Use Sought For Schools

EAST HARTFORD - The Real Estate Acquisition and Disposition Committee of the Town Council has voted to turn the two grammar schools which were closed last spring over to the mayor for

Mayor Richard H. Blackstone said he would like to lease the Second North School, 1450 Main St. The other school property, the South Grammar School, 120 High St., should be "disposed of in some way." Blackstone said.

Junior Achievement, Inc., has inquired about the Second North School property. Junior Achievement is looking for a center to hold meetings and serve youths from East Hartford, Glastonbury and South Windsor.

If Junior Achievement were to get the property, it would be under a three-year lease arrangement, Blackstone said. JA would maintain the building and pay a rent for using it, he said.

Blackstone said the South Grammar School would cost too much to renovate. A senior citizens group in the south end expressed interest in using the site as a senior citizens center.

Strike News gubernatorial race as an independent. Blacked Out

WINDSOR LOCKS (UPI) — Striking Bridgeport teachers and the Bridgeport Board of Education imposed a news blackout today after a marathon bargaining session recessed at 8 a.m.

"This looks like it could be it, though," said Max Reed, a spokesman for the Bridgeport Education Association, referring to what he perceived as a step in resolving the 9-day-old walkout.

"There apparently was some progress made last night," he said. Reed said there would be no official statement on the status of contract talks until after 7 p.m. today when talks were to resume.

More teachers were to appear in Bridgeport Superior Court today and possibly face the same contempt citations, fines, and jail sentences now shared by other teachers imprisoned at an abandoned 150-bed National Guard post once used by migrant tobacco pickers.

Deputy Education Commissioner Peter Horoschak announced today that federal mediators assisting with negotiations called for the recess. There was no official word on whether progress had been made. Round-the-clock negotiations, which began Sunday at 2 p.m., were adjourned at 8 a.m. today, Horoschak

The city's 1,250 teachers are seeking a new contract with higher wages and improved working con-

The Risley Reservoir water probably would be a necessity for the town until 1990, Jodaitis said. But, if the dam is removed and the reservoir drained, the town would have to find an alternate source to replace the Risley water, he said.

Right now, the reservoir is well below its normal level and presents no hazard, he said. When the water level becomes high, the town takes steps to drain some of the water.

This could not be done last spring, however, because of the heavy snow melt. During last spring, the reservoir did overflow the dam some, Jodaitis said. There was no major damage, however.

Clothes ranged fromn 1870 sleeping outfit worn by John Williams to children's clothing modeled by Allan and Lisa Marcus. Other fashions included bridal gowns, tight waisted skirts, beautifully plumed hats, and a Roaring Twenties dress for a night on the town. The clothes were at one time part of the Boston 200 Bicentennial Group. They are now privately owned, and were rented from the owner and received by the society three weeks ago.

The 40 outfits were modeled in chronological order. and the narration was done by Marlene Gallo. Peter Cobb played the old-fashioned tunes on the piano and even got into the modeling act. He wore a sleep shirt and peeled it off midway through the program to
