Enough Gas?

HARTFORD (UPI) — State officials Friday were watching the gasoline supply situation in Connecticut to determine whether the closing of about 70 Gasland service stations would cause any spot shortages.

C. J. Woskowitz, chief of operations for energy in the state Office of Policy and Management, said all Gasland stations in Connecticut were scheduled to close. They began closing Wednesday.

Woskowitz said the 70 stations, operated by Good Hope Industries of Springfield, Mass., held about five percent of the Connecticut market.

He said Good Hope, which also operates Gasland service stations in New York, Massachusetts and Vermont, has been in Bankruptcy Court in Boston for about three years.

City Shooting

HARTFORD (UPI) — Police say a Hartford man shot and killed his wife Friday in their barricaded North End home and then shot himself in the chest.

William Lassiter, 37, of 192 Granby St., was listed in guarded condition at Mount Sinai Hospital. The victim was identified by police as Pauline Lassiter, 36, of the same address.

A police spokesman said Lassiter apparently held his wife, their nine-year-old daughter and two-year-old son hostage before barricading his family in their home shortly before 2 p.m.

Authorities said the children were not harmed. Police were taking care of them until relatives could be reached.

Funding Idea

WEST HARTFORD (UPI) — The special task force created to find a fair way to finance education in Connecticut Friday recommended the state set a minimum expenditure that communities must spend on each student.

The 25-member advisory panel recommended that any finance plan that is ultimately approved by the Legislature should also "assure that each district has the ability to pay for a suitable program of educational expenses for each child."

Economic Reports Said Encouraging

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Housing construction remained strong in October, the government said Friday, but interest rates have soared since then and builders are bracing for a sharp slowdown in 1979.

In another development, the government reported the personal income of Americans rose by a strong 1.2 percent in October, largest gain since mid-summer and an encouraging signal that consumer spending probably will not decline soon.

New construction of homes and apartments was at an annual rate of 2.08 million units in October — virtually unchanged from September, the Commerce Department said. It was the eighth consecutive month that starts have been above the 2 million mark, a level economists consider to be healthy.

However, building permits, an indication of future housing construction, fell 2.9 percent, the department said.

"We believe that starts should finish the year at nearly 2 million, which is great," said Michael Sumichrast, chief economist for the National Association of Home Builders. "But next year will tell a different tale and starts should fall to about 1.5 million."

The government has issued slightly more optimistic estimates, saying starts will fall to between 1.65 million and 1.7 million in 1979.

Sumichrast said the first effects on construction of the near record high interest rates being charged for mortgage loans will show up soon.

"Some of our builders plan to cut back by 20 to 40 percent next year," he said.

On Nov. 1, President Carter and the Federal Reserve Board unveiled a package of measures to rescue the sagging dollar, including a steep boost in interest rates.

Most experts see that mortgage interest rates will hit 11 percent, severely limiting the amount of funds available for loan by financial institutions.

Police Report

Town Seeks Bond Rating Improvement

MANCHESTER — The town, hoping to improve its bond rating, is expecting a visit during the spring from Moody's Rating Service.

Moody's, which rates municipalities for the interest rate charged for long-term investment, now gives Manchester an A-1 rating, its third highest.

Town Treasurer Roger Negro said in his annual report released Friday that plans are being worked out for a tour of the town in the spring by the rating service.

Town Manager Robert Weiss said the town is hoping to move up to an AA rating, which is the service's second-highest rating. The highest category, AAA, seldom is used in rating municipalities, Weiss said.

Weiss said the town usually goes to New York to provide information to Moody's about Manchester's fiscal matters. He feels a visit here will provide a further in-depth look into financial matters in the town.

"We think it will make a big difference," he said. Such items as money management, tax collection effort and whether past fiscal years have ended with a surplus are looked at to determine the rating.

Weiss also said that something like the recently completed townwide citizens survey might also have an effect. The survey showed general satisfaction with town government services.

An improvement in the town's rating could mean a decrease in interest paid on long-term bonds.

But, even with the A-1 rating, Weiss said the town has received favorable rates in the past. "We feel we've been getting bids from bond investors as if we were AA," he said.

