## Leaf Pickups To Start Late

MANCHESTER — The town's annual leaf pickup program will have one of its latest starts ever this year.

George Ringstone, acting highway superintendent, said Friday that the program probably will not be started until about Nov. 1.

Every fall, the town's Highway Department handles a street-by-street collection of fallen leaves that have been swept and piled by residents.

Last year, the town cleanup started in late October and was finished in early December. Residents have complained sometimes about the leaves picked up too early in the season and more piling up before the end of autumn.

Early snowfalls, however, can disrupt the cleanup schedule if it is started too late.

## Stock Market

NEW YORK (UPI)

Investors, encouraged by a jump in the leading economic indicators and President Carter's pledge to take a firmer stand against inflation, sent stock prices higher Friday. Trading was quiet.

The Dow Jones industrial average climbed 4.51 points to 865.82. The blue chip indicator eked out a gain of 3.38 points for the week.

The New York Stock Exchange index rose 0.31 to 57.78 and the price of an average share added 18 cents. Advances led declines by a 9-to-4 ratio among the 1,870 issues traded at 4 p.m. EDT. Big Board volume amounted to about 23,610,000 shares.

Before the market opened, the Commerce Department reported its August index of leading economic indicators — designed to forecast the future of the economy — spurred 0.8 percent on the heels of a revised 1.3 percent slump in July.

Although the Federal Reserve Board tightened credit another notch Thursday by allowing the federal funds rate to exceed its presumed target, Wall Street apparently believes the Fed will not impose stricter restraints in the near future.

Investors also were relieved the nation's basic money supply rose by a moderate \$800 million in the latest week. Although the supply has grown at an unacceptable 10.6 percent annual rate over the last four weeks, the latest advance was not heated enough to push the Fed toward curbing the monetary expansion.

Composite volume of NYSE issues listed on all U.S. exchanges and over the counter totaled 25,720,000 shares. The American Stock Exchange index climbed 1.23 to 168.81 and the price of an average share added 10 cents. The National Association of Security Dealers' NASDAQ index of OTC stocks gained 0.78 to 132.55.

At 4 p.m. Holiday Inns was the most active NYSE-listed issue unchanged at 28 1/4. Ramada Inns was second, off 1/2 to 13 3/4. Exxon Corp. was third, up 3/8 to 52 1/8.

On the Amex, advances routed declines by a 3-to-2 margin among the 849 issues traded at 4 p.m. Volume at that time amounted to 3,900,000 shares.

Allied Artists led the Amex actives, ahead 1 1/8 to 7 1/8. Syntex was second, up 1 5/8 to 35 3/4. Valmac Industries followed, ahead 1 to 14 7/8.

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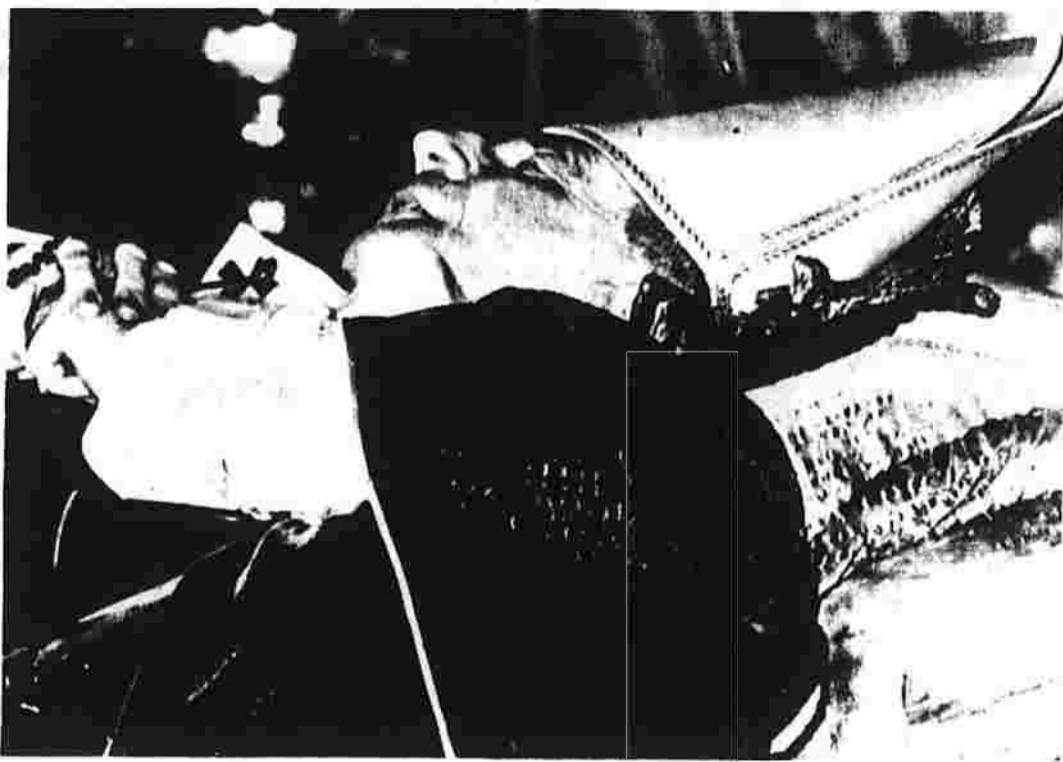

