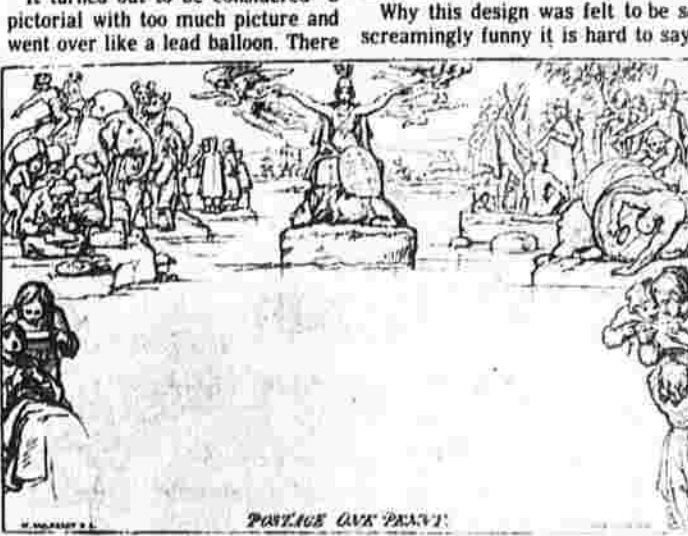
Your Neighbors' Views: Do you favor building more nuclear energy plants?

School Funds Plan Would Double Aid

HARTFORD (UPI) - After voting down a flood of amendments, the Legislature's Education Committee Friday approved 19-13 a plan to more than double state educational aid to municipalities over the next five years.

In the spring of 1977, the state Supreme Court declared Connecticut's system of funding education unconstitutional because it relied too heavily on local property taxes.

Chair Asks More Time On Charter

GLASTONBURY - The chairman of the Charter Revision Commission has asked the Town Council for an extension of time in submitting a report to council members.

The commission, which was named last Dec. 26 by the council, is to report on 29 items the council asked it to consider and another 22 items which were submitted by citizens and town employees.

Perley reiterated the commission's request of holding the referendum on any proposed charter revisions in November with the regular town elections.

Blackstone said the study is still in the engineering phase. Purcell Associates of Glastonbury are the engineers, he said.

Engineering Will Delay Street Job

EAST HARTFORD - The \$1.2 million reconstruction of Main Street from the Glastonbury town line north to Brewer Street will be delayed until late fall, Mayor Richard H. Blackstone said Friday.

The project involves widening the road to provide a uniform road length throughout Main Street, improving the storm drainage system and resignalization of the traffic lights at Main and Maple streets.

The project involves about 7,000 feet of road.

The program is funded under a federal, state and local ratio. The town will pay \$180,000 or 15 percent of the \$1.2 million total cost.

