MHS Incidents Have Racial Overtones

MANCHESTER — School authorities Friday afternoon were investigating several incidents with racial overtones which erupted at Manchester High School during the school day Friday.

The incidents included name calling between small segregated groups of white and black students and an assault involving some female students at the close of school.

Principal Jacob Ludes reported in a press conference called late Friday afternoon.

Ludes, obviously concerned about the incidents and anxious to quell rumors about them, said that the name-calling incidents are being investigated by school authorities and the assault case has been turned over to Manchester Police who are investigating. No arrests or disciplinary action has been taken yet.

Two arrests of non-students, charged with loitering on school grounds, were made by police, but it was not clear whether the arrests were related to the disruptive incidents within the school.

Alerted by complaints and rumors which started Thursday, Ludes had called in extra help from the Youth Services Department and put the police on alert for Friday.

A black student had complained Thursday of being called "nigger," Ludes said. Other students also told him of the name calling going on.

Friday's incidents started with name calling between two groups of students, which Ludes said were basically segregated groups, of about 8 to 12 students during first period in the cafeteria.

That incident involved name calling between the students while moving about the cafeteria, Ludes said, and the excitement spread briefly into the corridors at the end of the period. It did not

involve loud hurling insults, he said. A number of students did not report to school Friday and urged calmness and rational attitudes.

Ludes said he will also meet with groups of students to try to resolve the incidents and to determine if they were isolated incidents.

In the strongly worded statement to the student body Friday, Ludes said that the name calling and threats of physical violence at the school will not be tolerated.

Disciplinary actions will be taken and may include suspension, Ludes said for actions which involve criminal activity, police will be called in, he said.

He urged students to attend all their classes and to cooperate to eliminate rumors in order to restore order to the school. Ludes said several students had come to him concerned about the disruptive incidents, and anxious to have them curbed.

Ludes, who has only been principal for one month, said he believes it is a good school and a good student body and he wants it to remain that way.

The school, with a total population of 2,033 students of which only 57 are black, has not had a history of racial dissension, School Superintendent James P. Kennedy, who also sat in on the press conference, said. He said there have always been reports of fights and name calling between various groups, but not of this specific nature or magnitude.

Kennedy said he has had some concern about the increasing numbers of minority students and has attempted to deal with the situation through in-

service training of staff and alerting them to the problems which could arise.

Ludes met with the faculty after school Friday and urged calmness and rational attitudes.

He said he will be contacting parents over the weekend, and had already heard from some parents who expressed a willingness to meet with him as early as Tuesday.

There are no classes on Monday because of the Columbus Day holiday.

Ludes said he will also meet with groups of students to try to resolve the incidents and to determine if they were isolated incidents.

In the strongly worded statement to the student body Friday, Ludes said that the name calling and threats of physical violence at the school will not be tolerated.

Disciplinary actions will be taken and may include suspension, Ludes said for actions which involve criminal activity, police will be called in, he said.

He urged students to attend all their classes and to cooperate to eliminate rumors in order to restore order to the school. Ludes said several students had come to him concerned about the disruptive incidents, and anxious to have them curbed.

Ludes, who has only been principal for one month, said he believes it is a good school and a good student body and he wants it to remain that way.

"I don't intend to let the problem get out of hand," he said. He said he is trying to focus on the vast majority of students that do not want a problem.

The high school administration is working out plans for increased security at the school starting Tuesday. This will include putting more teachers in the corridors and places where students congregate, but will not mean bringing in substitute or extra help, Ludes said.

Corks Pop to Signal K-Mart Reconstruction

MANCHESTER — Owners of stores in the K-Mart Plaza broke out the champagne Friday to celebrate the beginning of reconstruction of the K-Mart roof which collapsed last January.

Tony LoGrasso, owner of the Pizza Wagon, was so excited to see the big demolition cranes drive into the plaza Friday afternoon that he baked three pizzas and bought champagne to share with the other store owners.

Michael DiBella of Blue Liquors Package Store in the plaza, were brought out with the pizzas and placed on a card table right in front of the huge crane.

The contractor took out a \$1 million building permit Wednesday, and shoring up of the building to make it safe started after that, Miller said. The actual dismantling of the debris from the roof will start Monday. The dismantling will probably take about six weeks, Miller said.

In about two weeks an engineering survey will be taken by Joseph Cook Structural Engineers of Philadelphia to assess what the reconstruction will entail. Those plans will be reviewed by Francis Conti, the town's chief building inspector.

Miller said he plans to use all local labor, sub-contractors and materials as much as possible on the job. He said K-Mart believes in doing this in all their locales where they build stores.

The store owners joined with Earl Miller, job superintendent for the K-Mart reconstruction project, and Nancy Upton, manager of the Manchester K-Mart store, in toasting a new beginning for K-Mart plaza.

