## Judge Delays CD Ban To Decide Injunction

HARTFORD—A U.S. District Court judge has issued a restraining order that will prevent the Town of Manchester from withdrawing from the Community Development program for 10 days.

Manchester voters last week approved an ordinance that prohibits the town from participating in the Community Development program for two years. The day after the vote, three low-income residents filed a lawsuit against the town's action. The suit asked for the injunction to be issued.

If the injunction is granted, the merits of the case will be heard at a later hearing. If the judge denies the injunction, it effectively kills the lawsuit unless the decision is appealed.

The attorneys also argued that the town's vote in favor of the ban is not a permissible way of leaving the program.

"Although a community is free to withdraw from Community Development, they are not free to withdraw

in this way, attorney Diana Johnston of Connecticut Legal Services said. Attorneys representing Manchester, however, said the process is proper and the ban should go into effect.

A resolution passed by the Town Board of Directors in support of such a ban was submitted by the town's attorneys.

HARTFORD (UPI) — In a rare display of political unanimity, the Senate Friday overwhelmingly approved Gov. Ella Grasso's austere \$2,400 billion budget. She signed the bare bones spending package within the hour.

After five hours of debate, the Senate approved the budget on a 33-3 vote and shipped it to Mrs. Grasso via state police cruiser. The governor, who was staying at her summer vacation home in Old Lyme, penned the document at 5 p.m.

In an unusual gesture toward the end of the Senate debate, Senate Minority Leader Richard Bozuto, R-Waterbury, gave his blessing to the spending package, which is only 5.5 percent above last year's election year budget.

Voting against the budget were Republican Sens. John Cunningham of Stamford, John Matthews of New Canaan and Russell Post of Canton. Democrats control the Senate 26-10.

The package sets aside \$28 million for state employee raises, adds \$30 million for public school funding and provides a 5 percent increase for welfare recipients.

Mrs. Grasso Thursday signed into law the school funding bill to beat a May 1 court-imposed deadline to come up with such a plan.

The approved budget kept in line with Appropriation's recommendation that \$3.3 million be added to what the governor recommended for the state's educational institutions and \$2 million more for anticipated increases in fuel costs.

But a number of Fairfield County lawmakers successfully argued that raising the drinking age would force Connecticut teen-agers, particularly those in their region, to drive to New York where the drinking age would still be 18.

This, they said, would result in a dramatic rise in traffic fatalities involving drunken youngsters.

In the end, a compromise was struck. A majority of lawmakers felt making it illegal for package stores to sell liquor to those under 18 would remedy the problem of 18-year olds selling liquor to their younger friends.

At one point, the House, on a 104-38 vote, turned aside an amendment to raise the drinking age to 20.

The three hours of debate on the drinking age brought out the traditional arguments about whether 18-year olds are mature enough to handle alcohol.

"At 18, you're mature enough to get married, at 18 you're mature enough to buy a house. You have all the rights," said Rep. Robert Sorenson, D-Meriden. "But we going to say, at 18 you can't drink? Is that consistent?"

taken by the directors and not by the voters of the town. Raymond Norko, an attorney from the Hartford County Legal Aid Society, said the board's resolution would not have passed if the town's residents had not previously voted for the two-year ban.

Norke and Ms. Johnston both pointed to an earlier vote of the board which approved submitting the application for funding next year through the Community Development program.

He reminded also that much of the responsibility to be borne by today's children when they are young adults will fall upon members of minority groups — blacks and Hispanics expected to make up a larger percentage of the nation's adult population than today.

As has become his custom, Pifer made his major pronouncement, "Perceptions of Childhood and Youth," in an essay in the foundation's annual report to be released Friday.

He sees as a deep and far-reaching development the dramatic fall in the birthrate following the baby boom of the 1950s — a happening that shifted public and private attention away from children toward adults.

## Compromise Set On Drinking Age

HARTFORD (UPI) — In a compromise move, the House Friday chose to keep Connecticut's drinking age at 18, but voted to prohibit package stores from selling alcohol to anyone under 18.

Under the measure, 18-year olds would still be allowed to buy and consume drinks in bars and restaurants.

Originally, the bill — approved on a 76-48 vote and sent to the Senate — would have raised Connecticut's drinking age from 18 to 19. In 1972, the Legislature lowered the state's drinking age from 21 to 18.

Proponents of the measure said raising the drinking age one year would "get booze out of the high schools." Many argued that 18-year olds are buying alcohol and selling it to their younger classmates.

"Our educators are pleading with us, begging us to raise the drinking age," said Rep. Andrew Grande, D-Bristol. "A majority of our 18-year olds are youngsters."

Pifer cited this evidence that contemporary society is fencing out children:

- Widespread exclusion of families with children from rental housing.
- Growth of single life styles.
- Reluctance of many parents to stint themselves on behalf of children.
- Massive shift that has already taken place in the allocation of public spending toward the elderly.

