Space Shuttle Ride, Rodeo Highlight Teng's Trip

HOUSTON (UPI) — Chinese Vice Premier Teng Hsiang-ping Friday accepted a set of silver spurs and a pair of cowboy hats as he took simulated rides in the lunar lander and the space shuttle and prepared for "an old, wild West" rodeo.

Teng, who began his United States visit with a diplomatic mission in Washington, flew from Atlanta to Houston to fulfill his expressed desire to learn about the American people and their technology.

After dodging a well-organized demonstration by Taiwanese Chinese at Ellington Air Force Base outside Houston, he quickly lost his somber, expressionless demeanor as he

played with space age toys on a tour of NASA's Lyndon B. Johnson Space Center.

Teng first inspected a Skylab space laboratory, finding out astronauts eat, sleep and go to the bathroom in space. Then he piloted the space shuttle in simulated landings from 100,000 miles and 30,000 miles up.

The Communist vice premier, guided by astronaut Allen Bean who spent two days on the moon and 59 days aboard Skylab, donned caparhones and discarded his usual reserve.

Bean said, "I would ask his excellency to push the (landing gear) button when I point." Teng raised his left thumb toward the button.

But in the simulated flight he was still over the Mojave Desert, far from the landing field, and Bean indicated it was too soon. Teng slowly pulled the throttle back.

Moments later — "over" Las Vegas and Los Angeles — Teng landed.

He and Vice Premier for Space and Technology Fang Yi sat together in a lunar rover, while Teng's wife, Cho Lin, gently thumped the tires.

Teng met pioneer American astronaut John Glenn, now a U.S. senator from Ohio, in front of the Apollo 17 command module.

"He (Glenn) now belongs to the heavenly men," Teng said. "But he is a mortal, he is an immortal."

Glenn, grinning, responded, "My constituents in Ohio call me many things, but that is not one of them."

Late Friday, Teng was scheduled to attend a barbecue-rodeo in suburban Simonton. Saturday he will meet with Southwestern editors and publishers and visit the Hughes Tool Co., which already has sold \$12 million in well-drilling equipment to China, before flying to Seattle, Wash. He leaves for home from Seattle Monday.

"Normally, when folks come down here from the north, or especially when they come from overseas, they expect Texas to be the old, wild West — we try to accommodate," said Luke Van Dries, owner of the Roundup Rodeo.

The reception in Houston — which ironically is the sister city of Taipei, Taiwan — displayed a great mutual interest between the Chinese and the American people. It also showed the division of opinion in the United States on President Carter's decision to switch diplomatic recognition from Taiwan to mainland China. Both of Texas' U.S. senators and many state politicians stayed away from Houston during the visit.

Texas Gov. Bill Clements gave Teng a 3-foot high wicker basket full of toys "for the children of China." Houston Mayor Jim McCom gave Teng a \$240 pair of silver cowboy spurs.

In a short welcoming speech, Clements said:

"We in Texas, as well as the rest of America, have a great curiosity about China and we are glad you are here. We in Texas are renowned for our hospitality and I'm sure that after your visit here you will see that."

Chinese and American demonstrators gathered at the main gate of Ellington to protest the Teng visit and urge shift of U.S. diplomatic recognition from Taiwan.

The main protest was a parade involving 1,000 persons downtown, near the Hyatt Regency Hotel which is the headquarters for the Houston visit.

