PZC Needs Deep Thought On Liquor Rule Changes

MANCHESTER - After hearing strong arguments at a public hearing Monday night for and against the proposed revised distance requirements for restaurants that serve liquor, the Planning and Zoning Commission tabled its decision.

"We aren't trying to make some drastic change in what exists today in Manchester. We're saying this type of change is reasonable in our type of society." Referring to the State Liquor Control Commission's role in the application, he said that before a liquor license is granted, the state commission looks at the business returns of the applicant and would exercise control over this type of regulation.

Judd Peskin, an attorney representing Willie's Steak House on Center Street, said that approving the application would "greatly increase competition and would lower the standards of all restaurants who have to compete."

"These are family-type establishments, not joints, not bars, not places of entertainment," he said referring to Mr. Steak Inc. at 34 Center St., Bonanza Sirloin Pit on Spencer Street and West Middle Turnpike, Pizza Wagon at 221 Spencer St. and the On Luck Chinese Restaurant at 224 Spencer St.

"If this law came to pass and other places would have to have places you wouldn't want to have," Oleksinski said. "If this comes to pass, I know there are plans to put another disco on Main Street," he added.

Defending some of the "old laws which made good sense" was Donald Denley, co-owner of the Brass Key Restaurant on Main Street. Referring to the familiar town description of a "city of village charm," he urged keeping it that way. "We don't want a tavern on every corner like a gas station."

Governor Will Consider Stopping Millstone III

HARFORD (UPI) - Gov. Ella Grasso is looking into whether Connecticut can stop construction of its fourth atomic power plant, saying the state has done more than enough in developing nuclear energy.

The governor said she is convinced Connecticut could safely handle a nuclear mishap like the one that occurred at the Three Mile Island atomic plant near Harrisburg, Pa. "I feel confident we could handle any situation that developed," she said.

The governor said she was definitely opposed to construction of a fifth nuclear plant in the future. Northeast utility officials have indicated they might be interested in building another plant in the 1990s.

New Management Improves Beechwood Apartments

MANCHESTER - A moderate income housing development which was plagued with management and maintenance problems a year ago has been undergoing a clean-up by new management.

Arthur Boothby, property manager for Housing Services, which now manages the Beechwood Apartments on Rachel Road, said recently that the company has been bringing the apartments "up to where they should have been."

Boothby said the maintenance men have been working an average of 50 to 60 hours a week at the complex and someone is on call 24 hours a day. The housing problems which has bothered some areas of the complex in the previous years have improved with the addition of some new pumps, he said.

The major problem at the complex now is finding a recreation area for the many children who live there. Boothby said he has been trying to make some arrangements with neighboring property owners, but so far has had no success.

The apartments were painted last summer and more site work is planned for this spring, Boothby said. Phyllis Jackson, president of the MISAC Corp., also mentioned the efforts to upgrade the complex with repaving, grading and re-seeding planned for this spring. She also said the interior of the apartments are gradually being redone also.

Smith said the woman had lived in the complex for over a year and had never been late with her rent. When she realized last September that she would be late on her rent she notified the management, but was sent the eviction process. She was given the choice of paying her first within five days plus a \$40 charge, which she did pay, Smith said.

Housing Incentive Boosted

VERNON - Amendments to the administrative guidelines for the town's Investor-Owned and Owner-Occupied Property Rehabilitation Programs, approved by the Town Council Monday night, will increase income limits, raise the amount allowed for construction costs and put a cap on rent increases.

The amendments were proposed by the Housing Rehabilitation Committee headed by Councilman Robert Hurst. The committee said that the interest subsidy of \$5,000 provided under the existing guidelines has proven less of an inducement to property owners than was anticipated during the committee's initial deliberations.

The owner-occupied program was established in 1976 to encourage homeowners in the Rockville section to improve their property to bring it up to local housing code standards. The investor-owned program provides interest subsidies to Rockville section landlords who upgrade their housing units.

Equal Education Passed

HARTFORD (UPI) - The Legislature's Education Committee has approved legislation which would guarantee equal opportunities to all students in mandatory courses that range from the arts to vocational education.

The committee, with the financial aspects of the education plan settled, Monday approved specific language granting that "each child shall have an equal opportunity" to all activities, programs and courses of study. The panel is putting the finishing touches on an education package that must be approved by the full Legislature and meet a court deadline of May 1.

The committee Monday spelled out the prescribed course that must be made available. Almost all of them are already on the books but the committee approved new language for local school board compliance. Beginning in 1981, local school boards must show to the state board of education that such prescribed program of instruction is planned, ongoing and systematic.

Board Delays Vote On Fire Commission

VERNON - The Town Council voting Monday night to delay action on approving the organization of a Board of Fire Commissioners, but for varying reasons.