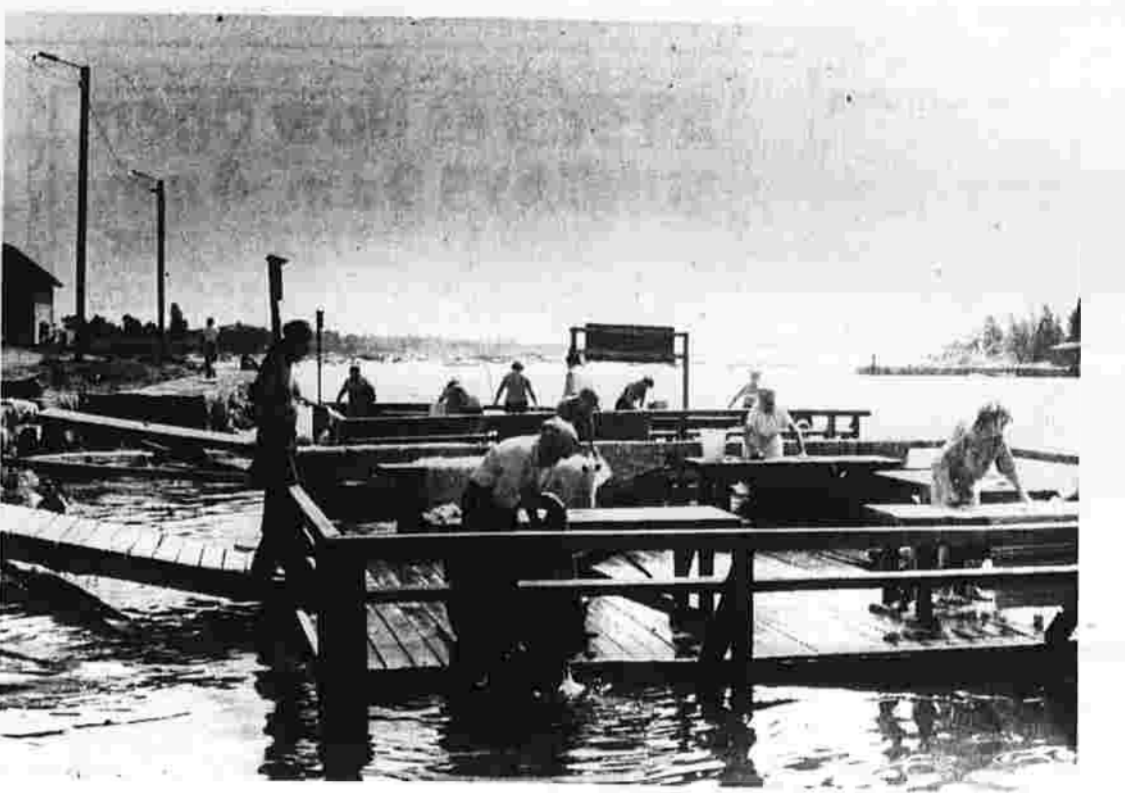

Friendly, Serene and Beautiful Finland's Charm Captivates American Visitors

Visiting the place of one's roots was exciting because it was an opportunity to experience firsthand all the things we had heard about all our lives.

For three of us Finnish-Americans in Finland, these things included saunas, Sibelius, striking architecture, beautiful glassware, china and textiles, tall pine forests and many lakes, and of course, our Finnish family.

We were more fortunate than most tourists because we had personal guided tours from our Finnish hosts and hostesses through the streets and country roads of Finland and were able to stay in many kinds of Finnish homes throughout our three-week stay this past summer.

Our trip was also made more interesting by the fact that our Finnish hosts and hostesses were from many different professions and walks of life. They included pharmacists, salesmen, several teachers and a high school principal, a nurse and doctor, a nursing instructor, an architect, a retired army colonel, retired liberal arts artist, a city public works director, a factory worker, farmers, students, and many creative homemakers and others.

Each of them shared with us in interesting information and knowledge about their particular life work and lifestyle that we could not have gained any other way.

We expected Finland to be a fairly modern country and we were impressed with the modern, efficient architecture and urban planners throughout the world, and the site of the 1952 Olympic stadium.

Visits to Tapiola, the planned community which has served as a model for architects and urban planners throughout the world, and to Saarninen's home, both north of

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Film Industry Not Bothered By Regulations

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Jack Valenti and his Motion Picture Association seem just a little smug in this day of all-out industry battles against government regulation.

The movie executive, a Texas sidick of the late President Lyndon Johnson, says his organization has met the enemy and won. And even Congress agrees.

"The film industry is unique," a House subcommittee on small business recently found. "Federal regulation is not an obstacle as it is to just about every other industry. The ratings system has done a good job of heading this off."

