## That's Entertainment A Musical Reprise?

In light of the enormous audience turnout for such recent, large-scale musicals as "Grease" and "The Wiz," the question has been sounded on the long-range merits of a massive reprise of the once-flourishing Hollywood musical, a la the Mickey Rooney-Judy Garland ("Hey, gang, let's do a show!") motif, a la the super-duper Alice Faye-Betty Grable ("Hi, everybody, hi!") concept, and the tap-lap-leap, bow-wow-bow Bushby Berkeley Warner Bros. super-spectacles amid military settings, Broadway what-have-you.

Proponents argue, with considerable justification, that if a John Travolta, a Richard Pryor, an Olivia Newton-John, a Diana Ross can spark big crowds, why they ask for the kind of entertainment that truly entertained all those years ago?

The trouble Mr. Mrs. Ms. Proponent is that both the Hollywood and the public of 20, 30, 40 years ago can be said to have changed. For the better, cry many. For the worst, lament still others. It must be emphasized, straightforwardly, amid the resounding rhetoric, that the movie audience, once broad-based (i.e., the age bracket spanned young to old), is now concentrated on the young — to a degree Hollywood and the public would never have envisioned 20, 30, 40 years ago — and, hence, like it or

not, there's new determination to be considered. For one thing, there's an erratic movie-going thinking habit. Where once folks in Manchester, Memphis and Minneapolis figured on one "special" day a week to see a movie, it's now a matter of both personal choice (i.e., a Travolta movie will bring out people, despite snow, ice, what-have-you) and, well, impulse (word-of-mouth still have a great impact on movie-going).  
There's one obvious problem here, of course: Travolta's not about to work 52 weeks a year in movie musicals. There's his "Welcome Back, Kotter" continuing ABC series, there are non-musical screen roles. And how many superstars like Travolta, Pryor, are there?

Significantly, the turnout for "Saturday Night Fever" and "Grease" proved, emphatically, that there is a great movie audience out there, provided the entertainment is on the screen.  
The formula, the "B" movie that once prevailed to excess many years ago can no longer be found. In its place is a more sophisticated product. And watching this more sophisticated product is an audience that's literally grown up with television — television with, sadly enough, a lot of the formula, "B" movie that once comprised a Hollywood staple. A study in paradox indeed.

If there's to be a musical reprise — and cost alone would seem to indicate a continuing pattern of investment — far between, a la "Grease," at best — it's going to take more than Travolta, more than Pryor, more than Newton-John, more than Ross, to trigger a turnaround.  
These are in their specialized creativeness, gifted people. It takes more than two musical hits to develop a cycle. And more than a few superstars.  
Like the once-popular "Rowdy Boys," "Jones Family," "Blondie," "Andy Hardy" (no, Ms. Proponent, not related to the Hardy Boys of ABC-TV), the Hollywood musical enjoyed excellent response a generation ago. The plots were simplistic. The music, depending on the talent, was predictable.  
Along came television. The screen "series" vanished. So, too, did the musical motif. Not because the creative talent wasn't there. Rather, because audience tastes had changed. Changed drastically.  
The variety shows on the home screen created a vast new audience. But even Carol Burnett couldn't swim against the tide; her variety show finally bowed out. And Mary Tyler Moore couldn't even get started adequately with a like-minded project.  
The Hollywood musical will appear sporadically at best. So, too, will similar format on television. Audience taste — reflected at the boxoffice, movie theaters, in the Nielsen, television — still reflects public wants, and want-nots.

Beirut's Troubles Still Linger

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) - Beirut in 1979 is Fellini gone mad, a grotesque mixture of luxury and destruction, horror and sunshine.

There's a Kachalnikov, a Russian-made machinegun, in nearly every home. Holidays are celebrated by so much shooting in the air it isn't safe to sit on upper-floor balconies anywhere in town.

When the "security situation" is bad, it isn't safe to travel by car from the predominantly Moslem West to the Christian eastern sectors of town.