# Rome in State of Shock

VATICAN CITY (UPI) — The body of Pope John Paul I, his face serene in a death no one expected, lay in state in his papal palace as the Roman Catholic church set in motion for the second time in as many months the 2,000-year-old process of choosing a successor.

A stunned world expressed surprise and sorrow at the sudden death of the 65-year-old pontiff who died alone of a heart attack Thursday night while lying in bed reading a book of religious devotion. His private secretary found him early Friday morning, the lights still burning at his bedside, the book still in his hands.

John Paul's reign lasted only 34 days, the briefest in nearly four centuries. It was a reign highlighted by his ready smile and parish-priest manner that won him immediate affection. His personal style was humble and warm-hearted, and Romans loved him for it.

"Rome is in a state of shock," Bishop Paul Dudley of Minneapolis said at the Vatican. The eternal city was still mourning the death on Aug. 6 of Pope Paul VI and a Vatican attendant, echoing the thoughts of 700 million Catholics, said, "It's impossible, it cannot be true. He had opened his arms to all of us and now he is gone so quickly."

The body of the 263rd pontiff, clad in his red and white papal vestments, lay on a bier in the marbled papal palace, his white silk miter resting on green and silver pillows, as nearly 100,000 mourners, numb with grief and surprise, passed by.

Under his left arm was the silver bishop's staff topped by a crucifix. On his feet were the bright red "shoes of the fisherman" symbolizing the Roman Catholic belief that popes are the successors of St. Peter, the fisherman from Galilee who became Christ's main disciple.

Thousands of other mourners crowded into St. Peter's Square and knelt in prayer for the repose of the soul of the pontiff.

Messages of condolence poured into the Vatican from throughout the world. President Carter expressed his "deep sadness." Evangelist Billy Graham said in Stockholm that "God may have a message for the world" through the recent deaths of two popes and a Russian Orthodox church leader.

When John Paul's body was discovered, Vatican Secretary of State Cardinal Jean Villot of France, the church chamberlain, rushed into the room carrying a ritual silver hammer. A Vatican doctor was with him.

Villot lightly tapped the late pope on the forehead three times with the hammer and called the pontiff by his given name three times in Latin: "Albino, Albino, Albino. Are you dead?"

When there was no reply Villot pronounced the pontiff dead, grasped the pontiff's hand and removed the gold ring of the fisherman, symbolizing papal power, and smashed it with the hammer, signaling the end of John Paul's brief reign.

## Special Masses

MANCHESTER — All regularly scheduled masses at St. James Church this weekend will be recited in memory of Pope John Paul. There will be a special mass held the day of the Pope's burial, on a date to be announced.

At St. Bridget Church the pope's passing will be mourned at the regularly scheduled masses.