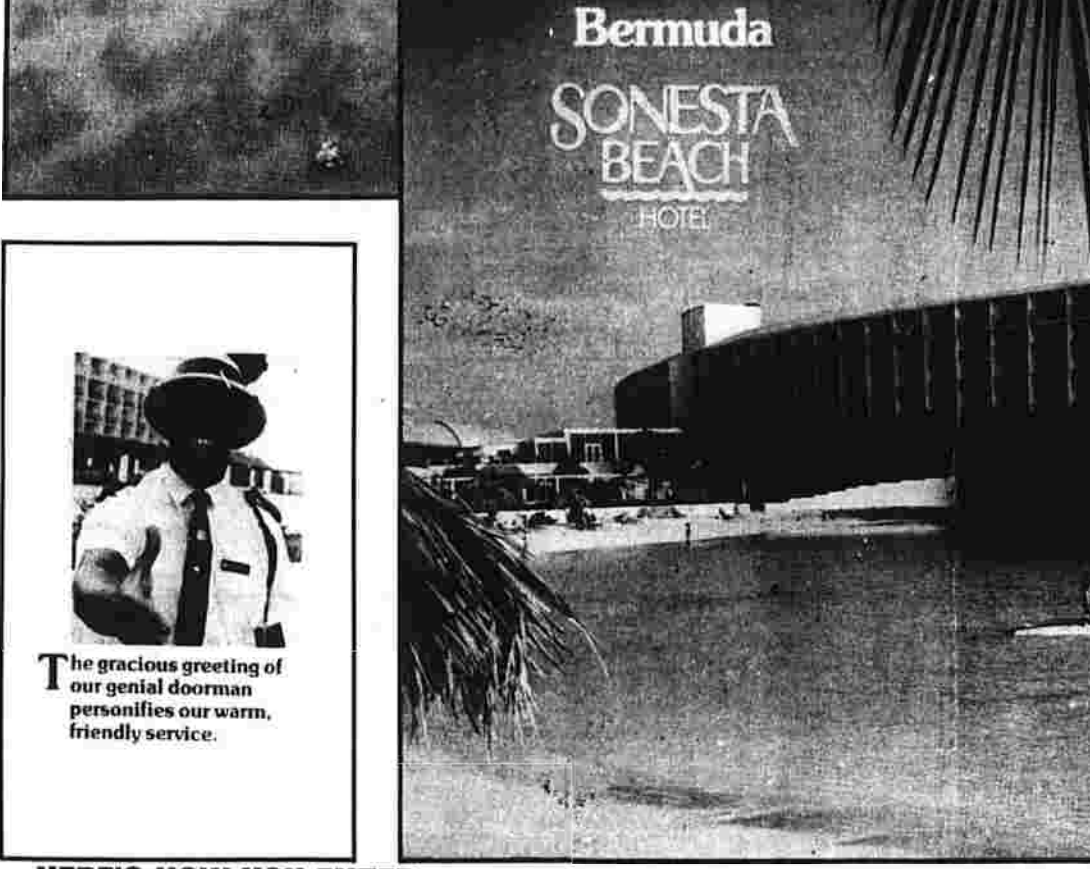
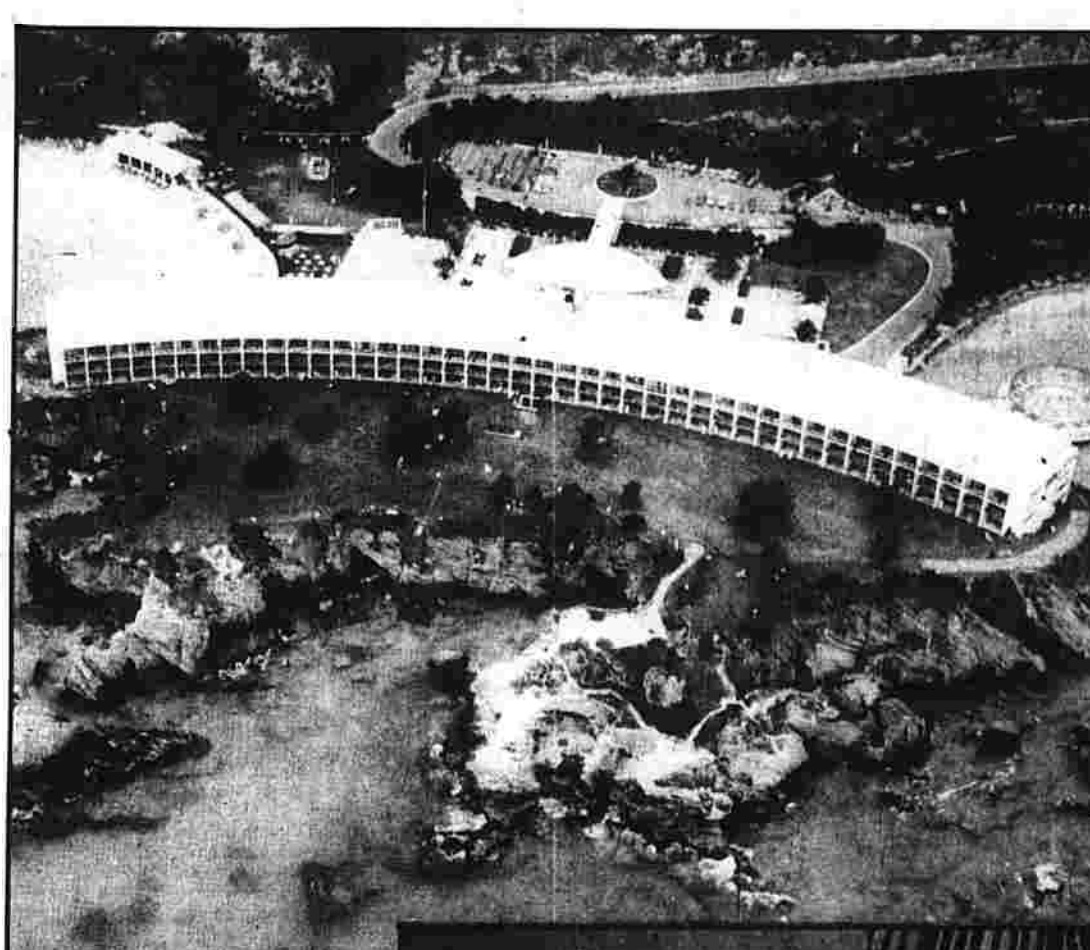

