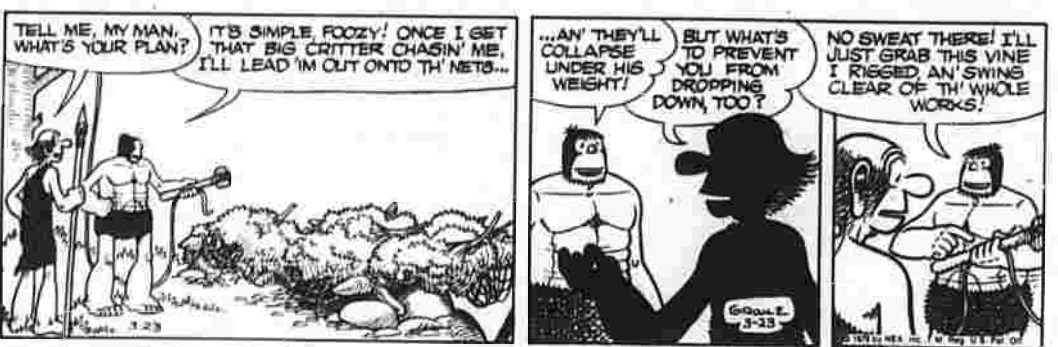

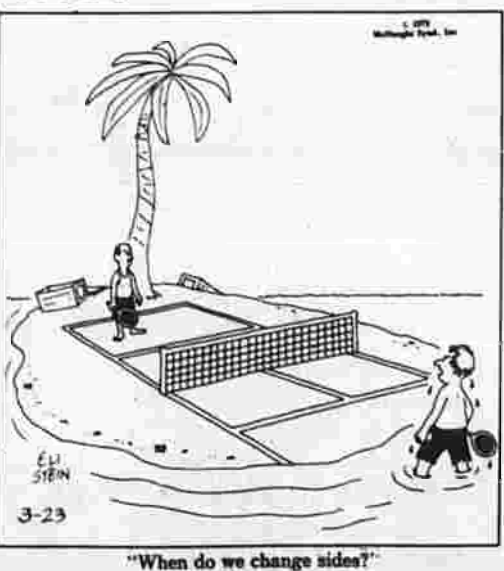

West was faced with a Hobson's choice. He could rise with the ace of hearts which would eventually allow South to take his queen of hearts and then discard the queen of spades on dummy's heart king; or he could duck.

He elected to duck. The Professor took dummy's king, came to his hand with a trump; discarded one of dummy's hearts on his last high diamond and led his queen of hearts.

West had to take his ace and was then forced either to lead a spade up to the ace-queen or a diamond or heart to allow a ruff in dummy and the discard of that spade queen from his own hand.

Sorry Folks

HARTFORD (UPI) — Gas customers refunded money by the Connecticut Light and Power Co. last month are in for a disappointment. The utility said Friday it refunded too much money.

Due to "an error in computation," CL&P refunded customers \$16.7 million instead of \$14.8 million. The \$1.9 million extra will be tacked onto April's gas bills.

Residential customers who use gas for heating will be billed about \$25 next month and other customers will be billed about \$3. The refund originally gave heating consumers \$133 and non-heating consumers \$24.

CL&P refunded the money after negotiating a settlement between gas distribution companies and natural gas suppliers. The money was returned by natural gas pipeline suppliers.

The utility said refunds to electric customers were properly computed.

Begins Campaign

BEDFORD, N.H. (UPI) — Sen. Lowell Weicker, R-Conn., opens his presidential campaign in New Hampshire with a news conference and cocktail party Sunday night.

Aide James Donnelly said Weicker has invited about 25 leading Republicans to a cocktail party, some of whom already are committed to or leaning toward other candidates.

Among those not invited were the two Republican members of the Congressional delegation, Rep. James C. Cleveland, who is tacitly supporting George Bush, and Sen. Gordon Humphrey, who hasn't said who he'll support.