## Vorster President

CAPE TOWN, South Africa (UPI) — South African legislators Friday elected former Prime Minister John Vorster as the nation's fourth president, a largely ceremonial post he is expected to transform into a powerful position.

Vorster, who stepped down from his 12-year reign as prime minister Thursday, was elected president by South Africa's Senate and Assembly sitting in a joint session. He becomes the first man to serve in both posts.

The presidency has been largely a ceremonial post in the past, but the South African constitution is being rewritten and one expected result is that the president will have greatly expanded powers.

The 63-year-old Vorster, who resigned because of health problems, was expected to take on the role of "elder statesman" to hold together the warring factions within the ruling Nationalist Party.

The presidency was left vacant by the death last month of Nicolaas

Diederichs. Vorster said he was available for the post when he was announced on Sept. 20 that he was resigning as prime minister.

Vorster was opposed in the voting by two candidates nominated by the opposition Progressive Federal and New Republic parties, but the vote never was in doubt because Vorster's Nationalist Party held a solid majority.

He received 173 votes out of 204 votes cast.

Vorster, a man with solemn dignity and heavy public countenance, epitomized the deeply religious, stubborn Afrikaaner people who have dominated South Africa since 1948.

Vorster was succeeded as prime minister by Defense Minister Pieter W. Botha, who is known as a military hawk and relentless foe of "giving in" to the nation's black majority.

In his first remarks as prime minister, Botha, 62, promised a "positive party to improve race relations" in the white-ruled nation.

## Rail Strikers Told Go Back

WASHINGTON (UPI) — U.S. District Judge Aubrey Robinson ordered the nationwide four-day rail strike ended Friday and the president of the striking rail clerks sent his members back to work immediately.

Robinson signed a "double-edged" temporary restraining order that directed the strikers to return to work and forbade more than 100 railroads from taking reprisals against the strikers who have disrupted virtually all the passenger and freight rail transportation in the nation.

Fred Kroll, president of the striking Brotherhood of Railway, Airline and Steamship Clerks, emphasized all workers who were on strike would be protected.

"With this tremendous victory, I urge our people to immediately return to work," Kroll said.

"We're going to start getting them back immediately. I don't anticipate any problems."

Robinson's order stated that the railroads and the union, its officers, employees, agents, members "and

all persons acting in concert or participation with any of them, are hereby enjoined and restrained from resorting to self-help including strikes or lockouts during the period in which the status quo provisions of section 10 of the Railway Labor Act is in effect."

Such a period would run up to 60 days from President Carter's creation of the emergency board under the act Thursday.

Robinson's order will expire at 6:45 p.m. on Oct. 10 unless further extended by the court. Robinson set Oct. 10 for a hearing on a preliminary injunction against the strike.

The judge acted after a one-hour hearing in which the BRAC and the railroads could not work out a legal agreement aimed at reopening rail operations and contract negotiations.

Earlier Friday, the Justice Department filed suit against the union and 139 railroads asking that there be no strikes or lockouts during a 60-day "cooling off" period under the Railway Labor Act.

The suit contended that "unless the strikes are enjoined, the United States ... will suffer immediate and

irreparable injury for which it has no adequate remedy of law."

Justice Department attorney Glenn Whitaker told Robinson that any order or injunction must be a "two-edged sword," both protecting workers against reprisals for striking and also ordering them back to work.

When Richard Conway, a lawyer for the National Railway Labor Conference, an industry group, addressed the court, Robinson asked: "Do you agree it is two-edged?"

"I agree it is two-edged," Conway said, but urged that the railroads not be required to hire back all workers nor forego disciplinary procedures.

Robinson said he was issuing only a temporary restraining order because of the problems about reprisals.

Kroll said his workers needed assurances from the railroads there would be no reprisals against strikers when they go back to work.

## One Supermarket Will Defy Blue Law

HARTFORD (UPI) — At least one Connecticut firm — a supermarket chain — said Friday it plans to remain open Sunday in defiance of the state's new "blue" law.

At the same time, Attorney General Carl Ajello said the new law does not provide him with the money or staff to go to court to stop businessmen from opening their stores.