When the "security situation" is bad, teen-aged Christian militiamen in outlandish hats, fatigues, T-shirts and boots trade rocket-propelled grenades and machinegun fire with Syrian soldiers.

When the "security situation" is bad, the tragedy is that the sectarian balance in Lebanon is so delicate that there is nothing to prevent a similar situation developing two generations hence.

When the "security situation" is good, cars thro in measured rhythm from the most recent round of fighting.

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Resilient as ants, after every round the Lebanese emerge from their shelters and start replacing broken glass and plastering shell-pocked walls. Nobody is putting any real money into capital investment, though - not until the "security situation" has improved for good.

Navy, Environment Becoming Foes

WASHINGTON - "Damn the torpedoes, full speed ahead!" is one of the Navy's most famous slogans. But in the Navy's continuing search for energy sources, admirals of less than David Farragut stature are operating on the slogan, "Damn the environment and the expense, full speed ahead!"

This, at any rate, is the conclusion to be drawn from the mismanagement of the Navy's attempt to tap geothermal energy from lava underground deposits of molten lava in the Mojave Desert. The admirals have sunk millions of dollars into re-drilling projects with only questionable results so far.

The shenanigans being in the Navy learned that its China Lake Naval Weapons Center sits on what may be the largest deposit of close-to-the-surface lava in North America. Usually the sizzling liquid is deep in the earth's core, but in rare cases it can be found within several thousand feet of the surface.

If the deposit can be tapped for the energy generated by the intense underground heat, the Navy figures it could provide power for all the naval installations on the West Coast. Births, marriages and deaths become a tortured ritual of long-distance calls to relatives overseas. It is torture because half the time international operators aren't at work or aren't answering, and the other half they tell you the lines are out of order.

To get anything done at all in Beirut, you need "wasta" (influence) - a girlfriend in the telephone exchange, a friend in a government office, a nurse at the hospital, a "sacred heart" church, Route 3, if you don't have wasta, chances are you're not Lebanese.

The political situation defies description. Not even the Lebanese themselves pretend to know what is going on. For them, their country is in the grip of a massive conspiracy, the victim of the superpowers and various nefarious intelligence services.

When the "security situation" is bad, the tragedy is that the sectarian balance in Lebanon is so delicate that there is nothing to prevent a similar situation developing two generations hence, when no one alive remembers how horrible it was. It happened in 1860, it can happen again in 2060.

### Dancing for Joy

**Convalescent Home Patients Give Recital**  
It was toe-beet, toe-bee, down up, down up 'E to the strains of Chopin's "Les Sylphides."

It was a ballet exercise, but the dancers were not at the customary ballet exercise barre.

Some of the dancers could move only one arm, or one leg. Others moved with jerking gestures. Some were in wheel chairs, all were mentally and/or physically handicapped.

This is the group of patients at the Meadows Convalescent Home in Manchester who, since October, have been dancing for joy.

Wearing a bright colored plaid leotard, Rodell Solomon is the therapeutic recreation director who has introduced a whole new concept of dance therapy that lets the patients express themselves in joy, sorrow and anger. Ms. Solomon had

conducted a similar program in New Haven before coming to The Meadows.

A former music student, she is familiar with the types of music that will stimulate various emotional responses. She tapes the music she wants to use for her classes.

Recently, the patients' dance class held its first informal recital for friends and families. For the first time, these handicapped men and

women of various ages performed ballet, modern and creative dancing to classical and popular music.

First, Ms. Solomon led the group in an exercise routine.

"Why do we have exercises," she asked the group. Several replied, "To make us strong."

The group sits on the floor and stretches out their legs, tries to touch their noses to their knees, first right and then left. They stand and bend

their bodies, and do a squatting exercise which the students recognize as a ballet exercise called the "arms out, pronounced pleysey."

Then, "Why do we hold our arms out," Ms. Solomon asks as she extends her arms out at her sides.

