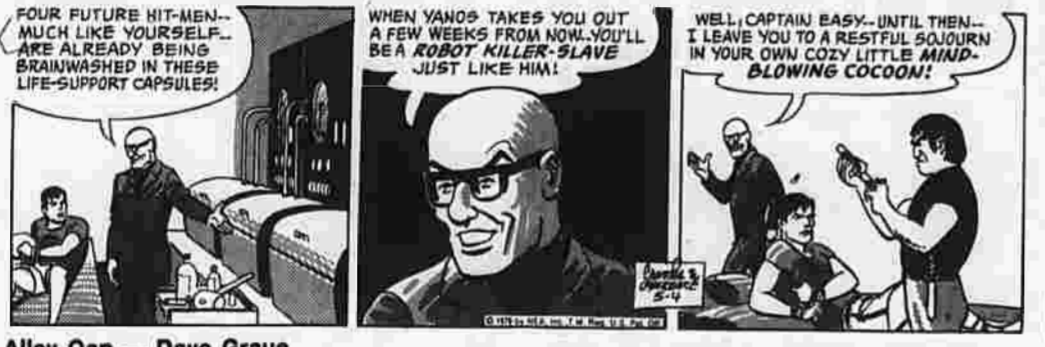

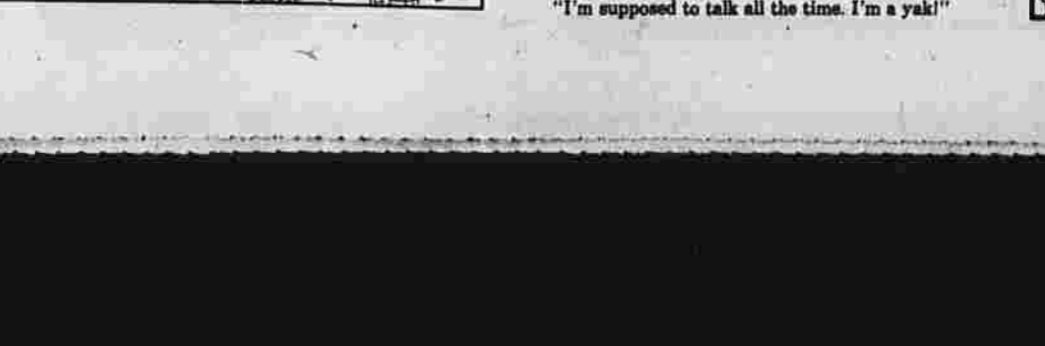

Powers Defends DOT On Right Turn Signs

HARTFORD (UPI) — Angry lawmakers and state transportation officials argued Friday over who was to blame for the confusion created by the right turn on red law that goes into effect in Connecticut on July 1. The confrontation at a meeting of the Legislature's Transportation Committee was based on the location of "No Turn on Red Signs" that will be posted at 35 percent of the state's 10,500 signalized intersections. Powers said there was confusion and misunderstanding with the law and "we have to live with a law not really our choice." But he rejected charges the DOT has attempted to circumvent the law. The commissioner said the problem stems from the posting of no turn signs near schools and playgrounds where there are significant pedestrian conflicts, sight restrictions, and intersections that are dangerous and have advance left turn signals.

Architecture Issue Set

By RUSS MAEKENDRICK These four 15-cent American Architecture stamps will be released at Kansas City, Mo., on June 4. The first-day ceremony will be held in the Municipal Auditorium during the National Convention of the Institute of Architects. There will be 48 stamps to a pane, printed by the intaglio method in brick-red and black, with only one plate number. The upper left stamp shows the Virginia Rotunda, modeled after the Pantheon by Thomas Jefferson. He planned it to be the focal structure for the University of Virginia at Charlottesville. The stamp beside it depicts the Baltimore Cathedral (the oldest cathedral in the country), built by Benjamin Latrobe. It is in the form of a Latin cross with a low Roman dome. Latrobe (1764-1820), is said to have given his services without charge in the years 1805 to 1818 for the construction of this edifice. He built the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts, and the Second Bank of the United States at Philadelphia. In 1815 he began the rebuilding of the Capitol at Washington that had been burned the previous year. One biographer states the Latrobe found American architecture a hobby of amateurs and left it a profession, mainly in the hands of his own pupils. One such pupil was William Stickland (1788-1854), who designed and built Philadelphia Merchants' Exchange shown on the stamp at the lower right. (Stickland's father had worked for Latrobe as a carpenter and one thing led to another.) The Exchange building, dating from 1834, is famous for its unique curving colonnade. The fourth stamp in the set, at the lower left, shows the Boston State House which is still being used for offices and chambers of the chief executive and legislature of Massachusetts. It was built by Charles Bulfinch (1763-1844), back when there were only 15 states in the Union. The golden dome of this building was called "The Hub of the Universe" by Oliver Wendell Holmes. (Actually he said that Bostonians seemed to think it was.) Bulfinch developed Boston Common and built the India Wharf with its warehouses. He took over the job of finishing the National Capitol after Latrobe resigned in 1817. Bulfinch moved to Washington with his family and stayed there until it was done in 1830. We can see some of his work much closer to home -