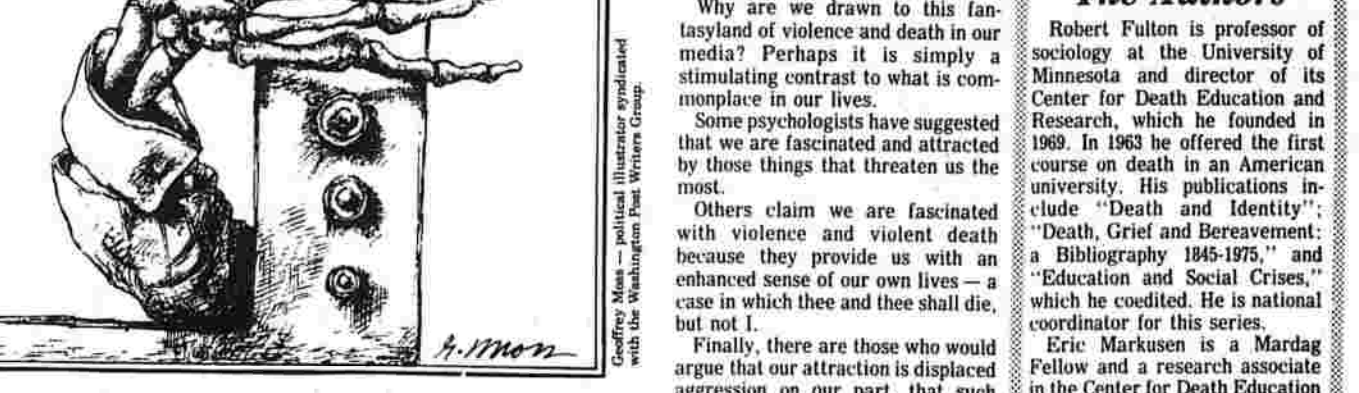

Board Hears Complaints On Vernon Sewer Bills

VERNON — It would cost about \$100 in all to install a water meter for each Vernon resident who uses the sewage treatment facility, but this wouldn't solve all of the town's problems as to equitable sewer user charges.

The Water Pollution Control Authority Thursday night discussed complaints from users concerning the bills they just received which were estimated to cover the past six months.

The bills were sent out and are payable Feb. 15 because the town needed the money to cover the cost of running the new sewage treatment plant. The users had been forewarned that the charges would go up considerably to pay for operation of the plant but some don't feel that the charges are being figured fairly.

Some residents said they feel it would be fairer to have water meters installed and then they would be charged only for the amount discharged into the sewer system.

A. Richard Lombardi, engineer, said that the average figure is 85 to 90 percent of the water used ends up in the sewer. He said he thinks that most of the water used in commercial operations ends up in the sewers.

Many apartment owners have complained, some more vigorously than others, because residential charges are made on a per unit-basis at \$35 for six months. The charge has been \$21 a year.

The charge is actually estimated at this time until the new treatment plant is in full operation. However, Charles Pitkat, superintendent of the plant, said it is estimated it will cost about \$800,000 to run the plant next year.

