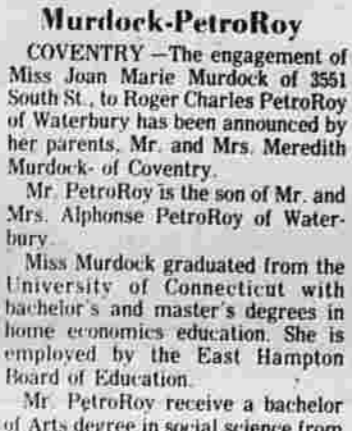

Carter Not Optimistic About Peace Talks

CAIRO (UPI) - President Carter arrived today in Cairo to a tumultuous welcome for what he called "crucial" talks with President Anwar Sadat but a high American official traveling with him said Carter was "not particularly optimistic" about achieving an Israeli-Egyptian peace treaty.

Both he and Sadat joined in pledging to work for a lasting peace in the Middle East and both implored the help of God in their peace efforts. But both sides made it clear that many difficult issues remain to be solved including Egyptian insistence on finding a just future for the Palestinians.

HARTFORD (UPI) — A parliamentary procedure hangup has put a "now-or-never" turn of events, the Legislature's Human Services Committee voted 10-4 to approve a voluntary "workfare" bill and ship it to the Appropriations Committee.

Originally, both voted for the workfare bill, but later they pushed for reconsideration. The third Senate member of the committee, Mary Martin, D-Groton, voted against reconsideration.

Directors Eye Sewer Budget

MANCHESTER — The Town Board of Directors will meet tonight to review the Sewer Department budget, which includes sizable rate increases for such large users as the Eighth Utilities District and Lyall Inc.

Last year, the town instituted a new form of sewer rates that eliminates discounts for larger users. Sewer rates are based on the amount of water consumption, and, previously, larger users had received a discount in their sewer rates as their consumption increased.

The town, however, in conformance with new federal standards, agreed to eliminate such a discount. The elimination, which will boost rates for larger users, is being phased in over two years, and the 1979-80 budget year will see the full impact of the change go into effect.

The Eighth District and Lyall Inc. will have the largest increases in 1979-80 according to a sewer budget prepared for the board.

The district's charge for the year would increase from \$15,192 to \$183,505, and the charge for Lyall Inc. would increase from \$96,100 to \$152,375, the budget report says.

Other possible increases for large users are: Cheney Brothers, \$50,540 to \$81,026; Manchester Memorial Hospital, \$27,971 to \$30,416; and Pratt & Whitney, \$12,743 to \$19,875.

One large user expects to have a decrease in its rate, apparently because of a conservation program to cut water use.

The report says Multi-Circuits rate is expected to drop from \$17,981 to \$15,668.

The directors will begin review of the entire sewer budget at 7:30 p.m. in the Municipal Building's Hearing Room.

Meeting Planned On Consolidation

MANCHESTER — Monday, March 26 is being targeted as the date for a meeting to appoint a consolidation commission.

Stephen Penny, chairman of the Town Board of Directors, has been instructed to reconvene a meeting to appoint the commission within 20 days.

That order was part of Judge Norris O'Neill's decision, which said the Eighth Utilities District and town, which now have separate fire departments and sewer authorities.

Penny said he plans to schedule the meeting Monday, March 26 at Manchester High School's auditorium.

Attorney John LaBelle Jr., district counsel, said Wednesday he plans to appeal the decision. That appeal could include a request to stay, or delay, the meeting for the appointment of the consolidation commission.

Default Rate High

HARTFORD (UPI) — Four Connecticut schools have default rates of more than 50 percent on federally subsidized students loans, the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare said Wednesday.

HEW said about 17 percent of the Connecticut students who participate in the program are in default. Students at the Computer Processing Institute in East Hartford topped the list with 82 percent not paying back loans.

An HEW spokesman said the school owed \$31,000 on defaulted loans.

Other schools with rates of more than 50 percent were Middlesex Community College, 53 percent; South Central Community College, 52 percent; and Mohegan Community College, 51 percent.

Fahey Fights College Cut

Sen. Marvella C. Fahey (D-District 3) is urging the legislature to reject the Gov. Ella Grasso's proposed cut in the higher education budget based on her support of community colleges.

Fahey said that the \$4 million cut from the Board of Higher Education's \$30.1 million request for the community colleges will cause the system to be "severely reduced in its ability to function effectively."

In a letter to Rep. Janet Palmsky, chairman of the Appropriations Subcommittee on Education, she said the proposed \$30 million budget is "not a budget of frills and nonessentials. It is merely an attempt to maintain existing services in the face of inflationary costs."