"The irony is that just the opposite seems to be the case: as the numbers have declined, public attitudes have turned to indifference or even outright antagonism."

Medal Catalog Unique

A high-falutin catalog has just come to hand. It describes the Vernon Hall Collection of European Medals. Vernon Hall is a person, the Professor of Comparative Literature at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He has donated nearly 400 examples of medallion art to their museum.

being taught to sing a love song by Cupid. The lion stands for Lionel of Este, Marquess of Rimini, and the medal was cast in honor of his marriage!
The piece is signed "OPVS PISANI PICTORIS." — meaning the Work of Pisano the Painter, with the date MCCCXLIII, which puzzles out to the year 1443. Pisanello (a nickname), always considered himself to be primarily a painter, he did not take up medal-making until he was in his forties.

His first medallion was made in 1438 for the Roman Emperor Palaeologus. It was about four inches in diameter (the same as that of the singing lion), and was made by a casting method newly developed. As noted by author V. Hall, it was a technological breakthrough and

Concert Canceled

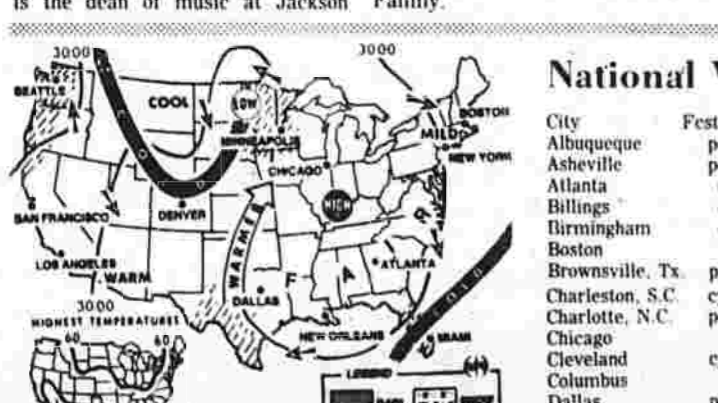

Editorial

The following is an editorial from WFSB-TV, Channel 3, concerning the referendum vote in Manchester on April 17.

Immediately following the editorial is a response from Carl A. Zinner, Republican member of the town's board of directors.

During the past couple of years, about 100 Manchester residents obtained low-interest loans to fix up their homes. But because the town voted Tuesday to withdraw from the federal CD program, there won't be any money for a couple of hundred other people to do the same.

Response

On Tuesday, April 17, 1979, the voters of the Town of Manchester demonstrated once again their desire to control their own destiny. On that memorable day they voted by a 2-1 margin to withdraw for a two-year period from the Community Development Block Grant program. This was not a vote against the poor or against minorities, as some would have you believe. This was simply a small

