### Top Court To Review Sex Disparity in Welfare Aid

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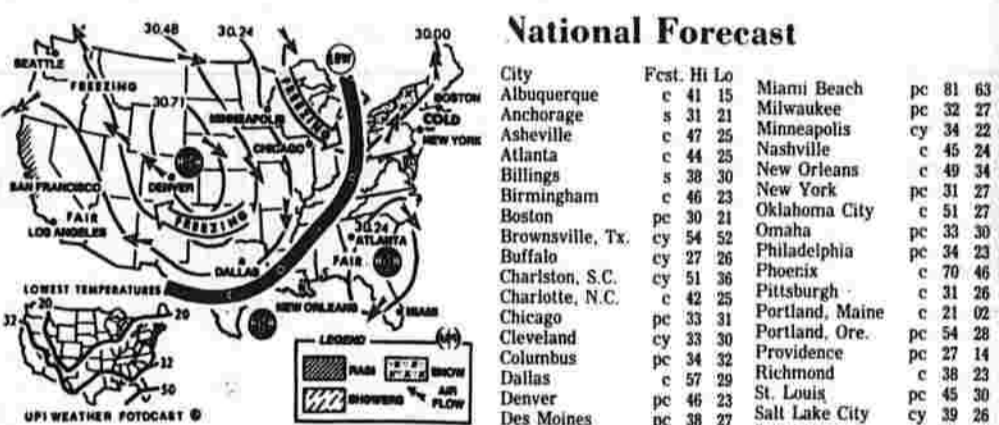

## Coventry Council Votes Funds for Beach Improvements

COVENTRY — Swimmers at Lisicke Beach will not be facing the hazard of sharp rocks in the shallow bathing area that they have braved in recent years. The Town Council has voted to appropriate \$500 for rock removal and sand based on estimates obtained by Town Manager Frank Connolly.

The Parks and Recreation Commission had made requests to two previous councils to look into the rock problem after numerous children, adults, and lifeguards were cut or bruised at the town's major beach.

A local woman who went wading at Lisicke last summer to investigate the rock complaints received a bad gash on her ankle and told the council she would not allow her children to swim there until the rocks had been removed.

The Mothers Club, which offers a swimming lesson program each summer at Lisicke, also asked for action. Last June the town manager attempted to explore the shallow bottom in a row boat, which caught on a jutting rock and plunged him fully dressed into the water.

Recreation Director Lionel Jean Jr. told the council that there are at least 200 large rocks in the roped off swimming area. The Upton Construction Company of Coventry has estimated that it would cost about \$250 to remove the rocks and suggested that new sand be added at \$30 per load.

Ernest Wheeler, the town's zoning agent, said the lake level could be lowered by opening a controlling dam. This would facilitate the rock removal. The lake is presently at 90 feet and is usually raised another three feet in the summer-time for recreational purposes.

In other business the council appointed Paul Jatkowski to the Salvation Army Land Purchase Study Committee. He will replace Anthony D'Amrosio, a former member of the Parks and Recreation Commission, who declined reappointment.

The study group has advised the council to renegotiate the purchase of about 76 acres of Army-

owned land on the southern end of Coventry Lake. Last spring voters rejected a council proposal to post \$425,000 in bonds to buy and develop the property. At that time the Army was asking \$375,000 for the land, which includes 16 beachfront acres.

The study committee is headed by Daniel Manley, who is also the town's representative to the Windham Regional Planning Agency, and has seven members. The group has asked the council to expand its membership to eleven members.

Harris has been a volunteer for many years at the Coventry Thrift Shop, whose proceeds go to the Public Nursing Association.



HARTFORD (UPI) — The state Supreme Court has ruled the sanctity of private property governs the discovery of a 20-pound fragment from a statue of King George III of England — toppled by patriots in 1776, then stashed in a Connecticut swamp by Tories.

The high court Monday ruled the 15-inch square gilded lead piece belonged to the owner of the Davis Swamp in Wilton, not the excavator who pulled it from the bog Oct. 16, 1972.

Louis Miller, who found the fragment using a metal detector, sold it to the Museum of the City of New York for \$5,000. But, the court ruled the artifact rightly belonged to swamp owner Fred Favorite.

The jurists ruled Miller's discovery was not as "selfless" as he claimed, noting he profited from the fragment's sale and used the discovery to boost his metal detector business through advertising.

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## High Court Says Statue Belongs to Swamp Owner

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The equine statue originally stood in Bowling Green Park in lower Manhattan. A band of happy patriots hacked it apart on July 9, 1776 after hearing the news of the Declaration of Independence.

The shattered fragments were ferried across Long Island Sound and loaded onto wagons in Norwalk, to be transported 50 miles north to Oliver Wolcott's foundry in Litchfield. The fragments were to be cast into bullets.

But, the patriots decided to celebrate America's independence en route with some spirits. While they loasted freedom in Wilton, loyalist Tories stole pieces of the statue and scattered them in the Davis Swamp.

Six years ago, Miller discovered one fragment with his metal detector buried 10 inches deep in the swampy area. The high court ruled Miller entered the property and took the fragment without selling Favorite, although a local historian had told him to do so.

The jurists, upholding the earlier decision of the Fairfield County Superior Court, concluded Miller's excavation was not as "selfless" as he claimed, and not entirely an effort "to guide man for the betterment of these islands."

"The defendant admitted that he was in the business of selling metal detectors and that he has used his success in finding the statue as advertising to boost his sales of such metal detectors," the court said.

"Further, there is the fact that he signed a contract with the City Museum of New York for the sale of the statutory piece and that he stands to profit thereby," the court found.

"... even if we assume his motive to be that of historical research alone, that fact will not justify his entering upon the property of another without permission," the court said.