As an alumna of Manchester Community College, Fahey said she can attest to the quality of the programs offered. She noted the benefits of the community colleges to the students including convenience of campus locations, flexibility of scheduling classes and relatively low cost of tuition.

She said the system prepares the students as "productive contributors to the businesses and industries of Connecticut."

Fahey also noted the increasing enrollments at the community colleges while other institutions of higher learning are having a decline in numbers of students.

More Funds Needed For Rail Service Update

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Congress has been told it cost another \$645 million to complete improvements on the Northeast rail corridor.

Transportation Secretary Brock Adams assured a House Commerce subcommittee Wednesday there would be no more requests for additional money after that.

But Antrak President Alan Boyd told subcommittee members they "should not be surprised" to see administration officials or their successors back for more funds at a later date.

"It's entirely possible we'll be back in 1981 or 1982 and say, 'Hey,

this thing just didn't pan out and here's why," said Boyd.

In 1976, Congress authorized \$1.75 billion for improvement of the passenger rail line between Washington, D.C., and Boston, the nation's most heavily traveled rail route. The project was scheduled for completion in early 1981, but Adams said that schedule must now be extended to late 1983.

Completion of the project will enable trains to travel between New York City and Washington in 2 hours and 40 minutes and between New York and Boston in 3 hours and 40 minutes.

Subcommittee chairman James Florio, D-N.J., said the project had been delayed and costs inflated by inadequate planning, poor management, waste and some outright fraud, which is now being investigated by the FBI.

Adams conceded the original problems, but said a new, more realistic plan has been worked out to achieve the original goals.

"I have no intention of asking this Congress for more money for the Northeast corridor project," Adams said in response to repeated questions from the congressmen.

He said the new cost estimate of \$2.4 billion in federal funds was based on a projected inflation rate of 7 percent for labor and 10 percent for some materials.

"I know of no major government or private projects that have been completed in recent years in accordance with a prior estimates," he said.

He said the original \$1.75 billion authorization was "woefully inadequate" to meet the goals set by Congress.

More Porn Charges Lodged

STAFFORD SPRINGS (UPI) - State police Wednesday charged a 40-year-old couple with six counts of promoting prostitution in connection with an alleged child pornography ring broken up last week.

David B. Getchell 35, and his wife, Shelley 37, who is legally blind, surrendered to state police in Stafford Springs. Getchell had been freed on \$100,000 bond on charges of obscenity and promoting minors in an obscene performance.

He and two others had been arrested by state police Feb. 24. Troopers confiscated files, books, films, pictures and sexual devices at his home.

The other suspects were Robert and Elizabeth McCloud, both 37, of Willington. Mrs. McCloud has pleaded innocent to two counts of risk of injury to a minor and charges of second-degree sexual assault, employment of a minor in an obscene performance and incest. She was being held on \$15,000 bond.

Her husband, arrested on the same charges, has entered no plea yet. He was being held on \$25,000 bond.

Thompson Won't Seek Seat

ANDOVER - The name of J. Russell Thompson will be removed from the ballot of the May town election as a candidate for the Board of Fire Commissioners.

Thompson, an incumbent, is the first selectman candidate for the Republican Party.

Thompson, a charter member of the Andover Volunteer Fire Department, since its inception in 1937, has served as a fire commissioner since 1940.

The Republican Town Committee endorsed Walter (Terry) Clark Jr. to fill the two-year term vacancy.

At its meeting Tuesday the committee discussed fund raising ideas and campaign mailings for the upcoming election.

Chairman Ylo Anson said there will be a meet the candidates night later this month.

Anson said the committee was relieved to learn there will not be a third candidate for the office of first selectman. He said the committee had been concerned about the possibility of a third candidate from a splinter group.

Jean Person and Carol Houghton were chosen to represent the party at the 4th Senatorial District meeting in May. Chosen as alternates were Peter Maneggia and Ylo Anson.

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Three Arrested In Gun Probe

EAST HARTFORD (UPI) - Federal authorities have arrested three men allegedly involved in a conspiracy to smuggle about 2,000 handguns into the Middle East.

Raad Nasser and Jehod Shuja, who carried Iraqi passports, were taken into custody Wednesday after a federal undercover investigation that began in August.

Authorities said the ages and U.S. addresses of the two were not available.

A third suspect, Jawad Hawa, was arrested in Charlotte, N.C., late Wednesday afternoon, authorities said. His nationality was not available.