The smaller businesses in the plaza have suffered from considerable loss of business since K-Mart, the biggest draw for customers, was forced to close down.

All the store owners said Friday they are willing to stick it out for the next nine months or so that it takes K-Mart to reopen.

Town Gets HUD Grant

MANCHESTER — A housing grant of \$1,195,110 will be offered by HUD to Manchester, according to an announcement from the office of Rep. William Cotter. The grant will be for acquisition and rehabilitation of 20-family units, and will be administered by the Manchester Housing Authority.

The houses the MHA intends to purchase would be those that take from one to four families, according to Pat Mastrangelo, MHA chairman.

He said that HUD has specified that the units not be all in one location, but spread out around town. The minimum accommodation would be a unit with two bedrooms, Mastrangelo said. He pointed out that these units are not for the elderly, but for those with families.

"We could buy a house with an interior that wouldn't meet the specifications of HUD," Mastrangelo said. "We would tear the inside out and redo it to meet their approval."

He also said that this grant applies to existing housing.

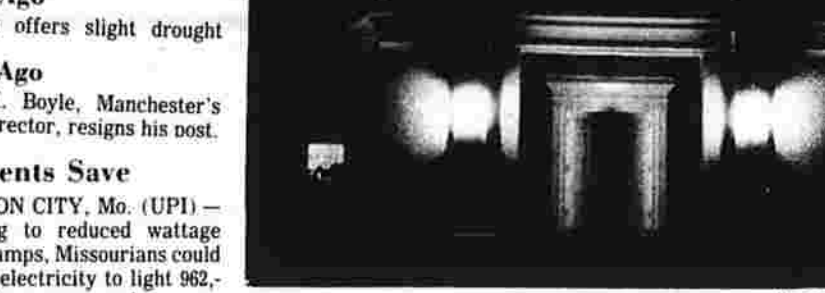

The Population Problem

Recently Robert S. McNamara, president of the World Bank, addressed the Urlogical section of the American College of Surgeons and said that "Unless poverty and the population problem are overcome the result may be a world that none of us want to live in."

In an effort to clarify the impact of a certain birth upon the population growth the number 70 is critical, i.e., if the birth rate is one percent the population doubles in 70 years; if two percent, the population doubles in 35 years; if three percent, in 24 years; if four percent, in 18 years; and five percent in 14 years. To attain population stabilization a growth rate of less than one percent would be necessary.

Another interesting aspect of the population problem is its structure.

In the developed countries the median age is 31 years, whereas in the developing nations, the median age is 19 years. In the emerging nations 40 percent of the population is less than 15 years of age!

While we are blessed with nature abundance, climatologists tell us that the climate of the world is gradually changing in a direction that is not encouraging and that a mild drought in our Great Plains could be a disaster.

Unimpeded population growth means malthusianism of the most of mankind (50 percent at the present time), an increase in pollution and crime, the erosion of our non-renewable natural resources, the fouling of our lakes and rivers, and depopulation of the natural beauty of our planet.