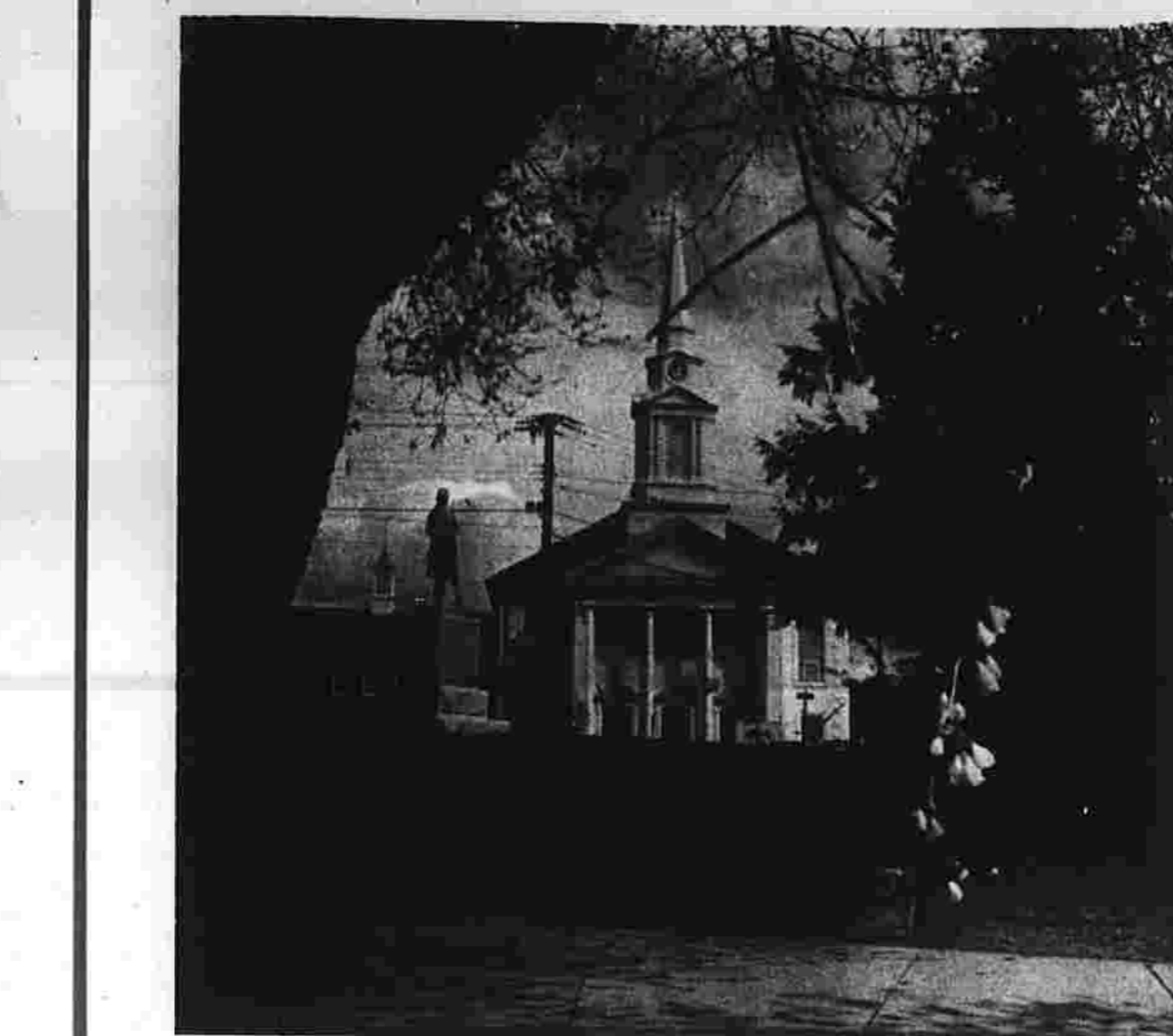
city's way of saying to the federal bureaucrats that we have had enough of their meddling in our affairs. Channel 3, along with others, claims that racism was a factor in the vote. This attack on the character of the people in Manchester is unwarranted. The electorate in Manchester recognizes, appreciates and obeys the laws of our land, including Civil Rights legislation. It is not fair to say that the vote in Manchester was a vote to deprive anyone of their civil rights. Rather, it was a vote to enforce the civil rights of the citizens of Manchester. Further, I am astonished that a responsible T.V. station, such as Channel 3, would state, "that the suit challenging the referendum is a just one." Am I to believe that Channel 3

could not meet the housing challenge instead of running from it, that Manchester has failed its own poor and elderly and that Manchester is unwilling to face up to its regional responsibility. Channel 3 believes that the suit challenging the referendum is a just one but, unfortunately again, it is hard to make a case against the vote of the people, even when the people are wrong.

Large part of their efforts, Congress passed legislation giving a tax credit to employers who hire Vietnam veterans. They have also been instrumental in pushing for a \$10 million appropriation to provide psychological counseling for veterans. Still, those who fought in Southeast Asia have discovered that the difference and indecisiveness that prolonged their suffering in the field have followed them home. In many ways, readjustment to civilian life has proven to be a tougher ordeal than actual combat was.

WASHINGTON - "The Deerhunter" and "Coming Home," two movies about the shattering effect of the Vietnam war on the men who fought it and survived, walked off with most of the Oscars recently at the Academy Awards gala. But for the 3.1 million Vietnam veterans themselves, the painful realities don't end in the movie theater. And the recognition they just won from Hollywood has not spread to the public at large. Americans who were not directly affected by the decade-long frustration of Vietnam want to forget the war. There are too many other matters, like dollar-a-gallon gasoline and inflation, to preoccupy the public's attention. This seems to be the case with President Carter as well. He promised during his campaign that he would give the Vietnam veterans a better deal. But aside from some success in reducing unemployment in their ranks, Carter has yet to reward the vets that he's willing to fulfill his commitments to them.