On Thursday, Chief State's Attorney Austin McGuigan told reporters at his swearing-in ceremony that he is asking police across the state to refrain from arresting businessmen who break the closing law when it takes effect Sunday.

Instead, McGuigan has asked the authorities to go to their local prosecutors to discuss alleged violations and possible arrest warrants. McGuigan has sent each prosecutor a memorandum explaining the law.

Democratic legislative leaders Friday applauded McGuigan's approach as "very rational." They also attacked Republican gubernatorial candidate, Ronald Sarasin, for saying the new law is "crazy" and probably as unconstitutional as its predecessor.

In 1976, a lower court judge struck down Connecticut's centuries-old "blue" law, saying it was vague, arbitrary and confusing. During the past session, the Legislature passed a law it felt remedied the problems with the old statute.

But Ajello indicated the new law also has some shortcomings. He said the law says the attorney general "may" go to court to keep a store from opening on Sunday.

"Unfortunately, the legislation has not conferred the necessary funding or supporting authority upon the at-

torney general to enable him to do so. Nor does it delineate the circumstances under which such actions would be either necessary or appropriate," he said.

Although many firms appeared to be backing away from testing the constitutionality of the new law, an executive with Everybody's Market, which has five supermarkets in Connecticut, said Friday his chain plans to stay open.

"The management has decided to keep the stores open," said John Waz, general manager of Emcon, Inc., the parent company of Everybody's Market.

"We have given it a lot of thought. We decided to open and see what happens," he said.

## Begin Goes To Hospital

TEL AVIV, Israel (UPI) — Prime Minister Menachem Begin entered a hospital at his own request Friday, saying only that he did not feel well, the national television reported.

Friends of the 65-year-old prime minister, who has a history of heart troubles, said they expected Begin to return to his Jerusalem home Saturday evening.

There was no immediate indication of the cause of Begin's illness. The prime minister was in the Knesset, the Israeli parliament, for the full 17-hour debate Thursday on the Camp David peace accords.

Begin's spokesman, Dan Pattir, said the prime minister spent the evening at home but complained of feeling tired. He said Begin telephoned his physician, Dr. Basil Lewis, and requested to go to the hospital for a checkup.

## U.N. Will Police Elections

UNITED NATIONS (UPI) — The U.N. Security Council Friday approved one of the largest peacekeeping operations in U.N. history designed to guarantee free elections and a smooth transition to independence in South West Africa.

The vote in favor of the massive U.N. presence in the former South African mandate territory was 12-0. The Soviet Union and Czechoslovakia abstained. China which is opposed to any U.N. military involvement, did not take part in the vote.

The plan's realization now depends on the consent of the new South African government of Prime Minister Pieter Botha.

Secretary General Kurt Waldheim submitted the transition plan to the Council on Aug. 29 after its five Western members had worked out its basic guidelines and obtained agreement from South Africa and the black guerrillas of the South West Africa People's Organization.

South Africa administers the huge, mineral-rich territory in defiance of the United Nations and has announced plans to proceed with its own plan for granting the territory independence.

Waldheim's plan features the dispatch of a U.N. force of up to 7,500 men, a team of 360 civilian police to observe law enforcement and 1,200 poll watchers for the election.

In Waldheim's first estimate, the one-year exercise — until an indepen-

dent Namibia is established — would cost up to \$300 million.

Under the plan, South African police would continue to be responsible for locally maintaining law and order.

Before the vote, Waldheim said he recognized that the cost of the operation "is a particularly heavy burden" and promised to ensure that it "is carried out in the most economical manner possible."

But he emphasized that without a strong U.N. presence "incidents might take place, intentionally or otherwise, that might lead to a resumption of hostilities."

He said the troop estimate by his special representative in Namibia, Martti Ahtisaari of Finland, "is

based upon reliable professional judgment and experience in the light of the tasks to be performed.

"The figure of 7,500 (which includes 2,300 for logistics)," he said, "would be the authorized upper limit of the military component and it is obvious that its actual size at any given time will depend upon the development of the general situation."