All three were charged with conspiracy and illegal possession of firearms and silencers.

U.S. Magistrate F. Owen Egan set bond for the two Connecticut suspects at \$100,000.

U.S. Attorney Richard Blumenthal said Shuja and Nasser allegedly gave \$500 to Richard Weronik, an undercover agent for the Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms Bureau, in exchange for three handguns and two silencers.

Blumenthal said the North Carolina suspect had told the agent previously he would come to the Hartford area this Sunday to receive 50 more handguns as the first major installment of an order.

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New Parole Hearing Slated for Galante

BRIDGEPORT (UPI) - A federal court judge has ordered a new parole hearing for reputed New York underworld boss Carmine Galante who turned himself in following nine days of freedom.

Galante, 70, was taken in custody in U.S. District Court Wednesday afternoon after being urged by authorities to surrender. He had been released from a Michigan prison Feb. 27 in an apparent misinterpretation of the judge's order.

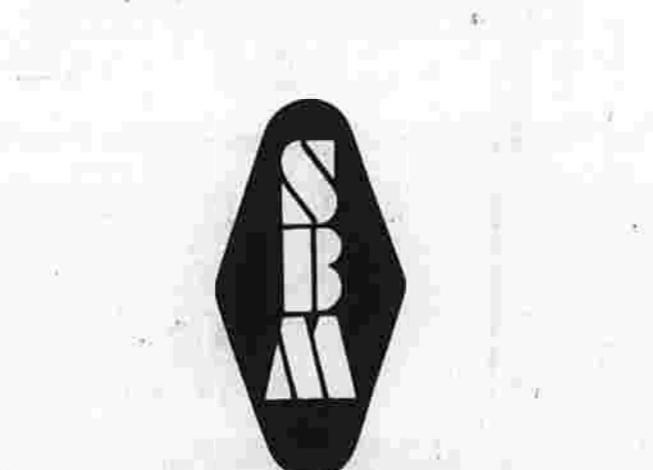
Galante was held at the North Avenue jail pending his transfer today to the Metropolitan Correctional Center in Manhattan.

Judge T.F. Gilroy Daly refused to set bail, but ordered that a new parole revocation hearing be held for Galante before March 22. U.S. Attorney Richard Blumenthal said.

Galante was paroled in 1974 after serving 4 1/2 years of a 20-year sentence for narcotics conspiracy. The parole was revoked in October 1977.

School-Rec Job Considered Substantially Complete

MANCHESTER - The Washington School-West Side Rec project was issued a certificate of substantial completion by the Town Building Committee Tuesday night.

Members of the committee toured the joint school and recreation addition Monday and agreed to accept the new first floor, which includes a gymnasium and other facilities, as substantially complete.

There are a few items, such as platform draperies and window guards which have not been installed, according to Richard Lawrence, architect. Workers were expected to install the six basketball backboards this week.

Town Building Inspector Francis Conti must now issue a certificate of occupancy before the new section of the building can be used by the school and Recreation Department.

Other parts of the new addition and the renovated school have been in use for several weeks. However, Lawrence noted that furniture for the media center has not yet arrived. The order has been held up for several months and Lawrence said he has not been able to receive any satisfactory responses from the manufacturer or supplier.

There is still outside site work to be done at the West Side complex, but it will have to wait until better weather.

Open House and decision ceremonies for the new shared use complex will be April 8.

In other business, the Building Committee also approved a certificate of substantial completion for five new rooms in the second floor of the Manchester Police Station. The approval was given after an inspection tour Monday to allow the police to move furniture into the offices and start using them next week.

The police station renovations and addition are 85 to 90 percent complete, according to Captain Henry Minor. Renovation work includes wiring, carpeting and other finishing.

The committee also learned Tuesday that the costs for renovating the lower west wing of Bentley School to provide an alternate education facility for emotionally disturbed children will cost about \$22,000.

Architect Richard Mankey said the total cost of the

work to modify the wing for the special use will be about \$11,700. Other fees might bring the cost up to \$22,000. The committee voted to set aside \$30,000 to cover the project.

Allan B. Chesterton, director of pupil personnel services for the Manchester public schools, explained the program for which the wing will be used. He said the

wing would provide an isolated area for instruction of severely emotionally disturbed students, ages 6 to 14. It will serve about 12 to 15 students starting next September.

Mankey said he will have bids available by the committee's next meeting. He said he would like the work to start before the end of the school year. It will require relocating two classrooms now using the area.