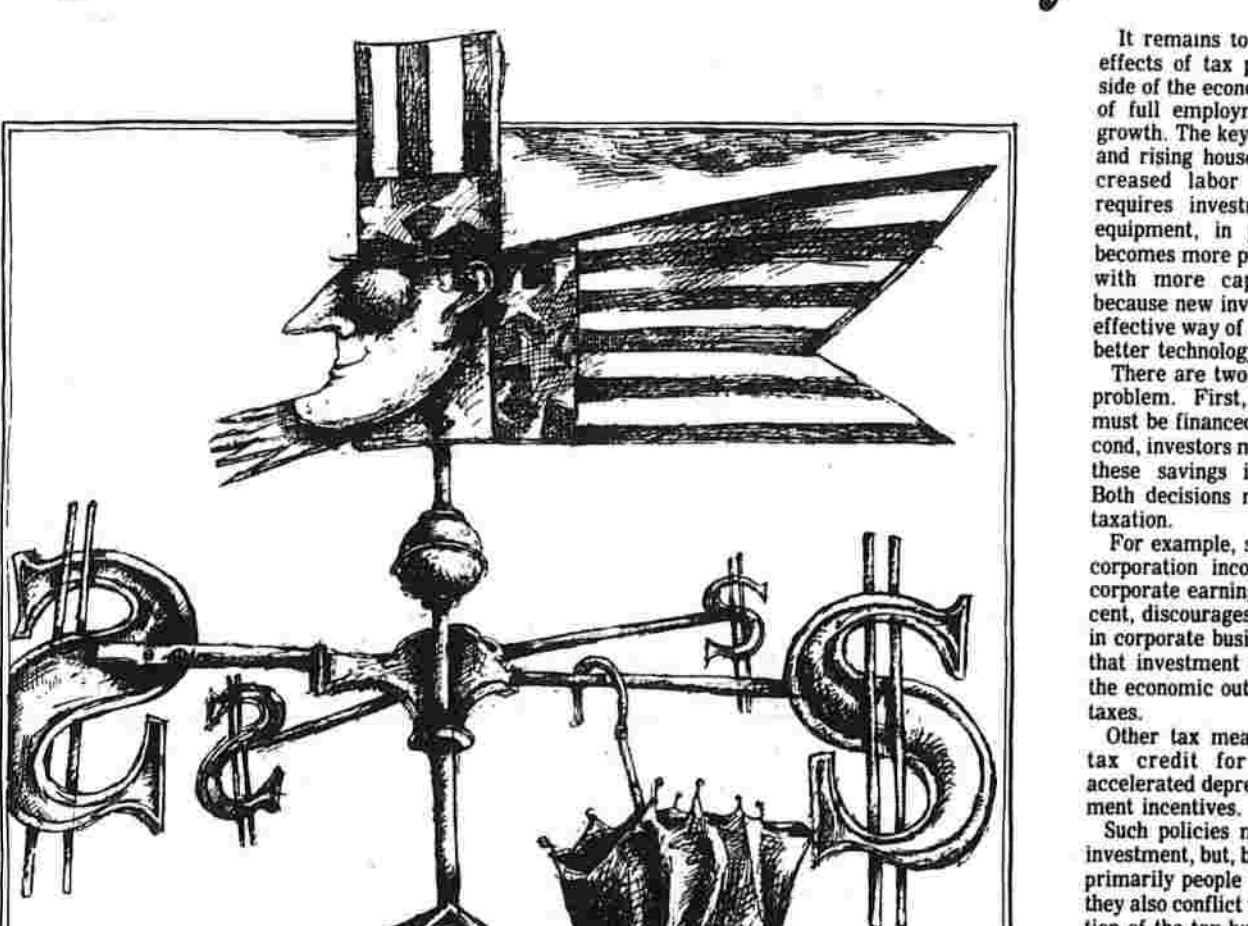
Taxation: Its Impact on the Economy

It remains to note the longer-run effects of tax policy on the supply side of the economy, that is, the level of full employment output and its growth. The key to economic growth and rising household incomes is increased labor productivity.

Clearly, tax policy is not simply a matter of raising revenue in an equitable fashion. The entire performance of the economy must be allowed for as well, though this should be done with least damage to the fairness of the tax system.

## Grasso, Sarasin Agree On Evil of Income Tax

**STAMFORD** (UPI) — In their first debate, Gov. Ella Grasso and her Republican rival Ronald Reagan Friday spent most of the time trying to outdo each other on how evil an income tax would be for Connecticut.  
 Mrs. Grasso accused Sarasin of being a relative newcomer on the anti-income tax scene and said the voters should be wary of any promises he makes. The silver-haired Beacon Falls congressman countered by saying the Democratic governor has already imposed an income tax of her own — the dividends tax.

In the first of several "joint appearances" by the two candidates, Sarasin told a meeting of the Southwestern Area Commerce and Industry Association that he would eliminate the "discriminatory" dividends tax which applies to individuals with gross incomes over \$20,000. He tabbed the tax "Mrs. Grasso's income tax."  
 The Republican candidate for governor also said he could guarantee there would not be an income tax during his administration — the same promise that has been repeated time and time again by the governor.  
 "I just wish you could have made that speech in 1971," chided Mrs. Grasso. That was the year Sarasin, then a member of the state legislature, voted against an income tax amendment, but later voted for a budget package that included the controversial levy.  
 "And Lew Rome could have seconded it," the governor continued, referring to Sarasin's running mate, GOP lieutenant governor nominee Lewis Rome, who once supported the concept of an income tax in Connecticut.  
 Sarasin, a three-term congressman from the economically depressed Naugatuck Valley, said even though Mrs. Grasso hasn't imposed an income tax during her administration, she has increased other taxes by about \$1 billion.  
 "Do you know what one billion is?" Sarasin asked. "One billion seconds ago, the first atomic bomb had not yet been exploded. One billion minutes ago, Cleopatra sailed the Nile. One billion hours ago, dinosaurs

walked the earth. One billion dollars ago, Mrs. Grasso took office."  
 The Republican said Mrs. Grasso became the "nation's biggest spender" this year when she proposed a budget 14 percent larger than the previous year's spending package.  
 Mrs. Grasso said she was able to spend that much because she had built up a formidable surplus through her "prudent and careful" management of the state's fiscal affairs. She categorized her term as one of "promises made and promises kept."  
 The governor harped on the number of new jobs her administration has brought into the state since 1974 and the amount of new money her administration has given to cities and towns. Sarasin said Mrs. Grasso's figures were deceiving.  
 The two candidates also disagreed on the need for a Department of Housing, an idea first backed by Mrs. Grasso's second-in-command and political nemesis Lt. Gov. Robert Killian.  
 Mrs. Grasso, who beat Killian by a 2-1 margin in the state's first Democratic gubernatorial primary in September, said the department would be an important addition to state government. Sarasin said it would be too costly and unnecessary.