Waldheim said he had so far made no commitments as to the contribution of military commitments to the force by individual countries, and emphasized that this would be done in consultation with the Security Council and based "on the principle of equitable geographical distribution."

## One Charged in Damage To Center Park Trees

MANCHESTER — Police have arrested one person and say that more arrests are pending in connection with vandalism to trees in Center Park.

Raymond Hardy, 17, of 28 Maple St. was charged Friday with second-degree criminal mischief, Captain of Detectives Joseph Brooks said Friday.

Damage to the trees was reported to police Sept. 14. Branches were ripped from several trees, and three — a dogwood, a striped maple and a copper beech — were damaged severely.

Hardy was released on a \$250 non-surety bond. His court date is Oct. 16. Brooks credited the work of Detective Robert Hennequin in connection with the arrest. More arrests in the case are expected, Brooks said.

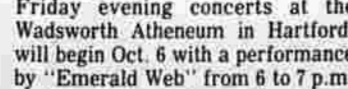

Police Sell 'Hot' Bikes

By CHRIS BLAKE Herald Reporter EAST HARTFORD—Do you want to buy a "hot" bike? Better still, do you want to buy one from the police?

No, this is not an illegal racket. It is the annual police bicycle auction, scheduled for today at the police headquarters parking lot, 497 Tolland St.

Every year, the police pick up from 400 to 500 stolen or unclaimed bicycles. Usually, most of them are claimed within a year. But the police must get rid of the remaining bikes at the end of the year.

Saturday morning, Officer Walter Kehoe will act as auctioneer and attempt to sell 42 bikes of all sizes, shapes and colors.

Kehoe said the police used to pick up bikes all over town, but they had too many cases where someone left the bike and came back for it later—only to discover that the police had taken it.

Now, the police pick up a bike only when someone complains there's a bike in their yard that they do not claim about.

Kehoe said he'll sell the bikes "for whatever they'll give. We have to get rid of them, even if we have to give them away."

This year's stock includes 100-speed bikes with butterfly handlebars and even a small trike.

"We usually don't get trikes, but this year we had one for some reason," Kehoe said.

The auction normally draws 100 and 150 people on a good day," he said. "We get an awful rash of stolen bikes here, as most towns do," he said.

Kehoe recommends chaining bikes to something that doesn't move. If you can't find something to chain it to, he suggests chaining several bikes together — "anything butter, roll-o-butter, blueberry tart, borage, French fries, salad, shell and meat sauce, tossed salad, bread and butter, Jell-O, beverage.

## At Andover Elementary School They Reap What They Have Sown

When anyone asks the staff of students at Andover Elementary School, "How does your garden grow?" they smile and reply, "Great." And, they're right.

The idea of growing their own vegetables for use in the school cafeteria began last year when David Kravet, school principal, was trying to cope with what he calls "the rising costs of the world."

"We began on a piece of borrowed land and put in 50 tomato plants. It proved successful and we closed out the entire school lunch program with a loss of only \$100."

"This year, using school property, we cleared two acres, but didn't plant it all. Next year we will," Kravet said.

Working on the project was Irene Collins, the school cafeteria manager; two CETA workers, one a

gardener and the other a baker; and the custodian.

"We planted 280 tomato plants this year along with cucumbers, corn, butternut squash, zucchini, and string beans."

"I think we planted watermelon and onions too late to harvest," he added.

The vegetables are used in the school lunch program menus, especially the tomatoes for sauce.

"Tomato sauce for spaghetti, pizza,

etc., is used frequently and it is so expensive to buy," Kravet said. Ms. Collins' staff cuts the tomatoes up and freezes them until it's time to use them in sauce.

"We didn't have to raise the price of lunches by using this bounty from our garden. It really saves the town quite a bit of money."

During their planning and growing period, Kravet, who admits to being a city boy from West Hartford, said a woodchuck kept invading the garden. "I was all for killing it, but the custodian and others working on the garden said they would trap it harmlessly and release it elsewhere. Realizing the damage it was doing to the garden, I told them they had one week to capture the woodchuck."

Before the week ended, the woodchuck was trapped, and wild rumors are that it was released in Hebron. Hopefully, no Hebron gardeners will report an extra woodchuck on their property.