Donnelly said there was "no special reason" for not inviting the Congressional delegation.

Weicker also will have dinner that night with Executive Councilor Lou D'Allesandro, R-Manchester, who stressed he is not committed to any candidate.

Brush Fire

SOUTHINGTON (UPI) — Fire companies from seven towns battled a string of brush fires along a five-mile stretch of Interstate 94 Friday afternoon.

The fire stretched from the Plainville town line to the Cheshire town line in Southington, a fire department spokesman said.

The fire, which the spokesman said was "the season's first major brush fire," broke out shortly after 12:30 p.m. He said it destroyed two sheds, but was kept from damaging homes and businesses.

No injuries were reported.

All six fire companies from Southington responded to the blaze. They were joined by firefighters from Plainville, Meriden, New Britain, Farmington, Wolcott, Cheshire and Bristol.

Jobless Claims

WETHERFIELD (UPI) — The Connecticut Labor Department Friday reported a slight drop in weekly claims filed for unemployment benefits during the two weeks ending March 17.

Labor Commissioner P. Joseph Peraro said there were an average 45,932 claims filed the week ending March 17, down by 580 from the preceding week.

During the same week last year, 75,966 claims for unemployment benefits were filed.

Peraro said new filings the week ending March 17 decreased from 4,572 to 4,045. Continued claims dropped from 41,940 to 41,897.

Beneficiaries expired for 306 unemployed people. Ten local unemployment offices reported a decrease in applications and nine offices reported increases.

Official Claims Passman Changed Rice Regulations

MONROE, La. (UPI) — Otto Passman, claiming he had "chips" to cash in with the preceding week, pressured Agriculture Department officials into changing rice-purchasing procedures to favor the Korean government, a former Agriculture Department administrator testified Friday.

Mill Rate Set At 46.41

MANCHESTER — The \$28,149,341 General Fund budget proposed by Town Manager Robert Weiss would result in a 46.41 mill rate for the 1979-80 fiscal year.

The present mill rate is 50.34, so there is almost a four-mill drop in that rate. But, property assessments will increase because this is the second year of the five-year phase-in. The tax rate proposed by Weiss for the Fire District Special-Fund would decrease from 6.88 mills to 6.37 mills. This tax is paid by customers served by the Town Fire Department.

The proposed fire budget is \$2,143,872, a 3.6 percent increase over present-year spending.

Dallas Is Bargain For Gas Customers

Motorists paid a low of 66 cents a gallon for regular unleaded gasoline in Dallas this week and as much as 84.2 cents in Chicago, a survey of full-service stations in 31 major U.S. cities revealed Friday.

At the same time, many service stations are beginning to curtail business hours and to limit the amount of gasoline each customer can buy. ABC Radio News found in a survey conducted by its affiliates present to meet the soaring demand for unleaded, which is expected to account for 42 percent of total U.S. gasoline consumption this year — compared with only 34 percent in 1978.

Many stations, particularly those in San Francisco, Denver, Baltimore, New York City, Portland, Phoenix and Dallas, are closing Sunday on service by ending Sunday operating on shorter daytime hours, or shutting down after midnight.

Though this does not appear to be widespread at the present time, the survey said, "there is a definite trend in the wind."

Show Features Frolicking Bear

Here is the frolicking panda bear cancellation to be used next month at the MANPEX. This is the big annual show put on by the Manchester Philatelic Society. The MANPEX of '79 will outline all the others in themes and timatics. The souvenir card will note on the International Year of the Child. Then there will be three cachet covers for endangered species and three more for all things antique typewriters!

There is a good reason, though. It is the sequentialness of the first American typewriter patent. The document was signed by President Jackson and Secretary of State Martin Van Buren on July 23, 1829. It was granted to a resident of Michigan, William Austin Burt, for his "TYPEWRITER." He had finally chosen this name over "Burt's Family Letter Press." It didn't get far, as it was slower than a quill pen even and made nothing but capitals.