The system, which applies the "G," "PG," "R" and increasingly "X" ratings to movies, was born 10 years ago this week after a Supreme Court pornography ruling made imminent the threat of government regulation.

Within weeks of the court decision, Valenti said, producers, distributors and theater owners had devised the plan now familiar to all cinema-goers. They would second-guess the government by evaluating film content themselves and advising parents of their findings.

"The movie industry is doing what the law would do and probably doing it better," Valenti said.

"If there weren't a rating system then there would be a vacuum and the government would step in."

The three branches of the film industry appointed a seven-member board to run the independent and self-financing system. Board members view an average of two films a day, tally their ratings and hear appeals.

A producer pays from \$700 to \$8,000 — according to the size of the film's budget — to have a movie rated. The first three categories — "G," "PG" and "R" — are copyrighted. But the last, "X," is up for grabs and can be applied voluntarily to any film.

The controversy that first greeted the system, mostly from within the industry, has quieted. And Valenti said, local and state governments have stopped the initially frequent attempts to establish censorship boards.

"The result, he believes, is a screen that is free for creators and audiences alike."

"The movie business has never been better," said Valenti.

Box office profits are running 13.2 percent ahead of last year. Ticket prices have risen only 4 percent. Attendance is up 8.4 percent.

"So if you subtract inflation, it's still an enormous gain," he said.

Curiously, the "arty" statement movies that in part prompted the ratings system have been replaced by "entertainment-oriented films," the movie executive said.

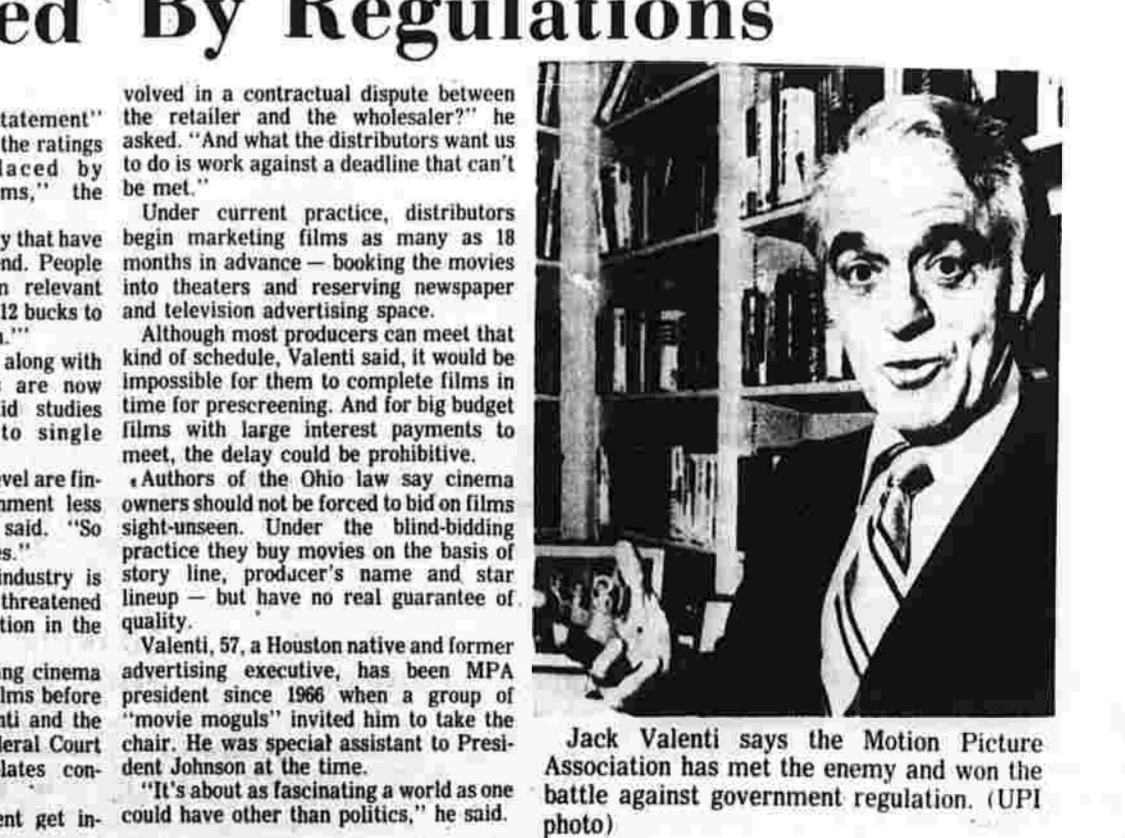
"Under current practice, distributors begin marketing films as many as 18 months in advance — booking the movies into theaters and reserving newspaper and television advertising space."