Some felt no action should be taken until the consolidation of the town's two fire departments is acted on in a November referendum. Others felt there shouldn't be a Board of Fire Commissioners at all and still others think that instead of the functions of such a commission would be better handled by means of a sub-committee of the council.

The proposal to consolidate the town's fire departments was made by a Fire Study Committee appointed several months ago by Mayor Frank McGer. The council recommended the merger and the council approved but it has to be done by charter change which a revision commission is now working on.

Panel Adjusts Sewer List

Belanger said it would mean that "because somebody has to pay." He said he feels, to the best of his ability, that the authority has made the assessments equitable.

The property owners, in being told they can pay the assessment over the 15-year period were also told the interest rate will be five percent and that they could add into the amount the \$200 it will cost to tie into the sewer lines. The charge for tie-in now is \$100 but is increasing as of April 15.

Town Not Among First To Improve Its Water

MANCHESTER — The town is behind others in the state in making water improvements, and even if the April 17 bond issue passes, it probably cannot meet the Jan. 1, 1981 deadline for filter plant operation.

That is the assessment of Richard Woodhull, chief of water supplies inspection for the state Department of Health.

The state, however, is not yet concerned about enforcement action if deadlines are not met. He wants such changes to be made voluntarily rather than being forced on a community.

Woodhull's attitude mirrors that of Frank Jodanis, water and sewer administrator for the town, who feels his department should be supplying the best possible water whether or not it is forced to take such action.

Manchester voters go to the polls two weeks from today to decide about a \$20 million bond issue for water improvements. The proposed improvements include construction of a filter treatment plant to treat water and major improvements to water lines.

Two private firms, the Connecticut Water Co. and Bridgeport Hydraulic, have started construction of new plants and improvements, and two others — the New Haven Water Co. and the Stamford Water Co. — are near construction, Woodhull said.

This leaves Manchester in a group with other communities in the state, including Waterbury, Middletown, New London and Wallingford, who still are months away from starting construction.

Woodhull doubts Manchester will meet the Jan. 1, 1981 deadline by which a filter treatment plant should be in operation.

Town officials have said the town lags in lines if it does not meet the requirements of the federal law. Because of this and the cost of inflation, which increases the price tag of the work for each day of delay, town officials are supporting the bond issue and are anxious to start work.

Woodhull said the state has not yet devised enforcement methods or penalties if towns fail to meet the requirements.

"But, we want to keep them moving," he said of the proposed improvements in communities.

"We're at the stage where everything is moving voluntarily," he said. Apparently, the state would like to see work continue that way and will emphasize voluntary compliance with the laws. This could avoid any attempt to fine for non-compliance.

"I would hope we don't have to go the penalties route at all. That's not very productive," he said.

Jodanis agrees that the town should work to meet the federal requirements with or without the threat of penalties.

"If you're supplying water to people, they should have quality water whether there's a law or not," he said.

The department isn't here just to comply with laws. It's here to supply good water to people and fire protection to the town," Jodanis said.

These improvements are needed for the town to meet the requirements of the federal Safe Drinking Water Act.

Woodhull said Manchester ranks in the second half of the state among communities and private water companies taking steps to meet those federal requirements.

Rogers' Incinerator OK

MANCHESTER — A state-appointed hearing officer has ruled that the Rogers Corp. should receive a permit to install an incinerator at its Mill Street plant.

The incinerator actually will reduce the company's emissions into the air, according to testimony Rogers submitted at a March 12 hearing on the matter.

The hearing was conducted by the state Department of Environmental Protection, Jonathan Clapp, the hearing officer, who said that the firm should receive its permit. His recommendation has been forwarded to Stanley Pae, commissioner of the DEP, who will make the final decision on the matter.

About a dozen residents who live near the Rogers plant attended the March 12 hearing to voice their protests about odors and emissions already in the neighborhood.

The incinerator — also known as a thermal oxidizer — would cut down the emissions of hydrocarbons that are created by a production process started last August at the plant.

Clapp agreed with that assessment.

"They met the standards that have been set in the regulations," he said as he explained his decision to approve the permit. Clapp's decision was not appealed by any of the residents who attended the hearing.

Those who became parties in the hearing said he had recommended a conditional permit, which would insure that the system works properly before a full permit is issued.

Ruling Gives Employee Hearing on Grievance

MANCHESTER — A Superior Court judge has ruled a town employee has the right to an arbitration hearing because he feels he was passed over for a promotion.

Judge Harry Hammer ruled Robert Taylor, a water and sewer department employee, may challenge his failure to be promoted by going to the state Board of Mediation and Arbitration.

Taylor was denied a promotion about 1 1/2 years ago.