Research discloses that Mr. Burt used to write a letter to his wife that began: "MY DEAR COMPANION" (no comment).

The MANPEX will be above and apart from all other "PEX's" in the country by a display of old-time typewriters from the mammoth collection owned by Jack Capolich, who is a member of the Society. One of the show cachets will have a sketch of Burt's Typewriter.

Philatelic Society, The MANPEX of '79 will be a show now has a "name." There will be two auctions and many door prizes.

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The cocktail party will start at 7 p.m. and the production "Four Poster" will start at 8:30 p.m. Tickets may be obtained from members of the committee or Joe Stockwell or Joan Kowley.

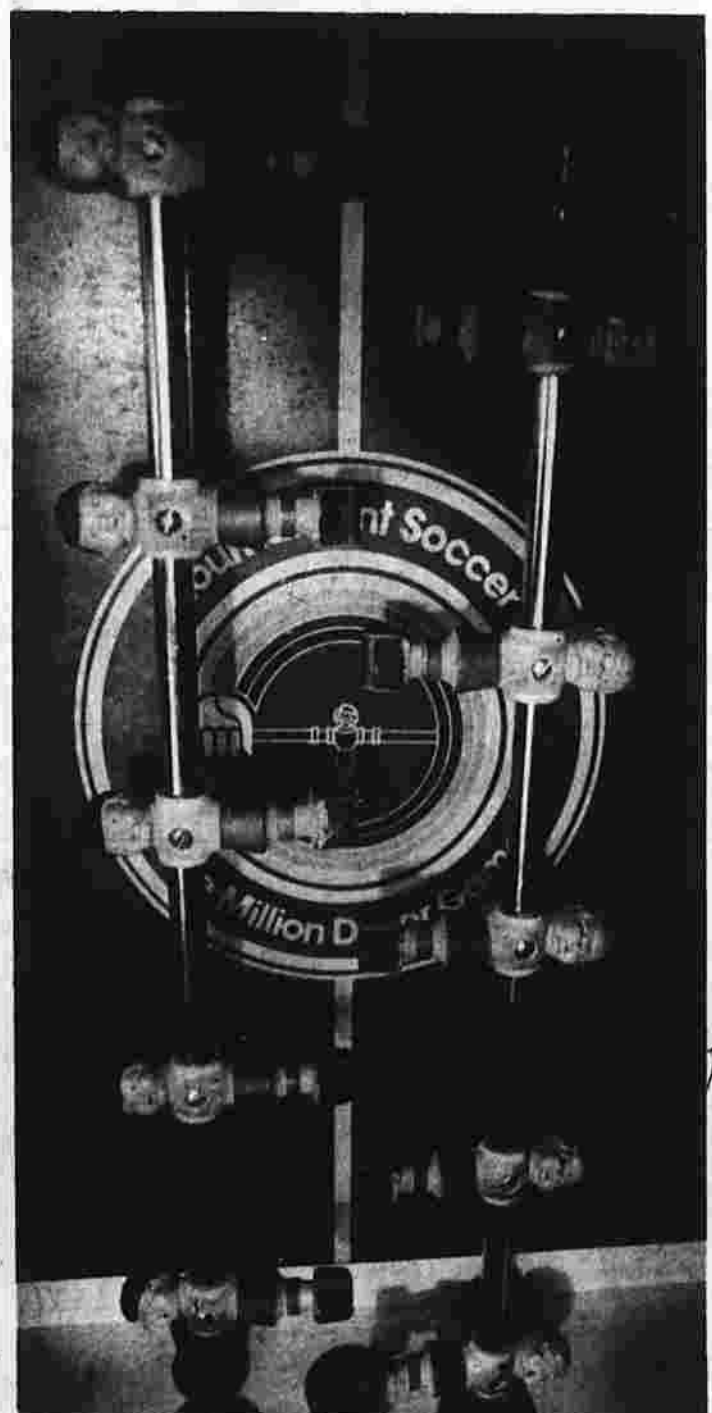

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WHA and NHL Fail to Agree On Conditions for Admission

CHICAGO (UPI) — Representatives of four World Hockey Association franchises and the National Hockey League Board of Governors failed to agree Friday on conditions that would allow the four WHA teams to enter the rival NHL.

