That's Entertainment Theater Ceremony Significant Event

Seventy-eight-year-old Helen Hayes was in Provincetown, Mass., on her first visit to the other weekend. The trip was both sentimental and significant. A First Lady of the American Theater was on Cape Cod, off-season, if you please, to participate in a very auspicious occasion — a ceremony announcing designation of a Rhode Island architect to design the new Provincetown Playhouse on the Wharf and the Eugene O'Neill Archival Center.

The internationally-known architect, I.M. Pei, was there to make the formal announcement of William Warner of Exeter, R.I., topping a design competition said to be unique and unprecedented in American architecture.

The \$1,000,000 project will go on the site of the old playhouse destroyed by fire last year, a summer 1980 completion is targeted.

What's so important about a new theater project in Cape Cod climes? Eugene O'Neill, who spent his childhood in Connecticut's New London (chums included Arthur B. McPinney, later to become sports editor of The Hartford Times), had his first play — "Bound East for Cardiff" — staged at the old Provincetown Playhouse six decades ago. The O'Neill work sparked an era of mous change, challenge, in American theater.

Helen Hayes, talking there in Provincetown the other weekend, remembered how she felt at age 17, watching the Provincetown Players perform O'Neill's works in New York in the winter of 1917.

"I was very young and needed all the inspiration I could get," she remembered. "My mother, by scripping on our survival budget, managed to buy season tickets and that year I saw the birth of O'Neill's plays. It was a pure and exciting art form and had a lasting and, I hope, good effect on my life."

She also told the Provincetown Universalist Church gathering attended by 500 theater-minded folks: "I have never been here before but I have a sense of homecoming. I have walked your beaches, smelled your air, seen the sea. It is a renewal and I wish now I had my life to live again."

And a newspaper photographer, coming away from such a touching setting, can only remind himself, and his readers, that the dedication that churched out the lasting works of a Eugene O'Neill, provided the impetus for the Helen Hayes acting career, one of the most distinguished in this country, can only be said to be very much part and parcel of the dedication that is American theater.

Provincetown stage, in-the-round staging, whatever, the American acting community through generations has provided the American public with some of its most memorable entertainment.

Only a writer can understand the loneliness of creativity, and only a performer can comprehend the longing to do better. The two elements have given American theater its incentive, its very incisiveness.

Come the summer of 1980 and opening of a spanking new theater in a storied setting, perhaps, just perhaps, the audience will once in awhile will contain a determined young writer, novice, and a determined young performer, untried, to be sure, but determined, and perhaps, just perhaps, emerging from a play, these young folks will have found the will to succeed, the need to fulfill their dreams, their hopes, their aspirations.

What is being developed in Provincetown, Mass., out on the tip of Cape Cod, augers well for the future of American theater. Augers well indeed!

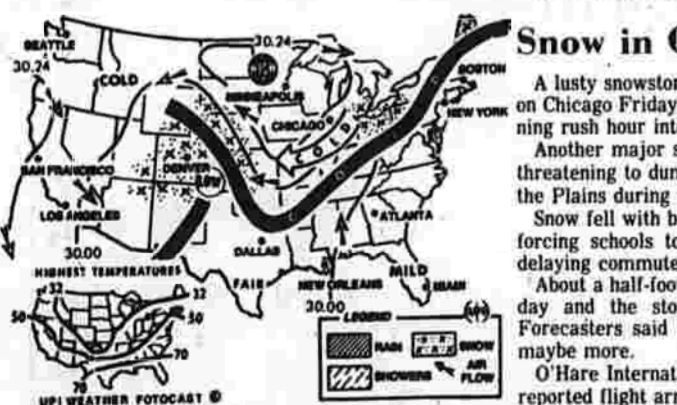

Snow in Chicago

A lusty snowstorm dumped nearly a half foot of snow on Chicago Friday, closing schools and turning the morning rush hour into a giant game of bumper-cars.

Another major storm was brewing over the Rockies, threatening to dump deep snows from the mountains to the Plains during the weekend.

Snow fell with blinding speed across northern Illinois, forcing schools to shut down, clogging highways and delaying commuters and air travelers.

About a half-foot piled up in the Chicago area by mid-day and the storm showed no sign of letting up.

Forecasters said they expected another four inches — maybe more.

O'Hare International Airport — the world's busiest — reported flight arrivals and departures were delayed by as much as 1 1/2 hours.

Snow fell so fast that salt spread on the roads by highway crews to melt the snow was diluted and rendered useless.

A car skidded off a slush-slicked road in Chicago's north suburban Skokie and struck a utility light, knocking out power to 800 customers. A car and school bus collided on a slippery road near the north central Illinois community of Sterling but no injuries were reported.

Some lanes in the Chicago area expressway system were reported impassible and many roads across northern Illinois were slippery and hazardous.

For dozens of schools in the Chicago area, it was the first winter holiday of the season. One school in northwestern Illinois Whiteside County also closed.

CBing gets a rough ride abroad

It is easy to overlook the freedoms allowed CBers in the United States. Probably only Canada and Australia are comparable to the United States. Both, it would appear, follow the patterns established by the FCC fairly closely. They also have similar problems to those faced by users of citizens band radio here. Several reasons have written about rumors that Canada and Australia were going to 900 megahertz from the 27 megs where all three countries presently permit CB operations. The Canadian Department of Communications has not formally considered it, according to Paul Coutts, a licensing staffer in Ottawa. "We generally follow the lead of your country," he explains. "We went to 40 channels from 23 on Jan. 1, 1978, as you did, and we established more rigid specifications for manufacturers to cut down on interference which plagues us, as it does you." Bryan Peck, of the Australian Embassy in Washington, D.C., isn't aware that there were any formal plans for moving CB to another location on the spectrum.

The CB going is rough, however, around the rest of the world. Fritz Donat, a member of the German Embassy staff, and an ardent CBer himself, reports that Europe has societal and cultural differences to cope with. These are compounded by the closeness of the countries in a comparatively small land space. "We use 500 millivolts instead of 4 watts for our transmitters in Germany," he explains. "We seemed to designated officially." Donat, known as the "Globetrotter," says that CB hasn't yet been banned in his native country but adds "it is quite possible for political reasons, particularly in view of the terrorists operating in so many adjoining countries, and even in Germany." Monitoring is almost impossible, advises Donat, since there are no speed limits on the autobahns and so many languages and dialects are spoken within

small distances. This could also contribute to either a lack of interest or outlawing of two-way radio, in his opinion. Holland has officially banned CB. This upsets German tourists because their sets are sealed or confiscated at the border. "When I travel to the United States I just use my Canadian license," counters Coutts. "I've never had a problem. That's freedom." (NEWSPAPER ENTERPRISE ASSN.)