"Although most producers can meet that kind of schedule, Valenti said, it would be impossible for them to complete films in time for prescreening. And for big budget films with large interest payments to meet, the industry could be prohibitive."

"Authors of the Ohio law say cinema owners should not be forced to bid on films sight-unseen. Under the blind-bidding practice they buy movies on the basis of story line, producer's name and star lineup — but have no real guarantee of quality."

Valenti, 57, a Houston native and former advertising executive, has been MPA president since 1966 when a group of "movie moguls" invited him to take the chair. He was special assistant to President Johnson at the time.

"It's about as fascinating a world as one could have other than politics," he said.

Tonsillitis Fails To Slow McEnroe

LONDON (UPI) — John McEnroe, aiming for his second Grand Prix victory inside a week, overcame an attack of tonsillitis Friday to head an all-American semifinal lineup in the \$75,000 tennis championship.

McEnroe, 22, favorite for the \$66,400 first prize, following the exit of the two top seeds, won a bizarre 65-minute match 6-0, 7-6 and then rushed off to see a doctor who diagnosed tonsillitis and prescribed antibiotics to bring down his 100 degree temperature.

The 19-year-old left-handed New Yorker, seeded third, was adamant he would play Saturday's semifinal against fellow-American Dick Slackton, who also made the last four at the expense of an Italian, beating Adriano Panatta 6-4, 4-6, 8-6.

"I have had it before," said McEnroe. "I knew it was there before the match and that is why I arranged to see the doctor before going on court."

The other semifinal features two unseeded players, 1975 Wimbledon champion Arthur Ashe against Tim Gullikson.

Gullikson, the 27-year-old right-hander of the tennis twins, crushed sixth-seeded fellow-American Sandy Mayer 6-2, 6-2 while Ashe defeated 1972 Wimbledon champion Stan Smith 6-3, 6-2 in the last match of the evening.

McEnroe's match swung amazingly, following the first set in 18 minutes with the loss of only seven points and then traced into a 4-0 lead in the second.

The hapless Barazzutti, reeling about as if suffering from shell shock as winners flashed past him and over him from all directions, seemed ready to throw in the towel.

McEnroe would not offer his losses as an alibi for his sudden lapse.

Tedford Produces Winner at Iling

"It was noted by Lind that 11 years of the 16 on this year's high school varsity were from Iling.

Todd Return Gives Lift to Jets

NEW YORK (UPI) — The New York Jets got a big lift this week with the announcement that Richard Todd will return as starting quarterback against New England. But the question still remains — will that be enough to overcome the after effects of the Patriots' crushing 55-21 victory earlier this season?

Todd suffered a broken collarbone Sept. 24 when he was dumped by two Washington linemen. He began throwing with pads this week and will make his first start against the Patriots.

New England fell into a first-place tie with Miami for the AFC East last week when the Patriots blew a 23-point lead and lost to Houston 26-23. Both the Patriots and the Dolphins are 6-3.

The Jets, with second-year man Matt Robinson at quarterback, won four of the seven games Todd missed and are 6-5. But one of those losses was the humiliation at Foxboro, Mass., in which the Patriots scored touchdowns the first seven times they had the ball, built a 47-7 lead at halftime and then cleared the bench.

"I think our people realize they have to play harder. You just don't walk out and beat a club like New England. You have to work at it. We don't plan any great innovations. We'll have some changes but nothing major."

The Patriots also must be wary of overconfidence. The Jets can be dangerous. A week after the loss to New England, they spotted Denver, one of the top defensive clubs in the NFL, a 28-7 lead at halftime and came back to win 31-28.

"Games like the one we had against the Jets don't happen very often," said Patriots' tight end Russ Francis. "I don't expect an easy game. After losing last week, we're in the position where we have to win at any place."

"I couldn't believe that first game just as the Jets probably couldn't believe what we did to them. But there were a lot of circumstances. We completed four or five long pass plays that if they weren't complete would change the complexion of the game. We had things open up and we got a couple of calls but a couple of plays the other way and things could have been a lot different.

New England is six point favorite.

"What happened is history. You have to get ready for this game just like any other game. You put the first game out of your mind. This one starts at four. All I know is that we lost a game last week and that we shouldn't have lost and that we have to still saddle up again and get going."