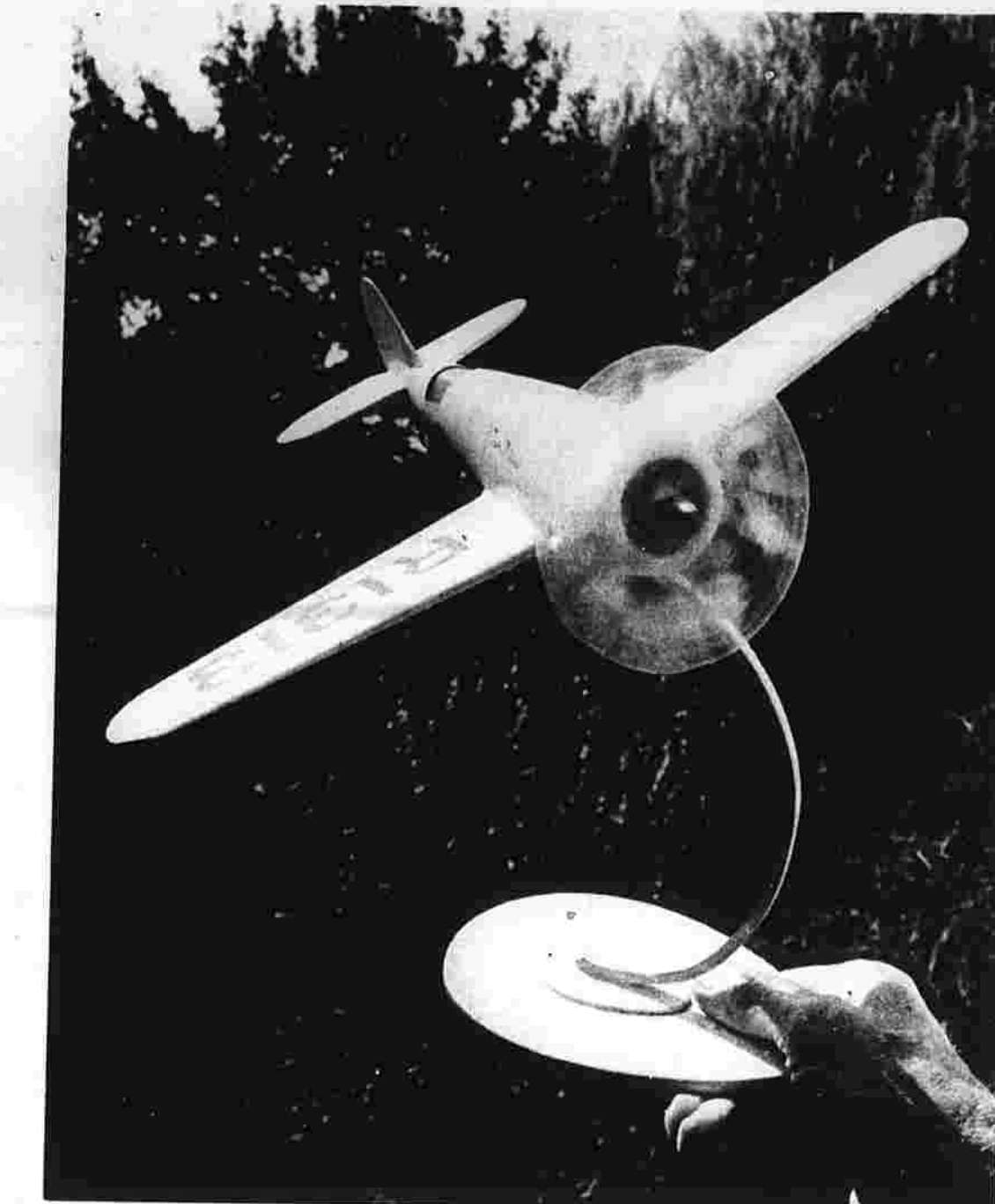

A model of one of Howell "Pete" Miller's planes

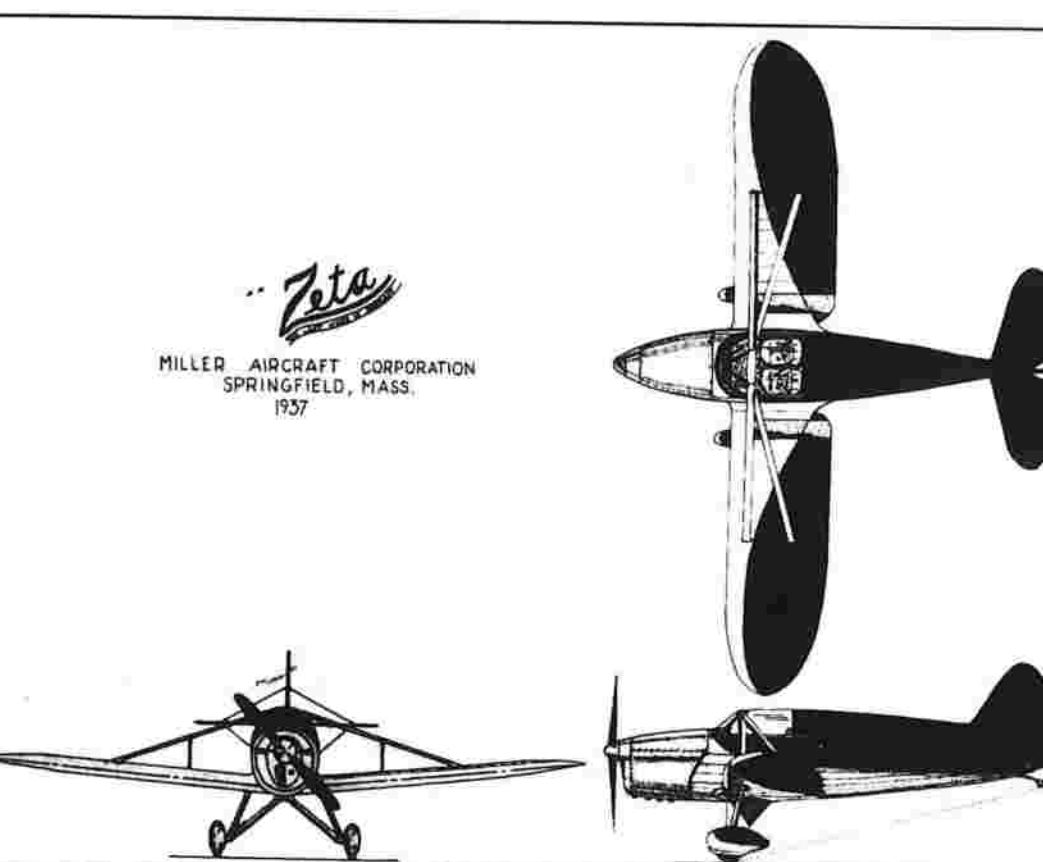

## 'Zeta Day' in Springfield Aircraft Designer Honored

An airplane built more than 40 years ago was hoisted to a place of honor Sept. 30 in a newly designated area earmarked for aviation history at the Springfield (Mass.) Science Museum. Honored at the afternoon reception was Howell W. (Pete) Miller of 384 Porter St., who was the president and chief engineer of the Miller Aircraft Corp. in 1938 when the aircraft was built.  
 The first aviation exhibit in the museum, the "Zeta," is a two-place, low wing aircraft which was built at the old Springfield Airport.  
 Miller's corporation was formed in 1926 with 20 stockholders buying shares of stock for \$100 each. Millard was vice president and production engineer.  
 Before that time, Miller was chief engineer for Granville Brothers Aircraft in Springfield, builders of the Gee Bee (for Granville Brothers) #21 and the Gee Bee #2.  
 Jimmy Doolittle, who was later to become a hero in World War II, piloted the R-1 to win the Thompson Trophy Race in 1922, setting a world land speed record of 296.237 miles per hour.  
 The Zeta, which has been in storage about 30 years, was donated to the museum by Romaine Lambert of Southampton, Mass. Lambert, recipient of the FAA 1969 New England Mechanic of the Year Award, ran an aircraft maintenance business more than 30 years.  
 Commenting on the cost of building aircraft then and now, Miller said, "The Zeta was built for approximately \$5,000. But today to comply with government-approved type certification plus all the testing and designing required, it would cost at least \$100,000."  
 Money was scarce then, and there was not enough for an approved type certificate, Miller said, and the "Zeta," named for Miller's college fraternity, Zeta Psi, was deemed to be a staff engineer and senior design engineer in the research laboratory.  
 While he never piloted one of his aircraft, Miller, nonetheless, has racked up hundreds of hours of flying time in the planes he designed.  
 Now enjoying his retirement with his wife, Dorothy, also a former P&W employee, Miller says he is content to stay on the ground.  
 Miller said.  
 Still later, in 1936, the company built "Time Flies" for pilot Commander Frank M. Hawks.  
 Other planes designed by Miller are "Moonship," "Westfield Trainer," and "Summit."  
 "When the war clouds began to gather in 1937, materials were becoming hard to obtain and military aircraft were being built. It was then we decided to store the 'Zeta,' which was a sport plane," he said.  
 Miller, retired from the Pratt & Whitney Division of United Technologies Corp. in East Hartford 10 years ago, where he worked as a staff engineer and senior design engineer in the research laboratory.