However, John Ziegler, president of the NHL, said, "I think we're closer than we ever have been" to accepting the WHA teams into the NHL.

The two sides met for hours late Thursday night and most of the day Friday before breaking up and going home.

The NHL Board of Governors Thursday voted 14-3 to offer Winnipeg, Edmonton, New England and Quebec of the WHA franchises in the NHL for the 1979-80 season.

Ziegler said lawyers for the four WHA teams and the NHL will continue negotiating by telephone and teleconfer on conditions under which the teams could join the NHL.

Ziegler said he hopes to have a proposal before the NHL Board of

Governors sometime next week, but he refused to comment on issues that remain to be resolved.

"I'm not disappointed with the negotiations so far... I think we're very close," Ziegler said.

Asked about published reports the WHA teams had agreed to join the NHL, Ziegler said, "We are in no position to say, 'Gentlemen, we have an agreement.'"

"Based on what's happened here, I think we've made some substantive progress," Bob Caporale, chief counsel for the WHA teams, said. "Both sides, having analyzed the existing situation, feel we have identified the problem areas, but that doesn't necessarily mean there's disagreement. We're looking for solutions to the problems at this point."

Existing NHL teams would protect 15 skaters, two goalies and their first-year players, with the remainder being placed in a pool for the expansion clubs to draft at \$125,000 each.

Eagleson, director of the NHL Players Association, said last week the WHA teams would be "crazy" to give up any of their players in a merger.

The players association was not the only unhappy party. Boston President Paul Mooney said Tuesday he would consider legal action against his NHL partners if the expansion goes through.

The plan also reportedly would prohibit the three WHA Canadian teams from sharing in a national TV pool of hockey night in Canada for three years.

Ziegler said the financial stability of the four "entities" was an important consideration in making the offer to expand, the first by the NHL since 1974 when franchises were awarded to Kansas City and Washington.

Also to be ironed out was the question of rights to junior players on WHA teams. The NHL has a 20-year-old age limit which the WHA has ignored.

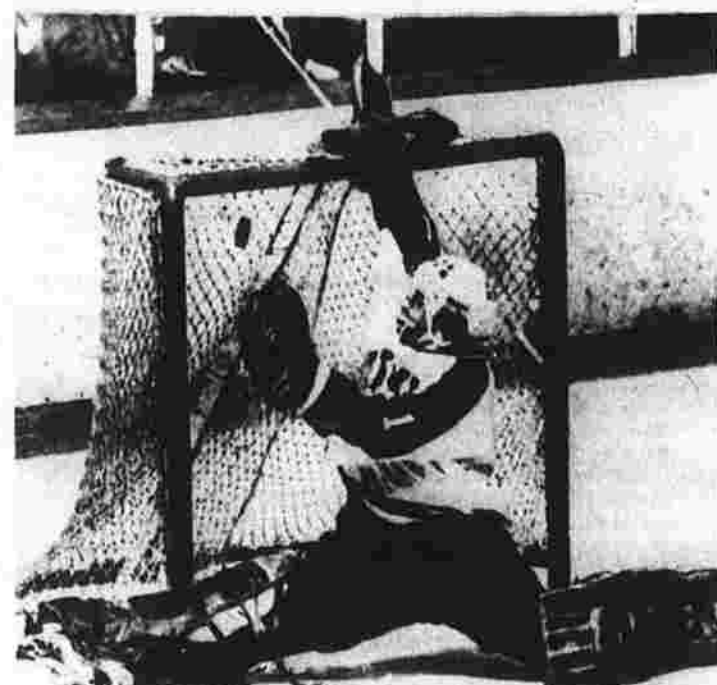

Wadkins Leading By Three Strokes

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (UPI) — Lanny Wadkins, making a bid to become the first two-time winner on this year's PGA tour, overcame fierce and gusty winds Friday to forge a three-stroke lead in the second round of the Tournament Players Championship.