Todd feels he'll need just a few plays to get back into the swing of things.

"I've been out six weeks but I've been at all the meetings and I know what we're trying to do," said Todd, who will also celebrate his 25th birthday Sunday. "What I want to do Sunday is complete a pass, take a good lick and get those third shots over with."

"New England right now is one of the top three teams in the league. I think it's a good time to come back, against top competition. We're going to have to play wide open, mix it up. You can't beat these guys playing conservative football."

In their first meeting, the Patriots' Steve Grogan, probably the best running quarterback in the NFL, was content to stand back and throw to veteran Harold Jackson, who manhandled rookie cornerback Bob Jackson. The key for the Jets is controlling Grogan.

For New England, the Patriots must stop wide receiver Wesley Walker, who is averaging nearly 25 yards a catch, tops in the NFL. Walker, who caught the 75-yard TD pass to beat Denver, has established himself as possibly the most dangerous long-range scoring threat in the NFL.

New England is six point favorite.

"I think there's that element involved, perhaps," Robinson admitted when asked why most of the football fans who show up at the Coliseum for Saturday's 1:10 p.m. kickoff expect the Patriots to win because of their past success.

"But that doesn't have anything to do with me and my feelings about UCLA and I doubt if UCLA has those feelings. I think they're a confident team."

UCLA didn't play a great game last Saturday at Oregon State, losing 12-13. Two weeks ago, UCLA edged Oregon 23-21 at home and Oregon is 1-9 this season. Against Oregon State, UCLA quarterback Rick Bashore didn't complete a pass in 10 attempts and had one interception.

USC is 8-1 overall and 5-1 in the PAC-10 race while UCLA is 8-2 and 6-1.

There has been conjecture this week that a third straight loss by UCLA to USC could do more to shake Donahue's job. Before the season, UCLA athletic director Jim Gagliardi said this was the most talented UCLA football team in history.

UCLA's loss at Oregon State will probably keep the Bruins out of another bowl if they lose to the Trojans.

"I thought we had a good ball club," states Danielson. "We were in every game. We couldn't say that last year."

"This team got better as the year went on but just couldn't stick it in the net. We were lacking something up. I think only two teams wall outscored this one."

Foran (4 goals), Peter Krupp (4) and Tom Roach (7) will graduate from the front line as will Adam, Wilson and Burt Pina from the halfback slots. Bill Fromoll (4 goals), who showed marked improvement with increased playing time because of the injury to Foran, also graduates as does the goaldending combination of Mark Copeland and Ron Apter.

"We had two good goalies, a luxury most teams couldn't afford," Mark had to be the starter," Danielson stated. Matt Glushko graduates from the fullback line.

Manchester will have to rebuild at halfback and up front but "our second line was good enough to play for many schools," insists Danielson, referring to John Moran, John Kelly and Jim Glushko along with Dan Collins. All are juniors. And of course leading scorer Jeff Lombardo, a junior who tallied 19 goals, returns for another campaign.

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"There is a nucleus for next year but it will be an inexperienced team on the varsity level," summed up Danielson.

experienced halfback returning "We may have to do some juggling and may be able to move some fullbacks up," the veteran Tribe coach remarked.

"I want to get someone who wants to be center halfback," Danielson emphasized. "I want a take-charge guy. We haven't had that. If we can get someone who wants to play center halfback, someone who'll be a leader to these guys, we can build a team around that individual."

Isle Issues Show Yule Plants

The little island of Guernsey has issued a quartet of multi-colored stamps depicting some plant life used to decorate homes at Christmas. The two high values have the holly and mistletoe. These are familiar enough, but the 5 pence and the 7 pence show the Jerusalem cherry and the Christmas rose which are not so well known in this area.



The "cherry" itself, scarlet or orange-red in color, is an invasion to disperse if swallowed. The plant is said to be beautiful, though, with fruits a half inch in diameter that last and last. It is a member of the solanum family that also gives us the potato, eggplant and melon pear.

Here they nurture some 16 million tomato plants and 46 million irises plus roses (real), freesia, mums and whatever for overseas shipment. They make the most of their space with tomatoes trained to grow on overhead arbors. The total length of the greenhouses comes to 320 miles. Guernsey started with its own postal administration in 1969, and through Feb. 7, 1978, Scott's Catalogue lists 160 mailing stamps and 27 postage dues. There is a scattering of costly ones from that first year, but ignoring those, the Guernsey issues are attractive and will continue to put out the American Air Mail Catalogue and oc-