The authority is going to study a proposal prepared by the engineering firm of Anderson-Nichols for setting up classes and categories to establish a different user charge system. Joseph Belanger, chairman of the authority, said members will be looking at the recommendation as part of the overall problem. Meanwhile, Belanger suggested that

they stick with the per unit form of billing for residential now.

Dr. Saul Cohen, a local dentist, told the authority he thought a town meeting should be called to discuss the user charges. Belanger reminded him that a public hearing was held before the ordinance was passed by the Town Council.

Cohen, remarking on the fact that there were only four people at Thursday's meeting said he didn't think that would carry any clout. Belanger agreed that that wasn't much support for changing the last billing.

Dr. Cohen told Belanger that he felt the matter was a fait accompli and he suggested that the mayor should be asked to call a town meeting.

Belanger and authority member Robert McGarity said, "the decision has to be made at this table, we can't herd people in."

Dr. Cohen said he has lived in town since 1948 and he feels he has paid his share of sewer taxes. And Belanger reminded him that they weren't talking about paying for the plant itself, but rather just the plant operation charges.

Belanger said the newspapers had given plenty of publicity about the fact that the user charges would be increasing considerably for the new plant.

Eric Santini, an apartment owner, said, "Everybody doesn't read the newspapers and a lot of the landlords didn't know about the charge or the meeting."

He suggested that the town could get the water meters wholesale and schedule the installation of them all at the same time and it would cost less than \$100 — but in the meantime we say you should charge on a per capita basis," he said.

He said by installing the meters it would solve the problem for senior citizens who don't use as much water as people with young families. "With the flat rate system you are forcing us to challenge it," Santini said.

Belanger said the authority had said that all of the bills sent out could be subject to adjustment but "we can't accept as an excuse to

adjust the fact, that they didn't know of the increase in cost."

Mrs. Norman Fisher and her husband Dr. Norman Fisher attended Thursday's meeting also. Mrs. Fisher told the authority that they have a water meter and they are willing to pay for what they use but not for what they don't use. She said their bill increased by about 400 percent because her husband has his office in the house.

Belanger assured her that the authority would study the classification system as proposed by the engineering firm. He said at the last meeting the authority discussed going to a minimum commercial charge which would be equivalent to one residential unit.

He said he might recommend to the Town Council that the procedure on bills be that a commercial user, with a water meter reading of under 500 gallons per day be billed as a single unit.

Santini indicated that the town will have trouble collecting the money for the bills just sent out, but Belanger disagreed.

Jack Vanouderhoe, the assistant assessor, said his office can't handle the work to readjust bills now. He said maybe those who feel their bills are wrong can pay what they think they owe and protest the rest. He said then if the bills are refigured and it is found they still owe the money they will be subject to a penalty.

Belanger recommended that single commercial accounts with water bills going back no less than three consecutive quarters, and showing that they used less than 500 gallons a day, be entitled to adjust to the single residential charge and that people who do not ask for that adjustment now will be entitled to it in the future.

Belanger said it wasn't the intent of the authority that there be a minimum 1,000 gallons charge for commercial users. He said his recommendation will be made to the Town Council.

Newspapers Rank Carter

WASHINGTON (UPI) — More than 92 percent of Washington bureau chiefs of major U.S. dailies believe President Carter has done a "fair" or "good" job in his first two years, and 91 percent say he will be re-nominated, according to a survey released Friday by RKO General Broadcasting.

Carter received generally better grades from the Washington bureau chiefs than he did from their editors and publishers, according to the poll conducted by RKO General's Washington Vice President Clifford Evans.

Of the Washington bureau chiefs polled, 64.7 percent said he has done a fair job, 37.7 said he has done a good job, and 7.6 percent said he had done poorly. In the earlier surveys, publishers responded this way: 57 percent "fair," 19.5 percent good, and 23.5 percent poor; and editors 49 percent "fair," 36 percent "good," and 4 percent "poor," and 4 percent "excellent."

The Washington bureau chiefs said Carter's strengths were "sincerity ... honesty ... decency ... integrity ... intelligence ... perseverance." His weaknesses were listed as "unsure of himself ... inexperience ... inability to persuade the public he can provide strong leadership ... lack of decisiveness ... lack of credibility ... staff problems."