Standing guard over the ample garden is a colorful Big Bird, feathers and all, but minus one wing.

"It used to be in the school library, but one day after the crows had been pecking away at our seeds, it mysteriously appeared in the garden. No one seems to know just how it got there," the smiling principal said.

Doing their part on an individual basis, Andover farmers often donate other vegetables from their gardens such as rhubarb and apples.

"When we get enough, we make pies or other desserts for the kids," Kravet said.

Obviously, for the students at Andover Elementary School, lunches made from fresh produce from their own garden, must make school almost fun.

### Collectors' Corner

These four set-tenant stamps will be released at the Hot Springs National Park in Arkansas on the eighth of October, during the convention of the American Forestry Association. There is the giant sequoia, the eastern white pine (state tree of Maine and Michigan), the white oak (state tree of Connecticut and Maryland) — and the gray birch.

The forests will doubtless be mystified to find the gray birch in this select company. It has been described by one authority as "a weedy and horticulturally useless tree." Its only claim to fame is that it will grow where no other tree can survive — so perhaps the stamp is meant as a tribute to true grit.

The giant sequoia is seen only in certain groves in California. One of the trees, called the General Sherman, is nearly 27 feet in diameter and a long walk in circumference. The redwood is also a sequoia, and has a little wider distribution. The name "sequoia" always had a challenge in spelling, belonged originally to an Indian chief who invented an alphabet for his people.

An extra fillip to the stamp designs is the depiction of the leaf and fruiting of each tree at the lower left. Also, except for the oak, there is a background scene of each tree's typical habitat. The artist responsible is Walter D. Richards of New Canaan, Conn.

The stamps will be semi-jumbos, printed by gravure in pairs of 4. There will be six colors, headed by green, and six plate numbers. First-day cancellations will be available through the postmark.

### Accused Murderer Pleads Innocent

**CROWN POINT, Ind. (UPI)** — A Gary man accused of firing an errant shotgun blast that killed California Angels' outfielder Lyman Bostock pleaded innocent Friday to first degree murder.

Leonard Smith, 31, an unemployed steelworker, entered his plea during arraignment before Lake County Criminal Court Judge Andrew V. Giorgi.

Police said Smith was firing at his estranged wife but, instead, killed Bostock, 27, who had signed a five-year, \$2-million contract with the Angels this season. The shooting took place on a Gary street last weekend.

"The suspect's attorney, Nick Thirus, filed motions asking the judge to set bail on the charge, which carries a penalty of 30 to 60 years in prison, and to allow the defense to review all evidence in the case."

Giorgi set a hearing for Oct. 12 on the bail motion and granted discovery to both prosecution and defense.

The Lake County prosecutor's office said the next step will be to seek Smith's indictment by the county grand jury when it convenes in mid-October.

Gary police detectives said Smith, an unemployed steel worker with a record of minor arrests but no convictions, was trying to kill his estranged wife, Barbara, 26, who was riding with Bostock in the back seat of a car driven by the Smith's uncle.

Bostock met Mrs. Baylor for the first time a few minutes before the shooting. Mrs. Smith suffered minor pellet wounds to the face.

Police services were held Thursday in Los Angeles for the outfielder and more than 500 persons — friends, family, teammates, reporters and sports fans — crowded into the Vermont Square United Methodist Church. Hundreds more stood outside.

"It is always difficult to say goodbye to a friend," pitcher Ken Brett said in an eulogy. "I don't believe I have the ability to portray the picture of the Lyman Bostock that we all knew so briefly."

"There remains for us only one consolation, that we are better persons for having known him."

## Green Takes Lead

**AKRON, Ohio (UPI)** — Former U.S. Open Champion Hubert Green fired a three-under-par 67 Friday over the rugged Firestone South Course to grab a two-shot lead over Severiano Ballesteros after two rounds of the \$300,000 World Series of Golf.

Green and Ballesteros were the only golfers in the elite field of 26 who were under par after 36 holes. Texan Tom Kite, who shot a 69 Friday, was at even par 140, three strokes behind Green.