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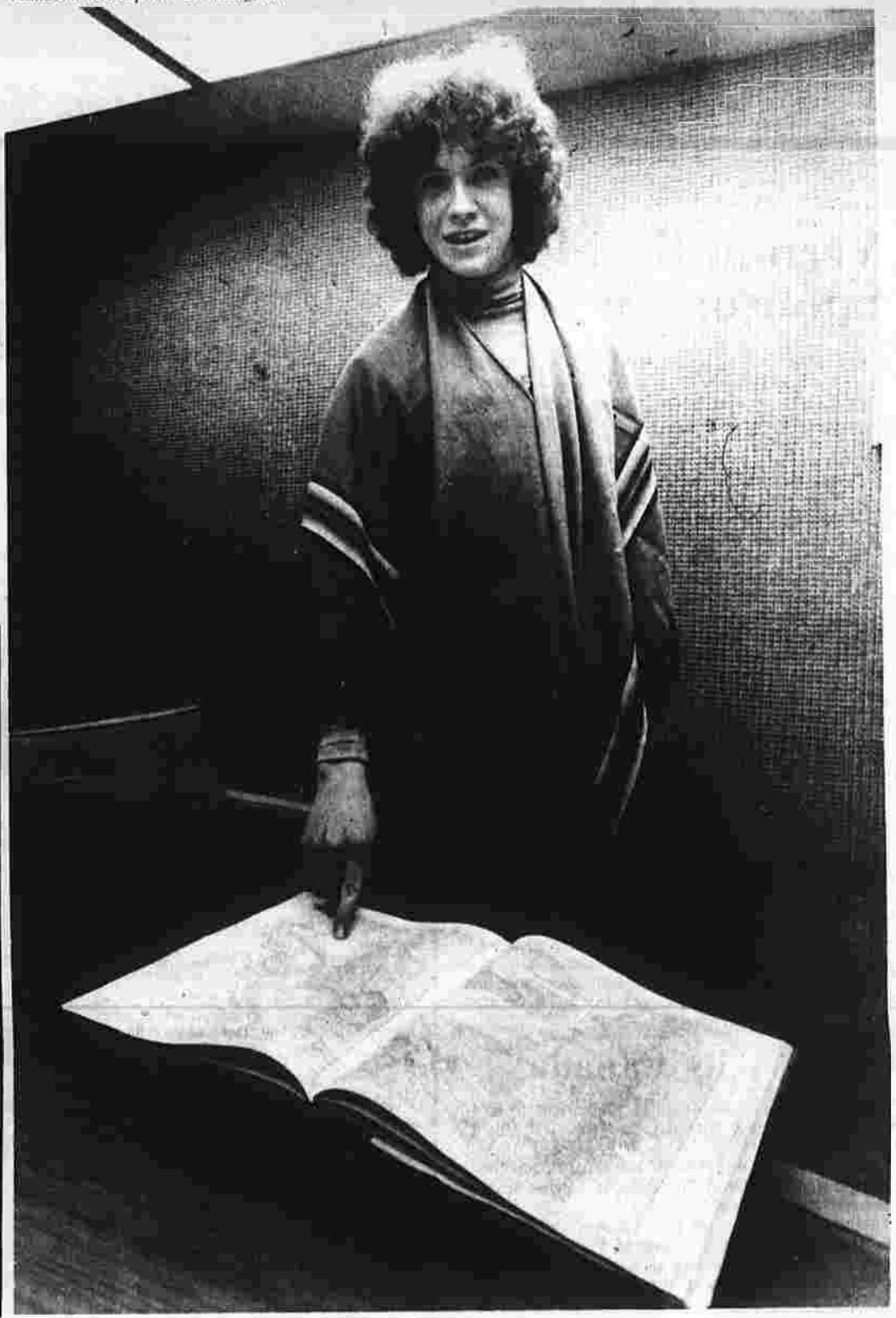
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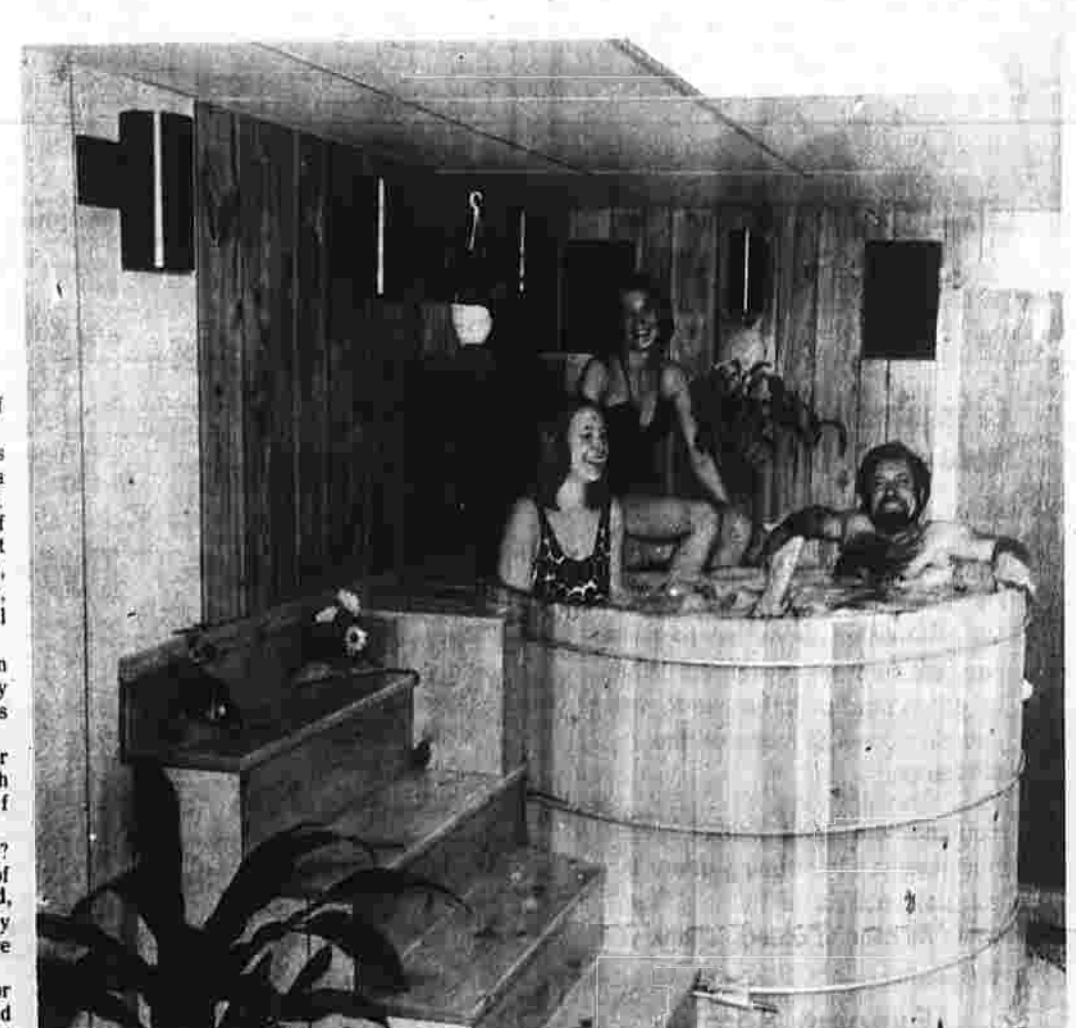