Wings of Morning Only Failures Stay Down

Last Sunday, I preached on "Success in Failing" and sought to point out that although only one may rise to the top in politics or some corporation or one of the things that may well be a "failure" in the things that really matter. The Christian marches to a different drum. Millions have never been present or a titan in industry and yet found abiding joy, and inner peace, meaning for life, and revealed humility, sensitivity and acceptance in their daily lives. My main illustration came from a plaque hanging in the minister's office of the Episcopal Church in Rangely, Maine. It described how a young man of 22 started a crossroads store in the midwest. He failed and lost seven years' savings. At 31, he tried again. This time to fall because of a drunken partner with 15 years needed to pay off the debt. At 29, he borrowed money to go into surviving - failed because a creditor took the horse and instruments. When his wife died, it was so close to insanity he dared not care for her and had to recover his family for a year to recover his mental health. Later, he was elected to a Congress but failed as he was soon voted out of office. Again, he tried for nomination to the U.S. Senate, only to fail again. Two years later he ran against a suave, gifted, experienced opponent - and failed again. Now at 50 this misfit and a failure of over 30 years, Abraham Lincoln was president of the United States. He fell down, but didn't stay there. A "Success" Even If Not Elected. I maintained that even if Abraham Lincoln had never made the highest office in the United States, he would have been a successful man from the Christian standpoint. We march to a different drum. He was a man of deep integrity with his word his bond - and honesty to a fault. Who does not recall his long walk to return a few pennies because he had made a mistake in making change? He was a thoughtful, gentle, sensitive soul as well as a keen student of theology. He understood people and had a sense of humor, he had an excellent sense of humor, and walked close to God. Broken Glass or a River. The Christian sees an event - whether a "success" or a "failure" - as part of a process toward a goal in the setting of God's creation. Some horrible calamity happens in a family. For some, it is an event that stands by itself and is final. It is a thick pane of glass that is shattered and cannot be put together. Peter, both wept bitterly and Judas went out and hanged himself; the "sorrow that worketh death" and Peter became the leader among the disciples with "a change of heart that leads to salvation." Judas broke the glass while Peter channeled his faith back into the riverbed of the Kingdom. Christ the Goal - Unreachable, but Unreachable. The Christian seeks in all situations to follow the commands of Christ whether the event be good or bad. Some anti-Christians will tell you \$10,000 or in an instant without any and through either situation we seek and find the farthest thing from my mind. Whose arms to clasp us on the cross were spread." A Final Word from Ben. 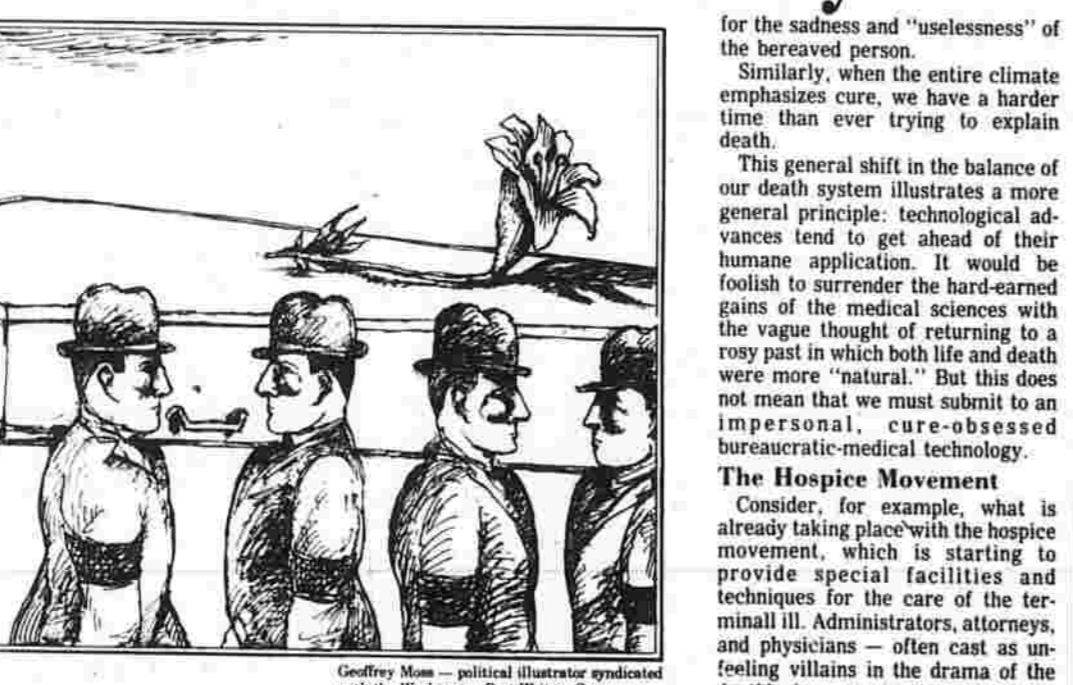

Death & Dying 15: The Death System

For more than two decades now the death awareness movement has persistently criticized the American approach to death and dying. It would appear that we are afraid to speak openly about death and dying, and we avoid intimate contact with the terminally ill. Professional caregivers, we are told, assault the dying person with technology rather than providing basic human comfort, and the dying process itself is miserably prolonged. Our funerals often are the fastest carcasses that demean - expensively - both the deceased and the survivors. Many of the criticisms have been well-founded. I have been too long among the critics myself as clinician, researcher, and teacher to dissociate from those who have been alarmed by our failings in this area. However, I suggest we have been quite one-sided in our negativism. We have failed to put our current problems in historical perspective, and so also have failed to develop a clear vision of the options before us. It would appear that we are using technical skills in the humane care of the dying person. Organization for Death. We usually think of death as a very personal event, and so it is. But at the same time, death is a public phenomenon, one in which all of society has a critical stake. We cannot fully understand the personal side of dying and death without some appreciation of the social dynamics involved. Since all societies must cope with