## When Forecaster Is 84, You Believe Him

**COVENTRY, R.I.** (UPI) — Autumn is beginning to set in along Plainfield Pike. The postcard-pretty countryside is being transformed into hues of gold, rust and crimson.  
 With the change of seasons — winter just around the corner — the telephone rings more than usual at the white farmhouse where Cy Place was born 84 years ago and has lived ever since.  
 Place lives as far west as you can drive in tiny Rhode Island without being in Connecticut. He is one of New England's oft-quoted weather prophets. And he is storyteller to boot.  
 "I'll be 85 next St. Patrick's Day," Place tells a visitor. "My mother sent for a neighbor. No doctor. I tell people I wasn't worth it."  
 Place glanced across the dining room table to his wife, Ina, who gave up her teaching job in Providence in 1923 and followed the man she loved back to his dairy farm.  
 "She made a wonderful farm wife out of me," Place said. "She's already 85. Has the jump on me."  
 The kitchen phone rang. Ina didn't budge. "It's usually his call, so I let him answer it," she said.  
 When people call for Cy, the conversation usually turns to the weather and what he sees ahead.  
 Cold, Blustery Winter  
 Place says another cold, blustery winter is in store this year and for a few more years down the road because the Northeast is in a "wet cycle."  
 "We'll have a cold, wet winter, that means lots of snow," he said, adding it will be nothing like last February's blizzard.  
 "We've been in this wet cycle for at least a year. I don't think it's apt to change for quite a while. These things last. Mild winters are very few and far between."  
 His weather-watching theories include:  
 • "Currents from high winds. You can't predict long-range weather with animals. Only what's coming up soon."  
 • "Three frosty mornings in a row mean a storm. Or three foggy mornings. Either one."  
 • "There is always a cold spell of weather around the full moon, even in summer."  
 • "Heavy husks on corn means a hard winter."  
 • "A rainbow means good weather."  
 When Place says he's going on 85, you have to take him at his word.  
**Few Gray Hairs**  
 There are few gray hairs on his brown head. His brow is deeply furrowed, strong hands gnarled from years of rugged outdoor work.  
 Place sold his dairy herd about five years ago when arthritis in his legs made it difficult to get around his 125-acre farm. He sells hay and still raises a garden to help get the household through the winter.  
 He spent a little time in his younger years in the city, where he met Ina, and quickly decided that lifestyle wasn't for him.  
 "With country living, most everybody within five miles you consider a neighbor, where, in the city, I had people live right around the corner I never knew. You're just one of the thousands of people."  
 "If you get here and try to work beside the road, it's almost impossible for me to get any work done. Every other car will either stop, honk the horn, wave or something."  
 "I still enjoy it. If they didn't like us, they wouldn't do it."  
 The farm handed down to Place after his parents' deaths has been in the family "back to the 1600s."  
 "That was a custom with the old people. They expected the children — at least one of them anyway — to continue on the homestead. Tradition. Will End  
 He expects that long line of farm tradition will end when he and Ina pass on, but is realistic about it.  
 "It looks possible when we're done — the property might change hands. My daughter has a home of her own. She has six children. They're all college people and in different professions."  
 "Times have changed. I wouldn't want to tie my family down to it."