Four said Carter would be denied his party's renomination. Of these, two predicted the Democratic candidate will be Sen. Edward M. Kennedy of Massachusetts, one said it would be Kennedy or Gov. Edmund G. Brown Jr. of California, and one did not say.

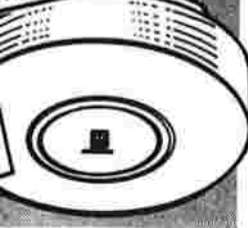

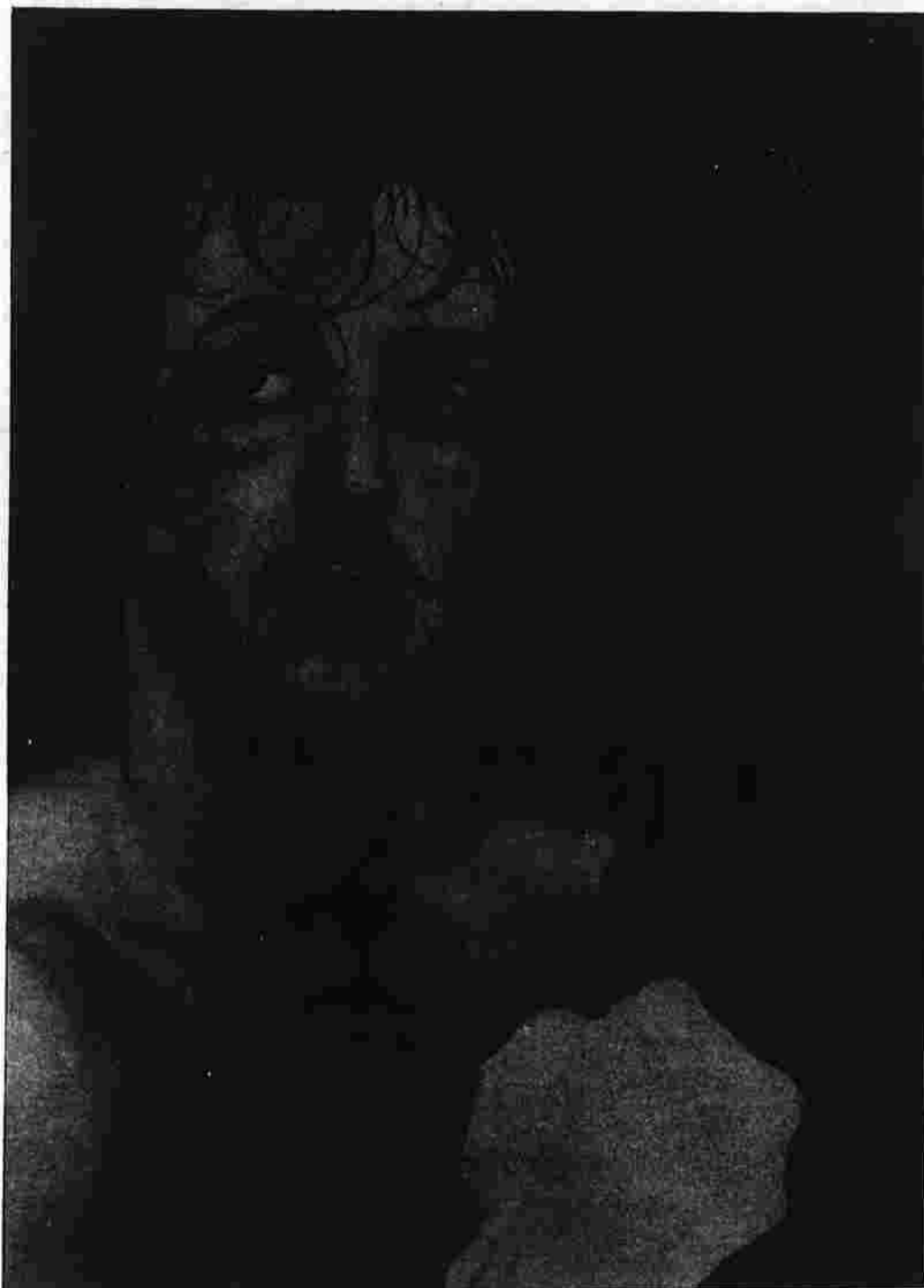