"For balance," is the uniform response. Then to a flowing waltz melody, the group moves their arms in patterns; first, the ballet wave (bird), ballet ripple (butterfly), and arms over head, like a tent.

The combination of exercise and balance is necessary before one can dance for fun. Ms. Solomon tells her group two or three times a week.

The group was probably most successful in its performance to "The Rhinestone Cowboy," with even an occasional "bump," and all joining in singing the title phrase when it was repeated.

The most fun, and also the most meaningful part of the dance therapy program is the ability the patients are developing in expressing their feelings by body movement to music.

"Sometimes it's hard to say our feelings," Ms. Solomon says. "Dance is body language."

She demonstrated by showing her feelings of being without her pet dog this past Christmas. Through dance, she reminisced the happy times she recalled petting and playing with her dog. Then, in slower movements, she brushed a tear from her eyes, and the ended in a bowed, thoughtful attitude.

"Which one of you has felt sad about something, or angry," she asked as she invited the members to come forward and express their feelings.

A man had an arm that hurt, and he related his feelings through movements to music. Another felt sad about one particular patient's

crippled legs, and one was sad because she hasn't seen her family in three years. One woman showed feelings of anger to the music from "Star Wars."

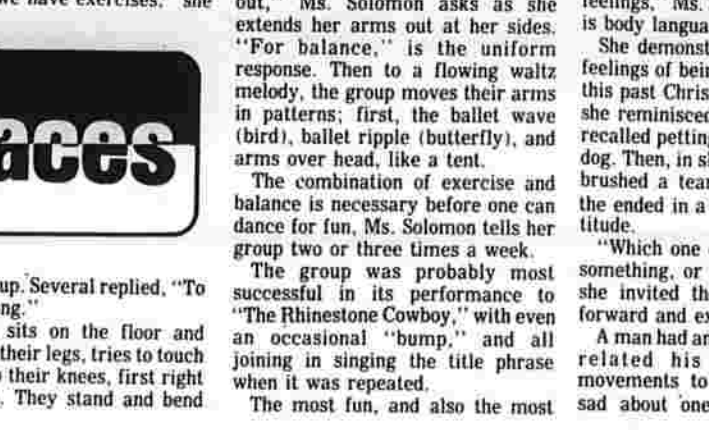
Ms. Solomon would like to include her class in a "Very Special People" that's held annually in the spring at the Paul Mellon Arts Center at the Choate School in Wallingford.

The ultimate thrill of the Meadows patients' first dance performance program was the awarding of certificates, with each individual's name, declaring they had completed the first phase of the Meadows dance therapy program.

"Everyone has a disability; some show more than others," Ms. Solomon said as she summed up her philosophy of sharing dance experiences with her student patients.

## Comic Book Collectors Are Fussy

**Collectors' Corner**

Captain Marvel first appeared as one of several features in WHIZ COMICS of February 1940. He went over so big that he had his own 64-page book by the end of that year.

The "Adventures" shown here, which came out in September of 1943 was loaned by Sam's Paperback Books and Comics of 39 Purnell Place in this town. It is priced at \$5, but in pristine condition might go for \$30 to \$40.

Comic book collectors are just as fussy as coin or stamp people and so there are all manner of prices according to the shape of the material. One writer warns never to repair a book - no tape, no ironing of covers, and don't even replace a rusty staple.

The 1946 WHIZ COMICS with the first Captain Marvel's said to be worth nearly \$3,000. The captain was eventually put out of business by a lawsuit brought by the publishers of SUPERMAN, claiming infringement.

Sam has thousands of comics and paperbacks and invites us to trade 2 for 1 for the everyday material. The scarce items, the collectibles, now have themselves a special set-up in the basement. It is worth the trip just to see the stairwell that was decorated by youthful artists in a recent burst of creativity.

