





Lobbyist Abandons

HARTFORD (UPI) - A lobbyist for Connecticut theater owners made his last pitch Friday to have the state the atmosphere March 15. drop its "brutal" 7 percent tax on ilm rentals - which generates up to \$1.5 million a year in state revenue. The state now imposes a 7 percent tax on film rentals and a 10 percent tax on movie admissions. The first tax is paid by the theater owner. The second tax is paid by the customer.

"For theater owners who are not doing well financially, (the tax) is way, way out of line compared with sister states," Bourke Spellacy, a Hartford lawyer and spokesman for he Connecticut Association of Theater Owners, said Friday.

Legislature's tax-writing Revenue. Finance and Bonding Committee. The proposal would eliminate the 7 preent tax on leased or rented films, is long as the admission tax is collected. The admission tax does not

apply to 99 cent shows, such as children's viewings The rental tax actually has never been collected. Theater owners challenged the levy in court in 1976, right after it was passed. A Superior ourt judge said it was illegal, but the state Supreme Court upheld the

tax in February. Spellacy said theater owners still will have to pay the rental tax for the three years during which it was litigated — which he said amounts to about \$3.5 million.

The association figures the state would forfeit about \$1 million a year by eliminating the tax. The state's own preliminary figures show Connecticut would give up about \$1.5

Spellacy said the tax isn't fair because the theater has to pay a flat 7 percent on the rental fee, regardless of how much money they make on the film. He also said the tax is much higher than other states. A chart compiled by Spellacy showed the only other state in the

country which taxes both film rentals and movie admissions is South Carolina, but its rental fee is 4 percent - three percent lower than Connecticut's