Wadkins, who won the Los Angeles Open four weeks ago, posted a 4-under-par 68 Friday for a two-day total of 9-under-135, with George Burns his nearest pursuer in this \$400,000 event — richest of all golf tournaments.

Burns, a long-hitting New Yorker who has earned more than \$250,000 but has yet to win a tournament in his 11-year PGA career, turned in the day's best round — a record-tying 6-under-par 66 despite back-to-back bogeys.

Wadkins' round was actually more remarkable than Burns' since the wind didn't begin raging until after Burns was finished. While all around him were having trouble keeping the ball in play, Wadkins, the 1977 PGA champion, turned in a four-birdie, no-bogey round.

"There is no question the course played much tougher than Thursday and that's one of the best rounds of golf I've ever played," said Wadkins, a 29-year-old Virginian. "To get around without a bogey is quite an accomplishment, even more so than the score itself."

Wadkins got his first birdie on the second hole with a 20-foot putt and his final one at No. 14 with a 35-footer, but he missed a four-footer for another birdie at No. 10.

"The wind didn't help me at all," said Wadkins. "I'm a little fellow (175 pounds) and I need to use finesse and not try to fight the wind."

Lee Trevino, who just this week switched back to his once-feared fade shot, had a 69 Friday to share third place at 5-under 139 with Bill

Kratzer and Dan Halliderson, who both had second-round 70s.

Wadkins began Friday's round in the runnerup spot, tied with defending champion Jack Nicklaus and U.S. Open champion Andy North and one stroke behind first-round leader Kermit Zarley, who tied the course mark on Thursday with a 66.

DUNEDIN, Fla. (UPI) — To say you're always liable to get a good strong opinion by talking to Rico Carty is like saying you're liable to come away with a little bit of a bone bruise if you're stepped on by an elephant.

Both these truths are self-evident, and in the case of Rico Carty, or rather Rico Carty, Jr., the truth is even more so.

Teammates call him, his opinions turn out right much more often than they do wrong and maybe that's why he's generally drawn so many listeners.

Fifteen years ago, when he came up as a rookie with the Milwaukee Braves and said he was capable of doing better than the 330 average, 88 RBI and 122 homers he recorded in his first season, he was indulged far more readily than he was believed.

But Rico Carty, the Dominican Republic could hit. He also liked to talk a lot of the consensus.

Besides, one of Carty's colleagues with the Braves was getting most of the attention at the time, a fellow outfielder just beginning to warm up for his big race with Babe Ruth, a fellow by the name of Hank Aaron.

But here it is nearly two decades later and Rico Adolfo Jacobo Carty is still hitting the ball solidly. He also has backed up his opinion. Not once, but twice, he has won the MVP award.

Carty is back with the Blue Jays again, the same club he started with last season, and he's back for the last six weeks, and he's happy. The Blue Jays are, too. They're so happy, that they signed him to a five-year contract for \$1.1 million even though they know he's at least 37.

Last year, Carty hit 31 home runs with the Jays and the A's, more than he had ever hit in any one season before, and his 59 RBI were the most he had totaled in eight years, ees combined .282 batting average wasn't that shabby, either.

Carty will be used almost exclusively as a designated hitter by Manager Roy Hartsfield and he has no complaint about that at all. One thing he's absolutely sure of, he will hit.

"It's a God-given talent," he says.