Green, who always seems to save his best golf for the world's toughest courses, birdied the par-5 16th and the par-4 17th en route to a three-under-par 32 on the back nine.

Green entered the day one shot behind his playing partner Ballesteros, who shot a 69 Thursday for the only subpar round on the opening day.

Hale Irwin stood alone in fourth place at 142, after shooting a 71 Friday to match his Thursday performance. Tied at 143, six shots behind Green, were defending champion Lanny Wadkins, Bill Kratzert and Dr. Gil Morgan.

Jack Nicklaus, who won the first expanded World Series in 1976, probably has the most to lose out of contention with a 76 for a 148 total, 11 shots back.

The pros again found the 7,130-yard South Course to be tough going. Out of the 26 best golfers in the world, only Green and Kite could break par Friday.

Kite, who grabbed the lead midway through the second round by birdieing three of the last four holes on the front nine for a 33, three putted 18 for the second day in a row and shot 71.

Despite his brilliant round Friday, the ever-smiling Green discounted his chances of winning the \$100,000 top prize.

"I led after two rounds two years ago," he said. "and then my game came back to normal and I finished fifth. I suppose I'm more of a favorite than I was when the tournament started, but I still wouldn't run out and bet on my chances."

But Green's play belied his attitude as he started the day with a 40-foot birdie putt on the first hole and was never in serious trouble the rest of the way.

"I played solid golf today," said Green. "and I have been playing pretty well. The course is playing very difficult and probably will be the rest of the way. I think that is my advantage."

Ballesteros — who hit only six fairways Friday and only eight on Thursday — said, "I like my position," but noted that "this course can be easy if you play like Hubie Green did today."

The 72-hole tournament continues through Sunday.

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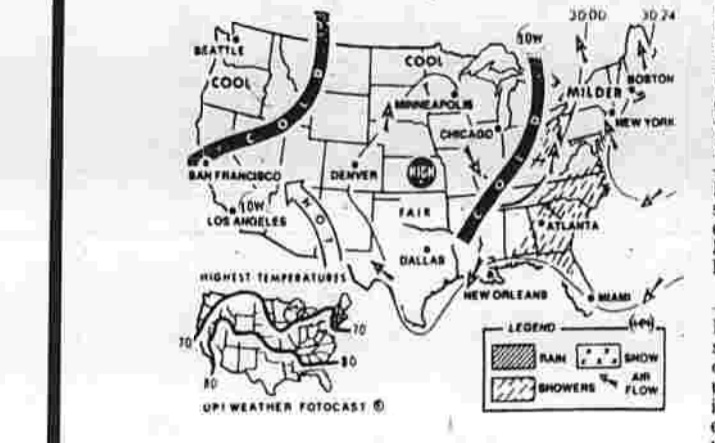

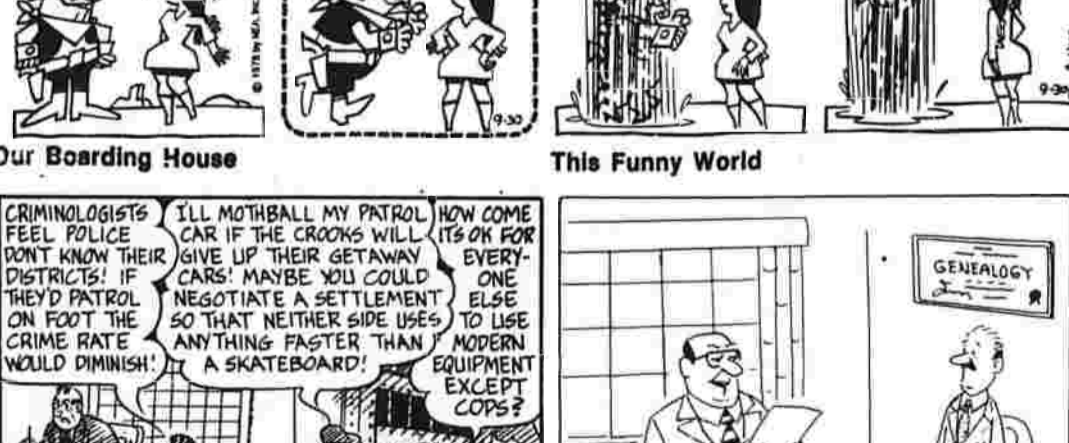

## CB Convac

By Ink Dipper

We wrote last November about cities that had launched programs employing CB in emergencies and in crime control. Two of those cities — Rochester, N.Y., and Ft. Worth, Tex. — were conducting noteworthy programs. Since nearly a year has passed, we thought we'd check back on the progress of the CB ventures in those communities.