potential technological advances nations to turn the world into a smoldering graveyard stands as ever-present background to the unfolding of our daily lives. We are affected by the possibility as well as the actuality of military violence. Similarly, our heightened ability to prevent death or cure illness affects us both in actuality and in expectation. More people survive life-threatening conditions than ever before, but our expectations for cure continue to rise. Thus, we often experience bitter disappointment and bewilderment when the fact of mortality comes home to us. Cure Overemphasized. The emphasis upon cure has led to an imbalance in our death system and a comparative withering of concern for its other classic function. Preventing, not comforting, has emerged as such a high social medical priority that it has taken a very determined effort to promote a re-discovery of the dying person and his or her needs. The cure emphasis has also increased tendency to act as though funerals, cemeteries, and remembrances of the dead are no longer important. The person who has lost a loved one is expected to put on a brave face. The dead cannot be cured, and we have little tolerance

for the sadness and "uselessness" of bereaved persons. Similarly, when the entire climate emphasizes cure, we have a harder time than ever trying to explain death. This general shift in the balance of our death system illustrates a more general principle: technological advances tend to get ahead of their humane application. Technology is foolish to surrender the hard-earned gains of the medical sciences with the vague thought of returning to a roomier and less expensive technology. But another type of miracle will be taking place in either event: the creation of a final environment in which the finest human qualities of patient, loved ones, and professional caregivers can be expressed. # CD Suit Hearing Draws State, Federal Spectators'

HARTFORD — Many spectators, including some from Manchester, others from Hartford and one from Washington, D.C., attended Friday's court hearing about Community Development.

The hearing, in Hartford's U.S. District Court, was for an injunction to prevent Manchester from dropping out of the Community Development program.

Judge M. Joseph Blumenfeld issued a today restraining order to prevent the town from withdrawing

until it rules on the injunction request. (See page 1)

Manchester voters last week passed an ordinance that bans the town from participating in Community Development for two years. Three low-income residents filed the lawsuit that includes the request for the injunction.

The case has attracted much interest on the state and even national level. That interest was obvious Friday as about 25 persons attended the day-long hearing.

The spectators included Attorney Howard Feinstein of the U.S. Department of

Justice.

Feinstein, whose office is in Washington, D.C., said "We're just observing." He would not comment further.

Cheryl Wattle, an assistant U.S. attorney general, also attended the proceeding. Like Feinstein, she had no comment about her reasons for attending.

There have been reports that the federal government is looking into the Manchester situation and other cases where communities have dropped out of the Community Development program.

Also Cohen, an attorney for the

federal Department of Housing and Urban Development, and other HUD officials also attended. HUD is the department that oversees the Community Development program.

"We're just here to see what happens," he said.

Cohen faced a possible sticky situation that never did develop. John McLean, HUD's area director, was the first person to testify and was asked some legal questions about the program.

He did not know the exact answers, and it appeared Cohen might have to testify. Cohen said, however, that before any department employee

testifies, it has to be cleared by the department.

McLean, who had been subpoenaed, had received such permission. Cohen had not. He never was called to testify, however, so the problem was avoided.

Persons from the City of Hartford also attended as did officials and interested residents from Manchester. Hartford's City Council had passed a resolution to join the lawsuit.

At least three persons who had been subpoenaed — Manchester Mayor Stephen Penny, Alan Mason, the town's director of human services, and Arthur Green, head of the

state's Commission on Human Rights and Opportunities — did not testify.

Many legal aid attorneys also were at Friday's hearing. Two legal aid services are representing the low-income plaintiffs.

The legal aid representatives who attended included three Yale University first-year law students — Michael Plantamura, Patricia Connell and Laurie Miller — who are training in one of the legal aid offices.

"This is the first time I've ever been in court," Plantamura said.

## School Plan Eyes Shift In Students

MANCHESTER — A junior high school enrollment study recently released by the school administration indicates a preliminary plan to shift more students over the next 10 years from Bannet to Iling Junior High and possibly close the Main Building at Bannet.

The shift will be necessary because of an expected decline of 717 students by 1989 in the junior high enrollment, according to Wilson E. Deakin, assistant superintendent of schools. The last five years of the 10-year estimate will have a dramatic decrease of 542 additional pupils because of projected declines elementary enrollments, Deakin added.

Deakin stressed that the proposal to close a portion of the current junior high school facilities is not an administrative recommendation now, but is the conclusion of discussions among junior high school administrators.

They expect that the 1985-86 school year would be the most likely time to close a facility, with the logical candidate the Main Building at Bannet Junior High.

The enrollment study suggests that housing the 1,605 projected junior high student population in that year could be accomplished with 900 students at Iling Junior High, its current population, and reducing Bannet to 700 students. The Bannet complex would be the Main Building could accommodate 700 students, Deakin said.

