks, as a wedding present in 1845.

Ratcliffe Hicks was the son of Charles and he added on to the house in the 1880's and also "modernized" the interior.

### Ownership of Industrial Park Changes as Bank Forecloses

COVENTRY — The Coventry Industrial Park's ownership changed hands this week as the Connecticut Bank and Trust Company foreclosed the mortgage held by the ill-fated Coventry Development Corporation.

Corporation President James Ladd said the group was unable to raise the \$28,000 needed to pay off CDT by the Sept. 12 deadline set by the Tolland County Superior Court last month. A second mortgage of \$10,000 is held by Philip DeBatis, who does not plan to take over ownership of the property.

A third mortgage is owned by Peter Rich in the amount of \$3,000. He has made financial arrangements for assuming the land and ownership system.

The committee is headed by Councilman Robert Hurd. A committee member, Councilwoman Lena Theriault, said applications came in from Connecticut, Rhode Island, New Jersey, Texas, Ohio, Massachusetts, One Connecticut one was an applicant from Vernon.

Richard Cromie, attorney for the corporation, placed much of the blame for the industrial park's failure on town officials. Two years ago the Town Council refused to file an application for federal funds to build the internal road. Council members claimed it was improper to use public money for a private development.

The PZC is still holding a \$3,000 bond from the corporation for land stabilization and seeding of disturbed areas. Ladd has repeatedly charged the PZC with impending development of an internal road, increased the price of the lots to a point where they were not marketable.

Richard Cromie, attorney for the corporation, placed much of the blame for the industrial park's failure on town officials. Two years ago the Town Council refused to file an application for federal funds to build the internal road.

Several months ago the corporation had urged town officials to purchase the remaining lots and to develop them for town profit. But the Economic Development Commission advised the Town Council to turn down the offer.

The corporation then attempted to sell the land at auction, asking a minimum bid of \$45,000. However, no bidders turned up on auction day.