The valuations for collectible comics can be found in a surprisingly thick "Comic Book Price Guide" (No. 6, \$7.95). No. 1 (1983), is \$35 to \$50. TOMB OF DUCK (1944) is only \$5 to \$15. "X-MAN" No. 1 (1963), is \$20 to \$25, while a more recent mausoleum-oriented publication, TOMB OF DRACULA (1972), is only \$1.35 to \$4.00.

An invested-minded writer, claiming that comics are just as good as stamps or coins, warns us, however, to avoid the westerns, love stories, kids' funny books

and war stories - "no demand for these," where they offer used clothing and shoes, which he supposed to be the FAMOUS FUNNIES of 1934. Later came DETECTIVE COMICS in 1937 and BATMAN in 1939. The first SUPERMAN was in the September, 1938 issue of CTION COMICS. If you have this, don't let it go for less than \$1,000.

Anyone who goes into comics will attend conventions and shows, hunt the stores, check out garage sales, and read whatever he can find written on the subject. One especially good handbook to get would be Jules Pfeiffer's "Great Comic Book Heroes."

Sam has recently taken in a batch of 1,500 MARVEL comic books, the place is swimming with them and some good deals are in the air.

The Purnell Place area is just great for a browsing trip anyway. Besides Sam's, there is the Rummage Corner, Yale Typewriter (now having a sale of recon-

ditioned portables), and the Penny Saver, where they offer used clothing and shoes, household bric-a-brac, toys and ornaments. The Manchester Memorial Hospital Auxiliary operates this and last year they earned \$45,000 for the cause, besides giving many citizens a chance to get an IRS deduction for material donated.

Increased Information Wanted on Food Labels

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The government's latest review of food labeling rules indicates consumers want more complete information on certain health-related aspects of their food.

The three agencies also said, "The change most often asked by consumers is mandatory ingredient labeling for all foods. Currently, the government cannot require ingredients to be listed for products that have a standard recipe approved by the government. But some manufacturers do so voluntarily."

"Some form of mandatory open dating was strongly supported for all foods with the possible exception of fresh produce. There was no consensus on the kind of date that should be required."

While consumers support the need for food fortification, "There seems to be a divergence of opinion about which foods should be fortified and at what levels."