To prepare for the closing of the Main Building, each year more and more students would be shifted from Bannet to Iling. This shifting has already begun with all Wadwell district students moved from Bannet to Iling. The next students to be shifted will probably be in the Robertson and Verplanck school districts since the bulk of these are already bus students, Deakin noted.

When all the shifting is completed in the mid 1980s, it is envisioned that the boundary lines between the two junior high schools will be Middle Turnpike to East Center Street and all the way out Center Street.

The school population projections for the next 10 years show an overall decline of 1,400 students from kindergarten through Grade 12.

## Committee Urges Repairs at MHS

MANCHESTER — A subcommittee on long-range planning for the Manchester High School has recommended that major repairs for the roof and maintenance in several areas of the school are the most pressing renovations needs.

Roof repairs have also been recommended by school officials and an engineering study is under way.

The subcommittee, composed of four persons from the Citizens Advisory Long-Range Planning Committee, also made several recommendations in connection with what it termed "long overdue maintenance items." These items included work on the exterior cement walks and stairs, interior water damage, drinking fountains and science laboratories.

The modest renovations for the science labs were recommended because of apparent safety violations observed during a tour of the high school.

Howard Epstein, chairman of the subcommittee, said the group strongly felt there was an unsafe environment in the labs. The subcommittee recommended that no new laboratory, shop or class be initiated until a safe environment can be provided.

The subcommittee's final suggestion was that no major renovations, such as additions or major reallocations of space, are needed now.

The subcommittee made no recommendations on how funds will be raised for the projects. They discussed with the school administration the "packaging" of the items for a referendum vote.

School Superintendent James P. Kennedy noted that the maintenance items alone could be very expensive and could add to \$1 million very fast. The cost of replacing the entire

# Fund Drive Opens

In an effort to preserve one of Manchester's historic landmarks, a group of concerned citizens last year formed a non-profit corporation — The Pitkin Glass Works Inc.

Some segments of original walls of the Pitkin Glass Works of 1783 vintage still stand at the southern end of Parker, and Putnam streets.

Next week, letters seeking financial support will be mailed to area residents giving them an opportunity to share in the preservation of this national treasure.

In the letter, Richard T. Egan, president of the Pitkin Glass Works Inc., writes, "We have a national treasure in our own back yard."

"It was the first glassmaking factory in Connecticut and was a direct outgrowth of the War of Independence."

"During that struggle, the Pitkin family supplied vitally-needed gunpowder for the Continental Army. As part payment for this, the Connecticut General Court granted a 25-year monopoly for glass manufacture to Captain Pitkin."

"The factory built in 1783 and was in operation until 1830, mainly producing flasks and bottles for the shipment of cider to the West Indies. A few of these containers still survive and are eagerly sought by collectors."

Explaining the need for financial support, Egan's letter continued, "Because of the mounting maintenance costs, the survival of the ruins of the factory itself was for a time in doubt."

"Just last year, a non-profit corporation was set up for its preservation and now an opportunity is being presented for membership in a group devoted to taking care of our treasure and developing the site to attract visitors to this city of village charm."

"Already, the area has been recommended by the State Historical Commission for listing in the National Register of Historic

Places," his letter concludes.

Mrs. Ernest (Ruth) Shepherd of Bolton, a direct descendant of the Pitkin family, said, "The ruins of the factory are a Revolutionary War relic and the only one in Manchester."

For years it was covered with vines until a Boy Scout group helped clear the area. The wall stones are still loose. Through the years stone by stone has been carried away by souvenir hunters. We hope to have someone report the stones to preserve them."

Recalling her father's stories, Mrs. Shepherd said, "The factory used to make gunpowder and snuff and during the war supplied the government with gunpowder. They were exempt from taxes for 25 years."

After that time, hauling sand from New Jersey by ox-drawn carts became expensive and the factory started to go downhill.

Mrs. Shepherd has a few pieces of Pitkin glass. "It is usually identified as olive glass with a bubble-look and with a distinct satin finish."

## Dental Program Begins

Ronald Kraatz, the town's assistant health administrator, said that follow-ups have just begun in the school dental hygiene system. Children who have not responded to past dental referrals will be referred to the dental program which establishes a low-cost dental care at the Tolland Turnpike office of five dentists. They are Drs. Michael Goodman, Winfield Danielson Jr., Richard Freilich, Joseph Shin and Cathleen Kowalski.

The first visit will include only an examination and any necessary X-rays. Patients will be informed of the cost of the initial examination when the appointment is made. Patients are encouraged to pay for the first visit at the time of the visit.

The second visit will include an explanation of the treatment plan, the amount of the fees and discussion of the payment plan. There is no charge for this, the second visit.