South Being Drenched By United Press International Gully-washing spring rains set portions of the South awash Friday, sending hundreds of people fleeing for high ground and leaving others stranded. Rescue crews used boats and helicopters to evacuate isolated homes and offices. Flash floods - spawned by up to 7 inches of rain - forced residents from their homes in Middle Tennessee. Up to 10 feet of water covered some roads. Boats and helicopters were pressed into service to rescue people stranded by the high water. "There were cars upriver, floating all over the place," said David Newbern, who was one of about 30 persons airlifted from a flood-isolated south Nashville building. "I lost my car." Floodwaters swamped a TVA power substation, causing a four-hour power blackout in four counties. Schools and businesses throughout the area shut down. The heaviest flooding occurred in south Nashville, nearby areas of Williamson and Rutherford counties and at Lebanon. More than 100 families fled their homes in Williamson County. Other evacuations were ordered in south Nashville, Lebanon and Lavergne, Tenn. Torrential rains doused much of Mississippi Friday, prompting a flash flood watch for all except the coastal counties. More than 4 inches of rain soaked some areas of Mississippi. Thunderstorms dumped up to a half foot of rain on north and central Louisiana, flooding highways and underpasses and forcing scattered evacuations.

BOLTON - With Bolton elections just two days away, it has not evoked much interest, Morris Silverstein (R), member of the Board of Finance and the Zoning Board of Appeals, said Friday. Court Curb Measure Approved by House

HARTFORD (UPI) - The House Friday approved and sent to the Senate constitutional amendments to remove the authority of judges to appoint state attorneys and allow 16-year-olds to seek state office.

Another resolution sent to the Senate would amend the state constitution to create an Appellate Court in the state.

The House, in an emotional two-hour debate, also revived a controversial plan to require able-bodied welfare recipients to go to work or face loss of assistance.

The proposal was made by Rep. Joan Kemler, D-West Hartford, in the form of an amendment to another bill and it touched off heated protests by Reps. Boyd Hinds, D-Hartford, and Robert Walsh, D-Coventry.

Opponents charged the measure would force towns to spend money in enforcing the so-called workfare program.

The amendment was passed 85-59 but the main bill got bogged down in debate. Finally, House Majority Leader John Grillo, D-Windsor, pulled the bill on ice until Tuesday.

Mrs. Kemler's proposal would affect about 7,000 of the 10,000 persons who receive local welfare assistance under a \$38 million program administered by the Department of Income Maintenance.

Another amendment to the proposal would guarantee \$2 million in reimbursements for "reasonable" administration expenses by the towns.

The motion to set up an Appellate Court received a 79-62 vote, less than the required three-fourths majority needed. If approved by the Senate, it will come before the 1981 Legislature. It will then only need a simple majority by both houses to be placed on the ballot in 1982.

The resolution to allow persons as young as 18 to seek state office was approved 112-28. If three-fourths of the Senate approves, the resolution