The town had argued the employee could not take the case to arbitration because the town's personnel rules supersede the contract for the union involved — the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, AFL-CIO, Local 991.

Taylor's case involves differences between the town's personnel rules, which establish a merit system for promotions, and the union contract, which says promotions must be made based on seniority.

Taylor feels he was passed over for a promotion to water treatment technician, and now may take the matter to the state board, the Tolland County Superior Court judge ruled.

Since Taylor's grievance, there have been some other similar grievances filed by Water and Sewer Department employees who feel they were entitled to promotions based on seniority. These cases have been delayed pending the outcome of the Taylor case.

PZC Bugged Down On Wetland Plan

MANCHESTER - The Planning and Zoning Commission got bogged down in a quicksand Tuesday night at a public hearing on an application for an inland wetlands permit sought by the Vernon Street Corp.

A Manchester resident whose property abuts the inland wetlands through which the Vernon Street Corp. proposes to build a road, told the PZC that water from that area has already affected his property at 560 Vernon St.

Arthur Steele, a general contractor opposing the application, said that the water table has risen and his gas tank, originally sunk four feet in the ground, has now been pushed to the top of the ground.

"I have four acres in that swamp, and when I got finished filling it in, it will raise that swamp four feet," Steele said.

He also said there's quicksand underneath. "I was born there and lived there all my life and I know the land," he said. He said Jay Giles, public works director, and Walter Senkow, town engineer, had said they walked the brook in the swamp area.

"If they had, they wouldn't be here. There's quicksand there," he said. Later, Giles said he had never walked the brook.

Dominic Squatrito, the attorney representing the Vernon Street Corp., is requesting an inland wetlands permit to build a road about 1,100 feet long through marshy land. The road would connect the corporation's 48-lot Knollwood subdivision off Vernon Street to a 33-lot undeveloped parcel of land to the northeast, now inaccessible to vehicles.

Steele said he is afraid that the two 42-inch pipes that would be placed under the proposed roadway to carry off the water would bring it into his back yard and run his property.

Allen Hellstrom of 623 Vernon St., whose property also abuts the inland wetlands area in question, agreed that the water table has "come up considerably." He also opposed the application.

PZC chairman Alfred Steffert asked Alan Lamson, town planner, to prepare a map showing Steele's land and its proximity to the inland wetlands area designated for the proposed access road.

In other business, the commission approved an inland wetland permit for improved drainage in the Pitkin and Porter streets area with conditions that dead trees be removed from the Adelaide Road pond area.

MANCHESTER - The Eight Utilities District has written to the town about three issues that have been discussed in the past - Revenue Sharing, sewage use rates and payment for the Buckland fire jurisdiction case.

Nobel Prize Chemist Named as Lecturer

STORRS — Professor Vladimir Prelog, winner of the 1975 Nobel Prize in chemistry, will deliver the Randolph T. Major Memorial Lectures for the University of Connecticut chemistry department April 9 and 10.

Prelog, associated with the Eidgenossische Technische Hochschule of Zurich, Switzerland, won the Nobel Prize for his work on the stereochemistry of organic molecules.

Working in conjunction with Cahn and Ingold in Britain, Prelog devised a system for naming "chiral" molecules — those molecules showing properties related to right- and left-handedness (chirality). (Ingold was American Cyanamid lecturer at the UConn in 1966).

Their system and its nomenclature have been rapidly adopted by the chemists of the world, according to Dr. James M. Bobbitt, head of the UConn chemistry department.

Prelog's two lectures, both open free to the public, are entitled "Second Thoughts About Specification of Molecular Chirality," and "Chiral Ionophores." They will be given at 4 p.m. each day in Room 150 of the Chemistry Building.

The Randolph T. Major Memorial Lectures Series was made possible by a gift of \$50,000 from Merck and Co. of Rahway, N.J., in memory of Major, who was a UConn research professor from 1970 until his death in Nov. 1976.

Before coming to Storrs, Major had spent 27 years at Merck, where he held the positions of director of pure research, director of research and development, vice president and scientific director, and scientific vice president.

Referred to in the band business as a first trumpet player, which is comparable to a concertmaster in a symphony, Pantalak has worked with Jerry Lewis, Dave Brenner, Wayne Newton, Phyllis Diller, Sonny & Cher, Tony Orlando & Dawn, Gene Campbell, Jerry Vale and others.

"They're all good performers," Pantalak said, "and good to work with."

He said Diller and Jerry Lewis are "beautiful people." Both are quiet people off stage, he said. He added that Lewis is a real perfectionist.

Not all Pantalak's associations have been with jazz or popular groups. He also played with the Hartford Symphony and the Connecticut Opera Association for two years when he was in high school.