## Miracle Awakes Girl in Coma

AVON (UPI) — For a year, Joseph and Lorraine Delahanty never stopped praying.

On April 15, 1978, their daughter Karen was riding in a car with two friends when it hit a police cruiser head-on while rounding a curve.

Her friends, Thomas Moran and Webster Huntington of Simsbury, suffered facial cuts. Police officer Philip Roberts, driving the other car, had his leg broken.

Karen had been sitting in the front seat between Moran and Huntington. Her arm was broken and her head was badly battered.

She went into a coma and doctors said her chances of living were about 50-50.

Her parents, devout Roman Catholics, appealed to a higher power and never stopped believing that their prayers would be answered.

Almost a year went by and then came April 13 — Good Friday.

Nurses tried to replace a tube in Karen's nose. "No," she cried.

For the first time since entering the hospital, Karen had spoken.

Lorraine Delahanty was at the hospital a little later the same day, visiting her 22-year-old daughter as she had each day since the accident.

"I thought she was sleeping," Mrs. Delahanty recalls. "I was just talking about going home and making dinner for the boys when she opened her eyes and said, 'I don't want you to go. How long have I been asleep?'"

New Britain Memorial Hospital nursing director Gary Cadrine said Friday Karen's physician is unable to predict how well she will recover from her injuries.

"It's impossible to tell in these cases," Cadrine said. "She still has other medical problems to work out. We're not sure what will happen. It's just a matter of time."

Karen, who will be 23 next month, "doesn't remember anything before the accident."

She is in a four-bed rehabilitative unit where she receives extensive daily therapy to help her recuperate from partial paralysis caused by her injuries and the long months in a coma.

Doctors say the tendons in her legs have shrunk, making it very painful for her to be moved for her therapy sessions.

But since she began speaking, she has received a steady stream of visitors, including the two friends who were in the accident with her.

Mrs. Delahanty said Karen's younger brothers visit her often, but she keeps asking for her older brothers, one of whom is in Germany and the other in North Carolina.

"She keeps asking when she can come home, but I tell her she has to walk first," Mrs. Delahanty said.

The doctors say they are amazed Joseph and Lorraine Delahanty aren't. They just call it a miracle.

The really expert South notes that East is marked with both the ace and queen of hearts from the lead and play to the first trick. If East also shows up with the ace of clubs, then it is clear that he won't also hold that spade king. With 13 high-card points including two aces he would surely have opened the bidding.

South decides to check on the whereabouts of the club ace before playing trumps. South risks a club ruff on this line of attack, but decides that he can afford this slight chance. He leads a club to dummy's king. East plays his ace and now South knows that his only chance is to try to drop a singleton king of trumps. He tries the play and the king does drop.

