Carter Dismisses Depression Idea

WASHINGTON (UPI) - President controls "unless this nation is at a Carter and the Federal Reserve Board have wasted little time in silencing talk about a possible recession or - worst yet - a depression if the administration's anti-inflation

program flops. Carter and Federal Reserve Chairattempted to ease such worries by saying the economy will slow down next year, but that neither a recession nor a depression is on the horizon.

Their comments, made separately on the economic outlook, followed by one day a frightening suggestion by Alfred Kahn, Carter's chief inflation fighter, that a "deep, deep depression" could be possible if the

anti-inflation drive fails. It was the strongest language used thus far by a government official in assessing the ramifications of Carter's campaign.

"I think this is something we do not anticipate - a recession or a depression." Carter told reporters at breakfast session.

"If we have a complete and abject failure in our anti-inflation program, then I think a recession or a depression is a possibility," he said. "But I think we'll be successful."

Carter also restated his strong opposition to mandatory wage-price

"I don't have an intention of asking for wage and price authority. I don't think Congress would grant it if I asked. And I have no intention to ask," he said.

Miller, meanwhile, told the Senate Banking Committee he did not believe present economic circumstances point to a recession in 1979 or that there will be a "credit crunch" because of near-record interest rates.

"I do not see conditions that will bring about a recession," Miller said. He also said inflation will not slow next year as rapidly as the administration has predicted.

The reason, he said, is that cost increases already in the economic pipeline "will be placing continued pressure on the price structure, so that it will be difficult to break the momentum of inflation.'

Miller said it may take "five to seven years to bring inflation down to where it should be - below 2 percent.

"Inflation will not come down by large amounts in 1979," Miller said. There is no quick fix to basic inflation.

Miller promised the Fed would follow a policy of "responsible