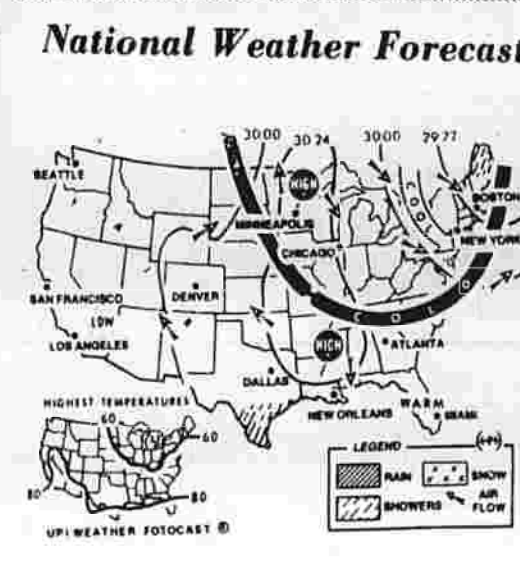

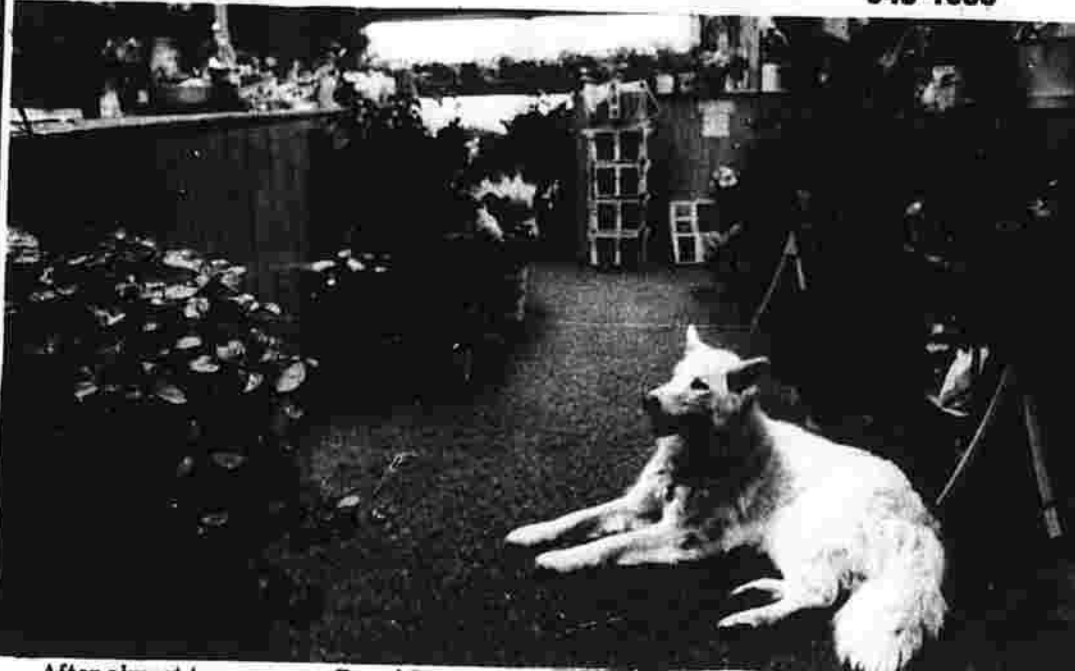

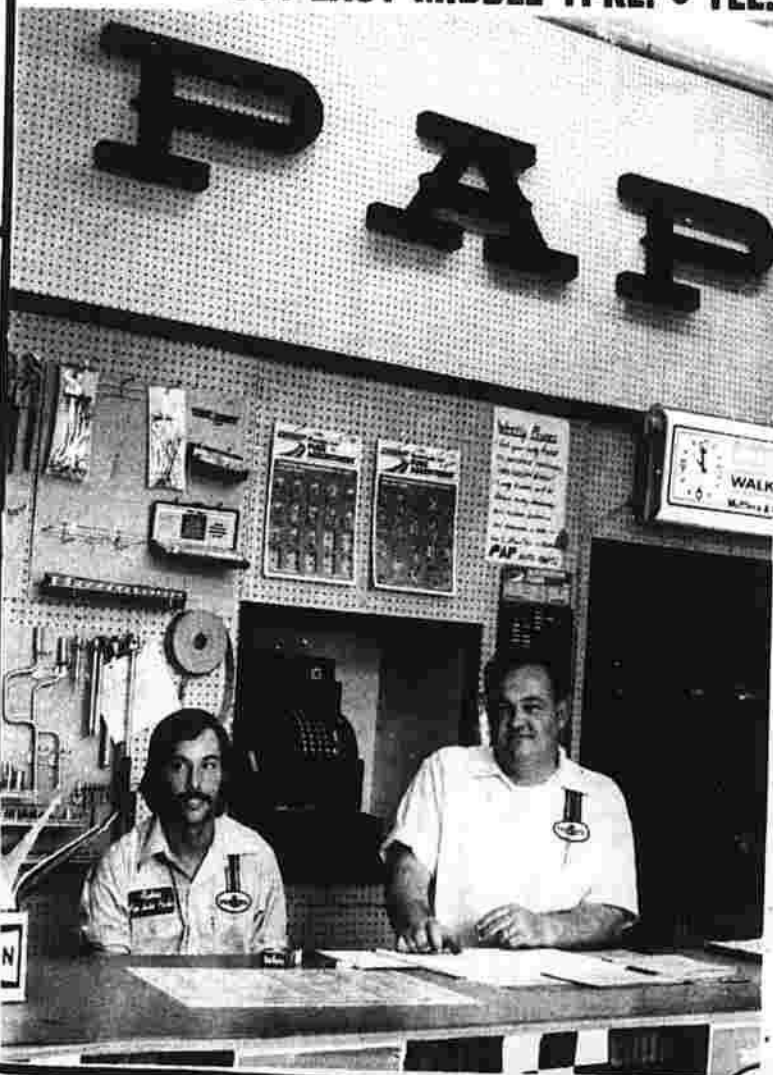

Good Buddy, while you've been thinking of the weather and traffic up ahead, the manufacturers of CB radios and accessories have been thinking ahead, too.

Their problem is they can't finger the mike and get a breaker-breaker that will give them the information they need to make their sales skyrocket this Christmas. They have to guess. And they've been busy doing just that.

The reason for all this activity is understandable. There are more CB units sold in November and December than any other two months of the year. The manufacturers and their retailers want to be sure they have plenty of goods to offer potential buyers.