Actually, Ft. Worth has had its Channel 9 Police Monitor since March 1976. The effort is totally voluntary. Rochester, on the other hand, has been testing a specific program aimed at helping elderly citizens. The idea resulted from a study by the state's Criminal Justice Services department in Albany and is a pilot for future statewide action if it is successful.

Rochester's state-funded project is administered by the city's police department. A group of 102 elderly persons in a specific zone was selected. Each household was equipped with a CB. Patrol cars in this zone were also equipped so they could react to any calls from the 102 families. Channel 9 was the call up channel.

Lt. Roy Irving, a Rochester police department researcher, has been watching over the effort. "We really haven't evaluated the program yet," he explained. "Burglaries have dropped in the zone. But we've only had about 15 or 16 calls from residents with the CBs. We don't know whether it is the publicity the plan has received or the result of all the efforts we have made toward crime prevention."

Added Irving: "We have had some problems. The radios we put in the police cars didn't work properly at first. Then we realized that the police officers were so busy monitoring five police channels on their regular radio, they weren't able to pay as much attention to their CBs as might be necessary. Too many voices at one time in the car."

In Ft. Worth, however, the Police Monitor Program handles an average of 6,890 calls every month. From March 12 through June 12, members of the Monitor fielded 18,465 calls. These included stranded people, reports of burglary activities in progress, accidents and other emergencies.

An truck traveling through the city hit a freight train carrying several tanks of jet fuel. The subsequent blast blacked-out all electric and telephone service in the area. A passing motorist gave the word on Channel 9 and police units and fire trucks were on the scene within minutes, saving valuable time and bringing immediate order to a chaotic scene.

Ft. Worth Police Chief

A.J. Brown considers the Police Monitor one of the city's greatest assets and gives the credit to the volunteers, who man the base units 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

"The effort has been of inestimable value to the police and fire departments," he said at an awards dinner for participants in the program.

T.E. Attebery, the liaison officer who supervises the program, said "Working with these people and supervising the Monitor Program is a function that gives more satisfaction than anything I've ever done. Its becoming a tradition that I hope will carry on forever."

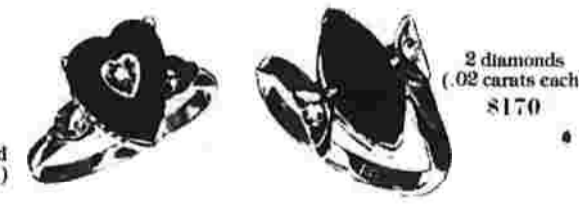

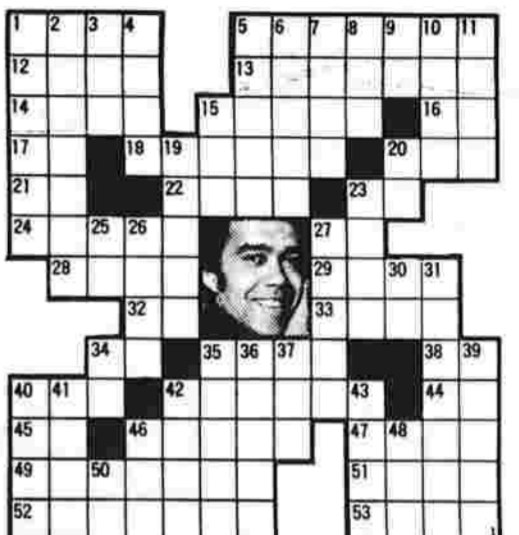