The committee also voted to reduce the contract retainer for Clear Span Structures, Inc. to two percent of the original bid on the major renovation project at Bentley School which was finished last summer.

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Senate Passes Proposal For Direct Rate Appeals

HARTFORD (UPI) — Utility companies and consumers would be able to appeal rate decisions directly to the state Supreme Court, under legislation approved by the Senate Wednesday.

The Democrat-controlled Senate approved the bill, 28-7, and sent it to the House after defeating an attempt to amend the measure by the Republican leadership.

The bill applies to all utilities with at least 100,000 customers and annual operating revenues of at least \$50 million.

The utilities and consumers would be allowed to sidestep Superior Courts and appeal Public Utility Control Authority decisions directly to the state's highest court.

Senate Minority Leader Richard Horatio, R-Waterbury, said the proposal would "glut" the already overworked Supreme Court. He submitted an amendment that would allow the high court to appoint a hearing officer to hear additional testimony and "report the findings back to the court."

Sen. Salvatore DePiano, D-Bridgeport, and Senate chairman the

Judiciary Committee, said the amendment "would defeat the purpose of this bill to speed up adjudication."

"Some utility cases have dragged on for three or four years," DePiano said.

He said this interfered with the efficient operation of utilities as well as causing unnecessary uncertainties on bill-paying consumers.

Sen. Russell Post, R-Canton, said the proposal would cause "a tremendous impact on the court's already heavy workload." He said it could "set a precedent that is unwise" for other state agencies.

DePiano said most major utility cases now wind up before the Supreme Court and the load would be no greater. He added it may not be a bad idea to include other agencies if the result would be a faster settlement of cases.

Senate President Pro Tem Joseph Fasano, D-Hartford, said the bill will eliminate "the double trial process" of going through extensive PUCA hearings, and then rehearsing the whole case in Superior Court.

In other action, the Senate ap-

proved and sent to the governor a bill that would drop the requirement that assistant state attorneys practice law for three years before coming to work for the state.

Also given final approval were bills allowing grandparents visitation rights to grandchildren involved in separation or divorce cases and increasing from \$50 to \$100 a week the penalty for failure to release a mortgage or lien that has been paid off.

Bolton Doc Airs Gripes

BOLTON — In a letter to the Board of Selectmen, Dr. Robert Butterfield of Vernon Road issued several complaints concerning the "lake house," the dumping of stones and dirt, and an old political sign.

Dr. Butterfield said he has been a resident of the Bolton Lake area for a number of years and has "tolerated the activities of the lake house rather well."

"However, the last activity (at the lake house) is the last straw," he said.

The lake house is now a cabaret featuring exotic dancers, according to Dr. Butterfield said. "I cannot un-

derstand how you can allow such low level activity in our community. He said, "Perhaps the only way to get the officials of Bolton to be interested in the lake area is for us to sue and join Vernon."

Dr. Butterfield also complained about the alleged practice of dumping piles of stone and dirt along the side of Quarry Road. He suggested that on those roads after a snowstorm to blend in with the natural beauty of the woods.

He also said, "I am weary of looking at Mr. Al Ahearn's photograph pasted on an old sign belonging to the state informing us of the fine for littering the roadside."

"It is very disturbing to be constantly reminded of their (politicians) empty promises desecrating the countryside," Dr. Butterfield said.

He asked the selectmen to have the town road crews plow a wider swath on Quarry and Vernon roads after snowstorms because he said it is hazardous to have two cars side by side on those roads after a snowstorm.

He also said that the light signal at the intersection of Route 41A and Quarry Road will be the "instrument of death soon." "Cars coming from Coventry continue whizzing through the red light," he said.

Voters To Fill Vacancies

Philip Savva resigned from the Planning Commission and Samuel Teller, who was an alternate, was appointed to fill the vacancy until the election.

After his appointment to the commission, Teller resigned as an alternate so that vacancy may be filled by

the Board of Selectmen, until election day.

Both the Democratic and Republican parties may submit names for the ballot to fill the vacancy on the Planning Commission from May 7, 1979, to July 1, 1980. Both parties may also submit names for the alternate vacancy, from May 7 to July 1, 1981.

Gil Bismarino resigned from the Board of Education. The board itself may fill the vacancy until election day.

Both parties may endorse candidates to fill the vacancy on election day, from May 7 until July 1, 1981.

Catherine Leiner, town clerk, said any resignations received up until 28 days before the election must be on the ballot.

The Board of Selectmen appointed Patricia Dowley to the Board of Library Directors filling the vacancy created by the resignation of John Gleason.