Royce Electronics, a major marketer of transceivers, antennas, and accessories, is announcing what they claim is the largest cash rebate program in CB history. On their lower-end models, Royce will give a rebate of \$3.00, \$10.00 on the middle of the line and \$20.00 on their Royce 641 and 642 models.

Cobra from Dynascan will offer, through retailers, mobile underdash models at special prices. The offer will include either a trunk-mounted antenna or a magnetic antenna free with the purchase. With purchase of two Cobra AM underdash mobile units there will be a power mike offered as a bonus.

Cobra also is introducing for the holiday season a 40-channel mobile unit that will retail for as low as \$79.95 and a base station for \$199.95. Buyers of these can get a Cobra transistor radio for only \$1.99 with the package.

Lafayette is introducing a new CB transceiver. It is a 40-channel unit that has two receiver sections. While one channel is being used on the primary receiver circuit, the secondary circuit will monitor any one of the remaining channels. It also has a unique two-way scanning system. If the main channel is being used, an audible tone will signal when there is activity on a monitor channel. Or it can be set to scan any two pre-selected channels and will automatically switch to the active one.

Radio Shack and E.F. Johnson do not have any special plans for Christmas. Radio Shack will continue to push its products based upon price — below \$100 — and depend upon their 3,200 outlets to get the volume. Johnson will have some price reductions on last year's models, but they'll maintain their normal promotions and do not plan anything unusual.

There is a "Lil' Buddy Talking CB Radio" coming on the scene from Kusan in Nashville, Tenn., a company that specializes in toys for children. The toy looks like a radio with the channels clearly marked so the little CBR can imitate Mom and Dad. It's got a mike, and when it's turned on, small fry can hear six different CB messages. It's a colorful toy and gives youngsters a chance to learn their numbers while they are imitating their parents.

These plans are from manufacturers. You can be sure that retailers will be adding to them with promotions of their own at your local level. (NEWSPAPER ENTERPRISE ASSN.)

AEROGRAMME VIA AIRMAIL PAR AVION

## Collectors' Corner

This bare-bones picture shows all there is of a design for an aerogram to be released Nov. 3 at the opening day of FLOREX '78 at the Hilton Hotel in St. Petersburg, Florida. This is the annual convention of the Florida Federation of Stamp Clubs, and will also be the site for the meetings of the United Postal Stationery Society and the Confederate Stamp Alliance. There will be special competition in those two areas plus the usual United States, U.N., airmail and topical exhibits.

Scott's Catalogue gives short shrift to aerograms (also called air letter sheets). They have them scattered through the section on airmail stamped envelopes and are difficult to puzzle out. A much better treatment is given in the Minkus "New American Stamp Catalogue." Here all the aerograms are shown together and are well illustrated. The first one was for 10 cents, issued in 1947 in Washington, D.C. It shows a four-engine plane. Another, in 1965, the fourth in the series, has a picture of J.F. Kennedy. There is a flight of doves for Human Rights Year (1968), three floating balloons to commemorate Hot Air Ballooning, and a "gram with a "NATO" spelled out in large letters to mark its 25th anniversary.

The skimpy design shown here was foreshadowed by something very similar in 1976—a "usa 22c" in script, red or blue. This one will be blue on white. Orders for first day cancels should be addressed: "Aerogramme, Postmaster, St. Petersburg, FL 33733." Send 22 cents for each one desired. Checks are accepted up to a total of \$44. They request either a self-addressed envelope or stickers for return. A complete collection of U.S. aerograms should not be too difficult to achieve. There have been only a dozen so far, with the most costly, the 1958 issue, priced at \$5.50, unused and entire.

The U.N. has put out almost as many. They do have a scarce one, the very first, (1952), which carries a tag of \$38.50.

**Canadian Catalog**

Collectors of Canadian stamps will be happy to see the 1979 "Canada Specialized," published by the Philatelic Supply Co. of Toronto. Especially so after a tussle with the new "snap-shut" edition of the Harris catalog. The Canada book is on white paper, with beautiful sharp pictures — and it lies flat when opened.

The price is \$3 at dealers, or it may be obtained by first class mail from the publishers for \$3.50. Address them at 127 Cartwright Avenue, Toronto, Ontario M6A 1VA, Canada.

**Also Useful**

Still another useful publication just off the press is the 1978 revision of "Duck Stamp Data." This has 50 large pages plus covers, all punched for a three-ring binder.

Each stamp design is shown enlarged to about 4½ by 3 inches with a normal-sized stamp lower on the page. They give a short story about each issue with plates used and quantity sold. (Except for the Ross' Goose of 1977-78.)

It is not in color, sorry, but it is still a good value at \$2.50. It is also known as "Fish and Wildlife Circular Number 111." The GPO Stock number to use is 024-010-00455-0. Order from the Superintendent of Documents, United States Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402.