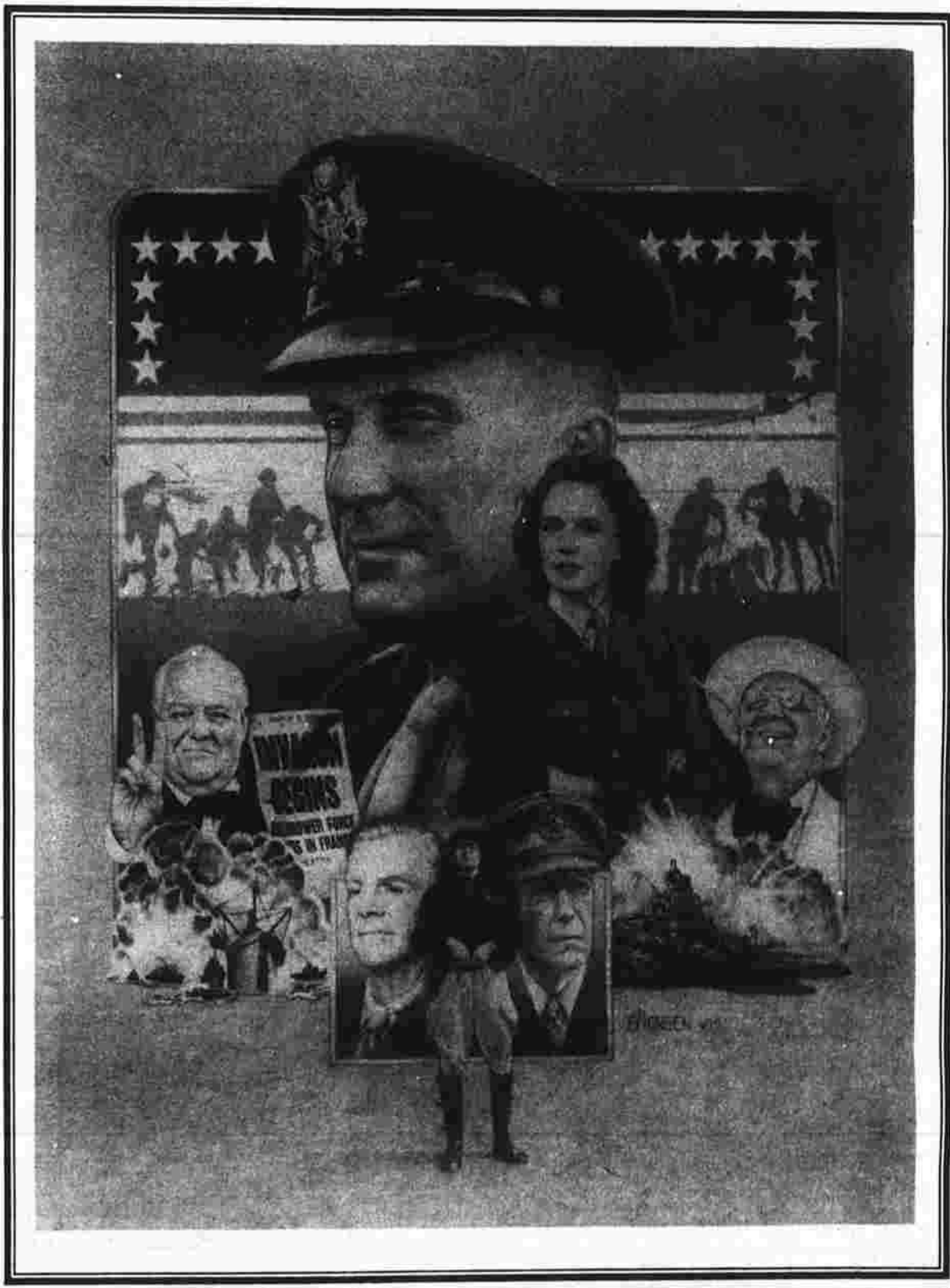

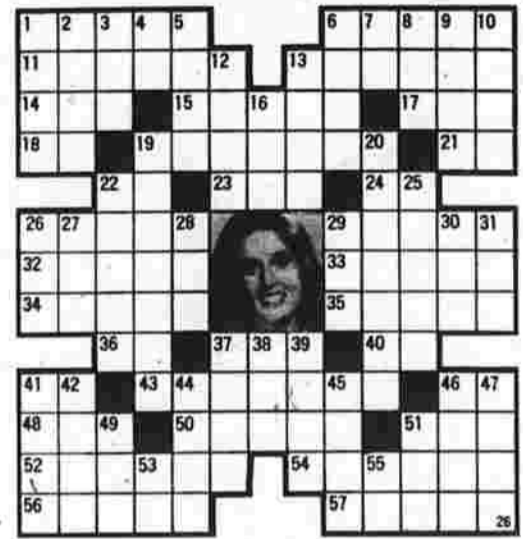

## Sandy and Jump Man Series

HOLLYWOOD -- Although Gary Sandy and Gordon Jump both were born and raised in Dayton, Ohio, seven miles from each other's home, they never met until they got to Hollywood years later and became co-stars in a television series about a run-down radio station in Cincinnati.

Television is filled with such ironies, and in the case of "WKRP in Cincinnati" it goes even further. This series had little hope for its future in the opening weeks of the new season last September. At one point, it even was yanked from the schedule and put into a two-month hiatus.

The industry buzzed that "WKRP in Cincinnati" had had it.

It seems, however, no one at CBS paid attention to the speculation. The network's program brass continued to exude passion for the series, insisting that as sure as there was a mid-season, "WKRP in Cincinnati" would be back on the schedule, not withstanding the early-season low ratings.

But at mid-season, "WKRP in Cincinnati" was back on the schedule in a new time period, at an hour later on Monday nights. That meant a world of difference, because now the show was in a good hammock position, between the very successful "M\*A\*S\*H" and the popular "Lou Grant" series.

The results were quickly discernable. "WKRP in Cincinnati" soon had good ratings, to the 30-plus circle, frequently finishing in the Top 20 shows of the Nielsen ratings.

Gary Sandy, who came to Hollywood via theater, and soap operas in New York, brings the twangy program director who turns the station around from "elevator music" to a hot Top 40 rock station. Gordon Jump is the station manager, a position he came to with ultimate qualifications - his mother owned the station.

This is a fun show with an ensemble of likeable characters, including the "heavies." It has a sweeping appeal in that ever-indulgent pursuit of demographic following.

"WKRP in Cincinnati" has a natural appeal to the contemporary generation since its set against the backdrop of rock 'n' roll music.

"We know radio is more popular today than ever," Jump notes. "A lot of young people turn on radio to listen to their favorite music. Our show appeals to those kids - at least we hope so - because it gives them a chance to look inside radio."

This is not to say that any show that appeals to young people is devoid of quality, or purpose.

"I'm sticking up for our show," says Gary Sandy defensively. "We're not doing that type of a show that worries about whether Sarah gets a date Monday night or not."