The Board of Selectmen has approved a four-day leave, with pay, for Lance Dimeck, a public works employee who will be taking an EMP refresher course.

Board Denies Request

HERRON — The Regional District Board of Education has denied a request by Ronald Ouellette for Grade 8 students in the social studies class to go on a four-day trip to Washington, D.C.

The board's decision was based on its policy of not allowing fund-raising for private gain. C. Robert Conlath, assistant superintendent, told the board that the administration didn't

approve of the trip.

However, the board did approve the trip to Florida for members of the band and chorus. They will leave April 13 and return April 20.

Board members voted to delete the amount of \$144,900 from the proposed 1979-80 budget. Items deleted included expenses budgeted in connection with the proposed new junior high school.

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Still More Comments On CD Program Issue

MANCHESTER — The issue has been discussed many times before, but there still was some public comment Tuesday night about the proposed ban on town involvement in the Community Development program.

Tuesday's discussion session was briefer than most that have been held before, though.

The discussion preceded the Town Board of Directors' vote to send the ordinance requesting a two-year ban directly to the voters.

The board also added two advisory questions to be decided by the voters. These ask whether town money should be used for administering and funding incomplete Community Development programs if the ban is passed.

The townwide vote will be April 17. Robert Von Deck head of the Concerned Citizens for Manchester, voiced his support for the two-year ban. The concerned citizens group originally proposed the ordinance for the two-year ban.

He mentioned his opposition to the equal opportunity coordinator and the fair housing brochure, two previous steps taken connected with the Community Development program.

He also said the two-year ban would allow the town to review what it has done through the program.

"We seem to be moving too fast. Let's stop and look it over," he said.

Von Deck also said he never received a letter from the Community Development Advisory Committee seeking input for a fact sheet. The committee had met earlier this week and said it never had received a response from Von Deck.

Gerry Harvey, chairman of Justice Organizations, Individuals Now, expressed her group's opposition to the proposed ban.

"We believe that the Board of Directors has wisely reapplied for funding through Community Development and has rightly resisted pressure to withdraw from the program," she said.

H.D. Pearl said, "It is time we stopped using Community Development."

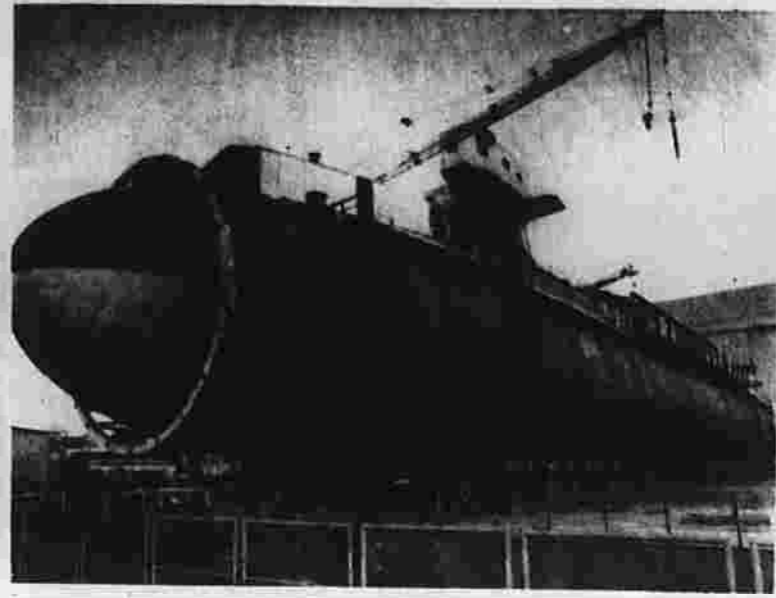
Pearl said the town's involvement with "dictatorial government agencies" has resulted in a loss of freedom.

"I stand for freedom. I don't stand for freedom of sex or freedom of speech or some of the other promiscuous ones," he added.

Bob Faucher, a Laurel Street resident, debated some of the arguments that have been voiced against Community Development participation.

He said the program has not meant the loss of any local freedom.

"What local control have we given up? I don't see any," he said. "The continued use of Community Development funds is in the best interest of Manchester. The facts show that," he said.

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New EB Center To Create Jobs

HARTFORD (UPI) — The Electric Boat Division of General Dynamics has announced plans to build a \$12 million technology center in Groton expected to create about 500 new jobs in southeastern Connecticut.

"This center is a first step in an expansion program which will enable our company to diversify its technological skills into new areas," said Electric Boat general manager P. Takis Veliotis Wednesday. "At the same time, the center will support our existing submarine-building programs."