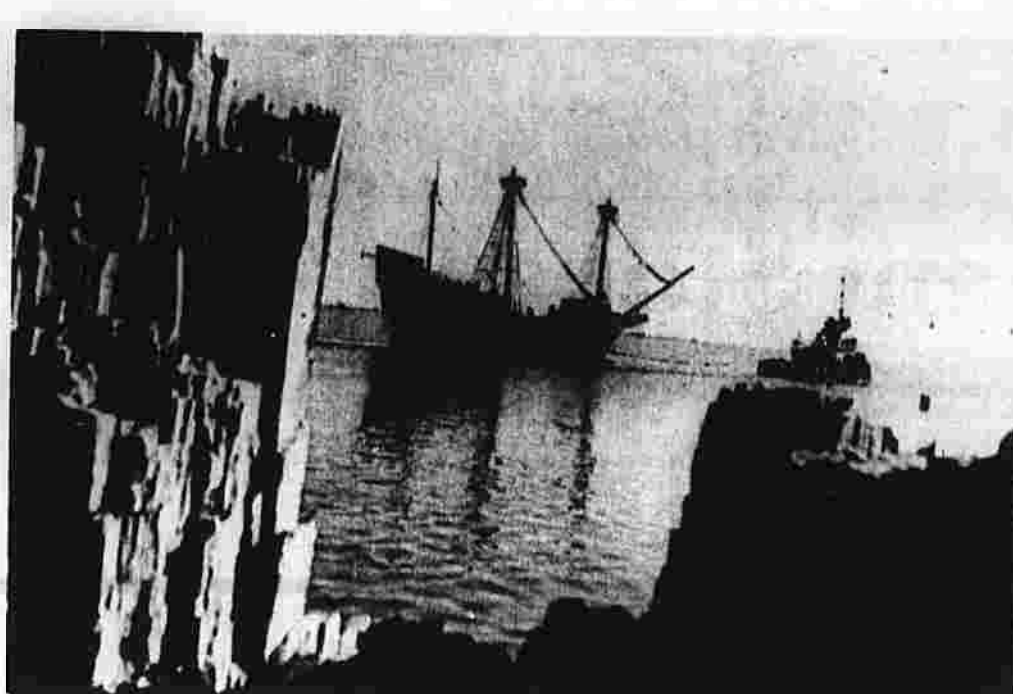

## "Thanks, Steve"

Fifteen-year-old Steven Wilson of Manchester happened to be in the right place at the right time. He was watching airplanes land and take off near the end of a runway at Bradley International Airport in Windsor Locks last September 20.

Suddenly, a plane seemed to come in too low. As he hit treetops and sliced through a power line. He saw a flash of light and heard a crash.

Bystanders boosted Steve over the six-foot, barbed-wire security fence that separated him from the crash area and, with Scott Black of Chicopee, Massachusetts, a passing truck driver, he hauled the plane's two occupants from the battered cockpit. Fuel was leaking from the plane. An explosion could have come at any moment.

The pilot, Thomas Skoran, an engineer at Pratt & Whitney Aircraft Group, was fatally injured in the crash and the other occupant, George Slossberg, was seriously injured. Slossberg, who is recovering, might not have lived if it hadn't been for Steve's quick action.

It saddens us that one of our employees lost his life in the crash. We are grateful, though, that Steven, who happens to be the son of another Pratt & Whitney employee, Thomas Wilson, was decisive and brave enough to help save a life.

The Slossbergs, residents of Manchester like the Wilsons, are grateful for Steven's action. "It's a miracle that my husband continues to show signs of pulling through," said Mrs. Slossberg, "and Steve deserves much of the credit. We want the public to be aware of the fine young people in their community. Thanks, Steve."

Steve, who lacks the use of one eye because of a childhood injury that developed into glaucoma, will be the beneficiary of a fund established by Slossberg in memory of Skoran. A sophomore at Manchester High School, Steve may face future eye operations.

### Colorado Payroll Listed Fairbanks

BOSTON (UPI) - New England Patriots coach Chuck Fairbanks today admitted in federal court he worked on the University of Colorado football program while at the same time preparing the Patriots for the National Football League playoffs and a potential berth in the Super Bowl.

Fairbanks told U.S. District Court Judge A. David Mazzone he worked from Dec. 13 to Jan. 3 interviewing up to 50 prospective candidates for assistant coaches and that he talked to various players recruited for the college team.

Fairbanks also admitted he told Colorado officials it was his "intention and desire to accept the coaching job."

Fairbanks, who coached the Patriots for six years and rebuilt the program from top to bottom, told Patriots owner Billy Sullivan last Dec. 18 that he intended to take the college job.

Sullivan immediately suspended Fairbanks, but the coach was reinstated two days later with the understanding he would concentrate on the playoffs and not the Colorado job.

The Patriots have filed suit against the University of Colorado and five other defendants charging them with conspiring to lure Fairbanks into a breach of contract situation with the Patriots. Colorado officials this week responded with a countersuit saying Fairbanks should be allowed to leave pro football whenever he wants.

The Patriots lost a 31-14 American Football Conference playoff game against the Houston Oilers on New Year's Eve - dashing their hopes to become the first Patriots team to make the Super Bowl.

Fairbanks also testified he met in mid-December with Colorado booster Jack Vickers. He said the two discussed a salary range of up to \$45,000; an expense account of up to \$10,000; and up to \$90,000 in fees for television, radio and football clinic appearances.

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## Edwardian Miniseries All About Edward

Mobile Showcase, the Wednesday night series of quality TV, has an Edwardian drama to beat "Upstairs Downstairs" and "The Duchess of Duke Street."

After all, "Edward the King," which premieres on Jan. 17, is a life-long account of the monarch for whom the age was named. The 13-part series has been syndicated nationally. Be sure to check your local listings for broadcast time and station.

