said his firm felt despite Munson's decision that "a merger with UTC would violate federal anti-trust laws and that Carrier would suffer" if the deal went through, then was broken up by the courts.

The Justice Department, despite not getting the injunction, likely will go ahead with a suit against the deal in hopes of having it declared illegal,

The government and Carrier had argued at hearings that a UTC takeover would make a company so powerful - the 22nd largest U.S. cor-

UTC has subsidiaries that make it a "significant developer" of control devices similar to ones Carrier

The complaint said that in 1977, Carrier accounted for about one-fifth of the residential single-unit heaters and air conditioner sales and 32 percent of the commercial systems sold in the United States and had sales totaling \$316 million.

The suit said United Technologies sold about \$4.5 million in heating and air conditioning control devices to Carrier in 1977.

According to the suit, Carrier buys about \$71.5 million worth of electric motors used in appliances and other devices

United Technologies, a highly diversified firm which owns Pratt & Whitney Aircraft and Otis Elevator Co., has been aggressive recently in seeking acquisitions. The company

#### Moonlighting Rules Weiss Suggests

MANCHEESTER - Town Manager Robert Weiss has proposed a policy that would grant him the discretion to decide whether department heads should be permitted to take another job.

He would permit such outside work as long as it does not interfere with the department head's responsibilities to the town.

"It should be remembered that

department heads do not have a specific work week of limited hours and most of them work a considerable number of hours of overtime in the performance of their Weiss wrote to the Town Board of Directors.

The board had asked the manager to propose a policy after a recent incident with Mel Siebold, the town's recreation director.

Siebold, asked the manager about taking a swim coach job at Manchester High School.

Weiss, after finding out that no board members had objections, granted permission for Siebold to take the job.

Later, however, the town's Advisory Recreation and Park Commission opposed Siebold's taking the part-time coaching post. A couple of board members also raised some questions about the arrangement after the commission's objections were made public.

Siebold then decided not to take the job, and the board asked Weiss for a

"Really, I think it's performance that counts," Penny said. If the department head can accomplish his or her duties and handle another job



HARTFORD (UPI) - A task force seeking methods to prevent and con-tain oil spills in Connecticut has recommended state environmenta officials oversee mandatory training for all persons who handle petroleum and other chemicals.

The Oil Spill Task Force's draft

aired Thursday included a proposal making the state Department of Enronmental Protection responsible or seeing that the employees of suppliers and oil cooperatives are adequately trained for emergency

The mandatory training would be required for all personnel at receiving terminals and storage areas where oil and hazardous substances are regularly delivered or

shipped.

The task force was created by the 1978 Legislature to improve ways to deal with oil spills on Connecticut waterways and along Long Island

DEP statistics showed oil and chemical spills in Connecticut over the last three years have increased to an average of 575 per year, with a total spillage amounting to more than 750,000 gallons, most of it inland on state rivers.

The panel also recommended that DEP set standards for conducting oil spill drills that will be carried out at east once every six months. The DEP would also coordinate

training of state and local police and fire officials and other state agencies in combatting spills.

The panel advised a closer liaison with the Coast Guard to set up agreements and establish authority for using shared equipment tha would save time in setting up containment procedures in the event of a

In addition, the task force recommended approval of a revolving fund that would enable the DEP to promptly contact companies for cleanup and removal of spills "in cases where the responsible party is either unwilling or unable to provide proper services; does not act responsibly or is unknown."

Herald Reporter VERNON - Town Planner George Russell thinks the ideal location for the fire station to replace Co. 2 would be at Rollingview Drive and Tunnel Road. But Russell told the Fire Study Committee Thursday night that the land is in the care of Munroe Moses who he eels might not want to sell it for a fire station. Russell recommended that a two-bay station be built

although the town doesn't have to fill it with apparatus right away. The study group agreed. Mrs. Jane Lamb, committee chairman, asked Russell if he had seen any other area that might be used for the

The Town Council, after a public hearing to discuss the proposed new station, agreed to ask the committee to make plans for building it south of Interstate 86. This is the area of the Lake Street School which has experienced considerable residential growth over the past few years.

Russell said the land around the school is owned by ohn Chessari and he has applied to the Conservation Commission for a subdivision. Russell said he doesn't think it will be granted because of water problems. He said another area considered was Birch Road where the town owns land. He said this wouldn't be good pecause there would be a serious problem maneuvering

The existing Co. 2 firehouse on Route 30 is small and inadequate. The 1975 Fire Study Committee recommended that it be replaced before completion of the highway

Opera Booms With Subsidy

LONDON (UPI) - Queen Victoria loved opera but always came late which meant the singers had to stop in full flight while the orchestra played "God Save the Queen." Faced with the choice of arriving on time or dis-rupting a performance, Her Majesty took the easy way out — she gave the Royal Opera House in Covent Garden a dispensation against having to play the national anthem when she appeared.

While she was at it the queen complained that the extras sent on to fill up the stage as pilgrims, prisoners or whatever in Beethoven's Fidelio and other crowd scene operas were so slovenly they ought to be replaced by, say, her own well-drilled soldiery. Ever since then soldiers of the London barracks have been drafted for whatever human background the opera libretto required. No one thinks this odd, possibly because it would take a lot to bemuse devotees of an art form which demands \$20

stirring aria by Mozart. If the music is glorious enough, and in grand opera it often is, anything seems possible except, of course, making a profit.

An opera house that can balance the ledgers is so rare, tears spring to the eyes of impresarios when they talk of the 1877 season in Covent Garden which wound up in the

In these artistically enlightened days no one really expects the great national opera theaters to cover their enormous costs, even with seats at the highest average prices in show business. They can provide the greatest singers, support symphony-sized orchestras and corps de ballet, and maintain the lush palaces which are their homes only with the aid of subsidies running into the millions of dollars. In Russia, Germany, France and Austria these sums

are provided gladly. Vienna has a permanent staff of 1,-000 people and blithely winds up the season some \$25 million in the red. But its performances are the glory and the pride of the nation - as well as a chance for Viennese society to preen in public.



Questions concerning what a cult is, why people join cults, are these cults good or bad, what is their purpose. and can they be harmful. The questions led The Rev. John Holliger, vicar of St. George's Episcopal Church in Bolton, to deliver a sermon

about cults to his parishoners this past Sunday. His own personal reaction to the tragedy is, "It was a horrendous tragedy, I felt threatened and fearful and shocked that one of the cults in our country would commit such an act of violence against itself."

Father Holliger said he doesn't think there are cult

groups in Connecticut, in Hartford, at Manchester Community College or at the University of Connecticut, that would end their lives with a mass suicide but, he said, "there are cults which are actively seeking out collegeage people and young families, to join them.' He said the Moonies, Hari Krishna, Divine Light and other less well-known cults are actively recruiting young people in this area.

Says Cults Dangerous

And the cults are dangerous, in his opinion. He said they set themselves up as good and holy an claim all else is evil. He said they obtain mind control of the young people using brainwashing techniques and sometimes hyp-

He said the different groups demand total obedience to the authoritative figure and the young people lose their ability to make decisions for themselves. When asked why other religious leaders aren't speaking out about cults, The Rev. Holliger said, "They

don't take it to be the serious problem that it is." He said an in-depth study of the situation which substantiates the dangers and reality of the cult groups was done by the United Methodist Church. He said other church leaders have not had the study made available to em and some of those who have do not take it seriously they think cults will die as a fad.