In recent months, several lawmakers have complained southeastern Connecticut relies too heavily on defense contracts and gets caught off guard when firms like Electric Boat lay off thousands of workers.

"Electric Boat has immediate openings for more than 200 engineers, but no adequate facilities to house them. The first phase of the center's construction will provide this space," Veliotis said.

He said later the center will be expanded, creating 300 additional jobs.

Electric Boat, a division of General Dynamics which manufactures nuclear-powered submarines, is the second largest employer in Connecticut and the largest employer in Rhode Island.

Town Students in Pilot State Nutrition Program

Manchester has been selected to participate in a pilot program, the Connecticut Nutritional Education and Training Program (NETP), according to Dr. Janina Czajkowski, professor of nutritional sciences at the University of Connecticut.

"The NETP uses the cross-age approach to nutrition and under the program, junior high and senior high school students, as well as sixth graders are trained as team teachers. After a two-week orientation session, they will then teach Grades 3 through 5 in the Manchester public school system during the month-long program," Dr. Czajkowski said.

All superintendents of private and public schools in the state had been notified of the availability of NETP. Dr. Czajkowski said, and Manchester indicated interest. "When federal funding for the program came through, Manchester was able to get it all together by arranging schedules within the schools, and was able to move right into the project."

This week and next, student orientation is under way, and beginning on March 19 and continuing through April 20, the team teaching approach to nutrition will be initiated with the schools. There will be six lessons as part of a mini course.

"For example, Dr. Czajkowski said, at Highland Park School, Grade 6 will teach Grades 1 through 3 at the school. The board of education has selected the schools and arranged the schedules for a little travel as possible for the team teachers. We hope to reach more than 1,000 children in the lower grades."

At the same time, the school systems food service departments will be involved in orientation training so that the food served

during the program will correlate with the classroom teaching. On March 19, at 3 p.m. at Nathan Hale School, a cross-over session for team teachers, school principals, nurses, representatives of PTA's and PTO's, teachers, etc., will be conducted to explain NETP and how it will be effectively implemented into the various schools.

Luis Selman, coordinator for the program, is employed by the State Board of Education and is responsible for helping to recruit interested students and team teachers. Dr. Czajkowski's role is to implement and evaluate the program.

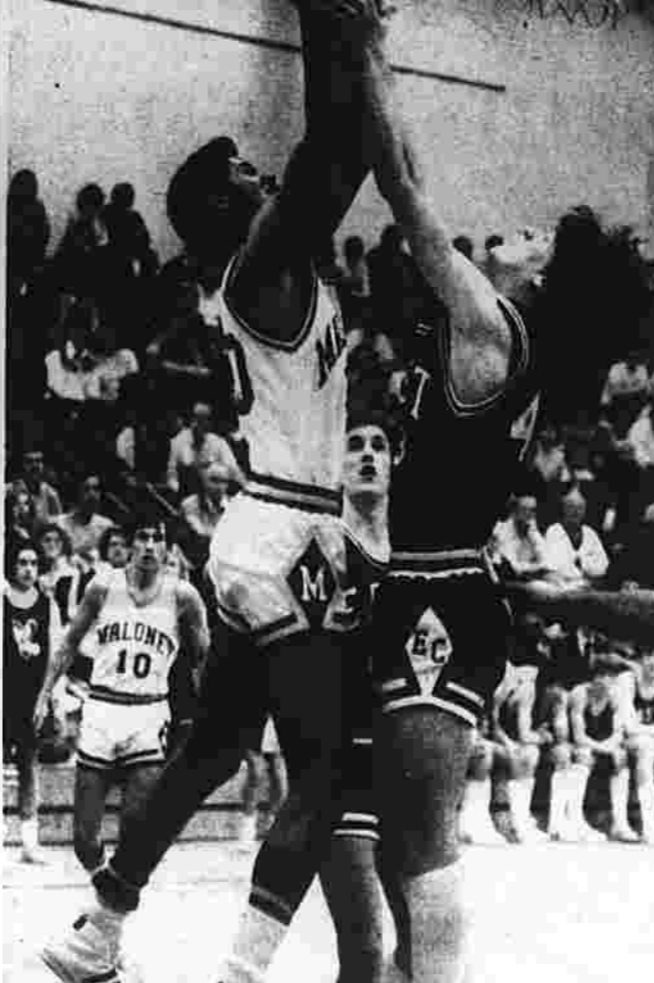