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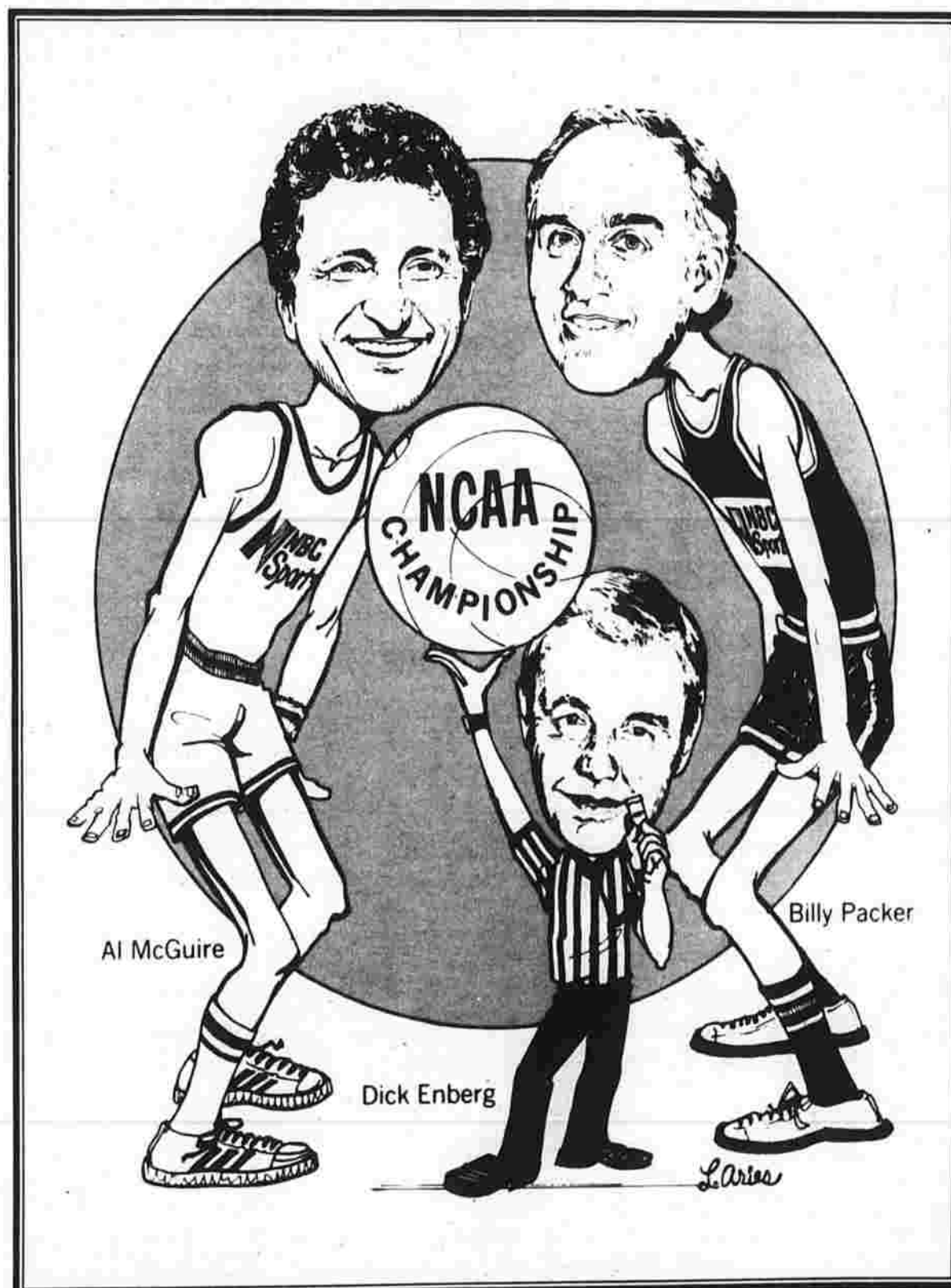