"Edward the King" is based on the widely-acclaimed biography by Sir Philip Magnus. A full year in the making, this British import won seven awards when it aired on the BBC in England.

The lush costumes and gorgeous sets are no shock. The series was made with total cooperation from the British government - including access to the royal palaces and residents, which were previously off-limits to actors and cameramen.

Buckingham Palace at Windsor, Osborne House, Sandringham and historic sites such as St. George's Chapel, Windsor, and St. Paul's Cathedral are the backdrops for Timothy West, who plays King Edward and Annette Crosbie, who plays his mother, Queen Victoria.

Both West and Crosbie won the British equivalents of Academy Awards for their performances.

The series opens with Queen Victoria learning

that she is pregnant with the child who will eventually succeed her. From Edward's birth in 1841, through his death in 1910, the childhood, romances, achievements and frustrations of England's "playboy king" are historically documented.

Edward's harsh, rigid discipline as a child is put into perspective. His train-

ing for royal duties was strangled by his mother who refused to allow the future king any political responsibilities.

After he's married off to Princess Alexandra of Denmark in a match arranged to unite European royalties, the idle, frustrated Edward's love of gambling, drinking, racing, yachting and beautiful

women grows despite the very real love that develops between him and Alix.

Edward's frequently scandalous lifestyle and extramarital affairs jeopardize the monarchy, but his basic humanity and high spirits endear him to the people he was finally to reign over after waiting 40 years.

Victoria's death made Edward king, but he reigned for less than a decade before his death put an end to a richly colorful life.

Through the 13 hour-long episodes pass internationally-known figures who played vital roles in world history, including Disraeli (Sir John Gielgud), Gladstone, Palmerston, Kaiser Wilhelm II, Winston Churchill, and such immortal theatrical stars as Marie Lloyd and Lillie Langtry.

Timothy West faces the challenge of portraying Edward from the age of 22 to almost 70. Obviously, babies and children had to be cast for the role at varying times during his younger years, and Edward from his late teens to his early 20s is played by a completely unknown actor named Charles Sturridge.

Similarly, two actresses portray Alexandra, the Danish princess who was chosen as Edward's bride. Deborah Grant is seen as Alexandra from the age of 17, and Helen Ryan takes over from age 22 for the remainder of the series.



## FILMETER

A capsule look at cinema

**OLIVER'S STORY (PG)** - Ryan O'Neal, Candice Bergen, Ray Milland. Romantic drama. This glibly written sequel to "Love Story" has a warm performance by Candice Bergen. But the plight of two rich young lovers does not tend to conjure up depth of feeling. A film with not much on its mind. **GRADE: C.** (Miller)

**BRINK'S JOB, THE (PG)** - Peter Falk, Peter Boyle, Gena Rowlands, Warren Oates. Crime. This is the recreation of the famous Boston armored car robbery, but if you want a rip-'em-up, cops-and-robbers film, stay home. Director William Friedkin plays this more for gentle humor and compassion. It works if you want that, but if you like action, this will bore you. **GRADE: B.**

**CALIFORNIA SUITE (PG)** - Jane Fonda, Alan Alda, Maggie Smith, Michael Caine, Walter Matthau. Comedy and drama. Neil Simon's play, like his "Plaza Suite," is a group of stories united only by the fact that they all take place in one hotel - this time, The Beverly Hills Hotel. Director Herb Ross is much more successful with the dramatic stories than with the comedies, which become embarrassing. Fonda and Smith are superb. **GRADE: A** (for the dramas), **C** (for the comedies) and, thus, **B** (overall).