Two Youths Charged In \$125,000 Blaze

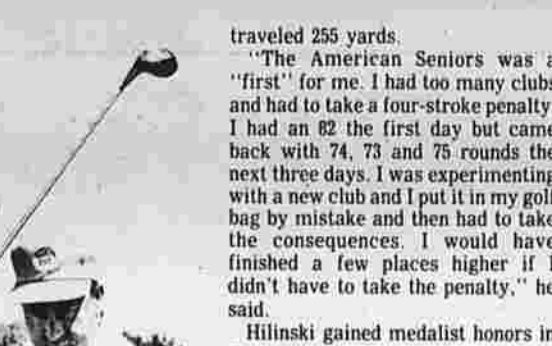
Stan Hilinski Wins Florida Club Title

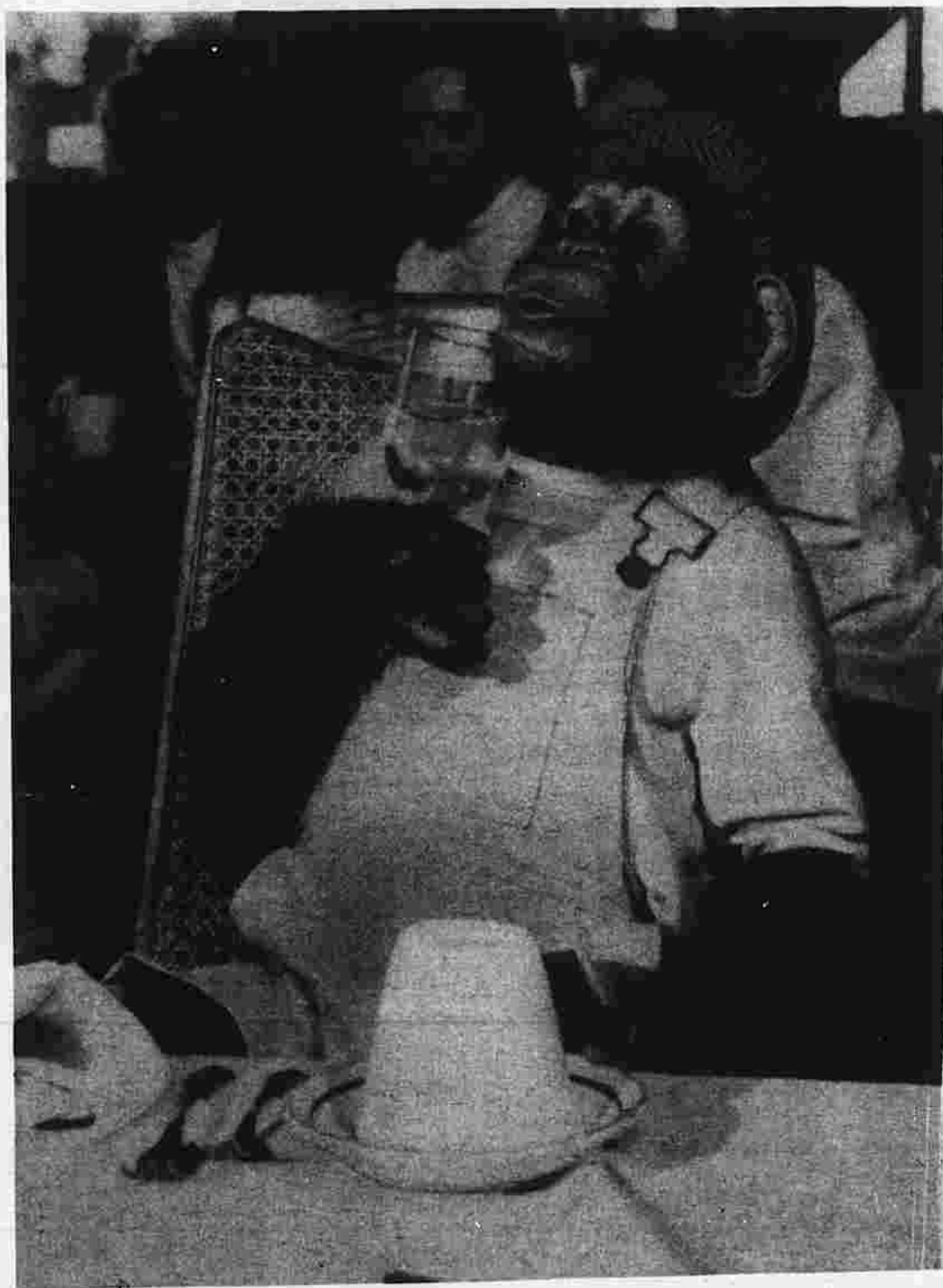

This first television version was praised by British critics as the best treatment of Muriel Spark's work, including the theater version starring Zoe Caldwell in 1961 and the 1968 film starring Maggie Smith.

The talented and versatile Julie Harris, the only actress to receive five coveted Tony awards, will host the six one-hour pro-

grams, which star British actress Geraldine McEwan in the title role. The series chronicles the lives of the free-spirited Jean Brodie, a very progressive school teacher, and a select group of pre-adolescent young ladies whom she befriends and guides.

When Miss Brodie takes a post at the conservative Marcia Blaine School for Girls in Edinburgh in 1930, her unusual and sometimes eccentric approach to teaching strains her relationship with the Headmistress, but "Brodie's girls" love her ways both in and out of the classroom.

"Give me a girl at an

impressionable age and she is mine for life," declares Miss Brodie, "So long as the girls are equipped for the end of term examination, my methods cannot be condemned - unless they can be proved to be in any part improper or subversive."