**DEER HUNTER (R)** - Robert DeNiro, John Cazale, John Savage, Meryl Streep, Christopher Walken. Drama. This is a powerful, memorable look at three Pennsylvania steel workers who go off to fight in Vietnam. Director Michael Cimino has created images you may never forget. It is too long and some of it is forced, but it remains a classic film. **GRADE: A.**

**KING OF THE GYPSIES (R)** - Sterling Hayden, Susan Sarandon, Shelley Winters, Judd Hirsch, Brooke Shields, Eric Roberts. Drama. Slick attempt to raid the gypsy underworld for "Godfather" material falls victim to a dull, predictable story and a messy stew of ethnic cliches. No feeling for the milieu or the people. Casting and acting are strikingly poor. **GRADE: C-minus** (Handler)

**LORD OF THE RINGS (PG)** - Animated fantasy. J.R.R. Tolkien's works come to the screen, animated by Ralph Bakshi of "Fritz the Cat" fame. If you are familiar with Tolkien's creations - hobbits, black horsemen and the rest - this could be exciting. But if you're not, it's gibberish. The art work is beautiful, but the story is impossible for aliens to follow. And Caution - animated or not, it is so violent that it's not for kids. **GRADE: B** for Tolkien fans; **D** for the rest of us.

**MOMENT BY MOMENT (R)** - Lily Tomlin, John Travolta. Romance. "Hour By Hour" would be a better title, because this seems endless. It is the old cliché of the rich lady and the young, brash kid. It proceeds at a snail's pace and even the snail is bored. Poorly acted (except by Travolta) and directed. **GRADE: C-minus.**

**MOVIE, MOVIE (G)** - George C. Scott, Trish VanDevere, Red Buttons. Comedy, musical. Double-bill salute-cum-spoof of '30s and '40s fight films and musicals that has it all down pat, right down to the last cliché. You can still get the real thing on the late show, but this is worth a few chuckles and a tap dance down memory lane. **GRADE: B.** (O'Brien)

**SUPERMAN (PG)** - Christopher Reeve, Gene Hackman, Ned Beatty, Jackie Cooper, Margot Kidder, Valerie Perrine, Marlon Brando. Adventure. Big, lavish, expensive - and designed just for fun and frolic. This story of Superman's arrival on Earth and his first anti-crime campaigns starts slowly but closes with a rush. And it is all done tongue-in-cheek, so that the whole family can find something to enjoy in it. It's not art, but it sure is entertainment. **GRADE: B-plus.**

## FCC readies new 900 MHz public band

A new personal radio band in the 900 megahertz range is on the way.

The Federal Communications Commission has told the Bureau of Safety and Special Radio Services to prepare a Notice of Inquiry - an early step toward opening the extra broadcast frequencies for individuals in the early 1980s.

For some time, this column has proposed that all citizen's band radio could be moved to the 900 MHz range. Several expert engineers have predicted the move would have to be made to alleviate present CB crowding.

The new FCC announcement indicates, however, that instead of moving all CB to a different frequency, another public radio service will be created.

"By setting up a new service, but not replacing the existing one, more channels will be available for other uses," explained Ron Stone, a member of the bureau's legal staff.

"When citizen's band radio began its dramatic

growth several years ago, many small businesses and other entities were forced into land mobile systems or other forms of communications," he said. "The development of a new personal radio service in the 900 megahertz range will accommodate these people."

Stone indicated the Notice of Inquiry would probably be sent out about March 1, 1979.

A period of six to eight months is then made available for comments and replies.

Next, a Notice of Proposed Rule Making would be drafted. This document would

govern the development and characteristics of the new public band.

The FCC would provide authorization upon the approval of the PRM.

"The timetable looks at this point like a mid-1981 authorization from the Commissioner, and that the service would be activated about 1982," according to Stone. "This could be altered by as much as three months, one way or another, but I would expect it in full flower by early 1982."

At 900 megahertz, the new personal radio frequencies will create a whole new business for manufacturers and retailers.

The time lag between the authorization and activation is to give the manufacturers time to design their radios for the band, to get them tested and approved, and to fill the pipelines to retailers.

"We don't expect that this new service will reach the 15 million licensee level as quickly as citizen's band radio did, but we do think that eventually it will attain it," said Stone.
